

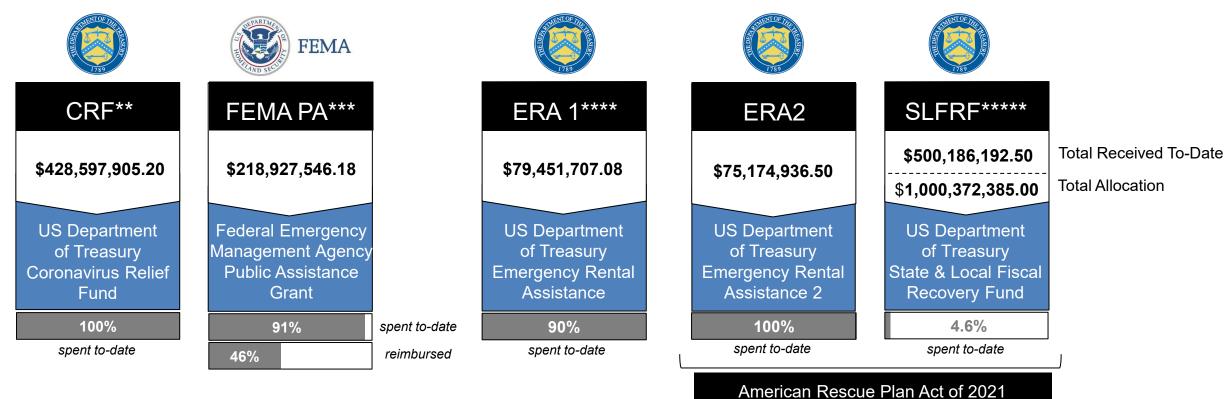
# COVID-19 Financial Response

### Report to the Board of Commissioners

May 12, 2022

#### Purpose

This report is intended to serve as an update on the County's COVID-19 funding.\*



<sup>\*</sup> This report covers activity for the period from March 1, 2020 through April 22, 2022.

<sup>\*\*</sup> The CARES Act Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) expired December 31, 2021. The County is engaged in closeout activities, including final reporting to the US Treasury. CRF data can be found in the appendix of this report.

<sup>\*\*\*</sup> Amount reflected above is the amount of the current grant budget. During the February 25, 2021 Board meeting, the budget was increased by \$75m to account for anticipated vaccination and labor costs. During the September 23, 2021 Board meeting, the budget was increased by \$16.5m to account for additional labor and non-personnel costs. During the December 16, 2021, the budget was increased by \$49.9m to account for additional vaccination, labor and non-personnel costs. During the February 10, 2022 Board meeting, the budget was increased by \$15.7m to account for additional vaccine distribution and administrative costs. On March 1, 2022, FEMA public assistance was extended through July 1, 2022.

<sup>\*\*\*\*</sup> Cook County was allocated \$72,808,624.10 for their original ERA 1 allocation. Subsequently, Cook County diverted \$3M in residual ERA 1 Admin to Direct Assistance, and received two reallocations of funds. The 1<sup>st</sup> was in the amount of \$446,212.19 and the second was in the amount of \$6,196,870.79. Thus, the final amount of ERA 1 Funds available is \$79,451,707.08.

\*\*\*\*\*\* Cook County was allocated \$1,000,372,385.00 under SLFRF and has received 50% of the award allocation to-date, or \$500,186,192.50.



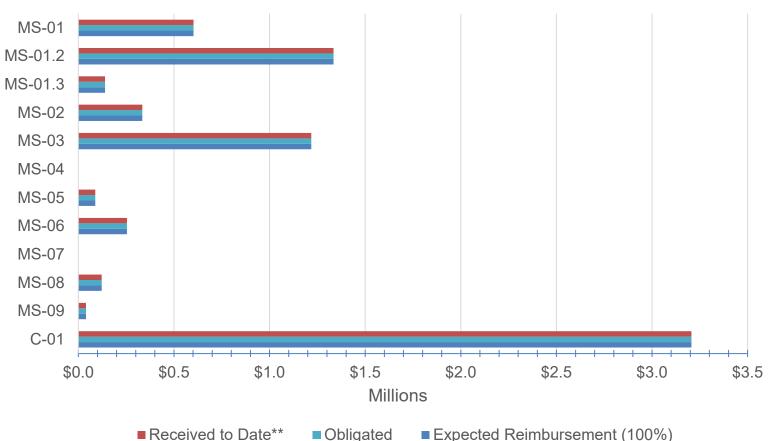

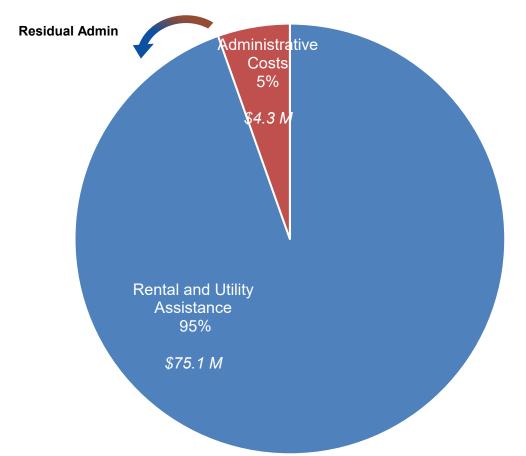
## **ERA 1 Funding**

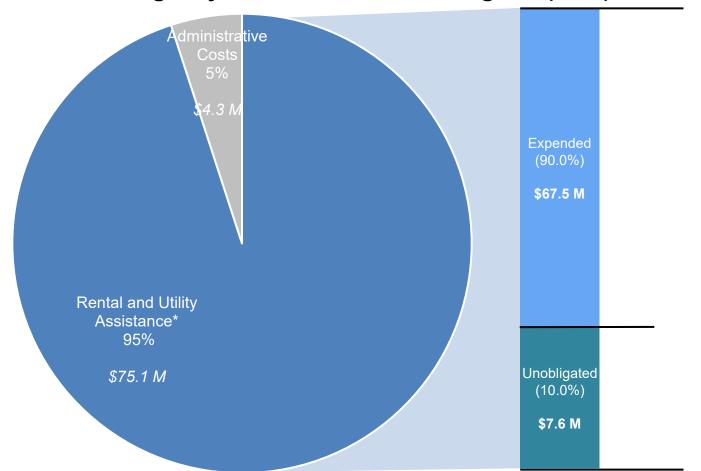

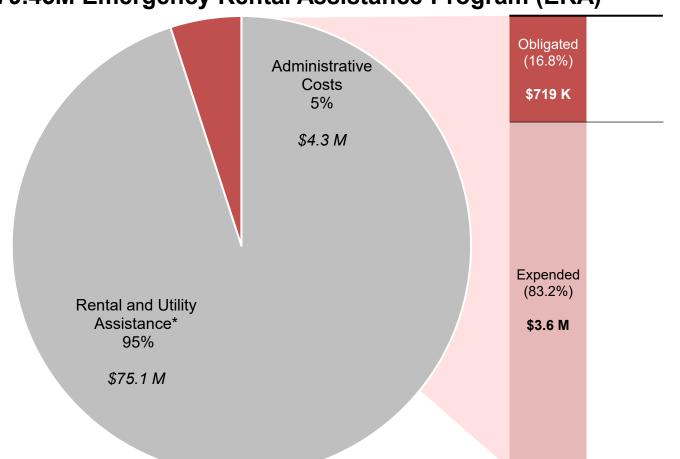

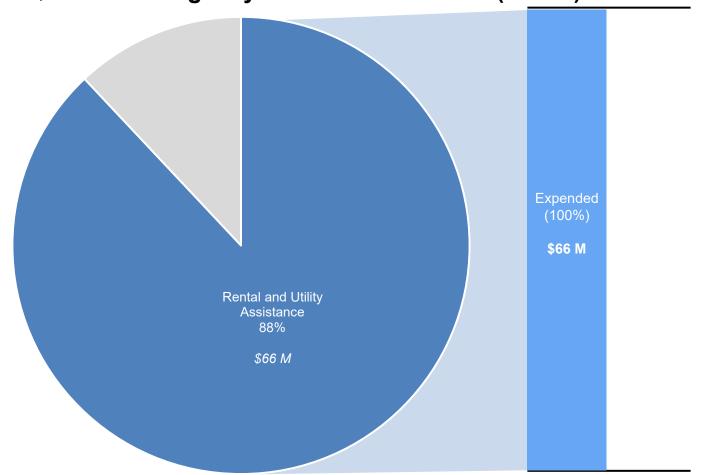

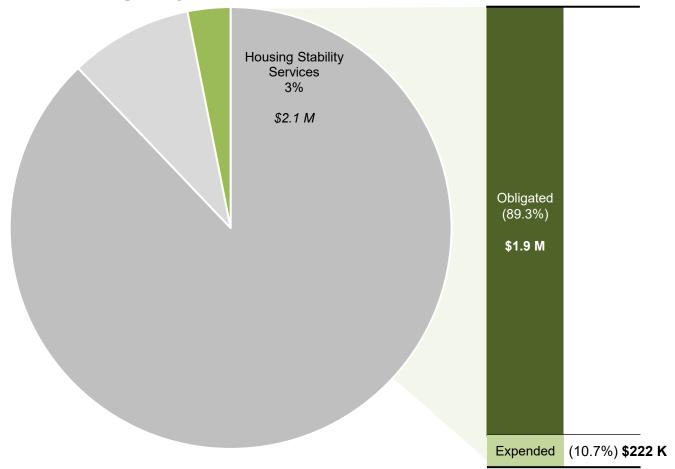

Breakdown of Housing Stability Services costs and obligated expenses within ERA 1 program



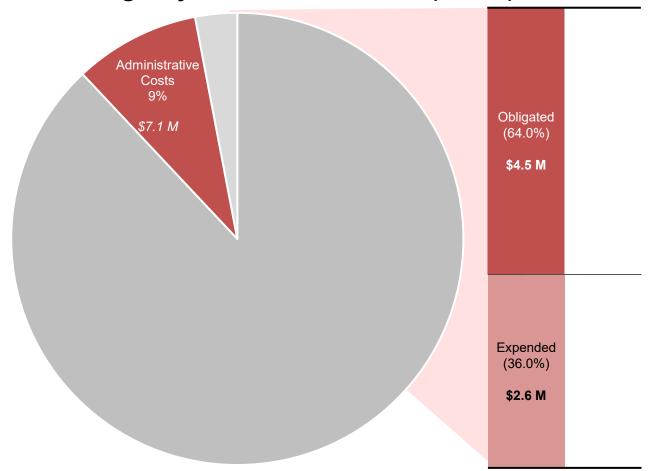

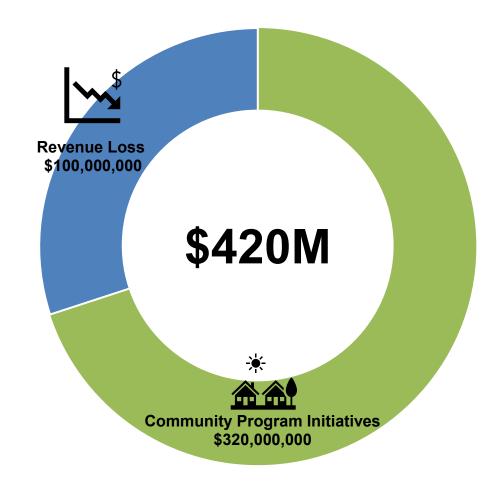

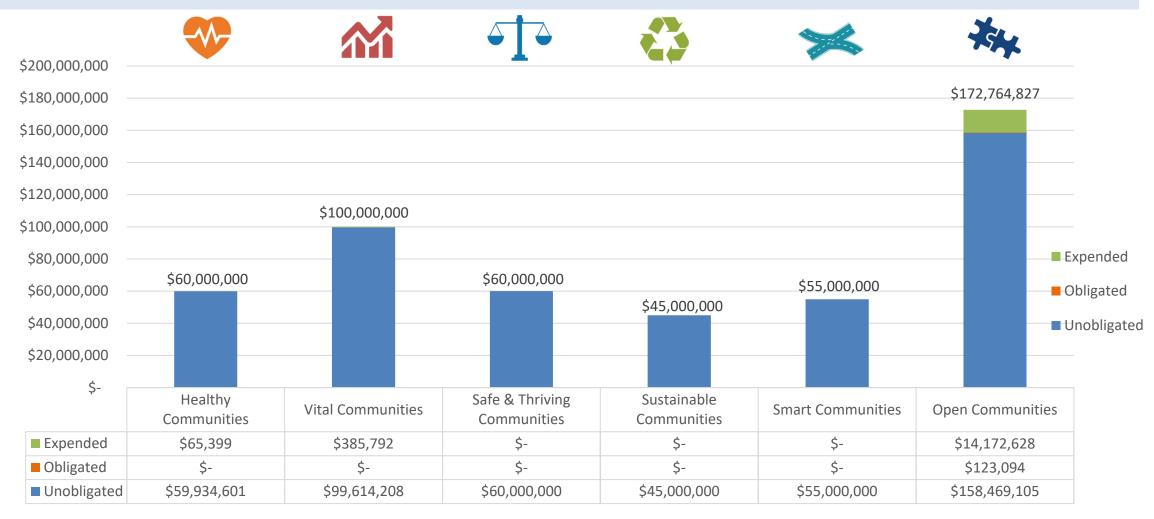
#### State & Local Fiscal Recovery Fund: FY22 Board Appropriated Allocations

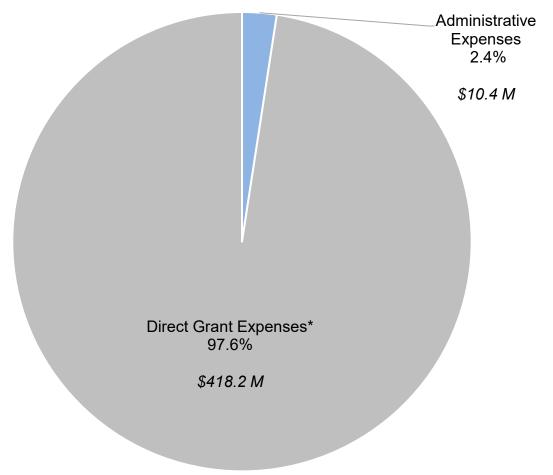

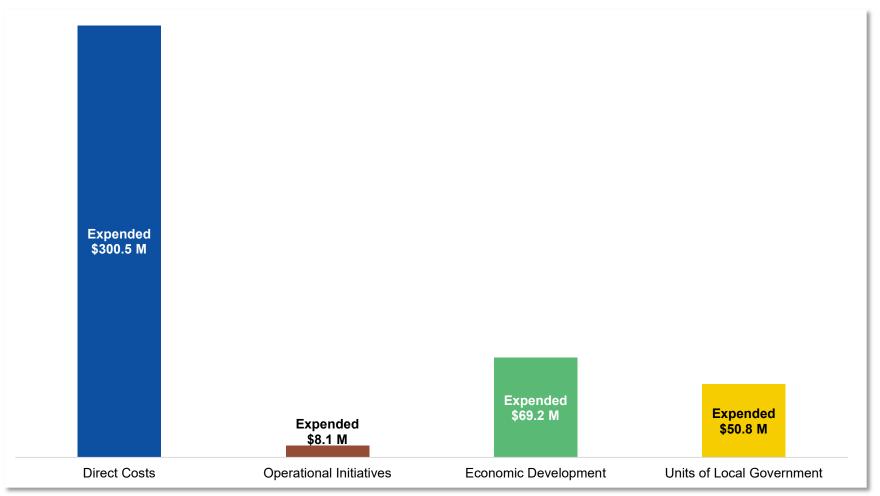

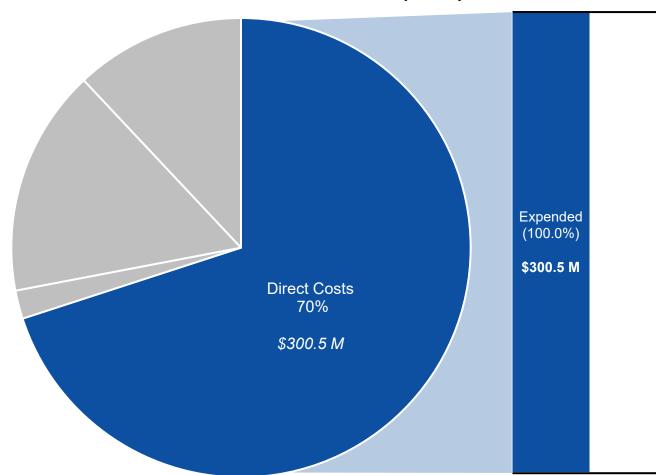

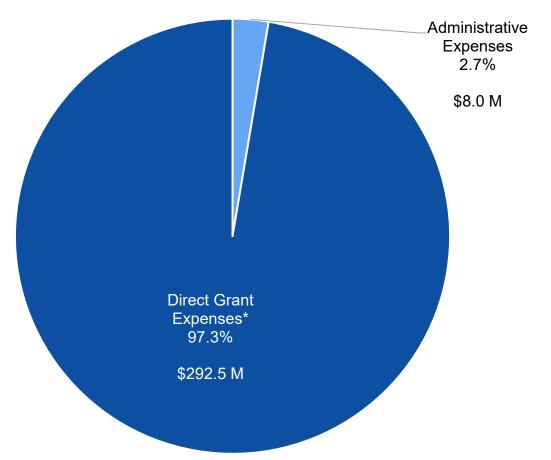

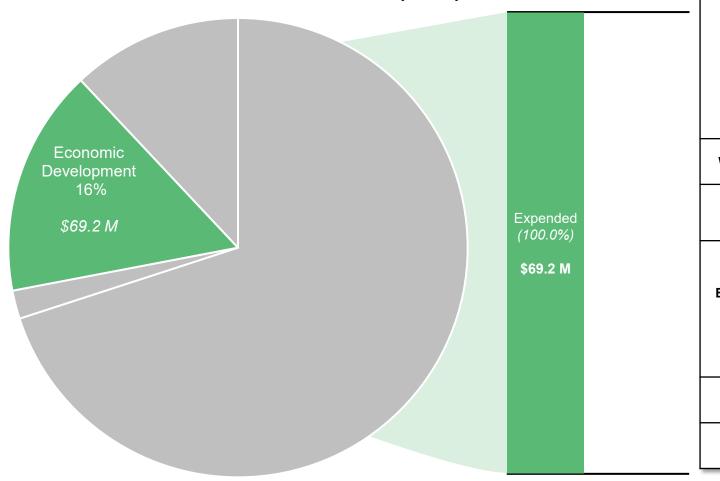

#### Breakdown of administrative expenses within Economic Development Programs

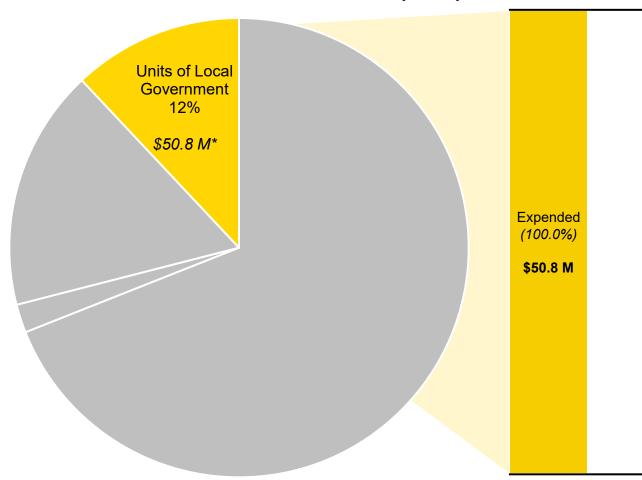

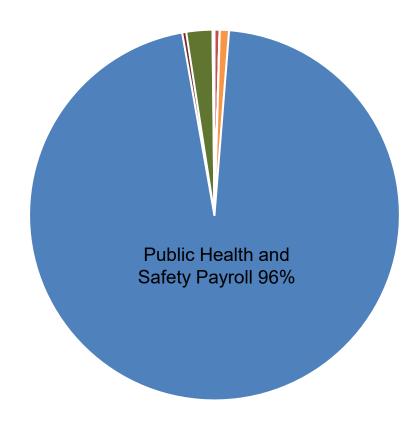

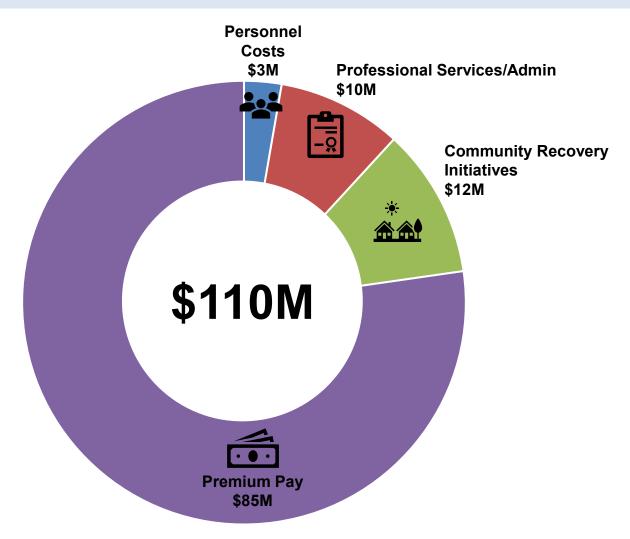
