PROPOSED RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEVELOPMENT OF A COUNTYWIDE CPR & AED TRAINING AWARENESS CAMPAIGN AND EXPANSION OF TRAINING ACCESS

WHEREAS, in one year alone, 475,000 Americans die from cardiac arrest and globally, cardiac arrest claims more lives than colorectal cancer, breast cancer, prostate cancer, influenza, pneumonia, auto accidents, human immunodeficiency virus (HIV), firearms, and house fires combined; and

WHEREAS, heart disease (including Coronary Heart Disease, Hypertension, and Stroke) remains the No. 1 cause of death in the United States, while the estimated annual incidence of heart attack in the U.S. is 720,000 new attacks and 335,000 recurrent attacks per year; and

WHEREAS, more than 350,000 cardiac arrests occur outside of the hospital each year and nearly 45 percent of out-of-hospital cardiac arrest victims survived when bystander cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) was administered, as immediate CPR can double or triple chances of survival after cardiac arrest; and

WHEREAS, similarly to national statistics, heart disease is the leading cause of death in Cook County as well, accounting for just under 10,000 deaths per year with more than half occurring in suburban Cook County; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Health and Hospitals System along with the Cook County Department of Public Health can contribute to decreasing the incidents of fatal heart attacks in Cook County by creating a robust awareness campaign to increase participation of Cook County employees in existing training programs on how to properly administer cardiopulmonary resuscitation and how to use an automated external defibrillator (AED) as well as expand access to such trainings countywide in all County workplaces; and

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois beginning in 2014 has made such training a curricula requirement for all secondary schools in the state; and

WHEREAS, the County awareness and training initiative should cover adult CPR & AED training and such training must include a hands-on practice component for beginners, as well as be in accordance with

the standards of the American Heart Association, or another nationally recognized certifying organization; and

WHEREAS, any improvement in outcomes associated with heart attacks would have an immeasurable impact on survivors both for County employees and their co-workers and families as well as the general public.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the President and the Cook County Board of Commissioners requests the development of a countywide CPR and AED training awareness campaign for all Cook County employees as well as expanded access to training programs in all County workplaces in order to assist in reducing incidents of death due to cardiac arrest both in the workplace and general public; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the President and Cook County Board of Commissioners requests that the Cook County Health and Hospitals System along with the Cook County Department of Public Health and their partners develop such awareness campaign and that the expanded training program shall be in accordance with the standards of the American Heart Association, or another nationally recognized certifying organization; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Cook County Health and Hospitals System or one of its partners such as the American Heart Association provide this Honorable Body with statistics on the number of lives that could be saved in Cook County by knowing and using CPR and/or AED; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the awareness campaign and expanded training access should begin in February 2019 to coincide with American Heart Month; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that data on said awareness campaign and expanded training including the total number of employees newly trained or re-trained in CPR and AED as well as their employment location by district be added to the monthly and annual Cook County Health and Hospitals System reports.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION

CALLING FOR A HEARING ON THE ILLINOIS BLOCKCHAIN TASK FORCE REPORT AND THE APPLICATIONS OF ITS FINDINGS TO COOK COUNTY

WHEREAS, blockchains offer enormous potential for the storage and maintenance of data and records; and

WHEREAS, a blockchain is a database that is replicated over a peer-to-peer network that is designed to achieve consistent and reliable agreement over a record of events between independent participants through consensus about changes to the state of the shared database; and

WHEREAS, blockchains allow digital information to be distributed, but not copied, making it very difficult to inappropriately modify the original data. Anything of value, money, titles, deeds, votes, and identity attributes can be exchanged, stored, and managed securely and privately; and

WHEREAS, there are a variety of potential applications of blockchains to manage the voluminous data that Cook County manages, including, but not limited to, applications in the Office of the Cook County Clerk, Recorder of Deeds, Assessor, Clerk of the Circuit Court and much more; and

WHEREAS, on November 30, 2016, the State of Illinois formed the Illinois Blockchain Initiative to explore how Blockchain could help spur economic development in the State; and

WHEREAS, the Illinois Blockchain Task Force was charged by Illinois House Joint Resolution 25, which was adopted by both houses on June 28, 2017, to study aspects of distributed ledger technology that includes opportunities and risks associated with using blockchain, different types of blockchains (public and private), as well as projects and use cases in other states and domains that Illinois could consider utilizing; and

WHEREAS, on January 31, 2018, the Illinois Blockchain and Distributed Ledger Task Force issued a report on:

- 1) opportunities and risks associated with using blockchain and other distributed ledger technologies,
- 2) the different types of blockchains, public and private,
- 3) projects and use cases in other states/nations that Illinois could consider,
- 4) how current state laws could be modified to support this technology,
- 5) encryption technology, including Illinois' digital signature infrastructure, and
- 6) official reports and recommendations from the Illinois Blockchain Initiative.

WHEREAS, the Task Force found that that blockchain technology and its built-in encryption can facilitate highly-secure methods for interacting with government and keeping paperless records, increasing data accuracy and providing better cybersecurity protections for Illinois residents; and

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that a joint meeting of the Legislation and Intergovernmental Relations and Technology Committees of the Cook County Board of Commissioners convene to review the Illinois Blockchain Task Force Report and the possible applications of blockchain technology within Cook County.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

AN AMENDMENT TO THE COOK COUNTY INSPECTOR GENERAL ORDINANCE

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 2 - Administration, Article IV - Officers and Employees, Division 5 - Inspector General, Sections 2-288 and 2-291. are amended as Follows:

Sec. 2-288. - Confidential Summary reports.

Upon conclusion of any investigation, the Independent Inspector General shall submit a confidential summary report to the President, the appropriate head of any department or bureau to whose office the investigation pertains, the Chief of the Bureau of Human Resources and to the Purchasing Agent in the case of a sustained finding regarding a contractor, subcontractor, applicant for a contract, or person seeking certification of eligibility for a contract, and to the Board of Ethics in the case of a sustained finding regarding any violation of the Cook County Ethics Ordinance (Sections 2-560 through 2-603). If the Independent Inspector General has conducted any investigations regarding the office, or an employee, contractor or subcontractor of a separately elected official, the Independent Inspector General also shall submit the confidential summary report to the elected official.

Confidential summary reports shall be labeled as such and shall contain the information set forth below in accordance with this section. Confidential summary reports received by any government official or employee shall only be used for official government purposes and may only be disclosed for official government purposes. The penalty for improper use or disclosure of confidential summary reports, including, but not limited to, a disclosure for political purposes, shall be governed by Section 2-291.

(a) The report shall include the following:

- (1) A description of any complaints or other information received by the Independent Inspector General pertinent to the investigation.
- (2) A description of any illegal conduct, corruption, fraud, waste, mismanagement, unlawful political discrimination, misconduct, or inefficiencies observed or discovered in the course of the investigation.
- (3) Recommendations for correction of any illegal conduct, corruption, fraud, waste, mismanagement, unlawful political discrimination, misconduct, or inefficiencies described in the report and a timeline for corrective action.

- (4) Such other information as the Independent Inspector General may deem relevant to the investigation or resulting recommendations.
- (b) The report shall not mention the name of any informant, complainant, witness, or person investigated, except in the following instances:
 - (1) Where the copy of the report given to the head of any department or agency recommends disciplinary action against an employee of that agency.
 - (2) Where the copy of the report given to the purchasing agent makes recommendations concerning any contractor, subcontractor, applicant for a contract, or person seeking certification of eligibility for a contract.
 - (3) Where the copy of the report given to the head of a department or agency makes recommendation concerning a person seeking certification of eligibility of a program administered by the department or agency.
 - (4) Where the copy given to the President and the Chief of the Bureau of Human Resources recommends disciplinary action against the head or any employee of any executive department or agency.
- (c) If any investigation is not concluded within 180 days after its initiation, the Independent Inspector General shall notify the President and the Litigation Subcommittee of the general nature of the complaint or information giving rise to the investigation and the reasons for failure to complete the investigation within 180 days.

Sec. 2-291. - Violations and penalties.

- (a) It shall be a violation of this division for any person to:
 - (1) Retaliate against, punish, harass, threaten or penalize any other person for communicating, cooperating or assisting the Independent Inspector General in the performance of duties.
 - (2) Interfere, obstruct, or attempt to interfere or obstruct an investigation conducted by the Independent Inspector General.
- (b) In addition to all other available remedies, civil and criminal, the following penalties shall apply to violations of this division:
 - (1) Any County employee who is found to have willfully violated this division as provided in Section 2-285 or Subsection (a) of this Section shall be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including discharge. Disciplinary action shall be instituted in accordance with procedures applicable to the employee, including but not limited to those established by the Merit Board, Civil Service Commission, Human Resources Board, collective bargaining agreements, employee manuals, handbooks or at-will practice of the employer.

- (2) Any agent, independent contractor or appointed official found to have willfully violated this division as provided in Section 2-285 or Subsection (a) of this Section shall be subject to removal.
- (3) Any contractor, subcontractor, grantee, lessee or licensee under a County contract, grant, lease or license, found to have willfully violated this division as provided in Section 2-285 or Subsection (a) of this Section shall be subject to termination of existing contracts, grants, leases or licenses, and/or ineligibility for consideration for future County contracts, grants, leases or licenses for a period not to exceed two years.
- (4) Any person or business entity seeking County contracts or certification of eligibility for County contracts or participation in any County program found to have willfully violated this division shall be subject to ineligibility for consideration for future County contracts, grants, leases, licenses, or programs for a period not to exceed two years.
- (5) Any person found to have willfully violated Section 2-285 shall also be subject to a fine of not less than \$300.00 and not more than \$500.00 for each violation.
- (6) Any person who makes a false statement, material to the issue or point in question, which he does not believe to be true, in any complaint or other document relating to the Independent Inspector General's investigations of elected officials, and which is certified by such person in accordance with Subsection 2-284(1) shall be guilty of knowingly furnishing false statements or misleading information. Any person found to have violated, intentionally obstructed or interfered with an investigation of, or intentionally made a false, misleading or bad faith allegation or claim in accordance with Subsection 2-284(1) shall be subject to the above-listed penalties and may be further subject to a penalty of up to six months imprisonment and fines up to \$5,000.00 per violation. Actions seeking the imposition of a fine shall be filed as quasi-criminal actions subject to the provisions of the Illinois Code of Civil Procedure, as amended.
- (7) Any person found to have to have improperly used or disclosed a confidential summary report as provided in Section 2-288 shall be subject to a penalty of up to six months imprisonment and fines up to \$5,000.00 per violation. Actions seeking the imposition of a fine shall be filed as quasi-criminal actions subject to the provisions of the Illinois Code of Civil Procedure, as amended.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE

CREATING A BID PREFERENCE FOR BUSINESSES OWNED BY PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 34 - Finance, Article IV - Procurement, Division 6 - Bid Incentives and Preferences, Section 34-242 - Businesses Owned by People with Disabilities is hereby enacted as follows:

Sec. 34-242 . - Businesses Owned by People with Disabilities

(a) Preference for Businesses Owned by People with Disabilities: The CPO shall give a preference of five percent of the amount of the Contract to a Responsible and Responsive PDBE. The CPO shall develop procedures for implementation of this Section.

(b) Certification - The CCD shall certify a Person as a PDBE when it is a small business:

(1) That is at least 51 percent owned, controlled, and managed by one or more qualified Disabled Persons; and

(2) That has its home office in Illinois.

(c) In lieu of conducting its own certifications, the CCD by rule may accept formal certifications by other entities, provided that Cook County's requirements are met.

(d) In order to increase awareness and provide opportunities for PDBE's, the CCD shall provide education, outreach, and the dissemination of information to PBDE regarding the County's certification program and available opportunities. The CCD, in collaboration with other departments, shall from time to time, by way of seminars, workshops, and internet-based communications, make available to the business community such information, documents, and personnel as well as:

(1) Assist otherwise eligible businesses in applying for, gaining, and maintaining certification;

(2) Assist the business community in understanding the manner in which to properly complete a Utilization Plan including how a full or partial waiver may be requested, and the manner in which such a request may be supported;

(3) Identify best practices by other governmental entities and private sector firms that may improve the Program; and

(4) Identify systemic or organizational problems and related solutions associated with certification and contract participation.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 34 - Finance, Article IV - Procurement, Division 6 - Bid Incentives and Preferences, Sections 34-229 - Definitions and Section 34-237. - Veteran-owned businesses are hereby amended as follows:

Sec. 34-229. - Definitions.

Disadvantaged refers to individuals who are mentally, physically, economically, or educationally disadvantaged, including, but not limited to, individuals who are living below the poverty line, developmentally disabled, mentally ill, substance abusers, recovering substance abusers, elderly and in need of hospice care, gang members, on welfare, or people with arrest or conviction records.

Disability or Disabled means, with respect to an individual, a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more of the major life activities of the individual, a record of physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more of the major life activities of the individual, or being regarded as an individual with a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more of the major life activities of the individual.

Earned Credit means the amount allocated to a Contractor upon completion of a Qualifying Contract through which the Contractor met or exceeded the goals for the utilization of Former Offenders, Apprentices or youth.

Labor hours means the total hours of workers receiving an hourly wage who are directly employed at the work site. "Labor hours" shall include hours performed by workers employed by the contractor and all subcontractors working at the work site. "Labor hours" shall not include hours worked by nonworking foremen, superintendents, owners and workers who are not subject to prevailing wage requirements.

Persons with Disabilities Owned Business Enterprise (PDBE) means a small business (i) that is at least 51 percent owned, controlled and managed by one or more Persons with a Disability, or in the case of a corporation, at least 51 percent or more of the stock of which is owned, controlled, and managed by one or more Persons with a Disability; (ii) that has its home office in Illinois, as certified by the CCD under policies and procedures promulgated by the CCD.

Qualifying Contract means a Contract for Public Works with a Bid Price of \$100,000.00 or more, for which the Contractor is eligible for Earned Credits.

Sec. 34-237. - Veteran-owned and Persons with Disabilities Owned businesses.

(a) It is the goal of the County to award each year not less than three percent of its total expenditures for supplies, equipment, goods, and services to VBES, ~~and~~ SDVBES, ~~and~~ PDBES. The CCD may count toward its three-percent yearly goal that portion of all Contracts in which the Contractor subcontracts with a VBE, ~~or~~ SDVBE, ~~or~~ PDBE. CCD shall submit an annual report to the County Board that shall include, at a minimum, the following for the preceding fiscal year:

- (1) The number of responsible VBEs, ~~and~~ SDVBEs, and PDBEs that submitted a Bid or proposal;
- (2) The number of VBEs, ~~and~~ SDVBEs, and PDBEs that entered into Contracts, the specific industry or category of goods, services, or supplies for each Contract, and the total value of those Contracts;
- (3) The participation of VBEs, ~~and~~ SDVBEs, and PDBEs at both contractor and subcontractor levels;
- (4) The total number of the County's certified VBEs, ~~and~~ SDVBEs, and PDBEs available for participation in procurement, by category or industry; and
- (5) Whether the County achieved the goal described in this subsection.

The recommendations shall be based upon the number of VBEs, ~~and~~ SDVBEs, and PDBEs and on the continued need to encourage and promote businesses owned by qualified veterans and people with disabilities.

(c) The CPO will make best efforts to recruit and solicit bids and make procurements from VBEs, ~~and~~ SDVBEs, and PDBEs.

(d) The above-stated goal shall not be treated as a quota nor shall it be used to discriminate against any person or business enterprise on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, ~~or~~ sex or disability.

(e) The CCD, in consultation with the Using Agency and the CPO, shall consider the size and complexity of the procurement before establishing contract specific goals and shall only be required to establish contract specific goals on procurements that have an available pool of certified VBEs, ~~and~~ SDVBEs, and PDBEs for supplies, materials and equipment, or services.

(f) The provisions of this Division 6, Section 34-237(a) shall be effective as of July 1, 2013. The Contract Compliance Director shall as soon as practicable develop and implement procedures and any corresponding regulations for certifying and monitoring utilization of VBEs, ~~and~~ SDVBEs, and PDBEs.

PROHIBITING THE SALE OF TOBACCO PRODUCTS TO PERSONS UNDER THE AGE OF 21

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 54 - Licenses, Permits and Miscellaneous Business Regulations, Article V, Tobacco Dealers, Section 54-301- Definitions and 54-305 - Prohibitions on sale or distribution of tobacco products, of the Cook County Code are hereby amended as follows:

Sec. 54-301. - Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Tobacco products means any product in leaf, flake, plug, liquid, vapor or any other form, containing nicotine derived from tobacco, which product is intended to enable human consumption of the tobacco or nicotine, whether chewed, smoked, absorbed, dissolved, inhaled, snorted, sniffed, or ingested by other means. The term includes tobacco products that are a nonlighted, noncombustible product that employs a mechanical heating element, battery, or electronic circuit regardless of shape or size and that can be used to produce vapor from nicotine in a solution. The term also includes any vapor cartridge or other container of nicotine in a solution or other form that is intended to be used with or in an electronic cigarette, electronic cigar, electronic cigarillo, electronic pipe, or similar product or device. For the purposes of this article, the term "Tobacco products" excludes any product that has been specifically approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration for sale as a tobacco cessation product or for other medical purposes, where such product is marketed and sold solely for such an approved purpose.

Sec. 54-305. Prohibitions on sale or distribution of tobacco products.

- (a) Underage tobacco sales.
 - (1) No retailer may sell or distribute tobacco products to any person under ~~18~~ 21 years of age.
 - (2) Each retailer shall request and examine the photographic identification of any person purchasing tobacco products so as to verify that the purchaser is over ~~18~~ 21 years of age or older. No such verification is required for any person who appears without reasonable doubt to be over the age of 27.

Effective date: This ordinance shall be in effect June 1, 2019.

After case assignment, Specialists make an initial assessment of the needs of each case, Specialists engage in case assessment and planning, conduct case planning, provide case status information and direct service to victims. Victim Specialists accompany victims to court and make phone, e-mail, and letter notifications to victims who do not. Specialists arrange meetings between victims and Assistant State's Attorneys. Specialists assist victims with writing and presenting victim impact statements. Specialists provide written literature regarding the many post-conviction options. Whether or not a victim participates in the prosecution of a case, Specialists provide them a full service array.

WHEREAS, pursuant to notice as required by the Illinois County Code and the Cook County Zoning Ordinance, a public hearing was conducted by the Zoning Board of Appeals on August 1, 2018 and was continued on September 19, 2018 to consider the Special Use Permit for a Planned Unit Development and companion variation requests; and the Zoning Board of Appeals having recommended that both requests be granted and approved; and

WHEREAS, on November 7, 2018 the Zoning Board of Appeals met and moved to approve with a condition the Special Use and Variation requests and, moved such Special Use and Variation requests to the Cook County Board of Commissioners for final decision. The condition is for the homeowners to work with the Department of Transportation and Highway for the installation of a permeable paved street that takes into consideration the wetland.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Board of Commissioners of Cook County, Illinois, pursuant to its home rule powers, as follows:

Section 1: Pursuant to the Findings of Fact made and determined by the Zoning Board of Appeals, a Special Use Permit for a Planned Unit Development is granted to allow for the construction of a single-family residence dwelling within an “Environmentally Sensitive Area” as designated by the Cook County Comprehensive Land Use and Policies Plan. The companion Variance (V18-29) requests to: (1) reduce the lot area from the minimum required 40,000 square feet to an existing 13,129 square feet, (2) reduce the lot width from the minimum required 150 feet to an existing 99.24 feet and (3) reduce the rear yard setback from the minimum required 50 feet to a proposed 42.03 feet if granted under the companion Special Use request. The Variance is sought in order to construct a single-family residential dwelling served by a well and septic system, on the following described property:

LOT 149 IN FRANK DELUGACHS WOODED ESTATES SUBDIVISION IN SECTION 18, TOWNSHIP 36 NORTH, RANGE 12, EAST OF THE THIRD PRINCIPAL MERIDIAN, IN COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS.

P.I.N. 27-18-422-011-0000.

The common address is 15640 113th Court, Orland Park, Illinois 60467.

Section 2: This Ordinance and every provision thereof shall be considered severable. If any Section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, sentence or provision of this Ordinance shall be adjudged by any Court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair, invalidate or nullify the remainder thereof, which remainder shall remain and continue in full force and effect.

Section 3: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall become effective from and after its passage, approval and publication in the manner prescribed by law.

Pursuant to § 13.8.9 of the Cook County Zoning Ordinance, the Board makes the following Findings of Fact as to the Special Use:

1. Establishment, maintenance or operation of the special use will not be detrimental to or endanger public health, safety or general welfare.

The proposed used use is to be a single family. Maintenance of public health, safety and general welfare will be enhanced by eliminating an existing vacant property.

2. **Establishment, maintenance or operation of the special use will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity for the uses already permitted, nor diminishes and impairs property values within the neighborhood.**

The proposed construction will comply with the approved use for this parcel (single family residential) and occupation by the family will provide maintenance of the presently vacant parcel in line with the existing uses on adjacent and nearby developed parcels. Construction of this project will serve to maintain or improve property values by providing stability of reducing one vacant lot in a mostly already developed subdivision.

3. **Establishment, maintenance or operation of the special use will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of surrounding property for permitted uses.**

The proposed improvement is completely in line with the normal, orderly development and improvement of the area by providing a new single-family residence in a neighborhood composed entirely of single family residences on small lots.

4. **Adequate utilities, access roads, drainage and other necessary facilities have been or are being provided.**

The area is presently developed with public utilities for gas, electric and telephone within dedicated easements. This project will require the construction of access via an extension of 113th court under permit from the township highway department. The Owners/Applicants have been coordinating design efforts with Orland Township's Engineer. Final design is not completed but will comply with all Orland Township requirements. Initial review by MWRD was positive.

5. **Adequate measures have been, or will be, taken to provide ingress and egress designed to minimize traffic congestion in public streets.**

Construction of one additional single-family home in this subdivision will not significantly impact traffic operation on public streets in the area. The improvement will include construction of all-weather access to the presently vacant property, within the existing township right of way for 113th court.

6. **Establishment, maintenance or operation of the special use shall in all other respects conform to all Cook County Ordinances, unless otherwise authorized by the Cook County Board of Commissioners pursuant to the recommendation of the Zoning Board of Appeals.**

With the exception of the Special Use for the Planned Unit Development and the requested setback and lot size variances, the Special Use will conform in all respects to all Cook County Ordinances. The Owner's/Applicant's testimony demonstrated that they would comply with any and all applicable ordinances as well as any conditions recommended by the ZBA.

Pursuant to § 9.5.10 of the Cook County Zoning Ordinance, the Board makes the following Findings of Fact as to the Planned Unit Development:

ARTICLE 9.5.10: STANDARDS FOR PLANNED UNIT DEVELOPMENT

1. **PUD conforms with the planning objectives, policies and maps of the County as specified in the Cook County Comprehensive Land Use and Policies Plan.**

The proposed use is single family residential and the area is zoned for single family residential uses. The proposed use is in compliance with County Standards for this lot within this area.

2. PUD is a type and character and contains uses that are needed in the area.

The proposed use is single family residential. The area is zoned for and occupied by single family residential uses on similarly sized lots. The proposed use is in the compliance with use that is needed within this area.

3. PUD is designed and laid out to preserve environmentally sensitive areas, natural resources, habitat and topographic features to the fullest extent possible.

The proposed design for this lot will not harm any natural resources or habitat. The lot is presently maintained by mowing and there are no environmentally sensitive elements existing on the property. The design minimizes the disturbed area by providing a moderate size house with limited changes to the existing grades on the site. The proposed residence is planned to fit into the existing environment with minimum disturbance.

4. PUD is designed in conformity with the provisions of the Cook County Subdivision Manual or any successor subdivision document.

The proposed Application will not alter boundaries of the existing subdivision which was platted in the 1940's. Although lot sizes within this subdivision do not meet current subdivision standards, there are adequate public road and utility easement dedications to provide a healthy residential neighborhood as was intended when the subdivision was approved. The proposed development conforms to the original intent for this lot.

5. PUD is designed to provide horizontal spacing between buildings which takes into consideration the purpose and objectives of this article.

The proposed construction will meet the requirements for yard setbacks as contained in the current ordinance for this zoning district, except as specifically requested for variation. Nearby vacant properties are unlikely to be developed in the future since they are either substantially in the identified floodplain or sensitive wetland areas. This development will be adjoined by vacant uses for the foreseeable future.

6. PUD complies with the industrial performance standards enumerated in Article 6 of this Ordinance if the PUD contains industrial uses.

This is not applicable since the proposed improvement does not include industrial uses.

7. PUD complies with the parking requirements enumerated in Article 11 of this Ordinance.

The proposed improvement will provide two parking spaces within the garage and two additional spaces in the driveway, complying with county requirements for single family construction.

8. PUD provides appropriate yards, setbacks and buffers between the PUD and adjacent zoning lots.

The Owner/Applicant shall specifically request, in writing, any variance from the required setbacks. The proposed development complies with the requirements for yards of the Cook County Zoning Ordinance, except as specifically requested for variation. In compliance with the Ordinance for this residential class, the front yard setback will be a percentage of the lot depth rather than the standard dimension. This property will be served by an onsite sewage treatment system (septic system). Under County Zoning Ordinance, minimum lot width shall be 150 feet. This width may be reduced by variance as long as the county department of public health has approved a septic system design for the site. The

proposed septic design for this property has been reviewed and approved by the Cook County Department of Public Health, and copies of the approval have been submitted to the Department of Building and Zoning. The size of this lot is substantially the same as all the other lots in this subdivision, all of which are required to be on well and septic and have received variances in the past.

9. PUD has adequate utilities, access roads, drainage and other necessary facilities.

The area is presently developed with public utilities for gas, electric and telephone within dedicated easements. This project will require the construction of access via an extension of 113th court under permit from the township Highway Department. The Owner/Applicant has been coordinating design efforts with the township's engineer. Final design is not completed but will comply with all township requirements as well. Initial review by MWRD was positive. There are no storm sewers in the area. No additional drainage problems will be created by the proposed development.

10. PUD has ingress and egress designed to minimize traffic congestion in public streets.

Construction of one additional single-family home in the subdivision will not significantly impact traffic operation on public streets in the area. The improvement will include construction of all-weather access to the presently vacant property, within the existing township right of way for 113th Court.

11. PUD and its maintenance and operation will not be detrimental to or endanger public health, safety or general welfare.

The proposed use is to be a single family residence in a residential district. It will contribute positively to the maintenance of public health, safety and general welfare by eliminating an existing vacant property.

12. PUD and its maintenance and operation will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity for the uses already permitted, nor diminish and impair property values within the surrounding area.

The proposed request will comply with the approved use for this parcel (single family residential) and occupation by the Owners/Applicants will provide maintenance of the presently vacant parcel in line with the existing uses on adjacent and nearby developed parcels. Construction of this project will serve to maintain or improve property values by providing stability in the action of reducing one vacant lot in a mostly already developed subdivision.

13. PUD and its maintenance and operation will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of surrounding property.

The proposed single-family improvement is compatible with the surrounding single-family residences in the area. It's maintenance and operation will match that of the existing neighboring developed properties and have no adverse effect on future development of vacant lots within the subdivision.

14. PUD shall provide more open space than would be required in a standard subdivision.

Due to the small size of this lot, there is no opportunity to provide more open space than already provided on surrounding properties. The proposed house is designed with a moderate footprint and the proposed driveway is short. Since the adjacent properties are environmentally sensitive areas, this portion of the subdivision will have an abnormally large amount of open space for the foreseeable future.

15. PUD shall be designed to connect to existing or planned pedestrian and bicycle systems in the

vicinity

There are no existing or planned pedestrian or bicycle systems in this area of the County.

Pursuant to § 13.6.3 of the Cook County Zoning Ordinance, the Board makes the following Findings of Fact as to the Variance:

- 1. Physical surroundings, shape or topographical condition of the property would result in hardship upon the owner, as distinguished from a mere inconvenience, if the provisions of this Ordinance were followed.**

The lots in this subdivision are substantially smaller than would be allowed today under the current Ordinance. Every single-family residence proposed to be constructed on a single lot within this subdivision requires granting of a variance in order to be constructed.

- 2. Conditions which are unique to the property exist and are not applicable to other properties within the same zoning classification.**

Lot requirements for this zoning classification include 150' minimum lot width (with septic system) and minimum area of 40,000 square feet. No lots within this subdivision can meet these requirements without re-subdivision to combine several lots together for one project.

- 3. Variance sought is not based exclusively upon a desire to make the property more profitable.**

The Owners/Applicants stated that they intend to construct this single-family home for their personal use as the family residence.

- 4. Hardship or alleged difficulty is caused by this Ordinance and not by any person presently having an interest in the property.**

The hardship is caused by the current Zoning Ordinance requiring lot dimensions well in excess of the dimensions of this lot as approved and platted in the 1940's.

- 5. Variance will not be detrimental to the public welfare or injurious to other properties or improvements in the neighborhood.**

The lots in this subdivision are all smaller than would be allowed today under the current Zoning Ordinance. Every single-family residence proposed to be constructed on a single lot within this subdivision requires granting of a variance in order to be constructed. Granting of variation for this lot will be a continuation of the practice of the Cook County in regard to furthering orderly development of this neighborhood for over 60 years. Granting of the proposed variation will not be detrimental to the public welfare or injurious to other properties in the neighborhood.

- 6. Variance will not impair an adequate supply of light and air to adjacent properties, substantially increase congestion in the public streets, increase the danger of fire, cause increased flooding risk to adjacent property, endanger public safety or substantially diminish or impair property values within adjacent neighborhoods.**

The proposed construction will meet the requirements for yard setbacks as contained in the Ordinance for the R-4 Single Family District, except as requested herein. Nearby vacant properties are unlikely to be developed in the future since they are either substantially in the identified floodplain or sensitive wetland areas. This development will be adjoined by vacant uses for the foreseeable future.

Construction of an additional single-family home in this subdivision will not significantly impact traffic operation on public streets in the area. The improvement will include construction of all-weather access to the presently vacant property, within the existing Orland Township right of way for 113th court.

The proposed construction will fully comply with requirements of the Cook County Building Code and the local Fire Protection District with regard to fire protection.

Construction of the proposed SU/PUD will not increase risk of flooding on adjacent properties since all on-site work will be completed above the elevation of the defined flood plain and drainage onto neighboring properties will avoided or minimized wherever feasible.

The proposed construction will comply with the approved use for this parcel (R-4 Single Family Residential) and occupation will provide maintenance of the vacant parcel in line with the existing uses on adjacent and nearby developed parcels. The proposed request will serve to maintain or improve property values by providing stability of reducing one vacant lot in a mostly already developed subdivision.

Section 5: SPECIAL USE: That this Ordinance under the provisions of Section 13.8.9 of the Cook County Zoning Ordinance is in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval, except that if said use is not established within one year as provided in Section 13.8.14 said Special Use for shall be null and void. That said Subject Property be developed and constructed pursuant to the detailing set forth in the testimony and contained in the exhibits and Findings of the Cook County Zoning Board of Appeals hereby incorporated by reference into the Ordinance, as provided by law.

Section 1: Pursuant to the Findings of Fact made and determined by the Zoning Board of Appeals, a Special Use Permit for a Planned Unit Development is granted to allow for the installation of a Community Solar Garden within an “Environmentally Sensitive Area” as designated by the Cook County Comprehensive Land Use and Policies Plan if granted under the companion Special Use request on the following described property:

Section 3: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall become effective from and after its passage, approval and publication in the manner prescribed by law.

Pursuant to § 13.8.9 of the Cook County Zoning Ordinance, the Board makes the following Findings of Fact as to the Special Use:

1. Establishment, maintenance or operation of the special use will not be detrimental to or endanger public health, safety or general welfare.

Polycrystalline solar panels will be used for this facility. This is opposed to what is called thin-film solar panels which will not be used. The thin-film panels contain cadmium in them and they are largely used down south. When you google solar PV dangerous chemicals, thin-film panels pop up, but polycrystalline panels will be used here. Polycrystalline panels are essentially two sheets of plexiglass with a solar wafer in the middle.

As for noise, the inverters are the only things that make any noise. The decibels drop from 65 at 1 foot down to 29 at 64 feet which is the same as quiet rural night. The facility is at least 100 feet from any neighbor, so nobody will be able to hear it.

EMFs is another issue that some people are concerned about. Solar panels are similar to any appliance in your house. The EMFs from them are below a fluorescent lamp at three feet.

Another issue that has come up is how solar kills birds. Google can mislead searchers as it is concentrated solar that is dangerous to birds, not solar PV. Concentrated solar is where all the mirrors reflect to one spot that heats up water and fuels a generator, which is not what is being proposed here. Concentrated solar is more common in a desert. Solar PV typically attracts birds as they are good perching habitats for them.

A 2MW solar facility reduces carbon emissions by the equivalent of taking 717 passenger cars off the road for one year. (October 10, 2018, pg. 48)

Finally, the SU is not detrimental to general welfare because of all the items already listed as they are good for the health and morale of the citizens.

2. Establishment, maintenance or operation of the special use will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity for the uses already permitted, nor diminishes and impairs property values within the neighborhood.

The SU will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the vicinity for uses already permitted for a few reasons. First, there will be no incremental runoff or soil erosion based on the fact that there will be year-round ground cover. There single axis trackers, since they are constantly moving, rain will not cause drip zones that would become an issue in the soil. Soil absorption will increase as was discussed in prior standards. The year-round ground cover will allow for greater absorption by the soil when compared to the soil that would lay bare outside of the growing season.

Again, the solar farm is quiet, so neighbors will not hear it. There will be no incremental EMFs, runoff or erosion.

There will also be screening provided to screen the facility from neighbor's view. The fence will also be a game fence that is more suitable for neighborhoods when compared to the normal industrial chain link fence. There will be no barbed wire on the fence and it will not be electrified.

Mr. Makofski testified that the SU would cause no damage to property values in the surrounding area. In summary, he looked at a Cohn Reznick Report which looked at similar areas to the Subject Property that had solar in proximity and found that there was no property value damage as a result. He was able to take those findings and apply them to this site to determine that the SU would not damage property values in the proximity.

3. Establishment, maintenance or operation of the special use will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of surrounding property for permitted uses.

This development is normal and orderly as discussed earlier (reference no ability to develop housing) and it will not impede normal and orderly development of surrounding properties.

4. Adequate utilities, access roads, drainage and other necessary facilities have been or are being provided.

There are adequate utilities already on-site. There will be a net positive on the drainage on-site. Under normal circumstances, the Subject Property is an open field through most of the year and so it is sitting there vacant with nothing on it. Plus, during the planting season, the soil is still not covered for most of the time. The seed mixes that will be planted will completely cover the soil year-round, so it will be a net positive to the drainage profile.

Access roads are incorporated into the plan and will intend on installing the minimal amount of road as possible. Utilities will only be required for interconnection.

5. Adequate measures have been, or will be, taken to provide ingress and egress designed to minimize traffic congestion in public streets.

The SU will not affect traffic flow and there will be virtually no additional traffic during operation. The solar farms are quiet neighbors.

- 6. Establishment, maintenance or operation of the special use shall in all other respects conform to all Cook County ordinances, unless otherwise authorized by the Cook County Board of Commissioners pursuant to the recommendation of the Zoning Board of Appeals.**

The SU will conform to all Cook County Ordinances.

Pursuant to Section 9.5.10 of the Cook County Zoning Ordinance, the Zoning Board of Appeals makes the following findings as to the Planned Unit Development

- 1. PUD conforms with the planning objectives, policies and maps of the County as specified in the Cook County Comprehensive Land Use and Policies Plan.** The solar garden conforms with the objectives, policies and maps of Cook County by staying outside of the environmentally sensitive areas. Additionally, the solar garden will bring benefits to the community. The particular area in which the Subject Property is was identified by the Fair

Housing and Equity Assessment (Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning, 2013) as one of the lowest opportunity areas for fair housing development. That suggests that this property should be used for other types of development.

The Future Energy Jobs Act also provides a significant amount of money to put towards training low income members of the community to work on the solar installation. That will provide another benefit to the local community.

- 2. PUD is of a type and character and contains uses that are needed in the area.**

The PUD does contain uses that are needed in the area. The Future Energy Jobs act requires 3,000MW in Illinois. This project is 2MW so perhaps 1,000 of these projects will be needed with some projects being larger.

Several other counties in the area surrounding Cook County, including Will, Grundy, Winnebago and Kankakee, have dozens of applications. In Cook County, this project is the first one being heard. Space like the Subject Property is hard to come by in Cook County. In order to keep these jobs in the county and make sure members of this particular community receive the financial resources made available under the Future Energy Jobs Act, projects like these are needed. Otherwise, those potential jobs will be outside of Cook County.

- 3. PUD is designed and laid out to preserve environmentally sensitive areas, natural resources, habitat and topographic features to the fullest extent possible.**

The project location was selected to avoid the flood plains. The site was previously used for agriculture but the IDNR determined no kind of habitat or resource issues in the area. There will be minimal foot traffic after construction, no emissions and no kinds of chemicals.

- 4. PUD is designed in conformity with the provisions of the Cook County Subdivision Manual or any successor subdivision document.**

The PUD will be in conformity with the Cook County Subdivision Manual and the 7th Division Manual.

5. PUD is designed to provide horizontal spacing between buildings which takes into consideration the purpose and objectives of this article.

No buildings will be required and the spacing between the panels will be sufficient for driving emergency or any other vehicles through them.

6. PUD complies with the industrial performance standards enumerated in Article 6 of this ordinance if the PUD contains industrial uses.

The PUD complies with the industry standards for industrial performance 41-906.

7. PUD complies with the parking requirements enumerated in Article 11 of this ordinance.

No long-term parking will be necessary but there will be an access path that meets specific requirements for emergency access and other needed services.

8. PUD provides appropriate yards, setbacks and buffers between the PUD and adjacent zoning lots. The applicant shall specifically request, in writing, any variance from the required setbacks.

The necessary setbacks have been met plus some extra space.

9. PUD has adequate utilities, access roads, drainage and other necessary facilities.

There are adequate utilities already on-site. There will be a net positive on the drainage on-site. Under normal circumstances, the Subject Property is an open field through most of the year and so it is sitting there vacant with nothing on it. Plus, during the planting season, the soil is still not covered for most of the time. The seed mixes that will be planted will completely cover the soil year-round so it will be a net positive to the drainage profile.

Access roads are incorporated into the plan and will intend on installing the minimal amount of road as possible. Utilities will only be required for interconnection.

10. PUD has ingress and egress designed to minimize traffic congestion in public streets.

The PUD will not affect traffic flow and there will be virtually no additional traffic during operation. The solar farms are quiet neighbors.

11. PUD and its maintenance and operation will not be detrimental to or endanger public health, safety or general welfare.

Polycrystalline solar panels will be used for this facility and are not detrimental to or endanger public health, safety or general welfare This is opposed to what is called thin-film solar panels which will not be used. The thin-film panels contain cadmium in them and they are largely used down south. When you google solar PV dangerous chemicals, thin-film panels pop up but polycrystalline panels will be used here. Polycrystalline panels are essentially two sheets of plexiglass with a solar wafer in the middle.

As for noise, the inverters are the only things that make any noise. The decibels drop from 65 at 1 foot down to 29 at 64 feet which is the same as quiet rural night. The facility is at least 100 feet from any neighbor, so nobody will be able to hear it.

EMFs is another issue that some people are concerned about. Solar panels are similar to any appliance in your house. The EMFs from them are below a fluorescent lamp at three feet.

Another issue that has come up is how solar kills birds. Google can mislead searchers as it is concentrated solar that is dangerous to birds, not solar PV. Concentrated solar is where all the mirrors reflect to one spot that heats up water and fuels a generator, which is not what is being proposed here. Concentrated solar is more common in a desert. Solar PV typically attracts birds as they are good perching habitats for them.

A 2MW solar facility reduces carbon emissions by the equivalent of taking 717 passenger cars off the road for one year.

Finally, the PUD is not detrimental to general welfare because of all the items already listed as they are good for the health and morale of the citizens.

12. PUD and its maintenance and operation will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity for the uses already permitted, nor diminish and impair property values within the surrounding area.

The PUD will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the vicinity for uses already permitted for a few reasons. First, there will be no incremental runoff or soil erosion based on the fact that there will be year-round ground cover. There single axis trackers, since they are constantly moving, rain will not cause drip zones that would become an issue in the soil. Soil absorption will increase as was discussed in prior standards. The year-round ground cover will allow for greater absorption by the soil when compared to the soil that would lay bare outside of the growing season.

The solar farm is quiet so neighbors will not hear it. There will be no incremental EMFs, runoff or erosion.

There will be screening provided to screen the facility from neighbor's view. The fence will be a game fence which is more suitable for neighborhoods when compared to the normal industrial chain link fence. There will be no barbed wire on the fence and it will not be electrified.

Mr. Makofski testified to the fact that the PUD would cause no damage to property values in the surrounding area. In summary, he looked at a Cohn Reznick Report which looked at similar areas to the Subject Property that had solar in proximity and found that there was no property value damage as a result. He was able to take those findings and apply them to this site to determine that the PUD would not damage property values in the proximity.

13. PUD and its maintenance and operation will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of surrounding property.

This development is normal and orderly as discussed earlier (reference no ability to develop housing) and so it will not impede normal and orderly development of surrounding properties.

14. PUD shall provide more open space than would be required in a standard subdivision.

There will be a 24% ground coverage ratio and so there will be a lot of open space, more that would be required in a standard subdivision.

15. PUD shall be designed to connect to existing or planned pedestrian and bicycle systems in the vicinity.

There will be no impact on pedestrian usage or bicycle systems.

Section 5: SPECIAL USE That this Ordinance under the provisions of Section 13.8.9 of the Cook County Zoning Ordinance is in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval, except that if said use is not established within one year as provided in Section 13.8.14 said Special Use for shall be null and void. That said Subject Property be developed and constructed pursuant to the detailing set forth in the testimony and contained in the exhibits and Findings of the Cook County Zoning Board of Appeals hereby incorporated by reference into the Ordinance, as provided by law.

TO REGULATE THE REGIONAL GANG INTELLIGENCE DATABASE

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners that Chapter 46 Law Enforcement, Article II, Sheriff, Division sections 46-37.4 through 46-37.5 of the Cook County Code, is hereby enacted as follows:

Sec. 46-37.4 An Ordinance to regulate the Regional Gang Intelligence Database

(a) The Office of the Sheriff shall be prohibited from finalizing negotiations with any law enforcement agency that would discontinue the Cook County Sheriff's current management of the Regional Gang Intelligence Database (RGID) until any pending investigations or requests pertaining to RGID with the Office of the Independent Inspector General (OIIG) are completed and made public and a public hearing on the matter is held.

(b) The Office of the Sheriff shall be prohibited from designating any individual a gang member and/or inputting any individual's information into any gang database, unless the OIIG concludes that these gang designations have a legitimate law enforcement related purpose that outweighs the harm caused to individuals who are designated as gang members, and in those circumstances the gang designations must be verified in accordance with professionally accepted standards and be submitted to regular audits.

(c) Such designations must also be free from racial discrimination.

(d) The Office of the Sheriff shall provide individuals notification of their designation and an opportunity to challenge this designation. Such an appeal process should be developed with experts and advocates on this topic to ensure it is not costly or burdensome to individuals.

(e) The Office of the Sheriff shall further be prohibited from sharing gang designations and/or information contained in RGID with any third party, n except that the OIIG may access RGID for the sole purpose of auditing its policies and practices.

(f) The Office of the Sheriff is required to provide a written notice to every individual who is currently or who has been designated a gang member since 2013 in one or more of databases the Sheriff has access to. The notice will state:

- (1) The date the individual was designated a gang member, associate, and/or affiliate;
- (2) The gang(s) with which the individual is alleges to have been affiliated;
- (3) The basis for the designation and the location where the designation took place;

- (4) The name of the officer(s) who made the initial designation;
 - (5) Any external agencies that have access to that designation, and the dates on which any (6) external agency accessed that designation;
 - (6) And the most recent date of any audit or assessment of the accuracy of that designation.
- (g) On an annual basis, the Office of the Sheriff will publish both a statement detailing the actions it has taken to comply with the requirements of this ordinance, data about the individuals designated as gang affiliated, and data and status on appeals received, disaggregated by:
- (1) Race/ethnicity;
 - (2) Gender;
 - (3) Age;
 - (4) Alleged gang affiliation(s);
 - (5) Basis for identifying gang affiliations(s);
 - (6) Location of police interaction that led to designation(s);
 - (7) Date of first designation(s);
 - (8) Number of arrests for serious or violent crime(s);
 - (9) Number of individuals added while detained at Cook County Jail;
 - (10) Number and status of appeals upon notification and
 - (11) Basis for null descriptions.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE

COOK COUNTY HISTORIC DISTRICT PRESERVATION EXEMPTION

WHEREAS, Cook County residents are experiencing substantial and unpredictable property tax increases; and

WHEREAS, Cook County residents residing in historic districts are experiencing even more substantial and unpredictable property tax increases due to the overlap of some historic districts with areas experiencing rapid displacement and gentrification; and

WHEREAS, in June 2017 a Tribune published an investigation entitled “The Tax Divide” that detailed widespread inconsistencies and inequities in Cook County home valuations; and

WHEREAS, between 2015 and 2016 more than 12,000 black residents left Cook County and since 2010 the greater Chicago areas has seen a loss of nearly 46,000 black residents; and

WHEREAS, the Southwest side neighborhood, Pilsen, known for its Latinx culture and identity has seen a loss of 10,300 Latinx residents since 2000; and

WHEREAS, certain areas designated as Historic Districts by the National Register of Historic Places overlap with areas experiencing rapid displacement, gentrification and loss of cultural heritage; and

WHEREAS, in recognition of the severe economic circumstances that many longtime homeowners face, the Illinois Legislature and the Cook County Board of Commissioners have historically created legislation to target impacted communities; and

WHEREAS, the Illinois Legislature passed Public Act 88-451, the Longtime Owner-Occupant Property Tax Relief Act (35 ILCS 250, et. seq.) with the purpose of providing property tax relief to longtime homeowners, whose property taxes rose sharply as a result of new construction or renovation of existing residences in long-established residential areas; and

WHEREAS, on June 5, 2001, the Cook County Longtime Homeowner Exemption Ordinance (Ord. No. 01-O-12) was enacted to provide relief to longtime homeowners who are experiencing unpredictable property tax increases due to upper-scale development or re-development; and

WHEREAS, the Illinois Legislature passed Public Act 90-0114, creating a Property Tax Assessment Freeze Program which provides tax incentives to owner-occupants of certified historic residences who rehabilitate their homes; and

WHEREAS, as a matter of public policy, the Cook County Board of Commissioners has the responsibility to enact property tax relief provisions that will enable eligible longtime property owners to remain in financially secure possession of their homes.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the President and the Board of Commissioners of Cook County the following:

TITLE OF ORDINANCE: Historic District Preservation Exemption Ordinance.

PURPOSE: An Ordinance creating the Historic District Preservation Exemption Program to provide property tax relief to property owners who have owned a property within a historic district and who have low- or middle-income tenants who have resided in a property within a historic district for a minimum of 10 years. The ordinance allows property owners to conserve the Historic District Preservation Exemption if they stay or move to another historic district. Property owners who have tenants who have stayed or

moved to another historic district can also apply. The Cook County Assessor (“Assessor”) shall administer the Historic District Preservation Program. To be eligible, the property owner must own a Class 2 or Class up to 2-12 property located in Cook County. Eligibility for the program terminates at the time the property owner no longer has any property in the historic district, however, new property owners can reapply for existing tenants.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners that Chapter 74 Taxation, Article II, Real Property Taxation, Division 1 sections 74-49 through 74-57 of the Cook County Code, is hereby enacted as follows:

Sec. 74-49. Short title. This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the “Historic District Preservation Exemption Ordinance.”

Sec. 74-50. Purpose. The intent of this Ordinance is to stabilize the effects of soaring property taxes for longtime property owners who rent to low and middle-income tenants, who have resided in historic districts for a minimum of 10 years or more.

Sec. 74-51. Definitions. As used in this Ordinance:

Assessment District Cook County has a triennial reassessment cycle wherein one of the three districts within the county is reassessed each year. The three assessment districts are defined in the Illinois Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/9-220(B)).

Assessed Value “AV” as defined in the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance (Section 2, Class 2 and Section 3, Class 2).

Average Assessment Increase. A percentage calculated by taking the value of all potentially qualifying Class 2 properties within the assessment district and determining the percent difference between the current reassessment value and the prior year’s assessment value.

Certified Local Government. A unit of local government fulfilling the requirements of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended, 16 U.S.C. 470a (the ‘Act’) that has been certified by the Illinois State Historic Preservation Officer pursuant to the Act.

Equalized Assessed Value “EAV.” The assessed value multiplied by the equalization factor calculated by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

Homeowner Exemption for Long-term Properties “H.E.L.P.” calculated as follows: that portion of the current EAV for an eligible property which exceeds the sum of the EAV for the year prior to reassessment; plus the prior year EAV multiplied by a factor equal to 150 percent of the average assessment increase for the most current reassessment of the assessment district.

Class 2 to 2-12 Properties. Residential properties as defined in the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance (Section 2, Class 2).

Contributing Building. A building which is a historic structure within a specifically designated historic or landmark district pursuant to a local ordinance, approved by a Certified Local Government, which has been certified by the Illinois Historic Preservation Agency, and which meets the following criteria:

- (1) The building was constructed within or present during the period of historical significance of the district; and
- (2) The building relates to the significant features, qualities, and/or themes that give the district its historic, cultural and/or architectural significance; and
- (3) The building substantially retains its design, materials and appearance from the period of historical significance of the district; or if substantially altered, the changes are reversible such that, through the Substantial Rehabilitation of the building, the building will be returned to a state that substantially retains its design, materials, and appearance from the period of historical significance of the district.

Historic District. A district which is specifically designated as a historic or landmark district pursuant to a local ordinance, approved by a Certified Local Government, pursuant to its criteria, which have been certified by the Illinois Historic Preservation Agency.

Historic District Property Owner. Persons who have owned and occupied a Cook County Class 2 or Class up to 2-12 property since 2008, or five years or more if the owner received assistance in the acquisition of the property as part of a government or nonprofit housing program. "Longtime homeowners" also means persons who inherited the property from a spouse who owned and occupied a Class 2 or Class up to 2-12 property since January 1, 2008 or five years or more if the owner received assistance in purchasing the residence from a governmental or non-profit housing program.

Period of Historical Significance. The period of development history for which the district is significant.

Preservation Commission. A commission or similar body established by a Certified Local Government pursuant to the 'Act,' generally for the purpose of identifying, preserving, protecting, recommending for designation and encouraging the continued use and the rehabilitation of areas, properties and structures having historic and/or architectural significance.

Substantial Rehabilitation. The extensive renovation or replacement of primary building systems of the landmark and/or the significant improvement of the condition of the landmark, as further prescribed by rule of the Assessor; which meets or exceeds the Standards of the United States Department of the Interior for Rehabilitation, Preservation, Restoration and Reconstruction of Historic Properties; and which has been completed in accordance with plans approved by the Certified Local Government within which the landmark is located.

Triennial Reassessment. Any reassessment of an assessment district, which occurs every third year as set forth in the Illinois Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/9-220(B)).

Sec. 74-52. Administration of the historic district preservation exemption program.

- (a) The Cook County Assessor shall have the authority to:
 - (1) Administer the Historic District Preservation Exemption program as created by the enactment of this Ordinance and;
 - (2) Create applications for and determine potential eligibility to the program based on the eligibility criteria set forth in this Ordinance and;
- (b) The Cook County Clerk shall have the authority to compute tax rates and calculate tax bill amounts and to provide this information to the Cook County Treasurer to implement the provisions of this Ordinance.
- (c) The Cook County Treasurer shall state on the tax bill the amount of the tax saved by the exemption.

Sec. 74-53. Eligibility criteria.

- (a) The following nonexclusive criteria shall be used to verify a property owner's eligibility for program on an annual basis:
 - (1) Property owner owns a Cook County Class 2 up to Class 2-12 property in a historic district, and that owner has owned the property since January 1, 2008; or
 - (2) Property Owner owns a Cook County Class 2 up to Class 2-12 property in a historic district; or
 - (3) Annual household income of property occupants for the year of the property owner's triennial assessment does not exceed one hundred and fifteen percent (115%) of the Chicago Primary Metropolitan Statistical Area median income as defined by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Sec. 74-54. Applying the exemption.

- (a) The Cook County Assessor shall:
 - (1) Annually verify potential eligible property owners; and
 - (2) Provide to the Cook County Clerk the information necessary to calculate the exemption in accordance with the Ordinance.
- (b) The Cook County Clerk shall remove the exempt value from the calculation of the property tax.
- (c) The Cook County Treasurer shall state on the tax bill the amount of tax saved by the exemption.

Sec. 74-55. Eligibility notification.

The Assessor shall notify potentially eligible owners of record of Class 2 and up to Class 2-12 properties in Cook County of the existence of the Historic District Preservation Exemption Program for each triennial assessment cycle within sufficient time to apply.

Sec. 74-56. Terminating eligibilty.

Eligibility for the program terminates at the time the property owner no longer has any property in the historic district, and/or tenant household income is above 115% of the Chicago Primary Metropolitan Statistical Area median income as defined by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Sec. 74-57. Effective date. This ordinance shall be in effect December 1, 2019. (Exemption discount should be reflected on the 2019 property tax bill payable in 2020).

PROPOSED ORDINANCE**COMPLETE COUNT CENSUS COMMISSION for COOK COUNTY**

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 2- Administration, Article VI, Boards, Commissions, and Committees, Division 1 - generally sections 2-477 through 2-479 of the Cook County Code, is hereby enacted as Follows:

Sec. 2-477. Short Title. This Division shall be known and may be cited as the “**Complete Count Census Commission for Cook County**” (**The Commission**)

Sec. 2-478. - Policy and Purpose.*(a) Policy.*

This ordinance hereby creates a Commission to assist in the development of an accurate, timely and comprehensive census outreach plan to educate the population on the importance of the census having a complete and accurate population count. Strategic focus will be placed on addressing Hard to Count and underserved communities that the census historically missed - communities of color, urban and rural low-income households, immigrants, populations with language barriers, and young children. Two years prior to the census decennial the Commission shall be activated and a budget line item appropriated, empowering the Commission to perform its work.

(b) Purpose.

- (1) A complete and accurate population count is crucial to the well-being of the county. Federal officials rely on population data to allocate billions of dollars in federal funds to local communities.
- (2) An accurate population count is also used to determine fair reapportionment of congressional representation.
- (3) State and local officials use the population count in the redistricting processes to draw representative boundaries for federal, state and local districts.
- (4) The census data is also used to make decisions about infrastructure, such as where to build a new school or road. Similarly, local and national businesses utilize census data to decide whether and where to start or relocate a business.

Sec. 2-479. - Complete Count Census Commission of Cook County.

(a) The Commission will have eleven (11) members including: two (2) Commissioners who were the original sponsors of the ordinance who shall serve as Chair and Co-Chair of the Commission. Four (4) of the Commission members shall be selected by the Chair and Co-Chair Four (4) members of the Commission shall be appointed by the President of the Cook County Board of Commissioners which may include but not be limited to: civic leaders, business leaders or private sector representatives who have established excellent inclusion practices. The President shall also appoint by virtue of the position (1) Bureau Chief of Economic Development All to be confirmed by the Cook County Board.

(b) The Commission members will serve for two (2) years leading up to the decennial census (typically taken every 10 years in the month of April) and can be reappointed for consecutive decennial census terms.

(c) The Commission shall review and make recommendations on how the Commission can increase the participation in hard to count communities. This will be done in collaboration with Bureau of Economic Development for the creation of the request for proposal.

(d) The Commission will establish the guidelines and vision for the census outreach plan and oversee the implementation of the plan, and the creation of the request for proposals.

(e) The Commission has the authority to review, oversee and make recommendations on all proposals submitted to the Bureau of Economic Development as it relates to all census activities.

(f) The Commission will advise the office of the President and Board of Commissioners not less than quarterly on its recommendations. Six months prior to the decennial census the Commission will advise the President and the Board of Commissioners on a monthly basis.

(g) All meetings of the Commission will be open to the public.

Effective date: This ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE

ARTICLE III. - CHARITABLE ROTATING CRIMINAL BOND FUNDS

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 18 COURTS, ARTICLE III. - CHARITABLE ROTATING CRIMINAL BOND FUNDS, SECTION NUMBER(S) 18-45 - 18-50, of the Cook County Code is hereby enacted as Follows:

Sec. 18-45. - Definitions

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Charitable Bond Fund means a not-for-profit 501c3, as defined by the Internal Revenue Service, organization that uses its funds to post bond for individuals who are detained at the Cook County Jail.

Sec. 18-46. - Eligibility for representation by the Public Defender's Office

A criminal defendant whose deposit or cash bond is posted by a Charitable Bond Fund shall not be deemed ineligible for representation by the Cook County Public Defender's Office.

Sec. 18-47. - Charitable Bond Fund bond ineligible for bail assignment or attorney's fees

Any bonds posted by a Charitable Bond Fund shall not be used to pay attorney's fees.

Sec. 18-48. - Fees

The Clerk of the Court shall not deduct any fees, court costs, or penalties from bond funds that were posted by a Charitable Bond Fund and at the conclusion of the case shall return available funds to the Charitable Bond Fund.

Sec. 18-49. - Forfeiture

In the instance where bond is posted by a Charitable Bond Fund and a judgment of forfeiture is ordered in favor of the state, no part of the amount deposited by the Charitable Bond Fund shall be forfeited to the state.

Sec. 18-50. - Return of Funds

The Clerk of the Court shall return bond monies posted by Charitable Bond Funds immediately. The funds shall be returned via direct deposit.

Effective date: This ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.

A motion was made by Commissioner Suffredin, seconded by Commissioner Johnson, that the Proposed Ordinance be referred to the Criminal Justice Committee. The motion carried.
