FY2025 Fleet Inventory Report

Summary


In accordance with Section 2-671 of the Cook County Vehicle Ordinance, the Vehicle Steering Committee submits the FY2025 Fleet Inventory Report. The County fleet consists of 1,989 vehicles across 29 departments, with an average model year of 2016 and an average age of 9 years.

Fleet size declined during FY2020–FY2021 due to COVID-19-related disruptions, but inventory levels have since stabilized, and normal replacement cycles resumed in FY2024–FY2025.


The County continues to advance sustainability goals, with 29% of the fleet consisting of hybrid or electric vehicles, including 9 electric vehicles.

Key observations include:

- Law Enforcement vehicles represent approximately 69.5% of the total fleet.
- Light Duty (74 units) and SUV (160 units) vehicles are the newest fleet categories, both averaging a 2021 model year.
- Medium Duty vehicles average 12 years of age, signaling increased maintenance costs and upcoming replacement considerations.
- Heavy Duty vehicles, trailers and passenger sedans align with the fleet-wide average age of 9 years and represent smaller portions of the total inventory.



Countywide Fleet Inventory Trend




FY2020–FY2021: Fleet size declined due to COVID-19 production delays and vehicle retirements.


FY2022–FY2023: Manufacturing recovery resumed, and replacement approvals progressed.

FY2024–FY2025: Fleet inventory stabilized with replacement and additions returning to normal levels.

The chart below illustrates the average model year by vehicle type, ranging from 2012 (Mobile Home) to 2021 (Light Duty and SUV), with an overall average of 2016.




The fleet's age ranges from 4 to 13 years, with an average of 9 years.



Environmental and Sustainability Efforts

The County continues to advance fleet sustainability through targeted procurement strategies:

- **Hybrid Vehicles:** 571 units
- **Gasoline Vehicles:** 1,409 units
- **Electric Vehicles:** 9 units (7 Nissan LEAFs, 2 E-Transit Vans)
- **Hybrid and EV share:** 30.8%



The year-end inventory includes 1,989 vehicles across 29 departments.
