The Cook County Board of Commissioners is on August Recess.

CEO Report Legislative Updates State



The House and Senate are scheduled to return to Springfield October 14-16 and 28-30 for the Fall/Veto Session.

The Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services (HFS) and Department of Human Services held a briefing earlier this month to outline projected impact of the "One Big Beautiful Bill Act" (OBBBA). A recording of the webinar can be found online here and the slides are posted here.

Illinois Attorney General Kwame Raoul joined a <u>federal lawsuit</u>, along with 21 other states, against the Trump Administration over a provision included in the OBBBA that prohibits Planned Parenthood from participating in the Medicaid program.

• HFS shared at the August 1 Medicaid Advisory Committee meeting that Medicaid payments to Illinois Planned Parenthood can continue until further notice, as a result of a preliminary injunction issued July 28.

CEO Report Legislative Updates State



1115 Medicaid Waiver

In July 2024, the Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services (HFS) received federal approval for its <u>Medicaid 1115</u> <u>waiver</u>. Federal CMS has approved the 1115 waiver contract, protocols, and plans necessary for implemention.

An <u>announcement from federal CMS</u> to no longer support Medicaid waivers that include designated state health programs (DSHPs) and designated state investment programs (DSIPs) <u>does not</u> have any impact on Illinois' approved 1115 waiver, as the Illinois waiver does not include DSHPs or DSIPs.

The 1115 waiver permits Illinois Medicaid to cover new health related social needs including food/nutrition, housing and housing supports, medical respite, violence prevention/intervention, non-emergency transportation, and supported employment. These new benefits will be administered through Medicaid Managed Care. Additionally, the waiver will allow individuals residing in state prisons or the Cook County Jail to be covered by Medicaid up to 90 days pre-release, to support these individuals in their re-entry efforts.

CCH has been actively engaged in several HFS workgroups and planning discussions. The first phase of waiver services include food/nutrition, medical respite, housing, and re-entry. Internal waiver readiness meetings have also been taking place at CCH since early 2023, and stakeholders include leaders from strategy, finance, operations, clinical, and managed care.

While HFS still intends to eventually launch the waiver services, HFS recently notified stakeholders that they are pausing their external workgroups. HFS shared that the passage of the federal budget reconciliation bill/OBBBA has made the waiver planning process more complex, and HFS needs to understand the impact on budget, timing, and roll-out of waiver services.

State Directed Payments

- Administrator Oz told Ways & Means Committee regulatory guidance "coming soon"
- Unclear when CMS will act on preprints submitted prior to date of enactment

Provider Taxes

Unclear yet whether CMS will allow flexibility for a transition period of up to three years

Rural Health Transformation Fund

- \$50 billion over 5 years: \$25 billion (\$5 billion/year) distributed equally to states with approved applications and \$25 billion (\$5 billion/year) distributed at the discretion of the CMS Administrator (at least 25% must go to states with approved applications)
- Administrator Oz said state applications will be released in "early September" and will be approved by December 31, 2025



Fiscal Year 2026 (FY26) Appropriations

Congress has enacted ZERO of the 12 appropriations bills although each chamber has passed a handful of bills

In early August, the **Senate Appropriations Committee passed a strongly bipartisan FY26 Labor-HHS-Education bill**

 Bill rejects program eliminations, funding cuts, and HHS restructuring including the creation of the Administration for a Healthy America called for in the President's FY26 proposed budget

House Appropriations Committee postponed consideration of the FY26 Labor-HHS-Education bill until the fall

Both House and Senate are now in recess until September 2

Current federal fiscal year ends on September 30

 Continuing resolution for some length of time and/or a partial or full government shutdown are possible

Congress's Post-Recess Agenda

Government Funding

Health extenders

- Medicaid DSH, Medicare telehealth flexibility, and other extenders that expire on October 1, 2025
- ACA enhanced premium tax credits expire at the end of the year and pressure is mounting to extend them

Trump Nominees

 While CDC Director nominee Susan Monarez was confirmed by the Senate, the Senate GOP may invoke a "nuclear" option (eliminating 60-vote cloture threshold) in order to clear more Trump nominees after a bipartisan deal in early August fell through

Future budget reconciliation bills possible

 GOP will not rule out pursuing at least one more budget reconciliation bill, which would include further cuts to Medicaid

Another FY25 rescissions package

White House will not rule out sending another FY25 rescissions package to congress



Trump Executive Orders

Ending Crime and Disorder on America's Streets Executive Order

- Emphasis on expanding involuntary commitments and increased funding for mental health treatment beds, crisis intervention and drug courts and jail diversion
- Restricts federal funding for harm reduction services
- Creates new HUD homelessness program requirements and data and privacy considerations
- Directs several federal agencies including DOJ, HHS, HUD and DOT to issue guidance and rulemaking.

Improving Oversight of Federal Grantmaking Executive Order

- Gives political appointees more control and oversight over federal grantmaking to ensure grants are "consistent with agency priorities and the national interest
- Political appointees should use "their independent judgement" when making funding decisions



Trump Administrative Actions

Public Benefits Notice

- HHS (as well as USDA, ED, DOL, and DOJ) <u>issued Notices</u> in mid-July reinterpreting eligibility restrictions under the 1996 Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act (PRWORA) in ways that aim to restrict eligibility for programs that were previously available to immigrant communities.
- HHS has agreed not to enforce the Notice in the 21 states that sued through September 10, 2025
- Deadline to submit public comment is August 13

Gender-Affirming Care Rulemaking

 New rule under review by the White House would reportedly prohibit Medicaid funding to hospitals that provide gender-affirming care and may also condition participation in Medicare and Medicaid on providing this care

We are so grateful for the support from the entire team - nursing, radiology, SPD, administration, pathology - for supporting this milestone.



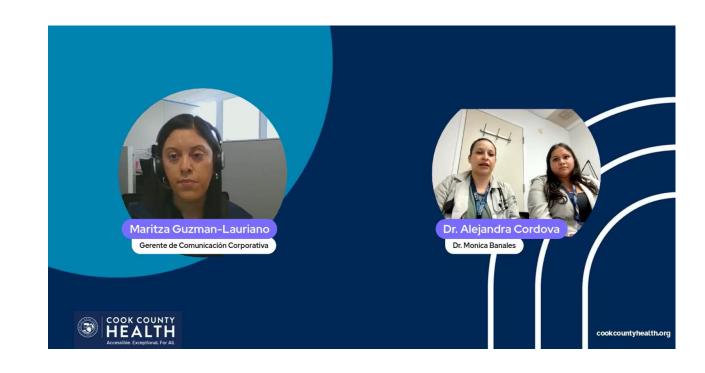
Back-to-School Facebook Live

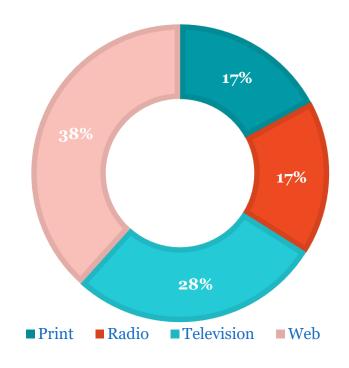

- On an accrual basis, interim financials show that CCH ended June with a \$107.0M unfavorable variance to budget. County's preliminary cash report on revenues and expenses, which is cash-based accounting, shows that CCH is favorable to budget by \$27.5M.

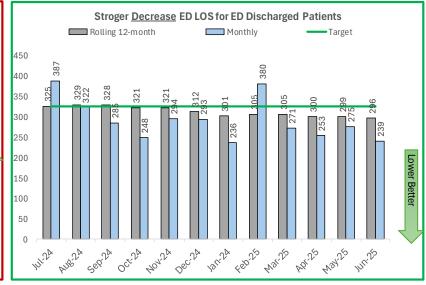
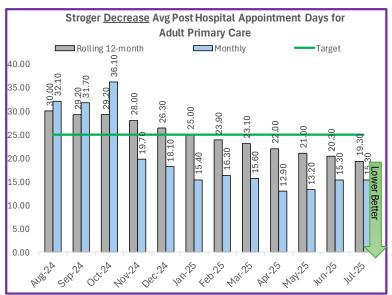
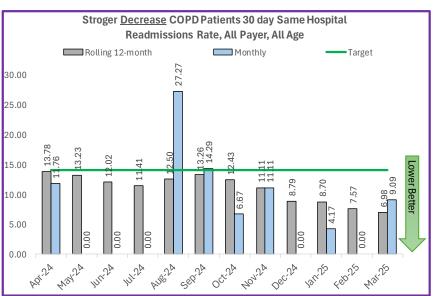
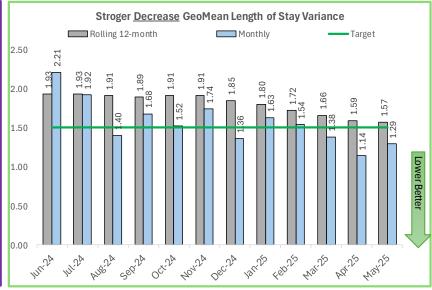


Chart performance monitoring-color based on the most recent rolling 12-month scoring measure results.
