Summary: This increase and extension will allow Cook County to continue providing car sharing services to Cook County employees. The Bureau of Administration implemented the Shared Fleet Program in 2012. Zipcar, Inc.'s technology is currently installed in 18 Shared Fleet vehicles which allow Cook County employees to reserve vehicles on an as-needed basis using an online system. This technology and system allow Cook County to track mileage and location information for all travel using these vehicles. Currently, 38 departments utilize the Shared Fleet Program.

Additionally, Cook County employees can utilize Zipcar, Inc.'s vehicles when Shared Fleet vehicles are not available or if it is determined that it is more cost effective based on the type of trip and the amount of time the vehicle is required. This contract is being extended to allow the County additional time to review and explore options for a new contract.

This contract was awarded through the use of a Comparable Government Procurement pursuant to Section 34-140 of the Cook County Procurement Code. Zipcar, Inc. was previously awarded a contract by the City of Chicago through a competitive bidding process.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

COOK COUNTY MEDICAL EXAMINER’S ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 38, Health and Human Services, Article VI, Medical Examiner, Division 1, Generally, Sections. 38-109 through 38-148 of the Cook County Code, is hereby amended as follows:

DIVISION 1. - GENERALLY

Sec. 38-109. - Office of coroner eliminated.

The office of Coroner of Cook County is hereby eliminated. This article shall be known and may be cited as the Cook County Medical Examiner's Ordinance.-

Sec. 38-110. - Definitions.

{The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this ~~article ordinance~~, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:}

Sec. 38-119. - Deaths subject to investigation; establishing manner and cause of death.

Where a death has occurred under any of the circumstances enumerated in Section 38-118, then an investigation, including autopsy if necessary, shall be conducted sufficient to establish manner and cause of death, and the Medical Examiner shall recover and retain any and all evidence for use in the investigation. The Medical Examiner shall obtain specimens necessary to determine the cause and manner of death and retain them in accordance with nationally established practice guidelines for forensic pathology. The Medical Examiner shall have the authority to retain tissue specimen necessary to determine the cause and manner of death without notification or family permission and will have the authority to retain such body parts as the Medical Examiner deems necessary in the public interest with notification to any identified next-of-kin. The Medical Examiner shall have the authority to dispose of retained body parts or tissue specimen in an appropriate manner consistent with law, including using anonymized tissue samples for research in lieu of destruction.

An investigation into a death does not necessarily imply that an autopsy and/or a scene examination will be performed. ~~The necessity of a~~An autopsy and/or a scene examination will be ~~determined by~~conducted at the Medical Examiner's discretion based on ~~the criteria specified in Section 38-118 and~~ generally accepted guidelines for conducting medico-legal death investigations.

Sec. 38-120. - Deaths subject to investigation; death certificate.

In deaths subject to investigation under Section 38-118, the Medical Examiner, upon completion of his/her investigation ~~and examination~~, shall cause a death certificate to be issued specifically setting forth the cause, circumstances and manner of death, if determinable, or if undeterminable, so state.

Sec. 38-121. - Deaths subject to investigation; duty to notify.

Any person, including, but not limited to, any law enforcement officer, physician, nurse, ambulance attendant, hospital director or administrator, or funeral director who may become aware of a death subject to investigation under Section 38-118 ~~may~~shall immediately report such death to the Office of the Medical Examiner or to any law enforcement officer; any such report to a law enforcement officer shall be immediately transmitted to the Medical Examiner.

Sec. 38-122. - Deaths subject to investigation; examination of scene.

Upon receipt of a report pursuant to Section 38-121, the Medical Examiner or his/her appointed representative shall go to the location of the body and take charge of same, and shall begin his/her investigation with an examination of the scene except when permission for removal has been approved pursuant to Section 38-123 or removal is otherwise authorized under 38-123 to preserve such body from damage or destruction, or to protect life, safety, or health. Any such removal of the body pursuant to Section 38-123 shall not preclude the Medical Examiner or his/her appointed represented from examining the scene.

Sec. 38-123. - Deaths subject to investigation; permission required for removal.

No dead human body whose death may be subject to investigation under Section 38-118, or the personal property of such a deceased person, shall be handled, disturbed, embalmed or removed from the

place of death by any person except with the permission of the Medical Examiner, unless the same shall be necessary to preserve such body from damage or destruction, or to protect life, safety, or health.

Whenever the Medical Examiner shall lawfully assume jurisdiction of a body, it shall not be removed or released from his/her jurisdiction except upon his/her direction and consent or as otherwise permitted in this Section.

Sec. 38-125. - Procedures and powers in investigation into cause of death.

(a) The Medical Examiner shall have the power to establish and supervise the procedures to be utilized in the conduct of investigations necessary to establish the cause and manner of death. The Medical Examiner, at his/her option, shall have the power to call and conduct public hearings in cases of public interest.

(b) The Medical Examiner shall have the power to issue subpoenas requiring persons to give information under oath and to produce books, records, papers or such other documents or objects the Medical Examiner shall deem necessary to establish the cause or manner of death. The Medical Examiner or a hearing officer acting in his/her behalf shall have the power to administer the necessary oath or affirmation to such witness. Any witness appearing at an investigation or public hearing shall have the right to be represented by counsel.

(c) The Medical Examiner shall have the power to request and obtain medical and/or mental health records within 24 hours of the first day of business operations of a hospital or physician's office that has treated a decedent under investigation by the Medical Examiner.

(d) The Medical Examiner shall have the power to request and obtain hospital admission blood samples on any in-hospital death under investigation by the Medical Examiner. Hospitals shall retain admission blood samples for ~~24~~48 hours following the death of a patient who will fall under investigation by the Medical Examiner as described in Section 38-118.

~~(e) Violation of the terms of this Section will be subject to the terms delineated in Section 38-148.~~

Sec. 38-131. - Deaths subject to investigation; release of the body.

Upon completion of the Medical Examiner's investigation ~~and examination~~, the Medical Examiner shall release the body of the decedent to the decedent's next-of-kin, personal representative, friends, or to the person designated in writing by the decedent or to the funeral director selected by such person or other authorized person, as the case may be, for proper disposition.

Sec. 38-137. - Retention of human remains.

Notwithstanding other provisions in this ~~Article-ordinance~~, if the Medical Examiner determines that a body needs to be retained greater than 90 days then the Medical Examiner shall provide a written report to the Advisory Committee and County Board stating the reason for retention. The Medical Examiner shall report to Advisory Committee and County Board on this matter quarterly.

Sec. 38-141. - Advisory committee.

(d) *Attendance.* The members of this Committee shall attend meetings to be held at the Medical Examiner's Office on a quarterly basis, beginning with the third quarter of the fiscal year in which this Ordinance ~~{Article}~~ is enacted.

Sec. 38-144. - Fees.

The Medical Examiner shall charge the following fees with the amounts as set in Section 32-1 of this Code.

(18) Conference room use fee. Fee charged for use of the Medical Examiner’s Conference Room located in the basement of the Office of the Cook County Medical Examiner. Conference room use fees shall be paid to the Cook County Medical Examiner in advance, unless special circumstances warrant a fee waiver which may be granted at the discretion of the Medical Examiner.

Sec. 38-148. - Penalty for violation.

Any person who knowingly violates any provision of this ~~Ordinance {Article}~~ may be fined not more than \$1,000.00 and imprisoned not more than six months per violation.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 32 Fees, Sec. 32-1 of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as follows:

WHEREAS, the Cook County Bureau of Asset Management, Department of Capital Planning & Policy (“BAM/DCPP”) seeks to reduce energy use and greenhouse gas emissions at County facilities; and

WHEREAS, to promote a healthy environment and the use of clean energy sources, BAM/DCPP purchased electric charging stations for the charging of electric vehicles that are utilized for County operations and the public at large; and

WHEREAS, the Master Services and Subscription Agreement (“Agreement”) that was entered into in 2017 as a result of the purchase of ChargePoint, Inc. charging stations provides for the charging station subscription services for the one vehicle installed ChargePoint Level II station at six County sites including Bridgeview, Markham, Rolling Meadows and Skokie Courthouses and at Des Plaines and Riverdale Department of Transportation & Highways locations; and

WHEREAS, ChargePoint has the nation’s largest network of electric vehicle charging stations with about 47,800 charging spots throughout the country; and

WHEREAS, as of 2017, ChargePoint has averaged nationally, over one million charging events per month, that’s equivalent to the emissions avoided from almost 670,000 gallons of gasoline saved each month; and

WHEREAS, the ChargePoint network is available to all users; and

WHEREAS, the County through BAM/DCPP has a ChargePoint Assure Full Service and Maintenance Support Program (“Maintenance Plan”) with ChargePoint Assure for each County owned charging station that will continue for three years from the activation date for each station; and

WHEREAS, the Maintenance Plans for the Bridgeview, Markham, Rolling Meadows and Skokie Courthouses; and the Des Plaines and Riverdale Department of Transportation & Highways locations began in August 2017 and provide for two one-year renewal options; and

WHEREAS, ChargePoint receives 10% of all session fees and in return ChargePoint processes all forms of payment and reimburses the County 90% of all session fees; and

WHEREAS, ChargePoint began collecting charging fees at the six County owned stations as of August 28, 2017 and has collected \$288.97 in session fees; and

WHEREAS, since the August 2017 start dates and through April 2018, the Cook County stations have been used 316 times, saving an estimated 695 kilograms of CO2 emissions, which is equivalent to 1,708 miles driven by an average passenger vehicle or 73 gallons of gas avoided; and

**DESIGNATION OF COOK COUNTY AS A HYBRID ENTITY
FOR THE PURPOSES OF COMPLIANCE
WITH THE HEALTH INSURANCE PORTABILITY AND ACCOUNTABILITY ACT**

WHEREAS, the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA) and its Rules (codified in the Code of Federal Regulations at 45 CFR parts 160 and 164, Pub. Law No. 10-191) impose privacy and security standards and requirements upon health plans, health care clearing houses, and health care providers that transmit any health information in electronic form in connection with standard transactions within the scope of HIPAA, otherwise known as Covered Entities; and

WHEREAS, Cook County (“County”), a unit of local government under the laws of the State of Illinois, is a single legal entity which conducts both Covered Functions and non-covered Functions; and

WHEREAS, the operation of the Cook County Health & Hospitals System (“CCHHS”) and the County’s patient arrestee program, self-insured health, dental, vision and pharmacy benefit plans as administered by the Department of Risk Management are Covered Functions subject to the HIPAA Privacy and Security Rules; and

WHEREAS, HIPAA allows a Covered Entity to designate itself as a Hybrid Entity when it performs both Covered and non-Covered Functions and to designate Health Care Components, which must comply with HIPAA; and

WHEREAS, a Hybrid Entity limits the Covered Entity’s potential liability by requiring only those departments designated as Health Care Components to comply with HIPAA; and

WHEREAS, HIPAA requires any entity that performs a function on behalf of a Covered Entity or a Health Care Component of a Hybrid Entity, which involves the use or disclosure of protected health information (“PHI”), shall be required to execute a business associate agreement (“BAA”); and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Board of Commissioners desires to declare Cook County a Hybrid Entity, designates the County’s Health Care Components; directs the Cook County Health System Board to designate a Privacy and Security Officer at the CCHHS and directs that the Director of Risk Management or his/her designee serve as the Privacy Officer and designate a Security Officer to ensure that the County’s patient arrestee program, self-insured health, dental, and pharmacy benefit plans are HIPAA compliant; and

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners that Chapter 2 - ADMINISTRATION, ARTICLE XIV- HIPAA Compliance, SECTION 2-1020 - 2-1026- is hereby enacted as follows:

ARTICLE XIV - HIPAA Compliance

Sec. 2-1020 - Definitions

The definitions of terms set forth in HIPAA are adopted and incorporated herein by reference as if fully set forth.

Business Associate - A person or entity that performs a function on behalf of a Covered Entity or assists a Covered Entity with a function or activity involving the use or disclosure of PHI.

Business Associate Agreement (“BAA”) - A contract between a HIPAA covered entity and a HIPAA business associate which protects PHI in accordance with HIPAA guidelines.

Covered Entity - A health plan, a health care clearinghouse or a health care provider that transmits any health information in electronic form within the scope of HIPAA.

Covered Functions - Those functions of a Covered Entity which make it a health plan, health care provider or health care clearinghouse.

Electronic Protected Health Information (“ePHI”) - Protected health information created or received by a Covered Entity that is transmitted by electronic media or maintained by electronic media.

Health Care Component - A component or combination of components of a Hybrid Entity designated by the Hybrid Entity, including any component that would meet the definition of a Covered Entity if it were a separate legal entity. Health Care Component(s) may include a component only to the extent that it performs covered functions.

Hybrid Entity - A single legal entity that is a Covered Entity whose business functions include covered and non-covered functions as defined by HIPAA. The entity must designate Health Care Components and document the designation in accordance with HIPAA requirements.

Non-covered Functions- Those functions performed by components of a Hybrid Entity that are not subject to HIPAA requirements.

Protected Health Information (“PHI”) - Individually identifiable health information collected from an individual that is created or received by a Covered Entity. PHI encompasses information that identifies an individual and relates to the past, present or future physical or mental health of an individual, the provision of health care to an individual or payment for the provision of health care to the individual.

Sec. 2-1021 - Health Care Component Designation for Hybrid Entity

(a) Cook County is required to comply with HIPAA privacy and security standards to maintain the confidentiality of PHI as referenced in Cook County Resolution 03-R-300 (adopted on July 1, 2003).

(b) Cook County delegates itself as a Hybrid Entity pursuant to HIPAA as it conducts business activities which include Covered Functions and non-Covered Functions.

(c) In accordance with HIPAA, only departments or organizations which administer Cook County’s patient arrestee program, self-insured health plans or provide electronically billed health care services and transmit ePHI will be designated as a Health Care Component of Cook County.

(d) The following Cook County self-insured health plans and organizations are hereby designated as Health Care Components of Cook County:

1. Self-insured health, dental, vision and pharmacy plans as administered by the Department of Risk Management;
2. Patient Arrestee Medical Care program as administered by the Department of Risk Management; and
3. Cook County Health and Hospitals System.

(e) All other departments, organizations or functions of Cook County that do not engage in covered functions are hereby designated as non-covered functions of Cook County.

(f) The Cook County Board may amend the designation of the Health Care Components by adding or removing a department, office, division or self-insured health plan to or from such designation.

Sec. 2-1022 - HIPAA Privacy Rule and Security Rule Compliance

(a) Notwithstanding the designation of the County Health Care Components herein, the County shall be responsible for developing policies and procedures to ensure compliance with the HIPAA Privacy Rule and Security Rule, and shall be responsible for activities related to oversight of compliance with, and enforcement of the aforementioned rules.

A Health Care Component shall not disclose any PHI, ePHI or HIPAA-required documentation which it receives or maintains to another County department or agency 1) if such disclosure would be prohibited by the HIPAA Privacy or Security Rules, 2) if the Health Care Component and 3) such other County department or agency were separate and distinct legal entities.

Sec. 2-1023 - Designation of Privacy Officers and Security Officers

(a) Each Health Care Component shall have a designated Privacy Officer and Security Officer. A Health Care Component's Privacy Officer and Security Officer may appoint an employee of the Health Care Component to assist in the performance of the Privacy Officer and/or Security Officer's responsibilities.

(b) The Privacy Officer and Security Officer for the Healthcare Components of the County (other than the CCHHS) shall be the Director of the Department of Risk Management or his or her designee.

(c) The Privacy Officer and a Security Officer for the CCHHS shall be the Chief Compliance and Privacy Officer for the Cook County Health and Hospital System or his or her designee.

(d) The Privacy and Security Officers for their respective Health Care Components shall each develop written policies and procedures and perform any other duties or obligations as required by HIPAA.

Sec. 2-1024 - HIPAA Required Agreements; Authorization

(a) Any entity (including another County department or agency) that performs a function on behalf of the County or a Health Care Component of the County as defined in Section 2-1021 (d), which involves the use or disclosure of PHI shall be required to execute a business associate agreement.

(b) The Chief Compliance and Privacy Officer of CCHHS and the Director of Risk Management of the County are hereby authorized to enter into BAAs necessary to comply with the HIPAA Privacy and Security Rules and, to enter into all other agreements required by the HIPAA.

Sec. 2-1026 - Severability

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this ordinance is held to be invalid or unconstitutional, or unlawful for any reason, by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed and is hereby declared to be a separate, distinct and independent provision of this ordinance, and such holding or holdings shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance.

WHEREAS, The U.S. Supreme Court ruled six years ago that sentencing schemes that require life sentences with no hope of parole for crimes committed by juveniles violated the U.S. Constitution; and,

WHEREAS, on May 6, 2018, the Injustice Project, in partnership with the Chicago Sun-Times, published an article stating that in Illinois more than 160 prisoners are serving life sentences for crimes they committed as juveniles, with virtually no hope of parole or early release under current law; and,

WHEREAS, Using Illinois Department of Corrections data, Injustice Watch examined the number of prisoners serving 50 or more years in prison who were taken into custody before their 18th birthday; and,

WHEREAS, Because Illinois almost entirely abolished parole in 1978, the 167 juvenile offenders do not get the same chance to show rehabilitation and change that they might get in other states. The only juvenile offenders with parole opportunities are the aging handful who were convicted before the law changed four decades ago; and,

WHEREAS, Courts across the country varied standards on what length of a prison term can legally be considered a life sentence, and whether and when they should be eligible for parole; and,

WHEREAS, At least 13 other states and Washington, D.C., have passed laws giving young offenders a chance to ask for parole release or a sentence reduction after first serving as few as 12 and as many as 35 years in prison, depending on the state and severity of the crime; and,

WHEREAS, The Illinois Senate Criminal Law Committee last month sent to the full Senate a bill that would permit inmates who committed crimes before the age of 21 the periodic chance to ask for parole, after first serving 10 years for lesser crimes and 20 years for first-degree murder or aggravated sexual assault; and,

WHEREAS, Research indicates that incarceration has a jarring effect on life expectancy, a study by Vanderbilt University Professor Evelyn Patterson found each year of incarceration likely reduces a prisoner's life expectancy by two years.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners do hereby support and encourage the 100th General Assembly of the State of Illinois in the passage of Senate Bill 3228.

(e) Board Members will serve for three years and can be reappointed for consecutive terms.

(f) The Commission has the authority to purchase subscriptions to economic and financial data, engage outside forecasting resources and hire staff as needed as approved by the Board of Commissioners.

(g) All meetings of the Commission will be open to the public.

(h) The forecast and assumptions will be made publicly available on the County’s website.

WHEREAS, CRGC's purpose and agenda aligns with recommendations contained in *Partnering for Prosperity, An Economic Action Agenda for Cook County* and *Planning for Progress, Cook County's Consolidated Plan and Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy, 2015-2019*; and

WHEREAS, CRGC serves Cook, DuPage, Kane, Kendall, Lake, McHenry and Will Counties and the City of Chicago whose diverse and dynamic economy is at the center of global trade routes and boasts major assets in transportation infrastructure, information technology and manufacturing; and

WHEREAS, said region, which more than 30 Fortune 500 headquarters across seven counties call home, is one of the world's top ten most competitive economies and repeatedly ranks highly in global competitiveness and the pace of foreign investment; and

WHEREAS, the Chicago region is rich in assets, including diverse industries, a highly skilled workforce and essential infrastructure; has the potential to perform better by working collaboratively and collectively across jurisdictions; and

WHEREAS in 2013, to improve coordination, leaders from northeastern Illinois convened a working group to identify opportunities to drive economic development together and developed several successful projects leading to growth, investment and the creation and retention of quality jobs; and

WHEREAS, after working collaboratively and cooperatively together for four years, said leaders deemed that further structure, organization and capacity was required to ensure the sustainability and effectiveness of this initiative and launched the Chicago Regional Growth Corporation (CRGC) in January 2018 with a founding board of directors; and

WHEREAS, CRGC now provides the organizational infrastructure for the group's ongoing collaboration and will coordinate development opportunities in northeastern Illinois, creating programs, building

networks and providing more efficient economic development tools and resources to grow the region's economy, including, but not limited to:

- Leading programs to increase exports by small and medium-sized firms through the successful Metro Chicago Exports grant program, pitch competition and ExporTech™ curriculum.
- Developing new programs to attract foreign investment to the region and build stronger relationships with existing foreign-owned enterprises.
- Convening important industry clusters to discuss common issues and identify new opportunities for growth, such as the Chicago Metro Metals Consortium, which the group launched to strengthen the fabricated metal and machinery sectors.
- Coordinating regional networks to improve essential systems, such as the group's effort to enhance the region's freight transportation system by standardizing truck permitting.
- Advancing these efforts in the region's economically distressed communities to create high-quality, wealth-building jobs for residents in the areas with opportunity for growth; and

WHEREAS, each of the seven counties and the City of Chicago committed financial support in the range of \$15,000.00 to \$150,000.00 based broadly on their population size to support the launch of CRGC, with Cook County and the City of Chicago each committing a total of \$150,000.00; and

WHEREAS, as a founding board member, Cook County desires to fulfill its commitment by agreeing to contribute \$75,000.00 annually to CRGC for the 2018 and 2019 fiscal years for a total of \$150,000 and recognizes that evidence of Cook County's financial support will assist CRGC in securing additional public and private funding; and

WHEREAS, Cook County, through its Bureau of Economic Development, desires to enter into an agreement with CRGC to participate in and financially support CRGC; and

WHEREAS, Cook County through the Bureau of Economic and CRGC share the common goals of promoting economic development and creating economic opportunities for local residents and businesses.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners does hereby authorize the Chief of the Bureau of Economic Development, or his or her designee, to enter into an agreement with CRGC, including payment of \$75,000.00 for fiscal year 2018 and an additional \$75,000.00 for fiscal year 2019.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

AMENDMENT TO COUNTY CONTACTS REGARDING SEXUAL HARASSMENT COMPLIANCE

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 42, Human Relations, Section. 42-40 of the Cook County Code, is hereby amended as follows:

Sec. 42-40. - County contracts.

(a) *Prohibition.* No person who is a party to a contract with Cook County ("County") shall engage in unlawful discrimination or sexual harassment against any individual in the terms or conditions of employment, credit, public accommodations, housing, or provision of County facilities, services or programs. "Sexual harassment" has such meaning as is ascribed to it in other sections of this article.

(b) *Contract provisions.* The ~~purchasing agent~~ Chief Procurement Officer for the County, and all other department heads, as authorized, shall include a provision in all County contracts that sets forth the County's policies with respect to unlawful discrimination and sexual harassment, as embodied in this article, and that requires every contractor to certify its compliance with these policies and its agreement to abide by such policies as a part of the contractor's contractual obligations. In certifying its compliance with this section, every Contractor shall certify that it has policies, procedures, and training advising employees of the illegality of sexual harassment and the rights and remedies for aggrieved employees. All County contracts shall further provide that if any party to a contract with the County is found to have violated any provision of this article, or furnished false or misleading information in any investigation, hearing, or inquiry held pursuant to this article, that contract may be subject to a declaration of default and termination.

(c) *Exception.* This section applies only to contracts executed after the effective date of the ordinance from which this article is derived.

Effective date: This ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption

PROPOSED ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE CREATING THE PREFERENCE FOR BUSINESSES OWNED BY PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 34 - Finance, Article IV - Procurement, Division 6 - Bid Incentives and Preferences, Section 34-242 - Businesses Owned by People with Disabilities is hereby enacted as follows:

Sec. 34-242 . - Businesses Owned by People with Disabilities

(a) Preference for Businesses Owned by People with Disabilities: The CPO shall give a preference of five percent of the amount of the Contract to a Responsible and Responsive PDBE. The CPO shall develop procedures for implementation of this Section.

(b) Certification - The CCD shall certify a Person as a PDBE when it is a small business:

(1) That is at least 51 percent owned, controlled, and managed by one or more qualified Disabled Persons; and

(2) That has its home office in Illinois.

(c) In lieu of conducting its own certifications, the CCD by rule may accept formal certifications by other entities, provided that Cook County's requirements are met.

(d) In order to increase awareness and provide opportunities for PDBE's, the CCD shall provide education, outreach, and the dissemination of information to PBDE regarding the County's certification program and available opportunities. The CCD, in collaboration with other departments, shall from time to time, by way of seminars, workshops, and internet-based communications, make available to the business community such information, documents, and personnel as well as:

(1) Assist otherwise eligible businesses in applying for, gaining, and maintaining certification;

(2) Assist the business community in understanding the manner in which to properly complete a Utilization Plan including how a full or partial waiver may be requested, and the manner in which such a request may be supported;

(3) Identify best practices by other governmental entities and private sector firms that may improve the Program; and

4. Identify systemic or organizational problems and related solutions associated with certification and contract participation.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 34 - Finance, Article IV - Procurement, Division 6 - Bid Incentives and Preferences, Sections 34-229 - Definitions and Section 34-237. - Veteran-owned businesses are hereby amended as follows:

Sec. 34-229. - Definitions.

Disadvantaged refers to individuals who are mentally, physically, economically, or educationally disadvantaged, including, but not limited to, individuals who are living below the poverty line, developmentally disabled, mentally ill, substance abusers, recovering substance abusers, elderly and in need of hospice care, gang members, on welfare, or people with arrest or conviction records.

Disability or Disabled means, with respect to an individual, a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more of the major life activities of the individual, a record of physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more of the major life activities of the individual, or being regarded as an individual with a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more of the major life activities of the individual.

Earned Credit means the amount allocated to a Contractor upon completion of a Qualifying Contract through which the Contractor met or exceeded the goals for the utilization of Former Offenders, Apprentices or youth.

Labor hours means the total hours of workers receiving an hourly wage who are directly employed at the work site. "Labor hours" shall include hours performed by workers employed by the contractor and all subcontractors working at the work site. "Labor hours" shall not include hours worked by nonworking foremen, superintendents, owners and workers who are not subject to prevailing wage requirements.

Persons with Disabilities Owned Business Enterprise (PDBE) means a small business (i) that is at least 51 percent owned, controlled and managed by one or more Persons with a Disability, or in the case of a corporation, at least 51 percent or more of the stock of which is owned, controlled, and managed by one or more Persons with a Disability; (ii) that has its home office in Illinois, as certified by the CCD under policies and procedures promulgated by the CCD.

Qualifying Contract means a Contract for Public Works with a Bid Price of \$100,000.00 or more, for which the Contractor is eligible for Earned Credits.

Sec. 34-237. - Veteran-owned and Persons with Disabilities Owned businesses.

(a) It is the goal of the County to award each year not less than three percent of its total expenditures for supplies, equipment, goods, and services to VBEs, ~~and~~ SDVBEs, and PDBEs. The CCD may count toward its three-percent yearly goal that portion of all Contracts in which the Contractor subcontracts with a VBE, ~~or~~ SDVBE, or PDBE. CCD shall submit an annual report to the County Board that shall include, at a minimum, the following for the preceding fiscal year:

- (1) The number of responsible VBEs, ~~and~~ SDVBEs, and PDBEs that submitted a Bid or proposal;
- (2) The number of VBEs, ~~and~~ SDVBEs, and PDBEs that entered into Contracts, the specific industry or category of goods, services, or supplies for each Contract, and the total value of those Contracts;
- (3) The participation of VBEs, ~~and~~ SDVBEs, and PDBEs at both contractor and subcontractor levels;

(4) The total number of the County's certified VBEs, ~~and~~ SDVBES, and PDBEs available for participation in procurement, by category or industry; and

(5) Whether the County achieved the goal described in this subsection.

(b) Each year, the CCD shall review the three-percent goal with input from the Cook County Chairman of Veterans Affairs, the Cook County Director of Veterans Affairs, countywide veterans' service organizations, countywide service organizations for people with disabilities and from the business community including VBEs, ~~and~~ SDVBES, and PDBEs, and shall make recommendations to the County Board regarding continuation, increases, or decreases in the percentage goal. The recommendations shall be based upon the number of VBEs, ~~and~~ SDVBES, and PDBEs and on the continued need to encourage and promote businesses owned by qualified veterans and people with disabilities.

(c) The CPO will make best efforts to recruit and solicit bids and make procurements from VBEs, ~~and~~ SDVBES, and PDBEs.

(d) The above-stated goal shall not be treated as a quota nor shall it be used to discriminate against any person or business enterprise on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, ~~or~~ sex or disability.

(e) The CCD, in consultation with the Using Agency and the CPO, shall consider the size and complexity of the procurement before establishing contract specific goals and shall only be required to establish contract specific goals on procurements that have an available pool of certified VBEs, ~~and~~ SDVBES, and PDBEs for supplies, materials and equipment, or services.

(f) The provisions of this Division 6, Section 34-237(a) shall be effective as of July 1, 2013. The Contract Compliance Director shall as soon as practicable develop and implement procedures and any corresponding regulations for certifying and monitoring utilization of VBEs, ~~and~~ SDVBES, and PDBEs.

Effective date: This ordinance shall be in effect January 1, 2019.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

AMENDMENT TO SECTION 74-63 ASSESSMENT CLASSES

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that CHAPTER 74 TAXATION, ARTICLE II REAL PROPERTY TAXATION, DIVISION 2 CLASSIFICATION SYSTEM FOR ASSESSMENT, SECTION 74-63 ASSESSMENT CLASSES of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as Follows:

Sec. 74-63. - Assessment classes.

Real estate is divided into the following assessment classes:

- (7) *Class 6b.* Real estate used primarily for industrial purposes, consisting of all newly constructed buildings or other structures, including the land upon which they are situated; or abandoned property, including the land upon which such property is situated; or all buildings and other structures which are substantially rehabilitated to the extent such rehabilitation has added to their value, including qualified land related to the rehabilitation. Land qualifies when the rehabilitation adds vertical or horizontal square footage to the improvements. The amount of land eligible for the incentive shall be in such proportion as the square footage added by the rehabilitation bears to the total square footage of the improvements on the parcel.

- d. In the instance where real estate does not meet the definition of abandoned property as defined herein, the municipality or the County Board, as the case may be, may still determine that special circumstances justify finding that the property is deemed "abandoned" for purpose of Class 6b, unless:
1. There has been a purchase for value and the buildings and other structures have not been vacant and unused prior to such purchase; or
 2. There has been no purchase for value and the buildings and other structures have been vacant and unused for less than 24 continuous months.

The finding of abandonment, along with the specification of the special circumstances, shall be included in the Resolution or Ordinance supporting and consenting to the Class 6b application. If the Ordinance or Resolution is that of a municipality, the approval of the County Board is required to validate such a finding that the property is deemed "abandoned" for purposes of Class 6b, and a County Resolution to that effect shall be obtained. The applicant must obtain the municipal enabling Ordinance with the required finding of special circumstances and present such municipal Ordinance to the Board of Commissioners of Cook County prior to its determination as to whether it will validate such a finding that the property is deemed "abandoned" for purposes of Class 6b and provide a County Resolution to that effect. A certified copy of an Ordinance or Resolution finding that special circumstances exist, as well as a certified copy of a County Ordinance or Resolution validating such a finding that the property is deemed "abandoned" for purposes of Class 6b need not be filed at the time of filing the Class 6b eligibility application with the Assessor, but must be filed with the Assessor no later than the date an assessment appeal is filed to request the class change to Class 6b. If the Resolution is not filed at the time of the Class 6b eligibility application, the applicant shall instead file, at that time, a letter from the municipality or the County as the case may be, confirming that a Resolution or Ordinance regarding special circumstances has been requested.

If the real estate is located within an Industrial Growth Zone, prior to filing a Class 6b eligibility application with the Assessor and in lieu of an Ordinance or Resolution, an applicant may obtain from an authorized officer of the municipality or an authorized officer of the Cook County Bureau of Economic Development if the real estate is located in an unincorporated area, a letter stating that the municipality or the County Board, as the case may be, supports and consents to the filing of the Class 6b application with the Assessor. Such authorized officer shall have been designated by the legislative body of the municipality or, in the case of an unincorporated area, by the Cook County Board.

A copy of the authorized officer letter and a certified copy of the legislative action designating the authorized officer shall be included with the Class 6b application and submitted to the Cook County Bureau of Economic Development for verification prior to filing of the application with the Assessor.

In addition, the letter from the authorized officer shall:

1. Describe the redevelopment objective of the municipality;
2. State the applicant's intended use of the property; and
3. State that an Economic Disclosure Statement, as defined in this Division, was received and filed by the municipality or County Board, as the case may be.

Following verification that the Class 6b application is in an Industrial Growth Zone and has been properly submitted with a letter from an authorized officer and a certified copy of the legislative action designating the authorized officer, the Bureau of Economic Development will forward the application to the Assessor's Office for filing. A certified copy of the legislative action designating the authorized officer and the authorized officer letter shall be included with the Class 6b application at the time of filing the application with the Assessor. The applicant must demonstrate that the industrial development project qualifies for the Class 6b classification.

Temporary Emergency Economic Recovery Modification (TEERM) Program: In the instance where real estate does not meet the definition of abandoned property as defined herein, the municipality or the County Board, as the case may be, may still determine that special circumstances justify finding that the property is deemed "abandoned" for purpose of a Class 6b under the TEERM Program if:

1. There has been no purchase for value; and
2. The buildings and other structures have been vacant and unused for at least 12 continuous months.

The finding of abandonment, along with the specification of the special circumstances, and a determination that the applicant's participation in the TEERM Program is necessary for the development to occur, and that without such designation the industrial enterprise would not be economically viable causing the property to be in imminent risk of remaining vacant and

unused, shall be included in the Resolution or Ordinance supporting and consenting to the Class 6b application under the TEERM Program.

In addition, the Ordinance or Resolution where applicable shall:

1. Describe the redevelopment objective of the municipality;
2. State the applicant's intended use of the property; and
3. State that an Economic Disclosure Statement, as defined in this Division, was received and filed by the municipality or County Board, as the case may be.

If the Ordinance or Resolution is that of a municipality, the approval of the County Board is required to validate such a finding that the property is deemed "abandoned" for purposes of Class 6b, and a County Resolution to that effect shall be obtained. The applicant must obtain the municipal enabling Ordinance with the required finding of special circumstances and present such municipal Ordinance to the Board of Commissioners of Cook County prior to its determination as to whether it will validate such a finding that the property is deemed "abandoned" for purposes of Class 6b and provide a County Resolution to that effect. A certified copy of an Ordinance or Resolution finding that special circumstances exist, as well as a certified copy of a County Ordinance or Resolution validating such a finding that the property is deemed "abandoned" for purposes of Class 6b need not be filed at the time of filing the Class 6b application with the Assessor, but must be filed with the Assessor no later than the date an assessment appeal is filed to request the class change to Class 6b. If the Resolution is not filed at the time of the Class 6b application, the applicant shall instead file, at that time, a letter from the municipality or the County as the case may be, confirming that a Resolution or Ordinance regarding special circumstances has been requested.

Critical Emergency Employee Retention Modification (CEERM) Program: In the instance where real estate does not meet the definition of abandoned property as defined herein, the municipality or the County Board, as the case may be, may still determine that special circumstances justify finding that the property is deemed "abandoned" for purpose of a Class 6b under the TEERM Program if:

1. There has been no purchase for value; and
2. The buildings and other structures have been vacant and unused for at least 3 continuous months.

At least 250 positions would be retained at the subject location and the applicant's participation in the CEERM Program is necessary for the development to occur, and that without such designation the industrial enterprise would not be economically viable causing the property to be in imminent risk of remaining vacant and unused, shall be included in the Resolution or Ordinance supporting and consenting to the Class 6b application under the CEERM Program.

In addition, the Ordinance or Resolution where applicable shall:

1. Describe the redevelopment objective of the municipality;
2. State the applicant's intended use of the property; and
3. State that an Economic Disclosure Statement, as defined in this Division, was received and filed by the municipality or County Board, as the case may be.

If the Ordinance or Resolution is that of a municipality, the approval of the County Board is required to validate such a finding that the property is deemed "abandoned" for purposes of Class 6b, and a County Resolution to that effect shall be obtained. The applicant must obtain the municipal enabling Ordinance with the required finding of special circumstances and present such municipal Ordinance to the Board of Commissioners of Cook County prior to its determination as to whether it will validate such a finding that the property is deemed "abandoned" for purposes of Class 6b and provide a County Resolution to that effect. 1. The industrial enterprise that occupies the premises has been at the same location for a minimum of ten years prior to the date of application for the SER Program; and
2. The industrial enterprise that occupies the premises submits evidence of hardship supporting a determination that participation in the SER Program is necessary for the industrial enterprise to continue operations at its current location and maintain its staff, and that without such designation the industrial enterprise would not be economically viable causing the property to be in imminent risk of becoming vacant and unused.

The finding that a property is qualified, along with the specification of the special circumstances, and a determination that the applicant's participation in the SER Program is necessary for the industrial enterprise to continue operations at its current location and maintain its staff, and that without such designation the industrial enterprise would not be economically viable causing the property to be in imminent risk of becoming vacant and unused, shall be included in the Resolution or Ordinance supporting and consenting to the Class 6b application under the SER Program.

In addition, the Ordinance or Resolution where applicable shall:

1. Describe the redevelopment objective of the municipality;
2. State the applicant's intended use of the property; and
3. State that an Economic Disclosure Statement, as defined in this Division, was received and filed by the municipality or County Board, as the case may be.

If the Ordinance or Resolution is that of a municipality, the approval of the County Board is required to validate such a finding that the property is deemed "qualified" for purposes of Class 6b, and a County Resolution to that effect shall be obtained. The applicant must obtain the municipal enabling Ordinance with the required finding of special circumstances and present such municipal Ordinance to the Board of Commissioners of Cook County prior to its determination as to whether it will validate such a finding that the property is deemed "qualified" for purposes of Class 6b and provide a County Resolution to that effect. Applications for Class 6b incentives pursuant to the TEERM Program or SER Program or CEERM Program must be received by the Assessor's Office on or before November 30, 2018 to receive consideration.

The Assessor shall provide by rule for the filing of annual reports by recipients of Class 6b incentives granted pursuant to the SER Program as to the use of the property and the number of persons employed at the Class 6b site. In such reports, recipients shall be required to certify whether the industrial enterprise that occupied the premises at the time of the SER application continues its operations at that location. In addition, recipients of Class 6b incentives granted pursuant to the SER Program shall be required to report to the Assessor within 30 days if the industrial enterprise that occupied the premises at the time of the SER application ceases operations at that location. A copy of such reports will be forwarded by the Assessor's Office to the Secretary of the County Board for distribution to members of the County Board from the affected districts. Failure to file such reports within the time established by the Assessor's rules shall result in loss of the incentive for the period relating to the non-filing. Additionally, if the industrial enterprise that occupied the premises at the time of the SER application ceases operations at that location, then the Class 6b incentive granted pursuant to the SER program shall terminate.

- e. This classification shall continue for a period of 12 years from the date such new construction (excluding demolition, if any) or such substantial rehabilitation was completed and initially assessed, or in the case of abandoned property, from the date of substantial re-occupancy, or in the case of incentives granted pursuant to the TEERM Program, from the date of the notice

of approval. In the case of incentives granted pursuant to the SER Program, this classification shall continue for a period of 12 years from the date of the notice of approval, or until the industrial enterprise that occupied the premises at the time of the SER application ceases operations at that location if that occurs sooner.

- f. Unless a Class 6b granted pursuant to the TEERM Program or the SER Program or the CEERM Program, this incentive may be renewed during the last year a property is entitled to a ten percent assessment level pursuant to Section 74-64(7), if the following requirements are met:
1. The taxpayer notifies the Assessor's Office of intent to request renewal of the incentive from the municipality or the County Board if the real estate is located in an unincorporated area;
 2. The municipality in which the real estate is located or the County Board, if the real estate is located in an unincorporated area, adopts a Resolution expressly stating that the municipality or the County Board, as the case may be, has determined that the industrial use of the property is necessary and beneficial to the local economy, and supports and consents to renewal of the Class 6b; and
 3. A copy of the Resolution and a completed renewal application are filed with the Assessor's Office before the expiration of the ten percent assessment level period.

Effective date: This ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING A FISCAL IMPACT NOTE FOR PENDING LEGISLATION

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 2 - Administration, Article III. - County Board, Division I. -- Generally, Section 2-77 is hereby amended as follows:

Section 2-77 Fiscal impact review.

(a) *Short title.* This Section shall be known and may be cited as the Fiscal Impact Review Ordinance.

(b) *Impact note required.*

(1) Every measure before the County Board including, but not limited to, any ordinance, resolution, motion, contract approval, or any amendment thereto (collectively and individually "measure"), except those measures making a direct appropriation or approving a contract for a specified amount to be expended within one fiscal year, the purpose or effect of which is to expend any County funds or to increase or decrease the revenues of the County, or to require the expenditure of their own funds either directly or indirectly, shall have prepared for it a brief explanatory statement or note ("fiscal note") which shall include a reliable estimate of the probable impact of such measure upon the County's annual budget. The Cook County Chief Financial Officer shall prepare a fiscal impact statement for all ordinances or resolutions that propose to or would otherwise:

- i) expend any funds or increase or decrease the revenues of the County, either directly or indirectly; or
- ii) appropriate funds; or
- iii) increase or decrease existing appropriations; or
- iv) increase or decrease the fiscal liability of the County; or
- v) sell or lease any County asset, including revenue streams from that asset, if the anticipated revenue from the sale or lease of the asset is greater than \$5,000,000.00.

(2) If an ordinance authorizes capital expenditures or appropriates funds for capital expenditures, a fiscal note shall specify by year any principal and interest payments required to finance such capital expenditures. In addition, increased operational costs, by year, shall be specified. In no event shall a fiscal note be required to estimate out-year costs for more than five years.

(c) *Responsibility and deadline for furnishing the fiscal note.*

1. The Secretary of the Board chief sponsor of the item under consideration shall request, promptly after the introduction of the measure before the County Board, the Chief Financial Officer of the County to prepare a fiscal ~~note~~ impact statement promptly after the introduction of the measure before the County Board setting forth the information specified in this Section regarding any measure.
2. The fiscal impact statement shall be provided to all Commissioners at least 72 hours prior to the consideration of the ordinance or resolution by the Board of Commissioners; provided a request by a Commissioner to prepare the fiscal impact statement is made earlier, the Chief Financial Officer shall prepare the fiscal impact statement and provide it to the Commissioner within 48 hours of such request.

~~(2)~~ (3) No measure may be called for a final vote by the County Board until delivery of the fiscal note according to the provisions of this Section, except that whenever, because of the complexity of the measure, additional time is required for the preparation of the fiscal note the Chief Financial Officer shall provide each member of the County Board and the President of the County Board with a statement of reasons why the fiscal note cannot be supplied in seven business days, and request an extension of time not to exceed five additional business days within which such fiscal note is to be furnished. Such extension shall be granted only with the consent of the majority of the

members of the County Board and shall not extend beyond the end of the fiscal year in which the request was made. In no event may such extensions be used to unduly delay or hinder the consideration of the measure by the County Board. The County Board shall authorize the drafting of any rules of regulations which shall be subject to County Board approval, to ensure compliance with this Section.

~~(3)~~(4) In connection with the preparation of the fiscal note, all County officials and employees shall upon request cooperate with the Chief Fiscal Officer in providing information.

(d) *Form and content.*

1. The fiscal note shall be factual in nature, as brief and concise as may be, and shall provide as reliable an estimate, in dollars, as is possible under the circumstances. The fiscal note shall include both the immediate effect, and if determinable or reasonably foreseeable, the long-range effect of the measure.
2. If, after careful investigation it is determined that no dollar estimate is possible, the fiscal note shall contain a statement to that effect, setting forth the reasons why no such estimate can be given. A brief summary or work sheet of computations used in arriving at the fiscal note figures shall be included.

(e) *Preparation of fiscal note.*

1. No comment or opinion shall be included in the fiscal note with regard to the merits of the measure for which the fiscal note is prepared; however, technical or mechanical defects may be noted.
2. The work sheet shall include, insofar as practicable, a breakdown of the costs upon which the fiscal note is based. Such breakdown shall include, but need not be limited to, costs of personnel, materials and supplies, and capital outlay. The fiscal note shall also include such other information as is required by the rules and regulations which may be promulgated by the County Board with respect to the preparation of such fiscal notes. The fiscal impact statement shall, to the degree possible, consist of an estimate in dollars of the anticipated change in revenue, expenditures, or fiscal liability under the provisions of the ordinance or resolution. It shall also include a statement as to the immediate effect and, if determinable or reasonably foreseeable, the long-range effect of the measure. If after investigation, it is determined that no dollar estimate is possible, the fiscal impact statement shall contain a statement to that effect, setting forth the reasons why no dollar estimate can be given. The fiscal impact statement shall include an explanation of the basis or reasoning on which the estimate is founded, including all assumptions involved. A copy of the fiscal note shall be delivered to each member of the Board and the President of the County Board, according to the provisions of subsection (b) of this Section.
3. The original of the fiscal note and the work sheet shall be signed by the Chief Financial Officer or such person as the Chief Financial Officer may designate.

(f) *No restrictions on committee testimony.* The fact that a fiscal note is prepared for any measure shall not preclude or restrict the appearance before any committee of the County Board, of any official or authorized employee of any County commission, department, agency or other entity who desires to be heard in support of or in opposition to the measure.

Effective date: This ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.

A RESOLUTION TO EVALUATE THE FEASIBILITY OF SHERIFF'S OFFICE CONDUCTING COOK COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT'S BACKGROUND CHECKS

WHEREAS, An investigative report recently exposed multiple counts of sexual abuse of Chicago Public School (CPS) students at the hands of staff and teachers; and,

WHEREAS, Ineffective background checks or the disregard of negative background checks exposed students to educators and staff with criminal convictions and arrests for sex crimes against children; and,

WHEREAS, Although all school districts require potential school staff, volunteers and contract workers to pass a background check before they work with students, the report cited a lack of control over commissioning, receipt, and action of information received from background checks; and,

WHEREAS, Currently the Chicago Police Department, like CPS a department of the City of Chicago, conducts criminal background checks on all CPS potential staff; and,

WHEREAS, The background check function could be directed to an outside vendor, however, such a contract would still be under the management and control of a department of the City of Chicago; and,

WHEREAS, As is best practice in law enforcement, currently the city and the county operate a separation of powers in law enforcement functions; and,

WHEREAS, It is imperative to have separation of power to ensure all units of government are performing its core functions to the highest standard; and,

WHEREAS, The Cook County Sheriff's Office has the ability to conduct in depth criminal background checks, including criminal records, educational credentials, and prior employment on potential staff and conduct random checks to catch the arrests of current staff; and,

WHEREAS, It is the first duty of any unit of government to ensure the protection of children, especially those entrusted in the care of such government.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners shall direct the Cook County Sheriff's Office to explore the feasibility of conducting background checks for school districts in the County of Cook; and,

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners directs the Cook County Sheriff's Office and all other various stakeholders to work together to suggest any necessary public policy determinations or procedural changes necessary to allow the Cook County Sheriff's Office to conduct such background checks.

A motion was made by Commissioner Gainer, seconded by Commissioner Suffredin, that the Proposed Resolution be referred to the Legislation and Intergovernmental Relations Committee. The motion carried.
