PROPOSED RESOLUTION

CALLING FOR A HEARING OF THE HEALTH AND HOSPITALS COMMITTEE TO RECEIVE AN UPDATE ON THE FULL SPECTRUM OF MATERNAL HEALTH CARE AND MORBIDITY & MORTALITY RATES IN COOK COUNTY

WHEREAS, each year in the U.S., hundreds of women die from complications related to pregnancy and childbirth, known as maternal death, at a rate many times greater than in other developed nations; and

WHEREAS, maternal death/mortality is defined by the World Health Organization (WHO) as "the death of a woman while pregnant or within 42 days of termination of pregnancy, irrespective of the duration and the site of the pregnancy, from any cause related to or aggravated by the pregnancy or its management, but not from accidental or incidental causes, and maternal morbidity as "any health condition attributed to and/or complicating pregnancy, and childbirth that has a negative impact on the woman's well-being and/or functioning"; and

WHEREAS, Health and Human Services officials and stakeholders stated that the pandemic worsened factors contributing to maternal health disparities, like access to care, cardiovascular problems and other underlying conditions; and

WHEREAS, in 2021, the U.S. had one of the worst rates of maternal mortality in the country's history going back to 1965. 1,205 people died of maternal causes in the U.S. in 2021, which represents a 40% increase from the previous year, and the U.S. rate for 2021 was 32.9 maternal deaths per 100,000 live births, which is more than ten times the estimated rates of some other high-income countries, including Australia, Austria, Israel, Japan and Spain which all reported between 2 and 3 deaths per 100,000 in 2020; and

WHEREAS, according to the CDC, cardiovascular conditions such as pulmonary embolisms, uncontrolled bleeding and problems emanating from hypertension are the leading cause of pregnancy-related deaths in the U.S. and sadly most, up to 91%, of maternal deaths due to clinical, system, social, community or patient factors are preventable, as the health-care solutions to prevent or manage complications are well known, and more than half of pregnancy-related deaths occur more than 60 days postpartum; and

WHEREAS, the maternal death rate for Black or African American women was 44.0 per 100,000 live births in 2019, then increased to 55.3 in 2020, and 68.9 in 2021. In contrast, White (not Hispanic or Latina) women had death rates of 17.9, 19.1, and 26.1, respectively; and

WHEREAS, the maternal death rate for Hispanic or Latina women was lower 12.6 per 100,000 live births compared with White (not Hispanic or Latina) women 17.9 in 2019, but increased significantly during the pandemic in 2020 to 18.2 and in 2021 to 27.5 per 100 live births; and

WHEREAS, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) the 12-month ending provisional maternal mortality rates by race ending June 2024 are as follows: Hispanic or Latina 13.8 per 100,000 live births, White non-Hispanic 15.3, Asian non-Hispanic 14.6 and Black non-Hispanic 51.2; and

WHEREAS, according to the 2023 Illinois Maternal Morbidity and Mortality Report, 43% of women who died while pregnant or within one year of pregnancy died from a cause related to pregnancy, and the leading cause of pregnancy-related death was substance use disorder, which comprised 32% of pregnancy-related deaths and the other 68% most common causes of pregnancy-related death were cardiac and coronary conditions, pre-existing chronic medical conditions, sepsis, mental health conditions, and embolism; and

WHEREAS, for mental health conditions and substance use disorders, all racial/ethnic groups had similar pregnancy related mortality ratios, but for medical causes of death, Black women had a pregnancy-related mortality ratio nearly three times that of White women; and

WHEREAS, disparities in other adverse maternal outcomes, such as preterm and low birthweight births and severe maternal morbidity, which represents a group of potentially life-threatening unexpected maternal conditions or complications that occur during labor and delivery that may cause long-lasting health problems that extend beyond the pregnancy, persisted for Black or African American women; and

WHEREAS, according to the 2022 Illinois Task Force on Infant and Maternal Mortality Among African Americans report, the crisis of non-Hispanic Black/African American infant and maternal mortality and morbidity in states, especially Illinois, mirrors the larger trends seen across the country. Non-Hispanic Black/African American women in Illinois are about three times as likely to experience a pregnancy-related death as White and Hispanic women, and Non-Hispanic Black/African American women also have the highest severe maternal morbidity (SMM) rate at 132.4 per 10,000 live births, more than two times the rate of non-Hispanic White women and significantly higher than Asian and Hispanic women; and

WHEREAS, overall, women in Illinois with no prenatal care had a severe maternal morbidity rate that was nearly three times that of women with adequate prenatal care; and

WHEREAS, in addition, contraceptive care plays a crucial role in improving maternal health outcomes in the United States by preventing unintended pregnancies and sexually transmitted infections (STIs), promoting healthy birth spacing, reducing maternal mortality, enhancing access to prenatal care, improving socioeconomic outcomes, and improving health disparities; and

WHEREAS, contraceptive care also involves ensuring that individuals have access to a range of contraceptive methods. Some populations, such as those with limited access to the healthcare systems due to geography, income, or fear and distrust in the medical system, experience additional barriers accessing contraceptive care (e.g., transportation, time off of work, and childcare needed for an individual to get to their provider and/or pharmacy to access the contraceptive method of choice), which can significantly impact continuation or appropriate utilization of contraception. Contraceptives are often time-sensitive medications or devices, and, when access is limited, can result in unintended pregnancies; and

WHEREAS, ensuring increased access to the contraception method of choice by making all contraceptives available at healthcare facilities the same day, increasing access to pharmacist-prescribed contraception, and increasing use of telemedicine for contraceptive care can help decrease negative maternal health outcomes; and

WHEREAS, uterine fibroids are a less discussed but severe maternal morbidity factor. According to the National Institute for Health Care Management (NIHCM) Foundation, more than 70% of US women will experience uterine fibroids by 50 years old and they are the most common reason, aside from cancer, that women have their uterus removed through hysterectomy, but for Black women that rate is over 80%. Overall, uterine fibroids become more common, from age 30 to menopause, but Black women develop fibroids at a younger age, have more severe symptoms and develop higher rates of complications; and

WHEREAS, Black women deserve access to high-quality and equitable health care for all maternal health needs, including the treatment of uterine fibroids, and an increased focus on education and advocacy on fibroids prevention, symptoms, treatment, and car as well as adequate insurance coverage are necessary to improve this aspect of Black women's maternal health and fertility; and

WHEREAS, although fibroids are benign tumors, negative maternal health outcomes for Black women who experience them, including late detections of diagnoses, increased rates of surgery-related mortality, and increased rates of hysterectomies have persisted, in fact across the U.S., women of African ancestry are more likely to be offered hysterectomy as the only treatment; and

WHEREAS, Black women with fibroids of all socioeconomic statuses and education levels suffer from a lack of fibroids relief because of non-comprehensive and costly treatment plans, minimal insurance coverage for scans, and harmful, invasive removals; and

WHEREAS, women who undergo infertility treatment, particularly in vitro fertilization (IVF), are at somewhat higher risk of severe maternal morbidity or death. Efforts are needed to identify patient and treatment-specific predictors of severe maternal morbidity that may influence the type of treatment a woman is offered; and

WHEREAS, women who conceived by IVF have a greater than two-fold higher risk of severe maternal morbidity and this higher risk is evident across all racial/ethnic groups. However, non-Hispanic Black and Hispanic women who conceived by IVF had a higher risk of uterine rupture/hysterectomy, and Asian women who conceived by IVF had a higher risk of ICU admission; and

WHEREAS, over the last two years, Commissioner Miller convened two maternal health public hearings to address this crisis and worked with the leadership at Cook County Health (CCH) to secure \$1 million to launch the 1st Doula program at CCH; and

WHEREAS, Doula services not only are shown to improve maternal health outcomes, but are a way of reducing costs associated with maternal mortality and morbidity due to less dependence on pain medication; shorter duration of labor, less time in the hospital; fewer operative deliveries, such as C-section episiotomy; higher APGAR (newborn) scores; decreased infant mortality; and decreased maternal mortality; and

WHEREAS, Commissioner Miller also sponsored a National Association of Counties (NACo) policy resolution that urges the Federal Government and Congress to assist counties by providing funding for increased doula services and training to ameliorate maternal health outcomes for all women and address racial disparities in maternal health, mortality, and morbidity, which was approved at the annual NACo Conference in July 2024; and

WHEREAS, midwives are healthcare providers who are trained to provide obstetric and gynecological services, including primary care, prenatal and obstetric care, and routine gynecological care like annual exams and contraception, also play an important role in maternal health; and

WHEREAS, midwives are usually not physicians, but often work alongside obstetricians and gynecologists (Ob/Gyns) in a hospital to ensure you have access to any care needed, and is recommended when pregnancy is low-risk; and

WHEREAS, the use of midwives and doulas have been shown to improve birth outcomes. Midwives are an important component of the health care workforce, attending 12% of births in the U.S. in 2021, according to a U.S. Government Accountability Office report. Midwife-attended births are associated with fewer medical interventions, and there are efforts to grow and diversify the midwifery workforce to help improve maternal health outcome disparities and reduce mortality and morbidity; and

WHEREAS, Cook County Health (CCH), the Cook County Department of Public Health (CCDPH) and CountyCare have been actively studying and trying to improve maternal morbidity and mortality rates and the health disparities that contribute to adverse pregnancy outcomes, including the above-mentioned doula care program, which launched January 2025; and

WHEREAS, the Health & Hospitals Committee, is the ideal platform to hold the 3rd annual maternal health public hearing to bring together stakeholders from CCH, CCDPH, CountyCare and other healthcare providers and experts to receive an update on the data, and to learn about solutions being implemented to improve maternal morbidity and mortality rates in Cook County as well as discuss the full spectrum of maternal health care.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners does hereby request a public hearing of the Health and Hospitals Committee be held to bring together key maternal health stakeholders in order to fully understand the factors leading to high maternal morbidity and mortality rates including but not limited to access to contraceptives, detection, treatment and management of uterine fibroids, and IVF treatments; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that representatives from Cook County Health, the Cook County Department of Public Health, CountyCare, the Illinois Department of Public Health, outside healthcare providers and any other pertinent stakeholder representatives are requested to appear before the Health & Hospitals Committee and be prepared to give an overview to the committee and answer questions related to maternal health overall as well as disparities in maternal morbidity and mortality rates in Cook County and Illinois; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that each stakeholder be prepared to provide the most up to date data on such rates and the factors that have contributed to them including but not limited to: access to contraceptives, detection, treatment and management of uterine fibroids, and IVF treatments; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that each stakeholder be prepared to provide short and long-term recommendations to prevent pregnancy related deaths and improve maternal morbidity and mortality rates in Cook County and Illinois including updates on programs that have been implemented, such as the CCH Doula Program or should be implemented.

THE HONORABLE TONI PRECKWINKLE, PRESIDENT OF THE COOK COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

LEVY OF TAXES FOR FISCAL YEAR 2025

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners and the Committee on Finance of the Board of Commissioners of Cook County, Illinois, have considered the subject of the Annual Tax Levy for the Fiscal Year, 2025, and the several sums necessary to be levied to meet the needs and requirements of the County of Cook for said fiscal year, and have recommended that this Ordinance for the Levy of Taxes be adopted; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of Cook County, Illinois, approved, passed, and adopted the Annual Appropriation Bill of the County of Cook, for its Fiscal Year 2025, which said Appropriation Bill is hereinafter set forth and which contains a Revenue Estimate that includes an allocation of the 2025 Tax Levy by Fund together with additional columns captioned: "ANNUAL TAX LEVY", "APPROPRIATION ALLOWANCE FOR UNCOLLECTED TAXES" and "NET TAX LEVY FOR APPROPRIATION"; and

WHEREAS, Cook County and its taxpayers have benefited from Tax Increment Financing Districts (TIFs) by having the increment generated during the life of the TIFs invest in the specific area generating the increment; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Board passed a Resolution on November 15, 2011, outlining that it is the policy of Cook County to recapture any property taxes at the termination of a TIF; and

WHEREAS, within the County of Cook, certain real-estate parcels, or a portion of the assessed valuation of certain real-estate parcels, are from time to time identified on the County real-estate tax rolls as deriving from new property, insofar as they were developed or substantially improved or are the subject of tax incentives that expired since the most recent assessment of real-estate taxes, the value of which has not heretofore been recaptured; and

WHEREAS, the interests of County taxpayers and the County itself are better served if the taxes on the additional value of said new property is captured.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, and ordered by the Board of Commissioners of Cook County, Illinois, that pursuant to its home rule powers, \$720,483,542 as a base levy amount, plus a TIF value recapture sum of \$38,226,594, an expiring incentives sum of \$4,494,965, and a new-property value capture sum of \$52,354,857 which aggregate amount of these sums is to be collected from the Annual Tax Levy for the Fiscal Year 2025 of the County of Cook for the Public Safety Fund purposes of said County, and for the Health Enterprise Fund purposes of said County, and for the payment of principal and interest on general obligation bonds of said County as represented by the Bond and Interest fund purposes, and for Cook County Employees Annuity and Benefit Fund purposes, and for the Election Fund purposes, and Capital Project purposes said aggregate amount being \$815,559,958, which is the total amount of appropriations heretofore legally made from the Annual Tax Levy for the year 2025 and contained in the Annual Appropriation Bill (hereinafter set forth in the Ordinance) for the Fiscal Year 2025 duly adopted by the Board of Commissioners of Cook County on November 21, 2024, is hereby levied on and upon all taxable property in the said County of Cook for the Fiscal Year 2025.

As provided in the Fiscal Year 2025 Annual Appropriation Bill, three percent of the property tax levy revenues separately allocated to the Public Safety Fund, Health Enterprise Fund, Capital Project Fund, and Election Fund are to be made available to each Fund for purposes of covering the loss and cost of collecting taxes levied for said Funds; for the amounts of taxes for which the nonpayment will result in forfeiture of real estate; and for abatements in the amounts of such taxes as extended upon the collectors' books. To ensure the County meets its obligations for indebtedness as represented by the Bond and Interest Fund, and that the actual collections of property taxes received by the Annuity and Benefit Fund are commensurate with the amounts so levied, the County Clerk is authorized, in consultation with the County's Chief Financial Officer, to extend loss and collections for these funds in a manner that is sufficient for these purposes.

The specific amounts herein levied for the various purposes heretofore named are stated in this Ordinance and Tax Levy and itemized by Fund in the Revenue Estimate of the Annual Appropriation Bill, including a column captioned: "ANNUAL TAX LEVY". The tax hereby levied for said Fiscal Year 2025 for said appropriations, to be collected from this Levy, being the aforesaid total, consists of the following specific amount levied for the various purposes hereinafter set forth:

WHEREAS, when formed in 1831, Cook County's original boundaries included all of McHenry, Lake, DuPage and parts of Kane and Will. The other counties were separately created between 1836 and 1839, leading to Cook County's current boundaries; and

WHEREAS, Cook County was named for Daniel Pope Cook (1794 - October 16, 1827). Originally from Kentucky, Cook moved to Illinois and became a lawyer, newspaper publisher, politician and one of the early advocates of statehood for Illinois. An anti-slavery advocate, he was the state's first Attorney General, and then congressman. It is believed Cook never visited the area which would be named in his honor; and

WHEREAS, the first Cook County Board of Commissioners was elected on March 7, 1831, taking office and holding their first meeting the following day. Three (3) commissioners-Gholson Kercheval, Samuel Miller and James Walker-convened a meeting at Fort Dearborn on the Chicago Settlement lakeshore, in the magazine (powder room). The first County Board meeting would last for two (2) days; and

WHEREAS, also elected on March 7 were Sheriff James Kinsey and Coroner John K. Clark. County Clerk William See, County Treasurer Archibald Clybourn, were appointed March 8 and Jedediah Wooley, Jr was recommended as County Surveyor to the Governor and Legislature; and

WHEREAS, one of the first acts of the new board was approval of a Resolution asking Illinois for 10 acres of land including the corner of Clark and Randolph for the location of a new County Courthouse. This

building would be completed in 1835 and included a small stockade which served as the first County Jail and later added an Almshouse which was the forerunner of the County Hospital, Since the land was granted to the County, the corner of Clark and Randolph Streets in Chicago has been the headquarters of Cook County Government; and

WHEREAS, the official population of Cook County at the time of its founding was 100 (a count of settlers, not including Native Americans forcibly removed from the local area). The Chicago settlement (Chicago was not incorporated as a town until 1833) had 50 to 60 residents; and

WHEREAS, Cook County would become a leader in growing the region, the state and the nation; blazing trails in the fields of transportation, food processing, public health, education, juvenile justice, art and music. The dynamic and diverse county population would swell the county population to 350,000 in 1870, over 1.1 million 20 years later and 1.8 million at the turn of the 20th Century. By 1910, Cook County had 2.4 million residents, surpassing three million residents by 1920. By 1940, Cook County grew to four million residents. In 1960, Cook County population totaled 5.1 million; and

WHEREAS, the history of Cook County Government contributed directly to the development of the region and the State of Illinois, with many projects and initiatives of several County departments directly impacting the economic and political direction of the region for years to come; and

WHEREAS, in December 2019, the Cook County Board of Commissioners determined that, in celebration of the County's bicentennial anniversary, a new flag would be created to be representative of the bountiful geography, history, culture and diversity of Cook County; and

WHEREAS, the new Cook County Flag, which was approved and adopted on June 16, 2022, symbolically represents many of these initiatives including: the provision of health services to all as an essential County mission and the creation over time of institutions to fulfill that mission including John H. Stroger, Jr., Provident and Oak Forest Hospitals; the Ruth M. Rothstein CORE Center, the Ambulatory Care Network and the Cook County Department of Public Health; the protection of individual rights and voting rights through County ordinances and the conduct of free and fair elections for the entire jurisdiction of Cook County; the protection and preservation of the environment including natural lands and open spaces primarily through the establishment of the Forest Preserves in 1914; the establishment of the world's first juvenile court system, which separated children from adults with an emphasis on individualized treatment instead of rigid adherence to due process, and probation over incarceration, and; the spirit of intergovernmental cooperation with all local governments as partners for progress through the work of county offices and agencies; and

WHEREAS, as Cook County approaches its 200th anniversary-and having developed a unique and extensive collection of public documents and records that contain historical significance-establishing an initiative to archive historically significant documents and records is imperative to County Government history; and

WHEREAS, fundamental to capturing the history of Cook County is a thorough and complete documentation of the history of Cook County Government; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners created a County Historic Archives and Records Office (CARO) to affirmatively coordinate efforts across all departments and with all officials to determine the historical

value of various county documents and records and make recommendations to the Board of Commissioners regarding access and promotion of the County's history; and

WHEREAS, looking forward to Cook County's Bicentennial in 2031, and building upon the previous years' work, CARO seeks to establish a Cook County Archives Center to continue to manage, promote, document, and preserve said materials, activate its collections; and to engage exploratory initiatives to establish sustainable external fiscal support through the development of a foundation to support the ongoing growth of CARO.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the President and the members of the Board of Commissioners of Cook County does hereby celebrate the 194th anniversary of the founding of Cook County, Illinois; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the President and the members of the Board of Commissioners of Cook County are contributing to the preservation of Cook County Government; and encourages all County agencies under all elected and appointed officials to work closely with the Manager of Archives and the Cook County Historic Archives and Records Office (CARO) to preserve the history of their offices, to include all formats of physical and electronic documents, photographs, maps, films, other media and artifacts towards that purpose.

RECOGNIZING JANUARY 23RD, 2025 AS MATERNAL HEALTH AWARENESS DAY IN COOK COUNTY

WHEREAS, in 2018, New Jersey became the first state to recognize January 23rd as Maternal Health Awareness Day through the work of the New Jersey Section of the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecologists (ACOG), Tara Hansen Foundation, Rutgers Robert Wood Johnson Medical School, Rutgers New Jersey Medical School, and other vital organizations that work to help spread awareness and stop maternal mortality; and

WHEREAS, the theme for this year's Maternal Health Awareness Day is "Know What's at Stake" as maternal care access is becoming more and more challenging, with more than one-third (35.1%) of U.S. counties considered maternity care deserts (areas without a single birthing facility or obstetric clinician), according to a 2024 March of Dimes report; and

WHEREAS, more than 2.3 million women aged 15-44 live in counties considered maternity care deserts, with no access to obstetric care, birth centers, ob-gyns or certified perinatal practitioners; and

WHEREAS, many people, including those in the postpartum period, are losing Medicaid coverage following the end of the COVID-19 public health emergency, and the 12 months immediately after delivery can be critical because that is when some of the deadliest pregnancy-related complications occur; and

WHEREAS, Health and Human Services officials and stakeholders reported that the Covid-19 pandemic worsened factors contributing to maternal health disparities, like access to care, cardiovascular problems and other underlying conditions, which contributed to a 78% overall increase in maternal mortality rates in the U.S. between 2000-2020. The maternal death rate for Black or African American (not Hispanic or Latina) women was 44.0 per 100,000 live births in 2019, then increased to 55.3 in 2020, and 68.9 in 2021. In contrast, White (not Hispanic or Latina) women had death rates of 17.9, 19.1, and 26.1, respectively; and

WHEREAS, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) the 12-month ending provisional maternal mortality rates by race ending June 2024 are as follows: Hispanic or Latina 13.8 per 100,000 live births, White non-Hispanic 15.3, Asian non-Hispanic 14.6 and Black non-Hispanic 51.2; and

WHEREAS, these results are unacceptable and occur regardless of income or education levels. A person's race should never determine their health outcomes, and pregnancy and childbirth should be safe for all; and

WHEREAS, as the wealthiest nation in the world, the U.S. should also be the safest place in the world to be pregnant and give birth; however, we are consistently among the least safe, with rates of maternal mortality and serious injury continuing to grow at an alarming rate; and

WHEREAS, in 2021, the U.S. had one of the worst rates of maternal mortality in the country's history going back to 1965. 1,205 people died of maternal causes in the U.S. in 2021, which represents a 40% increase from the previous year, and the U.S. rate for 2021 was 32.9 maternal deaths per 100,000 live births, which is more than ten times the estimated rates of some other developed countries, including Australia, Austria, Israel, Japan and Spain which all reported between 2 and 3 deaths per 100,000 in 2020; and

WHEREAS, in addition, the infant mortality rate increased significantly in 2022 for the first time in two decades; and

WHEREAS, according to the CDC, cardiovascular conditions such as pulmonary embolisms, uncontrolled bleeding and problems emanating from hypertension are the leading cause of pregnancy-related deaths in the U.S. and most, over 80% are preventable and nearly half of maternal deaths occur between seven and 365 days postpartum, not during delivery itself; and

WHEREAS, each year, more than 50,000 individuals in the United States suffer from a "near miss" or severe maternal morbidity, which includes potentially life-threatening complications that arise from labor and childbirth; and

RECOGNIZING JANUARY 2025 AS CERVICAL HEALTH AWARENESS MONTH IN COOK COUNTY

WHEREAS, the United States Congress designated January as Cervical Health Awareness Month; and

WHEREAS, cervical cancer is the fourth most common cancer in women globally with an estimated 660,000 new cases and 350,000 deaths in 2022, according to the World Health Organization (WHO); and

WHEREAS, the American Cancer Society's estimates for cervical cancer in the United States for 2024 are approximately 13,820 new cases of invasive cervical cancer will be diagnosed and about 4,360 women will die as a result of this diagnosis, but the disease is preventable with vaccination and appropriate screening such as Pap and HPV tests; and

WHEREAS, like many diseases, racial disparities are troubling for cervical cancer, where the death rate is 65% higher in Black women than in White women, even though both groups self-report similar screening efforts, accordingly in Illinois, cervical cancer incidence and mortality rates are highest in Black and Latina women and lowest in White women; and

WHEREAS, human papillomavirus (HPV) is the #1 cause of cervical cancer; however, HPV vaccines can help prevent infection from both high-risk HPV types that can lead to cervical cancer and low risk types that cause genital warts; and

WHEREAS, the CDC recommends all boys and girls get the HPV vaccine at age 11 or 12, but vaccination is available through age 26; and

WHEREAS, the vaccine produces a stronger immune response when taken during the preteen years, and it is for this reason that up until age 14, only two doses of the vaccine are required; and

WHEREAS, young women and men can get the vaccine up to age 26, but for those 15 and older, a full three-dose series is needed; and

HONORING NATIONAL BLOOD DONOR MONTH

WHEREAS, National Blood Donor Month was a proclamation issued by President Richard Nixon in 1970. Its purpose was to recognize the critical role of blood donation, sustaining the nation's healthcare system; and

WHEREAS, before the First World War, blood transfusions were risky and often a fatal procedure due to the lack of knowledge about blood compatibility and coagulation; and

WHEREAS, during the war, Canadian doctor Lawrence Bruce Robertson pioneered the use of direct transfusion techniques on the battlefield allowing blood to be transferred directly from donor to patient, saving many lives; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Philip Syng Physick performed the first human blood transfusion in 1795, and the first transfusion of human blood for treating hemorrhaging in England in 1818 by Dr. James Blundell; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Charles R. Drew, an African American surgeon, educator, medical researcher, and one of the pioneers of blood banking during World War II, discovered that plasma had a longer shelf life than blood and could be separated to be used in transfusions. His work saved thousands during World War II and laid the groundwork for long-term blood preservation and storage techniques that have saved countless lives. Dr. Drew was also the first medical director of the American Red Cross blood bank in which he laid the foundation for modern blood banking; and

WHEREAS, Cook County Health is home to the nation's first blood bank opened by Dr. Bernard Fantus at Cook County Hospital on March 15, 1937. Dr. Fantus' work made it possible to provide blood to save the lives of many patents; and

WHEREAS, Cook County Health now transfuses 800-900 units of blood products per month, helping patients who may need transfusions due to a surgery, cancer treatment, childbirth or a traumatic injury or burn; and

WHEREAS, the transfusion of red blood cells has become a relatively common procedure. In the United States, around 15 million units are transfused annually, while about 85 million units are transfused worldwide; and

WHEREAS, maintaining an adequate blood supply is often challenging due to factors such as seasonal fluctuations, unforeseen emergencies, a limited shelf life or certain blood types, and not enough donations from minority groups; and

WHEREAS, approximately 38% of the country's population is eligible to donate blood and roughly 10% actually do; and

WHEREAS, according to the Stanford Blood Center, the average blood donors are college-educated, Caucasian males between the ages of 30 and 50; and

WHEREAS, according to a study conducted by researchers at Emory University, approximately 78% of blood donations come from white donors, while Black donors supplied about 16%, and other donors of color gave even less; and

WHEREAS, in America today, 19.5% of all blood donations come from communities of color. Increasing the amount minority blood donors is one of the best ways to support those living with diseases such as sickle cell and other ailments; and

WHEREAS, blood bank organizations, health care organizations and advocates, and community organizations have dedicated January as a month to strongly advocate for blood donation with an emphasis on the ongoing need for blood and blood products; and

WHEREAS, the Lifeline: Save Chicago Initiative, in partnership with Cook County Commissioner Tara Stamps and the 1st District of Cook County, are dedicated to increasing donor awareness and participation in underserved and underrepresented communities of color. This initiative emphasizes the importance of local blood donations to meet critical needs in these communities; and

WHEREAS, the Lifeline: Save Chicago Initiative also seeks to partner with schools, faith-based organizations, and community groups to provide education and engagement opportunities, addressing barriers to donation while inspiring a new generation of donors; and

WHEREAS, under the leadership of Lamekia Davis, Executive Director of Operations, and with the unwavering support of Commissioner Tara Stamps, the Community Blood Center is committed to ensuring that the partnership with Cook County expands outreach, builds trust, and fosters sustainable donor programs in communities that are often disproportionately affected by the need for blood transfusions.

REQUESTING A MEETING OF THE COOK COUNTY HEALTH AND HOSPITALS COMMITTEE TO RECEIVE AN UPDATE FROM COOK COUNTY HEALTH AND THE COOK COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH ON THEIR COVID-19 AND OTHER DISEASES OF CONCERN IMMUNIZATION and MITIGATION PLANS IN SUBURBAN COOK COUNTY

WHEREAS, on January 27, 2020, the United States Secretary of Health and Human Services declared that COVID-19, a respiratory illness spread by close contact through respiratory droplets, presents a public health emergency, and the World Health Organization characterized the COVID-19 outbreak as a pandemic on March 11, 2020; and

WHEREAS, despite advances in treatment protocols and the availability of vaccines, COVID-19 continues to be a serious disease across the U.S. and Cook County, and;

WHEREAS, as of November 30, 2022, there have been 655,646 confirmed cases of SARS-CoV-2 in Suburban Cook County under the jurisdiction of the Cook County Department of Public Health with ,309 reported deaths; and

WHEREAS, on August 31, 2022, the FDA amended the emergency use authorizations (EUAs) of the Moderna COVID-19 Vaccine and the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine to authorize bivalent formulations of the vaccines (in individuals in individuals 18 years of age and older for Moderna and 12 years of age and older for Pfizer-BioNTech) for use as a single booster dose at least two months following primary OR at least two months following monovalent booster vaccination; and

WHEREAS, the FDA has also revised the EUA of the Moderna COVID-19 Vaccine and the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine to remove the use of the monovalent Moderna and Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccines for booster administration for individuals 18 years of age and older and 12 years of age and older, respectively; however, they continue to be authorized for use for administration of a primary series for individuals 6 months of age and; and

WHEREAS, the Novavax COVID-19 vaccine is currently approved for individuals 12 and up; and

WHEREAS, the ever-changing nature of this virus has necessitated routine updates for the benefit of Commissioners and the public to stay abreast of the latest mitigation and vaccine protocols, proving essential to combatting the pandemic and to building back better; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Department of Public Health (CCDPH) is the Illinois certified local health department for suburban Cook County, Illinois, with the exception of Evanston, Skokie, Oak Park, and Stickney Township, serving 127 municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Department of Public Health (CCDPH) working alongside the Cook County Department of Emergency Management and Regional Security is charged with making the COVID-19 vaccines available to people in CCDPH's jurisdiction of suburban Cook County; and

WHEREAS, CCDPH is continuing to work with partners at all levels, including hospitals, health care providers and community leaders, to develop flexible and responsive COVID-19 vaccination programs that can accommodate different vaccines and increase uptake of boosters by informing the public and advertising about the vaccines importance with the Boost Up Cook County COVID and flu vaccination campaign, which is particularly important due to the possibility of a 'Tripledemic' of COVID, Flu and RSV this winter; and

WHEREAS, equally important has been to ensure the vaccines are distributed in an equitable fashion, prioritizing those areas and residents of the county that have been most impacted by COVID-19 as a result of longstanding disparities in healthcare system access and delivery; and

WHEREAS, as of November 30, 2022, CCH and CCDPH have administered 1,625,108 million complete vaccine series to suburban residents or 71% of the total population; however, only 14.8% of the population is up to date on recommended vaccines to include boosters.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Health and Hospitals Committee convene a meeting to discuss the Cook County Department of Public Health's COVID-19 mitigation and vaccination efforts for Suburban Cook County; and

Because each child, every human life is filled with promise, and though we continue to be filled with unbearable pain we choose love, belief, and hope instead of anger.

This is a Promise. To do everything in our power to be remembered not as the town filled with grief and victims; but as the place where real change began.

Our hearts are broken; Our spirit is not.

This is our Promise. The Sandy Hook Promise; and

WHEREAS, in November 2014, the first Say Something program teaching the warning signs of potential violence is conducted by Sandy Hook Promise Co-founder Nicole Hockley, at St. John's Church in Columbus, Ohio; and

WHEREAS, in 2015, the first credible school shooting plot is averted in Cincinnati, Ohio, with the help of a Say Something-trained student and guidance counselor; and

WHEREAS, in 2018, the "Say Something Anonymous Reporting System" launches nationwide, becoming the first anonymous reporting system exclusively serving schools 24/7/365; and

WHEREAS, in 2020, Sandy Hook Promise launches "Say Something: Prevent Suicide and Being a Trusted Adult" programs to prevent youth suicide and violence; and

WHEREAS, the "Say Something" program teaches both students and adults about different types of warning signs or threats and how to spot them, understand strategies to take action and overcome potential

barriers to being an "upstander", and how to intervene by telling a trusted adult or using an anonymous reporting system; and

WHEREAS, the City of Chicago ("City"), through ordinance and executive order, has committed to addressing and preventing violence and discrimination against marginalized communities, including the transgender community; and

WHEREAS, Chicago is the deadliest city in the nation for Black trans women; and

WHEREAS, transfemicide, which is the killing of a trans woman because of gender identity, mainly when motivated by transmisogyny, is an example of violence and discrimination that the City has committed to work against; and

WHEREAS, the concept of "chosen family," an idea which refers to a group of individuals who create deep emotional bonds and support systems, often transcending biological or legal ties, often as a result of rejection from a person's biological family due to their sexual orientation or gender identity, leading them to form alternative family structures based on love, acceptance, and mutual support, is recognized as essential within the transgender community, allowing friends and loved ones to celebrate each other's milestones and to support one another in times of crisis; and

WHEREAS, Chicago is home to many community organizations that are well-equipped to meet the needs of trans Chicagoans; and

WHEREAS, the City has acknowledged the importance of collaboration between various government agencies and community organizations in addressing violence and ensuring equity in policy and procedures; and

WHEREAS, the accurate reporting and tracking of hate incidents and hate crimes, including transfemicide, is essential to identifying trends and implementing effective measures to combat violence and discrimination; and

WHEREAS, the City has agreed to establish a working group on transfemicide and protections for the transgender and gender-diverse community, which will be led by the Commissioner of the Chicago Commission on Human Relations in collaboration with the Chicago Police Department and include representatives from the Mayor's Office; the Chicago Commission on Human Relations; the Department of Police; the Department of Family and Support Services, and the Chicago Department of Public Health; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the City's working group is to: (i) review and recommend updates to City policies, procedures, training, and directives related to hate incidents and hate crimes that impact the Black, Indigenous, and people of color (BIPOC) transgender and gender-diverse community by formulating gender-, racial-, and ethno-inclusive, trauma-informed practices that respect the rights of transgender persons and their chosen family; (ii) seek best practices for unified approaches to the issues that the working group seeks to solve, not just in the City, but in the County as well; (iii) to explore solutions to the barriers that chosen family members of transgender victims that keep them from participating in investigative, legal, and support processes traditionally limited to biological family members; and (iv) to explore how best to report incidents of transfemicide, and transfemicide within racial and ethnic communities, to the public; and

WHEREAS, the working group is charged with making every effort to seek the expertise and advice of members of the transgender community and to collaborate with the Cook County government, the Cook

WHEREAS, the City's working group shall hold at least three community meetings to engage and solicit recommendations with the broader transgender community, holding at least one community meeting on the City's South Side, West Side, and far North Side; and

WHEREAS, the City's working group is directed to convene by February 28, 2025 and within six months of its convening, the working group shall (i) recommend data points for reports to the public for instances of transfemicide, transfemicide against BIPOC individuals, and hate crimes and hate incidents against transgender, gender-diverse, or non binary individuals; and (ii) submit a written report to the City's Committee on Health and Human Relations, detailing its findings and recommendations; and

Purpose: Pass-through funding needed renovations of two non-congregate fixed-site permanent shelter locations: Aloha Motel located at 8515 S. Cicero Avenue, Chicago, 60652 and the Margarita Inn located at 1566 Oak Avenue, Evanston, IL, 60201.

The Budget Department has received all requisite documents and determined the fiscal impact on Cook County, if any.

Summary: In June 2024, the Department of Planning and Development, within the Bureau of Economic Development, applied for two awards of \$2,000,000 each, totaling the subject \$4,000,000, through the State of Illinois' Community Development Block Grant-Coronavirus Urban Shelter Program. The Department received Notice of State Award Finalists on November 14, 2024, and expect to receive approval of funds by April 2025.

These funds will be used to renovate two non-congregate shelter facilities: the Aloha Motel located at 8515 S Cicero Avenue, Chicago 60652 and the Margarita Inn located at 1566 Oak Avenue, Evanston, IL 60201.

The Department of Planning and Development has previously received approval through related legislation for the acquisition of the two properties with the goal of conversion to permanent fixed-site shelters. Legislation item 23-4079 allocated \$7,000,000 in ARPA funds for the purchase of an existing hotel, Margarita Inn, in Evanston, IL. Additionally, item number 24-2910 allocated \$2,800,000 in CDBG-CV funds to acquire the Aloha Motel, which will also be converted into a permanent fixed-site transitional shelter serving Chicago and the southwest suburbs.

The Margarita Inn, a 100-year-old boutique hotel, requires critical renovations to provide safe, stable housing for the community. This non-congregate shelter is operated by Connections for the Homeless Inc., an organization focused on developing programs to assist people experiencing or at risk of homelessness. The \$2,000,000 grant award will be utilized for the first phase of renovations to provide 46 rooms of permanent fixed-site shelter to the suburban Northshore community area. Connections for the Homeless has applied for supplementary funding to support additional phases of rehabilitation to the hotel facility.

The Aloha Motel, a 67-year-old limited-service facility, requires critical renovation to provide stable, safe, and adequate housing for the unhoused or people at risk of homelessness, within the community. The non-congregate shelter is operated by Bed Plus Care, Inc, an organization that provides evidence-based services to people experiencing homelessness and at imminent risk of homelessness in Southwest Suburban Cook County. The \$2,000,000 grant award will be used for rehabilitation of the motel to provide 55 units of non-congregate shelter in Chicago and the near Southwest Suburbs. BEDS Plus Care, Inc. has applied for supplementary funding to support additional phases of rehabilitation to the motel facility
