#### PROPOSED RESOLUTION

#### 2024 STARTING BLOCK GRANTS

**WHEREAS**, in November 2021, the Cook County Board of Commissioners passed Resolution No. 21-5542 creating a special purpose fund for Equity and Inclusion ("Equity Fund") dedicated to addressing historical disparities and disinvestment communities that are marginalized or have experienced other social and economic disparities; and

**WHEREAS**, through the Equity Fund, intentional investments from government resources are allocated to address historical and continued disparities and disinvestment, (as defined in the Equity Report) and to bring advocates, service providers, and other partners to the table as thought partners and decision-makers; and

**WHEREAS**, in May 2022, in conjunction with the release of the inaugural Equity Fund Report, Cook County brought forth and approved a resolution detailing the Equity Fund's first installment spending plan for the initial \$50M which was allocated to the fund as part of the FY22 budget; and

**WHEREAS**, Equity in Grantmaking/Capacity Building was established as a priority area and confirmed by the board via Resolution #22-2779 "Program Allocation for Budgeted FY 2022 Equity and Inclusion Special Purpose Funds"; and

**WHEREAS**, the Bureau of Economic Development and Office of the President were designated as program leads for Equity in Grantmaking/Capacity Building Grant Resolution #22-2779; and

WHEREAS, the Office of the President convened Cook County agencies including, but not limited to, the Justice Advisory Council, Bureau of Economic Development, Office of the Chief Procurement Officer, Department of Transportation and Highways, Cook County Health, Cook County Department of Public Health, and the Department of Environment and Sustainability as the Equity in Grantmaking Workgroup; and

**WHEREAS**, the Equity in Grantmaking Workgroup recommended \$5 million of first round funding for a Cook County Starting Block Grant initiative, consisting of \$4 million from the Equity Fund and \$1 million from the Justice Advisory Council Violence Prevention Capacity Building portfolio; and

**WHEREAS**, the Justice Advisory Council, given their existing grant infrastructure and expertise in grant-making, was designated as the lead agency for administration of the Starting Block Grants; and

**WHEREAS**, the goal of the Starting Block Grants is to support capacity building for small to medium sized community-based organizations looking to develop their infrastructure to promote organizational health, growth and stability; and

**WHEREAS**, the Starting Block Grants further the work of the Equity Fund by partnering with, funding, and building the capacity of community organizations working to promote the health, safety, and success of residents in high vulnerability communities; and

**WHEREAS**, the capacity building efforts are structured by seven key themes of non-profit capacity described in Learning for Action's Point the Way report; and

WHEREAS, the seven key themes for non-profit capacity are:

1) <u>Vision and Impact Models</u>, for which the organization will be working to build a clear and detailed description of the impact the organization is trying to create, mapped to organizational activities (e.g., Theory of Change);

- 2) <u>Governance and Leadership</u>, for which the organization will be working to ensure board staff and leadership have the skills needed to work effectively together in service of the organization's mission:
- 3) <u>Program Delivery</u>, for which the organization will be working to build capacity for staff, technology, facilities, and other capabilities needed to deliver programs;
- 4) <u>Resource Generation</u>, for which the organization will work to build a strong funding model and the capability to secure resources over time,
- 5) <u>Internal Operations and Management</u>, for which the organization will work to build capacity for technical functions, including IT, financial management. Communications, human resources management, and strategic planning;
- 6) <u>Evaluation and Learning</u>, for which the organization will acquire, develop, or enhance existing tools, processes and culture that support continuous improvement; and
- 7) <u>Strategic Relationships</u>, for which the organization will build their ability to nurture and maintain the external relationships necessary for success; and

**WHEREAS**, Starting Block Grant applicants identified areas within their organization in need of capacity building, as aligned with at least one of these seven key themes; and

**WHEREAS**, the JAC received 365 applications organizations headquartered across 16 of 17 Cook County commissioner districts, across more than 10 service sectors; and

**WHEREAS**, 326 applications passed technical review, 148 of which went on to be unanimously for funding; and

**WHEREAS,** in December 2023, the Cook County Board of Commissioners approved Resolution No. 23-0331 Starting Block Grants 2023 totaling \$4,983,029.13.

**WHEREAS**, Resolution 23-0331 marked the first round of Starting Block Grant awards, and was approved to support 51 top-scoring applicants with no more than \$100,000 over two years; and

**WHEREAS**, this resolution, Resolution No. 24 - 0593 seeks County Board approval for a second round of funding, totaling \$2,958,555.37; and

**WHEREAS**, the next 31 top-scoring applicants shall be awarded no more than \$100,000 over two years; and

**WHEREAS**, these selected organizations serve 143 geographic areas across Cook County, representing all 17 Cook County Districts and 17 different service sectors; and

WHEREAS, the primary service sectors for the selected awardees include the following: Violence

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Prevention (Including Youth development and community-based violence intervention strategies), Human Services, Human Rights, Housing, Health, Education, Community and Economic Development, Arts and Culture, Social and Community Context, Workers Rights, Social Justice Activism and Awareness, Mentorship, Workforce Development, Legal Assistance, Reentry, Youth Development, and Family Support Services; and

**WHEREAS**, the total amount of funding allocated to support community-based organizations through Resolutions 23-0331 and 24-0593 is \$7,941,584.50;

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that the Cook County Board of Commissioners authorizes the Justice Advisory Council to make the following Starting Block Grant awards, to be funded in part, through the previously approved Equity in Grantmaking funding allocation of \$15M:

- 1. <u>Chicago Lawndale Amachi Mentoring Program (LAMP)</u> is an education, human services, and violence prevention organization providing services in North Lawndale. LAMP is being awarded \$100,000 to develop and strengthen their governance and leadership and program delivery.
- 2. <u>Junior League of Chicago</u> is a community and economic development, education, and violence prevention organization providing services in Bridgeport, Lake View, Logan Square, Lower West Side (Pilsen), Uptown, Ravenswood, and Westside. Junior League of Chicago is being awarded \$69,838 to develop and strengthen their governance and leadership and program delivery.
- 3. <u>LatinX Digital Leaders Now</u> is a community and economic development and education organization providing services in Archer Heights, Berwyn, East Garfield Park, Garfield Ridge, McKinley Park, and Summit. LatinX Digital Leaders Now is being awarded \$100,000 to develop and strengthen their resource generation and strategic relationships.
- **4.** <u>Minds Matter Chicago</u> is an education organization providing services in Albany Park, Cicero, Kenwood, Lower West Side (Pilsen), and Near West Side. Minds Matter Chicago is being awarded \$100,000 to develop and strengthen their governance and leadership and program delivery.
- 5. <u>BA NIA Incorporated</u> is a community and economic development, education, and health organization providing services in Auburn Gresham, Calumet Park, Chatham, Englewood, Greater Grand Crossing, Near South Side, Roseland, Sauk Village, South Chicago, South Shore, Washington Park, West Englewood, and Woodlawn. BA NIA Incorporated is being awarded \$100,000 to develop and strengthen their governance and leadership and resource generation.

**WHEREAS**, on June 24, 2021, the Cook County American Rescue Plan Act Framework (the "ARPA Framework") was presented to the Cook County Board of Commissioners; and

**WHEREAS**, the Cook County Board of Commissioners via Resolution 21-3654 accepted the ARPA federal award allocated to Cook County to assist the County in its recovery from the economic and health effects of COVID-19 in the amount of approximately \$1,000,372,385.00; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 21-3654 further authorized the Cook County Budget Director and Comptroller to create and implement a Special Purpose Fund for the ARPA award and other accounting measures to track the acceptance and spending of the federal award; and

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**WHEREAS,** the Cook County Board of Commissioners authorized the Chief Financial Officer, Budget Director, Chief Procurement Officer and applicable using agencies to issue grants, contracts and agreements for ARPA programs approved via Resolutions 22-3657 and 22-0637; and

**WHEREAS**, to further the Policy Roadmap Goal, the Cook County Department of Public Health has developed a menu of Healthy Community programs and initiatives which have undergone review and approval through the Project Management Office process to utilize ARPA funding for such programs and initiatives pursuant to the issuance of grants, contracts, and agreements; and

**WHEREAS,** Resolutions 21-3657 and 22-0637 provided that any grants issued regarding ARPA programs in an amount over \$1M shall require the approval of the Cook County Board of Commissioners; and

**WHEREAS,** Resolution 23-1918 authorized Cook County Health and Cook County Department of Public Health to enter into a Subrecipient Agreement with Family Guidance Centers and Proactive Community Services.

The County's HOME loan will be in a subordinate second position during the construction term (estimated 24-month) springing to a first position permanent loan (40-year term). The loan will be interest-free during construction with no payment obligations then will bear interest at a rate of 1.00% and will be fully amortized over the 40-year permanent loan term. The County's \$2,500,000 HOME loan of \$2,500,000 (\$59,524 per unit) is 13.4% of the \$18.7MM total development cost (\$445,032 per unit).

Turnstone Development Corp. (Turnstone), a not-for-profit, repeat Cook County borrower will develop Hillside Senior Apartments (through its single-purpose entity, Turnstone Hillside Senior Apartments LP). The Project will contain 42 units of affordable rental housing for seniors in a single, five-story elevator building. Turnstone will offer tenant services aimed at ensuring independence of the senior residents such as agency referrals, recreational and social activities, access to counseling services, and literacy and educational services (services coordinated through outside agencies in Turnstone's existing network).

The investment meets the established goals within the Consolidated Plan by offering tenant services and investing in defined areas of housing need including affordable seniors housing. 100% of Project units will be affordable to households earning between 30% and 60% of AMI with 18 units supported by project-based vouchers through the Housing Authority of Cook County (HACC).

**WHEREAS,** In 1835 the area that was to become Berkeley was home to farmers, most of German and Dutch Ancestry; and

WHEREAS, In 1836 St. Charles Road, a stretch of roadway from St. Charles to Chicago, was built; and

**WHEREAS,** In 1845 Peter Bohlander donated land at the southeast corner of St. Charles Road and Taft Avenue for the purpose of burying family, friends and neighbors, and is now known as Old Settler's Cemetery; and

**WHEREAS,** A small group of farm families established a one-room school called Sunnyside in 1848. Now housed in a larger and newer building, Sunnyside Elementary School still operates today; and

**WHEREAS,** The 1902 completion of the Chicago, Aurora & Elgin Railroad gave the area its first passenger rail service at a stop called Berkeley; and

WHEREAS, The first subdivided plots of land for residential building were advertised for sale in 1908; and

WHEREAS, Residential construction brought new residents, many of whom were English, to the area; and

WHEREAS, Berkeley residents chose to incorporate their community of about 800 citizens by one vote, despite fierce opposition from residents living east of Hillside Avenue, becoming official on May 20, 1924; and

WHEREAS, The village population tripled between 1950 and 1960; and

**WHEREAS,** The Chicago, Aurora & Elgin Railway ceased passenger service in 1957, however, its route through the village remains as the "Illinois Prairie Path" multi- use nature trail; and

**WHEREAS,** The picturesque Illinois Prairie Path goes right through Berkeley for those who enjoy hiking or biking; and

**WHEREAS,** Berkeley's land purchase from the railroad in the 1960s extended its northern boundary, allowing for the addition of a small industrial park; and

#### ACKNOWLEDGING LUPUS AWARENESS MONTH

**WHEREAS,** in 1851 Lupus was defined as an autoimmune disease. Documented research leads to the advancement of the understanding and diagnosis of lupus as an autoimmune disease. There is no known cause of lupus; and

WHEREAS, women ages 15 to 44 of certain racial or ethnic groups including people who are African American, Asian American, Hispanic/Latino, Native American, or Pacific Islander People who have a family member with lupus or another autoimmune disease are gravely impacted; and

**WHEREAS,** this inflammatory disease is caused when the immune system attacks its own tissues and affects the overall well-being of the person in many ways. It also impacts the physical, emotional, and economic aspects of a person's life; and

**WHEREAS,** the history of lupus, although dating back at least to the Middle Ages, has experienced an explosion in this century, especially during the modern era over the past 60 years. It is hoped that this growth of new knowledge will allow a better understanding of immunopathogenesis of the disease and the development of more effective treatments; and

WHEREAS, over the last decade or so, there have been significant advances in the understanding of the genetic basis of lupus, and of the immunological derangements which lead to the clinical manifestations of the disease; and

**WHEREAS,** advances have been made in the assessment of the impact of the disease in general, and in minority population groups, in particular and efforts are being made towards defining lupus biomarkers which may help both to predict disease outcome and to guide treatments; and

**WHEREAS**, during the month of May the lupus community join together annually to raise awareness of the physical, emotional and economic impact of lupus, while raising funds to support lupus research, care, support services, and educational resources and programs; and

WHEREAS, purple is a combination of red and blue - the color red represents passion/motivation, and the color blue evokes a sense of calmness. Thus, purple is the color for lupus as it is the perfect blend of colors that represent the characteristics required to fight lupus. A purple butterfly is also the symbol for lupus; and

**WHEREAS,** Ms. Patricia Ann Betts had a very strong faith in God and shared a special bond with her family and friends. She cared deeply for people and expressed and immerse willingness to care for others; and

**WHEREAS,** Rev. Walter "Slim" Coleman and Kathy Archibald worked together to establish the People's Information Center in Lincoln Park. This center collaborated with the Black Panther Party and the Young Lords activist group, led by the well-known activist Jose "Cha Cha" Jimenez; and

**WHEREAS,** Rev. Walter "Slim" Coleman collaborated with Fred Hampton to establish the Rainbow Coalition in Chicago. The Coalition was a combination of the Illinois Black Panther Party, the Young Lords, and the Young Patriots Organization. The Young Patriots Organization was a leftist organization primarily comprised of white migrants from Appalachia and was based in Uptown; and

**WHEREAS,** as a community organizer in the Uptown neighborhood in the 1970's, Rev. Walter "Slim" Coleman organized the International Survival Committee - an auxiliary to the Black Panther Party - along with future Chicago Alderwoman Helen Shiller; and

WHEREAS, the Committee later became known as the Heart of Uptown Coalition, a political and social service organization focused on needs such as access to affordable housing, medical care, legal aid; and WHEREAS, Rev. Walter "Slim" Coleman played a significant role in Harold Washington's successful campaign to become Chicago's first Black mayor in 1983, particularly in the crucial voter registration effort; and

**WHEREAS**, in the late 1980's and early 1990's, Rev. Walter "Slim" Coleman split his work between Uptown and West Town/Bucktown communities with a focus on serving the needs of immigrants; and

#### HONORING MAY AS ASIAN AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH

WHEREAS, the month of May is recognized as Asian American Heritage Month; and

**WHEREAS,** there were approximately 409,000 Asian Americans in Cook County representing 7.7% of the County's population in 2020, and Asian Americans experienced a 28.2% population increase, the highest minority population growth rate in Cook County, between 2010 and 2020, according to the U.S. Census Bureau; and

**WHEREAS**, Asian Americans come from over 40 countries across East Asia, Southeast Asia, Pacific Islands, and South Asia, speaking 2,300 languages and dialects, and a myriad of religions; and

**WHEREAS**, The American story would not be possible without the strength, contributions, and legacies of Asian Americans who have helped build and unite this country in each successive generation from connecting the East to the West, farming fields, starting businesses, caring for our loved ones and honorably serving our Nation in uniform; and

**WHEREAS,** anti-Asian policies, from exclusionary immigration policies to the internment of Japanese Americans during World War II, have been prevalent throughout the history of this country; and

WHEREAS, the recent rise in anti-Asian hate have caused great pain and fear; and

**WHEREAS,** Asian American representation in elected office across Illinois has grown exponentially in the last decade bringing greater participation and visibility for Asian Americans in government; and

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**WHEREAS,** the Illinois General Assembly, led by the Asian American Caucus, passed the Teaching Asian American Community History (TEAACH) Act in 2021, making Illinois the first state in the nation to require a unit of Asian American history in all public schools.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that we, the Cook County Board of Commissioners, do hereby recognize May as Asian American Heritage Month, celebrate the vast contributions of and recognize the struggles endured by Asian Americans, and recommit to the struggle for Asian American equity.

# PROPOSED RESOLUTION REQUESTING A PUBLIC HEARING OF THE HUMAN RELATIONS COMMITTEE TO ADDRESS THE TRAFFICKING AND SEXUAL EXPLOITATION OF MEN AND BOYS IN COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS

**WHEREAS**, in the U.S. Department of State's fact sheet on 'Understanding Human Trafficking', it identifies "trafficking in persons" and "human trafficking" as umbrella terms-often used interchangeably-to refer to a crime whereby traffickers exploit and profit at the expense of adults or children by compelling them to perform labor or engage in commercial sex; and

**WHEREAS**, in that same fact sheet, the U.S. Department of State further identifies that both labor and sex trafficking entail the use of force, fraud, or coercion that exploits the labor or services of another person or to compel their engagement in a commercial sex act; and

**WHEREAS**, under Illinois statute, 720 ILCS 5/10-9 , trafficking is defined as (1) the recruitment, enticement, harboring, transport, provision, or obtainment by any means, or attempts to recruit, entice, harbor, transport, provide, or obtain by any means, another person, intending or knowing that the person will be subjected to involuntary servitude, or (2) the benefiting, financially or by receiving anything of value, from participation in a venture that has engaged in an act of involuntary servitude or involuntary sexual servitude of a minor; and

WHEREAS, the statute goes on to define that a company commits trafficking in persons when the company knowingly benefits, financially or by receiving anything of value, from participation in a venture that has engaged in an act of involuntary servitude or involuntary sexual servitude of a minor; and WHEREAS, based on these definitions, it bears emphasizing that adult consensual sex work is not trafficking; and

**WHEREAS**, according to the United Nations Office of Drugs & Crime Global Report on Trafficking Persons (2022), the majority of human trafficking occurs outside of sex trafficking - with sex trafficking making up 39% whilst the other 61% encompasses human trafficking that occurs in other industries, fish & farming, domestic, cleaning, hospitality, and other purposes; and

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**WHEREAS**, the Cook County Board reaffirms that trafficking in persons and sexual exploitation are crimes, grave violations of human rights, and public health issues that affect individuals across gender, sex, age, and nationality, with a significant yet underrecognized impact on men and boys; and

**WHEREAS**, the National Human Trafficking Hotline has described Chicago, Cook County's largest city, as having a robust sex trade, a claim that is further supported by the following: a recent Department of Justice (DOJ) study estimated that 3,303 young adults ages 18-24 are engaged in the sex trade in the city; and

**WHEREAS**, this data parallels informed estimates from the Chicago Coalition for the Homeless that Chicago has 15,744 homeless youth ages 14-24, a quarter (27.5%) of whom have likely sold sex to survive, with 60% of Chicago's homeless youth identifying as male; and

**WHEREAS**, a conservative estimate places nearly 2,500 male-identified individuals as having sold sex in Chicago, for whom there are virtually no gender-specific services available; and

**WHEREAS**, an additional study exploring the relative participation of male- to female-identified victims found that 36% of youth (14-24) engaged in the sex trade are male; and

**WHEREAS**, societal misunderstandings, stereotypes, and stigma around victimhood lead to a lack of identification of men and boys as victims and survivors of human trafficking and sexual exploitation from those from whom they seek help, including law enforcement, healthcare providers, and social services, and handicaps prevention by parents who are significantly less likely to use filtering software on their son's computers versus their daughter's; and

WHEREAS, the current landscape of support services and resources for male-identified victims of human trafficking and sexual exploitation, including only one residential program for males in the nation and a small minority of social service agencies nationally and locally who are willing to serve males, is significantly lacking in provisions for male-identified victims, including contributing to their further marginalization and suffering; and

**WHEREAS**, the Cook County Board acknowledges the necessity of a comprehensive, inclusive, and intersectional approach to combat human trafficking and sexual exploitation, which includes addressing the specific needs of male-identified victims.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that the Cook County Board hereby commits to the following actions to address trafficking in persons and sexual exploitation of men and boys in Cook County, Illinois: and

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that we, the Cook County Board of Commissioners request a convening of the Cook County Human Relations Committee to conduct a hearing; and

1. Establish a task force or a subcommittee within the current Cook County Human Trafficking Task Force: Create a dedicated task force or a subcommittee within the current Cook County Human Trafficking Task Force to encourage effective cooperation and coordination of efforts in partnership

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with other anti-trafficking advocates such as law enforcement, social-service agencies, healthcare providers, nonprofit organizations, and survivor advocacy groups to combat trafficking in persons and exploitation of men and boys in Cook County.

- 2. Develop Specialized Support Services: Allocate funding and resources to develop and implement specialized support services for male victims and survivors of trafficking in persons and exploitation, including safe housing, medical care, psychological support, legal assistance, job training, and more.
- 3. Raise Awareness and Training: Launch public awareness campaigns to shed light on male victimhood, including the social, economic, cultural, and political factors that make men and boys vulnerable to trafficking in persons and sexual exploitation. These factors include, but are not limited to, poverty, unemployment, inequality, sexual violence, gender discrimination, social exclusion, and marginalization, as well as the social and cultural bias around males. Additionally, develop comprehensive training programs for law enforcement, healthcare providers, educators, and social-service personnel to identify male or male-identified victims among vulnerable populations through appropriate, inclusive, and nondiscriminatory measures.
- 4. Promote Research and Data Collection: Encourage and support research initiatives to gather data on the trafficking and exploitation of men and boys to better understand their needs and improve the effectiveness of interventions and support services. Conduct research and collect suitable disaggregated data to enable proper analysis of the nature and extent of trafficking in persons for men and boys specifically.
- 5. Engage Community and Survivor Voices: Foster strong partnerships with community organizations and ensure the meaningful involvement of survivors in shaping policies, services, and awareness efforts to ensure that interventions are survivor-informed and culturally sensitive.
- 6. Advocate for Policy Changes: Advocate for changes in local, state, and federal policies to recognize the needs of male victims of trafficking in persons and sexual exploitation and to ensure that laws and regulations are inclusive and supportive of all victims, regardless of gender.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that the Cook County Board shall review the progress of these initiatives annually and adjust as necessary to ensure that Cook County is a leading example of comprehensive and inclusive support for all victims of trafficking in persons and sexual exploitation. That a suitable copy of this resolution be spread upon the official proceedings of this Honorable Body this 29th day of February 2024.

#### PROPOSED RESOLUTION

# CALLING FOR A HEARING OF THE HEALTH AND HOSPITALS COMMITTEE TO RECEIVE AN UPDATE ON MATERNAL HEALTH MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY RATES IN COOK COUNTY

**WHEREAS**, each year in the U.S., hundreds of women die from complications related to pregnancy and childbirth, known as maternal death, at a rate many times greater than in other developed nations; and

WHEREAS, maternal death/mortality is defined by the World Health Organization (WHO) as "the death of a woman while pregnant or within 42 days of termination of pregnancy, irrespective of the duration and the site of the pregnancy, from any cause related to or aggravated by the pregnancy or its management, but not from accidental or incidental causes, and maternal morbidity as "any health condition attributed to and/or complicating pregnancy, and childbirth that has a negative impact on the woman's well-being and/or functioning"; and

WHEREAS, Health and Human Services officials and stakeholders stated that the pandemic worsened factors contributing to maternal health disparities, like access to care, cardiovascular problems and other underlying conditions, which contributed to a 78% rise in maternal mortality rates in the U.S. between 2000-2020 according to the WHO; and

WHEREAS, CDC data shows that maternal deaths increased during the COVID-19 pandemic and COVID-19 was a contributing factor in one quarter of all maternal deaths in 2020 and 2021 combined, and although the pandemic has been substantially brought under control, there will continue to be ramifications for maternal health outcomes into the future; and

**WHEREAS,** in 2021, the U.S. had one of the worst rates of maternal mortality in the country's history going back to 1965. 1,205 people died of maternal causes in the U.S. in 2021, which represents a 40% increase from the previous year, and the U.S. rate for 2021 was 32.9 maternal deaths per 100,000 live births, which is more than ten times the estimated rates of some other high-income countries, including Australia, Austria, Israel, Japan and Spain which all reported between 2 and 3 deaths per 100,000 in 2020; and

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WHEREAS, according to the CDC, cardiovascular conditions such as pulmonary embolisms, uncontrolled bleeding and problems emanating from hypertension are the leading cause of pregnancy-related deaths in the U.S. and sadly most, up to 91%, of maternal deaths due to clinical, system, social, community or patient factors are preventable, as the health-care solutions to prevent or manage complications are well known, and more than half of pregnancy-related deaths occur more than 60 days postpartum; and

**WHEREAS,** the maternal death rate for Black or African American women was 44.0 per 100,000 live births in 2019, then increased to 55.3 in 2020, and 68.9 in 2021. In contrast, White (not Hispanic or Latina) women had death rates of 17.9, 19.1, and 26.1, respectively; and

WHEREAS, the maternal death rate for Hispanic or Latina women was lower 12.6 per 100,000 live births compared with White (not Hispanic or Latina) women 17.9 in 2019, but increased significantly during the pandemic in 2020 to 18.2 and in 2021 to 27.5 per 100 live births; and

**WHEREAS,** in Illinois, 43% of women who died while pregnant or within one year of pregnancy died from a cause related to pregnancy, and the leading cause of pregnancy-related death was substance use disorder, which comprised 32% of pregnancy-related deaths and the other 68% most common causes of pregnancy-related death were cardiac and coronary conditions, pre-existing chronic medical conditions, sepsis, mental health conditions, and embolism; and

**WHEREAS,** for mental health conditions and substance use disorders, all racial/ethnic groups had similar pregnancy related mortality ratios, but for medical causes of death, Black women had a pregnancy-related mortality ratio nearly three times that of White women; and

**WHEREAS,** disparities in other adverse maternal outcomes, such as preterm and low birthweight births and severe maternal morbidity, which represents a group of potentially life-threatening unexpected maternal conditions or complications that occur during labor and delivery that may cause long-lasting health problems that extend beyond the pregnancy, persisted for Black or African American women; and

WHEREAS, according to the 2022 Illinois Task Force on Infant and Maternal Mortality Among African Americans report, the crisis of non-Hispanic Black/African American infant and maternal mortality and morbidity in states, especially Illinois, mirrors the larger trends seen across the country. Non-Hispanic Black/African American women in Illinois are about three times as likely to experience a pregnancy-related death as White and Hispanic women, and Non-Hispanic Black/African American women also have the highest severe maternal morbidity (SMM) rate at 132.4 per 10,000 live births, more than two times the rate of non-Hispanic White women and significantly higher than Asian and Hispanic women; and

**WHEREAS,** overall, women in Illinois with no prenatal care had a severe maternal morbidity rate that was nearly three times that of women with adequate prenatal care; and

**WHEREAS,** these dreadful numbers motivated Commissioner Donna Miller to call for the 1<sup>st</sup> maternal health public hearing of the Cook County Board of Commissioners' Health and Hospitals Committee to address this crisis, which occurred in June of 2023; and

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**WHEREAS,** this impactful hearing, led Commissioner Miller to work with the leadership at Cook County Health (CCH) to secure \$1 million in the 2024 budget to create the 1<sup>st</sup> Doula program at CCH; and

**WHEREAS,** Doula services not only are shown to improve maternal health outcomes, but are a way of reducing costs associated with maternal mortality and morbidity due to less dependence on pain medication; shorter duration of labor, less time in the hospital; fewer operative deliveries, such as C-section episiotomy; higher APGAR (newborn) scores; decreased infant mortality; and decreased maternal mortality; and

**WHEREAS,** Commissioner Miller also sponsored a National Association of Counties (NACo) policy resolution at the February 2024 Legislative Conference that urges the Federal Government and Congress to assist counties by providing funding for increased doula services and training to ameliorate maternal health outcomes for all women and address racial disparities in maternal health, mortality, and morbidity; and

WHEREAS, Cook County Health (CCH) and the Cook County Department of Public Health (CCDPH) have been actively studying and trying to improve maternal morbidity and mortality rates and the health disparities that contribute to adverse pregnancy outcomes, including the above-mentioned doula care program, which is in the process of being created; and

WHEREAS, a meeting of the Health & Hospitals Committee, one year after the initial maternal health hearing, is the ideal platform to bring together stakeholders from CCH, CCDPH, CountyCare and other healthcare providers to receive an update on the data, and to learn about solutions being implemented to improve maternal morbidity and mortality rates in Cook County and beyond.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that the Cook County Board of Commissioners does hereby request a public hearing of the Health and Hospitals Committee be held to bring together key maternal health stakeholders in order to fully understand the factors leading to high maternal morbidity and mortality rates; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that representatives from Cook County Health, the Cook County Department of Public Health, CountyCare, the Illinois Department of Public Health, outside healthcare providers and any other pertinent stakeholder representatives are requested to appear before the Health & Hospitals Committee and be prepared to give an overview to the committee and answer questions related to maternal health overall as well as disparities in maternal morbidity and mortality rates in Cook County and Illinois; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that each stakeholder be prepared to provide the most up to date data on such rates and the factors that have contributed to them; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that each stakeholder be prepared to provide short and long-term recommendations to prevent pregnancy related deaths and improve maternal morbidity and mortality rates in Cook County and Illinois including initiatives that have been implemented or are in the process of being implemented.

#### AMENDMENT TO COUNTY TAXPAYERS' INTEREST ASSURANCE ORDINANCE

**BE IT ORDAINED,** by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 34 Finance, Article I Generally, Section Number 34-4 of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as follows:

#### Sec. 34-4. Investment of public funds.

- (a) This section shall be known and may be cited as the "Cook County Taxpayers' Interest Assurance Ordinance".
- (b) All elected and appointed public officials of Cook County are directed to invest public funds in their possession or for which they are custodians in interest-bearing accounts, except where prohibited by law or for which compelling economic reasons do not justify the use of an interest-bearing account. If any public funds are not invested in an interest-bearing account, the elected or appointed public official shall certify in writing to the Chief Financial Officer and the County Auditor the reason that such funds have not been invested in an interest-bearing account. The Chief Financial Officer and the County Auditor will forward to the President of the County Board who, in turn, will forward to the Chairman of the Audit Committee the correspondence received from the elected or appointed officials indicating why public funds have not been invested in an interest-bearing account. On an annual basis, the Chief Financial Officer shall report to the Audit Committee a listing of all depository accounts including the

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department number, department name, name of account, depository institution, account number, account balance, average daily balance, authorized signers, interest rate and any explanation or certification for any noninterest-bearing accounts.

- (c) The County Auditor shall report to the County Board as part of an annual audit of the accounts of each elected and appointed public official:
  - (1) The nature and amount of all funds for which such certifications have been received from elected or appointed public officials;
  - (2) The rates of return received by elected and appointed public officials on invested funds; and
  - (3) The average daily balance in the interest-bearing account in order to provide a benchmark against which to evaluate the rate of return the elected and appointed officials are earning on the funds.
- (d) Any public funds in the possession or custody of an elected or appointed public official may be invested in any financial institution approved from time to time by the County Board as a depository of public funds. The minimum requirements for any financial institution to be an approved depository for County funds shall include:
  - (1) Minimum capital requirement of \$10,000,000.00;
  - (2) The institution must have been in operation for at least five years;
  - (3) Located in Cook County, and
  - (4) Meet regulatory requirement of the Community Reinvestment Act and not engage in predatory lending practices.

No elected or appointed public official shall open any new account in an approved depository without reporting the opening of such account to the County Auditor and the Chief Financial Officer of the County within seven days of the opening of such account.

- (e) Any elected or appointed public official who invests any public funds in any approved depository which are in excess of the insured limits of such depository shall require that such depository provide at least 102 percent collateral or provide a surety bond in an amount of 102 percent on any funds in excess of the insured limit of such depository, except as provided in Subsection (f) of this section.
- (f) The Cook County Treasurer is authorized to make use of the Illinois Public Treasurer's Investment Pool (IPTIP), pursuant to 30 ILCS 235/2(e) (1992), to on a limited basis facilitate wire transfers of funds due and owing to Cook County payable by the State of Illinois. Such funds, as they become due to Cook County, may be invested by the Cook County Treasurer in the IPTIP for a period of time not to exceed ten calendar days at which point the funds must be transferred to the County and recognized as revenue in the County's financial records. Once such funds are recognized as revenue in the Cook County's financial records, the funds are eligible to be reinvested by the Cook County Treasurer's Office into a separate account registered with IPTIP for investment purposes. The collateral

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requirement on County funds invested by the County Treasurer in the IPTIP shall not be less than 102 percent.

Whenever a public agency deposits any public funds in a financial institution, the public agency shall enter into an agreement with the financial institution requiring any funds not insured by the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation to be collateralized by securities, a letter of credit or mortgage backed securities in an amount equal to at least 102 percent of the market value of that amount of funds deposited exceeding the insurance limitation provided by the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation. The letter of credit must be issued by a financial institution that is rated "A" or better by at least two of the following rating agencies: Fitch, Moody's and Standard & Poor's. Mortgage-backed securities used as collateral must be guaranteed by the Federal Home Loan Bank system, the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation or the Federal National Mortgage Association.

- (g) Except as provided in Subsection (f) of this section, Cook County funds placed in the IPTIP shall be invested in the same manner, in the same types of investments and subject to the same limitations provided for the investment of funds in the State Treasury.
- (h) The Cook County Treasurer, the Chief Financial Officer of Cook County and the County Comptroller are authorized to execute on behalf of Cook County, an "Application and Agreement to Participate in the Illinois Public Treasurer's Investment Pool", the terms of which shall not be inconsistent with this section.
- (i) As used in this section, the term "public funds" shall mean current operating funds, special funds, interest and sinking funds, and funds of any kind or character belonging to or in the custody of any elected or appointed public official. The County Board may supersede the provisions of this section should the authorizing ordinance specify the permitted investments and with respect to similar funds held in a fiduciary capacity pursuant to statute or specific ordinance.

**Effective date:** This ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.

**WHEREAS,** on March 11, 2021, the federal government authorized the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 ("ARPA") which includes \$1.9 trillion in federal stimulus funds to hasten the United States' recovery from the economic and health effects caused by the COVID-19 pandemic; and

**WHEREAS,** specifically, the federal government has authorized and allocated a federal award of approximately \$1,000,372,385B of ARPA funding to Cook County to assist the County in its recovery from the economic and health effects of COVID-19; and

**WHEREAS,** on June 24, 2021, the Cook County American Rescue Plan Act Framework (the "ARPA Framework") was presented to the Cook County Board of Commissioners; and

**WHEREAS** the Cook County Board of Commissioners via Resolution 21-3654 accepted the ARPA federal award allocated to Cook County to assist the County in its recovery from the economic and health effects of COVID-19 in the amount of approximately \$1,000,372,385.00; and

**WHEREAS** Resolution 21-3654 further authorized the Cook County Budget Director and Comptroller to create and implement a Special Purpose Fund for the ARPA award and other accounting measures to track the acceptance and spending of the federal award; and

**WHEREAS,** the Cook County Board of Commissioners authorized the Chief Financial Officer, Budget Director, Chief Procurement Officer and applicable using agencies to issue grants, contracts and agreements for ARPA programs approved via Resolutions 22-3657 and 22-0637; and

**WHEREAS**, to further the Policy Roadmap Goals, the Bureau of Economic Development (BED) developed a menu of Vital Community programs and initiatives which received approval through the

Project Management Office process to utilize ARPA funding for such programs and initiatives pursuant; and

**WHEREAS** Resolutions 22-3657 and 22-0637 provided that any grants issued regarding ARPA programs in an amount over \$1M shall require the approval of the Cook County Board of Commissioners; and

**WHEREAS** Cook County Bureau of Economic Development seeks to advance industry-sector strategies to build vibrant, sustainable and inclusive communities where people want to live, learn, work and play; and

**WHEREAS**, the Cook County Policy Roadmap includes a key objective under Vital Communities to "Invest in economic sectors with good jobs and positive economic, environmental and social impact"; and

**WHEREAS**, the Cook County arts sector is an essential driver of community vibrancy and livability that continues to experience increased operating costs, audience loss and decreased revenue; and

WHEREAS, to advance the above the Bureau of Economic Development established the Cook County Arts (NT830) as an initiative to support artists and arts organizations with grants, engage with municipalities to promote arts investments and explore strategies for Cook County to support arts sector beyond ARPA; and

**WHEREAS,** Resolution 22-4414 authorized the Bureau of Economic Development to enter into a Sub-recipient Agreement with the Arts Alliance Illinois in an aggregate amount of up to \$5,000,000 to encourage investment in the arts and promote economic recovery in this hard-hit sector in suburban Cook County; and

WHEREAS, Arts Alliance Illinois and the Bureau of Economic Development have mutually agreed to a modified scope of work and reduction of the allocated funding totaling up to \$1.8 million to focus on distribution of relief grants to suburban Cook nonprofit arts organizations, conduct an analysis of the suburban Cook arts landscape and assist the County identify opportunities to further support integration of the arts into the county's programs and policies, with the intention of supporting the sector's long-term vitality and growth; and

WHEREAS, to ensure expediency in the effective implementation of the Cook County Arts' objectives, Cook County seeks to enter into a Subrecipient Agreement with LISC Chicago ("LISC") for up to \$2.0 million, a regional nonprofit affiliate of the national Local Initiative Support Corporation, to develop an arts-focused creative placemaking initiative in suburban Cook; and

**WHEREAS,** LISC has a track record of building organizational capacity by organizing and engaging stakeholders to further community-driven economic and cultural development.

**WHEREAS,** LISC currently provides grants, loans, technical assistance, and other resources to more than 70 nonprofit partners in low- and moderate-income communities across Chicago and this program

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will expand its footprint into suburban Cook County; and

**WHEREAS**, the initial project scope of the Arts Alliance Illinois included the creation and delivery of training curriculum to foster and support the arts in local communities; and

**WHEREAS**, based upon mutual agreement between the Bureau of Economic Development and the Alliance, and in recognition of LISC's experience in this area, BED will engage LISC to develop initiatives to support the arts, often called creative placemaking projects, provide capacity building to support project development and create the framework to provide implementation grants for said projects in suburban Cook County.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that the Cook County Board of Commissioners does hereby authorize the Bureau Chief of the Bureau of Economic Development to amend the Arts Alliance Illinois' original scope of work and reduce its budget and then enter into a new subrecipient agreement with LISC Chicago for Cook County Arts for up to \$2.0 million through 2026 to provide technical assistance to projects that support the arts in suburban Cook as well as administer, and distribute grants to advance these projects; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that the Cook County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes the Bureau Chief of the Bureau of Economic Development or its designee to modify the agreement and funding amount based upon need, performance, and utilization, subject to annual appropriation by the Board.

WHEREAS, to further the Policy Roadmap Goal to pursue inclusive economic and community growth by supporting residents, growing businesses, attracting investment and nurturing talent, the Bureau of Economic Development (BED) has developed a menu of Vital Community programs and initiatives, including the Cook County Legal Aid for Housing and Debt Program, which have undergone review and approval through the Project Management Office process to utilize ARPA funding for such programs and initiatives pursuant to the issuance of grants, contracts and agreements; and

**WHEREAS,** Resolution 22-0637 provided that any grants issued in regard to ARPA programs in an amount over \$1M shall require the approval of the Cook County Board of Commissioners; and

**WHEREAS**, Resolution 22-2807 authorized the Bureau of Economic Development to enter into a Subrecipient Agreement with the Chicago Bar Foundation in an aggregate amount of up to \$13,929,400 to implement the Cook County Legal Aid for Housing and Debt Program; and

**WHEREAS**, ARPA funding is available within the Cook County Legal Aid for Housing and Debt Program, and the Bureau of Economic Development desires to provide additional funding to the Chicago Bar Foundation to support their implementation of the Cook County Legal Aid for Housing and Debt Program.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that the Cook County Board of Commissioners hereby approves the issuance of the following agreement amendment by the BED, subject to satisfactory performance of the program by the subrecipient and subject to annual appropriation by the Board:

**WHEREAS,** Resolution 23-3116 authorized the Bureau of Economic Development to enter into a Subrecipient Agreement with Elevate Energy in an aggregate amount of up to \$7,820,000 to begin implementation of the Water Affordability Program; of which \$7,500,000 was intended to be provided to CEDA to administer a household water utility assistance program; and

WHEREAS, BED, Elevate Energy and CEDA worked to design the household water utility assistance program and jointly determined that such program would not be feasible and cost-effective to administer, and the funding initially intended for such program will be allocated to Elevate Energy for the programs provided herein; and

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WHEREAS, ARPA funding is available within the Water Affordability Program, and the Bureau of Economic Development desires to provide additional funding to Elevate Energy to support their implementation of the remaining components of the Water Affordability Program which include residential water efficiency efforts; a municipal bulk household debt relief strategy in income-qualified and high water-burdened communities; and a water affordability technical assistance program for municipalities in suburban Cook County; and

**WHEREAS**, the remaining \$8.5 million in BED's Vital Communities Water Affordability Program will be transferred to the Connected (formerly Smart) Communities Pillar to support Build Up Cook water capital projects.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that the Cook County Board of Commissioners hereby approves the issuance of the following agreement amendment by the BED, subject to annual appropriation by the Board:

- 1. Amend the Subrecipient Agreement with Elevate Energy to increase the total funding by \$3,680,000, from the original approved amount of \$7,820,000 to a revised aggregate amount of up to \$11,500,000 to continue their implementation of the Water Affordability Program. Elevate will operate several components of the Water Affordability Program: residential water efficiency efforts, including a leak repair assistance program; a municipal bulk household debt relief strategy in income-qualified and high water-burdened communities that incorporates water affordability best practices; and a water affordability technical assistance program for municipalities in suburban Cook County.
- 2. Under this amendment, BED will implement the municipal bulk household debt relief component with the following requirements for participating municipalities:
  - a. If water service has been disconnected solely due to nonpayment, service is restored immediately.
  - b. If water service is pending disconnection, disconnection efforts will cease while payment to the municipality on behalf of the resident is processed.
  - c. Water service for assisted residents shall be maintained for up to six months from the date the payment is received.
  - d. Proof of customer credits shall be provided by the municipality to Elevate.
  - e. Proof of water supplier payments in an amount greater than or equal to total payments received from the County shall be provided by the municipality to Elevate.
  - f. Participating municipalities will waive late fees and interest charges for residents receiving assistance and Elevate will encourage participating municipalities to extend such waivers to other residents.
  - g. Elevate will seek to pay 80% of residents' debt, with municipality covering the balance, but may adjust this parameter based on municipal feedback.
  - h. Elevate will work with participating municipalities to identify entities/owners that are not acting in good faith to pay water bills for a high number of subject accounts/properties and remove them from the program.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes the

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Chief of the Bureau of Economic Development or its designee to modify the agreements and funding allocations to all BED selected organizations based upon need and utilization.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that funding for the BED ARPA Programs shall be subject to availability of funds from the United States Government and appropriation of funding by the Cook County Board of Commissioners.

# Board of Commissioners A RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF THE COMMUNITY SAFETY THROUGH STABLE HOMES ACT

WHEREAS, according to the Illinois Department of Human Rights (IDHR) report "Fair Housing Implications of Nuisance and Crime-Free Ordinances: A Guide for Units of Local Government", 'crime-free' housing programs are formal partnerships between cities and housing providers that often require housing providers to evict tenants that are deemed connected to crimes; and

**WHEREAS**, the report goes on to note that these crime-free ordinances often require housing providers to deny housing, evict, fine, or penalize tenants for their connection to specific crimes or just "criminal activity" in general, and are often broadly written to prohibit activities such as the act of an arrest or simple calls for police service; and

**WHEREAS**, according to the ACLU of Illinois, these ordinances have been broadly written to apply even when the tenant was the victim of the crime or called the police for protection or assistance; and

**WHEREAS**, Illinois Public Media reports that these types of ordinances, such as one passed in the Village of Rantoul, can allow for the eviction of tenants even when the suspected criminal activity and/or calls for police service pertain to a guest of the tenant(s); and

**WHEREAS**, the IDHR'S report explains that crime-free housing programs often require landlords to evict tenants, utilize strict lease addendums, and conduct criminal background checks on tenants, even when these actions conflict with local human rights ordinances or other fair housing protections; and

WHEREAS, though these ordinances are often passed with the expressed intention of deterring criminal activity on rental properties, the ACLU of Illinois reports these ordinances are disproportionately enforced against Black people and other people of color, that they harm survivors of domestic and sexual violence who seek police protection, individuals with disabilities, and others who need emergency services; and

WHEREAS, the IDHR's report explains that by using the simple act of police contact as a trigger for evictions or other penalties against tenants, these ordinances can introduce the biases of the criminal justice system into the housing market and run the risk of furthering segregation and undermining fair housing responsibilities; and

WHEREAS, the IDHR's report further notes that latent segregated housing patterns often facilitate over-policing so that communities of color are more likely to have repeated interactions with police; and

WHEREAS, the IDHR's report additionally highlights that a higher percentage of racial minorities in Illinois are renters compared to white residents, and as such nuisance and crime-free ordinances may have an unlawful disparate impact; and

**WHEREAS**, the ACLU of Illinois also reports legal problems with these types of ordinances in that they may violate a number of legal protections including due process guarantees, federal and state prohibitions against housing discrimination, and the First Amendment right to petition the government; and

**WHEREAS,** the Shriver Center's 2013 report "The Cost of Being Crime Free" further details how these ordinances can deprive tenants of due process guaranteed by the Fourteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution when municipalities undertake enforcement efforts that expose a tenant to the threat of being displaced from their housing without first giving the tenant notice and an opportunity to dispute the validity of these efforts; and

WHEREAS, according to the Shriver Center's report, more than 100 municipalities in the state of Illinois alone have adopted some version of these types of ordinances, with that number expected to increase; and

**WHEREAS,** though Illinois enacted Public Act 99-441 (Illinois Counties and Municipal Codes) which prohibits the enforcement of these types of 'crime-free' ordinances in situations where police are called relating to issues of domestic and sexual violence or disability, the IDHR's report notes that these types of ordinances run the risk of further discouraging victims of domestic violence from contacting the police in fear of losing their housing; and

**WHEREAS**, in a 2016 guidance report, the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development analyzed the adverse impact that crime-free programs have on survivors of domestic violence and found that incidents of domestic and sexual violence have been considered a nuisance or considered a violation of a crime-free program, making survivors hesitant to contact police or emergency assistance, left facing eviction, and ultimately displaced from communities; and

**WHEREAS**, the Shriver Center's report further discusses how linking law enforcement's activity at a property with the possibility of eviction of the tenants and/or penalties against the landlord, ordinances can actually deter tenants, landlords, and concerned citizens from reaching out to the police for help and/or coming to the aid of crime victims-which only serves to undermine crime reporting and public safety; and

WHEREAS, per its Diversity and Inclusion Statement, Cook County remains dedicated to equity and fairness in governance-in all its forms-to strengthen and serve our communities to the best of our abilities; and

**WHEREAS,** Illinois SB 3680, HB 5314, HB 5432, or The Community Safety Through Stable Homes Act, embodies this mission towards equity across the state by amending the Counties Code and the Illinois Municipal Code to prohibit local governments from requiring landlords to evict a tenant for having contact with police, a criminal conviction, or if another person in the household or guest had contact with police;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that the Cook County Board of Commissioners does hereby declare its support for the Illinois Legislature to pass SB 3680, HB 5314, and HB 5432, or The Community Safety Through Stable Homes Act; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the Governor of Illinois, the Illinois Senate President and Minority Leader, the Illinois House Speaker and Minority Leader, and to the members of the Illinois Housing Committee, Rules Committee, and Assignments

**WHEREAS,** the subminimum wage impacts a Cook County workforce of almost 78,000 tipped workers, 60 percent of whom are women and 46 percent are people of color; and

**WHEREAS**, under the Cook County Minimum Wage Ordinance, the minimum hourly wage for adults over the age of 18 was raised to \$14 for non-tipped workers per hour and \$8.40 for tipped workers per hour on the 1st of January 2024; and

**WHEREAS**, the "two-tiered" subminimum wage system exposes tipped workers to disproportional levels of poverty, financial uncertainty, exploitation of workers under the age of 18, <u>and</u> sexual harassment; and

**WHEREAS,** according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, an estimated 2 million people are working as restaurant servers in the United States, and roughly 70 percent of them are women; and

**WHEREAS,** almost 13 percent of tipped workers are in poverty, compared with approximately 6 percent of non-tipped employees, according to a 2014 joint report by the Economic Policy Institute and the Center on Wage and Employment Dynamics at the University of California, Berkeley; and

WHEREAS, income inequality due to tipped wages disproportionately impacts sole providers and their households, whom are often Black, brown, Indigenous, and women of color and single mothers; and

WHEREAS, in a study conducted by Michael Paarlberg and Teofilo Reyes, between the New York and Pennsylvania workforces along the state's border found that on aggregate, in the year following the tipped-minimum hike, those New York border counties saw workers take-home pay go up an average of 7.4 percent and employment go up 1.3 percent, compared with Pennsylvania border counties, which saw a pay increase of 2.2 percent and a decline in employment of 0.2 percent; and

**WHEREAS,** restaurant sales in states that have implemented One Fair Wage grew by 17 percent, according to 2017-2018 restaurant trade lobby estimates, compared to 15.6 percent in subminimum wage states; and

**WHEREAS,** according to restaurant trade lobby estimates, California, a state that has implemented One Fair Wage, had the highest restaurant sales in 2018 - topping over \$97 billion; and

**WHEREAS,** a Cornell University study titled "A National Study of Human Resource Practices, Turnover, and Customer Service in the Restaurant Industry" found in evaluating 1,100 restaurant employers, employers can cut employee turnover almost in half with higher wages and better benefits due to increased morale and worker productivity; and

WHEREAS, several local and state governments, including Alaska, California, Minnesota, Nevada, Oregon, Washington state, Washington, D.C, and Wisconsin, have passed legislation that mandates that tipped workers be paid at least the same minimum wage as non-tipped employees; and

**WHEREAS,** Chicago recently became the largest city in the United States to independently abolish the subminimum wage for tipped workers with the passage of the One Fair Wage ordinance on October 6, 2023; and

WHEREAS, Illinois State Representative Lisa Hernandez filed House Bill 5345, and Illinois State Senator Lakesia Collins filed Senate Bill 3776 to abolish the subminimum wage for all tipped workers in Illinois, including the subminimum wage for workers under the age of 18; and

WHEREAS, Cook County works to advance economic, racial, and social justice for all people; and

WHEREAS, Cook County believes all workers deserve a living wage.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that President Toni Preckwinkle and the Cook County Board of Commissioners celebrate the passage of the One Fair Wage ordinance in Chicago and call on the Illinois State Legislature and Governor Pritzker to <u>work with all stakeholders to pass a</u> One Fair Wage <u>law</u> and abolish the subminimum wage for tipped workers and <u>for-workers</u> under the age of 18 in Illinois; and

#### SURVIVING SPOUSE TAX ABATEMENTS

**WHEREAS,** on September 5, 2019, the Cook County Board of Commissioners passed the Surviving Spouse Tax Abatement Ordinance which can be found in Section 74-47 of the Cook County Code of Ordinances; and

**WHEREAS,** the Surviving Spouse Tax Abatement permitted the application to the Cook County Board of Review ("Board of Review") for the abatement or rebate of Cook County's portion of property taxes levied on a qualified property for surviving spouses of a fallen police officer, soldier, or rescue worker in accordance with 35 ILCS 200/18-178; and

**WHEREAS,** in accordance with Section 74-47 of the Cook County Code of Ordinances, the Board of Review developed an application process in which surviving spouses of a of a fallen police officer, soldier or rescue worker in accordance with 35 ILCS 200/18-178 could request an abatement or rebate of Cook County's portion of property taxes levied on a qualified property; and

**WHEREAS,** the Board of Review has received applications for property tax abatements or rebates in accordance with Section 74-47 and has reviewed said applications for a surviving spouse tax abatement as set forth in Exhibit A and has determined the following:

- (1) The Board of Review finds that each of the decedents qualifies as a fallen police officer, soldier, or rescue worker who died as a result of or in the course of employment as a police officer; while in the active service of a fire, rescue, or emergency medical service; or while on active duty as a member of the United States Armed Services, including the National Guard, serving in Iraq or Afghanistan;
- (2) The Board of Review finds that each applicant qualifies as a surviving spouse, as each is a spouse, who has not remarried, of a fallen police officer, soldier, or rescue worker;

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(3) The Board of Review finds that each subject property satisfies the requirement of qualified property in that each is used as the principal residence of a surviving spouse and was owned by the fallen police officer, soldier, or rescue worker or surviving spouse at the time of the police officer's, soldier's, or rescue worker's death; was acquired by the surviving spouse within 2 years after the police officer's, soldier's, or rescue worker's death if the surviving spouse was domiciled.

**WHEREAS**, the above findings demonstrate each applicant satisfies Section 74-47 of the Cook County Code and the Board of Review recommends the abatement or rebate of 100% of Cook County's portion of property taxes levied against the residential properties in the approximate dollar amounts set forth in Exhibit A; and

**WHEREAS,** pursuant to Section 74-47(c)(1), the Board of Review also recommends the abatement period shall start from the earliest date permitted under the ordinance, i.e. July 9, 2012, or the decedent's date of death, whichever is later, and continue so long as the applicant continues to satisfy the requirements of Section 74-47.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED,** the Cook County Board of Commissioners has reviewed the recommendations of the Board of Review and orders the abatement or rebate of 100% of Cook County's portion of property taxes levied against the residential properties in the approximate dollar amounts for the time periods addressed and set forth in Exhibit A; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOVLED,** the County Clerk shall provide a certified copy of this ordinance approving the surviving spouse tax abatements/rebates as provided in Exhibit A to all applicable Cook County tax officials in order to process the approved surviving spouse tax abatements/rebates.; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOVLED,** that should the applicable Cook County tax officials determine that a portion of the abatements cannot be made due to the closure of a tax year, the applicable Cook County tax officials shall notify the County's Chief Financial Officer of the portion of the funds that cannot be refunded through abatement and the Chief Financial Officer and County Comptroller shall be authorized to identify an appropriate funding source and rebate any outstanding amount as authorized under this Ordinance.

**WHERAS**, in 1851 Lupus was defined as an autoimmune disease. Documented research leads to the advancement of the understanding and diagnosis of lupus as an autoimmune disease, and;

WHERAS, there is no known cause of lupus and no single test to diagnose the disease, and;

WHERAS, there are 1.5 million people in the United States living with lupus, and;

WHERAS, the history of lupus, although dating back at least to the Middle Ages, has experienced an

explosion in this century, especially during the modern era over the past 60 years, and;

**WHERAS,** women ages 15 to 44 of certain racial or ethnic groups including people who are African American, Asian American, Hispanic/Latino, Native American, or Pacific Islander People who have a family member with lupus or another autoimmune disease are gravely impacted, and;

WHERAS, African-American women are three times more likely to get lupus than White women. African-American and Hispanic women usually get lupus at a younger age and have more severe symptoms, including kidney problems, than women of other groups. African-American women with lupus also have more problems with seizures, strokes, and dangerous swelling of the heart.

**WHERAS**, it is believed that 10-15 percent of people with lupus will die prematurely due to complications of lupus, and;

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WHERAS, it is estimated that there 16,000 new cases per year, and;

**WHERAS,** The Lupus Foundation of American identified 20 investigational drugs in various phases of research to determine their effectiveness in people with lupus, and;

**WHERAS**, nearly 20 percent of people with lupus will have a parent or sibling who already has lupus or may develop lupus, and;

WHERAS, about 5 percent of the children born to individuals with lupus will develop the illness, and;

**WHERAS**, lupus is a disease that strikes predominantly young women in the reproductive years which makes pregnancy both a practical and a research issue, and;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that this resolution be referred to the Health and Hospitals Committee for further discussion on research, statistics, funding opportunities, county-wide awareness, advocacy, medical trials, treatment options, manage care, and other means to reduce the mortality rate of lupus, and;

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that a request for and a public hearing with the Health and Hospitals Committee with healthcare professionals, doctors, scientists, health educators, experts from both Cook County Health and Cook County and Illinois Department of Public Health, local lupus awareness organizations, advocates and those living with lupus to work together to present future legislation.

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Development (Account: 11286.1027.65937.580171.00000.00000), a \$10,000,000.00 initiative geared toward providing development subsidies in the form of a subordinate mortgage to offset the increased development costs due to inflationary pressures, increased labor and material costs, supply line shortages in support of continued housing development for residents requiring supportive services in Cook County; and

WHEREAS, Full Circle Communities, Inc. (through its wholly owned single-purpose entity, Arlington Heights PSH, LLC) proposed the development of a 25-unit affordable housing and permanent supportive housing (PSH) development at 1519 S. Arlington Heights Road in Arlington Heights, a suburb in northwestern Cook County to be known as Arlington Heights PSH. The Project will be a mix of one- and two-bedroom units targeting individuals and small families with disabilities, youth aging out of DCFS-funded care, and veteran earning 30% to 50% of the Area Median Income; and

**WHEREAS**, Full Circle Communities, an affordable housing developer and manager with a portfolio of approximately 1,100 units will serve as an experienced owner and property manager. Further, Full Circle Communities will provide on-site management and case management that will coordinate a wide variety of supportive services to provide tenant support aimed at maintaining resident independence; and

**WHEREAS,** the Project approved for HOME Investment Partnership Program funding via Item 22-1051 is a permanent supportive housing development eligible for funding under ARPA Initiative NT095: Permanent Supportive Housing Development; and

**WHEREAS**, the proposed developer, Full Circle Communities, Inc. (through its wholly owned single-purpose entity, Arlington Heights PSH, LLC), has requested an increase in funding to \$2,500,000 in American Rescue Plan Act - Permanent Supportive Housing (ARPA-PSH) funding, with a construction and thirty-year permanent loan term, 0% permanent loan rate with principal payable from surplus cash.

#### RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF REEXAMINING TIER TWO PENSION BENEFITS

**WHEREAS**, in 2010, the Illinois General Assembly enacted legislation that created the so-called "Tier Two" pension benefit for Illinois public employees hired on or after Jan. 1, 2011; and

**WHEREAS**, teachers, education support professionals (ESPs), and higher education staff hired after the January 2011 cutoff will receive fewer pension benefits and have to work later in life than their colleagues doing the same job but hired before the January 2011 cutoff; and

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**WHEREAS**, Tier Two educators' retiring salary is the average of the last eight years worked, while their Tier One colleagues retire on the average of their final three years worked; and

**WHEREAS**, Tier Two educators will have to wait until age 67 to retire with their full benefits, while their Tier One peers only have to work until age 60, or 55 if they have 35 years of service; and

**WHEREAS**, new pension funding laws have been passed that increased employer funding of the retirement systems, with most on track to reach 90% funded by 2045.

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED,** that the Cook County Board of Commissioners does hereby call upon the esteemed Illinois State Legislature to review, reexamine, and reevaluate the pensions system to identify whether there may be a fiscally responsible alternative to Tier Two, that is comparable with Tier One benefits, legally compliant, and better for teachers; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the Governor of Illinois, the Illinois Senate President and Minority Leader, the Illinois House Speaker and Minority Leader; and

REQUESTING A REPORT FROM THE COOK COUNTY HEALTH AND HOSPITALS SYSTEM AND THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH ON THE CURRENT SYPHILIS STATISTICS, TREATMENT, EDUCATION, AND EFFORT TO REDUCE THE CASES OF SYPHILIS AND CONGENITAL SYPHILIS IN COOK COUNTY

**WHEREAS**, syphilis is a sexually transmitted infection (STI) that can cause serious health problems without treatment. Syphilis infection develops in stages known as primary, secondary, latent, and tertiary, with each stage presenting different signs and symptoms; and

**WHEREAS**, congenital syphilis (CS) is a disease that occurs when a mother with syphilis passes the infection on to her baby during pregnancy, affecting the baby depending on how long syphilis has gone untreated, causing among many other health impacts: miscarriage, stillbirth, prematurity, low birth

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weight, or even death shortly after birth; and

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**WHEREAS**, babies born with congenital syphilis can present deformed bones, severe anemia, enlarged liver and spleen, jaundice, brain and nerve problems, like blindness or deafness, meningitis, and skin rashes; and

WHEREAS, according to the Cook County Department of Public Health's 2020-2021 STI Surveillance Report, published last year, "amid increases across the U.S., the number of Primary and Secondary Syphilis (PSS) cases rose 66% from 167 in 2020 to 277 in 2021. The rates doubled in non-Hispanic-Black/African-American persons, doubled in non-Hispanic Whites, and increased by 52% in Hispanic/Latinx persons. PSS rates are highest in west suburbs and those municipalities in the south bordering the City of Chicago. PSS rates increased 53% in men (sex at birth) and tripled in women (sex at birth)." And

WHEREAS, the CCDPH also reports that congenital syphilis cases more than doubled between 2020 and 2021, an especially worrisome trend considering that "Syphilis can look like so many other conditions. Providers must know how to diagnose, stage and treat syphilis. Writing a prescription is not enough, often, many patients may also need additional support to receive and complete treatment, including help paying for medications in some cases. Syphilis is preventable, treatable, and curable with the right medications given at the right time." And

**WHEREAS**, per the CDC, it is possible that a baby with CS won't have any symptoms at birth. But without treatment, the baby may develop serious problems. Usually, these health problems develop in the first few weeks after birth, but they can also happen years later. Babies who do not get treatment for CS and develop symptoms later can die from the infection. They may also be developmentally delayed or have seizures; and

**WHEREAS**, per the CCDPH website, last updated August of 2023, the only medication available to treat pregnant people with syphilis and babies with congenital syphilis is in short supply. Pfizer, the maker of this penicillin, anticipates this shortage until early- to mid-2024; and

**WHEREAS**, also per the CCDPH website, the Department is working to reduce the cases of syphilis by: serving as a technical consultant for test ordering, staging, and current treatment guidelines; contacting and talking with cases, help them to notify partners, and help individuals reduce risk; providing condoms; educating the public, providers and the department; monitoring trends and intervene where possible; and helping people get into primary care; and

**WHEREAS**, the CDC encourages all pregnant women to be tested for syphilis at the first prenatal visit, since people may have syphilis and not know it, may show no symptoms or symptoms may be very mild or similar to other health problems.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that the Cook County Board of Commissioners does hereby request that representatives of the Cook County Health and Hospitals System and the Department of Public Health present to this body an updated report on the rates of syphilis and congenital syphilis in Cook County, the shortage of medication and impact on treatment, and their efforts to reduce the

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incidence of this disease; and

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**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners also requests that the CCDPH evaluate and propose education avenues on the spread and symptoms of syphilis for the public and medical workers, including primary doctors, gynecologists, and specialists to help them identify, treat and cure syphilis.
