

Key Responsibilities

- Emergency management: Serve as the mandated emergency management agency, assisting municipalities to enhance readiness for disasters and other threats.
- Assets and expertise: Provide emergency logistics support, technical expertise and resource coordination to municipal, governmental and non-profit partners.
- Investments to buy down risk: Leverage grant-funded investments to understand strengthen our region's ability to prepare, respond and recover.

The role of Cook County EMRS

Before a major incident:

- Help communities in planning, preparedness and risk-based investments
- Support regional mutual aid efforts/specialized response capabilities

During a major incident:

- Response coordination for significant and evolving incidents
- Disaster proclamations to access state and federal resources

After a major incident:

- Recovery activities
- Mitigation efforts to enhance resiliency

Deliverables

- Responding to emergency incidents 24/7/365 approximately 25-50 times per year at the request of municipalities.
- Deploying EMRS equipment and assets over 400 times per year at the request of municipalities.
- Providing 100+ public safety/first-responder training programs each year.
- Building a culture of preparedness at over 60 community events across Chicago and suburban Cook County.

Drivers of our work...

- The County's most vulnerable residents continue to experience disproportionate impacts from disasters and risk.
- Emergencies and disasters are continuously evolving as environmental conditions change.
- EMRS must ensure that equity is integrated across all our work and remain adaptive to the changing risk environment.


