Back Drop

2006: The Massachusetts Department of Youth Services had:

- No policy regulating the use of isolation
- No data related to isolation
- No direction to the field related to practice standards
- Inadequate intake screening process
- Unlicensed clinical staff
- A salary structure that did not support recruitment & retention of qualified, experienced clinicians
- A lot of self-harm by youths in their rooms



DYS Policy: No Room Confinement as a Sanction

"It is the policy of the Department of Youth Services ("DYS") that during non-sleep hours, youth may be kept involuntarily in a room for the following reasons: to calm a youth who is exhibiting seriously disruptive or dangerous behavior; ... for the safety and security of a youth; ... A youth may not be confined in a room for the following purposes: as a consequence for non-compliance; punishment; harassment; or in retaliation for any youth conduct... Room confinement may only be used when less restrictive interventions have failed and for the least amount of time required for the youth to regain self-control."


Strategic Approach

Adopted Strength Based Approach

- Positive Youth Development: positions youth as assets not problems to be fixed
- Premium on staff engagement of youth: respect trust potential for constructive criticism
- Dialectical Behavioral Therapy: Cognitive strategy
- Created System of Repairs
- Moved Toward a Balanced Behavioral Approach that Includes Limit Setting as Well as Incentives




Involuntary Room Confinements Trend
