COMMEMORATING THE LIFE AND MEMORY OF THEODORE GREEN

WHEREAS, Ted Green spent nearly two decades of his life as a Cook County Assistant Public Defender where he was well known and respected by his peers and his adversaries alike for his diligence and devotion to fighting for every client's constitutional rights; and

WHEREAS, Ted Green was born and raised in Atlanta, Georgia and was the oldest of eight (8) siblings. He excelled as a student at Booker T. Washington High School and attended Clark Atlanta University. Later he graduated from the George Washington University Law School in Washington, D.C. and set out to pursue his dream of becoming a lawyer; and

WHEREAS, as a young lawyer, Ted Green moved to Chicago and began his work with the Cook County Public Defender's office a year later. He rose through the ranks and, because of his legal aptitude, his profound compassion and rapport with his clients, he was selected to join the elite Murder Task Force division of the Cook County Public Defender; and

WHEREAS, during the time that Ted Green spent fighting for the lives of his clients on the Murder Task Force, the climate was particularly hostile and societal compassion for poor defendants facing death was at its nadir. It was a difficult time to be a defense attorney fighting for the life of a client; it was an even more difficult time to be a defense attorney for multitudes of clients whose extreme poverty and deprivation left them deeply troubled. With that as a backdrop, Ted became known, not just as an attorney who was meticulously prepared and skilled as a litigator but as one who genuinely believed and valued the humanity of each of his clients and treated them and their families with dignity and respect; and

WHEREAS, in 1984, Ted Green left the public defender's office and went into private practice in Chicago. After several decades he returned to the Public Defender's office in 2003 as a supervisor for trial lawyers working in the First Municipal District courts and remained there until his untimely death at the age of 66; and

WHEREAS, Ted Green was a generous and tireless mentor to countless young attorneys at the Public Defender's Office. His wisdom and guidance helped shape the next generation of Public Defenders and his calm and thoughtful demeanor made him an excellent model for all lawyers; and

WHEREAS, Ted Green will be sorely missed by his daughter, Brandi Green and his seven (7) siblings, Teala Goode, Camille Collier, Stacy Collier, Pamela Collier, Tracy Collier, Craig Collier and Chauncy Collier; and

WHEREAS, Ted Green will long be remembered for his thorough work and achievement, his high ethical and moral standards, professionalism, and excellent character. Above all, he will be remembered as a model of decorum and affability; he was uniformly referred to as a real "Southern gentleman".

THE HONORABLE LARRY SUFFREDIN, COUNTY COMMISSIONER

COMMEMORATING THE EXTRAORDINARY LIFE, ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND MEMORY OF JANET OTWELL

WHEREAS, Jan Otwell, former President of the League of Women Voters of Illinois, Director of the Illinois Department of Aging and a tireless advocate and community volunteer died on February 23, 2015 leaving behind countless friends, family and a community profoundly enriched for having known her; and

WHEREAS, Jan Otwell championed the value of civic engagement over a long life of volunteer and public service. She inspired Illinois citizens to greater awareness of public issues and participation in the democratic process through her leadership in the community, her service in state government, and her time spent volunteering in social service agencies; and

WHEREAS, Jan Otwell grew up in suburban Philadelphia and came to Illinois to study journalism at Northwestern University in Evanston. She received undergraduate and graduate degrees in journalism, and

it was while working on the Daily Northwestern newspaper that she met her husband Ralph Otwell. He was a reporter and she was his managing editor. Jan and Ralph had three sons and, while Ralph rose through the ranks in journalism to become a top editor at the Chicago Sun-Times, Jan focused her energies on the family and became a valued volunteer in the community; and

WHEREAS, Jan Otwell was a member of the Illinois League state board from 1968 to 1981, and served as its President from 1977 to 1981. During this time she spearheaded the League's effort to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment in Illinois, and directed the Illinois Juvenile Court Watching Project, which was funded through the Illinois League. As President, she chose to take the Illinois League Convention to the neighboring state of Wisconsin after Illinois refused to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA). In recognition for her decades of hard work and dedication to the League of Women Voters she was honored with the Carrie Chapman Catt Award, the highest honor the League bestows; and

WHEREAS, Jan Otwell was a tireless leader and advocate for the aging. Despite her being a life-long Democrat, Republican Governor Jim Thompson appointed her to head the Illinois Department on Aging. During her seven years in Governor Thompson's cabinet, she focused her energies on fighting elder abuse and neglect and to extend quality of life. One of her initiatives, "Ninety for the '90s," was a groundbreaking networking program that drew together leaders from business, labor, communications, health and religion to study and report on issues facing aging Illinoisans. She created the Task Force on the Status of Older Women in Illinois and later became the Midwest Director of the AARP; and

WHEREAS, Jan Otwell was appointed to and served on the Task Force on the Future of Illinois, the Bureau of Employment Security Advisory Board, and the White House Conference on Families. She served as Coordinator of the Governor's Task Force on Children and she was chairperson of the Long Term Care Committee of the National Association on State Units on Aging. She also chaired the Department of Children and Family Services Advisory Council; and

WHEREAS, Jan Otwell's commitment to her community was not limited to civics. Jan spent substantial time working to improve the lives of children, women, and the homeless through her involvement with Voices for Illinois Children, the Good News Partners and Deborah's Place; and

WHEREAS, while being universally regarded as a dedicated team player, Jan Otwell's exceptional abilities regularly singled her out for distinction. In addition to many other recognitions and awards she was honored by the Chicago Metro Chapter of the National Caucus and Center on Black Aged for her efforts to improve the lives of the minority elderly. She received the first annual Wise Older Woman Award from the White Crane Senior Health Center in Chicago, the Northwestern Club of Chicago Community Service Award, and the "Friend of Children" award from the Child Care Association of Illinois and, for her work with the Intergenerational Initiative, she received the "Champion" award; and

WHEREAS, Jan Otwell's unfailing loyalty and her great generosity of spirit won her the affection and respect of the community. She was a role model for all who knew her and will be deeply missed. Jan Otwell and her husband Ralph resided in Evanston for nearly 31 years and the community has lost a treasured leader. Her loss will be felt even more acutely by her husband Ralph Otwell and their sons Brian, Douglas and David; their five (5) grandchildren; and one great-granddaughter.

WHEREAS, after a brief stint as legal advisor to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction he joined the Cook County State's Attorney's office as a felony trial assistant, Judge Cunningham would also serve as Chief of the Vertical Prosecutions Unit. Later in his career, he would rejoin the State's Attorney's office as a supervisor of all misdemeanor and quasi-criminal cases; and

WHEREAS, after leaving the State's Attorney's office in 1976, Judge Cunningham joined the Criminal Defense Consortium of Cook County as a Supervisor of that organization's Lawndale office; and

WHEREAS, Judge Cunningham joined the bench as a Cook County Circuit Court Judge in 1986. During his time on the bench, he presided over thousands of bench trials, hundreds of jury trials, and was appointed by the Chief Judge to mentor newly appointed and elected judges. His last judicial assignment was in the Law Division, where he presided over an array of civil matters; and

WHEREAS, on April 1, 2009, after being appointed by then County Board President, Todd Stroger, Judge Cunningham was sworn into the office of Public Defender of Cook County by his sister and Presiding Judge of the Sixth Municipal District, Honorable Marjorie Laws; and

WHEREAS, during his six-year term as Public Defender, Judge Cunningham has diligently carried out his mission to uphold the Constitutions of the United States of America and the State of Illinois; and protect the rights, liberties, and dignities of every person his office was appointed to represent.

HONORING THE LIFE OF REVEREND WILLIE T. BARROW

WHEREAS, Almighty God, in His infinite wisdom, has called one of our spiritual leaders, Reverend Willie T. Barrow from our midst; and

WHEREAS, Reverend Barrow was born in Burton, Texas, to Nelson and Octavia Taplin. At the young age of twelve, in 1936, she organized and led her first demonstration when she confronted a bus driver and demanded that all students be allowed to ride the school bus regardless of race; and

WHEREAS, at age sixteen, Reverend Barrow moved to Portland, Oregon, to attend Warner Pacific Theological Seminary. It was here that she organized one of the first African-American Churches of God; and where during World War II she worked as a welder at the Kaiser Shipyards in Swan Island, Washington; and

WHEREAS, in 1943 Reverend Barrow and her husband, Clyde Barrow, moved to Chicago where she began studies at Moody Bible Institute and served as a youth minister at Langley Avenue Church of God; and

URGING THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO PASS LEGISLATION TO REFORM PERCENTAGE BASED BAIL BOND FEES

WHEREAS, in 2011, 79% of Cook County defendants were either ordered to pay financial bond to secure release pending trial or held without bond, 13% were ordered released subject to electronic monitoring and only 8% were released pursuant to an I-bond; which allows defendants to be released upon a signature, but still subjects them to payment of the full bond amount if they fail to make a required court appearance; and

WHEREAS, by contrast, New York City releases approximately 70% of their felony pre-trial defendants on personal recognizance, and Washington, D.C. releases over 80% of their felony pre-trial defendants on personal recognizance, yet both cities have high court appearance rates and low re-arrest rates; and

WHEREAS, our over-reliance on a money-based bail system disproportionately impacts low-income people and minorities, perpetuating the cycle of poverty and incarceration, evidenced by the fact that about 86% of the Cook County jail population are African-American or Hispanic; and

WHEREAS, when properly administered, bail is designed to be a function of risk to society or flight risk, not simply a means test of ability to pay; and

WHEREAS, the overreliance on monetary bail and the inability of many detainees to afford it are among the primary drivers of the level and growth in our jail population; and

WHEREAS, monetary bail additionally means that those too poor to pay remain in jail regardless of their risk level or presumed innocence; and

WHEREAS, a decades-old state law (725 ILCS 5/110-7) directs court clerks to retain 10% of posted bail as 'bail bond costs' regardless of the size of the bond even though the costs of processing a bond by the Clerk of the Court are the same regardless of the bond amount; and

WHEREAS, people with limited financial resources may not have the capacity to forfeit a 10% deposit on their bond and the prospect of posting bond is made even more challenging given that even if they are able to post bond, 10% of the money posted is kept by the Clerk of the Circuit Court, regardless of whether they abide by the conditions of their bond, if they are found to be innocent of the charges against them or even if the charges are dropped; and

WHEREAS, this percentage-based fee is inherently unfair and regressive. As a percentage of their income, poor people who are arrested are paying more for these bond processing fees, in fact on any given day, about 1/5 of the Cook County jail population are there because they were unable to post \$6,000 or less to bail out, resulting in higher than necessary daily jail populations at a significant cost to the county, costs that can exceed the amount of the underlying bail; and

WHEREAS, in 2013, the Clerk of the Court for Cook County retained \$5.6 million as 'bail bond costs' pursuant to 725 ILCS 5/110-7; and

WHEREAS, it is contrary to prudent public policy or the notion of an equitable criminal justice system for units of government to use excessive 'bail bond costs' as a profit resource; and

WHEREAS, legislation was recently introduced in both the Illinois House of Representatives and Illinois Senate which would amend 725 ILCS 5/110-7 by capping the antiquated percentage-based bond processing fee collected by the Cook County Clerk of the Circuit Court at \$100, an amount more than sufficient to cover processing costs;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners urges the Illinois General Assembly to pass legislation amending 725 ILCS 5/110-7 to cap the fee collected on bail bond deposits by the Clerk of the Circuit Court for Cook County, thereby reducing the already significant and unnecessary financial burden on pre-trial detainees and their families, reducing average daily jail population, as a necessary step towards reforming our criminal justice system; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a suitable copy of the Resolution be tendered to the Speaker of the Illinois House of Representatives, the President of the Illinois Senate and to the Governor of Illinois.

OPPOSING A PROPERTY TAX INCREASE IN THE FISCAL YEAR 2016 BUDGET

WHEREAS, Cook County is located in the northeastern section of the State of Illinois that contains more than 800 local governmental units within its boundaries, it has a population of approximately 5.3 million people, it is the second most populous county in the nation and the 19th largest government in the United States (2005 census statistics); and

WHEREAS, Cook County contains 135 municipalities in its region, the most well-known being The City of Chicago, the City of Chicago and the suburban municipalities account for approximately 85% of the County's 946 square miles, while unincorporated areas make up the remaining 15%; and

WHEREAS, property taxes are paid in arrears and are due in two installments every year, and after taking advantage of property tax exemptions, many longtime homeowners still face the threat of being forced to sell their property due to the exponential cost of their property taxes; and

WHEREAS, despite Cook County holding the line on its property tax levy since 1994, taxpayers are subject to increasing property tax bills as a result of the increase of tax rates by individual taxing districts; and

WHEREAS, property taxes collected by all governments in Cook County increased from \$7.89 billion in 2000 to \$11.69 billion in 2010 according to the Heartland Institute; and

Development (HUD) grant of Community Development Block Grant Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) funds in response to disasters occurring in 2013, authorized under the Disaster Relief Appropriations Act, 2013. The purpose of the CDBG-DR program is to assist targeted areas that have been affected by a natural disaster (in this case, severe storms and flooding during the period of 4/16/2013 to 5/5/2013). The program will provide necessary expenses related to disaster relief, long-term recovery, restoration of infrastructure and housing, and economic revitalization in the most impacted and distressed areas resulting from a major disaster declared pursuant to the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act of 1974 (Stafford Act).

Cook County was initially allocated \$68.8 million via two awards, which were accepted by the Cook County Board of Commissioners in March and September 2014 respectively. Subsequent to the initial allocation, Cook County was awarded an additional \$14,816,000, bringing the total grant amount to \$83,616,000.

In order to identify the most impacted and distressed areas by the 2013 declared disaster as well as to identify potential projects, the Department of Planning and Development met with or consulted related studies prepared by the Cook County Departments of Homeland Security and Emergency Management, Environmental Control, and Transportation and Highways, the Cook County Forest Preserve District, the Illinois and Federal Emergency Management Agencies (IEMA and FEMA, respectively), the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, as well as municipal and township leaders.

The Department of Planning and Development desires to fund projects that strategically assist with the recovery efforts and support other investments which are occurring in the area. Summary: Cook County has two 8-year-old IBM iSeries computers (one for production and one for testing) that support mission-critical financial, property, and criminal justice systems, and over 2,000 internal users. While many of these systems are being reengineered for other platforms (such as the ERP software that will replace the County's current JD Edwards One World system), the County anticipates needing iSeries capabilities for another 3 to 5 years. However, the County faces mounting risks in the next 3 to 5 years as the physical hardware and software become increasingly unsupportable.

Therefore, BOT, BOF and the Assessor respectfully request approval of this amendment to the County's current Acxiom contract, which will include hosting of the County's iSeries servers at Acxiom, where the County's mainframe is currently hosted. The increase and extension will fund the iSeries hosting through 2019, without adding time or money for mainframe hosting services. The migration will immediately upgrade the resiliency and availability of the County's mission-critical financial, property, and criminal justice systems that run on the iSeries servers, including the County's JD Edwards One World financial system.

Through this amendment, BOT and its partners seek to mitigate several identified risks to these systems: eight-year-old hardware, including disk drives and tape drives, are increasingly failing due to their age; and the servers' back-up tape drives are out of support and are no longer supported by the manufacturer, making restoration from tape drive extremely difficult. Were an out-of-support disk and tape drive to fail, the County could face catastrophic data loss. Through the contract amendment, Acxiom will provide a hosting environment that eliminates or reduces these potential points of failure.

In establishing its strategy and negotiating the contract amendment, BOT has coordinated with and briefed several key stakeholders, including the County's Chief Information Security Officer, Assessor's and Chief Judge's offices; and service levels have been negotiated in order to meet the needs of our finance, criminal justice and property stakeholders.

15-1565 SUBSTITUTE ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

SUBSTITUTE ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 46
OF THE COOK COUNTY CODE OF ORDINANCES CONCERNING
"LAW ENFORCEMENT" BY ADDING A NEW SECTION 46-6 PROHIBITING
THE USE OF CAROTID CONTROL HOLDS BY THE
JOHN H. STROGER, JR. HOSPITAL POLICE

WHEREAS, the County of Cook is a home rule unit of government pursuant to the 1970 Illinois Constitution, Article VII, Section 6; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to its home rule power the County of Cook may exercise any power and perform any function relating to its government and affairs, including the power to regulate for the protection of the public health, safety, morals and welfare; and

WHEREAS, the John H. Stroger, Jr. Hospital Police, will maintain a courteous and professional demeanor when dealing with the public, in addition to and including individuals detained in the Cook County Jail and the Juvenile Temporary Detention Center, pursuant to current standing orders, policies and procedures; and

WHEREAS, the John H. Stroger, Jr. Hospital Police, will maintain compliance with all laws, current standing orders, policies and procedures mandating that employees of the aforementioned departments

select the appropriate level of force based on a subject's actions, and that employees further modify their selection of options as the subject offers less or greater resistance; and

WHEREAS, carotid control holds are largely ineffective and create the potential for a subject to panic and react with greater resistance than he or she otherwise might deploy during an officer restraint; and

WHEREAS, the President and Board of Commissioners of Cook County intend to modify the County Code of Ordinances with respect to the current orders, policies and procedures of the Office of the John H. Stroger, Jr. Hospital Police, requiring a progressive and reasonable escalation and de-escalation of officer applied force; and

WHEREAS, such modification by the President and Board of Commissioners is consistent with the requirements of State and Federal law while also fully authorized and consistent with the authority of Cook County as a home rule unit of government under the Constitution of the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, the President and Board of Commissioners of Cook County further intend to expressly prohibit the use of carotid control holds by the John H. Stroger, Jr. Hospital Police with the exception of conditions expressly enumerated in Section 46-6(c) of this Ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF COOK COUNTY:

- **Section 1.** The above recitals are expressly incorporated herein and made part hereof as though fully set forth herein.
- **Section 2.** Chapter 46 of the Cook County Code of Ordinances concerning "Law Enforcement" is hereby amended by adding a new Section 46-6 as follows:

Sec. 46-6 Policy on Use of Force - choke holds prohibited

- (a) The John H. Stroger, Jr. Hospital Police shall use an amount of force reasonably necessary based on the totality of the circumstances to perform a lawful task, effect an arrest, overcome resistance, control a subject or protect themselves or others from injury. Circumstances that may govern the reasonableness of using a particular force option include but are not limited to: (1) whether the officer reasonably believes the subject poses an immediate threat to the safety of officers or others; and (2) whether the subject is actively resisting arrest or attempting to evade arrest by flight.
 - (b) After gaining total control of a subject the John H. Stroger, Jr. Hospital Police shall:
 - (1) Avoid sitting, kneeling or standing on a subject's chest which may result in chest compression, thereby reducing the subject's ability to breathe;
 - (2) If practicable, position the subject in a manner to allow free breathing;
 - (3) Monitor an arrestee until transported to a secure location; and
 - (4) Seek medical attention for an arrestee who has injuries or illnesses consistent with applicable standing orders and departmental policy directives.
- (c) No employee of the John H. Stroger, Jr. Hospital Police shall apply a carotid control hold in the performance of his or her duties unless faced with a situation in which the use of deadly force is justified

under applicable law. A carotid control hold shall include but is not limited to, any sustained pressure to the throat or windpipe which may prevent or hinder breathing or reduce intake of air.

(d) For purposes of this Section the following terms shall have the following meaning:

"Employee of the John H. Stroger, Jr. Hospital Police" refers to any individual employed by the aforementioned department who by virtue of that employment is vested by law with a duty to maintain public order or make arrests for offenses, whether that duty extends to all offenses or is limited to specific offenses.

- **Section 3.** (a) Nothing in this Ordinance shall preclude an employee of the Office of the Cook County Sheriff, the Sheriff's Police Department, the Department of Corrections, the Court Services Department, the John H. Stroger, Jr. Hospital Police or the Investigators of the Cook County State's Attorney from utilizing self-defense tactics which are enumerated in the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board prescribed certification for Law Enforcement.
- (b) Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions, an employee of the John H. Stroger, Jr. Hospital Police need not retreat or desist from efforts to make a lawful arrest because of resistance or threatened resistance to the arrest. Any such officer or employee is justified in the use of any force which he reasonably believes to be necessary to defend himself or another from bodily harm while making the arrest. However, the officer or employee is justified in using force likely to cause death or great bodily harm only when he reasonably believes that such force is necessary to prevent death or great bodily harm to himself or such other person or when he reasonably believes both that:
 - (1) Such force is necessary to prevent the arrest from being defeated b resistance or escape; and
 - (2) The person to be arrested has committed or attempted a forcible felony which involves the infliction or threatened infliction of great bodily harm or is attempting to escape by use of a deadly weapon, or otherwise indicates that he will endanger human life or inflict great bodily harm unless arrested without delay.
- **Section 4.** Incorporating all of the foregoing provisions, this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage and publication.

WHEREAS, according to the U.S. Department of Education, college campuses reported over 5,000 forcible sex offenses in 2013 - but a recent study by the Bureau of Justice shows that the actual number of offenses is estimated to be closer to 30,000 each year; and

WHEREAS, According to the Department of Justice, less than 5% of rape victims attending college report their attack to law enforcement; and

WHEREAS, Despite evidence of the problem, 41 percent of colleges and universities recently surveyed have not conducted a single investigation of sexual violence on their campus in the last five years; and

WHEREAS, Currently, 101 universities are under federal investigation by the U.S. Department of Education's Office for Civil Rights for alleged violations of Title IX related to the handling of sexual violence; and

WHEREAS, Title IX states that "colleges and universities have a legal obligation to provide an environment that is free from discrimination on the basis of sex in all education programs and activities." Sexual harassment, which includes sexual violence, is a form of sexual discrimination prohibited under Title IX; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Board of Commissioners recognizes the importance of addressing sexual violence and the need to take all possible steps to prevent sexual assaults from occurring while simultaneously creating safe, secure and streamlined reporting policies for the victims of sexual assault.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Cook County Board of Commissioners urges Congress to pass the bipartisan Campus Accountability and Safety Act that establishes new campus resources and support services for student survivors, requires fairness in campus disciplinary process, ensures minimum training standards for on-campus personnel, creates new transparency requirements, requires better accountability and coordination with local law enforcement and has enforceable Title IX penalties and stiffer penalties for Cleary Act Violations.

RESOLUTION OPPOSING THE CREATION OF LOCAL RIGHT TO WORK ZONES IN ILLINOIS

WHEREAS, Illinois Governor Bruce Rauner has repeatedly called for the creation of local right to work zones, in which voters could decide if workers in their communities employed in unionized industries can opt out of paying dues to labor organizations; and

WHEREAS, Governor Rauner has asked for city councils across Illinois to consider a resolution asking for voter referendums to allow local right to work zones, as well as changes to prevailing wage laws and worker compensation laws; and

WHEREAS, such action has the potential to further dismantle unionized labor organizations, which have historically protected the rights of working and middle-class Illinoisans and could lead to lower wages, reduced benefits, and poor working conditions for employees whether they are union or non-union; and

WHEREAS, Illinois Attorney General Lisa Madigan released an opinion last week unequivocally declaring that the concept of local right to work zones presented by Governor Rauner would violate the National Labor Relations Act (NLRA); and

WHEREAS, the Attorney General opinion additionally states that "counties and municipalities, whether home rule or non-home-rule, as well as all other political subdivisions, units of local government, and school districts of this State, are precluded by federal law from enacting ordinances and resolutions that limit or restrict the use of union security agreements. Further, current law does not authorize the creation, through the passage of a referendum, of "right to work" zones or local areas wherein union security agreements will not be recognized."; and

WHEREAS, although Illinois courts have not had to address this matter previously, courts of other jurisdictions and other state Attorneys General that have opined on the matter have uniformly concluded that the NLRA preempts the prohibition of union security agreements by units of local government in all instances relating to interstate commerce and that the lone exception to federal preemption authorizes only states and territories, and not their political subdivisions, to prohibit union security agreements; and

WHEREAS, this latest attack on collective bargaining is an attempt to weaken organized labor and will not make Illinois a more competitive business environment, evidenced by the fact that similar laws in other states have had no significant impact on attracting employers to a particular state;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners hereby opposes the proposal to create local right to work zones in Illinois as such action would violate current federal and state laws and would negatively impact collective bargaining and hurt hard-working middle-class employees and their families in Illinois; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that in light of the current federal and Illinois laws, the Cook County Board of Commissioners urges local government subdivisions within Cook County to refrain from considering and adopting resolutions asking the Illinois Legislature to allow local right to work zones.

COOK COUNTY APPRENTICESHIPS EARNED CREDIT INCENTIVE

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 34 Finance, Division 6 Bid Incentives and Preferences, Sec. 34-229 - Sec. 34-239 of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as Follows:

DIVISION 6. - BID INCENTIVES AND PREFERENCES

Sec. 34-229. - Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this Division shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this Section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning. Terms not defined in this section are defined in Division 1 of this Procurement Code, or in Section 1-3 of the Cook County Code.

Apprentice means any person who: (1) is enrolled in an apprenticeship program approved by and registered with the United States Department of Labor's Office of Apprenticeship, or its successor organization; or (2) has graduated within the past four (4) years from an apprenticeship program that has been approved by and registered with the United States Department of Labor's Office of Apprenticeship, or its successor organization.

Armed forces of the United States means the United States Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, Coast Guard, or service in active duty as defined under 38 U.S.C. Section 101. Service in the Merchant Marine that constitutes active duty under Section 401 of federal Public Act 95-202 shall also be considered service in the armed forces for purposes of this division.

Committee means Cook County Re-entry Employment Committee.

<u>Bid incentive</u> means an amount deducted, for bid evaluation purposes only, from the contract base bid in order to calculate the bid price to be used to evaluate the bid on a competitively bid project.

<u>Contract base bid</u> means the total dollar amount bid on a project without factoring any bid incentive or percentage reductions to the bid amount.

Earned Credit means the amount allocated to a Contractor upon completion of a Qualifying Contract through which the Contractor met or exceeded the goals for the utilization of Former Offenders or Apprentices.

Eligible Veteran means a person who (i) has been either a member of the armed forces of the United States or, while a citizen of the United States, was a member of the armed forces of allies of the United States in time of hostilities with a foreign country and (ii) has served under one or more of the following conditions: (a) the veteran served a total of at least six months; (b) the veteran served for the duration of hostilities regardless of the length of the engagement; (c) the veteran was discharged on the basis of hardship; or (d) the veteran was released from active duty because of a service connected disability and was discharged under honorable conditions.

Former Offenders means adults who are residents of the County and who have been convicted of a crime.

Labor hours means the total hours of workers receiving an hourly wage who are directly employed at work site. "Labor hours" shall include hours performed by workers employed by the contractor and all subcontractors working at the work site. "Labor hours" shall not include hours worked by nonworking foremen, superintendents, owners and workers who are not subject to prevailing wage requirements.

Qualifying Contract means a Contract for Public Works with a Bid Price of \$100,000.00 or more, for which the Contractor is eligible for Earned Credits.

Service-connected disability means a disability incurred in the line of duty in the active military, naval, or air service as described in 38 U.S.C. 101(16).

Service-Disabled Veteran means an Eligible Veteran who has been found to have ten percent or more service-connected disability by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs or the United States Department of Defense.

Service-Disabled Veteran-owned Business Enterprise (SDVBE) means a small business (i) that is at least 51 percent owned, controlled, and managed by one or more qualified service-disabled veterans or, in the case of a corporation, at least 51 percent or more of the stock of which is owned, controlled, and managed by one or more Service Disabled Veterans; (ii) that has its home office in Illinois, as certified by the CCD under policies and procedures promulgated by the CCD.

Time of hostilities with a foreign country means any period of time in the past, present, or future during which a declaration of war by the United States Congress has been or is in effect or during which an emergency condition has been or is in effect that is recognized by the issuance of a Presidential proclamation or a Presidential executive order and in which the armed forces expeditionary medal or other campaign service medals are awarded according to Presidential executive order.

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Sec. 34-233. - Re-entry employment plan.

A Contractor may qualify for Earned Credits by utilizing Former Offenders for work under a Qualifying Contract. In order to so qualify, a Bidder must include in its Bid for such Qualifying Contract an employment plan for Former Offenders by Contractor or any subcontractors. Bidders may request from the Committee a list of candidates. If the Bidder or any subcontractor employs Former Offenders or identifies potential candidates on its own, such candidates may be submitted to the Committee to determine if they are Former Offenders, as defined in this division.

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Sec. 34-234. - Re-entry employment earned credits.

- (a) The CPO shall include information regarding re-entry employment Earned Credits in all advertisements for Qualifying Contracts.
- (b) Upon the completion of a Qualifying Contract, a Contractor may apply to the CPO for Earned Credits, on such forms and including such information as required by the CPO. If the Contractor met or exceeded the Former Offender employment goals established in the Qualifying Contract. If the CPO determines that the Contractor has successfully met or exceeded its employment plan in the Qualifying Contract, the CPO shall issue an Earned Credit Certificate that evidences the amount of Earned Credits calculated as set forth below. The Contractor may utilize the Earned Credits as set forth in this division in a future Bid for a Contract for Public Works of equal of greater value as the Qualifying Contract, by including a copy of the Earned Credit Certificate with its Bid.
- (c) For any Qualifying Contract, the CPO shall determine the Earned Credits, as follows. And issue an Earned Credit Certificate, which shall be valid for three years from the date of issuance.

Percentage of Total Labor Hours Performed by Former Offenders Earned Credit 5-10% ½% of Bid price

Over 10% 1% of Bid price

d) For purposes of calculating the lowest Responsive and Responsible Bidder only, the CPO shall deduct from the Bid Price the amount of Earned Credit set forth on the Earned Credit Certificate submitted by a Bidder. If the Bidder is awarded the Contract, such Earned Credit Certificate may not be used again in a future Bid.

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Sec. 34-235. - Re-entry employment contractor's records.

A Contractor shall retain all records supporting any Certificate of Earned Credits issued to such Contractor for a period of at least three years after issuance of such Certificate. A Contractor shall impose this requirement by contract with any subcontractors included in the employment plan. The Office of the CPO shall have access to the Contractor's and such subcontractors' records.

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Sec. 34-236. - Eligible Veterans' preference established.

- (a) Veterans' Workplace Preference. The CPO shall give a preference of one percent of the amount of the Contract to a Responsible and Responsive Contractor for a Public Works Contract when such Contractor has committed by affidavit to utilize Eligible Veterans for at least five percent of the hours worked under such Contract. Failure to utilize Eligible Veterans in accordance with the affidavit will result in breach of contract.
- (b) Veteran-owned Business and Service Disabled Veteran-owned Business preference. The CPO shall give a preference of five percent of the amount of the Contract to a Responsible and Responsive VBE or SDVBE.

The CPO shall develop procedures for implementation of this Section.

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Sec. 34-237. - Veteran-owned businesses.

- (a) It is the goal of the County to award each year not less than three percent of its total expenditures for supplies, equipment, goods, and services to VBEs and SDVBEs. The CCD may count toward its three percent yearly goal that portion of all Contracts in which the Contractor subcontracts with a VBE or SDVBE. Each year, the CCD shall report to the County Board on all of the following for the immediately preceding 12-month period:
 - (1) The number of VBEs and SDVBEs that submitted a Bid.
- (2) The number of VBEs and SDVBEs that entered into Contracts and the total value of those Contracts.
 - (3) Whether the County achieved the goal described in this subsection.
- (b) Each year, the CCD shall review the three percent goal with input from countywide veterans' service organizations and from the business community including VBEs and SDVBEs, and shall make recommendations to the County Board regarding continuation, increases, or decreases in the percentage goal. The recommendations shall be based upon the number of VBEs and SDVBEs and on the continued need to encourage and promote businesses owned by qualified veterans.
- (c) The CPO will make best efforts to recruit and solicit bids and make procurements from VBEs and SDVBEs.
- (d) The above-stated goal shall not be treated as a quota nor shall it be used to discriminate against any person or business enterprise on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion or sex.
- (e) The CCD, in consultation with the Using Agency, shall establish contract specific goals for each contract. In establishing a contract specific goal, the CCD shall consider the availability of sufficient certified VBEs and SDVBEs for supplies, materials and equipment, or services required as part of the procurement.
- (f) The provisions of this Division 6, Section 34-237(a) shall be effective as of July 1, 2013. The Contract Compliance Director shall as soon as practicable develop and implement procedures and any corresponding regulations for certifying and monitoring utilization of VBEs and SDVBEs.

Sec. 34-238. - VBE/SDVBE Certification.

- (a) The CCD shall certify a Person as a VBE when it is a small business:
 - (1) That is at least 51 percent owned, controlled, and managed by one or more Eligible Veterans; and
 - (2) That has its home office in Illinois.
- (b) The CCD shall certify Person as a SDVBE when it is a small business:
 - (1) That is at least 51 percent owned, controlled, and managed by one or more qualified service-disabled veterans; and
 - (2) That has its home office in Illinois.
- (c) In lieu of conducting its own certifications, the CCD by rule may accept formal certifications by other entities, provided that Cook County's requirements are met.

Sec. 34-239 - Apprenticeship Earned Credits

A contractor may qualify for Earned Credits by utilizing Apprentices for work under a Qualifying Contract. In order to so qualify, a Bidder must include in its Bid for such Qualifying Contract a copy of the certificate approving the apprenticeship standards and a copy of each apprentice or apprenticeship completion certificate which corresponds to the individual in which the contractor claims credit.

- (a) For any project advertised after the effective date of this ordinance having an estimated contract value of \$100,000.00 or more, and where not otherwise prohibited by federal, state or local law, the chief procurement officer shall allocate to any qualified bidder the following bid incentive for utilization of apprentices in performance of the total labor hours performed under contract.
- (b) For any project advertised after the effective date of this ordinance having an estimated contract value of \$100,000.00 or more, and where not otherwise prohibited by federal, state or local law, the chief procurement officer shall allocate to any qualified bidder the following bid incentive for utilization of apprentices in performance of the total labor hours performed under contract.
- (c) Earned Credits for total labor hours performed by apprentices shall be earned as follows:

 Percentage of Total Labor Hours Performed by Apprentices Earned Credit

 5-10% ½% of Bid price

 Over 10% 1% of Bid price
- (d) The bid incentive is used only to calculate an amount to be used in evaluating the bid. The bid incentive does not affect the contract price.
- (e) For all projects advertised after the effective date of this ordinance, the chief procurement officer shall include the bid incentive provision in all such advertisements.
- (f) As part of the contract close-out procedure, if the chief procurement officer determines that the bidder has successfully met his or her apprentice utilization goals, the chief procurement officer shall issue an earned credit certificate that evidences the amount of earned credits allocated to the bidder. The bidder may apply the earned credits as the bid incentive for any future project contract bid of equal or greater dollar value.
- (g) The earned credit certificate is valid for three years from the date of issuance and shall not be applied towards any future contract bid after the expiration of that period.
- (h) The bidder may apply the earned credit certificate on multiple future project bids during the three year period in which the certificate is valid, but may only receive one bid incentive for bid evaluation purposes on one project contract award. If the contractor applies the earned credit certificate on multiple project bids and is the lowest responsive and responsible bidder on more than one project bid, the earned credit certificate shall be applied to the project first to be advertised by the Department of Procurement Services, or if multiple project bids were advertised on the same date, the earned credit certificate shall be applied only to the project with the greatest dollar value.
- (i) The contractor shall maintain accurate and detailed books and records necessary to monitor compliance with this section and shall submit such reports as required by the chief procurement officer, or

the commissioner of the supervising department.

- (j) Full access to the contractor's and subcontractors' records shall be granted to the chief procurement officer, the commissioner of the using Agency or any duly authorized representative thereof for a period of at least three (3) years after final acceptance of the work. A Contractor shall impose this requirement by contract with any subcontractors providing Apprentices under a Qualifying Contract
- (k) The chief procurement officer is authorized to adopt, promulgate and enforce reasonable rules and regulations pertaining to the administration and enforcement of this section.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION

URGING THE ILLINOIS GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO PASS LEGISLATION AMENDING THE STATE CANNABIS CONTROL ACT AS PER HOUSE BILL 0218

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois has 103 municipalities with widely differing cannabis enforcement standards in addition to State statutes, of which 46 are within Cook County, creating an inconsistent and unfair legal patchwork; and

WHEREAS, the lack of a uniform standard gives officers the discretion to arrest under the state statute or ticket under municipal codes, allowing for non-uniform enforcement of cannabis standards with no statutory or basis in qualifying factors; and

WHEREAS, under the current law, Chicago and Cook County spend enormous resources enforcing low-level drug offense where in the City of Chicago approximately 7,000 people are arrested every year for possession of a controlled substance (PCS) of one gram of less and where low-level narcotics arrests resulted in nearly 275,000 hours of work for Chicago police officers, keeping cops off the beat to fight violent crime; and

WHEREAS, there have been one million arrests for misdemeanor marijuana possession in the State of Illinois from 1975 to 2009 and Illinois ranked sixth in the nation in per-capita marijuana arrest rates in 2007, representing fifty-eight percent of all drugs arrest in the state; and

WHEREAS, Illinois had 12,406 more marijuana arrests in 2010 than it did in 2001; and

WHEREAS, Cook County led the nation in marijuana possession arrests in 2010 with 33,000 or 91 per day; and

WHEREAS, a 2013 American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) national study indicated that it costs up to \$250 million each year in Illinois to enforce our outmoded marijuana laws; and

WHEREAS, the lack of uniformity has led to Cook County having the highest racial disparity in cannabis possession arrests among the 25 most populated counties nationwide, with African-Americans 7.56 times more likely to face arrest statewide than Caucasians according to the American Civil Liberties Union; and

WHEREAS, most arrests for marijuana possession do not lead to trials or prison terms. Instead, a large number of these arrests are plea-bargained, continued without a finding, dismissed, or otherwise handled in a manner that makes ineffective use of limited criminal justice system resources; and

WHEREAS, arresting people for cannabis possession creates barriers to access to employment, school, housing and immigration status, even if as is almost always the case, the charges are dismissed; and

WHEREAS, the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) of Illinois believes House Bill 0218 prevents the wrongful criminal classification of thousands of Illinois residents, which cost taxpayers millions of dollars; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners does hereby urge the Illinois General Assembly to amend the State Cannabis Control Act as per House Bill 0218; and

BE IT FURTHUR RESOLVED, that suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Speaker of the Illinois House of Representatives and the President of the Illinois Senate.
