#### **External Message Disclaimer**

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Honorable Commissioners,

The Law Enforcement Officers Safety Act authorizes current and retired law enforcement officers, as defined by 18 USC § 926B or C, to carry a concealed weapon for their protection nationwide.

Currently employed officers of the Cook County Sheriff's Police, Court Services and Corrections all are law enforcement officers under 18 USC § 926B as supported by the Cook County Sheriff's Office's (CCSO) own policies:

"108.10 CARRYING FIREARMS OUT OF STATE

Qualified, active, full-time sworn members of the Sheriff's Office who are authorized to carry firearms by the Sheriff's Office are further authorized to carry a concealed firearm in all other states... (18 USC § 926B)"

The Illinois Retired Officer Concealed Carry Program (IROCC), a subordinate office of the Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board (ILETSB), is responsible for vetting and credentialing Illinois' retired law enforcement officers, as defined by 18 USC § 926C. This definition states:

- (c) As used in this section, the term "qualified retired law enforcement officer" means an individual who-
  - (1) separated from service in good standing from service with a public agency as a law enforcement officer;
  - (2) before such separation, was authorized by law to engage in or supervise the prevention, detection, investigation, or prosecution of, or the incarceration of any person for, any violation of law, and had statutory powers of arrest...

The application process requires that the agency from which the retiree retired affirm that retiree's retired law enforcement officer status as defined by 18 USC § 926C using the form provided by IROCC (please refer to form 3 of the attached IROCC application).

The Cook County Sheriff completes this form for retired officers of the Sheriff's Police but, refuses to do so for the retired officers of Court Services and Corrections even though we all are retired law enforcement officers as defined by 18 USC § 926C.

To date the Sheriff of Cook County, and the Cook County Board as a joint employer, has refused to address and resolve this **arbitrary and capricious denial of equal protection under the law** even though in 2015 the Sheriff, a County Board Commissioner, and several state legislators sent a letter to the ILETSB supporting issuance of IROCC cards to retired corrections officers and court services deputies (please refer to the attached *12-8-2015 Letter to ILETSB from Sheriff Dart*).

It is sadly ironic that the Sheriff of Cook County purports to serve and protect yet, he does a disservice to certain retirees of his department by preventing these trained and experienced retired officers from protecting themselves should the need arise.

On behalf of thousands of retired Court and Corrections officers, I am asking you to intervene and compel the Sheriff of Cook County to affirm the retired law enforcement officer status of these officers as we all satisfy the same retired law enforcement officer definition which he freely affirms for retired Sheriff's Police.

#### Dear Applicant:

Under the "Law Enforcement Officers Safety Act" and improvements, qualified active duty and retired law enforcement officers are exempt from certain state and local laws prohibiting the carry of concealed firearms.

In accordance with the Federal Act, Illinois passed Public Act 94-103 (2005), 50 ILCS 705/710 that provides for an annual firearm qualification mandated by the Federal Act, LEOSA.

Please read all materials carefully prior to completing your application. All required supporting documents and fees must accompany the completed application, or it will be returned for corrections.

Written notification of approval or denial of an application shall be sent within 60 working days after receipt of a completed application by ILETSB, unless additional information is needed.

Once the application has been pre-approved, you will be notified in writing and allowed to enroll in a firearm qualification at one of our range sites. Upon successful completion, you will receive a IROCC firearm qualification card verifying you have met the IROCC requirements as mandated by federal and state statutes.

## **New Applicant Permit Process Instructions**

#### **Step 1** Submit a completed application, which includes:

- Application (Form 1)
- Concealed Carry Affidavit (Form 2)
- Employment Verification (Form 3) or equivalent information verified on department letterhead.
- A photocopy of a valid Illinois Firearm Owners Identification (F.O.I.D.) card.
- A photocopy of the photo identification card issued by the law enforcement department/agency from which you retired/separated.
- A color photo for your permit may be mailed with your application, or a digital photo may be emailed to irocc@letac.org. (Black and white photos will not be accepted.)
- A non-refundable application fee of \$75/one firearm type or \$100/both Revolver and Semi-Automatic in the form of a check or money order, made payable to: Illinois Retired Officer Concealed Carry or IROCC.

When your application has been approved you will receive a pre-qualification letter with instructions on attending a firearm qualification shoot. Along with the letter, you will receive a range schedule with dates, locations and telephone numbers. You must register to secure the preferred date for your firearm qualification. Online registration is available on our website. You must report to the designated range 30 minutes prior to the scheduled qualification time, unless advised otherwise.

#### YOU MUST BRING THE FOLLOWING:

- UNLOADED and cased firearms
- Photo I.D. issued by your department/agency
- Valid F.O.I.D. card
- 60 rounds of factory ammunition
- Ear & eye protection
- Belt holster (No cross draw or shoulder holster)

In order to qualify, you must place 21 hits out of 30 rounds within the 8x14 target area (70% proficiency). You will be provided two opportunities to qualify; shooting a total of 30 rounds for each opportunity. If you are qualifying with two firearms, a revolver and a semi-automatic, you will be given one opportunity (30 rounds) for each weapon. The course of fire is 12 rounds from the five yard line, 12 rounds from the seven yard line and 6 rounds from the fifteen yard line.

Once you have successfully completed the firearm qualification, the range master will report your score to our office. Approximately 10 working days after qualifying, your firearm qualification card will be issued and mailed to your designated address. This firearm qualification card will verify compliance with both Federal and State statutes. Your firearm qualification card has an expiration date and it is your responsibility to reapply if you wish to continue to carry a concealed firearm under this law. Two months prior to expiration you will receive notice of renewal instructions.

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RE: Illinois Retired Officers Concealed Carry Program ("IROCC Program")

Dir. McClain, General Counsel and Board Members,

We come together as legislators, law enforcement leaders, and sympathetic neighbors, to urge you to modify the Illinois Administrative Code as it relates to the Illinois Retired Officer Concealed Carry Program ("IROCC Program"). Under the current Illinois Administrative Code language, as drafted in 2005 and interpreted by the ILETSB, retired Cook County Sheriff's Office Court Services deputies and correctional officers do not qualify as "retired law enforcement officers" for purposes of the IROCC Program. As the administering authority of the IROCC Program, we understand and accept that the ILETSB controls the determination of those who qualify for the program and the issuance of IROCC cards. However, excluding Cook County Sheriff's Office Court Services deputies and correctional officers from the scope of the IROCC Program demonstrates a failure to recognize both the important role they play in public safety, as well as the dangers they encounter every day on the job.

While ensuring the safe operation of Cook County's judicial and correctional systems, Cook County Sheriff's Office Court Services deputies and correctional officers come into daily and repetitive contact with individuals arrested for, and often convicted of, criminal activity. These Court Services deputies and correctional officers often secure the same offenders day in and day out. Moreover, given the scope of the Cook County criminal justice system, Cook County Sheriff's Office Court Services deputies and correctional officers are reasonably likely to encounter individuals who have been detained at the Cook County Department of Corrections ("CCDOC") or came through their assigned court rooms in the community.

The federal government anticipated the risk to these officers' personal safety when it defined "law enforcement officer" under the Law Enforcement Officers Safety Act ("LEOSA")<sup>2</sup> to include those authorized to "engage in or supervise the prevention, detection, investigation, or prosecution of, or the incarceration of any person for, any violation of law..." Clearly, under LEOSA, the job duties of Cook County Sheriff's Office Court Services deputies and correctional officers fall within the definition of "law enforcement officer." Yet, the Illinois Administrative Code's language overly narrows LEOSA's application in Illinois, unnecessarily excluding Cook County Sheriff's Office Court Services deputies and correctional officers. The resulting inconsistency between the Illinois Administrative Code and LEOSA is both confusing and unfair. The eligibility requirements for the IROCC Program must be clear, consistent, and fulfill the purposeful intent of the federal law, LEOSA.

The Cook County Sheriff's Office Court Services deputies and correctional officers place their own safety at risk, even after retirement, through their daily work securing the county's courthouses and the CCDOC. Considering that, in 2014, gun related deaths of U.S. law enforcement increased by fifty-six percent (56%) compared to 2013 and approximately one third of these officers were killed in ambush-style attacks, this is an issue we cannot ignore.

Cook County's law enforcement needs are distinct from any other county in Illinois. Thus, the Cook County Sheriff's Office is unique among Illinois sheriff's offices in that all Court Services deputies and CCDOC correctional officers are deputized and have the statutory power of arrest. Additionally, in Cook County, Court Services deputies and CCDOC correctional officers complete the same statutorily mandated firearms training as police officers. 4 Given Cook County's exceptionality in Illinois, our request is only to expand the scope to include Cook County Sheriff's Office Court Services deputies and correctional officers in Cook County. We have enclosed proposed language that would remedy this problem and allow Cook County Sheriff's Office Court Services deputies and correctional officers to be eligible for IROCC.

In sum, we respectfully urge both the ILETSB and JCAR to support an amendment to the Illinois Administrative Code that mirrors the definition of "qualified retired law enforcement officer" contained in the federal LEOSA, and thereby clarifying the IROCC Program's eligibility requirements to include Cook County Sheriff's Office corrections and court services sworn staff.
