- The use of form documents and the implications of contractual terms and provisions
- The structure of contractual and other relationships with suppliers and customers
- The review and negotiation of loan documents from banks and other third parties
- Regular, routine business transactions that arise in the day-to-day operation of a business or not-for-profit organization
- Advising tax-exempt not-for-profit organizations seeking to establish for-profit subsidiaries or affiliated entities that can provide additional revenues while complementing and maintaining their tax-exempt status
