AUDITOR ORDINANCE AMENDMENTS

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 2 Administration, Article IV Officers and Employees, Division 6 Auditor, Sections 2-311.2, 2-311.6 and 2-311.9 of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as Follows:

Sec. 2-311.2. - Qualifications.

The County Auditor must be hold at least be one (1) of the following credentials and be ingood standing in the profession

(a) Certified Public Accountant certified public accountant, licensed by the State of Illinois; and be in good standing in the profession.

(b) Certified Internal Auditor;

(c) Certified Information System Audit Professional; or

(d) Certified Government Finance Manager.

Sec. 2-311.6. - Professional development

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Sufficient resources shall be made available to the Auditor and staff to ensure appropriate professional development, continuing professional education and compliance with applicable certification <u>and professional</u> requirements.

Sec. 2-311.9. - Audit schedule.

At the beginning of each fiscal year least 45 days prior to the start of the fiscal year, the Auditor shall submit an audit schedule to the County Board for referral to the audit committee for review and comment. The schedule shall include the proposed plan, and the rationale for the selections, for auditing departments, offices, boards, activities, subcontractors and agencies for the <u>audit</u> period. This schedule may be amended after review with the audit committee, but the Auditor shall have final authority to select the audits planned and executed as well as adjust the plan, as deemed necessary by the Auditor.

Effective date: This Ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.

Summary: The JAC respectfully requests authority to enter into this contract to be made pursuant to RFQ 1753-17842 on August 2019 for services to persons returning from prisons and jails. Safer Foundation has successfully delivered such services for the County. Upon the emergence of the COVID-19 pandemic, a set of individuals in our community has been identified with significantly higher rates of justice system involvement, many of whom have unmet behavioral health and additional support needs.

The needs of these individuals are more critical during the current COVID-19 emergency, where high repeat system-use exacerbates public health concerns both inside and outside custodial facilities. To address this urgent concern, Safer Foundation would provide an effective mechanism to engage these individuals in appropriate services that will meet their needs and decrease justice system involvement. These services would be delivered to approximately forty (40) individuals between 8/1/2020 and 7/31/2021.

These services would be funded by an existing grant from the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation.

This agreement will build upon previous efforts by public agencies, faith-based leaders, community organizations, private foundations, and law enforcement partners to implement rapid-reduction strategies involving acutely high-risk individuals and communities.

Services will be delivered by trained partners and will focus on known hot spot areas in the County, empowering individuals to maintain peace on hot spots. This project will be subject to regular reporting (programmatic and fiscal) and will focus on, and measure, reduction in the incidence of group-on-group violence and active engagement of rival group members.

A RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF THE ILLINOIS NAACP STATE CONFERENCE AND THE ILLINOIS ASSOCIATION OF CHIEFS OF POLICE TEN SHARED PRINCIPLES

WHEREAS, Cook County has seen numerous peaceful protests against police brutality in response to the deaths of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Rayshard Brooks, and too many others to name locally and across the country; and

WHEREAS, a 2018 investigation by WBEZ and the Better Government Association found that of 113 shootings involving suburban police departments since 2005, no offers were charged criminally or faced disciplinary action: and

WHEREAS, according to the Chicago Tribune, from 2010 to 2015, Chicago Police Officers shot 262 people, killing 92, and with about four out of every five being African American males: and

WHEREAS, further police reform and training is needed to address the disparities of police conduct in communities of color; and

WHEREAS, in response to historical and consistent incidents of police misuse of force, the Illinois NAACP State Conference and the Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police affirmed the following Ten Shared Principles to guide reforms that eliminate the disproportionate negative impacts of policing on people of color:

- 1. We value the life of every person and consider life to be the highest value.
- 2. All persons should be treated with dignity and respect. This is another foundational value.
- 3. We reject discrimination toward any person that is based on race, ethnicity, religion, color, nationality, immigrant status, sexual orientation, gender, disability, or familial status.
- 4. We endorse the six pillars in the report of the President's Task Force on 21st Century Policing. The first pillar is to build and rebuild trust through procedural justice, transparency, accountability, and honest recognition of past and present obstacles.
- 5. We endorse the four pillars of procedural justice, which are fairness, voice (i.e., an opportunity for citizens and police to believe they are heard), transparency, and impartiality.
- 6. We endorse the values inherent in community policing, which includes community partnerships involving law enforcement, engagement of police officers with residents outside of interaction specific to enforcement of laws, and problem-solving that is collaborative, not one-sided.
- 7. We believe that developing strong ongoing relationships between law enforcement and communities of color at the leadership level and street level will be the keys to diminishing and eliminating racial tension.
- 8. We believe that law enforcement and community leaders have a mutual responsibility to encourage all citizens to gain a better understanding and knowledge of the law to assist them in their interactions with law enforcement officers.
- 9. We support diversity in police departments and in the law enforcement profession. Law enforcement and communities have a mutual responsibility and should work together to make a concerted effort to recruit diverse police departments.

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10. We believe de-escalation training should be required to ensure the safety of community members and officers. We endorse using de-escalation tactics to reduce the potential for confrontations that endanger law enforcement officers and community members; and the principle that human life should be taken only as a last resort; and

WHEREAS, the Ten Shared Principles asserts the importance of treating all persons with dignity and respect, and rejects discrimination toward any person on the basis of race, ethnicity, religion, color, nationality, immigrant status, sexual orientation, gender, disability, or familial status: and

WHEREAS, the Ten Shared Principles emphasizes building strong relationships between law enforcement and communities of color through transparency, accountability, and honest recognition of past and present obstacles: and

WHEREAS, the Ten Shared Principles mandates de-escalation training to ensure the safety of both community members and officers, and supports the principle that human life should be taken only as a last resort: and

WHEREAS, the Ten Shared Principles resolves to replace mistrust with mutual trust wherever, whenever, and however possible: and

WHEREAS, this document is meant to work in tandem with existing local and statewide efforts; and

WHEREAS, the Ten Shared Principles is a starting point for improving relationships between police officers and the residents they serve, and creating a space for open dialogue and collaborative problemsolving: and

WHEREAS, nearly 200 police departments and law organization have adopted the Ten Shared Principles since its inception in 2018: and

WHEREAS, the Forest Preserves supports and endorses the ideologies outlined in the Ten Shared Principles for the Forest Preserves of Cook County Police.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Cook County Board of Commissioners supports and endorses the ideologies outlined in the Ten Shared Principles and will work to implement them throughout the County, including lobbying as necessary to the state legislature: and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Cook County Sheriff's Office does hereby support and endorse the ideologies outlined in the Ten Shared Principles: and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Cook County Board of Commissioner encourages all police departments to adopt these principles and pledges to support police departments in pursuit of these principles.

AMENDMENT TO BUILDINGS AND BUILDING REGULATIONS

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners that Chapter 102 Building and Building Regulations, Article III Building Code, Section 102-105 is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 102-105. - Administration and enforcement.

(4)Enforcement.

3. Methods of Enforcement.

- a. *Registration for Building Work.*
 - (1) Contractors Registration Record. The Building Commissioner shall have the authority to create a secure, physical document or electronic database as may be necessary or prudent to record name address and other contact information for every person, firm, or corporation engaged in constructing, altering, repairing, relocating, or demolishing the whole or any part of buildings or structures, or related appurtenances, within the unincorporated area of Cook County. This record shall be entitled the "Contractors Registration Record," and shall transfer as necessary all information from the current registration book or records. Any such document or database shall record the name and address of each person, firm or corporation, and the name of any individual comprising any such firm or corporation. The Building Commissioner shall ensure that all data provided for the Contractors Registration Record is securely and accurately recorded and maintained.
 - (2)(1) Registration of persons, firms, or corporations. Every person, firm, or corporation must register its name and address in the Contractors Registration Record, in the method prescribed by the Building Commissioner, before undertaking the erection, enlargement, alteration, repair, relocation, or demolition of any building or structure for which permits are required by this Ordinance. In the case of a firm or corporation, the names of each individual comprising the firm and the names of each officer or a corporation shall be so registered. No permit shall be granted for the erection, enlargement, alteration, repair, relocation, or demolition of any building or structure unless the name and address of the person that is about to undertake such work is contained in the Contractors Registration Record. Registration may be done in person or electronically as provided by the Code, the Building Commissioner, or pursuant to the policy of the Cook County Department of Building and Zoning.

Every person, firm, or corporation engaged in the business of constructing, altering, repairing, relocating, or demolishing the whole or any part of buildings or structures, or appurtenances thereto, within the unincorporated area of Cook County, shall, before undertaking the erection, enlargement, alteration, repair, relocation, or demolition of any building or structure for which permits are required by this Ordinance, register in person with the Building Commissioner at the offices of the Cook County Department of Building and Zoning, the name and address of such person, firm or corporation in a book kept by the Building Commissioner and used for this purpose. In the case of a firm or corporation, the names of each individual comprising the firm and the names of each officer or a corporation shall be so registered. No permit shall be granted for the erection, enlargement, alteration, repair, relocation, or

demolition of any building or structure unless the name and address of the person that is about to undertake such work is contained in the registration book kept for that purpose.

The registration requirement for "in person" registration of persons, firms, and corporations engaged in the business of constructing, altering, repairing, relocating, or demolishing buildings or structures set forth herein, shall be for the original or initial registration of such person, firm, or corporation. Any subsequent registration or re-registration of a person, firm, or corporation, whose name is contained in the registration book, may be done in person or electronically by signature affidavit as provided by the Code, the Building Commissioner, or the policy of the Cook County Department of Building and Zoning.

- <u>(3)</u>(2) [...]
- (4)(3) Prior to the commencement of actual construction for which a permit has been issued, the permit shall file with the Building Commissioner, on a form provided by the Building Commissioner, the name of the person(s), firm(s), or corporation(s), engaged to perform the work. When the work is to be subcontracted, the party engaged for each subcontract shall also be listed. The Building Commissioner shall then determine that the name and address of this person(s), firm(s), or corporation(s) is (are) contained in the registration book Contractors Registration Record. No construction work shall commence until the Building Commissioner certifies that the contractor(s) is (are) duly registered.
- <u>(5)</u>(4) [...]
- (6)(5) If any person, firm or corporation registered as provided by this section, shall fail in the execution of any work or fail to comply with the provisions of this Ordinance relative to the erection, enlargement, alteration, repair, relocation, or demolition of any building, or part thereof, at least three times within two calendar years, the Building Commissioner, after notice to such person, firm or corporation that he, she, or it has three such failures or violations, shall remove or strike such persons', firm's, or corporation's name from the registration book Contractors Registration Record. For persons, firms, or corporations that have one such failure or violation, the Building Commissioner shall request the State's Attorney to bring suit and to prosecute such person, firm or corporation for such failure or violation, and in the case of a finding of guilty, his name shall be removed or stricken from the registration book Contractors Registration Record. In either case, such persons', firm's, or corporation's name shall not be re-entered or reinstated during such time as the failure or violation exists or any judgment remains unsatisfied with regard to said finding, or until the Building Commissioner determines that such person, firm, or corporation should be reentered or reinstated.
- (7)(6) Any person, firm, or corporation that shall have been found guilty under the preceding Section may have his name re-entered on the registration book in the

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<u>Contractors Registration Record</u> upon filing with the Building Commissioner a certificate signed by the State's Attorney, the Building Commissioner and the Health Officer to the effect that all violations of the Code with reference to which the finding of guilty was secured have been corrected or are nonexistent and that all claims and judgments arising from such convictions have been paid.

Effective date: This Ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.

WHEREAS, Mother Sinclair began her prison ministry, by following in the footsteps of her mother Jessie "Ma" Houston in Hot Springs Arkansas, after her stepbrother was arrested and later died in custody. It was then that her mother became the first African American woman to focus on ministering to prisoners; and

WHEREAS, After the family moved to Chicago in 1925, and Mother Sinclair started accompanying her mother on her inmate visits in 1945, at first just because her mother needed a ride; and

WHEREAS, Eventually Sinclair became not just her mother's chauffeur but her partner in spreading the gospel and later would become an ordained minister.

WHEREAS, At the age of 60 Mother Helen Sinclair joined the Peace Corps. and served in Malawi, South Africa and a few year later earning her bachelor's degree from Northeastern Illinois University. Through it all, her weekly prison visits continued where she developed programs that helped prison become places where inmates can transform their lives, not merely serve time; and

WHEREAS, Mother Sinclair has dedicated her life to ministering the inmates at correctional facilities like Statesville and others, she made it her mission to personally connect with every inmate and their

families. She would drive for hours to visit each institution to conduct worship services, where she continued to focus on ways to reform the prison system; and

WHEREAS, at the age of 100 and Sunday after Sunday, despite her aging body and fragile memory, Mother Sinclair journey's to state prisons to lead worship service, where she sings, offers prayer and teaches about black history and shouts words of encouragement. WHEREAS, Rosalie Clark, the City of Chicago's Director of Protocol for nearly two decades, died on June 26, 2020 at the age of 95; and

WHEREAS, born on the South side of Chicago on April 16, 1925, Clark attended St. Casimir Academy-Maria High School, where she participated in chorus and drama, and later attended Mount Mary University in Milwaukee; and

WHEREAS, Clark was married to William G. Clark, a former state legislator, Illinois Attorney General, and Chief Justice of the Illinois Supreme Court. Clark gained experience hosting fundraising events, meeting with reporters and high-profile government officials, and attending other campaign functions. It was during this time that she met Jane Byrne, then City Commissioner of Consumer Sales, who hand-picked Clark to serve on her staff after winning the 1979 Chicago mayoral election. Clark initially intended to work as the Director of Protocol only "for a year or two", but instead stayed to work under Mayors Byrne, Harold Washington, David Orr, Eugene Sawyer and Richard Daley; and

WHEREAS, Clark's duties involved greeting dignitaries and heads of state, arranging "courtesy visits" for celebrities wanting to meet the Mayor, and acting as "the City's chief hostess" for a wide array of events. She purchased cold-weather gear for Polish statesman Lech Wałęsa when her boss insisted on holding an outdoor rally in midwinter, scrambled to arrange Mikhail Gorbachev's impromptu visit to the Hard Rock Cafe, where he dined on nachos and beer and mingled with "real Chicagoans", coordinated a City Hall reception for the Dalai Lama, and watched Nelson Mandela deliver a speech wearing Bulls merchandise. She escorted celebrities including Arnold Schwarzenegger, Harrison Ford and Tony Bennett, and squired around Bishop Desmond Tutu, whom she described as "so warm and outgoing." Above all, Clark was responsible for making visitors feel at home - as she once told a reporter, "We get many noted visitors, from actors to ambassadors and prime ministers, and I love it when they say what a wonderful city Chicago is, and how friendly the people are."; and

WHEREAS, Clark was equally skilled in the more mundane aspects of her work. Anne Rashford, Clark's assistant of twelve years, described her former boss as the epitome of "grace under pressure."

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Rashford recalled an incident where, upon learning that a hired catering crew was incapable of cooking for a breakfast meeting in the Mayor's office, Clark took the task of cooking breakfast upon herself without hesitation. Rashford says "I was so lucky to work with her, grateful to start my career learning so much. She had such a zest for life, a seize-the-day mentality." James Sheahan, former City Director of Special Events, called Clark "the ultimate pro," and "really, really smart but also street smart, able to easily handle all the nuttiness of City Hall." "She could deal with truck drivers, and she could deal with heads of state. I always say that everyone is replaceable. She is not."; and

WHEREAS, in addition to her work at City Hall, Clark was a member of the boards of Illinois Federation of Democratic Women, Marillac House, Misericordia and Illinois State Museum. She enjoyed writing, gardening, entertaining and cooking for her family, and vacationing at Duck Lake in Michigan, where she was proud to be the only water-skiing grandmother on the lake; and

WHEREAS, Clark is survived by her daughter, Merrilee Redmond; her four sons, William Jr., John, Donald, and Robert; and her eleven grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. Her daughter said that, to the end, "she was almost constantly surrounded by family and friends."

HONORING THE 30TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE SIGNING OF THE AMERICAN DISABILITIES ACT (ADA)

WHEREAS, our nation committed itself to the elimination of discrimination against people with disabilities on July 26, 1990 when the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) was signed into law; and

WHEREAS, in 1986, the National Council on Disability (NCD) recommended enactment of an ADA, and drafted the first version of the bill which was introduced in the House and Senate in 1988; and

WHEREAS, after the spectacular Senate vote of 76 to 8 on September 7,1989, the Bill went to the House where it was considered by an unprecedented four Committees and later approved and signed as a law; and

WHEREAS, modeled after the Civil Rights Act of 1964, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin - and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 -- the ADA is an "equal opportunity" law for people with disabilities; and

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WHEREAS, the ADA is a wide-ranging civil rights law that prohibits discrimination based on disability and offers similar protections against discrimination to Americans with disabilities as the Civil Rights Act of 1964, which made discrimination based on race, religion, sex, national origin, and other characteristics illegal; and

WHEREAS, the ADA began with the establishment of the independent living movement which challenged the notion that people with disabilities needed to be institutionalized, and which fought for and provided services for people with disabilities to live in the community; and

WHEREAS, the hard work and the coalescing of lawyers and advocates, top level negotiators and policy analysts, disability organizations, lobbyers, protesters, witnesses, and many more groups from all areas of the Country formed the disability rights movement to help the passage of the ADA; and

WHEREAS, people with disabilities went to Washington D.C. to talk to members of Congress, to advocate for the Bill, and to explain why each provision was necessary while others wrote letters, attended town meetings, and made endless phone calls; and

WHEREAS, for the first time, the exclusion and segregation of people with disabilities was viewed as discrimination; and

WHEREAS, the ADA was the world's first comprehensive declaration of equality for people with disabilities and recognition that the surest path to America's continued vitality, strength and vibrancy is through the full realization of the contributions of all of its citizens. It was a collaborative effort of Democrats, Republicans, the legislative and the executive branches, federal and state agencies, and people with and without disabilities; and

WHEREAS, before the ADA, no federal law prohibited private sector discrimination against people with disabilities, absent a federal grant or contract; and

WHEREAS, the ADA protects people with both mental and physical disabilities regardless of the severity or permanency of such disability; and

WHEREAS, the ADA requires covered employers to provide reasonable accommodations to employees with disabilities, and imposes accessibility requirements on public accommodations; and

WHEREAS, the ADA was created on a basic presumption that people with disabilities want to, and are capable of contributing to their communities, and that exclusion and segregation cannot be tolerated; and

WHEREAS, the passage of the ADA has enhanced dignified treatment towards persons with a disability and enshrines their accommodations as a civil right.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Cook County Board of Commissioners does, hereby joins the rest of the Country in celebration of the 30th anniversary of the monumental signing of the American Disabilities Act (ADA); and

WHEREAS, As a young boy he and his mother migrated to Macomb, Illinois, where he attended Lincoln Grade school, and Edison Junior High School and later graduated from Macomb High School in 1942 and attended Western Illinois University where he worked as the sports editor for the school newspaper; and

WHEREAS, C.T. Vivian's first professional job was in 1947 as a recreation director for the Carver Community Center in Peoria, Illinois, where he participated in his first non-violent protest, a lunch counter sit-in; and

WHEREAS, Reverend Vivian's strong religious upbringing, received his calling into the ministry in 1955 with the help of his church. He enrolled in the American Baptist Theological Seminary now called the American Baptist College in Nashville, Tennessee the same year; and

WHEREAS, In 1959, Rev. C.T. Vivian along with various students from American Baptist College organized a systematic nonviolent sit-in campaign at local lunch counters. On April 19, 1960, 4000 demonstrators peacefully walked to Nashville's City Hall to discuss racial discrimination. As a result of that walk, the Mayor publicly agreed that racial discrimination was morally wrong. He would later become the director of national affiliates for the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, where he led a group of people to register to vote in Selma, Alabama; and

WHEREAS, Rev. Vivian helped found the Nashville Christian leadership Conference. In 1961 Rev. Vivian participated in Freedom Rides, working alongside Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. as the National Director of affiliates for the Southern Christian leadership Conference. During the summer following the Selma Voting Rights movement Rev. Vivian conceived and directed an education program, Vision and put 702 Alabama students in college with scholarships. Years later, the US Department of Education used his Vision program as a model to create Upward Bound, which was designed to improve high school and college graduation rates for student in underserved communities; and

WHEREAS, Vivian would move to Atlanta in 1970 to create the Black Action Strategies and Information Center (BASICS), a consultancy on multiculturism and race relations; and

WHEREAS, Rev. Vivian continued to speak publicly around the world including the United Nations. It was in 2013 that President Barack Obama awarded Rev. C.T. Vivian the highest civilian honor, the Presidential Medal of Freedom; and

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WHEREAS, Rev. Vivian passed away on July 17, 2020; and

WHEREAS, He is survived by daughters Kira Vivian, Denise Morse, Anita and son Mark.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE MEETING OF JULY 27, 2020

JUSTICE FOR BLACK LIVES

WHEREAS, throughout the history of the United States, policing, criminalization, and incarceration have been used as tools of violence and retribution against marginalized groups seeking safety, especially Black people; and

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WHEREAS, policing was in part developed as a tool to preserve the institution of slavery in the 1700's, focusing on chasing down runaway slaves and shutting down slave revolts, grew into a weapon to disrupt labor uprisings in the 1800s, and matured in the 1900s to be used as the single most effective tool in repressing the civil rights movement; and

WHEREAS, policing has had a troubled history in Cook County, most conspicuously visible in the wrongful conviction of more than 125 Black people over dozens of years as a result of the police work enabled by disgraced Chicago Police Commander Jon Burge and his associates, thereby permanently damaging the lives of hundreds of accused people, their family members, and Black communities at large; and

WHEREAS, the historic resistance to acknowledge problems in policing remains prevalent, illustrated by the alleged social media posts made by active Cook County Sheriff's Officers in response to the peaceful protesting by attorneys in the Law Office of the Cook County Public Defender on June 12th; and

WHEREAS, the brutality of law enforcement has become so commonplace in Black life that it is an ever-present cultural rite of passage in Black families to teach their children how to not be killed by law enforcement before they become adults; and

WHEREAS, despite centuries-long increased spending on traditional law enforcement, violence remains a problem in many communities, and there is little positive correlation between residents' feeling of safety and the degree of law enforcement presence in those communities; and

WHEREAS, currently most crimes are not resolved within the criminal justice system. The majority of sexual assaults and roughly half of robberies and aggravated assaults are never reported to police. Given the choice, many crime survivors choose nothing at all or accountability outside of criminal prosecution rather than seek help from our current justice system; and

WHEREAS, across the country, spending on traditional law enforcement and incarceration has escalated with no correlation to metrics of success such as clearance rates or sense of safety. For example, despite a 50% decrease in the number of people incarcerated in the Cook County Jail between 2013 and 2020, the Cook County Department of Corrections budget grew 26% over the same time period: and

WHEREAS, almost all people incarcerated in the jail are there while awaiting trial, and many hundreds specifically because they cannot afford to pay a money bond. They are presumed innocent but still sit locked in cages because they are Black and poor. There is little focus on the root causes of violence or engaging in the restorative processes that actually address harm and generate needed accountability, healing, and repair for survivors of violence; and

WHEREAS, interventions that would reduce the need for traditional law enforcement have been seen by too many officials with the power to allocate public resources as secondary efforts to maintain community peace. Specific endeavors that engage school-aged children, support street outreach workers, reclaim public spaces, promote job preparation and job growth and others go underfunded as a result of our reliance on traditional law enforcement spending; and **WHEREAS**, despite the decades long challenges preceding it, since 2010, Cook County has focused its efforts on justice reinvestment and has undertaken significant efforts to change the status quo through its work to reform bond court, substantially reduce the number of people incarcerated in the County Jail and Juvenile Temporary Detention Center, greatly expand access to behavioral health care including mental health treatment through County Care, which has directly insured thousands of county residents, establish the Behavioral Health Consortium of Illinois to expand healthcare access throughout the city and south suburbs, and reinvest \$23 million dollars in Violence Prevention, Recidivism Reduction, and Restorative Justice grants directly to community organizations rather than through law enforcement; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners does hereby declare that to best keep communities safe and reduce contact between people and law enforcement that has historically increased unaccountable violence inflicted on Black and Brown communities physically, economically, and emotionally, Cook County should engage in efforts to redirect funds from policing and incarceration to public services not administered by law enforcement that promote communities most impacted by violence and incarceration.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHERRESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners shall focus on its ability to invest additional resources in the following areas:

1. Housing: According to the 2019 State of Rental Housing in Cook County, 50% of renter households in Cook County are paying unaffordable housing costs. Cook County through the Bureau of Economic Development and the Housing Authority of Cook County should explore opportunities to expand the availability of high-quality affordable housing and strengthen pathways for homeownership in communities of color to build wealth.

2.Health Care: In this global pandemic, the same communities of color harmed by police violence and incarceration are also bearing the brunt of COVID-19 infections and deaths. Cook County through Cook County Health should increase funding for health care and further concentrate health care offerings in communities of color.

3.Mental Health: Cook County should expand mental health inpatient/outpatient care including for individuals leaving incarceration and ensure that first responders for people in mental health crisis are mental health professionals and not police.

4.Restorative Justice: To guard against militarization of local police, Cook County should utilize the Prohibited and Controlled Equipment lists of the Law Enforcement Equipment Working Group established under the Obama administration to guide acquisition of Emergency Management equipment. Prohibited equipment includes but is not limited to grenade launchers, camouflage uniforms, and firearms and ammunition exceeding .50 caliber. Cook County should invest additional resources in restorative justice programs that restore harm done to survivors of crime and violence and engage in community accountability with people who do harm to others rather than just punishing people.

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5.Job Creation: Cook County through the Bureau of Economic Development and the Chicago Cook Workforce Partnership should use additional resources to maintain a living wage and create public sector opportunities and encourage private sector jobs for people in communities of color.

6.Public Transit: Cook County through the Bureau of Economic Development and the Department of Transportation and Highways shall continue to work with transit partners to advocate for the expansion of spending on public transit in communities of color and low-income communities.

7.Eviction/Foreclosure: Cook County shall work with the State and legal advocates to ensure those facing evictions and mortgage foreclosures have ready access to high quality legal assistance. Cook County should continue to expand on innovative efforts to prevent the loss of property in Black and Brown communities via the Tax Sale.

8.Increase M/WBE Opportunity: Cook County Government, through the Office of Contract Compliance and in close collaboration with all of its departments, shall endeavor to improve its operations, review its procurement strategies and streamline its payment processes to facilitate increased participation by certified MBE and WBE firms on Cook County and Cook County Health contracts. The Office of the Chief Procurement Officer shall modernize its solicitation processes and evaluate bid incentive options for local businesses, including MBE and WBE firms, owned and operated by public schools' graduates located within Cook County. Where the Office of Contract Compliance and the Office of the Chief Procurement Officer assess monetary penalties against vendors who fail to meet MBE and/or WBE commitments, all monetary penalties shall be designated to a special purpose fund for the purpose of assisting MBE and WBE businesses

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that ceremonial copies of this resolution be delivered to Governor JB Pritzker, Speaker Michael Madigan, Senate President Don Harmon, Sheriff Tom Dart, State's Attorney Kim Foxx, Public Defender Amy Campanelli, Clerk of the Circuit Court Dorothy Brown, and Chief Judge Timothy Evans.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVES TO IMPLEMENT THE COOK COUNTY COVID-19 RESPONSE PLAN: FROM RAPID RESPONSE TO EQUITABLE RECOVERY

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the President of the United States issued a Proclamation, declaring a National Public Health Emergency as a result of the COVID-19 outbreak; and

WHEREAS, on March 27, 2020, the President of the United States signed into law the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (the "CARES Act"); and

WHEREAS, the CARES Act established the Coronavirus Relief Fund ("CRF"), which provides aid to eligible local governments to address necessary expenditures due to the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency; and

WHEREAS, on April 7, 2020, President Preckwinkle issued Executive Order 2020-9 which authorized the Cook County Bureau of Economic Development (BED) to develop, establish and administer a loan

and technical assistance program for small businesses located in suburban Cook County in the amount of \$10 M: and

WHEREAS, Cook County qualified as an eligible local government and received \$429 M in CRF funding from the U.S Department of Treasury; and

WHEREAS, Cook County has received \$429 million of CRF and Cook County has allocated approximately \$ 133 Million of the County's CRF allocation to address the impact of COVID on communities with \$51 M available to municipalities and \$82 M distributed via the BED to direct service providers to address economic and community development needs; and

WHEREAS, as a result of COVID-19, Cook County businesses and residents have been severely impacted and recovery initiatives are needed to assist Cook County businesses and residents as result of losses suffered and unforeseen expenses incurred; and

WHEREAS, on May 14, 2020 to ensure a comprehensive and coordinated response to the COVID-19 pandemic, President Preckwinkle released the Cook County COVID-19 Response Plan: From Rapid Response to Equitable Recovery. This Plan combines the County's ongoing public health and healthcare priorities with parallel agendas that respond to the longer-term economic and social impacts of the virus; and

WHEREAS, the Equitable Recovery phase of the Cook County COVID-19 Response Plan details actions the Offices Under the President will take to address the significant economic impact residents, municipalities, businesses and civic institutions face. Due to the uncertain nature of the pandemic and its economic impacts, the County expects the recovery phase to last at least 18 to 24 months; and

WHEREAS, Cook County adopted an approach to the design and implementation of COVID-19 economic relief programs to ensure the equitable distribution of resources to residents and businesses with the greatest need and adversely impacted by COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, to achieve the above objectives, the BED collaborated with stakeholders to develop new programs that will help restore the economic well-being of residents and businesses.

WHEREAS, the Plan outlines a commitment to expand BED's Community Recovery Initiative to assist renters and homeowners, dislocated workers, small businesses and address critical social service needs.

WHEREAS, to primarily assist suburban Cook County businesses and residents, Cook County through the Office of the Chief Financial Officer has allocated nearly \$82 Million to fund specific economic and community recovery initiatives administered by the BED; and

WHEREAS, the BED developed the proposed menu of programs to support business and community recovery through a process that included surveys by the County of businesses, social service agencies and resident needs, review of publicly available research; consultation with subject matter experts including, the Boston Consulting Group, the Civic Consulting Alliance, the Greater Chicago Food Depository, and other local organizations; and review and discussion with the Cook County Economic Development Advisory Committee; and

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WHEREAS, the *County's Equitable Recovery Plan* cites a "grave economic crisis" and notes that the existing Federal support does not provide enough resources to meet small businesses' needs and that smaller, minority-owned businesses were largely left behind; and

WHEREAS, the *County's Equitable Recovery Plan s*tates the County's continued intention to assisting small businesses, access relief and to identify resources to build a stronger small business ecosystem that supports recovery and foster resiliency; and

WHEREAS, the *County's Equitable Recovery Plan* expressed the County's intention of supporting Cook County residents seeking employment; and

WHEREAS, the *County's Equitable Recovery Plan* notes that residents are struggling to feed and house their families, social services are strained, and communities of color are suffering the harshest impacts of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, the *County's Equitable Recovery Plan* establishes the County's commitment to providing rent, mortgage, and utility assistance, homeless and other social services, and assistance for those impacted by eviction and foreclosure; and

WHEREAS, to impactfully leverage funding and ensure efficient and effective program operation, implementation and administration consistent with federal guidelines the BED will need to work with experienced and established fiscal agents, program administrators, partner agencies and technical assistance providers to achieve the various recovery objectives.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners hereby supports the Cook County initiatives to provide business and community recovery efforts as a result of COVID-19 and further supports the allocation of nearly \$82 million in CRF funds to support the following BED program and initiatives to address the needs in suburban Cook County, distributed as follows:

1. Implement the Cook County COVID-19 Small Business Recovery Grant and Technical Assistance Program in the amount of \$15 M to support small businesses in Cook County, who urgently require access to funding that will help businesses recover from the negative effects of COVID-19. Grant capital alone is insufficient in helping small businesses recover from the dampening effect of COVID- 19; small businesses will also receive technical assistance, business advice and education.

Cook County will join a growing coalition of business service organizations, supported by funds from charitable organizations and potential private sector funders, across Chicago and the suburbs of Cook County, to help business owners sustain and grow their businesses, addressing the impacts of COVID-19. The \$15 M Program, which continues to seek further funding from outside sources, contains the following program components: program design, administration and implementation with \$12.6 M being used for grants to small businesses, \$2 M for providing free advising and educational services to small businesses and approximately \$400,000 for program administration. All businesses that receive a grant under the Small Business Recovery Grant Program will be required to receive technical assistance to maximize the impact of the

grant.

2. Implement the Southland Development Technical Assistance Network, in the amount of \$1M, to provide free direct technical assistance services to small businesses located in Cook County's South Suburbs. The Southland Development Authority (SDA) in partnership with the Illinois Small Business Development Center at the Southland will assist businesses in re-opening safely, identifying financial resources to continue operations; apply for loans and grants; and connect businesses with mentors and advisors.

The South Suburban Economic Growth Initiative, Phase I report documents the importance of the South Suburbs to the regional economy, while offering potential for economic growth but represents the sub-region within Cook County with the greatest challenges resulting from years of disinvestment and population loss. As documented in the *County's Equitable Recovery Plan*, COVID only exacerbates the existing disparities and data from the Cook County Department of Public Health indicates the South Suburbs are among the hardest hit sub-regions in the County. As a result, the BED has targeted specific economic development resources to this region.

- 3. Implement the **Back to Work Cook County** program in the amount of **\$4M** to provide retraining and employment services to dislocated suburban Cook County residents due to COVID-19; **\$** 1.5 will be distributed to support direct "training vouchers" to eligible dislocated job seekers; \$750,000 to American Job Centers to hire additional staff to serve the increased volume of dislocated workers at suburban locations, \$450,000 to suburban community colleges to provide career counseling and coaching, \$200,000 to provide laptops and hotspots/service to loan to individuals who wish to participate in remote job training, but lack the technical resources to do so; \$350,000 to develop a pilot Cook County Manufacturing Rapid Response System to avert layoffs triggered by COVID-19, and to support placement of trainees into "essential" manufacturing jobs, and \$800,000 funds for program management and administration.
- 4. Implement the Cook County Manufacturing Cares Package, in the amount of \$500,000 to identify urgent and important needs for Cook County manufacturers as a result of COVID-19. All manufacturers that identify urgent needs will receive direct support from IMEC's team of improvement specialists and technicians dedicated to providing businesses in Illinois with the tools and techniques to create sustainable competitive futures. Assessment results will be compiled and shared in a comprehensive report outlining recommendations for business assistance to manufacturers in an ongoing COVID-19 environment. IMEC, the Illinois Manufacturing Excellence Center is the official Illinois representative of the U.S. Commerce Manufacturing Extension Partnership (MEP) National Network.
- 5. Implement the **Cook County Rental Assistance Program** to provide **\$20 M** in rental assistance payments for residents financially impacted by COVID-19, either for past due payments or upcoming payments. Payments made under this program will be made directly to the landlord.
- 6. Implement the **Cook County Mortgage Assistance Program** in the amount of **\$20 M** will provide mortgage assistance payments for residents financially impacted by COVID-19, either for past due payments or upcoming payments. Payments made under this program will be made directly to the servicer.

- 7. Implement the **Cook County Critical Social Service Programs** in the amount of **\$11.4 M** to provide services to the homeless (\$5 M); to provide legal aid, housing counseling, and foreclosure mediation services (\$1.1 million); to provide utility assistance to residents impacted by COVID-19 (\$2.1 M); to provide food assistance (\$1.1 million); and to provide direct financial assistance to residents impacted by COVID-19 (\$2.1 million), as follows:
 - a) The Homeless Sheltering Program funding will complement FEMA and other available sources of shelter funding to cover costs associated with providing hotel-based shelter to protect the high-risk homeless population during COVID-19 as well as costs for operating the few congregate shelter sites that have been housing residents. Prior to COVID-19, the suburban homeless system chiefly used a church-based rotating shelter model that is largely volunteer-driven. Under COVID-19, continuing congregate shelters is difficult, and most volunteers are unable to assist, so the system moved primarily to a hotel-based model for sheltering homeless individuals. Since the onset of COVID-19, the suburban shelter system has provided over 50,000 shelter nights and over 150,000 meals, and this level of service is expected to continue.
 - b) The Legal Aid, Housing Counseling and Foreclosure Mediation Program will provide these housing stability services to those at risk of eviction or foreclosure. BED will collaborate with the Cook County Justice Advisory Council and the Circuit Court of Cook <u>County</u> on these initiatives.
 - c) The Utility Assistance Program will provide utility assistance to suburban Cook County households struggling to pay their utility bills due to impacts from COVID-19. The program will focus on gas, electric, phone and water utility assistance for lower income households (up to 200% of the federal poverty level) impacted by COVID-19. Payments made under this program will be made directly to the utilities.
 - d) The **Food Assistance Program** will provide food assistance to residents and support the operation and staffing of food distribution sites. Funding will support new food distribution sites and partnerships, particularly black and brown-led distributions in priority communities in the south and west suburban regions.
 - e) The **Direct Financial Assistance Program** will provide one-time direct financial assistance to residents impacted by COVID-19, with the expectation of aiding at least 4,000 households with a \$500 one-time payment.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the US Department of Treasury limits the use of CRF for eligible expenses by December 30, 2020, the Cook County Board of Commissioners recognizes that time is of the essence and, in addition to the Cook County Community Recovery Loan Fund that was implemented pursuant to Executive Order 2020-9 in the amount of \$10 million, authorizes the Chief of the Bureau of Economic Development to negotiate and enter into the various agreements that outlines the specific metric and impact data, and compliance with all CRF reporting and monitoring requirements with the following agencies to implement the above programs:

- Chicago Community Trust (CCT) to serve as the fiscal agent of the Cook County COVID-19 Small Business Recovery Grant and Technical Assistance Program. CCT will be responsible for distributing the County's funds along with those from other philanthropic investors to local business service organizations for \$15 M.
- 2. **Southland Development Authority (SDA)** to implement the Southland Development Technical Assistance Network for \$1 million.
- 3. Chicago Cook Workforce Partnership (Partnership) to implement the Back to Work Cook County for \$4 M
- 4. Illinois Manufacturing Excellence Center (IMEC) to implement the Cook County Manufacturing Cares Package for \$500,000.
- **5. Housing Authority of Cook County** to implement the Cook County Rental Assistance Program for \$20 M.
- 6. Illinois Housing Development Authority or other appropriate housing agency to implement the Cook County Mortgage Assistance Program for \$20 M.
- 7. The Cook County Critical Social Service Programs, as follows:
 - a) **BEDS Plus, Connections for the Homeless, Housing Forward, JOURNEYS, Respond Now, and South Suburban PADS** to implement the Homeless Sheltering Program for \$5 M.
 - b) Lawyers' Committee for Better Housing and other appropriate entities providing legal aid, housing counseling and foreclosure mediation services to implement the Legal Aid, Housing Counseling and Foreclosure Mediation Program for \$1.1 M
 - c) **Community and Economic Development Association (CEDA)** to implement the Utility Assistance Program for \$2.1 M
 - d) Greater Chicago Food Depository to implement the Food Assistance Program for \$1.1 M.
 - e) **Family Independence Initiative** to implement the Direct Financial Assistance Program for \$2.1 M.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Cook County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes the Chief of BED to modify the funding allocations provided in this Resolution based upon need and utilization; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief of the Bureau of Economic Development shall issue quarterly reports to the Cook County Board of Commissioners regarding progress of the above programs toward the Vital Communities goals outlined in the *Cook County COVID-19 Response Plan*.

Sec. 44.92. Designation of Holidays

(a) The following days are hereby declared holidays, except in emergency and for necessary operations, for all salaried County officers and employees in the County offices, departments, or institutions:

(1) New Year's Eve, January 1. (2) Martin Luther King's Birthday, Third Monday in January (2)(3) Lincoln's Birthday, February 12. (3)(4) Washington's Birthday, Third Monday in February 22. (b) It is the intent of the County Board that all salaried Cook County employees be granted 11 14 holidays, or equivalent paid days off per year.

(c) Should a certain holiday fall on a Saturday, the preceding Friday shall be set as the holiday; should a certain holiday fall on a Sunday, the following Monday shall be set as the holiday.

(d) In addition to the above, any other day or part of a days shall be considered a holiday when so designated by the County Board.

Summary: The Cook County Assessor's Office (CCAO) seeks to renew a memorandum of understanding with the University of Chicago for the provision of a data science fellow to work a one-year fellowship with the office. This is an extension of University of Chicago's Applied Data

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Fellowship currently in place in the Office of the President and the Cook County Sheriff's Department and a continued fellowship with the Cook County Assessor's Office.

As the CCAO becomes more data driven in its approach to producing fair, equitable and transparent assessments, data science is leading the way in how we craft models and assessment policy. Under the new Assessor, Fritz Kaegi, the CCAO has developed a new Data Science department, under the leadership of Chief Data Officer, Rob Ross. Chief among the goals of this new department is to make assessment valuations more predictable and certain by modeling the considerations that go into valuing real property.

University of Chicago will continue to supply a recent graduate of their graduate school who is an expert in the area of data science to work on projects with our Chief Data Officer and data team that will continue the work of modeling fair and equitable assessments. The County has seen great results in developing data driven policies with the assistance of fellows hired under the Applied Data Fellows program. We believe that the Assessor's office will continue to greatly benefit from the assistance of a data fellow.

As you will see, the annual cost of this partnership with University of Chicago will cost \$60,000.

However, the cost will be split between two fiscal years: FY2020 and FY2021
