I am Kathryn Franklin, President of Access to Care. Thank you for the opportunity to speak here today and thank you for your support of the Access to Care program.

Access to Care is a non-profit primary health care program for low income, uninsured and under insured residents of suburban Cook County and northwest Chicago.

One of the many good features about ATC is the way we are able to leverage public funds with private resources. One of the important ways we do this is with our network of more than 600 physicians and 130 physician sites. Attached is a map of our physician sites. The back of the map has some client demographics. Members of ATC can sign up and be assigned a medical home in their own community. We currently serve approximately 5,000 patients annually.

ATC is very community based. We have relationships with community wide social service agencies, townships and municipalities, chambers of commerce, associations, faith based organizations and service oriented clubs. I have brought with me letters of support from some of them and ask that these letters be included in the testimony. Through the first three quarters of 2015 we have attended nearly 200 events or meetings. We consider ourselves a partner with the County, as it is our largest donor. Everywhere staff goes they bring County Care materials. We have conservatively referred 10,000 people to County Care. Earlier this year, Access to Care was awarded a certificate of appreciation from Alivio Medical Center in recognition of our outreach efforts.

Access to Care is very cost efficient. We are able to provide an unlimited number of physician office visits, lab tests, x-rays and prescription drugs for \$750 a year per person.


When clients come to us – it is usually because they are sick. Most have a chronic illness or two. ATC keeps them out of the emergency room. Often patients from the County's hospitals are referred to us for follow-up care. About half of the Access to Care members are immigrants who are not eligible for County Care either because they have not been in the country legally long enough or they are undocumented. Many of the other half tend to be in some kind of life transition. They may have lost a job, going through a divorce, or there may be a death or illness in the family that has caused a loss of income. During these difficult times, their focus is on keeping a roof over their heads and food on the table. Many times, we have heard a client say that they had to choose between medicine and food or medicine and rent.

I am here today because the funding for ATC has been cut in half in the County's preliminary budget. I am here to ask you to reinstate that funding – or at least some of it. If funding is cut many people may not get the care they need. ATC is a good steward of County funds. The program, because of provider discounts, is able to stretch \$1 dollar into \$2 worth of services. This is surely a good investment and use of County funds.



Dear Commissioner,

I have been dealing with Access to Care for several years. They are a gift to families I know. In a society that critiques the phrase "safety net", the blunt fact is that we have, in Westchester, and nearby, many families who are less than one paycheck away from poverty. We have, in our church, several families who are legitimately "the working poor". They work 3 jobs, pay taxes, and don't have enough money to take care of basic life needs. Access to Care provides basic medical needs, that otherwise would go un-met, and then, like dominoes, more things get "un-met" as they miss work, cannot pay more bills, etc. They, and we as a society, need Access to care. Please reinstate funding to Access to Care to the same level as the past few years.

Having volunteered for years at area nursing homes and hospitals, I know what happens when the poor and working poor suddenly need medical care. They go right over to the local hospital emergency room, and overburden an already over-worked staff. I have been at many hospitals when the emergency room is far beyond capacity. Hospitals were not, and should not be the place for basic, non-life threatening medical care. The cost to the remaining public becomes much greater and to the hospitals themselves. Access to Care provides an alternative that, quite frankly, I believe helps save money in our medical "chain of care", and a better alternative.

Please continue to support Access to Care at the same level or more. This is not simply a moral issue; it is a complicate economic and justice issue as well.

Dear Commissioner Fritchey:

I am writing in support of a continuation of funding for Access to Care, a non-profit organization which serves low to moderate income residents of Cook County by providing free or low-cost medical care. For many individuals and families on the northwest side of Chicago and suburban Cook County, Access to Care has offered an opportunity to see a physician without going to the emergency room. For those who qualify for this means-tested program, they pay only \$5 for a doctor visit, \$5 for lab tests and X-rays, and \$15 to \$40 for prescription medication.

By establishing an ongoing relationship with a general practice physician, individuals and families can get more timely care and avoid the acute/emergency medical attention created when people without coverage fail to seek immediate and appropriate treatment. Also, Access to Care provides assistance to people with coverage under the Affordable Care Act who have very high deductibles by offering them the ability to see a doctor for only \$5.

At a time when there is increasing stress on the Cook County health system, Access to Care is a great partner in relieving the pressure on Stroger and Provident Hospitals and the various county clinics which struggle to treat the uninsured and underinsured. It would be in the best interest of local residents and the Cook County budget to continue to fund Access to Care at the same level as in the past few years.

The Park Forest Health Department is also a registration site. I writing to ask you to continue funding Access to Care at the same level as in the immediate past years.

Access to Care is a non-profit primary health care program for low-income, uninsured and underinsured people in suburban Cook County and northwest Chicago. For many individuals and families Access to Care has offered an opportunity to see a local, primary care physician for \$5. Access to Care keeps people out of the emergency room for routine care.

Patients establish a relationship with their Access to Care physician. 



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

I am writing to you on behalf of Access to Care, an agency with which we have worked for many years to provide low cost primary care in our community.

I understand that Cook County is considering reducing its funding to Access to Care by 50%. I am very aware of the difficult budget decisions that must be considered at this time, and I understand that it may seem like a reasonable place to cut since the ACA has begun to lower rates for the uninsured. However, for low income persons and especially undocumented immigrants the ACA plans with high deductibles don't help accessing primary care. With Access to Care, these individuals can still access primary care and some common lab services for \$5.00. 

It is hard for me to believe that almost 30 years have gone by since then. I was the Executive Director of the Park Forest Health Department. I understand that in the preliminary 2016 County Budget, funding for Access to Care has been cut by 50%. I urge you to reinstate the lost funding or at least part of it.

Access to Care is a non-profit primary health care program for low-income, uninsured and underinsured people in suburban Cook County and northwest Chicago. For many individuals and families Access to Care offers the opportunity to see a local, primary care physician for \$5. Access to Care keeps people out of the emergency room for routine care.
