HONORING THE 150TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE FOUNDING OF
SAINT MARY PARISH CHURCH IN EVANSTON ON AUGUST 15TH 2015
AND PROCLAIMING AUGUST 15, 2015 SAINT MARY DAY IN COOK COUNTY**

WHEREAS, on August 15, 2015 Saint Mary Parish in Evanston will celebrate its Sesquicentennial; and

WHEREAS, Saint Mary Parish hosted the first Catholic Mass celebrated in Evanston on August 15, 1865 in the open air near what is now the present entry of Calvary Cemetery; and

WHEREAS, Saint Mary Parish was founded on August 15, 1865, on the day that honors the Assumption of Mary; and

WHEREAS, Saint Mary Parish is the oldest Roman Catholic Parish in Evanston and was dedicated on May 15, 1892; and

WHEREAS, Saint Mary's Church is located in the Historic Ridge District at the corner of Oak Avenue and Lake street in Evanston, Illinois; and

WHEREAS, Saint Mary's Church was designated an Evanston Preservation Landmark in 1975 and is listed in the National Register of Historic Places, March 3, 1983; and

WHEREAS, Saint Mary's School was established in 1874 and merged with the school of Saint Nicholas Parish in 1986 to become Pope John XXIII School of Saint Mary and Saint Nicholas; Saint Mary School was run by the Sinsinawa Dominican Sisters from its founding. Pope John XXIII has received the United States Department of Education - Blue Ribbon Award for its high standards and excellent academic achievement; and

WHEREAS, under the prayerful guidance of the Cardinal's Office for Divine Worship and the Parish Building and Renovation Committee, the church was renovated in 2004 to restore it to its former beauty and to address the needs of the rapidly growing parish; and

WHEREAS, as Saint Mary's celebrate its 150th year, its motto is: "Celebrating 150 Years of Faith and Service"; and

WHEREAS, the faith community of Saint Mary continues to thrive under the leadership of Reverend Gregory S. Sakowicz, Pastor, Reverend Anthony A. Joseph, Associate Pastor and Deacon Dennis Robak.

The Italians in Chicago exhibit is now permanently displayed at the Italian Cultural Center; and

**COMMEMORATING THE EXTRAORDINARY LIFE, ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND MEMORY
OF THE HONORABLE DONNA GERSON**

WHEREAS, Donna Gerson represented the best qualities of citizenship and humanity through her lifelong work as an elected official and community leader. She served as an Evanston Alderman, Library Trustee and was active in politics her entire life. When she died on July 10, 2015 she left behind a family, countless friends and a community profoundly enriched for having known her; and

WHEREAS, Donna Gerson was born and raised in Akron, Ohio. She met her husband of over 61 years, Stan Gerson during her first year of law school at Case Western Reserve. Both Donna and Stan took career detours and left Akron for Chicago, and finally settled Evanston. She left the law for teaching and the two settled in South Evanston where they raised their two children Lisa and Michael and became politically involved in the movements promoting fair housing and school desegregation in addition to many other local issues; and

WHEREAS, Donna Gerson had a lifelong interest in politics that began very early in life; she was a self-described "political junkie" who enjoyed discussing politics. When the Gersons were in their 40s, they spent a year in London during her husband's sabbatical. While there, Donna was exposed to a radio show that interested her. When she returned, she pitched the idea of doing a similar program to WBEZ, Chicago's Public radio station. Donna became a radio host of a program that featured interesting content from current magazine articles; and

WHEREAS, Donna Gerson was an admired and longtime member of the League of Women Voters of Evanston, generously supporting the organization for decades and tirelessly mentoring the organization's newest leaders; her generosity with her time was legendary. As a valued member of the League she worked tirelessly, advocating for justice and equality for all. She was active on the North Shore Summer Project, an open housing initiative and was a passionate supporter of Evanston's school integration initiative. She was also an extremely talented writer whose talents were put to good use when she became the editor of the League's newsletter, *The Intercom*. She honed her leadership skills during her early League years and it was with their strong support and encouragement that she ran and won a seat in Evanston's City Council; and

WHEREAS, Donna Gerson's love of politics and leadership abilities were put to work for her community when she was elected by the voters of Evanston's Ninth Ward to be their Alderman. She diligently represented the ward from 1979 to 1983. She also served on Evanston's Zoning Board of Appeals. She forged strong bonds with her fellow elected officials that outlasted their terms of office and spanned decades. They gathered once a month meeting socially to talk about everything from Evanston politics to their grandchildren; and

WHEREAS, Donna was a lifelong learner who had a passion for poetry and loved, in particular Shakespeare's sonnets. She attended classes at Northwestern University's Osher Lifelong Learning Institute and later became a coordinator. Her appreciation for the written word and devotion to her community was acknowledged and she was appointed to be an Evanston Library Trustee. There was no better advocate for the Evanston Public Library. She served two terms, and will long be remembered for her work supporting the expansion of evening hours and the renovation of the aging Chicago Avenue facility. She was also the voice of wisdom during the Youth Service Renovation Project of 2009 and for successfully and diplomatically guiding the process when the library transitioned to a separate tax-levying district; and

WHEREAS, Donna Gerson was a great champion of the principles of participatory democracy and was innovative in her work to further those standards. She coupled her in-depth understanding of government and her talent as a writer to author an instructional piece on how to be an effective advocate before a board or commission which was published in Illinois Issues Magazine; and

WHEREAS, Donna Gerson entered Cook County politics in the late 70's, when she became Administrative Assistant to Commissioner Joanne Alter at the Chicago Metropolitan Water Reclamation District. Later she became a management analyst at the Chicago Metropolitan Sanitary District and retired in 1993; and

WHEREAS, Donna Gerson was a cherished member of her synagogue, Beth Emet. The congregation has a tradition of anonymously delivering food to ill or housebound members of the synagogue. Despite the anonymous nature of the program, it was widely known that in many cases, the items had either been prepared by Donna or delivered by her, or both. Few could match her culinary skills or thoughtfulness. She was also a talented seamstress who learned to sew from a treasured aunt and frequently sewed her children's clothing; and

WHEREAS, the community has lost a great friend in Donna Gerson and she will be sorely missed by her two children Lisa Gerson and Michael Gerson but her loss will be felt most acutely by her husband of 61 years, Stan Gerson and her dear friends of over fifty years, a group of intrepid women known as the "Quintessentials;" and

WHEREAS, Donna Gerson possessed the unique combination of passionate political activism and diplomacy. She regularly achieved her goals without rancor and, as a result was genuinely admired and respected by her peers. She formed and nurtured strong relationships with fellow elected officials and friends that lasted over fifty years.

WHEREAS, H. Woods “Woody” Bowman, chief financial officer for Cook County, former state representative from the 18th district, treasured college professor and dedicated community advocate died on July 10, 2015 leaving behind a devoted family, countless friends and a community profoundly enriched for having known him; and

WHEREAS, Woody Bowman was born and raised in Charleston, West Virginia. His talents revealed themselves very early in life. He was an exceptional student; receiving a dual degree in physics and economics from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He later earned a Master’s Degree in public administration with highest honors and a Ph.D. in economics from the Maxwell School of Syracuse University; and

WHEREAS Woody Bowman came to Chicago as a young man to work as a research economist for the Federal Reserve Bank. During that same time he shared his exceptional talents with his students when he taught economics at the University of Illinois at Chicago;

WHEREAS, Woody Bowman immediately became known for his scrupulous integrity and wisdom in the area of economics and ethics. His expertise in budgetary issues was unparalleled and later made him a trusted advisor to many not-for-profit organizations, politicians and students; and

WHEREAS, Woody Bowman was elected to the Illinois General Assembly by the voters of the 18th district and served for over a decade as their state representative. While there, he made his mark early as a staunch supporter of human services and education. He was a tireless advocate for civil rights and the rights of the mentally ill. More than anything, he is widely credited with vastly improving the accountability and transparency of the budgeting process while acting as chair of the House Appropriations Committee. He had the unique ability to achieve his political goals without rancor and as a result was genuinely admired and respected by those on both sides of the aisle; and

WHEREAS, Woody Bowman’s financial expertise was recognized by Cook County Board President Richard Phelan who selected him to serve as Cook County’s chief financial officer, a position he held for four years. Through the years he has continued to serve the citizens of Cook County, most recently as member of Cook County’s task force on unincorporated areas; and

WHEREAS, Woody Bowman returned to academia in 1995, becoming an assistant professor at DePaul University. He was uniformly regarded as generous instructor, colleague and mentor who respected and took seriously his responsibility to shape the next generation of leaders. Later, he became professor emeritus at DePaul University's School of Public Service where he remained until he retired. Although he had

stopped teaching, he remained a vital part of the campus and was active on various projects at the school; and

WHEREAS, Woody Bowman was a prolific nonprofit researcher and author; he was a regular contributor to the Nonprofit Quarterly *Ethicist* column. Among his other articles were “*Issues in Nonprofit Finance Research: Surplus, Endowment, and Endowment Portfolios*,” with H.P. Tuckman and D.R. Young, “*The Contribution of Corporation Law to Civil Society*,” and “*The Economic Value of Volunteers to Organizations*.” His writing was insightful and informative and was frequently singled out for recognition; and

WHEREAS, Woody Bowman was honored with many awards including the Hodgkinson Research Prize from the Association for Research on Nonprofit Organizations and Voluntary Action (ARNOVA) for his book, “*Finance Fundamentals for Nonprofits: Building Capacity and Sustainability*.” The prize is given to the best book on philanthropy and the nonprofit sector that informs policy and practice; he was later honored with the Best Reviewer Award. DePaul University honored him with their Excellence in Public Service Award in 1999; and

WHEREAS, Woody Bowman will long be remembered for his thorough work and achievement, his high ethical standards, professionalism, and excellent character. Above all, he will be remembered as a model of kindness and affability; and

WHEREAS Woody Bowman was also well known as a man who was extremely generous with his time. He was a member of the Board of Housing Options for the Mentally Ill in Evanston and member of many of its committees for more than twenty-five years. He briefly served as interim president and CEO on a pro bono basis for Goodwill Industries of Metropolitan Chicago. He served on the board of ARNOVA for many years and chaired the planning committee for the 2010 annual conference. He also was a member of the Governor’s Taxpayer Action Board and the Civic Federation’s Cook County Modernization Committee in; and

WHEREAS, the impact felt by the loss of Woody Bowman is significant and has left a tremendous void in the community. His loss will be felt most acutely by his wife of nearly 30 years, Michele Thompson; and

**COMMEMORATING THE LIFE, MANY ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND MEMORY OF
VOYLE “GENE” BELL**

WHEREAS, Voyle “Gene” Bell, pioneering community leader, father figure to countless students and championship winning basketball star passed away on Thursday, July 9. He has left behind a devoted family, countless athletes, friends and a community enriched for having known him; and

WHEREAS, Gene Bell recognized the deep void left when the City of Evanston cut back its middle-school athletic program in 1968. As a result he helped found the Fellowship of African American Men “FAAM”. Not only did FAAM fill the void, it profoundly changed the community and made it a better place. Decades later it remains a much admired and thriving community program that provides good role models for kids, and instills in its athletes the principles of teamwork, discipline and respect for the coaches and officials. Gene Bell was the organization’s greatest champion and became known as “Commissioner for Life;” and **WHEREAS**, Gene Bell moved to Evanston as a young child. He attended Evanston Township High School where he quickly became an athletic star and local legend on the school’s basketball and baseball teams. After graduating he was recruited to attend Upper Iowa University on basketball and baseball scholarships; and

WHEREAS, his education was interrupted by the call of family obligation. Gene Bell returned to Evanston to assist the woman who had raised him, his beloved grandmother Leora Bell, after the passing of her second husband. He credits much of his success to her. “My grandmother made sure I did the right thing. She was the matriarch of our whole family. She meant everything to me;” and

WHEREAS, Gene Bell accepted employment with Row, Peterson Publishing, which later became Harper & Row. When the business moved to Kansas 16 years later, he started his career at Evanston Township High School, first on the custodial staff and later in security, where he became a popular fixture in the school and friend to all. He retired in 1995; and,

WHEREAS, throughout his life, Gene Bell worked tirelessly to ensure the success of FAAM. Under his watch it expanded to reach thousands of kids. Today, FAAM has fourteen boys’ teams, six girls’ teams and three cheerleading squads, comprising approximately 350 youngsters and 70 volunteer coaches/administrators; and

WHEREAS, Gene Bell’s pioneering efforts with FAAM had a far reaching impact on thousands of lives. Nirba White, a FAAM player who played professional basketball overseas, said “Words can’t describe what his leadership and mentoring have meant to the African American community;” and

WHEREAS, Gene Bell’s spirit remains alive in FAAM’s mission to empower youth through athletics and education. A former student-athlete himself, he well understood the importance of excellence on and off the court. Today, FAAM tracks school performance, requires players to maintain a minimum grade point

average, and provides a study program with teachers and tutors on hand after school and on Saturdays to help with homework; and

WHEREAS, Gene Bell’s leadership was not limited to athletics. He played a major role in organizing a union for the Security Department at Evanston Township High School. He was a member of the Candidate Nominating Committee for the school boards of District 65 and District 202 and he served as Co-Chair for the ‘Save Our Children’ community project. His love for baseball led him to become a Little League Umpire for the recreation department of Evanston from 1979 to 1986; and

WHEREAS, Gene Bell’s exceptional abilities singled him out for distinction and the community presented him with numerous honors. In addition to others, he received the William E. Harper Award from the McGraw YMCA and the Distinguished Community Service Award from the NAACP. He was also awarded the “Those Who Excel” honor from the Illinois State Board of Education, the Community Service Award from the Illinois Park and Recreation Association, and the SGMA Heroes “Man of the Year,” and

WHEREAS, Gene Bell is survived by his wife, Constance “Connie” Bell, three daughters Renee Johnson, Gina Bradley and Morma Russell, one son David, one grandson Aaron, three granddaughters Karisa, Shaniece and Tatana, one great grandson and two sisters. Along with many other relatives and friends the community mourns the loss of Gene Bell.

The JAC considers the partnership with Public Allies to be a valuable asset that supports the County's mission to advance the criminal justice reform agenda. In addition, the program enables the JAC to play an active role in helping young adults further their career objectives by providing a work environment that is supportive of the mission of Public Allies Chicago, which is to foster personal development and growth through projects that foster positive social change.

APPOINTING A COOK COUNTY GUN VIOLENCE CZAR AND ESTABLISHING A COOK COUNTY GUN VIOLENCE TASK FORCE

WHEREAS, the past seven months have seen dramatically escalating levels of gun violence in Cook County, especially in the County seat of Chicago; and

WHEREAS, in that time, more than 1,500 people in the City of Chicago have been victims of shootings; and

WHEREAS, more than 2,600 have been victims of shootings in the City of Chicago since January 1, 2014; and

WHEREAS, the past seven months have seen a major rise in shootings on Chicago area expressways, with the Illinois State Police reporting at least 20 expressway shootings since the start of the 2015, including the most recent such expressway shooting which took place on the Eisenhower Expressway on July 20, 2015 and resulted in the partial shutdown of the Eisenhower Expressway; and

WHEREAS, 19 Chicago area expressway shootings occurred in all of 2014; and

WHEREAS, 16 Chicago area expressway shootings occurred on Chicago area expressways in all of 2013; and

WHEREAS, in 2015, year to date, 259 people have died in the City of Chicago of as a result of gunshot wounds; and

WHEREAS, of those 259, roughly 10% were under the age of 18, and 56% were under 26; and

WHEREAS, of those who died in 2014 as a result of gunshot wounds, 14% were under the age of 18, and 59% were under 26; and

WHEREAS, of those who died in 2013 as a result of gunshot wounds, 12% were under the age of 18, and 54% were under 26; and

WHEREAS, despite being only 25% of the population of the City of Chicago, the Cook County Medical Examiner reports that 80% of those killed by gunshot wounds in 2015 have been African American. Specifically, in 2015, year to date, there have been 259 deaths from gunshot wounds, and 207 of those deaths were African American; and

WHEREAS, despite being only 25% of the population of the City of Chicago, the Cook County Medical Examiner reports that 80% of those killed by gunshot wounds in 2014 were African American. Specifically, in 2014, there were 455 deaths from gunshot wounds, and 363 of those deaths were African American; and

WHEREAS, despite being only 25% of the population of the City of Chicago, the Cook County Medical Examiner reports that 80% of those killed by gunshot wounds in 2013 were African American. Specifically, in 2013, there were 425 deaths from gunshot wounds, and 345 of those deaths were African American; and

WHEREAS, the University of Chicago Crime Lab estimated that gun violence in the City of Chicago costs the taxpayers \$2.5 billion each year; and

WHEREAS, the economic burden of that \$2.5 billion cost of gun violence translates to \$2,500 per household; and

WHEREAS, a joint report by Ted Miller of the Pacific Institute for Research and Evaluation and *Mother Jones Magazine* contains findings that gun violence across the country costs the United States \$229 billion each year; and

WHEREAS, that same joint report contains findings that gun violence in Illinois costs the state \$9.6 billion each year, or about \$750 per person; and

WHEREAS, Cook County government has an obligation to take action to protect its residents and taxpayers from gun violence and the resulting cost and trauma to the County; and

WHEREAS, Cook County government, like all units of government, has an obligation to its residents and taxpayers to do everything possible to preserve life, reduce instances of gun violence and minimize the harmful effects that follow acts of gun violence;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED that the President of Cook County and the Board of Commissioners hereby appoint a Cook County Gun Violence Czar and establish a Cook County Gun Violence Task Force; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 14 Community Development, Article VIII Gun Violence Czar and Gun Violence Task Force, Sec. 14-80 through Sec. 14-89 is hereby enacted as follows:

CHAPTER 14- COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

ARTICLE VIII. GUN VIOLENCE CZAR AND GUN VIOLENCE TASK FORCE

Sec. 14-80. Short title.

This chapter shall be known and may be cited as the Gun Violence Czar and Gun Violence Task Force Act.

Sec. 14-81. Definitions.

The following words and terms shall have the meanings set forth in this section, except where otherwise specifically indicated:

Board of Commissioners or County Board means the Board of Commissioners for Cook County, Illinois.

Member means appointed members of the Gun Violence Task Force.

County means "Cook County, Illinois."

Cook County Code means the Code of Ordinances of Cook County, Illinois.

Czar means the Gun Violence Czar.

Ordinance means this ordinance appointing a Gun Violence Czar and establishing the Gun Violence Task Force.

President means the President of the Cook County Board of Commissioners

Report means the Cook County Gun Violence Report.

State means State of Illinois.

Task Force means the Gun Violence Task Force.

Sec. 14-82. Purpose.

(a) The purpose of this Ordinance is to appoint a Gun Violence Czar and create the Gun Violence Task Force, which will serve as an investigative and fact-finding body with the objective of recommending a set of policies to the President and County Board designed to reduce gun violence in Cook County over a period of six months.

(b) The Task Force will hold public hearings chaired by the Gun Violence Czar to gather testimony and data about the economic, social, and cultural causes of gun violence in Cook County and the best methodology for reducing gun violence. The hearings shall take place over a period of time not to exceed six months and shall culminate in a written set of policy recommendations put forth under the authorship of the Gun Violence Czar and designed to reduce gun violence in Cook County effective January 1, 2016.

(c) Such hearings shall be held in the Cook County Board Room on the 5th Floor of the Cook County building at 118 North Clark Street in Chicago, Illinois, and the Gun Violence Czar and Task Force shall have full access to resources necessary to conduct said hearings and make a record of said hearings.

Sec. 14-83. Compliance with law.

As an investigative and fact-finding body empowered by the President and County Board, the Gun Violence Czar and Task Force shall comply with all applicable federal and state laws, rules, regulations, and orders.

Sec. 14-84. Task Force Membership.

- (a) The Task Force shall consist of 9 members:
 - (1) One member designated as the Gun Violence Czar. The Czar shall be appointed by the President, subject to approval by the County Board. The Czar shall serve as the official liaison between the Task Force and local, state, and federal officials, and the Cook County Board of Commissioners. The Czar shall have the power to convene public meetings of the Task Force.
 - (2) One Cook County Commissioner serving as an Ex-Officio Member of the Commission with voting rights. The Ex-Officio Member selected from the Board of Commissioners shall be the same Commissioner tasked with chairing the Cook County Board of Commissioners' Committee on Human Relations.
 - (3) One additional member appointed by the President.
 - (4) Two members appointed by the Cook County State's Attorney.
 - (5) Two members appointed by the Chief Judge of the Circuit Court of Cook County.
 - (6) Two members appointed by the Cook County Sheriff.

14-85. Term of Office.

Unless otherwise provided or revised, the members of the Gun Violence Task Force shall be appointed for a term of six months, subject to the approval of, and extension by the County Board.

14-86. Quorum Requirement, Absenteeism, Administration.

- (a) A quorum shall be necessary in order to conduct all hearings of the Task Force.

14-87. Expert Testimony.

- (a) The primary method of investigation by the Task Force shall be the solicitation, hearing, recording and transcription of expert testimony. Such expert testimony shall include but not be limited to the following categories of professionals:
 - (1) Law Enforcement
 - (2) Physicians and Nurse Practitioners
 - (3) Medical Examiners

- (4) Government Officials
- (5) Experts in Psychiatry and Psychology
- (6) Social Scientists with expertise in any of the following areas:
 - a. Economics
 - b. Criminal Justice
 - c. Conflict Management and Resolution
- (7) Faith and Community Leaders

14-88. Cook County Gun Violence Report.

Having concluded all hearings and investigatory functions, the Gun Violence Czar shall compile the testimony collected by the Task Force, and based on the information furnished through such testimony, shall author and tender a Cook County Gun Violence Report. The length of time between the first hearing and the completion of the Report shall not exceed six months. The Report will contain an overview of factors contributing to gun violence in Cook County, the effects of gun violence on victims and community members, and a set of policy recommendations designed to reduce gun violence and the harmful effects associated with gun violence. The Report shall be furnished to the President, the Board of Commissioners, and all countywide elected and appointed officials. Once the Report is furnished to the aforesaid officials, the Task Force shall convene to review the totality of its proceedings to date and determine the steps necessary in order to implement the policy recommendations set forth in the Report.

Effective date: This ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption

(2) The occupancy of a building or structure shall not be deemed to have changed because of a vacancy of six (6) months or less so long as the identical occupancy is re-established.

(3) Any change in occupancy or new occupancy of a business with a use of structure or use of land located in unincorporated Cook County shall be required to obtain a Business Occupancy Certificate; fee shall be charged as provided by Section 32.1 of the Code.

(4) After the initial occupancy period, businesses shall be subject to Annual Inspection and related fees as provided in this Code.

(i) At each stage of construction, as defined in the permit application, it shall be the duty of the permit holder to notify the appropriate inspector when work completed for each stage is ready for inspection.

(ii) If the inspection reveals that there are violations of the approved plans, the holder of the permit shall be notified of the violations, and it shall thereupon become the joint and several duty of such permit holder, owner, agent, lessee, or occupant to proceed forthwith to make whatever repairs, changes, or alterations may be necessary to make such stage of construction comply in all respects with the requirements of this ordinance and the approved plans, and to complete such repairs, changes, and alterations within 30 days after the receipt of such notice.

(iii) At each stage, if a re-inspection is required due to failure to notify or failure to conform to the approved plans, a re-inspection fee shall be charged as provided by the Field Inspection Fee Schedule in Section 32.1 of the Code.

(iv) Where a re-inspection is required, it shall be at the sole discretion of the inspector whether work on other stages of the construction may commence.

PREVAILING WAGE RATE ORDINANCE

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois has enacted "An Act regulating wages of laborers, mechanics and other workers employed in any public works by the State, county, city or any public body or any political subdivision or by anyone under contract for public works," approved June 26, 1941, codified as amended, 820 ILCS 130/1 et seq. (1993), formerly Ill. Rev. Stat., Ch. 48, par. 39s-1 et seq.; and

WHEREAS, the aforesaid Act requires that the Board of Commissioners of the County of Cook investigate and ascertain the prevailing rate of wages as defined in said Act for laborers, mechanics and other workers in the locality of said County employed in performing construction of public works, for said County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE COUNTY OF COOK:

Section 1. To the extent and as required by "An Act regulating wages of laborers, mechanics and other workers employed in any public works by the State, county, city or any public body or any political subdivision or by anyone under contract for public works," approved June 26, 1941, as amended, the general prevailing rate of wages in this locality for laborers, mechanics and other workers engaged in

the construction of public works coming under the jurisdiction of this County is hereby ascertained to be the same as the prevailing rate of wages for construction work in the Cook County area as determined by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois as of June 2015, a copy of that determination being submitted hereto and incorporated herein by reference. As required by said Act, any and all revisions of the prevailing rate of wages by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois shall supersede the Department's June determination and apply to any and all public works construction undertaken by the County of Cook. The Definition of any terms appearing in this Ordinance which are also used in aforesaid Act shall be the same as in said Act.

Section 2. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply said general prevailing rate of wages as herein ascertained to any work or employment except public works construction of this County to the extent required by the aforesaid Act.

Section 3. The Bureau of Human Resources shall publicly post or keep available for inspection by any interested party in the main office of this Bureau of Human Resources (County) this determination or any revisions of such prevailing rate of wage. A copy of this determination or of the current revised determination of prevailing rate of wages then in effect shall be attached to all contract specifications.

Section 4. The Clerk shall mail a copy of this determination to any employer, and to any association of employers and to any person or association of employees who have filed their names and addresses, requesting copies of any determination stating the particular rates and the particular class of workers whose wages will be affected by such rates.

Section 5. The Bureau of Human Resources shall promptly file a certified copy of this Ordinance with both the Secretary of State Index Division and the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois.

Section 6. The Bureau of Human Resources shall cause to be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the area a copy of this Ordinance, and such publication shall constitute notice that the determination is effective and that this is the determination of this public body.

Section 7. The Purchasing Agent of Cook County shall specify in the call for bids in any contract for public works that the general prevailing rate of wages in the locality for each craft or type of laborer or mechanic needed to execute the contract to perform such work, also the general prevailing rate for legal holiday and overtime work as ascertained by the Bureau of Human Resources, shall be paid for each craft or type of work needed to execute the contract or to perform such work. The Purchasing Agent in awarding the contract shall cause to be inserted in the contract a stipulation to the effect that not less than the prevailing rate of wages, as found by the Bureau of Human Resources, shall be paid to all laborers, workers and mechanics performing work under the contract, and the Purchasing Agent shall also require in all such contractor's bonds that the contract include such provision as will guarantee the faithful performance of such prevailing wage clause as provided by the contract.

Section 8. In the case of any underpayment of the prevailing wage, a penalty of 20% of the underpayment shall be assessed against the contractor or subcontractor; and the 20% penalty shall be payable to the Illinois Department of Labor. Any underpayment that has not been repaid to a worker within thirty-days of violation is subject to an additional 2% of the underpayment as a punitive damage assessment. This is payable to the worker.

Section 9. There is an automatic two (2) year debarment of any contractor or subcontractor found to have violated the Act on two (2) separate occasions. An affected contractor or subcontractor may request the Department to hold a hearing on the alleged violations within ten (10) days notification of the second violation.

COST OF LIVING ADJUSTMENTS AND HEALTH BENEFIT PLAN DESIGN FOR NON-UNION EMPLOYEES AND OFFICIALS

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 5 of the Annual Appropriation Bill and Budget Resolution for Fiscal Year 2015, the Cook County Board of Commissioners (“Board of Commissioners”) provided that “[i]n the event that union employees receive cost of living adjustments in fiscal year 2015 as a result of negotiated and approved 2012-2016 collective bargaining agreements, non-union employees shall also receive cost of living adjustments” subject to the approval of the Budget Director, Chief of the Bureau of Human Resources and the Board of Commissioners; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners have approved salary adjustments and general wage increases for a large number of Cook County employees covered under collective bargaining agreements with said changes being both retroactive and prospective; and

WHEREAS, in consideration of the 2015 Budget Resolution, the Interim Budget Director and the Interim Chief of the Bureau of Human Resources have worked to recommend appropriate salary adjustments for the County's non-union workforce which could be implemented in fiscal year 2015 and going forward; and

WHEREAS, in order to achieve cost savings, it is recommended that any increase in salary for the County's non-union workforce be prospective in nature and not retroactive and that step increases be frozen for the County's non-union workforce in fiscal year 2016; and

WHEREAS, it is recommended that all Grade 23 and lower non-union County employees receive a noncompounded 4.5% cost of living increase effective the first pay period of October, 2015; and

WHEREAS, it is recommended that all Grade 24 and Grade 24 Equivalent positions receive an increase effective the first pay period in October, 2015; however, said increase will be tied to length in current position and certain salaried positions will be exempt from such increase; and

WHEREAS, it is recommended that all non-union employees unless otherwise exempt herein shall receive a compounded 2% cost of living in the 2016 fiscal year with said increase taking effect on December 1, 2015; and

WHEREAS, in order to match the union increases provided in the Collective Bargaining Agreements for the period of December 1, 2012 through November 30, 2017, it is contemplated that additional increases may be provided in fiscal year 2017; and

WHEREAS, in addition to providing cost of living adjustments for the County's non-union workforce, it is further recommended that the health plan revisions implemented for the unionized workforce include the County's non-union employees and elected officials; and

WHEREAS, the proposed health plan revisions impact both plan designs and employee contributions and are recommended to be implemented effective December 1, 2015 with additional contributions taking effect in fiscal year 2016; and

WHEREAS, the proposed revised health plans continue to provide excellent benefits coverage at reasonable rates to participating employees and officials; and

WHEREAS, the County continues to review benefit options for all participating employees and officials; and

WHEREAS, these healthcare plan revisions are a necessary improvement with both positive financial and administrative impacts.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the President and the Cook County Board of Commissioners does hereby resolve that the following cost of living adjustments be provided for the County's non-union workforce by the Budget Director and the Chief of the Bureau of Human Resources:

Section 1. All Grade 23 and lower non-union County employees shall receive a non-compounded 4.5% cost of living increase effective the first pay period of October, 2015.

Section 2. All Grade 24 and Grade 24 Equivalent (including, but not limited to Grades A35, A34, A33, A32, A31, D12, D11, D10, NS2, NS3, NS4, and NS5) employees in their current position as of June 1, 2013 shall receive a non-compounded 4.5% cost of living increase effective the first pay period of October, 2015. All Grade 24 and Grade 24 Equivalent employees with a current annual salary of \$200,000 or greater shall not be eligible for this cost of living increase nor should employees in a K12 position be eligible for the cost of living increase.

Section 3. All Grade 24 and Grade 24 Equivalent (including, but not limited to Grades A35, A34, A33, A32, A31, D12, D11, D10, NS2, NS3, NS4, and NS5) employees in their current position on or after June 2, 2013 through June 1, 2014 shall receive a non-compounded 3.5% cost of living increase effective the first pay period of October, 2015. All Grade 24 and Grade 24 Equivalent employees with a current annual salary of \$200,000 or greater shall not be eligible for this cost of living increase nor should employees in a K12 position be eligible for the cost of living increase.

Section 4. All Grade 24 and Grade 24 Equivalent (including, but not limited to Grades A35, A34, A33, A32, A31, D12, D11, D10, NS2, NS3, NS4, and NS5) employees in their current position on or after June 2, 2014 through June 1, 2015 shall receive a non-compounded 2.0% cost of living increase effective the first pay period of October, 2015. All Grade 24 and Grade 24 Equivalent employees with a current annual salary of \$200,000 or greater shall not be eligible for this cost of living increase nor should employees in a K12 position be eligible for the cost of living increase.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 42, Human Relations, Article

II, Human Rights, Section 42-42 of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as Follows:

Section 42-42. County economic incentives.

- (a) Prohibition. No person or entity who is the beneficiary of an economic incentive provided by Cook County ("County") shall engage in unlawful discrimination or sexual harassment against any individual in the terms or conditions of employment, credit, public accommodations, housing, or provision of facilities, services or programs. "Sexual harassment" has such meaning as is ascribed to it in other sections of this article.
- (b) Provisions of County Economic Incentive Agreements. The Cook County Bureau of Economic Development, and all other department heads, as necessary and authorized, shall include a provision in all County economic incentive agreements that details the County's policies with respect to unlawful discrimination and sexual harassment, as embodied in this article, and that requires every recipient of a County-provided economic incentive to certify its compliance with these policies and its agreement to abide by such policies as a part of the recipient's obligations under the incentive agreement. All County economic incentive agreements shall further provide that if any recipient of an economic development incentive from County is found to have violated any provision of this article, or furnished false or misleading information in any investigation, hearing, or inquiry held pursuant to this article, that incentive will as a result be subject to immediate termination.
- (c) Disclosure and Disqualification. Any person or entity applying to receive an economic incentive from or otherwise benefit from an economic incentive provided by Cook County shall be required

to disclose whether that person or entity has been found guilty of or liable for, or settled a claim related to a charge of unlawful discrimination or sexual harassment. If, as a result of the applicant's compliance with the disclosure requirement, it is shown that the applicant has been found guilty of or liable for, or settled a claim related to a charge of unlawful discrimination or sexual harassment, both the applicant and the application shall be disqualified, and the applicant shall be prospectively barred from receiving or benefitting from an economic incentive provided by Cook County.

- (d) Post-Award Disclosure. If the recipient or beneficiary of an economic incentive provided by Cook County fails to properly comply with the disclosure requirement set forth in Section 42-42(c), and is subsequently learned to have been found guilty of or liable for, or settled a claim related to a charge of unlawful discrimination or sexual harassment, the economic incentive to which that person or entity is a party shall be immediately terminated, and the recipient or beneficiary of that economic incentive shall be required to repay the sum total of incentive proceeds and / or benefits received to date.

Sec. 42-42 43. - Effective date. This article shall take effect 60 days after becoming law.

ARTICLE V. - SERVICE OCCUPATION TAX

Sec. 74-190. - Short title.

This article shall be known and may be cited as the Cook County Home Rule County Service Occupation Tax Ordinance.

Sec. 74-191. - Imposed.

As authorized by 55 ILCS 5/5-1007 (home rule county service occupation tax law), a tax is imposed Countywide upon all persons in the County engaged in the business of making sales of service at the rate of one and one-quarter percent (1.25%) through December 31, 2011; one percent (1%) for the period of January 1, 2012 through December 31, 2012; three-quarters percent (0.75%) through December 31, 2015; and one and three-quarters percent (1.75%) thereafter of the selling price of all tangible personal property transferred by such serviceperson either in the form of tangible personal property or in the form of real estate as an incident to a sale of service. The imposition of any future increase in the service occupation tax after January 1, 2016 may not be adopted by the Cook County Board of Commissioners unless approved by a two-thirds vote of the members of the Cook County Board of Commissioners then holding office. The tax shall be paid in the manner provided in such statute.

WHEREAS, Roseland Community Hospital is located in a healthcare desert and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services has designated it as serving a medically underserved area/population, and as a primary care, mental health and dental health professional shortage area.

WHEREAS, should Roseland Community Hospital be forced to close due to the current funding crisis, residents would have to travel five miles to the next closest hospital, Advocate Trinity, and nearly eight miles to the nearest trauma center, Advocate Christ, putting residents with life-threatening conditions at a greatly increased risk of death or negative health outcome.
