To our Build Up Cook community,

I am pleased to share with you the first ever Annual Report for the Build Up Cook program. This program, launched as a \$20 million initiative funded by the American Rescue Plan Act and administered by the Bureau of Asset Management (BAM), was designed to meet the critical infrastructure needs of our municipalities and neighborhoods throughout Cook County. We are very proud of the work that has been done this year through the program, and this report serves not only as a report of our successes, but a testament to our commitment to equitably enhance resident quality of life across our communities.

Over the past year, the Build Up Cook program has transformed into a vital resource for many communities, addressing infrastructure challenges that have long been a barrier to the growth and safety of our most vulnerable communities. By bringing together our county's technical expertise, skilled workforce and funding opportunities, we have been able to work hand-in-hand with municipalities to execute critical infrastructure projects.

The accomplishments of the Build Up Cook Program so far speak to the power of collaboration. From replacing aging water mains to repairing essential civic structures, our efforts are already delivering tangible benefits. In addition to the infrastructure improvements that are in progress, the program is also leading transformative municipal workshops on the topics of budgeting and forecasting, grant management and leveraging community-connected resources. These workshops have provided a space for municipal leaders to come together to build capacity, share resources and strengthen connections.

We are immensely proud of the progress made so far. In just the short time since the announcement of the program in October 2023, Build Up Cook has been honored with multiple awards:

- 2024 National Association of Counties (NACo) Achievement Award. Since 1970, the NACo Achievement Awards have recognized outstanding county government programs and services. Noteworthy programs receive awards in 18 categories that cover a vast range of county responsibilities. Build Up Cook was recognized with an Achievement Award at NACo's Annual Conference & Exhibition in July.
- 2024 American Planning Association IL Chapter Advancing Diversity and Social Change Award. Each year APA-IL jurors receive nominations for a series of awards for distinguished projects in urban and regional planning. In 2024, the jury selected Build Up Cook to receive the Advancing Diversity and Social Change award for supporting under-represented communities.

Our work has just begun. We look forward to expanding our impact in the coming years. The challenges of aging infrastructure are significant, but with the Build Up Cook Program, we are addressing these needs head-on, ensuring that Cook County's communities remain resilient, safe and vibrant.

I would like to extend my gratitude to the Build Up Cook staff, the Interagency Working Group, our municipal partners and the many skilled workers all who have contributed to the success of this program. Together, we are building a stronger, more equitable and more resilient future for Cook County.

ARPA FUNDING

The American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) is one of the most impactful pieces of federal legislation passed since the New Deal in the 1930s. Congress allocated over \$1 billion of ARPA funding to Cook County, with the intention to assist in its recovery from the pandemic and continue building a sustainable, affordable and equitable future for all. Because of the hard work done over the past decade. Cook County is able to invest the vast majority of these funds directly into community programs to help residents, businesses and local governments thrive. Build Up Cook's priority investments in critical construction and capacity building reflect the Cook County's commitment to equity and the values of the Policy Roadmap.

Cook County initially allocated \$22 million in ARPA funding to Build Up Cook and an additional \$8.5 million was later added to increase the investment in drinking water infrastructure. With a total of \$30.5 million in ARPA funding invested into Build Up Cook, projects are already underway across Cook County to help communities thrive.

BUREAU OF ASSET MANAGEMENT

The Bureau of Asset Management (BAM) seeks to meet community needs for resilient and innovative spaces by providing essential public spaces equitably, collaboratively, and sustainably. The core work of the bureau services the buildings and infrastructure owned by Cook County; both responding to needs for new and renovated spaces and operating and maintaining the spaces already providing critical healthcare, public safety, environmental and economic development services to Cook County residents.

HISTORY OF BUILD UP COOK

The Bureau of Asset Management (BAM) was created to unite Cook County's capital planning, real estate and facilities management units under one leadership structure to improve the quality and resilience of the infrastructure and public facilities owned by Cook County. The Bureau of Asset Management continued to understand the needs of suburban municipalities, and the need for infrastructure assistance became critically apparent in 2021, when Dixmoor, Illinois experienced multiple main breaks resulting in boil orders, school closures and unreliable water pressure. When Cook County received historic ARPA investments that same year, BAM proposed a program to lend Cook County's technical expertise and resources to the most under-resourced municipalities. With the support of President Toni Preckwinkle, BAM piloted an approach that would lend Cook County's resources to the most under-resourced municipalities, with the goal of providing infrastructure equity through Build Up Cook.

Over the last two years, the Build Up Cook team has worked with incredible partners, both inside and outside Cook County, to pilot a program with real potential to equitably transform infrastructure and public facilities beginning with the communities who need them most.

POLICY ROADMAP PRIORITIES


In March, President Preckwinkle released The Policy Roadmap 2024-2027, an update to Cook County's policy-driven strategic plan for the Offices Under the President. The six-pillar Policy Roadmap reflects the administration's core values and vision for fostering safe, thriving and healthy communities. The work of Build Up Cook closely aligns with the Policy Roadmap, and specifically follows objectives of four pillars:

- Connected Communities (Infrastructure and Technology)
 - » Strategy 1.3: Coordinate the development of water infrastructure projects to improve drinking water and stormwater management.
- Healthy Communities (Health and Wellness)
 - » Strategy 3.3: Promote accessible multi-modal transportation options, including walking and biking, that connect people to family, work and play.
- Sustainable Communities (Climate Resiliency)
 - » Strategy 4.3: Partner with municipalities and community-based organizations to build regional capacity to mitigate and adapt to climate change.
- Vital Communities (Economic Development)
 - » Strategy 7.4: Provide capacity building assistance to municipalities and non-profits so they can better serve residents.


PRIORITY MUNICIPALITIES

The prioritization of communities receiving assistance from Build Up Cook was driven by the values of the Policy Roadmap: Equity, Engagement, and Excellence. A tool was developed to rank Cook County municipalities based on need, past investment and proximity to each other. This ranking tool leveraged both quantitative and qualitative review by an Interagency Working Group (IWG). First, the quantitative review began by ranking all municipalities based on the 2023 update to the Equitable Distribution Model (EDM) used to distribute County CARES Act funds. The IWG then conducted a qualitative review, considering both the amount of past County infrastructure investment and the potential for inter-jurisdictional impact. Municipalities with less past investment received higher priority. Municipalities clustered closer to one another also received higher priority, because of the potential for inter-jurisdictional collaboration. Finally, to remain responsive to local needs, all municipalities already selected for Build Up Cook pilot projects received priority.

Build Up Cook has already secured \$12.1 million in Bipartisan Infrastructure Law funding for lead water service line replacement through IEPA's state revolving fund.

That's \$27 for every dollar invested in Technical Assistance.

BUILD UP COOK BY THE NUMBERS

In 2023, much of the groundwork for Build Up Cook was laid, including hiring of staff, structuring the IWG, launching pilot projects and holding multiple rounds of meetings and site visits with priority municipalities. Throughout 2024, Build Up Cook executed a phased approach:

2024



- Established strong relationships with Build Up Cook priority municipalities through in-person visits and regular communication.
- Finalized construction project priorities with municipalities. Approved projects through IWG and notified municipalities of approved projects.



- Collaborated with individual IWG members and select County bureaus and departments to identify capacity building resources from Cook County to match with municipal needs.
- Developed and passed IGAs with 25 municipalities and Cook County Board of Commissioners to formally kick off construction projects.
- · Began site visits for all Phase I construction projects.




- Engaged with external stakeholders that can offer capacity building technical assistance to complement high-impact municipal projects.
- · Launched Fall Capacity Building Workshop Series.
- · Completed scope visits completed for all Phase I projects.
- Secured \$12.1M in funding for lead service line replacement in priority communities through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law administered by IEPA's State Revolving Fund.



- Hosted a series of workshops to address and build the capacity of municipalities in line with their priorities. Developed supporting materials, such as fact sheets and handouts, and partnered with regional advocacy organizations to maximize impact.
- · Obligated all \$30.5M in ARPA funds.

DRINKING WATER INFRASTRUCTURE

Throughout conversations across Cook County, the need for funding and support of drinking water systems became clear. Build Up Cook is working on a number of projects to replace hydrants and water valves and upgrade pumphouses in multiple communities. Through multiple site visits and meetings, communities were able to share priority hydrants and valves in most urgent need of replacement. In many cases, these priorities were found when it was already too late—by being called to a site during a fire and finding that the closest hydrants were unusable. One of the goals of Build Up Cook is to be able to provide maintenance on integral projects like hydrant and valve replacement before it becomes an emergency, allowing municipalities to be proactive on water system needs, rather than reactive.

WATER MAINS & SERVICES LINES

Safe drinking water is essential for human health. Across the region, there is an increasing need for investment in drinking water infrastructure. From lead service lines that need replacement in order to supply residents with safe drinking water, to aging water mains that leak into the ground and drive up resident costs without supplying water, the effect on residents is profound. With increasingly intense freeze and thaw cycles due to climate change that cause regular water main breaks across Cook County, the need for immediate action is high. News articles about water main breaks causing flooding for residents and boil orders for drinking water are becoming more common. Through Build Up Cook, Cook County has taken on a number of water main and service line projects.

"When we were nearing the end of our project with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, we realized we were at a standstill. Build Up Cook came in and provided the additional funding that we needed to extend the new water main and finish the job— that was the last 400 feet of a 4,400-foot project. These system-wide failures are occurring with greater frequency as the aging systems continue to degrade and fail. I hope that Build Up Cook can continue to be the lifeline that it has been to Dixmoor to other communities in the South Suburbs."

WATER MAIN EMERGENCIES

Cook County's Department of Emergency Management and Regional Security handles emergency response by addressing the immediate flooding caused by broken watermains and providing bottled water to residents. However, interruptions in water service delivery sometimes require a long-term infrastructure fix. This is a unique need that Build Up Cook, in partnership with multiple Departments and Bureaus within Cook County, has been able to fill. In 2023, Build Up Cook has taken on two unique emergency projects, one of which has been completed and the other of which is ongoing. Both of these projects began with a call to Cook County for help in both responding to an immediate emergency and for investment and support to fix the root of the problem. In both of these cases, the emergency was a water main break, but as with all of our projects, the specific needs are unique. In order to prevent emergencies like these, there is a need for greater investment in capital planning, infrastructure maintenance, repair and replacement over the long term.

SEWER & STORMWATER INFRASTRUCTURE

While sewer systems may be an afterthought to many, the functionality of municipal sewer systems are integral to the health of communities. Most communities in Cook County use a combined sewer system, meaning stormwater runoff is combined directly into the sewer system along with household wastewater. With more extreme weather events, this can bring an increase in combined sewer backups, which can cause toxic flooding in homes and neighborhoods. Maintenance such as sewer jetting and lining can prevent future backups and flooding. Build Up Cook is working with a number of communities on sewer jetting projects that remove buildup and televise the inside of laterals to assess possible damages. Build Up Cook is also assisting with the lining of sewers to seal any cracks or breaks within the system that are found during the jetting and televising process.

EMERGENCY GENERATORS

Emergency backup generators are an integral part of ensuring that communities continue have access to necessary services in the case of a power outage brought on by a storm or overburdened power utility. As storms and heat waves become more frequent and intense with the advance of climate change, communities are more at risk of power outages. Build Up Cook is replacing a number of generators across priority communities that will be used for a wide range of municipal buildings and services. Without reliable backup generators, the loss of power could cause even larger issues for communities: from loss of water pressure village-wide, to loss of power at village hall where important public services are processed, to loss of temperature controls in animal shelters and emergency shelters, and more.

BUILDING IMPROVEMENTS

Village halls, fire departments and police stations all deliver essential services to residents— whether putting out fires, responding to families in distress, providing a dignified place to vote or keeping elderly residents cool during heatwaves. Many of our public facilities have not been updated in decades— or in some cases, since the municipality was incorporated. It can be difficult to find funding to make these improvements without overburdening residents. Build Up Cook projects include replacing doors to ensure that people can safely enter and exit buildings easily, upgrading entrances and bathrooms to be accessible for all and bringing necessary upgrades to the exterior of buildings to ensure they are properly protected from the elements. These investments will ensure staff and residents have a safe, accessible and welcoming experience in municipal spaces.

ROOF REPLACEMENTS

Along with general building upgrades, Build Up Cook has taken on a number of full roof replacements in municipal buildings such as village halls, police stations and community centers. These facilities can experience regular leaks, lack of temperature control and unhealthy mold. The roof replacement projects maintain spaces where staff work daily and where residents apply for services, pay their water bills or participate in the democratic process. As with all Build Up Cook projects, the goal of roof replacements is to ensure that public spaces are safe, functional and accessible for all.

SIDEWALK REPLACEMENTS

Freedom of mobility means that people with different abilities can move from home to work, school and play freely. Uneven, buckling and broken sidewalks can limit freedom of mobility for seniors, parents with strollers and people with mobility limitations. Build Up Cook will be replacing sidewalks to increase mobility around priority areas in communities, such as near schools and community centers, to ensure that all residents are able to walk safely without fear of injury. Sidewalk replacement projects will also include updated accessibility ramps at curbs and crossways to ensure the walkways are accessible to all.

CAPACITY BUILDING

Build Up Cook's Capacity Building Program aims to enhance the capabilities of the most under-resourced communities in Cook County to deliver quality infrastructure and public facilities that improve quality of life and create greater economic opportunities. Beyond the work of Build Up Cook to conduct short-term capital infrastructure improvements, another integral part of the Build Up Cook program focuses on building long-term internal capacity within municipalities. This work enables staff and officials to make informed decisions that benefit their communities.

For decades, communities in the south and west part of Cook County, primarily communities of color, have seen declining capital investment— the direct result of negative historical race-driven policies and investments and limited tax capacity. Build Up Cook seeks to bring resources to these communities through comprehensive support such as a Fall Workshop Series, Grant Guidebook and strategic coordination with internal and external partners. Build Up Cook provides technical assistance, expert advice, and targeted resources to help these municipalities leverage recovery funding and advance critical capital projects.

KEY INITIATIVES

- Technical Assistance and Support: Build Up
 Cook provides hands-on technical assistance to
 municipalities to build their internal capacity. This
 includes guidance on project planning, financial
 management, regulatory compliance and strategic
 development. By focusing on these areas, the
 program ensures that municipalities are better
 equipped to manage capital projects, apply for
 grants and comply with funding requirements.
- Fall Workshop Series: The Fall Workshop Series is a cornerstone of the Build Up Cook Capacity Building Program, designed to provide in-depth training on essential topics for municipal development:
 - » Municipal Finance Workshop (September 10, 2024): The first workshop focused on building the financial management capabilities of municipalities. Participants engaged in interactive sessions on best practices for conducting audits and maintaining financial transparency. Over two dozen municipal representatives attended, benefiting from the expertise of speakers from the Great Lakes Community Action Partnership (GLCAP) and the Environmental Finance Center (EFC), who provided valuable resources to support financial planning and management.
- » Grant Readiness Workshop (October 8, 2024): This workshop equipped municipalities with the skills needed to secure additional resources through grants. It covered strategies for identifying grant opportunities from federal, state, and local sources, preparing competitive grant applications and managing awarded funds. With over 21 participants and experts from Arcadis, CMAP, STV and the Cook County Department of Transportation and Highways leading the discussions, the workshop was highly successful in fostering a deep understanding of grant processes.
- » Green Stormwater Infrastructure (GSI)
 Workshop (November 12, 2024): The
 final workshop of the series focused on
 environmental sustainability, providing
 municipalities with guidance on identifying
 green infrastructure projects, understanding
 current trends and securing complementary
 funding sources. Participants learned from
 real-world examples and best practices shared
 by industry experts and engaged in hands-on
 activities to develop their green infrastructure
 plans. Over 8 municipal representatives
 attended this event which also qualified
 for IEPA Operator Certification continuing
 education credits.

CAPACITY BUILDING

- under-resourced Cook County municipalities is limited capacity to compete for and manage state and federal funds. The first two capacity building workshops focused entirely on ways to overcome these challenges through best management practices and partnerships. Informed by this experience, consultation with Interagency Working Group members and input from partners, Build Up Cook will release a Grant Guidebook early in 2025 with information on identifying funding sources, developing successful applications and managing awarded funds effectively, thus enhancing municipal capacity to undertake impactful projects.
- **Securing Additional Capital Funding:** There is far more need for capital investment in underresourced Cook County municipalities than there is funding available through ARPA. As such, Build Up Cook is exploring opportunities to secure additional funding through competitive state and federal programs, partnerships with funders and other sources. Thus far, Build Up Cook has partnered with 12 municipalities to provide assistance applying for and managing funding for lead service line replacement. After just one year, this partnership has already secured \$12.1 million dollars from the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law through the State Revolving Fund. For every dollar invested by Cook County, this initiative has leveraged \$27 in new investments.

Build Up Cook relies on coordination across County departments to deliver comprehensive support to our municipal partners. Within the Bureau of Asset Management, the Department of Facilities Management was an early and integral partner in the development of Build Up Cook, providing much of the support for our pilot projects. 
