Summary:

The Justice Advisory Council is requesting authorization to enter into and execute contracts with ten (10) community-based organizations. These contractors will provide violence prevention, intervention, and reduction services.

Brighton Park Neighborhood Council will provide evidence-based interventions for 100 at-risk youth with justice system involvement and exposure to complex trauma. This program, Leaders of Tomorrow, interrupts cycles of violence with a holistic approach to the needs of marginalized youth in Brighton Park.

Build, Inc. will provide services to 230 young people in the Austin and Humboldt Park communities at highest risk for violence involvement. BUILD's interventions help gang- and justice-involved youth to step away from stabilize their current environment, increase their self-efficacy, succeed in school, and successfully transition to the workforce and adulthood, with the ultimate goal of reducing violence at both the individual and community levels.

Enlace Chicago will support youth through the Little Village Youth Safety Network (LVYSN). LVYSN provides coordinated services with a dozen community partners. Data from consecutive years indicates that youth participating in LVYSN programming become more connected to adults and report being able to seek help from these adults during a crisis. These connections serve as critical protective factors, mitigating exposure to violence.

Erie Neighborhood House will offer services for women through its Proyecto Cuídate program. This program responds to the growing need for culturally competent violence prevention and family strengthening services in the Little Village community. Proyecto Cuídate provides in-depth assessments,

supportive counseling, case management, parent education classes, and support groups for women designed to promote self-development and skill building. Programming will include supportive services, parenting classes and psychotherapy along with educational and/or training opportunities that include wraparound services such as literacy and English as a second Language classes for the entire family.

Habilitative Systems, Inc. (HSI) will integrate a public health and positive youth development approach to reduce youth violence and recidivism. HSI's R.E.S.T.O.R.E. Our Youth (Recapturing, Empowering, Supporting, Transforming, Ownership, Repairing and Enhancing) program will combine evidence-based violence prevention (VP) and restorative justice (RJ) models with a holistic continuum of wrap-around services to reduce violence among at risk youth in the Chicago's Austin, North Lawndale, and East & West Garfield Park neighborhoods.

Institute for Nonviolence Chicago will canvass the Back of the Yards, Austin, and West Garfield Park neighborhoods daily, engaging in conflict mediation and street outreach to defuse and de-escalate conflicts. Program workers respond to shootings and homicides within one hour of notification and work to prevent retaliation and support those in crisis. Combined with victim support services and re-entry case management, these efforts help heal and empower communities in the aftermath of violence and serve over 400 of the highest-risk individuals.

Kids Above All will deliver programs on the south and west sides of Chicago, with specific attention to the needs of youth in care, to remedy the negative effects of exposure to complex trauma. Programs will strengthen youth who have either been a victim of violence, committed violence, or are high risk to fall into one of those categories with specific attention to the Bronzeville, East Garfield Park, Englewood, Washington Park, Woodlawn, Lawndale, Humboldt Park, and Garfield Park communities of Chicago. Services include coordination of care with guardians, teachers, family members and other adults in the lives of participants.

St. Agatha Church will work with with local residents to lower the short-and-long-term crime, violence, and incarceration rates in East and West Garfield Park and North Lawndale, through practices that increase the potential for healing and empowering community residents and returning citizens. Staff members, along with church and community volunteers, act as coaches and mentors to individuals incarcerated at Cook County Jail, and upon their release assists them in accessing basic needs such as identification, housing, job training, trauma counseling and employment. St. Agatha also conducts weekly Circles for the parents of youth incarcerated in the Juvenile Detention Center to provide supports and strategies for building stronger communication skills with their children and helping them to make more positive choices upon release.

UCAN will provide tested violence interruption, 1:1 and group mentoring, counseling, workforce development, and wraparound services for young persons who have been victims and/or perpetrators of violence in Chicago's North Lawndale community. 100 youth and adults who have been detained and/or are at risk of detention in the Juvenile Temporary Detention Center or the Cook County Jail will receive supports to reduce the impact of exposure to violence and trauma, with a goal of 90% of these individuals not being subsequently charged with a violent crime.

Youth Guidance will deliver its proven BAM (Becoming a Man) counseling intervention program to 110 high-need male students at Thornton Township High School in Harvey and Rosa Parks Middle School in Dixmoor. BAM offers an integrated character development, violence prevention, and counseling program to youth between the ages of 12 and 17; this program is shown by external evaluations by the University of Chicago Crime Lab to be an effective means of supporting academic engagement and significantly decreasing student criminal behaviors.

These contracts were selected pursuant to Request for Proposals (RFP) 1205-2001, released in February 2020. The aforementioned vendors were selected based on the established evaluation criteria.

Summary:

The Justice Advisory Council is requesting authorization to enter into and execute contracts with six (6) community-based organizations. These contractors will provide recidivism reduction services.

Centers for New Horizons will provide "Rise!" a successful program serving 70 adults in the Grand Boulevard and Englewood communities who have been detained and/or are at risk of detention in the Cook County Jail. This program model began in 2018 and has shown great success in reducing recidivism. From the initial 62 enrollments in the program, only 1 participant has recidivated following enrollment while 36 have already joined the workforce. The program provides workforce services with intensive wrap around services and trauma based cognitive behavioral therapy to address history of trauma and violence, building resilience and providing supports.

Chicagoland Prison Outreach will provide vocational training to 75-85 individuals who have been incarcerated. Students receive job readiness, mentoring and life skills classes, as well as mental health services and trauma-informed counseling. Welding training (Arc/Mig/Tig) has been delivered with great success to CPO program participants for thirteen years, for residents of South Suburban communities and residents of Chicago south-side communities. Over 80% of program participants have gained employment after completion of the welding program.

Growing Home provides hands-on and classroom training in the Englewood community and other south and west side Chicago communities. Growing Home is been dedicated to supporting people with extreme barriers to employment, especially those with criminal backgrounds. The program includes an innovative 14-week transitional jobs program for 110 individuals which integrates three key activities-fieldwork on our organic farms, customized classroom instruction, and one-on-one case management-for a holistic approach to employment. The organization teaches transferable skills such as project management, effective communication, personal responsibility, leadership, and teamwork. Participants receive a wage for the hours they work and study. In 2019, 88% of Growing Home program participants completed the program, and 76% of these individuals found unsubsidized employment.

Inner-City Muslim Action Network (IMAN) provides a Green ReEntry Program, including comprehensive training and services to 70 formerly incarcerated men and women of all ages, located in Chicago Lawn, Englewood, and surrounding neighborhoods. The program addresses behavioral health, life skills, job readiness, and training in key trades in the construction industry as a career option. It also includes needed workshops on substance abuse, case management, and job placement. In addition, participants access long-term physical health and mental health counseling support through IMAN's federally qualified health center.

OAI, Inc. will provide a Train-Expunge-Counsel-Hire (TECH) program to provide technical field employment and related services to individuals returned from incarceration to the Cook County Southland communities, particularly Robbins, Riverdale, Dolton, Calumet City, Harvey, Chicago Heights, Park Forest, Markham, Matteson, Country Club Hills, and Blue Island. Available supportive services include case management, career coaching, transportation, interviewing attire, uniforms, childcare assistance, testing and certification fees, drug testing, record expungement assistance, food, and other need-based services required to eliminate barriers to success. Technical training providers Governors State University and South Suburban College will up-skill participants with nationally recognized industry credentials and, along with Chicago Southland Economic Development Corporation (CSEDC), will engage with employers to provide employment to graduates.

Revolution Workshop will serve seventy individuals from Chicago's west and south side communities with construction trades pre-apprenticeship skills training, job placement and retention, and supportive services such as housing, substance abuse and legal services, and medical services. Participants who are justice-involved receive tailored services to remove barriers to success, and construction industry relationships by this organization connect participants with job placement and union sponsorship. Revolution Workshop also seeks to reduce inequity in Chicago by providing 1-on-1 counseling focusing on solving immediate financial stability issues such as obtaining food stamps, Medicaid, child care, or

transportation, and later resolves thorny issues, such as medical, student, and traffic debt.

PROPOSED RESOLUTIONS

SUPPORTING THE PASSAGE OF THE "FAIR TAX" CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

WHEREAS, in the upcoming General Election on November 3, 2020 Illinois voters will be asked to vote on a proposed amendment to Section 3 of Article IX of the Illinois Constitution, colloquially known as the "Fair Tax;" and,

WHEREAS, the Fair Tax amendment will allow the State of Illinois to impose a graduated marginal income tax on residents for the first time, as opposed to a regressive flat income tax; and,

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois has the eighth most regressive tax systems in the nation, according to the Institute on Taxation and Economic Policy (ITEP); and,

WHEREAS, an ITEP report found that Illinois's flat tax exacerbates income inequality and worsens the racial wealth gap, and that the compounding effects of years of a flat income tax has enriched wealthy, mostly white Illinoisans, by tens of billions while stripping billions from Black and Hispanic communities; and,

WHEREAS, under the tax brackets approved by the Illinois legislature, the Fair Tax will amount to a tax increase for 3% of the population whose income is above \$250,000 per year, while the remaining 97% of the population will pay the same or less in taxes; and

WHEREAS, the Fair Tax is estimated to generate upwards of \$3 billion in revenue that will fund schools and other social services that are desperately needed in the City of Chicago and across the state.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Cook County Board of Commissioners supports the passage of the "Fair Tax" constitutional amendment to allow for a graduated income tax in Illinois.

Funds will support housing services through subrecipients and partnerships to address housing

needs of EM participants that are deemed No Place To Stay or difficult to place due to their criminal offenses. Funding would help the CCSO and its' partners to offer housing services that have not been available due to costs or other restrictions, and to meet the practical needs of individuals leaving CCDOC custody in order to remove them from the congregate setting and control and mitigate the spread of COVID-19.

Summary: While from a public health perspective the CCDOC, along with criminal justice organizations and community groups, has successfully worked with the Court to reduce the jail population, allowing for increased social distancing through single-celling and overall mitigation and control of the spread of COVID-19. Such wins have had an impact on the CCSO Community Corrections Electronic Monitoring Unit (EMU) resources. The target population for this grant proposal are detainees who are eligible to re-enter communities, either through discharge, bond court, or the EM program by court order, but who cannot be accepted or placed in available housing due to housing providers being at capacity, disqualifying factors within their criminal background that hinder existing contractual housing arrangements, or specialized medical needs that cannot be supported due to the high costs associated with housing these individuals.

As a continued control and mitigation measure, the importance of properly transitioning eligible detainees from the jail to the community is more urgent than ever before. This proposed program aims to address the numerous obstacles that confront individuals who are eligible to leave the jail, either through EM or a bond. First and foremost is ensuring that persons ordered to community corrections have appropriate housing and then complimenting housing arrangements with services that will help prevent individuals from running afoul of the legal system or being ensnared by other impediments to their rehabilitation.

The process of placing an individual on EM has several hurdles to overcome. The process begins when the court orders participants to be placed on electronic monitoring. Before a would-be participant is moved to EM, the CCSO reviews records to ensure the participant will not be placed with an alleged victim (e.g. a domestic partner who was allegedly abused by the participant). The CCSO also contacts the host to inquire whether they will accept the participant to live in their residence. In the aftermath of COVID-19, the CCSO also explains COVID-19 safety precautions and the potential for exposure to the host as part of

the procedure.

Should a potential host decline to house the detainee, which is increasingly common during the pandemic, the detainee loses the ability to reside at that host location. In these situations, the CCSO does try to work with potential EM participants and service providers to find housing. The proposed program would help CCSO and providers respond to the combined challenges of more individuals participating in the EM program and COVID-19 precautions that must be implemented by housing providers and notably, will expand the housing support network as funding would be available to house persons for example, with greater medical needs and costs.

By providing housing to EM participants, this grant would help meet the practical needs of individuals who otherwise would have to remain in the jail, contributing to crowding which ultimately places a strain on the Department's efforts to socially distance detainees as best as we can, within a correctional setting.

Providing them with housing helps to protect them and the communities from the spread of COVID-19 and removes them from congregate settings which inherently, carry greater risks of exposure during pandemics.

Summary: The RSAT program will incorporate Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT) based treatment interventions to include curricula from Breaking the Cycle, Thinking for Change, and the Change Companies materials. Additionally, the program will include a rigorous reentry care coordination effort and discharge planning. The reentry effort will be supported by care coordinators and community partner agencies that provide in-reaching services to support the program and encourage warm handoffs from Cook County Department of Corrections (CCDOC) program care coordinators to the community partner case managers or treatment providers. Following discharge, CCDOC reentry care coordinators will continue to provide ongoing support and referral services to those released individuals.

Assessments to be used will be the DASS 42, ASSIST, TCU, and ACES. These assessments are already being used by CCDOC program staff and are in line with the SMART program framework. Further, by utilizing measures already in use at CCDOC, the CCSO Research team will be better able to analyze data for program development and outcome information. The DAPPER-3 will be used to establish need and level of treatment. DAPPER-3 is designed to create individualized treatment plans by focusing the attention on factors that need immediate attention and are treatment plan priorities. The design is focused on documenting severity within a given ASAM dimension, not a normalized "score" based on an average. This allows each individual to receive the specialized and specific treatment they need throughout all stages of treatment. The DAPPER-3 rating design facilitates continued care by offering up to five

additional ratings to determine, if desired, changes or improvements are evinced during the treatment continuum.

The aim of the reentry planning component of the Sheriff's SMART program is to establish thought patterns and habits that prevent participants from future substance use. Community partner group in-reaching, individualized discharge planning, and intensive case management will be employed to assist participants' reentry to the community. Aggressive case management and ongoing clinical services will be provided to incarcerated detainees, and ongoing services will be provided by community providers once released.

WHEREAS, As the Clerk of Court, Hon. Dorothy Brown greatly increased access to justice, by implementing a range of technological innovations in the Clerk's Office: from creating a number of online services, including Online Traffic Ticket Payment System, Mortgage Surplus Search, Unclaimed Child Support Checks Search, SmartForms (Online Order of Protection service); to having one of the few court clerk Mobile Apps in the United States, Court Clerk Mobile Connect; to making the case management systems, all electronic, in 2002, by installing an electronic system in the Probate and County divisions; to

implementing an integrated cashiering system in 2004; to implementing an integrated eTraffic Ticket system to make traffic stops faster and safer for police officers in 2005; to implementing an Intranet system to balance the playing field for communicating information directly to the Clerk's Office employees; to championing the implementation of electronic filing in Illinois, being one of the first court clerks in Illinois to implement an integrated eFiling system in 2009; to implementing an Imaging Document Management System for the digitization of millions of court documents from 2009 to 2014; to implementing an integrated eTraffic Ticket system to make traffic stops faster and safer for police officers in 2011; to providing Digital Access Terminals in all Clerk's Office locations for viewing and retrieving the imaged documents in 2016; to installing Smart Kiosks and digital monitors for accessing court information in 2019; and, finally, selecting and installing a new, state-of-the-art, case management system from 2017 to 2020, to replace the 40-year-old, legacy mainframe case management systems that she inherited for Criminal, Civil and Traffic cases; and

COOK COUNTY RECOGNIZES OCTOBER 2020 AS DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS MONTH

WHEREAS, October is nationally known as Domestic Violence Awareness Month and a time to uplift the experiences and resilience of survivors, as well as educate and support households experiencing this hardship; and

WHEREAS, domestic violence is a pattern of physical and psychological abuse, threats, intimidation, isolation, or economic coercion used by one person to exert power and control over another person in the context of a dating, familial, or household relationship; and

WHEREAS, intimate partner violence can happen to anyone at any point in a relationship, and affects people of all ages as well as all racial, ethnic, gender, economic, and religious backgrounds; and

WHEREAS, according to the National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey, women are disproportionately victims of domestic violence, as 1 in 4 women and 1 in 7 men ages 18 and older will experience domestic violence at some point in their life; and

WHEREAS, according to the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence, 37.7% of women in Illinois 37.7% and 25.7% of men in Illinois experience intimate partner physical violence, intimate partner sexual violence or intimate partner stalking in their lifetimes; and

WHEREAS, a June 2020 report from The Network indicated that there were 2,458 domestic violence related incidents documented by the Cook County Sheriff's Office in 2019 alone; and

WHEREAS, according to the Institute for Women's Policy Research, approximately 40% of Black women and 34.4% of Latina women will endure domestic violence at some point in their lifetime; and

WHEREAS, Black women experience intimate partner violence at a rate 35% higher than that of white females, and about 2.5 times the rate of women of other races and are less likely than white women to use social services, battered women's programs, or go to the hospital because of domestic violence, according to the Bureau of Justice Statistics and the Feminist Majority Foundation; and

WHEREAS, 63% of victimized Latinas experience multiple acts of victimization, Latino victims are less likely to tell health care workers, and Latino victims report seeking local shelters less than women from other ethnic/racial groups due to language barriers and fear of immigration enforcement; and

WHEREAS, noncitizen victims of domestic violence report heightened concerns with accessing law enforcement and services due to uncertainty arising from changing immigration policies and heightened immigration enforcement; and

WHEREAS, LGBTQ domestic violence victims face barriers unique to their status, such as lack of access to domestic violence shelters, according to the National Coalition of Anti-Violence Programs; and

WHEREAS, during Domestic Violence Awareness Month, we acknowledge the progress made in this field and embrace the basic human right to be free from violence and abuse, and recognize that more work remains until every individual is able to live free from fear; and

WHEREAS, this month, we recognize the unique circumstances faced by survivors and individuals facing domestic violence due to the public health crisis of COVID-19 and the negative impact it has had on the delivery of social services and access to resources; and

WHEREAS, according to the Nation Coalition Against Domestic Violence, domestic violence hotlines receive approximately 21,000 calls a day, an average of close to 15 calls every minute; and

WHEREAS, victims of domestic violence who worked with advocates experienced less violence over time, reported higher quality of life and social support, and had less difficulty obtaining community resources over time, according to the National Resource Center on Domestic Violence; and

WHEREAS, there is a need to increase-not reduce-funding for programs aimed at intervening in and preventing domestic violence in Cook County and throughout the United States.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners commends domestic violence victim advocates, victim service providers, crisis hotline staff and first responders for their compassionate support of survivors of domestic violence, and commits to continuing to raise awareness of domestic violence and the corresponding devastating effects of domestic violence on survivors, families, and communities; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners officially recognizes October 2020 as Domestic Violence Awareness Month and call on the Cook County community to reaffirm their commitment to speaking out against domestic violence, assist victims in finding the help and healing they need, and work collaboratively to ending domestic violence in our community.

HONORING OCTOBER 29, 2020 AS LATINA EQUAL PAY DAY

WHEREAS, fifty-seven years ago, in 1963, President John F. Kennedy signed into law the Equal Pay Act into law which requires employers to give "equal pay for equal work" and one year later, in 1964, the Civil Rights Act was passed in which Title VII of that act barred all discrimination in employment, including discrimination in hiring, firing, promotion, and wages on the bases of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin; and

WHEREAS, in 2009 President Barack Obama signed the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act into law, which served to further strengthened previously established anti discriminatory labor laws; and

WHEREAS, "Equal Pay Day" was initiated in 1996 by the National Committee on Pay Equity to symbolize how far into the current year a woman must work to earn as much as man doing similar work earned in the previous year; and

WHEREAS, Overall, women in the United States, who work full-time, year-round, are compensated only 82 cents for every dollar paid to their male counterparts. Over the course of her lifetime, this gap will cost a woman and her family lost wages, reduced pensions and diminished Social Security benefits; and

WHEREAS, due to the compounding effects of gender and racial discrimination, for women of the color, the pay gap is even wider; and

WHEREAS, for every \$1 earned by white non-Hispanic males, Asian American and Pacific Islander women earn 90 cents, Black women earn 62 cents, Native American women earn 60 cents and Latinas earn just 55 cents; and

WHEREAS, because of these disparities and Equal Pay Day Chicago organizers have moved the official date of the Equal Pay Day Rally from March to Latina Equal Pay Day which will be held on October 29, 2020; and

WHEREAS, October 29, 2020 is a stark reminder of the significant disparity and amount of time it takes for Latina women to make as much as a white, non-Hispanic man; and

A RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF THE ILLINOIS NAACP STATE CONFERENCE AND THE ILLINOIS ASSOCIATION OF CHIEFS OF POLICE TEN SHARED PRINCIPLES

WHEREAS, Cook County has seen numerous peaceful protests against police brutality in response to the deaths of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Rayshard Brooks, and too many others to name locally and across the country; and

WHEREAS, a 2018 investigation by WBEZ and the Better Government Association found that of 113 shootings involving suburban police departments since 2005, no offers were charged criminally or faced disciplinary action; and

WHEREAS, according to the Chicago Tribune, from 2010 to 2015, Chicago Police Officers shot 262 people, killing 92, and with about four out of every five being African American males; and

WHEREAS, further police reform and training is needed to address the disparities of police conduct in communities of color; and

WHEREAS, in response to historical and consistent incidents of police misuse of force, the Illinois NAACP State Conference and the Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police affirmed the following Ten Shared Principles to guide reforms that eliminate the disproportionate negative impacts of policing on people of color:

- 1. We value the life of every person and consider life to be the highest value.
- 2. All persons should be treated with dignity and respect. This is another foundational value.
- 3. We reject discrimination toward any person that is based on race, ethnicity, religion, color, nationality, immigrant status, sexual orientation, gender, disability, or familial status.
- 4. We endorse the six pillars in the report of the President's Task Force on 21st Century Policing. The first pillar is to build and rebuild trust through procedural justice, transparency, accountability, and honest recognition of past and present obstacles.
- 5. We endorse the four pillars of procedural justice, which are fairness, voice (i.e., an opportunity for citizens and police to believe they are heard), transparency, and impartiality.
- 6. We endorse the values inherent in community policing, which includes community partnerships involving law enforcement, engagement of police officers with residents outside of interaction specific to enforcement of laws, and problem-solving that is collaborative, not one-sided.
- 7. We believe that developing strong ongoing relationships between law enforcement and communities of color at the leadership level and street level will be the keys to diminishing and eliminating racial tension.

- 8. We believe that law enforcement and community leaders have a mutual responsibility to encourage all citizens to gain a better understanding and knowledge of the law to assist them in their interactions with law enforcement officers.
- 9. We support diversity in police departments and in the law enforcement profession. Law enforcement and communities have a mutual responsibility and should work together to make a concerted effort to recruit diverse police departments.
- 10. We believe de-escalation training should be required to ensure the safety of community members and officers. We endorse using de-escalation tactics to reduce the potential for confrontations that endanger law enforcement officers and community members; and the principle that human life should be taken only as a last resort; and

WHEREAS, the Ten Shared Principles asserts the importance of treating all persons with dignity and respect, and rejects discrimination toward any person on the basis of race, ethnicity, religion, color, nationality, immigrant status, sexual orientation, gender, disability, or familial status; and

WHEREAS, the Ten Shared Principles emphasizes building strong relationships between law enforcement and communities of color through transparency, accountability, and honest recognition of past and present obstacles: and

WHEREAS, the Ten Shared Principles mandates de-escalation training to ensure the safety of both community members and officers, and supports the principle that human life should be taken only as a last resort; and

WHEREAS, the Ten Shared Principles resolves to replace mistrust with mutual trust wherever, whenever, and however possible; and

WHEREAS, this document is meant to work in tandem with existing local and statewide efforts; and

WHEREAS, the Ten Shared Principles is a starting point for improving relationships between police officers and the residents they serve, and creating a space for open dialogue and collaborative problem-solving; and

WHEREAS, nearly 200 police departments and law organization have adopted the Ten Shared Principles since its inception in 2018; and

WHEREAS, the Forest Preserves supports and endorses the ideologies outlined in the Ten Shared Principles for the Forest Preserves of Cook County Police.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Cook County Board of Commissioners supports and endorses the ideologies outlined in the Ten Shared Principles and will work to implement them throughout the County, including lobbying as necessary to the state legislature; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Cook County Sheriff's Office does hereby support and endorse the ideologies outlined in the Ten Shared Principles; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Cook County Board of Commissioner encourages all police departments to adopt these principles and pledges to support police departments in pursuit of these principles.

JUNETEENTH RECOGNIZED AS A COOK COUNTY HOLIDAY

WHEREAS, On January 1, 1863 President Abraham Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation; and

WHEREAS, That established that all enslaved people in Confederate states and against the Union shall be set free from slavery; and

WHEREAS, Many slave owners in the state of Texas did not release their slaves; and

WHEREAS, On June 19th, 1865, General Gordan Grainger and his troops made their way to Galveston, Texas after the surrender of General Robert E. Lee on Appotomox, Virginia. Upon General Grainger's arrival in Texas soil, he issued Generals Order No. 3; and

WHEREAS, This order officially declared the immediate release and freedom of the remainder of slaves located in Texas; and

WHEREAS, Slaves that were forcefully held captive almost three years after the Emancipation Proclamation was issued were finally pronounced freemen; and

WHEREAS, The year following 1865, freedmen in Texas organized the first of what became the annual celebration of "Jubilee Day" on June 19. In the ensuing decades, Juneteenth commemorations featured music, barbecues, prayer services and other activities; and

WHEREAS, The last of the people that were freed from slavery in Texas, made it a custom to go back to Galveston to celebrate their freedom. These former slaves pioneered and spread the celebration of Juneteenth throughout the entirety of the United States; and

WHEREAS, Although slaves were considered freemen, they continued to receive harsh treatment and were discriminated against by a large population of America; and

WHEREAS, Jim Crow Laws were placed to enforce the racial segregation of African-Americans and were often barred from participating in the celebration of Juneteenth; and

WHEREAS, This led to the eventual purchase of private lands, such as Emancipation Park in Houston, Texas, and the Booker T. Washington Park in Mexia, Texas for individuals to celebrate Juneteenth; and

WHEREAS, June 19 is now officially recognized as a ceremonial holiday in forty-seven of the fifty states, with Texas being the first to declare Juneteenth a state holiday in 1980; and

WHEREAS, Today, the celebration of Juneteenth is stronger than ever before, as it's been fueled by the unfortunate, but extremely impactful deaths of African -Americans, such as George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Ahmaud Arbery, and countless more victims; and

WHEREAS, Slavery and has had brutal impacts on African Americans and their families including but not limited to disparities in economics, healthcare, housing, the pursuit of happiness, education and the social determinants of health; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, by Cook County, President and Board of Commissioners shall promote Juneteenth as a day of education partnering with organizations and community to celebrate contribution of the many African- Americans from the past and today whose families were liberated, thereby allowing them to be free today; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 44 HUMAN RESOURCES, ARTICLE III. VACATION AND SICK LEAVE, SEC. 44.92 of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as follows:

Sec. 44.92. Designation of Holidays

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners that Chapter 102 Building and Building Regulations, Article II – Vacant Buildings, Section 102-5, Section 102-6 and Section 102-19 is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 102-5. - Obligation to register.

(a) The owner of any building that has become vacant shall within 30 days, after the building becomes vacant or within 30 days after assuming ownership of the building, whichever is later, file a registration statement, including proof of liability insurance in the amount prescribed in Section 102-14, for each such building with the appropriate enforcing authority on forms provided by that department for such purposes and pay a registration fee in the amount prescribed in Section 102-6, for each registered building; provided, however, that all eleemosynary, religious, educational, benevolent or charitable associations organized on a not-for-profit basis and all governmental agencies shall be exempt from the payment of the registration fee. The registration shall remain valid for one year from the date of registration. The owner shall be required to renew the registration every year as long as the building remains vacant. There shall be no fee for such renewal, and pay a renewal fee as prescribed in Section 102-6. The owner shall notify the Department of Building and Zoning, within 20 days, of any change in the registration information by filing an amended registration statement on a form provided by the Department of Building and Zoning for such purposes. The registration statement shall be deemed prima facie proof of the statements therein contained in any administrative enforcement proceeding or court proceeding instituted by the County against the owner or owners of the building. Registration of a building in accordance with this section shall be deemed to satisfy the registration requirement set forth in Article V, Administration and Enforcement, Section 5.3-4 of the Cook County Building Code.

Sec. 102-6. - Owner registration fee.

The registration fee for each registered building shall be \$250.00 (the "base registration fee"). The renewal fee for each registered building shall be \$500.00. All fees and fines laid out in this section are in addition to any fees and fines in other sections of the Cook County Building and Zoning Ordinance. The base registration fee set forth above in this section shall be doubled if the applicable initial registration takes place not through voluntary and timely compliance, but as the result of an enforcing authority's identification of a violation of this ordinance. Such doubled fee shall not be subject to reduction, during the relevant period, for having registered or renewed following the issuance of a citation for failure to register or renew.

Sec. 102-19. - Vacant buildings—Mortgagee required to act—Enforcement authority.

(a) The mortgagee of any residential building that has become vacant and which is not registered pursuant to this section or Section 102-5 of this Code shall, within the later of 30 days after

the building becomes vacant and unregistered or 60 days after a default, file a registration statement with the Department of Building and Zoning on forms provided by that department for such purposes and pay a registration fee of \$250.00. The mortgagee shall be required to renew the registration every year as long as the building remains vacant. There shall be no fee The fee for such renewal shall be \$500.00. The mortgagee shall notify the Department of Building and Zoning within 20 days of any change in the registration information by filing an amended registration statement on a form provided by the Department of Building and Zoning for such purposes. The registration statement shall be deemed prima facie proof of the statements therein contained in any administrative enforcement proceeding or court proceeding instituted under this section against the mortgagee with respect to the registered building. The base registration fee set forth above in this section shall be doubled if the applicable initial registration takes place not through voluntary and timely compliance, but as the result of an enforcing authority's identification of a violation of this ordinance. Such doubled fee shall not be subject to reduction, during the relevant period, for having registered or renewed following the issuance of a citation for failure to register or renew.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners that Chapter 102 Building and Building Regulations, Article III - Building Code, Section 102-105 is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 102-105. - Administration and enforcement.

- (3) *Permits, Certificates and Plans.*
 - 1. Building Permits.

p. Expiration of Permit. If, after a building permit or other required permit or other have required permit, shall been granted the operations called for by such permit are not begun within 12 months after the date thereof, such permit shall be void and no operations thereunder shall be begun. If work authorized by a permit is not completed within twelve (12) months of its issuance, such permit shall become invalid until an extended permit shall has been taken out by the Owner or his agent at a fee of 10% of the original permit cost or \$25, whichever is greater. An extended permit shall be valid for six months following the date of expiration of the original permit and must be applied for within ten days after the expiration of the original permit. Unless otherwise determined by the Building Commissioner, Oone extension only shall be granted, and if work is has not begun been completed within 18 months after the date of issuance of the original permit, all rights under the permit shall thereupon terminate. Where, under authority of a permit or extended permit, work has begun and has been abandoned for a continuous or cumulative period of 12 months, all rights under such permit shall thereupon terminate.

(4) Enforcement.

- 3. Methods of Enforcement.
 - a. Registration for Building Work.

- (5)If any person, firm or corporation registered as provided by this section, shall fail in the execution of any work or fail to comply with the provisions of this Ordinance relative to the erection, enlargement, alteration, repair, relocation, or demolition of any building, or part thereof, at least three times within two calendar years, the Building Commissioner, after notice to such person, firm or corporation that he, she, or it has three such failures or violations, shall remove or strike such persons', firm's, or corporation's name from the registration book. For persons, firms, or corporations that have one such failure or violation, the Building Commissioner shall request the State's Attorney to bring suit and to prosecute such person, firm or corporation for such failure or violation, and in the case of a finding of guilty, his name shall be removed or stricken from the registration book. In either case, such persons', firm's, or corporation's name shall not be re-entered or reinstated during such time as the failure or violation exists or any judgment remains unsatisfied with regard to said finding, or until the Building Commissioner determines that such person, firm, or corporation should be re-entered or reinstated.
- (6)Any person, firm, or corporation that shall have been found guilty under the preceding Section may have his name re-entered on the registration book upon filing with the Building Commissioner a certificate signed by the State's Attorney, the Building Commissioner and the Health Officer to the effect that all violations of the Code with reference to which the finding of guilty was secured have been corrected or are nonexistent and that all claims and judgments arising from such convictions have been paid.
- (5) (i) It shall be a violation for any person, firm or corporation registered, as proved by subsection 102-105(4)3.a.(1) to:
 - (a) Perform or direct the performance of any work, requiring the issuance of a permit under this Code, without the issuance of a permit; or
 - (b) Perform or direct work deviating from the drawings, plans or scope of any work done under the authority of a permit issued pursuant to this Code where said deviation would require prior written approval or the issuance of a new permit; or
 - (c) Perform or direct work in violation of a stop work order; or

- (d) Perform or direct work that results in the issuance of a stop work order; or
- (e) <u>Upon completion of work requiring a rough or final inspection or certification, fail to contact the Building Department to schedule a required inspection; or</u>
- (f) <u>Upon completion of work requiring a Certificate of Compliance, failed to contact</u> the Building Department to obtain a required Certificate of Compliance; or
- (g) <u>Utilize or direct any person of a building or construction trade or craft who is not registered by Cook County to perform work that is required to be performed by a person registered by Cook County; or</u>
 - When a permit requires the listing of the name or identification number of a person required to be registered by Cook County to perform the work, utilized or directed any person of a building or construction trade or craft tperform work other than the person or entity whose name or identification number is listed on the permit; or
- (h) List or allow the listing or use of one's registration name or identification number on a permit application or a permit when that work is performed by another person; or
- (i) Make a false statement on a permit application or aided and abetted another person in making a false statement on a permit application; or
- (j) Perform or direct work contrary to this Code or failed to perform work required by this Code, and such action resulted in a substantial defect, error or deficiency requiring a re-inspection or re-review by the Building Department; or
- (k) Fail to correct any substantial defect, error or deficiency as direct by the Building Department; or
- (1) Perform or direct work that poses an immediate or imminent threat to the health and safety of workers or the public; or
- (m) Conduct any fraud, misrepresentation or false statement contained in the application for such registration or permit application.
- (ii) Any person, firm or corporation found to be in violation of a first offense of this subsection shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$500.00 nor more than \$1,000.00. Any person, firm or corporation found to be in violation of a second offense of this subsection, occurring within two (2) years of the first offense, shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$1,000.00 nor more than \$2,000.00. Any person, firm or corporation found to be in violation of a third offense of this subsection, occurring within two (2) years of the first offense, shall be punished by a fine of not less than

\$2,000.00 nor more than \$3,000.00. Each day that a violation continues shall constitute a separate and distinct offense. For purposes of this subsection, multiple violations occurring on the same date shall be deemed a single violation.

(iii)If any person, firm or corporation required to be registered, as proved by subsection 102-105(4)3.a.(1), is found to be in violation of this subsection, as determined by a court or administrative tribunal of competent jurisdiction, the Building Commissioner shall have the power to suspend their registration, after giving notice of such, for up to one (1) year. Reinstatement of a suspended registration shall be automatic, provided that all fines and fees due and owing to the County have been paid in full, in addition to an administrative fee of \$50.00.

(iv)The notice of suspension shall include:

- (7)A general statement attesting to the basis for the suspension;
 - (a) The duration of the suspension period, not to exceed one (1) year;
 - (b) The beginning and end date of the suspension period;
 - (c) A statement informing the registrant of their right to petition the Building Commissioner requesting the reconsideration of their suspension and the reinstatement of their registration privileges. The petition shall include proof that any issue of noncompliance has been abated or corrected and that all related penalties and fees have been paid. In addition to any other penalties and fees, a fee of \$150.00 shall be paid to the County for every inspection or review conducted by the Building Department to verify compliance. Furthermore, a fee of \$50.00 shall be paid to the County for reinstatement of any registration. The petition must be served on the Building Commissioner within fourteen (14) days of the notice of suspension; and
 - (d) The process by which the person, firm or corporation may reinstatement their registration at the end of the suspension period
- (6) If any person, firm or corporation required to be registered, as proved by subsection 102-105(4)3.a.(1), is found to be in violation of this subsection, as determined by a court or administrative tribunal of competent jurisdiction, at least three (3) times within two (2) calendar years, the Building Commissioner shall have the power to revoke their registration after giving notice of such. Reinstatement of a revoked registration shall require a petition demonstrating rehabilitation to the satisfaction of the Building Commissioner.
 - (i) The notice of revocation shall include:
 - (a) A general statement attesting to the basis for revocation;
 - (b) A statement informing the registrant of their right to petition the Building Commissioner requesting the reconsideration of the revocation and the reinstatement of their registration privileges. The petition must be served on the Building Commissioner within fourteen (14) days of the notice of revocation; and

- (c) The process by which the person, firm or corporation may request the reinstatement of their revoked registration. Prior to the reinstatement of a revoked registration, in addition to any other penalties and fees, a fee of \$150.00 shall be paid to the County for every inspection or reviewed conducted by the Building Department to verify compliance. Furthermore, a fee of \$50.00 shall be paid to the County for reinstatement of a revoke registration.
- (ii) The Building Commissioner reserves the right to revoke a registration at any time where any person, firm or corporation is found to be in violation of this subsection, as determined by a court or administrative tribunal of competent jurisdiction, where the basis for the violation:
 - (a) Resulted in great bodily harm or the loss of life to any natural person; or
 - (b) Resulted in the damage or loss of property in an aggregated amount of one-hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) or more; or
 - (c) Was the result of or resulted in a conviction or finding of liability, as determined by a court or administrative tribunal of competent jurisdiction, for an act or underlying act: (i) related to bribery or attempted bribery of a government official or government vendor; or (ii) related to fraud or theft or attempted fraud or theft involving a government project, government program, government procurement or government contract, than no reinstatement shall be allowed unless the conviction or finding of liability is reversed or vacated. No petition shall be considered and no reinstatement shall be allowed less than one year or more than five (5) years after the revocation of the license. Only one such petition for reinstatement may be filed or considered per violation.
- (iii) If the Building Commissioner suspends or revokes any person's, firm's or corporation's registration under this subsection, the Building Commissioner may process an application for or revision to a permit if the permit is for work that would correct the basis for the suspension or revocation.
- (iv) Any suspension or revocation of a registration shall also apply to any subsequent company that has a twenty (20) percent or more common identity/ownership interest with the suspended or revoked registration.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners that Chapter 114 Signs, Article II - Billboards and Off-Premises Outdoor Advertising Signs, Section 114-32 is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 114-32. - Sign permits.

(c) Fees. In addition to the application fee required to obtain a sign permit, an annual registration renewal fee of \$600.00 as set forth in Section 32-1 shall be required to maintain the permit.

Effective date: This Ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.

TEMPORARY EQUIPMENT FOR REPROCESSING OF CONSTRUCTION AND DEMOLITION MATERIAL

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 30 Environment, Article III Air, Division II Air Pollution, Subdivision II Smoke and Particulate Matter of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as Follows:

Sec. 30-388. Temporary equipment for reprocessing of construction and demolition material

Sec. 30-389. Definitions.

<u>Reprocessable construction/demolition material</u> or <u>material</u> shall mean broken concrete, bricks, rock, stone or paving asphalt generated from construction and/or demolition activities. The material shall

not contain lead, asbestos or any other hazardous material of the type that renders recycling of such material illegal or impossible.

<u>Reprocessable construction/demolition material site</u> or <u>site</u> shall mean a site used for purposes of the temporary reprocessing, storage, transport and final usage of reprocessable construction/demolition material.

<u>Reprocessing equipment</u> or <u>equipment</u> shall mean equipment designed to crush or break reprocessable material into smaller constituent parts for the purpose of reprocessing such material and for use on site.

Reprocessing activities or reprocessed or reprocessing means the crushing or breaking of construction/demolition material into smaller constituent parts by reprocessing equipment.

<u>Temporary reprocessing activities permit</u> or <u>temporary reprocessing permit</u> shall mean a permit issued for a limited number of days for reprocessing activities pursuant to this article.

Sec. 30-390. Purpose and scope.

The purpose and intent of this article is to regulate temporary reprocessing activities and to prevent the improper reprocessing, storage, transport and/or final usage of construction/demolition material. This article shall apply within Cook County, outside the limits of the City of Chicago.

Sec. 30-391. Reprocessing Equipment Registration Permit and Certificate of Operation.

(a) <u>Equipment Registration Permit</u>. The Owner and/or Operator shall obtain an Equipment Registration Permit for the reprocessing equipment pursuant to Sec. 30-151 et. seq.

(b) <u>Certificate of Operation</u>. The Owner and/or Operator shall obtain a Certificate of Operation for the reprocessing equipment pursuant to Sec. 30-183 et seq.

Sec. 30-392. Temporary Reprocessing Activities Permit.

A temporary reprocessing activities permit shall be required for the reprocessing, storage, transport and/or final usage of materials generated from construction and/or demolition.

- (a)An Owner and/or Operator who issued a temporary reprocessing activities permit shall comply with all conditions set forth therein.
- (b) The construction/demolition material may be reprocessed solely on the site at which the construction/demolition occurs in accordance with the permit.
- (c) The temporary permit shall be valid for three months, as measured from the date on which such authorization is issued.
 - (d)Temporary permit fees shall be set forth in Section 32-1.

Sec. 30-393. Height and Setback Requirements.

(a) <u>Setback requirements</u>. Temporary reprocessing activities or the stockpile of reprocessable construction/demolition material shall be setback from the following places:

- (1) No less than 200 feet of any school, childcare facility, hospital, residential building or mixed occupancy building with a residential use;
- (2) No less than 100 feet of any building other than a school, childcare facility, hospital, residential building or mixed occupancy building with a residential use; and
- (3) No less than 100 feet of any public way or park.
- (b)At no time shall the height of reprocessable or reprocessed material and other materials brought on the site exceed 30 feet.

Sec. 30-394. Performance standards.

The Owner and/or Operator shall comply with the following performance standards:

- (a)No reprocessable construction/demolition waste shall be hauled, transferred, sent to, received by, stored, dumped at, abandoned or reprocessed at any location except at a solid waste and/or recycling facility properly zoned, licensed, and for which a permit has been issued pursuant to this chapter and the Cook County Solid Waste and Recycling Ordinance at Sec. 30-776 946, including the requirements set forth at Solid Waste Facilities at Sec. 30-822 30-832, and/or the requirements set forth at Recycling Facilities at 30-857 30-877.
- (b)All temporary reprocessable activities shall employ measures and/or devices approved by the Department to prevent the emission of dust beyond the site perimeter as zoned.
- (c) The activities must be performed by reprocessing equipment with control measures that prevent the dispersion of construction/demolition material and debris beyond the site.
- (d) The activities must be performed by reprocessing equipment that keeps the streets, sidewalks and sewers adjacent to the site free and clear at all times of all material and debris transported to or from the site and maintained or stored within the site.
- (e)<u>Construction/demolition material shall remain adequately wet from the initial disruption of the material through final usage.</u> Adequately wet means sufficiently mixed or penetrated with liquate to prevent the release of construction/demolition material particulates.

Sec. 30-395. Reports and recordkeeping.

The Owner and/or Operator shall prepare, upon the request of the Department or on a schedule prescribed by the Department, reports related to the materials and operation at the site.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 32 Fees, Section 32.1. Fee Schedule of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as Follows:

ESTABLISHING A PROPERTY ASSESSED CLEAN ENERGY ("PACE") PROGRAM AND A PACE AREA TO FINANCE AND/OR REFINANCE THE ACQUISITION, CONSTRUCTION, INSTALLATION, OR MODIFICATION OF ENERGY PROJECTS; PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF NOT TO EXCEED \$500,000,000 TAXABLE PACE REVENUE NOTES OF THE COUNTY TO FINANCE PROJECTS PURSUANT TO THE COUNTY'S PACE PROGRAM, PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF SAID NOTES, AUTHORIZING THE SALE OF SAID NOTES TO THE PURCHASER THEREOF; AND OTHER MATTERS RELATED THERETO

WHEREAS, Cook County, a county duly organized and validly existing under the 1970 Constitution of the State of Illinois Constitution (the "Constitution") and the laws of the State of Illinois (the "County"), is a home rule unit of local government of the State of Illinois authorized pursuant to the Property Assessed Clean Energy Act, 50 ILCS 50/1 et seq., as amended (the "PACE Act") to establish a property assessed clean energy program (the "PACE Program"), create a PACE area (as defined in the PACE Act) and finance and/or refinance energy projects (as defined in the PACE Act), and may, under the power granted by said Section 6(a) of Article VII of the Constitution, as supplemented by the Local Government Debt Reform Act of the State of Illinois, as amended (the "Debt Reform Act"), and the other Omnibus Bond Acts, as amended, exercise any power and perform any function pertaining to its government and affairs, including, but not limited to, the power to tax and to incur debt; and

WHEREAS, the PACE Act states that a program such as the PACE Program may be administered by a program administrator (as defined in the PACE Act);

WHEREAS, the County solicited a request for proposal in accordance with its Procurement Ordinance for qualified parties to be the program administrator for the PACE Program;

WHEREAS, the County desires to designate The Illinois Energy Conservation Authority NFP ("IECA") as program administrator (the "Program Administrator") for the PACE Program; and

WHEREAS, the Program Administrator has prepared the report attached hereto as <u>Exhibit A</u> (the "Program Report") setting forth certain terms of the proposed PACE Program in conformity with the PACE Act; and

WHEREAS, the County now desires to establish the PACE area as the entire corporate limits of the County described in Exhibit B and to establish the PACE Program as further described herein and in the Program Report and to finance or refinance energy projects; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the County (the "Board") has not adopted any ordinance, resolution, order or motion or provided any County Code provisions which restrict or limit the exercise of the home rule powers of the County in the issuance of limited recourse bonds or notes without referendum in furtherance of essential public and governmental purposes or which provides any special rules or procedures for the exercise of such power; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the PACE Act, in order to provide capital in furtherance of the PACE Program the County may issue bonds or notes pursuant to and in accordance with Section 35 of the PACE Act, secured by payments under one or more Assessment Contracts, or if applicable, municipal bond insurance, letters of credit, or public or private guarantees of sureties or, if applicable, other lawfully available funds of the County including revenues sources or reserves from bond or note proceeds; and

WHEREAS, the Illinois Finance Authority, a body politic and corporate duly organized and validly existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Illinois (the "Authority"), is authorized to issue PACE bonds (as defined in the PACE Act) to finance or refinance energy projects in accordance with the PACE Act and pursuant to subsection (d) of Section 825-65 of the Illinois Finance Authority Act, 20 ILCS 3501/801-1 et seq. (the "Authority Act"); and

WHEREAS, the Board does hereby determine that it is advisable and in the best interests of the County to establish the Program in and for the County, designate a PACE Area, designate a program administrator, provide for property assessments, authorize the issuance of not to exceed \$500,000,000 Taxable PACE Revenue Notes or Bonds ("Bond" or "Bonds" are referred to throughout this Ordinance interchangeably as, the "Note" or the "Notes") secured by payments under one or more Assessment Contracts, within certain expressed and delegated limitations as hereinafter set forth, and approve certain related matters:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE COUNTY OF COOK, ILLINOIS, AS FOLLOWS:

Incorporation of the Recitals. The Board hereby finds that all of the recitals contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are true, correct and complete and are hereby incorporated by reference thereto and are made a part hereof.

Public Purpose. The Board hereby finds that the imposition of assessments against qualifying properties on the records of the County to secure the repayment by property owners of Assessment Contracts entered into for the purpose of providing owners of qualifying properties (each an "Owner") with affordable financing or refinancing for Energy Projects (as defined in the PACE Act) pursuant to the PACE Program further essential public and governmental purposes of the County. The Board further finds it is necessary and in the best interests of the County to provide capital in furtherance of the PACE Program and issue the Notes for such purpose upon the terms provided herein. It is hereby found and determined that such borrowing of money is advisable for the public health, safety, welfare and convenience, is for a proper public purpose or purposes, is in the public interest, and is authorized pursuant to the PACE Act, the

Counties Code of the State of Illinois, and the Local Government Debt Reform Act; and as further supplemented and, where necessary, superseded by the County's home rule powers under Section 6 of Article VII of the 1970 Constitution of the State of Illinois, and these findings and determinations shall be deemed conclusive.

Designation of the Program Administrator. The Board hereby designates the Program Administrator as program administrator for the PACE Program on the terms and pursuant to the conditions set forth in an agreement for services between the County and the Program Administrator. In order to facilitate and finance the PACE Program, the Board hereby approves the execution and delivery of a Program Development and Administrative Services Agreement, in substantially the form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit B.</u> The Program Administrator shall also assist the County in determining the terms of sale of any Notes, which may be sold to one or more capital providers (each a "Purchaser").

Report of the Program Administrator; Creation of PACE Area.

The Board hereby finds as follows:

The financing and/or refinancing of energy projects is a valid public purpose and serves an essential governmental function;

The County intends to facilitate access to capital from the Program Administrator approved by the County or as otherwise permitted by the PACE Act, to provide funds for energy projects which will be repaid by assessments on the property (as defined in the PACE Act) benefitted with the agreement of the record owners (as defined in the PACE Act) of such property;

A description of the territory within the PACE area, the types of energy projects that may be financed and/or refinanced, and the description of the proposed arrangements for financing the PACE Program through the issuance of PACE bonds under or in accordance with Section 35 of the PACE Act, which PACE bonds may be purchased by one or more capital providers (as defined in the PACE Act); are all set forth in the Program Report which is attached hereto as Exhibit A. The Program Report is hereby incorporated by reference thereto and made a part hereof. The County hereby approves the Program Report and hereby establishes the PACE area as the corporate limits of the County, all as further described in the Program Report. The Program Report shall be made available for public inspection in the office of the County Clerk of the The County of Cook (the "County Clerk").

Note Details and Security. The Board hereby authorizes that there be borrowed for and on behalf of the County the Notes if issued, in one or more series in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$500,000,000 for the purposes aforesaid; and that the Notes shall be designated "Taxable PACE Revenue Note, ([Street Address] Project)" with such series or other designation as set forth in the Note Notification (as hereinafter defined). The Notes, if issued, shall be dated the date of issuance as set forth in the Note Notification and shall also bear the date of authentication, shall be in fully registered form, shall be in denominations as described in the Note Notification (but no single Note of a series shall represent installments of principal maturing on more than one date), and shall bear such further identifying information set forth in the Note. The Notes shall be in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit C, with such changes therein as such officials executing thereof shall approve, their execution to constitute conclusive evidence of their approval of any and all changes or revisions therein from the form before the Board, and such form and the terms contained therein are hereby approved by the Board.

Each Note, if issued, shall be secured solely by payments received by the County under and pursuant to the terms of a related Assessment Contract. The County shall make principal payments on the Note, together with applicable interest, fees, penalties, indemnities and other amounts payable to the Registered Owner under the pledged Assessment Contract, in the amounts and on the dates set forth in the Note Notification. Such County payments shall be made solely from the revenues received by the County under the related Assessment Contract, excluding (i) amounts collected from direct or indirect indemnification rights for the benefit of the County or other persons under the pledged Assessment Contract or any related document, (ii) any administrative fees and expenses to the extent payable to or on behalf of the County or its agent and (iii) [80]% of the sums received by the County from the collection of penalties and statutory interest on delinquent payments under such Assessment Contract, which shall be retained by the County as collections fees (the "Pledged Revenues").

Payments due on each Note shall be paid by or at the direction of the note registrar and paying agent (which shall be the Treasurer of the County (the "Treasurer"), the Registered Owner, the Program Administrator or a bank or trust company authorized to do business in the State of Illinois) as set forth in the Note Notification (the "Note Registrar"), to the person in whose name such Note is registered (the "Registered Owner") at the close of business on the 15th day preceding any regular or other payment date on the Notes (the "Record Date"), in the manner provided in writing by the Registered Owner to the Note Registrar.

Execution; Authentication. The Notes shall be executed on behalf of the County by the manual or duly authorized facsimile signature of the President of the Board and attested by the manual or duly authorized facsimile signature of the County Clerk. In case any such officer whose signature shall appear on any Note shall cease to be such officer before the delivery of such Note, such signature shall nevertheless be valid and sufficient for all purposes, the same as if such officer had remained in office until delivery. All Notes shall have thereon a certificate of authentication, substantially in the form hereinafter set forth, duly executed by the Note Registrar as authenticating agent of the County and showing the date of authentication. No Note shall be valid or obligatory for any purpose or be entitled to any security or benefit under this Ordinance unless and until such certificate of authentication shall have been duly executed by the Note Registrar by manual signature, and such certificate of authentication upon any such Note shall be conclusive evidence that such Note has been authenticated and delivered under this Ordinance. The certificate of authentication on any Note shall be deemed to have been executed by it if signed by an authorized officer of the Note Registrar, but it shall not be necessary that the same officer sign the certificate of authentication on all of the Notes issued hereunder.

Registration of Notes; Persons Treated as Registered Owners. The County shall cause books (the "Note Register") for the registration and for the transfer of the Notes as provided in this Ordinance to be kept at the principal office of the Program Administrator or the Note Registrar (the "Principal Office"), as set forth in the Note Notification. The County is authorized to prepare, and the Note Registrar shall keep custody of, multiple Note blanks executed by the County for use in the transfer and exchange of Notes.

Any Note may be transferred or exchanged, but only in the manner, subject to the limitations, and upon payment of the charges as set forth in the Note and accompanying Form of Assignment. The Note Registrar shall not be required to transfer or exchange any Note during the period beginning at the close of business on the 15th day of the month next preceding any payment date on such Note and ending at the opening of business on such payment date, nor to transfer or exchange any Note after notice of prepayment has been received by the Program Administrator.

The execution by the County of any fully registered Note shall constitute full and due authorization of such Note, and the Note Registrar shall thereby be authorized to authenticate, date and deliver such Note; provided, however, that the principal amount of outstanding Notes of each series and maturity authenticated by the Note Registrar shall not exceed the authorized principal amount of Notes for such series and maturity less previous retirements.

The Registered Owner shall be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes, and payments due on any Note shall be made only to or upon the order of the Registered Owner thereof or its legal representative. All such payments shall be valid and effectual to satisfy and discharge the liability upon such Note to the extent of the sum or sums so paid.

Prepayment. The Notes shall be subject to prepayment pursuant to the terms and conditions of the related Assessment Contract. Other than in accordance with the terms and conditions in the Assessment Contract and to the fullest extent permitted by applicable law, the County shall not permit any reduction or deferral in the amount of Pledged Revenues without the written consent of the Registered Owner. The County shall, or shall cause the Program Administrator to, provide a reasonable period of time for the Registered Owner to review and approve any calculations necessary to effect prepayments in accordance with the Assessment Contract. The Program Administrator shall promptly notify the County in writing of the Notes or portions of Notes selected for prepayment and, in the case of any Note selected for partial prepayment, the principal amount thereof to be prepaid.

Sale of Notes. Any one of the Authorized Officers is hereby authorized to proceed without any further authorization or direction from the Board, to sell the Notes upon the terms as prescribed in this Ordinance; *however*, in any individual transaction where the principal amount of a series of the Notes shall exceed \$5,000,000, additional authorization or direction from the Board is required.

The Notes hereby authorized shall be executed as in this Ordinance provided as soon after the delivery of the Note Notification as may be, and, after authentication thereof by the Note Registrar, be delivered to the Purchaser upon receipt of the purchase price therefor.

Upon the sale of a series of the Notes, the Authorized Officers shall prepare a Notification of Sale, which shall include the pertinent details of sale of such series of Notes as provided herein (the "Note Notification"). In the Note Notification, the Authorized Officers shall find and determine that such series of Notes have been sold at such price and bear interest at such rates that either the true interest cost (yield) or the net interest rate received upon the sale of such Notes does not exceed the maximum rate otherwise authorized by applicable law. Each Note Notification shall be entered into the records of the County and made available to the Board upon request; but such action shall be for information purposes only, and the Board shall have no right or authority at such time to approve or reject such sale as evidenced in a Note Notification.

Upon the sale of a series of Notes, the Authorized Officers and any other officers of the County, as shall be appropriate, shall be and are hereby authorized and directed to approve or execute, or both, such financing documents related to the sale of the Notes as may be necessary, including, without limitation, any contract for the sale of the Notes between the County and the Purchaser. Prior to the execution and delivery of a Note, the Authorized Officers shall find and determine that, to the best of their knowledge, no person holding any office of the County either by election or appointment, is in any manner financially interested, either directly, in his or her own name, or indirectly, in the name of any other person,

association, trust or corporation, in the transactions contemplated herein.

The use by the Purchaser or the County of a term sheet relating to the notes (the "Term Sheet") is hereby ratified, approved and authorized; the execution and delivery of the Term Sheet is hereby authorized; and the Authorized Officers are hereby authorized to take any action as may be required on the part of the County to consummate the transactions contemplated by this Ordinance, the Term Sheet and the Notes.

Funds and Accounts.

- A. There is hereby created the "PACE Note and Interest Fund" of the County (the "Note Fund"), which shall be a separate fund for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Notes. The County shall create a subaccount of the Note Fund for each series of the Notes issued (each a "Note Fund Subaccount"). The Pledged Revenues and any other funds lawfully available for the purpose shall be timely deposited upon receipt by the County into a Note Fund Subaccount and used solely and only for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the related Notes. Accrued interest, if any, received upon delivery of the Notes, together with the amount of proceeds of the Notes as set forth in a Note Notification, shall be deposited as set forth in a Note Notification and be applied to pay the first interest coming due on such Notes. The County hereby assigns to the Registered Owner of a Note all of its right, title and interest in and to all Pledged Revenues maintained in the related Note Fund Subaccount and agrees to hold such amounts in trust for the benefit of the Registered Owner.
- B. The remaining proceeds of the Notes and any premium received on the delivery of the Notes are hereby appropriated to pay the costs of issuance of the Notes, and that portion thereof not needed to pay such costs is hereby ordered to be deposited and held in a separate project fund (each a "Project Fund") specific to and as referenced in the related Assessment Contract to pay costs of the project being financed thereby. It is not currently anticipated that the County will hold any Project Fund. Proceeds of any Note issued to refund or refinance existing Notes, Assessment Contracts or other obligations shall be deposited as set forth in the related Note Notification.
- C. At the time of the issuance of the Notes, the costs of issuance of the Notes may be paid by the Purchaser, the Owner, the Program Administrator or the Note Registrar on behalf of the County.

Property Assessments. For the purpose of providing funds required to pay annual amounts due from Owners under the Assessment Contracts, and which amounts may be assigned by the County in furtherance of the PACE Program, there is hereby assessed upon property within the County and subject to an Assessment Contract, in the years for which amounts due under such Assessment Contract are outstanding, a direct annual assessment for that purpose; such assessment shall be in addition to all other assessments and taxes of the County.

Any such assessments are to be collected at the same time and in the same manner as taxes collected under the Illinois Property Tax Code. Alternatively, upon the approval of an Authorized Officer, assessments may be billed and collected by the Program Administrator or by another third party assessment servicer.

The County expressly intends to assign and/or pledge payments to be received from each such Assessment Contract in furtherance of the PACE Program. The County covenants and agrees with the beneficial holders of assessments, including Registered Owners, that so long as such assessments remain outstanding,

the County will take no action or fail to take any action which in any way would adversely affect the ability of the County to assess and collect the assessments provided for in this Ordinance. The County and its officers will comply with all present and future applicable laws in order to assure that the assessments may be permitted to be assessed, extended, and collected pursuant to applicable law.

Limited Obligation of the County. Any obligation of the County, including the Notes, to provide funds pursuant to an assignment of amounts to be received under an Assessment Contract shall be a special, limited obligation of the County, payable solely from the funds provided in such Assessment Contract and is not a general obligation of the County, and the full faith and credit of the County is not pledged to the payment of any obligation secured by such assigned amounts, including the Notes. The Assessment Contracts and any obligations secured thereby, including the Notes, shall be payable solely and only from payments of assessments on benefitted property within the PACE Area, and if applicable from revenue sources or reserves established in support of such obligations.

Covenants of the County. The County shall not amend an Assessment Contract or any related Notes in any manner that is materially adverse to the Registered Owner of a Note without such Registered Owner's prior written consent. The County covenants and agrees with each Registered Owner that so long as any Note remains outstanding, the County will take no action or fail to take any action which in any way would adversely affect the ability of the County to assess and collect the Pledged Revenues. The County and its officers will comply with all present and future applicable laws in order to assure that the Pledged Revenues may be permitted to be assessed, extended, and collected pursuant to applicable law.

No Conflicts; Further Acts of the County. It is hereby found that no person holding any office of the County either by election or appointment, is in any manner financially interested, either directly, in his or her own name, or indirectly, in the name of any other person, association, trust or corporation, in the transactions contemplated hereby.

When financing documents are executed and delivered by or on behalf of the County in support of the PACE Program, such financing documents will be binding on the County; from and after the execution and delivery of such financing documents, the officers, employees, and agents of the County are hereby authorized, empowered, and directed to do all such acts and things and to execute all such documents as may be necessary to carry out and comply with the provisions of such financing documents as executed.

Additional Ordinances. The Board may adopt additional ordinances or proceedings supplementing or amending this Ordinance. Such additional ordinances or proceedings shall in all instances become effective immediately without publication or posting or any further act or requirement. This Ordinance, together with such additional ordinances or proceedings, shall constitute complete authority for the County to implement the PACE Program, make the property assessments described herein and issue the Notes, all in accordance with applicable law.

No Public Hearing; Program Established. The Board hereby finds that no public hearing shall be required in connection with the adoption or amendment of the PACE Program and hereby establishes the PACE Program in accordance with the Program Report.

Assessment Contract. The form of "assessment contract" (as defined in the PACE Act) attached as Appendix A to the Program Report is hereby approved by the County. Chief of the Bureau of Economic Development (an "Authorized Officer"), under the recommendation of a committee comprised of the Director of Department of Planning and Development, Director of Department of Environment and

Sustainability, Chief of the Bureau of Asset Management, or their designee(s), is hereby authorized to negotiate, execute, and deliver one or more assessment contracts with record owners meeting the requirements set forth in the Program Report (each, an "Assessment Contract") in substantially the form of Appendix A to the Program Report, with such changes, deletions, and insertions as shall be approved by the Authorized Officer and such other supporting documents as may be necessary or appropriate to carry out and comply with the provisions of such Assessment Contract, and upon execution to record such Assessment Contract with the Recorder of Deeds of Cook County. The execution of such agreements and instruments shall be conclusive evidence of such approval. Prior to execution of any Assessment Contract, the Authorized Officer shall make the determination set forth in clause (i) below and shall have received evidence of items (ii) through (xi) below, to be documented in a written notification, certified by the property owner, to be filed with the office of the County Clerk:

that the property to be assessed is entirely within the PACE area of the County;

that there are no delinquent taxes, special assessments or water or sewer charges on the property to be assessed;

that there are no delinquent assessments on the property under a property assessed clean energy program;

whether there are any involuntary liens on the property, including, but not limited to, construction or mechanics liens, lis pendens or judgments against the record owner, environmental proceedings, or eminent domain proceedings;

that no notices of default or other evidence of property-based debt delinquency have been recorded and not cured:

that the record owner is current on all mortgage debt on the property, the record owner has not filed for bankruptcy in the last 2 years, and the property is not an asset in a current bankruptcy proceeding;

that all work requiring a license under any applicable law to acquire, construct, install, or modify an energy project shall be performed by a licensed contractor that has agreed to adhere to a set of terms and conditions through a process established by the County or the Program Administrator and described in the Program Report;

the contractor or contractors to be used have signed a written acknowledgement that the County will not authorize final payment to the contractor or contractors until the County has received written confirmation from the record owner that the energy project was properly acquired, constructed, installed or modified and is operating as intended; provided, however, that the contractor or contractors retain all legal rights and remedies in the event there is a disagreement with the record owner;

that the aggregate amount financed or refinanced under one or more assessment contracts does not exceed 25% in relation to the greater of any of the following:

the value of the property as determined by the office of the county assessor; or

the value of the property as determined by an appraisal conducted by a licensed appraiser;

that an evaluation of the existing water or energy use and a modeling of expected monetary savings have been conducted for any proposed energy efficiency improvement (as defined in the PACE Act), renewable energy improvement (as defined in the PACE Act), or water use improvement (as defined in the PACE Act), unless the water use improvement is undertaken to improve water quality in accordance with the procedures set forth in the Program Report; and

before entering into the Assessment Contract with the County, the record owner shall have provided to the mortgage holders of any existing mortgages encumbering or otherwise securing the property a notice of the record owner's intent to enter into the Assessment Contract with the County, together with the maximum principal amount to be financed or refinanced and the maximum assessment necessary to repay that amount, along with an additional request that the mortgage holders of any existing mortgages consent to the record owner subjecting the property to the PACE Program. Prior to the execution of any Assessment Contract, the County shall have been provided with a copy or other proof of those notices and the written consent of the mortgage holder for the record owner to enter into the Assessment Contract which acknowledges that (a) the existing mortgage or mortgages for which consent was received will be subordinate to the Assessment Contract and the lien created thereby and that the County or, if applicable, its permitted assignee (as defined in the PACE Act) can foreclose the property if the assessments are not paid.

Additional Actions. The Authorized Officer is hereby authorized:

to approve the form of Program Handbook of the Program Administrator (as defined in the Program Report) setting forth certain additional requirements, procedures, and descriptions relating to the PACE Program and to negotiate, execute, and deliver such other supporting documents as may be necessary or appropriate to implement the PACE Program;

in connection with the issuance of PACE bonds by the Authority to finance and/or refinance energy projects in accordance with the PACE Act and pursuant to subsection (d) of Section 825-65 of the Authority Act, to negotiate, execute, and deliver one or more agreements assigning to the Authority an Assessment Contract securing such PACE bonds; and

to approve changes, updates, amendments, modifications or supplements to the Program Report to the extent such changes, updates, amendments, modifications or supplements comply with the parameters and requirements set forth in the PACE Act.

Enactment. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be separable and if any section, phrase or provision shall for any reason be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, such declaration shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remainder of the sections, phrases and provisions hereof. All ordinances, orders and resolutions and parts thereof in conflict herewith are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed, and this Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force immediately upon its adoption. No provision of the County Code or violation of any provision of the County Code shall be deemed to impair the validity of this Ordinance or the instruments authorized by this Ordinance; provided further, however, that the foregoing shall not be deemed to affect the availability of any other remedy or penalty for any violation of any provision of the County Code.

Severability. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the other provisions of

this Ordinance.

Repealer and Effective Date. All ordinances, resolutions or orders, or parts thereof, in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed and this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect forthwith upon its adoption.

A copy of this Ordinance shall be published in pamphlet form, filed in the office of the County Clerk and made available for public inspection.

This Ordinance shall become effective upon its passage and approval.

COOK COUNTY COMMUNITY RECOVERY LOAN PROGRAM FORGIVENESS

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the President of the United States issued a Proclamation, declaring a National Public Health Emergency as a result of the COVID-19 outbreak; and

WHEREAS, on March 27, 2020, the President of the United States signed into law the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (the "CARES Act"); and

WHEREAS, the CARES Act established the Coronavirus Relief Fund ("CRF"), which provides aid to eligible local governments to address necessary expenditures due to the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency; and

WHEREAS, on April 7, 2020, President Preckwinkle issued Executive Order 2020-9 which authorized the Cook County Bureau of Economic Development (BED) to develop, establish and administer a loan and technical assistance program for independent contractors and small businesses located in suburban Cook County in the amount of \$10 Million; and

October 22, 2020

WHEREAS, Cook County qualified as an eligible local government and received \$429 Million in CRF funding from the U.S Department of Treasury; and

Board of Commissioners

WHEREAS, as a result of COVID-19, Cook County businesses and residents have been severely impacted and recovery initiatives are needed to assist Cook County businesses and residents as result of losses suffered and unforeseen expenses incurred; and

WHEREAS, on July 30, 2020, the Cook County Board of Commissioners approved the allocation of nearly \$82 Million in CRF funds to support the implementation of BED programs and initiatives to address the needs of residents, community development and small businesses in suburban Cook County, namely the Cook County Recovery Loan Program, Cook County COVID-19 Small Business Recovery Grant and Technical Assistance Program, Cook County Rental Assistance Program, Cook County Mortgage Assistance Program, and the Cook County Critical Social Service Programs; and

WHEREAS, the US Department of Treasury limits the use of CRF for eligible expenses by December 30, 2020; and

WHEREAS, Cook County determines that forgiveness of the loans extended through the Cook County Community Recovery Loan Program is necessary in response to adequately support such loan recipients through the ongoing public health emergency in Cook County; and

WHEREAS, in order to support Cook County Community Recovery Loan Program recipients in the ongoing public health emergency and prior to the December 30, 2020 deadline, the BED proposes to forgive such loans extended through such program up to \$10 Million, and to reimburse the County with up to \$10 Million in CRF funding for such loan forgiveness. Such forgiven loans shall thereby be considered grants in accordance with the U.S. Treasury guidelines for CRF funding issued pursuant to Section 601(d) of the Social Security Act, as added by section 5001 of the CARES Act and subsequent guidance.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners hereby determines that forgiveness of loans up to \$10 Million made under the Cook County Community Recovery program is necessary in response to the public health emergency in Cook County, and approves the use of up to \$10 Million in CRF funding allocated to the BED to forgive such loans made to independent contractors and small businesses to further assist them in the community recovery efforts as a result of COVID-19 pandemic; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that as the US Department of Treasury limits the use of CRF for eligible expenses by December 30, 2020, the Cook County Board of Commissioners recognizes that time is of the essence and, authorizes BED to forgive the loans issued under the Cook County Community Recovery Loan Fund that was implemented pursuant to Executive Order 2020-9 in the amount of up to \$10 Million and to use CRF to reimburse the County for such loans in the amount of up to \$10 Million. The Cook County Board of Commissioners further authorizes the Chief of the BED to modify and enter into any agreements as necessary to forgive the loans made to independent contractors and small businesses under the Cook Community Recovery Loan Fund and to provide grants to such independent contractors and small businesses in lieu thereof.

PROPOSED RESOLUTIONS

A RESOLUTION TO FULLY FUND OUR COMMUNITIES BY CANCELING WALL STREET PAYMENTS

WHEREAS, the COVID-19 pandemic has created a crisis more sudden and far more dramatic than any previously in history; and

WHEREAS, to date the COVID-19 virus has no known cure or vaccine, and will continue to spread with no certain end in sight, requiring continued public health measures; and

WHEREAS, in a period of just six months, the COVID-19 pandemic has infected more than 6.8 million people and caused the death of more than 200,000 people in the United States; and

WHEREAS, the COVID-19 pandemic has forced state and local governments to shut down businesses for weeks even months to protect everyone's health, with tens of millions of people losing their jobs within a period of weeks and millions more underemployed; and

WHEREAS, the COVID-19 pandemic continues to constitute an emergency that places essential workers at high risk for contracting the virus: Public sector employees, such as first responders, public health staff, sanitation workers, and safety net enrollment staff are among the many public employees saving lives, keeping communities safe, and ensuring that families have access to healthcare, food and roofs over their heads; and

WHEREAS, state and local governments are facing staggering budget shortfalls as economic contraction has reduced nearly all forms of government revenues, with the prospect of severe cuts to public services, painful layoffs and austerity measures on the horizon that will disproportionately impact Black, Brown and Indigenous workers and communities; and

WHEREAS, state and local governments are unable to predict the true scale of declining revenues, as costs rise sharply from business closings and rampant unemployment; and

WHEREAS, the public health and economic crises caused by the pandemic demand a robust safety net and the expansion of public services; and

WHEREAS, the imposition of austerity measures and service cuts will not only greatly increase the suffering of communities and families, it will prolong our recovery and roll back advances we have made in creating more equitable communities for Cook County residents; and

WHEREAS, the recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic will be uneven and disastrous without reprioritization of our local budget; and

WHEREAS, state and local governments across the country pay an estimated \$160 billion annually in interest payments on public debt, hindering governments' ability to provide critical services and meet community needs; and

WHEREAS, these high-interest payments that are intended to compensate creditors for the risk that borrowers will default on their debts become a major drain on public budgets; and

WHEREAS, the risk of state and local governments and government agencies defaulting on their debts is virtually nonexistent because debt payments take priority over almost all other government expenses and history shows that municipal borrower default rates are less than 0.2 percent; and

WHEREAS, despite these extremely rare defaults, credit rating agencies give municipal borrowers lower credit ratings than corporations with riskier credit profiles, thereby forcing them to pay unreasonably high interest rates; and

WHEREAS, the Wall Street banks that underwrite the municipal bonds have rigged the rules to maximize profits; and

WHEREAS, Wall Street banks have a long history of targeting municipal borrowers with fraudulent practices and predatory forms of debt, of repeatedly breaking federal and state antitrust and securities laws, and of defrauding municipal borrowers with misleading information to pad their own bottom line; and

WHEREAS, many of the bondholders profiting off of the interest from municipal bonds are the same wealthy investors who don't pay their fair share in taxes; and

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners that the Office of the Chief Financial Officer enter into conversations with the financial institutions that serve as bond underwriters for Cook County and demand that they offer Cook County long-term loans with terms of up to 30 years to meet all of its borrowing needs without charging any interest or fees; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners calls on the Federal Reserve Bank of the United States to offer long-term loans with terms of up to thirty years to meet all of the borrowing needs of all state and local governments and government units in the United States without charging them any interest or fees.
