WHEREAS, Morgan F. Murphy Jr. was born on April 16, 1932, to Morgan F. Murphy and Anne Murphy Sr., dear bother of Mary Rita (Robert) Stump, Jane (the late Raymond) Holmes, Bernard (Virginia) Murphy, the late Reverend John Michael Murphy, and Sister Carol Ann Murphy, RSM; and

WHEREAS, Morgan F. Murphy Jr. was the adored husband of the late Charlene Diane (Jurgensen); loving father of Morgan III, Michelle (Dan Hebert), Constance (Larry Doody), father-in-law of the Honorable Lisa Ruble Murphy; grandfather to Morgan F. Murphy, IV, Brendan P. Murphy, Riley P. Doody, Brieanne E. Hebert; and

WHEREAS, Morgan F. Murphy Jr. attended Chicago parochial schools and later Northwestern University in 1955 and was a member of Sigma Chi Fraternity, and he received a Juris Doctorate degree from DePaul University School of Law in 1962; and

WHEREAS, Morgan F. Murphy Jr. proudly served his county as a 1st Lieutenant of the United States Marine Corps from 1955-1957, including a one-year tour of duty in the Far East; and

WHEREAS, Morgan F. Murphy Jr. was an administrative assistant to Clerk of the Circuit Court of Chicago from 1958-1961, and commenced practice in Chicago; and

WHEREAS, Morgan F. Murphy Jr. was a Special Attorney for the Board of Election Commissioners, for the 1964 at-large elections; and

WHEREAS, Morgan F. Murphy Jr. was an attorney for the Chicago Dairyman's Association during the 1968 milk strikes, and a trustee-management representative of the Milk Wagon Drivers Union; and

WHEREAS, Morgan F. Murphy Jr. as a member of the United States House of Representatives from 1970-1980, were he served on the Rules Committee, Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence, Select Committee on Narcotics and Drug Abuse Control, Foreign Affairs, and as Chairman of the Subcommittee on Legislation; and **WHEREAS,** Morgan F. Murphy Jr. was a hearing officer for Local Liquor Control Commission, 1969-1970 and delegate to the Democratic National Conventions in 1968 and 1972; and

WHEREAS, Morgan F. Murphy Jr. served as a Board Member of the Cook County Zoning Board of Appeals from 2005-2014; and

WHEREAS, Congressman Morgan F. Murphy Jr, received the Central Intelligence Agency Award from the Director, Admiral Stansfield Turner, for outstanding leadership in legislative work for the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) and intelligence communities in 1979; and

WHEREAS, Congressman Morgan F. Murphy Jr, received many honors including the Chicago South Chamber of Commerce Annual Award for Midway Airport Reactivation in 1978, the Catholic Man of the Year Award in 1976, and Catholic Lawyers Guild of Chicago's Lawyer of the Year Award in 1977; and

WHEREAS, Morgan F. Murphy Jr. will be remembered for his generosity, kindness and larger than life personality; and

WHEREAS, Morgan F. Murphy Jr's enduring love and commitment to his wife, his children and his grandchildren shall forever be remembered.

WHEREAS, along with his family Mr. English briefly left Chicago, for New York, where he would study at Cornell University. He would later return to Chicago and take a job as a health-care executive; and

WHEREAS, Mr. English played key roles behind-the-scenes in efforts that included voter-registration initiatives that helped elect Harold Washington as mayor in 1983. He also worked to preserve the buildings at the South Shore Country Club and transform them into the South Shore Cultural Center; and

WHEREAS, in 1983 Mr. English founded the Black United Fund in Chicago. The Black United Fund raises charitable donations to provide grants and expertise to small not-for-profit groups and programs for job training; and

WHEREAS, Mr. English is survived by his wife, Denise; two sons: Nkrumah and Jummane; and two daughters: Kenya and Kamillah.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the President and the Cook County Board of Commissioners, on behalf of the residents of Cook County, do extend their deepest condolences and most heartfelt sympathy to the family as well as to the many friends and loved ones of Mr. Henry English; and

CONGRATULATING THE OAK PARK RIVER FOREST HIGH SCHOOL WRESTLING TEAM ON WINNING THEIR THIRD CONSECUTIVE CLASS 3A STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

WHEREAS, on February 27, 2016 the wrestling team of Oak Park River Forest High School (OPRF), the Huskies, repeated as Class 3A state champions, defeating Marmion Academy 34-22 in the final of the Illinois High School Association (IHSA) Dual Team Tournament at U.S. Cellular Coliseum in Bloomington; and

WHEREAS, in 2015 the Huskies edged Sandburg High School 39-16 to claim the 3A dual-team tourney title and also produced three individual state champions in Jason Renteria, Isaiah White, and Allen Stallings and six (6) more top-six, All-State finishers and two (2) additional state qualifiers; and

WHEREAS, the Huskies have won four (4) state championships over the last eight (8) years, including two (2) undefeated teams (28-0 in 2015; 24-0 in 2009); and

WHEREAS, nationally, OPRF finished as the top-ranked team in the country in 2016, per high school wrestling website Illinois MatMen; and

WHEREAS, Huskie student wrestler Isaiah White has gone 3-0 in addition to his program-best three (3) individual state titles. Isaiah was also the first Huskie student wrestler to win a title at the Walsh Ironman in 2015; and

WHEREAS, the Huskies overcame significant challenges off the mat on the way to their 2016 title. Just days before the tournament, junior Deundre Garner tragically lost his older brother Diamond to gun violence. Despite this setback, Deundre attended the tournament and wrestled, beating his opponent 8-5; and

WHEREAS, after the tournament, Coach Paul Collins paid tribute to Deundre's courage and commitment, praising the young man for showing up and competing in the face of adversity; and

WHEREAS, Oak Park and River Forest High School senior and Huskie student wrestler Allen Stallings captured the focus and inner strength necessary to succeed in the Huskie wrestling program when he said "It's 10 times better winning a team state title than individual. These are my brothers. These are the guys I work with all year. Even though wrestling is an individual sport, it's really all about the team at the end of the day".

PROPOSED ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE SALE OF SECOND HAND CATALYTIC CONVERTERS

WHEREAS, since 1975, all motor vehicles produced in the United States are required to have a catalytic converter as part of the exhaust system. The catalytic converter is an emissions control device containing precious metals, such as platinum, palladium or rhodium, that act as catalysts. A catalytic converter is vehicle emissions control device that converts toxic pollutants in the exhaust gas of motor vehicles into less harmful fumes; and

WHEREAS, with the price of precious metal skyrocketing, such as platinum, which is \$936.10 an ounce, palladium, which is \$536.30 an ounce, and rhodium which is \$760 an ounce, thieves have acquired an

interest in stealing catalytic converters, which they then pawn or sell to junk peddlers, second hand dealers, motor vehicle repair shops, and recycling facilities for a fraction of the converter's cost. Stolen catalytic converters typically reap the thief a profit of \$100.00 to \$150.00, while, depending on the make and model of the vehicle, it costs the vehicle owner between \$1,000.00 and \$2,000.00 to replace; and

WHEREAS, vehicles that sit higher from the ground, such as trucks, pick-up trucks and SUVs, are particularly vulnerable to catalytic converter theft because thieves can access the converter simply by sliding underneath the vehicle without having to jack it up. With just a few cuts of a battery-powered saw, a catalytic converter can be removed from a vehicle in less than a minute; and

WHEREAS, catalytic converter theft typically happens to vehicles that are parked for prolonged periods in large parking lots, such as shopping centers, mass transit commuter lots or company parking lots. However, vehicles parked on City streets are not immune from such theft, as police blotters are riddled with reports of stolen catalytic converters; and

WHEREAS, because catalytic converters are not marked with the vehicle's VIN number, they are not readily traceable to the vehicle's owner, making them easy fodder for theft and illegal resale; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Commissioners seeks to deter catalytic converter theft by making it more difficult for thieves to sell stolen catalytic converters in Cook County; and

WHEREAS, by implementing a ban on the sale of secondhand catalytic converters, Cook County would effectively become a dry County in the resale market of catalytic converters.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners that Chapter 58 Offenses and Miscellaneous Provisions, Article II Offenses Involving Property Rights, Section 58-48 Special Handling of Catalytic Converters, is hereby enacted as follows:

ARTICLE II. - OFFENSES INVOLVING PROPERTY RIGHTS

Sec. 58-48- Special Handling of Catalytic Converters.

(a) **Definitions**

Junk peddler means any person who travels, with or without a vehicle, from place to place within the city for the purpose of collecting, transporting or disposing of junk or who makes a business of purchasing junk from anyone who desires to sell it and carries it away upon purchasing it. The term "junk peddler" does not include any person issued a permit to operate a recycling facility under Sec. 30-859 of this Code.

Catalytic converter means a device incorporated in the exhaust system of a motor vehicle, containing a catalyst for converting pollutant gases into less harmful ones.

(b) Prohibited acts by junk peddlers.

It shall be unlawful for any licensee engaged in the business of junk peddler to:

(1) purchase, collect, transport or dispose of any catalytic converter that is not attached to a motor vehicle, or any portion of a dismantled catalytic converter that is reasonably identifiable as such.

(c) Prohibited pledges or purchases.

(1) No licensee under this chapter shall purchase, take or receive from any person in pawn or pledge, for money loaned, any catalytic converter that is not attached to a motor vehicle, or any portion of a dismantled catalytic converter that is reasonably identifiable as such.

(2) No secondhand dealer shall purchase, take or receive from any person any catalytic converter that is not attached to a motor vehicle, or any portion of a dismantled catalytic converter that is reasonably identifiable as such.

(d) Proper disposal of unrepairable or unclaimed vehicle catalytic converters.

Motor vehicle repair shops shall lawfully dispose of all unrepairable or unclaimed motor vehicles catalytic converters as provided by Chapter 30 Article VII of this Code. Proof of proper disposal, in the form of a receipt, shall be maintained by each motor vehicle repair shop on the business premises of the repair shop for a minimum of at least two years, and, upon request by any authorized county official, the receipt required under this section shall be made available for inspection by such authorized county official during the licensee's regular business hours.

(1) Unlawful acts and omissions. It shall be unlawful for any motor vehicle repair shop to perform any of the following acts or omissions related to the conduct of the business of the motor vehicle shop, whether done by the owner of the facility, the operator of the business or by any mechanic, employee, partner, officer or member of the motor vehicle repair shop:

a. purchasing from any person any catalytic converter that is not attached to a motor vehicle, or any portion of a dismantled catalytic converter that is reasonably identifiable as such, unless the person from whom such catalytic converter or portion thereof is purchased is:

(i) another properly licensed motor vehicle repair shop regulated by 815 ILCS 306, or

(ii) a properly permitted Class IVA or Class IVB recycling facility under Sec. 30-859 and as permitted by Sec. 30-873 of this Code, or

(iii) the original manufacturer of the catalytic converter or portion thereof.

(e) Proper disposal of catalytic converters - Maintenance of records - Required.

(1) Catalytic converters or parts of dismantled catalytic converters shall only be sold, disposed of or otherwise transferred:

a. to another properly licensed motor vehicle repair shop regulated by 815 ILCS 306, or

b. to a properly permitted Class IVA or Class IVB recycling facility under Sec. 30-859 and as permitted by Sec. 30-873 of this Code, or

c. by returning the converter or part thereof to its original manufacturer.

(2) Each catalytic converter or part thereof that is sold, disposed of or otherwise transferred pursuant to this section shall be accompanied by a copy of the invoice as required under subsection a. of this section pertaining to such converter or part.

Effective date: This ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.

AN AMENDMENT TO THE COOK COUNTY ETHICS ORDINANCE

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 2 - Administration, Article VII - Ethics, Division 2 - Code of Ethical Conduct, Section 2-575 Electronic Communication Regarding Official Government Business of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as Follows:

Sec. 2-575. Electronic Communication Regarding Official Government Business

All electronic communication by officials, board or commission appointees and employees regarding official government business shall be by and through official government email accounts. Use of personal email, texts or social media to communicate official government business is prohibited except as specified herein with respect to separately elected officials. Use of social media to broadcast information to the general public is permitted. Separately elected officials and their staffs may use separate email accounts associated with their own offices or personal email accounts if they notify the Secretary to the Board that such email accounts are being used for official government business and they include information from such accounts in response to Freedom of Information Act requests.

Effective date: This ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE

ESTABLISHING THE COOK COUNTY COMMISSION ON SOCIAL INNOVATION FOR JOB CREATION, WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT, ENTREPRENEURSHIP, COMMUNITY REVITALIZATION, AND INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT.

WHEREAS, the municipalities throughout Cook County, including inner-city Chicago and those comprising the Chicago Southland, are facing high unemployment and other economic challenges; and

WHEREAS, high levels of economic distress in the aforementioned areas have been reported in the *Distressed Community Index* from Washington D.C. based, Economic Innovation Group, that shows high levels of inequality; and

WHEREAS, people throughout Cook County are urgently seeking knowledge-based, innovation-driven solutions to social problems relating to education, health care, unemployment, and poverty.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners that Chapter 14 Community Development, Article IX, sections 14-89 through 14-97 of the Cook County Code, is hereby enacted as follows:

Sec. 14-89. Short title

This chapter shall be known and may be cited as the "Ordinance Establishing the Cook County Commission on Social Innovation."

Sec. 14-90. Declaration

The County Board hereby establishes the Cook County Commission on Social Innovation.

Sec. 14-91. Definitions

The following words and terms shall have the meanings set forth in this section, except where otherwise specifically indicated:

Board of Commissioners or County Board means the Board of Commissioners for Cook County, Illinois.

Commission means the Cook County Commission on Social Innovation created by this ordinance.

Chairperson means the chairperson of the Cook County Commission on Social Innovation.

County means Cook County, Illinois.

Cook County Code means the Code of Ordinances of Cook County, Illinois.

Inner City means any area within a municipality's boundaries that is facing economic challenges.

Members means members of the Cook County Commission on Social Innovation.

Ordinance means this ordinance creating the Cook County Commission on Social Innovation.

Social Innovation means (a) novel solutions to social problems which are more effective, efficient, sustainable, or just compared to current solutions, for which the value created accrues primarily to society rather than to private individuals, and (b) ideas that promote public, private, and philanthropic collaboration in order to create positive effects on areas with economic challenges.

Southland includes, but is not limited to the south-side of Chicago, the South incorporated municipalities of Suburban Cook County, and the unincorporated areas of South Suburban Cook County.

Sec. 14-92. Purpose

The purpose of this ordinance is to create the Cook County Commission on Social Innovation, which shall engage in the following activities:

(a) The commission shall make actionable policy recommendations to help achieve the following purposes:

(1)To strengthen the capacity of the Southland and, generally, of the County to work cooperatively with relevant stakeholders to create, scale, and sustain innovative social programs;

(2)To build the capacity of nonprofit organizations and government to pursue entrepreneurial ventures in the Southland and in the County; and

(3)To attract investment and philanthropic funding to the Southland and to the County to support these ventures.

(b) The commission shall advise the County Board and the heads of the County's agencies and departments.

(c) The commission shall gather empirical information on social innovation, social entrepreneurship, and social enterprise.

(d) The commission shall receive and consider reports and testimony from individuals, government departments, community-based organizations, nonprofit organizations, foundations, and other public and

private organizations (whether or not based in the County) about how social innovation and entrepreneurship can accelerate progress on social issues, work cross-sector, and advance social and economic development goals.

(e) The commission shall identify promising strategies that have been used in other communities, counties, states and countries to encourage cross-sector collaboration on social issues.

(f) The commission shall identify useful strategies to educate and train citizens, nonprofit organizations, governments, students, and businesses on entrepreneurial concepts specifically as applied in the social sector.

(g) The commission shall serve as (1) a resource for the County's agencies and departments in common cause to promote the Southland's and the County's data-driven social innovation ecosystem in collaboration with other relevant actors; and (2) the County's social innovation laboratory, convening a broad and diverse array of interests and expertise within and across sectors to facilitate cooperation and the co-creation of innovative solutions to social problems.

Sec. 14-93. Compliance with law

As a body empowered by the Cook County Board, the Cook County Commission on Social Innovation shall comply with all applicable federal and state laws, rules, regulations and orders.

Sec. 14-94. Chairperson and committee membership

The Cook County Commission on Social Innovation shall consist of the following persons who shall serve as commissioners each of whom shall reside within the corporate boundaries of Cook County and shall serve without compensation, but may be reimbursed by the County for reasonable expenses incurred in the performance of commission duties:

(a) The Chair of the County Board's Business and Economic Development Committee, who shall serve as the commission's Chairperson.

(b) A Vice Chairperson designated by the Chairperson who shall be responsible for the day-to-day operations of the commission.

(c) The Executive Director of the South Suburban Mayors and Managers Association or his or her designee.

(d) The Bureau Chief of the Cook County Bureau of Economic Development or his or her designee.

(e) The Chair of the Cook County Economic Development Advisory Committee or his or her designee.

(f) The Superintendent of the Cook County Department of Transportation and Highways or his or her designee.

(g) A mayor or manager of a municipality in the Southland, to be designated by the Chairperson as a member of the commission.

(h) Up to twenty (20) other persons appointed by the Chairperson who shall represent the diversity of the County and reflect the various disciplines necessary or desirable to ensure the commission's success.

Sec. 14-95. Term of office; vacancies

(a) The term of each commissioner designated under subsections 14-94(a) through (h) shall coincide with his or her term of public office if such commissioner is the officeholder, or with the term of public office of the designating officeholder if such commissioner is the designee.

(b) Vacancies on the commission shall be filled in the same manner that original appointments are made and shall be filled for the unexpired term of the commissioner whose place has become vacant.

Sec. 14-96. Quorum requirement

A quorum, being a majority of the commissioners then in office, shall be necessary in order to conduct all hearings of the Cook County Commission on Social Innovation.

Sec. 14-97. Operations

(a) The commission shall meet at least once per month.

(b) The commissioners, under the direction of the Chairperson, shall organize themselves into committees and subcommittees, which may be permanent or ad hoc. Committees and subcommittees may include, as non-voting members, members of the public and relevant subject matter experts who are not commissioners.

(c) The Chairperson of the commission shall appoint the chairperson of each committee.

(d) The chairperson of each committee shall appoint the chairperson of each subcommittee within the jurisdiction of that committee.

(e) Meetings of each committee or subcommittee shall be held at intervals determined by the chairperson of the respective committee or subcommittee.

(f) The commission may receive donations of money, labor, services, or other things of value from any public or private agency or person.

(g) The commission shall respond to assignments from County agencies and County departments in a timely fashion and shall submit reports to the County Board at least annually. Such reports shall address the plans, actions, and resources needed to achieve the commission's purposes.

(h) The commission shall serve as a research organization for the County Board regarding social issues, incubating proposed solutions to social problems, and advancing them for further consideration and, upon approval, for implementation. The goals of such collaboration shall include cooperation in prototyping or

modeling innovative social solutions, field-testing such solutions, and evaluating their results to ensure that such solutions are practicable and to reduce the risks associated with their implementation.

(i) All aspects of the commission's work shall be governed by the Open Meetings Act, 5 ILCS 120/1 to 120/7.5, and by the Freedom of Information Act, 5 ILCS 140/1 to 140/11.5. Members of the public shall be encouraged to attend and constructively participate in the commission's meetings.

Effective date: This ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.

The Budget Department has received all requisite documents and determined the fiscal impact on Cook County, if any.

Summary: This grant renewal will provide funding for the continued operation and maintenance of specialized air pollution monitoring sites in Cook County pursuant to the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency Air Monitoring Plan. These sites measure the 2.5 micron sized particles suspended in the air as part of an air quality plan requirement from USEPA and are part of a research project to determine the quantity and composition of these very small particles in the urban air.

WHEREAS, a new report, *Lost: The Crisis Of Jobless and Out Of School Teens and Young Adults In Chicago, Los Angeles, New York Illinois and the U.S.*, was commissioned by the Alternative Schools Network and developed by the University of Illinois Chicago's Great Cities Institute; and

WHEREAS, despite a growing national economic recovery, youth employment (16-24) is still at 27% nationwide; and

WHEREAS, Chicago leads the national average in out of work, out of school youth; and

WHEREAS, 47% of Black men (20-24) and 20% of Hispanic men are jobless and out of school in Chicago; and

WHEREAS, the situation is even worse for Chicago's Black and Hispanic teens (16-19) with 88% of Blacks and 85% of Hispanic youth, compared to 71% nationwide; and

WHEREAS, jobless rates for youth (20-24) are highest on the South and West Sides of the City of Chicago; and

WHEREAS, until 2000, there was a national summer youth employment program that provided over 650,000 low-income youth with jobs; and

WHEREAS, since then, there have been only sporadic programs that provide youth jobs in the summer and hardly any programs to provide youth jobs throughout the year; and

WHEREAS, joblessness leads to poverty, drug abuse, homelessness and violence in our communities; and

WHEREAS, the persistence and severity of these conditions have ramifications for our young people and generations to come, and

WHEREAS, a national focus and program must be developed, along with state and local based programs, to give the youth of our country the opportunity and skills they will need to become successful adults in an economy growing more competitive each year.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Workforce, Housing and Community Development Committee shall hold a hearing to discuss the findings of this report on the crisis of youth unemployment; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOVLED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners requests that the Chief Executive Officer of the Chicago Cook Workforce Partnership attend the hearing to provide an update on available programming and services for Cook County youth.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE GOVERNING THE SAFE DISPOSAL OF PHARMACEUTICALS

WHEREAS, Cook County is a home rule unit of government pursuant to the 1970 Illinois Constitution, Article VII, Section 6(a); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to its home rule power, Cook County may exercise any power and perform any function relating to its government and affairs including the power to regulate for the protection of the public health, safety, morals, and welfare; and

WHEREAS, the health and welfare of the residents of Cook County, particularly children and the elderly, would be greatly improved and advanced by the proper disposal of unwanted, expired or unneeded prescription drugs; and

WHEREAS, there is a significant risk of poisoning, in particular to children and the elderly, due to the improper or careless disposal of prescription drugs and the illegal re-sale of prescription drugs; and

WHEREAS, the groundwater and drinking water of Cook County is being contaminated by improperly disposed of prescription drugs passing through our wastewater and treatment centers; and

WHEREAS, the United States Supreme Court has held that waste disposal is traditionally a function of local government; and

WHEREAS, the first pharmaceutical disposal ordinance was enacted by Alameda County, California in 2012; and

WHEREAS, since Alameda County's enactment, other counties have enacted or introducing ordinances regulating the disposal of pharmaceuticals, including Los Angeles, Marin, Santa Barbara, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, San Francisco, and San Mateo Counties in California and King County, Washington;

WHEREAS, the Alameda County ordinance was upheld in the United States District Court for the Northern District of California in <u>Pharmaceutical Research and Manufacturers of America</u>, *et. al v. Alameda* <u>County</u>, *et. al.*, No. 3:12-cv-06203 (N.D. Cal., Aug. 28, 2013) and in the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit in <u>Pharmaceutical Research and Manufacturers of America</u>, *et. al v. Alameda County*, <u>*et. al.*</u>, No. 3:12-cv-06203 (9th Circuit, September 30, 2014). The United States Supreme Court declined to hear the case; and

WHEREAS, in an opinion by Judge N.R. Smith, the Ninth Circuit held that the ordinance did not burden interstate commerce, given that the Ordinance did not affect the interstate flow of goods; and

WHEREAS, the ordinance was found to not discriminate in favor of in-County competitors, as in both on its face and in effect, it applied to all manufacturers that make their drugs available in Alameda County-without respect to the geographic location of the manufacturer; and

WHEREAS, the ordinance did not impose different requirements on Producers within California and Producers outside of California; and

WHEREAS, the ordinance did not act like a tariff and there was no evidence that the Ordinance will interrupt, or even decrease, the "flow of goods" into or out of Alameda County; and

WHEREAS, the ordinance had de minimis costs as compared with the health, safety and environmental benefits; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, the above recitals are expressly incorporated herein and made part hereof as though fully set forth herein.

BE IT FURTHUR ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners that Chapter 46 Law Enforcement, Article II, Sheriff, Division 5, Pharmaceutical Disposal Program, Sections 46-102 - 46-121 is hereby enacted as follows:

Sec. 46-102 - Definitions.

For the purposes of this Division, the following definitions apply:

Board means the Board of Commissioners of Cook County, Illinois.

County means Cook County, Illinois.

County residents mean human beings residing in the County.

Collector means a Person approved by the Director to gather Unwanted Covered Drugs from County residents for the purpose of collection, transportation, and disposal.

Covered Drug means a Drug in any form used by County residents, including prescription, nonprescription, brand name and generic drugs. Notwithstanding the previous sentence, "Covered Drug" does not include:

(1) vitamins or supplements;

(2) herbal-based remedies and homeopathic drugs, products, or remedies;

(3) cosmetics, shampoos, sunscreens, toothpaste, lip balm, antiperspirants, or other personal care products that are regulated as both cosmetics and nonprescription drugs under the federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act (Title 21 U.S.C. Chapter 9);

(4) Drugs for which Producers provide a pharmaceutical product stewardship or take-back program as part

of a federal Food and Drug Administration-managed risk evaluation and mitigation strategy (21 U.S.C. § 355-1);

(5) Drugs that are biological products as defined by 21 C.F.R. § 600.3(h) as it exists on the effective date of this Division if the Producer already provides a pharmaceutical product stewardship or take-back program; and (6) medical devices or their component parts or accessories.

Director means the Director of the Prescription Drug Take Back Program of the Cook County Sheriff's Office, or a duly authorized representative.

District means the districts of Cook County as defined in Article II, Section 22-34 of the Code of Ordinances of Cook County, Illinois.

Drug Wholesaler means a Person who buys Drugs for resale and distribution to corporations, individuals, or entities other than consumers.

Drug means:

(1) any article recognized in the official United States pharmacopoeia, the official national formulary, the official homeopathic pharmacopoeia of the United States or any supplement of the formulary or those pharmacopoeias as published by the U.S. Pharmacopeial Convention and the Homeopathic Pharmacopoeia Convention of the United States;

(2) any substance intended for use in the diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment, or prevention of disease in humans or other animals;

(3) any substance, other than food, intended to affect the structure or any function of the body of humans or other animals; or

(4) any substance intended for use as a component of any substance specified in (1), (2), or (3) of this definition.

Manufacture means the production, preparation, propagation, compounding, or processing of a Drug but does not include the activities of a Repackager or Drug Wholesaler, or practitioner who, distributes or dispenses such substance or device in the course of his or her professional practice or, prepares, compounds, packages, or labels such substance or device.

Manufacturer means a Person engaged in the Manufacture of Drugs.

Mail-back services means a collection method for the return of Unwanted Covered Drugs from County residents utilizing pre-paid and pre-addressed mailing envelopes.

Nonprescription Drug means a Drug that may be lawfully sold without a prescription.

Person means any individual, corporation, limited liability corporation, organization, government,

governmental subdivision or agency, business trust, estate, trust, partnership, association and any other legal entity.

Pharmacy means a place licensed by the state of Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation engaged in the practice of "Pharmacy," as defined by the Illinois Pharmacy Practice Act, 225 ILCS 85/1 *et. seq.* is conducted.

Prescription Drug means any Drug, including any controlled substance, that is required by federal or state law or regulation to be dispensed by prescription only or is restricted to use by practitioners only.

Producer means a Manufacturer engaged in the Manufacture of a Covered Drug sold in the County, including a brand-name or generic Drug. Notwithstanding the previous sentence,

Producer does not include:

(1) a retailer whose store label appears on a Covered Drug or the drug's packaging if the Manufacturer from whom the retailer obtains the drug is identified under Sec. 46-103(d) of this Division;

(2) a Repackager if the Manufacturer from whom the Repackager obtains the Drug is identified under Sec. 46-103(d) of this Division;

(3) a pharmacist who compounds or repackages a prescribed individual drug product for a consumer; or

(4) a wholesaler who is not also the Manufacturer.

Repackager means a person who owns or operates an establishment that repacks and relabels a product or package for further sale, or for distribution without a further transaction.

Sheriff means the Office of the Cook County Sheriff.

Stewardship Plan means a plan for the collection, transportation and disposal of Unwanted Covered Drugs required under Sec. 46-104 of this Division that is:

(1) financed, developed, implemented and participated in by one or more Producers;

(2) operated by the participating Producers or a Stewardship Organization; and

(3) approved by the Director.

Stewardship Organization means an organization designated by a Producer or group of Producers to act as an agent on behalf of one or more Producers to develop and implement and operate a Stewardship Plan.

Unwanted Covered Drug means any Covered Drug that the owner has discarded or intends to discard.

Sec. 46-103 - Stewardship Plans - Participation.

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(a) Each Producer shall participate in a Stewardship Plan. Each Producer must:

(1) operate, individually or jointly with other Producers, a Stewardship Plan approved by the Director; or

(2) enter into an agreement with a Stewardship Organization to operate, on the Producer's behalf, a Stewardship Plan approved by the Director; or

(3) enter into an agreement with the Director to operate, on the Producer's behalf, a Stewardship Plan approved by the Director.

(b) Each Stewardship Plan must be approved by the Director before the entity administering the plan starts collecting Unwanted Covered Drugs. Once approved, each Stewardship Plan must have prior written approval of the Director for proposed changes as described under Sec. 46-102.

(c) By six months after the effective date of this Division, or by six months after a Produce starts sale of a Covered Drug in the County, a Producer must notify the Director in writing of the Producer's intent to participate in a Stewardship Plan, or to form a new Stewardship Plan.

(d) By six months after the effective date of this Division, or by six months after a retailer whose label appears on a Covered Drug or the Covered Drug's packaging starts selling the Covered Drug in the County, or by six months after a Covered Drug repackaged by Repackager is first sold in the County, and, thereafter, upon request from the Director, a retailer or Repackager whose label appears on a Covered Drug or the Covered Drug's packaging must provide:

(1)written notification as to whether the Manufacturer from whom the retailer or Repackager obtains the Covered Drug has provided its notice of intent to participate; and

(2)the contact information of the Manufacturer from whom the retailer or Repackager obtains the Covered Drug, including the telephone number, mailing address and email address of the retailer's or Repackager's point of contact at the Manufacturer.

(e) A Producer, either individually or jointly with other Producers, shall:

(1) By nine months after the effective date of this Division, or nine months after starting sale of a Covered Drug in the County, identify in writing to the Director a Stewardship Plan operator, including the operator's telephone, mailing address and email contact information, that is authorized to be the official point of contact for the Stewardship Plan;

(2) By nine months after the effective date of this Division, or nine months after starting sale of a Covered Drug in the County, notify all Pharmacies and law enforcement agencies in the County of the opportunity to participate as a drop-off site in accordance with Sec. 46-105 of this Division and provide a process for forming an agreement between the Stewardship Plan and interested Collectors; and annually thereafter, make the same notification to any nonparticipating or new Pharmacies in the County;

(3) By one year after the effective date of this Division, or one year after starting sale of a Covered Drug in the County, submit a proposed Stewardship Plan as described in Sec. 46-104 to the Director for review;

(4) Within three months after the Director's approval of the Stewardship Plan, operate or participate in the Stewardship Plan in accordance with this Division;

(5) At least every four years after the Stewardship Plan starts operations, submit an updated Stewardship Plan to the Director explaining any substantive changes to components of the Stewardship Plan required in Sec. 46-104. The updated Stewardship Plan shall be accompanied by the plan review fee in accordance with Section 46-115 of this Division. The Director shall review updated Stewardship Plans using the process described in Sec. 46-111 of this Division; and

(6) Pay all administrative and operational costs and fees associated with its Stewardship Plan.

(f) A Producer, either individually or jointly with other Producers, may:

(1) Enter into contracts and agreements with Stewardship Organizations, other service providers, or other entities as necessary, useful or convenient to carry out all or portion of their Stewardship Plan;

(2) Notify the Director of any Producer selling Covered Drugs Manufactured by that Producer or group of Producers in the County that is failing to participate in a Stewardship Plan; and

(3) Perform any other functions as may be necessary or proper to carry out the Stewardship Plan and to fulfill any or all of the purposes for which the plan is organized.

(g) After the first full year of participation in a Stewardship Plan, a Producer or group of Producers may notify the Director in writing of intent to form a new Stewardship Plan, and identify a plan operator, including the plan operator's telephone, mailing address, and email contact information, that is authorized to be the official point of contact for the proposed new Stewardship Plan. Within three months of such notification, the Producer or group of Producers shall submit a proposed Stewardship Plan as described under Sec. 46-104 to the Director for review.

(h) The Director may, on a case-by-case basis, approve in writing requests for extensions of time for the submission dates and deadlines in this Sec. 46-103.

(i) The Director may audit the records of a Producer, group of Producers, or Stewardship Organization related to a Stewardship Plan or request that the Producer, group of Producers, or Stewardship Organization arrange for the Director to inspect at reasonable times a Stewardship Plan's or a Collector's facilities, vehicles, and equipment used in carrying out the Stewardship Plan.

Sec. 46-104 - Stewardship Plans - Components.

Each Stewardship Plan, which must be submitted and reviewed according to Sec. 46-111, shall include:

(a) Contact information for all Producers participating in the Stewardship Plan, including each Drug

Producer's name, address, phone number, and email address, and the name, address, phone number, and email address of a human being to whom the Director may direct all inquiries regarding the Producer's participation in the Stewardship Plan;

(b) A description of the proposed collection system to provide convenient ongoing collection service for all Unwanted Covered Drugs from County residents in compliance with the provisions and requirements in Sec. 46-105, including a list of all collection methods and participating Collectors, a list of drop-off sites, a description of how any periodic collection events will be scheduled and located, a description of how any mail-back services will be provided and an example of the prepaid, preaddressed mailers the plan will use. The description of the collection service shall include a list of Retail Pharmacies and law enforcement agencies contacted by the plan under Sec. 46-103 (e)(2) of this Division, and a list of all Collectors who offered to participate;

(c) A description of the handling and disposal system, including identification of and contact information for Collectors, transporters and waste disposal facilities to be used by the Stewardship Plan in accordance with Sec. 46-105 and Sec. 46-107 of this Division;

(d) A description of the policies and procedures to be followed by Persons handling Unwanted Covered Drugs collected under the Stewardship Plan, including a description of how all Collectors, transporters and waste disposal facilities used will ensure that the collected Unwanted Covered Drugs are safely and securely tracked from collection through final disposal, and how all entities participating in the Stewardship Plan will operate under and comply with all applicable federal and state laws, rules and guidelines, including but not limited to those of the United States Drug Enforcement Administration, and how any Pharmacy collection site will operate under applicable rules and guidelines of the Safe Pharmaceutical Disposal Act of Illinois, 210 ILCS 150/1, *et. seq*.

(e) A certification that any patient information on Drug packaging will be promptly destroyed;

(f) A description of the public education effort and promotion strategy required in Sec. 46-106 of this Division, including a copy of standardized instructions for County residents, signage developed for Collectors, and required promotional materials;

(g) Proposed short-term and long-term goals of the Stewardship Plan for collection amounts, education and promotion; and

(h) A description of how the Stewardship Plan will consider:

(1)use of existing providers of waste pharmaceutical services;

(2)separating Covered Drugs from packaging to the extent possible to reduce transportation and disposal costs; and

(3)recycling of Drug packaging to the extent feasible.

Sec. 46-105 - Stewardship Plans - Collection of Covered Drugs.

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(a) This Section does not require any Person to serve as a Collector in a Stewardship Plan. A Person may offer to serve as a Collector voluntarily, or may agree to serve as a Collector in exchange for incentives or payment offered by a Producer, group of Producers or Stewardship Organization. Collectors may include law enforcement agencies, Pharmacies, mail-back services or other entities, operating in accordance with state and federal laws and regulations for the handling of Covered Drugs, including but not limited to those of the United States Drug Enforcement Administration, and in compliance with this Division. A Pharmacy collection site shall operate under applicable rules and guidelines of the Safe Pharmaceutical Disposal Act of Illinois, 210 ILCS 150/1, *et. seq*.

(b) The collection system for each Stewardship Plan shall:

(1) Provide reasonably convenient and equitable access for County residents in all Districts through dropoff sites. The system of drop-off sites shall provide at least one drop-off site for every 20,000 County residents in each District, located in every city, town or unincorporated area, geographically distributed to provide reasonably convenient and equitable access, but at no time shall there be less than five drop-off sites per District. If the service convenience goal in this subsection (b)(1) cannot be achieved due to a lack of drop-off sites at pharmacies, law enforcement agencies, or other qualified Collectors in each District, then those areas shall be served through periodic collection events and/or or mail-back services.

The system of drop-off sites shall provide in every city, town, or unincorporated community service area with a pharmacy or law enforcement facility, one drop-off site and a minimum of at least one additional drop-off site for every thirty thousand residents, geographically distributed to provide reasonably convenient and equitable access.

(2) Be safe and secure, including providing for the prompt destruction of patient information on Drug packaging.

(3) Give preference to having Retail Pharmacies and law enforcement agencies serve as drop-off sites.

(4) Include, as Collectors, any Pharmacy or any law enforcement agency willing to serve voluntarily as a drop-off site for Unwanted Covered Drugs and able to meet the requirements of this Division within three months of their offer to participate, unless the Collector requests a longer time frame. A Stewardship Plan may also accept other Collectors willing to serve as a drop-off site for Unwanted Covered Drugs and able to meet the requirements of this Division; and

(5) Make mail-back services available, free of charge, to disabled and homebound County residents upon request through the Stewardship Plan's toll-free telephone number and web site, and through distribution of prepaid, preaddressed mailers to Persons providing services to such County residents. The toll-free telephone number and web site required by this subsection (b)(5) shall be in English, Spanish, Polish, Chinese, Korean, and Russian.

(c) In addition to the collection system described in subsection (b)(1), all stewardships plans shall jointly operate a drop-off site within each County-owned pharmacy.

(d) Drop-off sites shall accept all Covered Drugs from County residents during all hours that the Pharmacy, law enforcement agency, or other Collector is normally open for business with the public. Drop-off sites not operated by a law enforcement agency shall utilize secure collection bins in compliance with all applicable requirements, including but not limited to those of the United States Drug Enforcement Administration and the Safe Pharmaceutical Disposal Act of Illinois, 210 ILCS 150/1, *et. seq.* In the event that more than one Stewardship Plan operates a drop-off site at a particular location, each drop-off site must accept all Covered Drugs.

Sec. 46-106 - Stewardship Plans - Promotion.

(a) All Stewardship Plans shall coordinate with each other and develop a single system of promotion that shall:

(1)Promote the Stewardship Plans so that collection options for Covered Drugs are widely understood by County residents, pharmacists, retailers of Covered Drugs and health care practitioners including doctors and other prescribers, veterinarians and veterinary hospitals, and promote the safe storage of Covered Drugs by County residents;

(2)Work with Collectors participating in Stewardship Plans to develop clear, standardized instructions for County residents on the use of collection bins and a readily-recognizable, consistent design of collection bins;

(3)Establish a single toll-free telephone number and single web site where collection options and current locations of drop-off sites will be publicized, and prepare educational and outreach materials promoting safe storage of medicines and describing where and how to return Unwanted Covered Drugs to the Stewardship Plan. These materials must be provided to Pharmacies, health care facilities, veterinary facilities, and other interested parties for dissemination to County residents. Plain language and explanatory images should be used to make use of medicine collection services readily understandable by all County residents, including individuals with limited English proficiency;

(4)Conduct a biennial survey of County residents and a survey of pharmacists, veterinarians, and health professionals in the County who interact with patients on use of medicines after the first full year of operation of the plans. Survey questions shall measure percent awareness of the Stewardship Plans, assess to what extent drop-off sites and other collection methods are convenient and easy to use, and assess knowledge and attitudes about risks of abuse, poisonings and overdoses from prescription and nonprescription medicines used in the home. Draft survey questions shall be submitted to the Director for review and comment at least 30 days prior to initiation of the survey. Results of the survey shall be reported to the Director and made available to the public on the website required in this Sec. 46-106 within 90 days of the end of the survey period. The privacy of all survey respondents shall be maintained.

(b) All surveys, outreach, education, promotion, websites, and toll-free phone numbers required by this Section 16-106 shall be in English, Spanish, Polish, Chinese, Korean, and Russian.

(c) The Director shall provide guidance on the development of a single system of promotion.

Sec. 46-107 - Stewardship Plans - Disposal of Covered Drugs.

(a) Covered Drugs collected under a Stewardship Plan must be disposed of at a permitted hazardous waste disposal facility as defined by the United States Environmental Protection Agency under 40 C.F.R. parts 264 and 265.

(b) The Director may grant approval for a Stewardship Plan to dispose of some or all collected Covered Drugs at a permitted large municipal waste combustor, as defined by the United States Environmental Protection Agency under 40 C.F.R. parts 60 and 62, if the Director deems the use of a hazardous waste disposal facility described under subsection (a) of this Sec. 46-107 to be infeasible for the Stewardship Plan based on cost, logistics or other considerations.

(c) A Stewardship Plan may petition the Director for approval to use final disposal technologies that provide superior environmental and human health protection than provided by the disposal technologies in subsections (a) and (b) of this Section 6 or equivalent protection at lesser cost. The proposed technology must provide equivalent or superior protection in each of the following areas:

(1) monitoring of any emissions or waste;

(2) worker health and safety;

(3) reduction or elimination of air, water or land emissions contributing to persistent, bioaccumulative, and toxic pollution; and

(4) overall impact on the environment and human health.

Sec. 46-108 - Stewardship Plans - Administrative and Operational Costs and Fees.

(a) A Producer or group of Producers participating in a Stewardship Plan shall pay all administrative and operational costs related to their Stewardship Plan, except as provided under this Sec. 46-108. Administrative and operational costs related to the Stewardship Plan include but are not limited to the following:

(1) Collection and transportation supplies for each drop-off site;

(2) Acquisition of all secure collection bins for drop-off sites;

- (3) Ongoing maintenance or replacement of secure collection bins, as requested by Collectors;
- (4) Prepaid, preaddressed mailers provided to disabled and/or home-bound County residents;

(5) Operation of periodic collection events, including costs of law enforcement staff time if necessary;

(6) Transportation of all collected Covered Drugs to final disposal, including costs of law enforcement escort if necessary;

(7) Environmentally sound disposal of all collected Covered Drugs under Sec. 46-107 of this Division;

(8) Program promotion under Sec. 46-106 of this Division; and

(b) No Person or Producer may charge a point-of-sale fee to consumers to recoup the costs of their Stewardship Plan, nor may they charge a specific point-of-collection fee at the time the Covered Drugs are collected.

(c) Producers are not required to pay for costs of staff time at drop-off sites provided by Collectors volunteering to participate in a Stewardship Plan.

Sec. 46-109 - Stewardship Plans - Reporting Requirements.

(a) Within six months after the end of the first 12-month period of operation, and annually thereafter, the plan operator of a Stewardship Plan shall submit a report to the Director on behalf of participating Producers describing their plan's activities during the previous reporting period. The report must include:

(1) A list of Producers participating in the Stewardship Plan;

(2) The amount, by weight, of Covered Drugs collected, including the amount by weight from each collection method used;

(3) A list of drop-off sites;

(4) The number of mailers provided for disabled and/or home-bound County residents;

- (5) The locations where mailers were provided, if applicable;
- (6) The dates and locations of collection events held, if applicable;

(7) The transporters used and the disposal facility or facilities used for all Covered drugs;

(8) Whether any safety or security problems occurred during collection, transportation or disposal of Unwanted Covered Drugs during the reporting period and, if so, what changes have or will be made to policies, procedures or tracking mechanisms to alleviate the problem and to improve safety and security in the future;

(9) A description of the public education, outreach and evaluation activities implemented during the reporting period;

(10) A description of how collected packaging was recycled to the extent feasible, including the recycling facility or facilities used;

(11) A summary of the Stewardship Plan's goals, the degree of success in meeting those goals in the past

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year, and, if any goals have not been met, what effort will be made to achieve the goals in the next year; and

(12) The total expenditures of the Stewardship Plan during the reporting period.

(b) The Director shall make reports submitted under this Section available to the public.

(c) For the purposes of this Sec. 46-109, "reporting period" means the period from January 1 through December 31 of the same calendar year, unless otherwise specified to the plan operator by the Director.

Sec. 46-110 - Stewardship Plans - List Of Producers of Covered Drugs.

Beginning 60 days after the effective date of this Division, each Drug Wholesaler that sells any Covered Drug in the County must provide a list of the Producers of those Covered Drugs to the Director in a form prescribed by the Director. Wholesalers must update and resubmit the list by January 15 each year.

Sec. 46-111 - Stewardship Plans - Review Of Proposed Plans.

(a) By one year after the effective date of this Division, or one year after starting sale of a Covered Drug in the County, each Producer, group of Producers or Stewardship Organization shall submit its proposed Stewardship Plan to the Director for review, accompanied by the plan review fee in accordance with Sec. 46-115 of this Division. The Director may upon request provide information, counseling, and technical assistance about the requirements of this Division to assist with the development of a proposed Stewardship Plan.

(b) The Director shall review the proposed Stewardship Plan and determine whether it meets the requirements of this Division. In reviewing a proposed Stewardship Plan, the Director shall provide an opportunity for written public comment on the proposed Stewardship Plan and consider any comments received.

(c) After the review under subsection (b) of this Sec. 46-111 and within 90 days after receipt of the proposed Stewardship Plan, the Director shall either approve or reject the proposed Stewardship Plan in writing and, if rejected, provide reasons for the rejection.

(d) If the Director rejects a proposed Stewardship Plan, a Producer, group of Producers, or Stewardship Organization must submit a revised Stewardship Plan to the Director within 60 days after receiving written notice of the rejection. The Director shall review and approve or reject a revised Stewardship Plan as provided under subsections (b) and (c) of this Sec. 46-111.

(e) If the Director rejects a revised Stewardship Plan, or any subsequently revised plan, the Director may deem the Producer or group of Producers out of compliance with this Division and subject to the enforcement provisions in this Division.

(f) In approving a proposed Stewardship Plan, the Director may exercise reasonable discretion to waive strict compliance with the requirements of this Division that apply to Producers in order to achieve the

objectives of this Division.

(g) The Director shall make all Stewardship Plans and proposed plans submitted under this Section 46-111 available to the public.

Sec. 46-112 - Stewardship Plans - Prior Approval for Change.

(a) Proposed changes to an approved Stewardship Plan that substantively alter plan operations, including, but not limited to, changes to participating Manufacturers, collection methods, achievement of the service convenience goal, policies and procedures for handling Unwanted Covered Drugs, or education and promotion methods or disposal facilities, must be approved in writing by the Director before the changes are implemented.

(b) A Producer or group of Producers or Stewardship Organization participating in an approved Stewardship Plan shall submit proposed changes to an approved Stewardship Plan within six months upon notice from the Director of a change to the population of a District as described in Sec. 46-105 (b)(1).

(c) A Producer or group of Producers or Stewardship Organization participating in a Stewardship Plan shall submit to the Director any proposed change to a Stewardship Plan as described under subsection (a) of this Sec. 46-111 in writing at least 30 days before the change is scheduled to occur and accompanied by the review fee in accordance with Sec. 46-115 of this Division.

(d) A Producer or group of Producers or Stewardship Organization participating in an approved Stewardship Plan shall notify the Director at least 15 days before implementing any changes to drop-off site locations, methods for scheduling and locating periodic collection events, or methods for distributing prepaid, preaddressed mailers, that do not substantively alter achievement of the service convenience goal under Sec. 46-105(b)(1) of this Division, or other changes that do not substantively alter plan operations under subsection (a) of this Sec. 46-111.

(e) A Producer or group of Producers or Stewardship Organization may request an advance determination from the Director whether a proposed change would be deemed to substantively alter plan operations.

Sec. 46-113 - Stewardship Plans - Enforcement and Penalties.

(a) The Director shall administer the penalty provisions of this Division.

(b) If the Director makes findings and determines that any Person has violated this Division or a regulation adopted pursuant to this Division, the Director shall send a written warning, as well as a copy of this Division and any regulations adopted pursuant to this Division, to the Person or Persons who violated it. The Person or Persons shall have 30 days after receipt of the warning to come into compliance and correct all violations.

(c) If the Person or Persons fail to come into compliance or correct all violations, the Director may impose administrative fines for violations of this Division or of any regulation adopted pursuant to this Division.

(1) Upon findings made under subsection (b), the Person or Persons shall be subject to an administrative fine as follows:

a. A fine not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for a first violation;

b. A fine not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for a second violation;

c. A fine not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the third violation and each subsequent violation.

(2) Each day a violation continues constitutes a separate violation.

(3) Fine Procedures. Notice of the fine shall be served on the Person or Persons. The notice shall contain an advisement of the right to request a hearing in the Cook County Department of Administrative Hearings. Hearings on violations shall be conducted in accordance with Article IX. - Administrative Hearings of the Cook County Code of Ordinances.

(4) Failure to Pay Fine. If said fine is not paid within 30 days from the date appearing on the notice of the fine or of the notice of determination of the Director or his or her designee after the hearing, the Director may use any lawful means for collecting the fine, including instituting an action in any court of proper jurisdiction.

(d) The County, a Producer, group of Producers, a Stewardship Organization, a group of Stewardship Organizations, any organization with tax exempt status under 26 United States Code Section 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(4) and with a primary mission of protecting the environment in the Cook County, or a combination thereof may bring a civil action to enjoin violations of or compel compliance with any requirement of this Division or any rule or regulation adopted pursuant to this Division, as well as for payment of civil penalties and any other appropriate remedy. The court shall award reasonable attorney's fees and costs to the County, Producer, group of Producers, Stewardship Organization, group of Stewardship Organizations, organization with tax exempt status under 26 United States Code Section 501(c)(4) and with a primary mission of protecting the environment in Cook County, or a combination thereof that is the prevailing party in a civil action brought under this subsection (d). A Producer, group of Producers, Stewardship Organizations, organization with tax exempt status under 26 United States Code Section 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(4) and with a primary mission of protecting the environment in Cook County, or a combination thereof that is the prevailing party in a civil action brought under this subsection (d). A Producer, group of Producers, Stewardship Organizations, organization with tax exempt status under 26 United States Code Section 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(4) and with a primary mission of protecting the environment in Cook County, or a combination thereof the environment in Cook County, or a combination with tax exempt status under 26 United States Code Section 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(4) and with a primary mission of protecting the environment in Cook County, or a combination thereof may institute a civil action under this subsection (d) only if:

(1)The Producer, group of Producers, Stewardship Organization, group of Stewardship Organizations, organization with tax exempt status under 26 United States Code Section 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(4) and with a primary mission of protecting the environment in Cook County, or a combination thereof has filed a Complaint with the Chief Executive Officer;

(2) 90 days have passed since the filing of the Complaint;

(3) After such 90-day period has passed, the Producer, group of Producers, Stewardship Organization, group of Stewardship Organizations, organization with tax exempt status under 26 United States Code Section 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(4) and with a primary mission of protecting the environment in Cook County,

or a combination thereof provides 30-day written notice to the Director and the County Counsel's Office of its intent to initiate civil proceedings; and

(4) The County has not provided notice to the Producer, group of Producers, Stewardship Organization, group of Stewardship Organizations, organization with tax exempt status under 26 United States Code Section 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(4) and with a primary mission of protecting the environment in Cook County, or a combination thereof of the County's intent to initiate civil proceedings by the end of the 30-day period.

(e) Any Person who knowingly and willfully violates the requirements of this Division or any rule or regulation adopted pursuant to this Division is punishable by a fine of not less than fifty dollars (\$50) and not more than five hundred (\$500) for each day per violation.

(f) Any Person in violation of this Division or any rule or regulation adopted pursuant to this Division shall be liable to the County for a civil penalty in an amount not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000) per day per violation. Each day in which the violation continues shall constitute a separate violation. Civil penalties shall not be assessed pursuant to this subsection (f) for the same violations for which the Director assessed an administrative penalty pursuant to subsection (c) of this Sec. 46-113.

(g) In determining the appropriate penalties, the court or the Director shall consider the extent of harm caused by the violation, the nature and persistence of the violation, the frequency of past violations, any action taken to mitigate the violation, and the financial burden to the violator.

(h) No civil or administrative action under this Sec. 46-113 may be brought more than four years after the date of the alleged violation.

Sec. 46-114 - Stewardship Plans - Rules, Performance Standards, and Report.

(a) The Director, following public notice and a hearing, may adopt rules necessary to implement, administer, and enforce this Division.

(b) The Director may work with the Stewardship Plan operator to define goals for collection amounts, education, and promotion for a Stewardship Plan.

(c) The Director shall report as requested to the Board concerning the status of all Stewardship Plans and recommendations for changes to this Division. The report may also include a summary of available data on indicators and trends of abuse, poisonings and overdoses from prescription and nonprescription drugs and a review of comprehensive prevention strategies to reduce risks of drug abuse, overdoses, and preventable poisonings.

Sec. 46-115 - Stewardship Plans - Plan Review and Annual Operation Fees.

(a) The Board authorizes the Director to charge the fees identified in this Division. A Producer or group of Producers participating in a Stewardship Plan shall pay to the Director plan review fees to be established under subsection (d) of this Section 46-115 for:

(1) Review of a proposed Stewardship Plan;

(2) Resubmittal of a proposed Stewardship Plan;

(3) Review of changes to an approved Stewardship Plan;

(4) Submittal of an updated Stewardship Plan at least every four years under Sec. 46 103(e)(5) of this Division; or

(5) Review of any petition for approval to use alternative final disposal technologies under Sec. 46-107(c) of this Division.

(b) In addition to plan review fees, a Producer or group of Producers participating in a Stewardship Plan shall pay to the Director annual operating fees to be established under subsection (d) of this Sec. 46-115.

(c) A Stewardship Organization may remit fees on behalf of participating Producer(s).

(d) The Director shall set the fees to recover but not exceed actual costs to the County at a rate duly approved by the Board.

Sec. 46-116 - Advisory Committee

(a) There shall be created a Pharmaceutical Disposal Advisory Committee made up of the President of the Cook County Board of Commissioners or his or her designee and six other members appointed by the President. Members of the Advisory Committee shall include:

(1) The President, or his or her designee; and

(2) One member of the Cook County Board of Commissioners; and

(3) The Sheriff, or his or her designee; and

(4) The Director of the Cook County Department of Environmental Control, or his or her designee; and

(5) The Chief Operating Officer of the Cook County Department of Public Health, or his or her designee; and

(6) A member of the Board of Commissioners of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago, to be appointed by the President of the Board of Commissioners of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Great Chicago.

(b) The Sheriff, or his or her designee, shall serve as the Chairman of the Advisory Committee. The Director shall serve as an ex officio member. The members of the Committee shall serve without pay.

(c)The purpose of the Advisory Committee is to oversee, advise and assist with the promotion and implementation of the Cook County Pharmaceutical Disposal Program. The Advisory Committee may formulate recommendations to bring about improvement in this regard.

(d)The members of the Advisory Committee shall meet quarterly or as designated by the Chairman.

(e)The Advisory Committee with the assistance of the Director shall prepare an annual report describing the work undertaken by the program. The annual report shall be distributed to the Cook County Board of Commissioners, on or before November 1st of each year. The report shall include minutes of meetings of the Advisory Committee over the past year and a description of the types of programs that have been implemented or outsourced.

Sec. 46-116 - Undertaking For the General Welfare.

In adopting and implementing this Division, the County is assuming an undertaking only to promote the general welfare. It is not assuming, nor is it imposing on its officers and employees, an obligation for breach of which it is liable in money damages to any Person who claims that such breach proximately caused injury.

Sec. 46-117 - No Conflict with Federal or State Law.

This Division shall be construed so as not to conflict with applicable federal or State laws, rules or regulations. Nothing in this Division shall authorize any County agency or department to impose any duties or obligations in conflict with limitations on authority established by State or federal law at the time such agency or department action is taken. The County shall suspend enforcement of this Division to the extent that said enforcement would conflict with any preemptive State or federal legislation subsequently adopted. Nothing in this Division is intended or shall be construed to protect anticompetitive or collusive conduct, or to modify, impair, or supersede the operation of any of the antitrust or unfair competition laws of the State of Illinois or the Unites States.

Sec. 46-118 - Severability.

If any of the provisions of this Division or the application thereof to any Person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of those provisions, including the application of such part or provisions to persons or circumstances other than those to which it is held invalid, shall not be affected thereby and shall continue in full force and effect. To this end, the provisions of this Division are severable.

Sec. 46-119 - Applicability.

Without limitation, this section applies to areas of unincorporated Cook County, to areas owned or operated by Special Districts within unincorporated Cook County, and to areas within municipalities within the County which have not adopted ordinances governing the operation of pharmaceutical stewardship plans within the said municipalities. To the extent a municipality has adopted an ordinance addressing pharmaceutical stewardship plans, or to the extent a municipality adopts an ordinance electing not to be bound by this pharmaceutical stewardship plans, the ordinance of the municipality shall apply, and this section shall not apply, to any areas within the jurisdiction of the municipality.

Effective date: This ordinance shall be in effect one hundred and eighty (180) days from the passage date.

FEMININE HYGEINE EXEMPTION

WHEREAS, the 1970 Illinois Constitution, Article VII, Section 6 designates Cook County as a Home Rule Unit of Government; and

WHEREAS, Cook County may exercise powers and perform functions as they relate to government, including the authority to regulate for the protection of the public health, safety, morals and welfare; and including the power to tax; and

WHEREAS, the County has determined that feminine hygiene products, such as tampons and sanitary napkins are a genuine necessity for the women of Cook County and hereby classifies feminine hygiene products in such a manner as to exempt them_from the Cook County Retailers' Occupation Tax; and

WHEREAS, the Illinois Supreme Court in *Geary v. Dominick's Finer Foods, Inc.*, 129 Ill. 2d 389, 544 N.E. 2d 344 (1989) has previously held that tampons and sanitary napkins are "medical appliances," thus exempting them from sales tax; and

WHEREAS, while the Illinois Department of Revenue currently classifies tampons and sanitary napkins as "grooming and hygiene" products which are subject to the County's current sales tax, the State's Use Tax Act [35 ILCS 105 *I* 1 *et. seq.]*, the Counties Code, and the 1970 Illinois Constitution do not specifically limit the concurrent exercise of this power or provide that the State has exclusive authority in this area, such that the home rule unit may not classify a product in such a matter to exempt it from home rule sales tax; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Chicago currently has pending legislation to exempts these products from its own sales tax; and

WHEREAS, legislation is currently pending, or has already been adopted in several States to exempt such products from their respective State Sales Taxes.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 74 Taxation, Article IV Retailers' Occupation Tax, Section. 74-153 of the Cook County Code be amended as follows:

ARTICLE IV.- RETAILERS' OCCUPATION TAX

Sec. 74-153- Items Used for Feminine Hygiene Exempted

The tax imposed in Section 74-151 shall not be imposed upon sales of the following items:

(a) <u>Good commonly sold at retail for the purpose of the collection and/or absorption, for disposal</u> <u>of menstrual fluid including, but not limited to: tampons; daily liners; sanitary napkins; and</u> <u>disposable and reusable menstruation cups.</u>

Effective date: This Ordinance shall take effect January 1, 2017.

SUPPORTING ILLINOIS SENATE BILL 1883 AND ILLINOIS HOUSE BILL 3422, THE GUN DEALER & AMMUNITION SELLER ACT

WHEREAS, between 2009 and 2013, four particular gun dealers, each located a short drive outside of Chicago, supplied 20% of all guns recovered from Chicago crime scenes; and

WHEREAS, firearms dealers are subject to very little federal oversight, and on average, are only inspected once a decade. ATF lacks the resources and authority to monitor the 138,000 gun dealers, manufacturers, collectors and others that it licenses; and

WHEREAS, measures such as law enforcement inspections, background checks for employees, inventory inspections, video surveillance and improved security, and restrictions on the locations of gun dealers and ranges, would promote best practices, discourage theft, and thwart illegal sales and straw purchases; and

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois possess the infrastructure and resources to institute licensing and regulation of gun dealerships, by requiring them to obtain a state license from the Department of Financial & Professional Regulation; and

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois licenses and regulates a wide range of professions to promote public safety, health and welfare, including for example, acupuncturists, cosmetologists, real estate appraisers and geologists, but not gun dealers; and

WHEREAS, Illinois State Senator Don Harmon and Illinois State Representative Christian Mitchell have introduce Senate Bill 1883 and House Bill 3422, the Gun Dealer and Ammunition Seller Act ("the Act"); and

WHEREAS, the Act provides that it is unlawful for any person engaged in the business of selling, leasing or otherwise transferring firearms or ammunition without a dealer license issues by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation; and

WHEREAS, the Act requires all applicants for a dealer license and their employees to have a valid Firearm Owner's Identification Card and to have background check conducted; and

WHEREAS, the Act prohibits the consumption of alcohol on the premises of any firearm dealer and allows the Department of State Police to establish rules requiring employees and agents of licenses to undergo training regarding legal requirements and responsible business practices as applicable to the sale or transfer of firearms or ammunition.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Commissioners of Cook County supports Illinois Senate Bill 1883 and Illinois House Bill Number 342, and encourages the Illinois General Assembly to pass both bills and for Illinois Governor Bruce Rauner to sign them; and

Summary: The Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic (DCEO) administers the Illinois Energy Now portfolio of programs as part of the Energy Efficiency Portfolio Standard to implement cost-effective energy efficiency measures that help meet annual energy savings targets. The Public Sector Energy Efficiency Programs provides incentives for projects that increase the energy efficiency of local governments located in the service territories of Ameren Illinois, Commonwealth Edison, Nicor Gas, Peoples Gas, and/or North Shore Gas.

The Bureau of Asset Management's Department of Capital Planning & Policy applied for and was awarded a \$1,736,300 Key Account Grant for energy efficiency upgrades completed between June 1, 2015 and May 31, 2016. These projects were approved prior to the notification of the grant award and would have been completed irrespective of grant funding.

The \$1.7M incentive is broken down by utility territory in 4 separate grants:

CALLING UPON THE CITY OF CHICAGO TO RESCIND THE \$0.05 BOTTLED WATER TAX

WHEREAS, in the aftermath of the water supply crisis in Flint, Michigan, an increasing level of public concern is being expressed in communities throughout Chicago and Cook County about the age of the water-related infrastructure and the content of the water supply in Chicago and Cook County, including whether or not there are quantities of lead present in that water supply; and,

WHEREAS, much like the water delivery infrastructure in Flint, Michigan, the water delivery infrastructure in many parts of the City of Chicago and Cook County is rapidly aging and composed primarily of lead pipe; and,

WHEREAS, there exist clear and numerous pieces of scientific evidence demonstrating that exposure to lead causes significant neurological and developmental damage to babies, toddlers and children, and that the effects of that damage include higher rates of developmental delay, learning disabilities, and hearing loss; and,

WHEREAS, there exist clear and numerous pieces of scientific evidence demonstrating that lead exposure in adults can lead to mood disorders, decline in mental functioning, miscarriage and infertility, as well as an increased risk of cancer; and,

WHEREAS, recent analysis indicates that while the lead pipes that supply water to most of the City of Chicago and Cook County generally pose only a slight health risk, recent construction projects which disturb the water lines around the County have caused the risk to increase; and,

WHEREAS, many informed residents of the City of Chicago and Cook County, in the light of the aforementioned risks, choose to drink bottled water rather than tap water; and,

WHEREAS, many Chicago and Cook County residents with low and moderate household incomes rely upon bottled water as their cleanest source of drinking water, as an installation of a water filtration system in their homes is cost-prohibitive; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Chicago should recognize the reality that large numbers of its citizens rely on bottled water, and must purchase that bottled water commercially; and,

WHEREAS, the existing five-cent per bottle tax on bottled water imposed by the City of Chicago is regressive, in that it disproportionately impacts citizens of Cook County and Chicago with the least disposable income; and,

WHEREAS, rescinding the five-cent per bottle tax will make bottled water more affordable to lower income residents who rely on bottled water for purposes of ensuring a clean drinking water source for their families; and,

WHEREAS, it is right and proper for the Cook County Board of Commissioners to opine and advocate on matters that affect the health and welfare of the citizens of Cook County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the President and Cook County Board of Commissioners do hereby call upon the City of Chicago to rescind the five-cent bottled water tax, to ensure that the citizens of the City of Chicago and Cook County have a more affordable source of clean, healthy drinking water.

AN ORDINANCE CREATING A YOUTH EMPLOYMENT SPECIAL FUND

The party responsible for the payment of property taxes on a qualifying parcel shall remit payment of the extended property tax amount to the Cook County Treasurer. All collected monies shall be deposited into the Youth Employment Fund, pursuant to Section 38-2 of the Cook County Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners that Chapter 38 Health and Human Services, Article I - In General, Section 38-2 is hereby enacted as follows:

Sec. 38-2. - Youth Employment Fund.

The Comptroller shall create a special fund to be known as the "Youth Employment Fund" which shall be subject to budget and appropriation for purposes related to the funding of youth employment. The Treasurer shall account for and transfer any remittals pursuant to Section 74-75 of the Cook County Code into such Fund. The Comptroller shall distribute monies from the Fund after appropriation by the Cook County Board of Commissioners.
