The community health worker will work specifically with people who are under supervision with electronic monitoring with the Cook County Sheriff's Office and/or involved in pretrial services with Cook County Adult Probation. CCH analyses of Cook County Medical Examiner data indicate a significantly increased risk of fatal opioid overdose among the population involved in community corrections with electronic monitoring as compared to the general population. This intervention addresses this finding, and is a collaboration between CCH, Cook County Adult Probation, and Cook County Sheriff's Office.
