# PROPOSED RESOLUTION FOR SAFE AND THRIVING COMMUNITIES PROGRAM INITIATIVES IMPLEMENTED BY THE JUSTICE ADVISORY COUNCIL

**WHEREAS,** on March 11, 2021, the federal government authorized the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 ("ARPA") which includes \$1.9 trillion in federal stimulus funds to hasten the United States' recovery from the economic and health effects caused by the COVID-19 pandemic; and

**WHEREAS,** specifically, the federal government has authorized and allocated a federal award of approximately \$1,000,372,385.00 of ARPA funding to Cook County to assist the County in its recovery from the economic and health effects of COVID-19; and

**WHEREAS,** on June 24, 2021, the Cook County American Rescue Plan Act Framework (the "ARPA Framework") was presented to the Cook County Board of Commissioners; and

**WHEREAS,** the Cook County Board of Commissioners, via Resolution 21-3654, accepted the ARPA federal award allocated to Cook County to assist the County in its recovery from the economic and health effects of COVID-19 in the amount of approximately \$1,000,372,385.00; and

**WHEREAS,** Resolution 21-3654 further authorized the Cook County Budget Director and Comptroller to create and implement a Special Purpose Fund for the ARPA award and other accounting measures to track the acceptance and spending of the federal award; and

**WHEREAS,** the Cook County Board of Commissioners authorized the Chief Financial Officer, Budget Director, Chief Procurement Officer and applicable using agencies to issue grants, contracts and agreements for ARPA programs approved via Resolutions 22-3657 and 22-0637; and

**WHEREAS,** to further the Policy Roadmap Goal, the Justice Advisory Council has developed a menu of Safe and Thriving Community programs and initiatives which have undergone review and approval through the Project Management Office process to utilize ARPA funding for such programs and initiatives pursuant to the issuance of grants, contracts, and agreements; and

**WHEREAS**, Resolutions 22-3657 and 22-0637 provided that any grants issued regarding ARPA programs in an amount over \$1M shall require the approval of the Cook County Board of Commissioners; and

**WHEREAS,** In June and July of 2022 the Cook County Board approved Resolutions 22-3550 and 22-4291 for the Justice Advisory Council's (JAC) Gun Violence Prevention and Reduction Grant Awardees; and

**WHEREAS,** The JAC identified 34 awardees representing 68 organizations and \$75 million of awards as recipients of recipients of ARPA Initiative NT897: Gun Violence Prevention and Reduction Grants through Resolutions 22-3550 and 22-4291, but received 190 applications totaling a request of roughly \$500,000,000.00; and

**WHEREAS,** The JAC committed to searching for additional funding to support highly qualified applicants from ARPA Initiative NT897: Gun Violence Prevention and Reduction Grant program; and

**WHEREAS,** the Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS)- Office of Firearm Violence Prevention (OFVP) reviewed and endorsed the JAC's application review process for ARPA Initiative NT897 and has awarded the JAC \$25,000,000 to support funding an additional 39 Cook County Gun Violence Prevention and Reduction applicants, representing 74 organizations; and

WHEREAS, these awards will be made to applicants providing street outreach intervention, case management and victim services in the geographic areas defined as communities impacted by gun violence in the Reimagine Public Safety Act (RPSA) (430 ILCS 69); and

**WHEREAS,** the RPSA calls for a comprehensive approach to reducing firearm violence through targeted, integrated behavioral health services and economic opportunities in communities with the greatest concentration of firearm victims; and

**WHEREAS**, the OFVP will enter into a uniform grant agreement with Cook County to fund a diverse array of service providers focused on supporting residents at high risk of experiencing gun violence as either a victim or perpetrator in communities with the highest rates of shooting incidents and shooting-related homicides; and

WHEREAS, services funded shall include Victim Services, Case Management, Street Outreach and Intervention; and

**WHEREAS,** the total award from IDHS will be disbursed in two award periods with the first award totaling \$5,000,588.00 during an award period of 02/01/2023 - 06/30/2023, to align with the state fiscal year; and

**WHEREAS,** the remainder of the \$25,002,942.00 shall be awarded on or about 07/01/2023 for JAC to distribute to the 39 selected awardees for an award period running from 07/01/2023 through 06/30/2024.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that the Cook County Board of Commissioners hereby approves the issuance of the following agreements by the Justice Advisory Council to utilize ARPA funding for multiyear terms through June 30, 2024, subject to appropriation by the Board in accordance with state and county fiscal years, for the Justice Advisory Council programs and initiatives as follows:

#### CELEBRATING THE 192ND ANNIVERSARY OF COOK COUNTY

WHEREAS, Cook County was founded by an act of the Illinois legislature on January 15, 1831; and

WHEREAS, originally part of the commonwealth of Virginia, the area which comprises modern day Cook County was also part of the Northwest Territory and then a part of 10 separate counties as the territory was formed into states, including Illinois. The 10 counties are Knox (1790), St. Clair (1801), Madison (1812), Edwards (1814), Crawford (1816), Clark (1819), Pike (1819), Fulton (1823), Peoria (1825), Putnam (1826); and

**WHEREAS,** when formed in 1831, Cook County's original boundaries included all of McHenry, Lake, DuPage and parts of Kane and Will. The other counties were separately created between 1836 and 1839, leading to Cook County's current boundaries; and

WHEREAS, Cook County was named for Daniel Pope Cook (1794 - October 16, 1827). Originally from Kentucky, Cook moved to Illinois and became a lawyer, newspaper publisher, politician and one of the early advocates of statehood for Illinois. An anti-slavery advocate, he was the state's first Attorney General, and then congressman. It is believed Cook never visited the area which would be named in his honor; and

WHEREAS, the first Cook County Board of Commissioners was elected on March 7, 1831, taking office and holding their first meeting the following day. Three (3) commissioners-Gholson Kercheval, Samuel Miller and James Walker-convened a meeting at Fort Dearborn on the Chicago Settlement lakeshore, in the magazine (powder room). The first County Board meeting would last for two (2) days; and

**WHEREAS,** also elected on March 7 were Sheriff James Kinsey and Coroner John K. Clark. County Clerk William See, County Treasurer Archibald Clybourn, were appointed March 8 and Jedediah Woolley was recommended as County Surveyor to the Governor and Legislature; and

WHEREAS, one of the first acts of the new board was approval of a Resolution asking Illinois for 10 acres of land including the corner of Clark and Randolph for the location of a new County Courthouse. This building would be completed in 1835 and included a small stockade which served as the first County Jail and later added an Almshouse which was the forerunner of the County Hospital, Since the land was granted to the County, the corner of Clark and Randolph Streets in Chicago has been the headquarters of Cook County Government; and

**WHEREAS,** the official population of Cook County at the time of its founding was 100 (a count of settlers, not including Native Americans forcibly removed from the local area). The Chicago settlement (Chicago was not incorporated as a town until 1833) had 50 to 60 residents; and

WHEREAS, Cook County would become a leader in growing the region, the state and the nation; blazing trails in the fields of transportation, food processing, public health, education, juvenile justice, art and music. The dynamic and diverse county population would swell the county population to 350,000 in 1870, over 1.1 million 20 years later and 1.8 million at the turn of the 20th Century. By 1910, Cook County had 2.4 million residents, surpassing three million residents by 1920. By 1940, Cook County grew to four million residents. In 1960, Cook County population totaled 5.1 million; and

**WHEREAS,** the history of Cook County Government contributed directly to the development of the region and the State of Illinois, with many projects and initiatives of several County departments directly impacting the economic and political direction of the region for years to come; and

**WHEREAS,** the new Cook County Flag symbolically represents many of these initiatives including: the provision of health services to all as an essential County mission and the creation over time of institutions to fulfill that mission including John H. Stroger, Jr., Provident and Oak Forest Hospitals; the Ruth M. Rothstein CORE Center, the Ambulatory Care Network and the Cook County Department of Public Health; the protection of individual rights and voting rights through County ordinances and the conduct of free and

fair elections for the entire jurisdiction of Cook County; the protection and preservation of the environment including natural lands and open spaces primarily through the establishment of the Forest Preserves in 1914; the establishment of the world's first juvenile court system, which separated children from adults with an emphasis on individualized treatment instead of rigid adherence to due process, and probation over incarceration, and; the spirit of intergovernmental cooperation with all local governments as partners for progress through the work of county offices and agencies; and

**WHEREAS**, as Cook County approaches its 200th anniversary-and having developed a unique and extensive collection of public documents and records that contain historical significance-establishing an initiative to archive historically significant documents and records is imperative to County Government history; and

WHEREAS, fundamental to capturing the history of Cook County is a thorough and complete documentation of the history of Cook County Government; and

**WHEREAS,** the Board of Commissioners created a County Historic Archives and Records Office (CARO) to affirmatively coordinate efforts across all departments and with all officials to determine the historical value of various county documents and records and make recommendations to the Board of Commissioners regarding access and promotion of the County's history; and

**WHEREAS,** looking forward to Cook County's Bicentennial in 2031, and building upon the previous year's work, CARO seeks to establish a Cook County Archives Center to continue to manage, promote, document, and preserve said materials, activate its collections; and to engage exploratory initiatives to establish sustainable external fiscal support through the development of a foundation to support the ongoing growth of CARO.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that the President and the members of the Board of Commissioners of Cook County does hereby celebrate the 192nd anniversary of the founding of Cook County, Illinois; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that the President and the members of the Board of Commissioners of Cook County are contributing to the preservation of Cook County Government; and encourages all County agencies under all elected and appointed officials to work closely with the Manager of Archives and the Cook County Historic Archives and Records Office (CARO) to preserve the history of their offices, to include all formats of physical and electronic documents, photographs, maps, films, other media and artifacts towards that purpose.

He would later join the Army Reserves and become a member of the Illinois National Guard; and

**WHEREAS,** Mr. White finished his military service in 1959 and returned to Chicago, where he finally began his professional baseball career, playing for several seasons with the Chicago Cubs organization; and

WHEREAS, in the off-season, Mr. White worked as a physical education instructor at Schiller Elementary School, the school that he attended as a child, as well as with the Chicago Park District where he worked as a gymnastics coach and teacher for the Chicago Park District YMCA of Metropolitan Chicago and enjoyed a 33-year career with the Chicago public school system as a teacher and administrator; and

**WHEREAS,** Mr. White was asked to organize a gym show at the Rockwell Garden Housing Projects, which would lay the foundation for what would become known worldwide as the Jesse White Tumbling Team and since the team's inception, over 10,000 children, ages 6 and up, have participated in the program; and

**WHEREAS,** the Jesse White Tumblers give more than 1,500 performances each year at major sporting events and community, business, and charity functions, garnering national and international attention and have performed throughout the United States, Canada, Hong Kong, Bermuda, Belize, China, Israel, Tokyo, Japan, and Zagreb, Croatia. The team has also been featured in commercials, national television shows, and motion pictures; and

**WHEREAS,** in 1974, he was elected to the Illinois House of Representatives, where he served on the Committees on Aging, Elementary & Secondary Education, Public Utilities, and chaired the Committee on

Children and Human Services. Among the bills proposed by White in the House was the Good Samaritan Bill, which allowed hotels to offer leftover food to soup kitchens without threat of liability; and

**WHEREAS,** Mr. White served 16 years in the Illinois General Assembly representing the most culturally, economically, and racially diverse district in Illinois building a solid record for fighting crime, improving education, and helping senior citizens; and

**WHEREAS,** Mr. White would go on to become the Recorder of Deeds of Cook County, the nation's second largest Recorder of Deeds office in the country at the time having been elected to the post in 1992 and reelected in 1996; and

**WHEREAS,** on November 3, 1998, Mr. White was elected Illinois Secretary of State by a margin of over 450,000 votes. He was sworn into office on January 11, 1999, serving as the 37th Secretary of State and retired as the longest serving and first African American to hold this position and in the process becoming perhaps the best-known and best-liked officeholder in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, in recognition of the indelible impact both inside and outside the world of politics over his remarkable career, this Honorable Body wishes to honor Mr. Jesse White on the occasion of his retirement.

**WHEREAS**, Mr. Rogers lived an immense life including a historical and impactful 37-year career as one of the most influential trial lawyers in the country; and

**WHEREAS**, Mr. Rogers' career gave life to a family engrained in law: an injury attorney son, a court reporter daughter, an attorney stepson, an employment attorney niece, a real estate litigator nephew, an injury lawyer grandson, and a granddaughter set to begin law school this year; and

**WHEREAS**, Mr. Rogers. passed on from this life on Thursday, January 20, 2023, after a valiant five-year fight with cancer; and

#### LEVY OF TAXES FOR FISCAL YEAR 2023

**WHEREAS**, the Board of Commissioners and the Committee on Finance of the Board of Commissioners of Cook County, Illinois, have considered the subject of the Annual Tax Levy for the Fiscal Year 2023, and the several sums necessary to be levied to meet the needs and requirements of the County of Cook for said fiscal year, and have recommended that this Ordinance for the Levy of Taxes be adopted; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of Cook County, Illinois, approved, passed, and adopted the Annual Appropriation Bill of the County of Cook, for its Fiscal Year 2023, which said Appropriation Bill is hereinafter set forth and which contains a Revenue Estimate that includes an allocation of the 2023 Tax Levy by Fund together with additional columns captioned: "ANNUAL TAX LEVY", "APPROPRIATION ALLOWANCE FOR UNCOLLECTED TAXES" and "NET TAX LEVY FOR APPROPRIATION"; and

**WHEREAS**, Cook County and its taxpayers have benefited from Tax Increment Financing Districts (TIFs) by having the increment generated during the life of the TIFs invest in the specific area generating the increment; and

**WHEREAS,** the Cook County Board passed a Resolution on November 15, 2011, outlining that it is the policy of Cook County to recapture any property taxes at the termination of a TIF; and

**WHEREAS,** within the County of Cook, certain real-estate parcels, or a portion of the assessed valuation of certain real-estate parcels, are from time to time identified on the County real-estate tax rolls as deriving from new property, insofar as they were developed or substantially improved or are the subject of tax incentives that expired since the most recent assessment of real-estate taxes, the value of which has not heretofore been recaptured; and

**WHEREAS**, the interests of County taxpayers and the County itself are better served if the taxes on the additional value of said new property is captured.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS, that pursuant to its home rule powers, \$720,483,542.00 as a base levy amount, plus a TIF value recapture sum of \$24,616,609.00, an expiring incentives sum of \$4,147,429.00, and a new-property value capture sum of \$48,273,687.00, which aggregate amount of these sums is to be collected from the Annual Tax Levy for the Fiscal Year 2023 of the County of Cook for the Public Safety Fund purposes of said County, and for the Health Enterprise Fund purposes of said County, and for the payment of principal and interest on general obligation bonds of said County as represented by the Bond and Interest fund purposes, and for Cook County Employees Annuity and Benefit Fund purposes, and for the Election Fund purposes, and for Capital Projects purposes, said aggregate amount being \$797,521,266.00, which is the total amount of appropriations heretofore legally made from the Annual Tax Levy for the year 2023 and contained in the Annual Appropriation Bill (hereinafter set forth in the Ordinance) for the Fiscal Year 2023 duly adopted by the Board of Commissioners of Cook County on November 17, 2022, is hereby levied on and upon all taxable property in the said County of Cook for the Fiscal Year 2023.

As provided in the Fiscal Year 2023 Annual Appropriation Bill, three percent of the property tax levy revenues separately allocated to the Public Safety Fund, Health Enterprise Fund, and Election Fund are to

be made available to each Fund for purposes of covering the loss and cost of collecting taxes levied for said Funds; for the amounts of taxes for which the nonpayment will result in forfeiture of real estate; and for abatements in the amounts of such taxes as extended upon the collectors' books. To ensure the County meets its obligations for indebtedness as represented by the Bond and Interest Fund, and that the actual collections of property taxes received by the Annuity and Benefit Fund are commensurate with the amounts so levied, the County Clerk is authorized, in consultation with the County's Chief Financial Officer, to extend loss and collections for these funds in a manner that is sufficient for these purposes.

The specific amounts herein levied for the various purposes heretofore named are stated in this Ordinance and Tax Levy and itemized by Fund in the Revenue Estimate of the Annual Appropriation Bill, including a column captioned: "ANNUAL TAX LEVY". The tax hereby levied for said Fiscal Year 2023 for said appropriations, to be collected from this Levy, being the aforesaid total, consists of the following specific amount levied for the various purposes hereinafter set forth:

WHEREAS, Cook County Bureau of Economic Development seeks to advance talent driven economic development; and

**WHEREAS**, the Cook County Policy Roadmap, includes a key objective under Vital Communities to "Grow economic clusters by launching and supporting industry-led partnerships"; and

**WHEREAS**, the Policy Roadmap recommends meeting the above objective through the use of strategies to "Identify, prioritize and support new and emerging sectors that lead to living wage jobs" and to "Create a center for industry partnerships to lead, coordinate and support key economic sectors' competitiveness, productivity, resiliency and adaptation to rapidly changing technology"; and

**WHEREAS,** the Cook County Equity Task Force Report includes a recommendation under Vital Communities to "Align Cook County's workforce investment intentionally and strategically to support high quality jobs that promote residents' economic mobility and equity"; and

WHEREAS, to advance the above objectives and strategy from the Policy Roadmap as well as those related to workforce investments outlined by the Equity Task Force, the Bureau of Economic Development has partnered and collaborated with the Chicagoland Workforce Funders Alliance (CWFA),

an initiative of the Chicago Community Trust, since 2020 to establish the Network for Employer Driven Talent Solutions and the Talent Solution Connector; and

WHEREAS, Cook County has a commitment to talent driven economic development which includes supporting industry-led partnerships to meet the talent needs of employers and to ensure that residents have opportunities for good jobs; and

**WHEREAS**, the COVID-19 pandemic has exacerbated the pre-existing challenges both employers and workers encounter, leaving businesses in desperate need of workers and many workers without meaningful and family-sustaining employment; and

**WHEREAS,** both employers and workers find the existing workforce ecosystem complex, segmented, varied across sectors, as well as generally difficult to understand and navigate; and

WHEREAS, only a small percentage of private sector employers use the public workforce system; and

**WHEREAS,** because of ongoing collaboration, the Cook County Bureau of Economic Development and the Chicagoland Workforce Funders Alliance propose an intentional and cooperative effort to prioritize, support and facilitate employers' and workers' ability to navigate, engage, and shape the workforce system to meet their needs through a program called, *Growing the Talent Solution Ecosystem*; and

WHEREAS, Growing the Talent Solution Ecosystem represents a three-year effort to support the further development of capacity, integration, coordination and promotion of the following services and resources:

- 1. Network of Employer-led Workforce Solutions <a href="https://chiworkforcesolutions.org/">https://chiworkforcesolutions.org/</a> ("NEWS"), a hub for networking, capacity building and resources for sector partnerships and other employer-led initiatives collaboratives. Sector partnerships are now considered a best practice and encouraged by many federal funding agencies for economic and workforce development; and
- 2. Talent Solution Connector <a href="https://talentsolutionsconnector.net/">https://talentsolutionsconnector.net/</a> (TSC) a service that

assists employers find workforce services to address talent challenges while prioritizing equity and diversity; and

3. Chicagoland Career Pathways <a href="https://www.careerpathways.net/">https://www.careerpathways.net/</a> (CP.Net) is an online directory that identifies and outlines onramps to good jobs through existing Cook County based career pathway programs with a focus on low-barrier options for young adults planning their post-secondary path; adult career-seekers/changers coupled with access to guides, counselors, and mentors; and

**WHEREAS,** to ensure accountability and the implementation of shared objectives, Cook County wants to leverage the expertise of the CWFA and its resources to advance these programs and administer the Program; and

**WHEREAS,** the duties and responsibilities of the CWFA will be outlined in a Scope of Services of a grant agreement between BED and CWFA necessary to support and operate the Network of Employer Solutions pursuant to which the CWFA will:

- · Provide technical assistance to NEWS members to increase their capacity to meet the talent needs of their sectors;
- · Support the planning and launching of new sector partnerships as requested by employers. Provide operational support to existing partnerships as needed;
- · Provide grant writing assistance to secure additional resources to support sector partnerships; Create a business plan and launch a pilot program that provides access to financing for the purchase of an automobile for workforce program participants/graduates;
- Expand the capacity and resources of NEWS and NEWS members;
- · Additional duties agreed upon by Cook County and CWFA; and

**WHEREAS**, in order to enhance and maintain both the Talent Solution Connector and Chicagoland Career Pathways, the grant agreement with the CWFA will also require the CWFA to:

- · Maintain these resources, websites, and related databases to ensure accuracy and completeness of all content;
  - · Conduct ongoing evaluation regarding use and satisfaction of sites;
- · Improve effectiveness of the above sites through new features and partnerships; ·Coordinate and leverage stakeholders throughout the workforce ecosystem to bring value to the stakeholders and the Program;
  - Expand outreach in Suburban Cook to gather additional information on career pathways and workforce resources available through local public schools, community colleges and community organizations;
  - · Conduct marketing efforts to expand the reach and usage of the sites;
  - · Additional duties agreed upon by Cook County and CWFA; and

**WHEREAS**, the CWFA will develop metrics and report quarterly to Cook County on programmatic and fiscal progress along with an annual report summarizing impact and success stories; and

WHEREAS, since 2021, the CWFA has invested significant resources to support and lay the foundation for the NEWS (including support for Early Childhood Workforce Partnership and the Healthcare/Public Health), development of the Talent Solution Connector, and CP.Net, 3.6 FTE for approximately \$390,000 (salary, fringe & administration), \$260,000 for consultants (facilitators, project managers, web platform design) and an additional \$20,000 per year on technology costs (licenses, hosting fees etc.) for a total of \$640,000 per year or a total of \$1,280,000; and

**WHEREAS**, the CWFA estimates that the cost of providing these services for Growing the Talent Solution Ecosystem from 2023 - 2025 will be \$715,000; and

**WHEREAS**, the Bureau of Economic Development has \$300,000 in its 2023 corporate budget to support the services outlined for 2023; and subject to approval of this resolution will seek approximately

\$300,000 in 2024 and \$125,000 in its 2025 budget to complete this work; and

**WHEREAS,** providing employers with new and improved channels to meet their talent needs, coupled with developing a comprehensive system to share the plethora of existing career pathway opportunities to both employers and job seekers will assist all parties.

Summary: The JAC is seeking a contract extension and increase to support the third year of the Restore, Reinvest, and Renew (R3) Program, in which the JAC serves as a pass-through agency to award funding to R3 awardees as subrecipients. R3 was created as a key equity element of the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act (CRTA), signed by Governor Pritzker in 2019. The law requires that 25 percent of all cannabis revenue be used to support communities impacted by economic disinvestment, violence, and the severe and disproportionate damage caused by the war on drugs, largely and disproportionately impacted low income Illinoisans and communities of color. In 2021, The R3 program, funded through the Illinois Criminal Justice Information Authority, made a grant to the Cook County Justice Advisory Council to deliver coordinated services through community partners for the south suburban municipalities of Robbins, Ford Heights, and Harvey. ICJIA intends to extend and increase these funds so that services and supports delivered by the following organizations: Restoration Ministries, Adults Active in Youth Development, Lawlor Consulting Group, Youth Guidance, Roseland CeaseFire, and Cabrini Green Legal Aid will continue; the terms of the grant indicate a 100% pass-through of funds in the amount of \$100,000.00 each to these six (6) organizations.

**Summary**: In June and July of 2022 the JAC sought board approval for 34 awardees representing 68 organizations and \$75 million of awards as recipients of ARPA Initiative NT897: Gun Violence Prevention and Reduction Grants. Having received 190 applications with requests totaling roughly \$500,000,000 the JAC committed to identifying additional funding for other highly scored applicants who were not awarded funding through this Cook County ARPA Initiative. At this time, IDHS OFVP reviewed and endorsed the JAC's application review process for ARPA Initiative NT897 and has awarded the JAC \$25,002,942 to support funding an additional 39 Cook County Gun Violence Prevention and Reduction applicants, representing 74 organizations. This brings the total number of JAC Gun Violence Prevention and Reduction Grant awardees to 73 applicants, representing 193 organizations.

The first award from IDHS OFVP shall total \$5,000,588 and be awarded during the period of 02/01/2023 -06/30/2023 to align with the state fiscal year. The remainder of the award shall be distributed beginning in 07/01/2023 for the State of Illinois's fiscal year 2024 and shall total \$20,002,354.

These awards will be made to applicants providing street outreach intervention, case management and victim services in the geographic areas defined as communities most impacted by gun violence in the Reimagine Public Safety Act (RPSA) (430 ILCS 69). The RPSA calls for a comprehensive approach to reducing firearm violence through targeted, integrated behavioral health services and economic opportunities in communities with the greatest concentration of firearm victims. As part of this approach,

the Office of Firearm Violence Prevention (OFVP) will enter into a uniform grant agreement with Cook County to fund a diverse array of service providers focused on supporting residents at high risk of experiencing gun violence as either a victim or perpetrator in communities with the highest rates of shooting incidents and shooting-related homicides. Services include Victim Services, Case Management,

# RESOLUTION REQUIRING A COST-COMPARISON ASSESSMENT AND ACTION PLAN FROM THE BUREAU OF TECHNOLOGY AND BOARD OF REVIEW ON TECHNOLOGY AND SOFTWARE SOLUTIONS

**WHEREAS**, in 2015 Cook County entered into a \$30 million contract with Tyler Technologies, Inc. ("Tyler Technologies") to assist the Bureau of Technology ("BoT") in replacing the County's 40-year-old mainframe system with an integrated appraisal and tax administration software solution; and

**WHEREAS**, after delays, contract extensions, and monetary increases, in October of 2020, the Cook County Assessor's Office ("CCAO"), BoT, and Tyler Technologies launched iasWorld's Phase One, which moved certain CCAO property tax operations away from the County mainframe system. This work was done with notice and input from the three other County offices that operate the County's property tax operations; the Clerk's office, the Treasurer's office and the Board of Review ("BoR"); and

**WHEREAS**, through the years 2023 and 2024, it is expected that the Cook County Clerk's office and the Cook County Treasurer's office will migrate its property tax operations to the County's iasWorld system; and

**WHEREAS**, BoR currently uses its own technology system, OnBase, for its property tax workflow, and BoR maintains OnBase works well for its Office. OnBase uses the mainframe as a data transfer platform to iasWorld; and

**WHEREAS**, in 2022, the CCAO needed to export data from the iasWorld's system back to the mainframe so the BoR could access it for its appeal process. During the export, there were disruptions

due to a breakdown of a parallel set of systems needed to handle the data. The finalization of property assessments to prepare property tax bills was significantly delayed. As a result, Cook County's property tax bills were mailed approximately five months late, leaving taxpayers confused and frustrated; and

WHEREAS, BoR has a preliminary plan to create an integrated automation platform technology to transfer data between OnBase and iasWorld; and

**WHEREAS**, there continues to be robust discussions about the technology solutions needed to avoid future property tax delays, how to efficiently use taxpayer money to support the property tax system while avoiding duplication of technological solutions, and streamline the property tax system using available technology;

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED,** that the BoR and BoT collaborate to prepare a cost-comparison assessment. The assessment shall analyze the annual cost to the County of operating and maintaining the two above-referenced contracts for OnBase and iasWorld and compare that number

with the amount it would cost the County to expand the iasWorld contract to cover BoR operations. In this evaluation, BoR and BoT shall calculate how much time BoR employees spend hand entering/data processing information into OnBase that already exists in iasWorld. The goal of the evaluation is to calculate the price difference, if any, between adding BoR to the current iasWorld contract versus continuing the operations of two separate technology systems; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** the cost-comparison assessment shall also calculate the cost to the County to create an integrated automation platform technology to transfer data between OnBase and iasWorld; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that BoR and BoT prepare a written report on the cost comparisons described above and prepare an action plan based on the report results. The report and action plan shall be presented by BoR to the Technology and Innovation Committee within 90 days of the enactment of this Resolution.

# REQUESTING A HEARING OF THE COOK COUNTY PENSION COMMITTEE TO DISCUSS THE FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS OF PENSION LEGISLATION

**WHEREAS**, the Illinois Pension Code (40 ILCS 5/9-101) establishes the creation of a pension fund in each county of more than 3,000,000 inhabitants a County Employees' and Officers' Annuity and Benefit Fund shall be created, set apart, maintained and administered, in the manner prescribed in this Article, for the benefit of the employees and officers herein designated and their beneficiaries, and;

**WHEREAS**, the County Employees' and Officers' Annuity and Benefit Fund is a single defined benefit, single employer pension and other post-employment benefits plan established by Illinois Compiled Statutes (Chapter 40, Acts 5/9 and 5/10), and;

**WHEREAS**, the Cook County Pension Fund provides pension, disability and other benefits to employees of both Cook County and the Forest Preserve District. While the County Fund and the Forest Fund are separate entities, the benefits provided to Cook County employees and Forest Preserve District employees are the same, and;

**WHEREAS**, the pension system is supported through two statutorily set and mandated sources: the employee contribution made by active County employees and the employer contribution of 1.54% of total salary made by the County, both of which are set by state law, and;

**WHEREAS**, the financial returns on the invested assets of Annuity and Benefit Fund are, historically, the greatest portion of the annual input to the pension fund, and;

**WHEREAS**, the determination of the allocation of assets and the choice of investments and the resulting financial returns are overseen and approved by the nine members of the Board of Trustees of the Annuity and Benefit Fund, and;

**WHEREAS**, the Cook County President and the Cook County Board of Commissioners have independently elected, via an intergovernmental agreement (IGA) with the Pension Benefit and Annuity Fund, to make supplemental pension payments beyond the statutory requirements, approximately \$2.5B as of the end of FY23, and;

**WHEREAS**, the County, unlike other pension funds, pays for retiree healthcare costs for annuitants out of pension assets, and;

**WHEREAS**, in FY2023, Annuity and Benefit allocations to the Pension Fund are budgeted at \$512.1 million, which consists of \$200.4 million in statutory payments, as per the Illinois Pension code, and an additional \$291.7 million in supplemental pension payments paid for by a voluntary incremental payment, and a \$20.0 million allocation to the pension reserve account for future pension payment increases, via an Intergovernmental Agreement approved by the Cook County Board of Commissioners on December 15, 2022, and;

**WHEREAS**, there are many future needs to ensure the continuity and health of the pension system. In order to pass meaningful legislation at a County level that addresses these future challenges, it's essential to have a comprehensive understanding of the financial impact of the pension system and any potential impact on the retirement security of Cook County annuitants.

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, a hearing of the Cook County Pension Committee to be convened on Wednesday, February 8 at 10:00 a.m. in order to discuss any changes that may be made to the statutory makeup of the County's contribution.
