HONORING LEYDEN TOWNSHIP ON THEIR 175th ANNIVERSARY

WHEREAS, Leyden Township was established on April 2, 1850, at the house of Richard Fuller, and initially consisted mainly of prairie land with a timber strip along the Des Plaines River; and

WHEREAS, Leyden Township is one of twenty-nine townships located in Cook County; and

WHEREAS, the area was originally known as Orison, and in the 1840s, farmers began settling there. The Chicago & Pacific Railroad laid tracks through the township in 1870; and

WHEREAS, Leyden Township encompasses portions of several municipalities, including Northlake, Melrose Park, Park Ridge, Norridge, and Bensenville, as well as all of River Grove, Schiller Park, Franklin Park, and Elmwood Park; and

WHEREAS, the township has evolved from its agricultural roots to include a variety of residential and industrial areas; and

WHEREAS, the total population of Leyden Township is 93,096 as of the 2020 census; and

WHEREAS, Unincorporated Leyden Township is home to approximately 10,000 residents. Unincorporated Leyden utilizes the Melrose Park Postal Service and uses the Northlake zip code of 60164. The Leyden Fire Protection District and Cook County Sheriff's Police protect the unincorporated area; and

WHEREAS, currently, Leyden Township's government provides services to the residents of the included municipalities, as well as a large unincorporated area; and

WHEREAS, Leyden Township supports its senior citizens. The township reevaluates senior service programs every day to meet the needs and desires of three generations of older adults. Leyden Township senior programs continue to expand current and develop new programs and opportunities for this dynamic generation of older adults and have an eye towards the future; and

WHEREAS, Leyden Township's food pantry supports individuals and households access to food, maintaining food security and diet quality; and

WHEREAS, Leyden Township collaborates with many community organizations to support food pantry services. Leyden Township community partners know the importance of donating to the food pantry

because it allows the Township to better serve residents and provide resources for those in need. Individuals continue to donate to help fight hunger in their community, making a lasting difference; and

WHEREAS, Leyden Township supports their veterans. Leyden Townships Veteran Liaison advocates for those Veterans and their respective family members who are either uninformed or have given up on seeking out earned benefits; and

WHEREAS, Leyden Township is dedicated to building a stronger community through educational and recreational programming. By offering numerous activities and events, Leyden brings residents with diverse backgrounds and common interests together. Leyden Township currently has five parks, one boxing gym, a community meeting room, and one community center; and

WHEREAS, the Township with collaboration of local businesses, Sheriff's Police, the Leyden Fire Protection District, surrounding municipalities, Manage Care Organizations, Health Care Providers and Leyden Family Services believes in celebrating as a community. Community events are constantly held throughout the township, including National Night Out, a Christmas Tree Lighting, and Leyden Township's Health Fair; and

WHEREAS, Leyden Township, from leadership to their constituents, have always strived to build a township centered around strong community ties, commerce and business development, and support for the municipalities and the residents located within Leyden Township.

RESOLUTION CELEBRATING THE LEAGUERS 70TH ANNIVERSARY AND DECLARING MAY 30, 2025, THROUGH JUNE 2, 2025, "LEAGUERS' WEEKEND"

WHEREAS, the Chicago Urban League was founded in 1916 and is an affiliate of one of the largest civil rights organizations in the country; and

WHEREAS, for seven decades, the Leaguers, an auxiliary organization of the Chicago Urban League, centered community voices in cultural consciousness; and

WHEREAS, upon Muriel Ibom receiving her master's degree from Atlanta University (no Clark-Atlanta University), the legendary Whitney M. Young, Jr. recommended Muriel Ibom for a position with the Chicago Urban League (CUL). The Chicago Urban League hired Muriel Ibom as a community representative, responsible for attending various community meetings to raise awareness about the League and to communicate the organization's positions to people in the community; and

WHEREAS, Muriel Ibom quickly realized the League also needed fundraising support which prompted her to pull together about thirty (30) of their women friends in their twenties (20s) to support the League's efforts. Muriel Ibom gathered women of different backgrounds who never previously worked together on any project. These women created the name for their new group: Leaguers. Three of our original members were still active until the mid-2000s - Grace Allen, Alice Griffin, and Mary Lou McDowell. Muriel Ibom once stated, "we wanted to do something positive for the Chicago Urban League," remembers Ibom of the women she gathered; and

WHEREAS, the Leaguers' first fundraising effort was selling chicken dinners for \$1.00 to men working at area service stations. This effort in 1955 laid the groundwork for The Leaguers auxiliary, currently one of three CUL auxiliaries.

WHEREAS, the Leaguers serve as an auxiliary to the Chicago Urban League to advance the organization's mission and achieve the group's civic, social, and financial objectives. The Leaguers' members are also dedicated to the principles of the League to improve race relations and the achievement of equality and opportunity for all Chicagoans; and

WHEREAS, the Leaguers' aims are:

- 1) to assist with CUL fundraising;
- 2) perpetuate CUL policies /programs;
- 3) interest the community in CUL's work; and
- 4) acquaint Chicagoans with the challenges that CUL addresses; and

WHEREAS, the Leaguers previously hosted several notable events such as:

- 1) The Annual Dinner Dances Support for all CUL undertakings;
- 5) Fashion Extravaganzas. Trips to Las Vegas and Jamaica;
- 6) Masquerade Balls Membership Retreats;
- 7) Assist in CUL Membership Campaigns Theatre Parties; and
- 8) The 50th Anniversary "Golden Reflections" Gala (2005); and

WHEREAS, the main benefit of being a Leaguer is the satisfaction Leaguers experience as full partners with the League in the quest for economic and social equality as the League works to bring people into the economic mainstream.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, we Bill Lowry, Cook County Commissioner of the 3rd district, and Toni Preckwinkle, president of the Cook County Board of Commissioner, on behalf of the residents of Cook County, does hereby celebrate the Leaguers 70th anniversary and do declare May 30, 2025, through June 2, 2025, "Leaguers' Weekend"; and

HONORING THE RESURRECTION PROJECT (TRP) ON THEIR 35TH ANNIVERSARY

WHEREAS, The Resurrection Project (TRP) is located at 1818 S. Paulina Street, Chicago, IL 60608 serving primarily the neighborhoods of Pilsen, Little Village, Back of the Yards, and surrounding areas; and

WHEREAS, TRP was founded in 1990, emerging from a grassroots effort in Chicago's Pilsen neighborhood, where a group of six local parishes came together in response to the neglect, violence, and

economic disinvestment plaguing Pilsen in the late 1980's and early 1990's; and

WHEREAS, these churches pooled \$5,000 each, creating seed capital totaling \$30,000 to launch the

organization focused on community-driven change; and

WHEREAS, TRP's initial mission was to empower residents to advocate for cleaner streets, safer neighborhoods, affordable housing, and access to quality education and resources; and

WHEREAS, TRP began as a grassroots advocacy group, organizing locals to reclaim and rebuild their community; and

WHEREAS, in 1991, TRP purchased its first property, the St. Vitus complex and Zócalo plaza at 18th and Paulina, marking a shift into the real estate market housing; and

WHEREAS, by 1999, TRP had taken the lead in Pilsen's redevelopment as part of LISC Chicago's New Communities Program, bringing together a coalition to develop a multi-year neighborhood revitalization plan. and

WHEREAS, TRP has grown to include affordable housing projects, community centers, financial services, legal support, and advocacy, benefiting not only Pilsen, but also Little Village, Back of the Yards, and the wider Chicago area communities; and

WHEREAS, TRP's founding model, built on community leadership, parish support, and a mission-driven approach, laid the groundwork for decades of social impact; and

WHEREAS, the initial \$30,000 investment sparked a transformation that eventually channeled hundreds of millions in community investment and established TRP as a statewide social impact organization. and

WHEREAS, TRP's main areas of focus include affordable housing development, financial wellness and asset building, immigration legal services, community organizing and civic engagement, and health equity Wellness; and

WHEREAS, Awards received by TRP include the Richard H. Driehaus Foundation Award for Outstanding Non-Profit Neighborhood Real Estate Project, Advancing Cities Award from JPMorgan Chase, Chicago Community Trust Outstanding Community Strategy of the Year, MacArthur Foundation Community Capital Grant, CDFI certification, Chicago Neighborhood Development Awards, Excellence in Community Service Award from MALDEF, and Lincoln Laureate; and

WHEREAS, TRP has invested more than \$600 million in community development, creating over 900 affordable housing units and supporting thousands of families through immigration, housing, and financial services, reaching more than 40,000 residents with direct services and outreach annually.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION

HONORING THE LITTLE VILLAGE LAWNDALE HIGH SCHOOL (LVLHS) ON ITS 20TH ANNIVERSARY

WHEREAS, the Little Village Lawndale High School (LVLHS) is a public high school located in the South Lawndale (Little Village) neighborhood of the City of Chicago; and

WHEREAS, the LVLHS opened in 2005 and serves students from the South Lawndale (Little Village) and North Lawndale areas; and

WHEREAS, the LVLHS originated from the community's fundamental conviction that dignified education is a human right that should be accessible to the Brown and Black young people of the South, West, and Southwest sides of the City of Chicago. Community members and advocates fought for what was promised to them about opening a new high school and led fourteen parents and grandparents to a nineteen-day hunger strike in 2001; and

WHEREAS, on May 13, 2001, 14 parents and community activists began a hunger strike demanding that the city move forward with building the promised school; and

WHEREAS, the group known as "The 14" or sometimes the "Hunger Strikers" fasted for 19 days, drinking only water; and

WHEREAS, "The 14" camped outside the site at 31st Street and Kostner Avenue, drawing media attention and political pressure; and

WHEREAS, as the activists of the hunger strike continued to advocate for control of the school model, they collectively went door-to-door asking parents to create an ideal situation in which their children could learn. These surveys produced fascinating results. Parents responded that they wanted a safe, small, and academically rigorous place for their children; and

WHEREAS, out of the survey results, the LVLHS created a structure that encompassed four autonomous schools within its campus; and

WHEREAS, one of the high schools is the Multicultural Academy of Scholarships (MAS) High School that aims to celebrate art, dance, and music as part of the curriculum; and

WHEREAS, the World Language High School aims to value bilingualism and biculturalism; and

WHEREAS, in the surveys, parents also called on the educators to prepare students for the ever-increasing jobs requiring strong math, science, and technological skills, which led to the formation of the Infinity Math, Science, and Technology High School; and

WHEREAS, the final high school was established as the Greater Lawndale High School for Social Justice (SOJO). This was the result of responses from the surveys that showed a pattern of the community wanting to "keep the values of peace and equity." Parents wanted all the children who graduated from the new high school never to forget the physical, spiritual, and communal struggle it took to achieve justice; and

WHEREAS, the Infinity, Math, Science, and Technology High School prepares students for the ever-increasing jobs requiring these skills; and

WHEREAS, each school has its own principal and teaching staff, and has approximately 385 to 400 students; and

WHEREAS the LVLHS has received the 2006 Cisco Project of the Year, acknowledging the school's building project as a significant success story; and

WHEREAS, in the spring of 2009, each school graduated from its first Senior class. Almost ten years after the start of community meetings and organizing in 1999, children have joined their parents in celebrating both the community's struggle to achieve this milestone and their personal academic and social journeys into the adult world.

WHEREAS, as of now, LVLHS continues to be a beacon of the South and North Lawndale communities, serving approximately 1,400 students in grades 9-12 and offering Advanced Placement (AP) courses, with 29% of the students enrolled.

WHEREA, in 2006, youth leaders from Access Living led a campaign to restore millions of dollars that had been cut from the Chicago Public Schools' budget; and

WHEREAS, Access Living empowers people with disabilities through advocacy, legal support, independent living training, and public policy; and

WHEREAS, Access Living works locally, statewide, and nationally to protect rights and eliminate systemic obstacles that prevent full participation in society.

RECOGNIZING JUNE AS ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE AND BRAIN AWARENESS MONTH

WHEREAS, June is Alzheimer's Disease and Brain Awareness Month, a time to raise awareness about Alzheimer's disease and other dementias, and to promote overall brain health; and

WHEREAS, Alzheimer's Disease and Brain Awareness Month was officially recognized by the Alzheimer's Association in June 2014; and

WHEREAS, according to the Alzheimer's Association, over 55 million people worldwide are currently living with Alzheimer's or another form of dementia; and

WHEREAS, in 2020, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), as many as 5.8 million Americans were living with Alzheimer's disease. The CDC expects that number to climb to about 95 million by 2060

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WHEREAS, right now, Alzheimer's Disease is the sixth leading cause of death among adults in the U.S.; and

WHEREAS, the number of people living with Alzheimer's disease doubles every five years after age 65; and

WHEREAS, more than 90% of Alzheimer's Disease cases don't show symptoms until after the age of 60. In 2018, the estimated total cost of healthcare for people with dementia and Alzheimer's was \$277 billion; and

WHEREAS, no cure currently exists, but early detection and support can improve quality of life As of 2025, approximately 7.2 million Americans aged 65+ are living with Alzheimer's Disease; and

WHEREAS, 38.6% of individuals aged 75 to 84 have Alzheimer's Disease, while 35.4% of those aged 85+; and

WHEREAS, Black Americans are nearly twice as likely, and Hispanics about 1.5 times as likely, to develop Alzheimer's compared to white Americans; and

WHEREAS, about 33% of Alzheimer's Disease patients in 2025 will be 85+ years old-a high-risk age group; and

WHEREAS, Alzheimer's and Brain Awareness Month works alongside other awareness campaigns, including National Alzheimer's Disease Awareness Month in November (created by President Reagan in 1983) and World Alzheimer's Disease Month in September (launched globally in 2012); and

WHEREAS, this month-long initiative aims to educate the public, support those affected, and encourage proactive steps to maintain optimal brain health.

WHEREAS, every June, National Microchip Month is an awareness campaign designed to promote pet microchipping as a simple, safe, and effective means of helping reunite lost pets with their owners; and

WHEREAS, by 1985, U.S.-based AVID Identification Systems, Inc. filed a patent for microchipping technology; and

WHEREAS, in the late 1980s to early 1990s, the first microchips were being implanted into pets; and

WHEREAS, in 2004, the American Food and Drug Administration stated that microchipping is a safe process for both animals and humans; and

WHEREAS, 1 in 3 pets will become lost at some point in their lives; and

WHEREAS, pets with microchips are 20 times more likely to be reunited with their families; and

WHEREAS, a microchip is permanent and can't be removed or fall off like a collar; and

WHEREAS, over 10 million pets are lost each year in the U.S; and

WHEREAS, only 22% of lost dogs without microchips are returned to their owners, compared to 52% with microchips; and

WHEREAS, for cats, the numbers are even more dramatic-38% of microchipped cats make it home,

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compared to less than 2% without; and

WHEREAS, a microchip is a tiny chip (about the size of a grain of rice) implanted under a pet's skin, usually between the shoulder blades.

WHEREAS, a microchip carries a unique ID number that links to a national pet registry; and

WHEREAS, vets and shelters use scanners to read the ID and contact the registered owner; and

WHEREAS, one can register the chip with your contact information; and

WHEREAS, a pet owner should update their information anytime they move or change phone numbers, it is crucial to have their pet's chips up to date; and

WHEREAS, the individuals can have their vet scan the chip during regular checkups to ensure it's still working; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Department of Animal & Rabies Control (ARC) hosts free or low-cost microchip clinics for pets all over the county.

RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING THE EFFORTS OF THE RACIAL EQUITY RAPID

Board of Commissioners RESPONSE TEAM

WHEREAS, for over 180 years, Cook County Health (hereinafter, "CCH") provided and continues to provide health care to everyone, regardless of race, ethnicity, immigration status, sexual orientation, or ability to pay; and

WHEREAS, in addition to providing direct clinical care, CCH also works to identify and address social needs, including but not limited to food insecurity, housing instability, and justice involvement. Additionally, CCH has a long history of working to address structural and systemic racism and take an inclusive approach in its work; and

WHEREAS, CCH is a founding hospital member of West Side United, including Ascension Health, Lurie Children's Hospital, RUSH, Sinai Chicago, and UI Health. CCH was also a co-convenor of the Racial Equity Rapid Respond Team (hereinafter, "RERRT") at the request the City of Chicago Mayor's Office, under former Mayor Lori Lightfoot; and

WHEREAS, The RERRT centered racial equity in all its efforts to address the pandemic to save lives and alleviate further harm to Black and Latinx communities; and

WHEREAS, the RERRT became a model worth replicating in other cities, including New York City, struggling to address inequitable health outcomes, including and beyond COVID-19, and the systemic issues underpinning them; and

WHEREAS, The RERRT convened communities and formed coalitions between government agencies, health providers, and community organizations. The RERRT identified needs and disparities by gathering community insight, advocating for resources, championing reliable data and information, and promoting healthy behavior; and

WHEREAS, The RERRT partnered with twenty-one (21) healthcare providers to proactively reach out to patients in communities most impacted by COVID-19, contacting approximately 75,000 patients. Of those who provided race/ethnicity information, 48% self-identified as Black and 40% self-identified as Latinx; and

WHEREAS, RERRT's key local partners included, City of Chicago Mayor's Office, Chicago Department of Public Health, West Side United, Civic Consulting Alliance, Rush University Medical Center, Sinai Urban Health Institute, University of Chicago, Advocate Health, University of Illinois Chicago, Austin Coming Together, Greater Auburn Gresham Development Corporation, South Shore Works, Enlace, Latinos Progresando, NW Side Housing Center, ChiByDesign, South West Organizing Project, Chicago COVID Response Fund, Oprah Winfrey Charitable Foundation and more; and

WHEREAS, The RERRT in partnership with the Civic Consulting Alliance facilitated collaboration between healthcare providers, which culminated in an unprecedented joint statement in mid-June, in which forty (40) institutions spoke out in a unified voice to declare racism a public health crisis and pledge collective action to improve health equity; and

WHEREAS, The RERRT worked to place testing sites in historically underserved communities, resulting in eight (8) testing sites in RERRT target locations and mobile testing sites to making testing more accessible; and

WHEREAS. The RERRT in partnership with local and national philanthropy secured financial support for those most impacted by COVID-19, including \$3.1M in grants secured by partners, \$155K in rent assistance, and cash assistance, including \$120K for 120 individuals ineligible for federal stimulus dollars; and

WHEREAS, within the first two (2) months of its launch, the RERRT distributed critical resources to communities, including 130,000 masks and 13,000 plus meals, reaching 8,000 households and more than 2,000 seniors. The RERRT enabled public access to COVID-19 data via a Slalom dashboard providing testing, case, and death rates by race/ethnicity and at the zip code-level establishing Chicago as a national leader in data transparency; and

WHEREAS, The RERRT commissioned the Driving Equitable Resource Distribution report compiled by ChiByDesign proposing five (5) strategies and fourteen (14) guiding principles to ensure cross collaboration between business, government and philanthropy.

WHEREAS, 160 years ago on June 19, 1865, Major General Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston, Texas, and issued General Order No. 3, with news the Civil War ended and the enslaved were free; and

WHEREAS, prior to Major General Gordon Granger's issuance of General Order No. 3, President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation on September 22, 1862. The Emancipation Proclamation declared slaves in the Confederate states, "shall be then, thenceforward, and forever free." Subsequently, the issuance of General Order No.3 came nearly two and a half years after President Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation went into effect on January 1, 1863; and

WHEREAS, the Emancipation Proclamation laid the groundwork for the passage of the Thirteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution abolishing slavery throughout the United States and its territories; and

WHEREAS, formerly enslaved African Americans, along with free African Americans known as freedmen, in the Southwest region of the United States of America celebrated June 19th, commonly known as "Juneteenth Independence Day" as the anniversary of their emancipation; and

WHEREAS, African Americans from the Southwest region continued the tradition of celebrating Juneteenth Independence Day as inspiration and encouragement for future generations; and

WHEREAS, now, Juneteenth, also known as "Emancipation Day," and "Freedom Day," continues to be the most recognized and the oldest African American commemorations in the United States; and

WHEREAS, for 160 years, Juneteenth Independence Day celebrations have been held to honor and commemorate African American freedom throughout the country.

WHEREAS, now June 19th, is now officially recognized as a ceremonial holiday in all fifty (50) states in some form. Texas was the first to declare Juneteenth a state holiday in 1980 and Illinois in 2022. Additionally, twenty-nine (29) of the fifty states, recognize Juneteenth as a paid holiday. Illinois recognized Juneteenth as a paid state holiday in 2021; and

WHEREAS, Cook County, the largest county in Illinois, and second largest county in the United States by population, declared Juneteenth a county holiday on December 17, 2020, with a unanimous vote; and

WHEREAS, in January 2021, Cook County established the Cook County Juneteenth Planning Committee partnering with organizations and communities to celebrate contributions of the many African Americans from the past and present whose families were liberated, thereby allowing them to be free

WHEREAS, Cook County Juneteenth Planning Committee partners with separate elected officials, community-based organizations, residents, and Juneteenth Illinois NFP Inc. on its annual Juneteenth Illinois Celebration, including the (1) Juneteenth Illinois Pres Conference, (2) Juneteenth Scholarship Reception, (3) panel discussions centered around Juneteenth program principles (Health, Justice, Education and Wealth), and other events celebrating the history and importance of Juneteenth.

ESTABLISHING BLACK INFERTILITY AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH WEEK IN COOK COUNTY

WHEREAS, Black women in the United States experience unacceptably poor maternal health outcomes, including disproportionately high rates of death related to pregnancy or childbirth, and are three to four times more likely to experience a pregnancy-related death than white women, numbers that are mirrored in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, a person's race should never determine their health outcomes, and pregnancy and childbirth should be safe for all. However, for far too many Black women, safety and equity have been tragically denied due to generations of systemic disadvantages in health care delivery and health care access, including lack of access to health care information and services, lack of insurance coverage, denial of therapeutics, limited access to contraceptive services, and cultural biases and discrimination in medical practice and medical education; and

WHEREAS, additionally overall reproductive health challenges affecting Black individuals and families related to challenges such as infertility are related to lack of equitable healthcare access, and the systemic barriers that contribute to reproductive health disparities in the Black community; and

WHEREAS, reproductive health is a lifelong journey that encompasses infertility, maternal health, menopause, and overall gynecological well-being, all of which disproportionately impact the Black community; and

WHEREAS, black women experience higher rates of infertility, higher risks of pregnancy-related complications, and more severe menopausal symptoms, yet often receive less access to quality care, fewer treatment options, and inadequate medical support. However, it is equally important to acknowledge the reproductive health challenges faced by Black men, an often-overlooked aspect of reproductive health in our community; and

WHEREAS, black men face significant barriers to understanding and addressing their reproductive health. Male infertility, which accounts for 50% of infertility cases, is rarely discussed or diagnosed in Black communities. Additionally, Black men face cultural stigmas around discussing infertility, further contributing to delays in diagnosis and treatment; and

WHEREAS, there are also significant health disparities impacting Black men, such as higher rates of obesity, diabetes, and hypertension, which can all negatively affect reproductive health. Yet, despite the clear need, Black men receive less access to male fertility assessments and treatments, leading to missed opportunities for addressing these issues earlier in their reproductive journeys; and

WHEREAS, infertility alone is a widespread issue, affecting millions of individuals. It is defined as the inability to conceive after one year of unprotected intercourse for women under 35 and six months for women 35 and older; and

WHEREAS, black individuals experience infertility at disproportionately high rates, with 30% of Black women, men, and couples struggling to conceive, higher than their White counterparts. Additionally, conditions such as uterine fibroids, which affect 80% of Black women by age 50, and sickle cell disease, which disproportionately affects Black individuals, increase the risk of infertility; and

WHEREAS, beyond medical challenges, the stigma surrounding infertility and reproductive health issues in the Black community creates profound emotional and psychological distress. In a culture where family and motherhood are deeply valued, many suffer in silence-discouraged from seeking help or speaking openly about their struggles. This silence exacerbates feelings of isolation and contributes to adverse maternal health outcomes; and

WHEREAS, to confront this crisis, Fertility for Colored Girls & The Guys is launching "Hold On to Hope: Infertility and Reproductive Health in the Black Community," a groundbreaking documentary that will feature personal stories from men and women, expert insights, discussions on disparities, and advocacy efforts. This documentary will serve as a powerful educational tool and a call to action, shedding light on the realities of Black reproductive health while providing hope and resources to those in need; and

WHEREAS, this Honorable Body wishes to promote equitable access to fertility resources, and advocate for culturally competent reproductive healthcare across all stages of life, from fertility to menopause, and for both Black women and men;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Members of the Cook County Board of Commissioners thanks and supports the efforts of Fertility for Colored Girls & The Guys and encourages advocacy for the official recognition of National Black Infertility and Reproductive Health Week, to be observed beginning June 23, 2025; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that in support of these efforts, be it hereby declared that the week of June 23, 2025, be commemorated as National Black Infertility and Reproductive Health Week in the County of Cook; and

WHEREAS, Kefir is a fermented milk drink similar to a thin yogurt or ayran that is made from kefir grains; and

WHEREAS, Kefir dates back to the Bronze Age. Traditional kefir was made in goatskin bags that were hung near a doorway; the bags would be knocked by anyone passing through to keep the milk and kefir grains well mixed; and

WHEREAS, the name Kefir comes from the Turkish word "keyif," which refers to the "good feeling" a person gets after drinking it; and

WHEREAS, 2025 marks the 11th International Day of Yoga, celebrated worldwide under the theme 'Yoga for One Earth, One Health', a reminder that individual well-being and planetary wellness are deeply interconnected; and

WHEREAS, Yoga, originating in India over 3,000 years ago is a comprehensive system of physical postures, breathwork, meditation, and spiritual wisdom designed to foster harmony of body and mind; and

WHEREAS, the Sanskrit word 'Yoga' derives from the root 'Yuj', meaning 'to join' or 'to unite', symbolizing the integration of body, mind, and consciousness; and

PROPOSED RESOLUTION

PROCLAIMING PRIDE MONTH IN COOK COUNTY

WHEREAS, Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Intersex and Asexual (LGBTQIA+) Pride Month is celebrated every June to honor the 1969 Stonewall Uprising in Manhattan and works to achieve equal justice and opportunity for LGBTQIA+ Americans, as well as recognize the impact that LGBTQIA+ individuals have had on society at local, national, and international levels; and

WHEREAS, the Stonewall Riots were a series of demonstrations in which members of the LGBTQIA+ community protested police raids and harassment and marked the beginning of the modern LGBTQIA+ rights movement; and

WHEREAS, the first Pride March was held in New York City on June 28, 1970, on the one-year anniversary of the Stonewall Uprising; and

WHEREAS, the LGBTQIA+ movement and its allies have fought hard to win the right to one's gender, to marry, and to start families while also continuing to fight against hate speech, hate crimes, and ongoing discrimination targeted at both the personal and legal levels; and

WHEREAS, the current national political environment has created very real legal and physical dangers for the LGBTQIA+ community; and

WHEREAS, according to the Southern Poverty Law Center, in 2024, the number of anti-LGBTQ+ groups increased by about 13% from the previous year; and

WHEREAS, according to the ACLU there are over 588 anti-LGBTQ+ bills introduced in the U.S.; and

WHEREAS, according to the ACLU, almost 60 of these introduced anti-LGBTQ+ bills have already passed in several states, including Iowa's S.F.418 signed by Governor Kim Reynolds on February 28, 2025, that removed "gender identity" protections from discrimination in housing, employment, wages and public accommodations from the state's civil rights code in addition to removing transgender Iowans' ability to change their sex designation on a birth certificate after receiving medical transition care.; and

WHEREAS, according to the GLAAD ALERT Desk, in 2024 there at least 918 anti-LGBTQ incidents across the US - the equivalent of 2.5 incidents every day; and

WHEREAS, according to GLAAD, there have been 2,242 attacks on LGBTQ+ individuals since June 2022; and

WHEREAS, according to the February 2025 brief from the Williams Institute at the UCLA School of Law 'Anti-LGBT Victimization in the United States', researchers found that recent developments and years of attacks on the LGBTQ+ community can lead to increased violence against LGBTQ+ people; and

WHEREAS, the brief goes on to note that "researchers found that following Trump campaign rallies in 2016, which the authors described as containing hate rhetoric, there was an increase in hate-motivated incidents in the counties where the rallies happened as compared to other counties and the same counties prior to the rally"; and

WHEREAS, the brief also mentions that "Following online attacks on transgender care, hospitals and doctors faced increased harassment, including death threats. This rhetoric and the anti-LGBT sentiments it promotes can lead to adverse mental health outcomes for LGBT people"; and

WHEREAS, Pride Month is observed each year to center the ongoing issues of the community while also celebrating its rich history, successes, stories; and

WHEREAS, a new study from Northeastern University in Boston reveals companies with LGBTQ+ board members outperform their rivals that don't have the same representation, finding that Fortune 500 companies with LGBTQ+ board members outperform their peers in both financial and non-financial metrics; and

WHEREAS, on May 20, 2025, Washington Governor Bob Ferguson signed into law H.B. 1296 which bans discrimination against marginalized groups, including LGBTQ+ people, establishes clear complaint procedures for when violations occur, and also limits parental access to children's health care and counseling information, protecting LGBTQ+ students from being outed to their parents without their consent; and

WHEREAS, on May 13, 2025, the Eleventh Circuit Court of Appeals issued its decision against Florida's SB 1438 that sought to make it a crime to admit young people to any performance, exhibit, play, or show that the state deems inappropriate - including drag shows - even if the child's parents think it is appropriate for their family, with the court calling the law overbroad and saying that it attempts to take a "shotgun" to constitutionally protected free speech rights; and

WHEREAS, on April 15, 2025, the Illinois High School Association (IHSA) reaffirmed its current policy that trans athletes can continue to participate in high school sports competitions, despite the demands to exclude trans athletes by the Trump administration and Illinois Republican lawmakers; and

WHEREAS, the annual iconic Chicago Pride Parade is one of the largest Pride events in the country during which residents throughout Cook County, Illinois, and the nation have the opportunity to come together, celebrate, and stand as one with the LGBTQIA+ community, their families, and friends; and

WHEREAS, the Chicago Pride Parade will return for its 54th year with a message of solidarity amid a volatile political climate under the theme of "United in Pride" on June 29, 2025, at 11 a.m.; and

WHEREAS, the LGBTQIA+ community is an important contributor to the diverse and vibrant communities across Cook County and as such Cook County must continue to loudly and proudly fight to affirm, welcome, and protect this community; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners does hereby proclaim June 2025 to be Pride Month in Cook County; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the President and the Cook County Board of Commissioners does hereby recommit to strengthening the advancement of equity for the LGBTQIA+ community across Cook County.

RECOGNIZING JUNE 6 AS GUN VIOLENCE PREVENTION DAY IN COOK COUNTY AND IMPLEMENTING "WEAR ORANGE DAY" ACROSS ALL COUNTY AGENCIES

WHEREAS, gun violence remains a public health crisis affecting communities across Cook County, particularly in historically disinvested Black and Brown neighborhoods where trauma, grief, and inequity persist; and

WHEREAS, the United States recorded over 48,800 gun deaths in 2021-including more than 26,000 suicides and nearly 21,000 homicides-the highest number in a single year, according to the 2023 Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health report; and

WHEREAS, in 2021, the Cook County Medical Examiner's Office reported 1,087 gun-related homicides, and 739 such homicides in 2023, reflecting a continuing crisis that demands coordinated, urgent, and community-centered action; and

WHEREAS, gun violence is now the leading cause of death for children and young adults in the United States, and Black Americans are over 10 times more likely than white Americans to die by firearm homicide; and

WHEREAS, Hadiya Pendleton, a 15-year-old honor student from King College Prep High School in Chicago, was tragically killed in 2013-just days after performing at President Barack Obama's second inauguration-catalyzing a national movement; and

WHEREAS, in Hadiya's honor, the color orange-her favorite-has become a national symbol for gun violence awareness and is worn each year on June 6, now recognized as Gun Violence Prevention Day; and

WHEREAS, U.S. Senators Dick Durbin and Tammy Duckworth, along with Congresswoman Robin Kelly, introduced a federal resolution in 2025 formally recognizing June 6 as National Gun Violence Prevention Day; and

WHEREAS, community organizations such as Moms Demand Action, organizing both nationally and locally within the 1st District of Cook County, have played a vital role in mobilizing awareness, policy advocacy, and survivor support across neighborhoods impacted by gun violence; and

WHEREAS, Bertha Parham, a dedicated leader with Moms Demand Action in the 1st District, has led

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with compassion, courage, and clarity, standing as a pillar of strength and advocacy for families throughout the district and beyond; and

WHEREAS, Cook County recognizes that lasting change requires partnership with community leaders and organizations, and that voices on the frontlines-like those of Moms Demand Action-must inform the County's response; and

WHEREAS, Cook County, via the Justice Advisory Council, has made strategic investments in community-based violence prevention initiatives, including the historic \$110 million Gun Violence Prevention and Reduction Grant made possible through the American Rescue Plan Act; and

WHEREAS, two complementary initiatives managed by the Justice Advisory Council-Cook County Community Violence Intervention (CC-CVI) and Cook County Wraparound Services for Survivors of Gun Violence (CC-SGV)-are launching this summer to further improve community safety; and

WHEREAS, additional community safety investments include JAC-led programs such as Cook County Reconnect, the Domestic Violence Intervention and Support Services Initiative, and behavioral health grants under *Stronger Together: Building a More Equitable Behavioral Health System in Cook County*, managed by Cook County Health; and

WHEREAS, in 2021, Cook County helped form the Government Alliance for Safe Communities to improve coordination and maximize the impact of investments in violence prevention by the State of Illinois, Cook County, and the City of Chicago; and

WHEREAS, the Government Alliance for Safe Communities has established key partnerships with philanthropic, business, research, and nonprofit stakeholders to support the sustainability and lasting impact of violence prevention efforts; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Clerk's Office has participated in Gun Violence Prevention Day by encouraging staff to observe "Wear Orange Day" and stand in solidarity with victims and survivors; and

WHEREAS, Commissioner Tara Stamps, a lifelong educator and advocate for equity and justice, urges all County departments, agencies, and staff to honor the lives lost and stand united in pursuit of a safer, more just future;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the President and Cook County Board of Commissioners, that June 6-or the first Friday of each June-shall be designated as Gun Violence Prevention Day in Cook County; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all Cook County agencies are encouraged to observe "Wear Orange Day" on June 6 by encouraging staff to wear orange, host awareness activities, and collaborate with community partners to educate and engage the public; and
