


# **COVID-19 Financial Response**

## **Report to the Board of Commissioners**

December 15, 2022

### Purpose

This report is intended to serve as an update on the County's COVID-19 funding.\*



American Rescue Plan Act of 2021

\* This report covers activity for the period from March 1, 2020 through November 18, 2022.

\*\* The CARES Act Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) expired December 31, 2021. The County submitted its final report to Treasury on July 7, 2022. CRF data can be found in the appendix of this report.

\*\*\* Amount reflected above is the amount of the current grant budget. During the February 25, 2021 Board meeting, the budget was increased by \$75m to account for anticipated vaccination and labor costs. During the September 23, 2021 Board meeting, the budget was increased by \$16.5m to account for additional labor and non-personnel costs. During the December 16, 2021, the budget was increased by \$49.9m to account for additional vaccination, labor and non-personnel costs. During the February 10, 2022 Board meeting, the budget was increased by \$15.7m to account for additional vaccine distribution and administrative costs. On March 1, 2022, FEMA public assistance was extended through July 1, 2022. During the June 16, 2022 Board meeting, the budget was increased by \$30m to account for additional vaccine distribution and administrative costs. During the July 28, 2022 Board meeting, the budget was increased by \$100m to account for additional vaccine distribution and administrative costs.

\*\*\*\* Cook County was allocated \$72,808,624.10 for their original ERA 1 allocation. Subsequently, Cook County diverted \$3M in residual ERA 1 Admin to Direct Assistance, and received four fund reallocations. The 1<sup>st</sup> was in the amount of \$446,212.19, the second was in the amount of \$6,196,870.79, the third was in the amount of \$5,935,560.20 and the fourth was in the amount of \$2,981,944.04.

\*\*\*\*\* Cook County was allocated \$75,174,936.50 for their ERA 2 allocation. Subsequently, Cook County received its first fund reallocation in the amount of \$2,600,862.36.

\*\*\*\*\*\* Cook County was allocated \$1,000,372,385.00 under SLFRF and has received 100% of the award allocation to-date, or \$1,000,372,385.00.








## ERA 1 Funding

US Department of Treasury Emergency Rental Assistance Program

\$88,369,211.32

After disbursing \$3M in ERA 1 funds originally allocated for Administrative Expenses, Cook County has subsequently disbursed \$6M in reallocated funds. Since then, the County received an additional \$6M reallocated award, with \$5.5M transferred for direct assistance and a new award of ~\$3M more which were entirely allocated to direct assistance. This culminated in 9,240 approved applications, amounting to approximately 96.3% direct rental assistance disbursements.\*



\* Cook County was allocated \$72,808,624.10 for their original ERA 1 allocation, with \$65.5M being allocated for Direct Assistance. Subsequently, Cook County diverted \$3M in residual ERA 1 Admin to Direct Assistance, and received four reallocations of funds. The first was in the amount of \$446,212.19, the second was in the amount of \$6,196,870.79, the third was in the amount of \$5,935,560.20 and the fourth was in the amount of \$2,981,944.04. Thus, the final amount of ERA 1 Funds available is \$88,369,211.32

The graph below provides the breakdown of direct rental and utility assistance provided to ERA 1 applicants. The County successfully disbursed 96.3% of the funds allocated for direct assistance, including subsequent reallocation awards.\*

**\$88.4M Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERA)** 





\* After disbursing 100% of its direct assistance portion (\$65.5M), the County received four reallocation awards totaling approximately \$15.6M. \$14.5M of the total reallocation amount was allocated for direct assistance (with the residual portion going to admin), in addition to \$3M that was previously diverted from administrative costs to direct assistance. This amounts to the \$83M figure reflected in the graph above. \*\* Treasury requires at least 90% of the total award be used to provide rent and utility financial assistance. The County has met and exceeded this requirement.

Breakdown of administrative costs and obligated expenses within ERA 1 program. This accounts for budget shift of \$3M from unspent administrative costs to direct assistance, and the recent approximately \$6M in reallocated funds received (\$435K of which went to admin).


## **ERA 2 Funding**

US Department of Treasury Emergency Rental Assistance 2 Program

Total Allocation: \$77,775,797.86

Between ERA 1 and ERA 2, Cook County received 38,516 applications with 37,771 being complete and reviewable to be processed by the Housing Authority of Cook County (HACC).\* The County has also transferred \$3M in dollars allocated for admin to direct assistance to continue providing support.

**\$77.8 M Emergency Rental Assistance 2 (ERA 2)** 




\* As the program continues to vacillate between ERA 1 and ERA 2, those originally allocated for ERA 2 have been now appropriated for ERA 1 (the current funds being disbursed). For this reason, we've provided the aggregate figures.

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After disbursing the total direct assistance allocation and shifting \$3M in funds originally allocated for admin, the County received its first ERA 2 reallocation award of ~\$2.6M. Approximately 94% of the total Direct Rental Assistance allocation has been disbursed.











Final Cook County Allocations of CARES Act Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) Dollars






















