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• Application fee of \$500 per establishment (per proposed ordinance)

- 40 establishments submitting applications in 2018; 50 in following years
- Estimate based on number of liquor license holders in unincorporated Cook County
- Assumes processing and approval of all applicants by the Illinois Gaming Board
- License fee of \$1,000 per gaming position/terminal (per proposed ordinance)
 - o 160 video gaming terminals licensed in 2018; 200 in following years
 - o Estimated based on average number of machines per establishment in Illinois
 - Assumes limited growth beyond 2019 as market becomes saturated
- Net Terminal Income of \$216 per terminal, per month (per IL Gaming Board data)
 - o Estimate based on Statewide averages for video gaming terminals
 - Estimate assumes annual growth based on recent State trends

Additionally, as a result of the Video Gaming Ordinance a positive fiscal impact is projected for the Cook County Gaming Machine Tax revenues - ranging from \$32,000 - \$40,000 annually.

The County estimates annual operating costs between \$190,000 to \$230,000 which will increase with inflation and will be covered by the anticipated Regulation Fee Revenue. The operating costs are calculated proportional to the amount of staff time the Sheriff's Office and the Department of Revenue expects to spend on administration and enforcement activities, along with system support costs. In addition to the operating costs, in year one, the County will also incur a one-time E-Licensing System which is approximately \$120,000.
