

### CARES Act – Coronavirus Relief Fund allocations for the State of Illinois

### State of Illinois received \$4.9 Billion from the Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF)


Chicago, \$470 Cook County, \$429 **DuPage County**, \$161 Kane County, \$93 Lake County, \$122 **Remaining Statewide** Allocation, \$3,519 Will County, \$121 In Millions

Direct disbursements were made by the Federal government to cities or counties with populations of 500,000 or more

The Cook County region when including the City of Chicago received \$899 Million

# Suburban Municipality Allocation

- Cook County Suburban Municipalities will be able to apply for reimbursement of direct expenditures related to COVID-19 consistent with their respective allocations
- Cook County has allocated Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) resources to Suburban Municipalities in a way that reflects the diverse impact of the pandemic on our communities
- Factors include:
  - Initial needs data collected through mid-May survey
  - Municipal population
  - Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning (CMAP) community demographic data
  - Public health data

# County Understanding of Suburban Municipality Needs

In May Cook County surveyed Suburban Municipalities regarding the financial impact of COVID-19

- Majority of municipalities were forced to make unbudgeted expenditures due to COVID-19
- Most municipalities reduced spending in other areas to account for COVID-19
- Salary/Hiring and Capital Projects make up most of the reductions

\$51 Million

# Suburban Municipalities

# Initial Suburban Municipality Allocations

### \$51 Million

Suburban Municipality Allocation

### 130+ Suburban Municipalities

Municipal Allocation is 1/3 based on population and 2/3 based on weighted socio economic and public health considerations Allocation Per Municipality =  $F^*(p/\sum p) +$ S\*((100-SCORE))/( $\sum 100$ -SCORE))


\$5.90 per person baseline

Additional allocation based on weighted calculation of four socio-economic and public health metrics

Individual Municipality Allocations & Requests Funding requests will be accepted and evaluated against Municipality allocations


## Determining Allocations: Equitable Distribution Model

Resulting allocations ensure all Suburban Municipalities receive an allocation that reflects the population, economic, social and public health factors of their community

# Rapid Response to Equitable Recovery Timeline



### **Developed Phase I & II**

- Rapid Response plan to address COVID-19 impact

- Cook County COVID-19 Response Plan: from Rapid Response to Equitable Recovery

### Launched

 \$10M zero interest Community Recovery Fund

### **Developing Phase III**

- Equitable Recovery initiatives address funding and technical assistance gaps in five key areas
- Execution of partnership agreements and IGA's

#### Launching Phase III

- Launch programs for Housing and Emergency Social Services
- Launch a series of initiatives to assist small businesses, manufacturers and workforce


## Equitable Recovery Program Phase III Overview


# Equitable Recovery Funding Coordination
