EXTENDING COOK COUNTY'S PROCLAMATION OF DISASTER FOR COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS THROUGH MAY 31, 2021

WHEREAS, COVID-19 is a novel severe acute respiratory illness that can spread among people through respiratory transmissions and present with symptoms similar to those of influenza; and

WHEREAS, the United States Secretary of Health and Human Services declared that COVID-19 presents a public health emergency on January 27, 2020, and the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a Public Health Emergency of International Concern on January 30, 2020; and

WHEREAS, certain populations are at higher risk of experiencing more severe illness as a result of COVID-19, including older adults and people who have serious chronic medical conditions such as heart disease, diabetes, or lung disease; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Department of Public Health and the Cook County Department of Emergency Management and Regional Security continue to work closely with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) as well as the State and local public health agencies as we closely monitor and work to prevent the spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, Cook County is continuing its efforts to prepare for any eventuality given that this is a novel illness with known health risks it poses for the elderly and those with serious chronic medical conditions; and

WHEREAS, on March 9, 2020, Illinois Governor JB Pritzker issued a disaster proclamation giving the state access to state money and possibly federal reimbursement for the costs of fighting the potentially deadly illness; and

WHEREAS, County Board President Toni Preckwinkle joined Governor JB Pritzker on March 9, 2020 along with representatives from the city of Chicago and DuPage County to announce that Cook County is joining the state and city to issue emergency proclamations in response to COVID-19 which will permit Cook County to access federal funds as well as other resources, and enhance our ability to respond to this virus; and

WHEREAS, based on the foregoing, on March 10, 2020, County Board President Toni Preckwinkle found that the circumstances surrounding COVID-19 constitute a public health emergency under the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act and a disaster under the Cook County Code of Ordinances Sec. 26-36 and issued a proclamation of disaster for Cook County activating Cook County's emergency operations plan; and

WHEREAS, on March 16, 2020, the Cook County Board of Commissioners passed Resolution 20-2195 which extended the County's disaster proclamation through May 31, 2020; and

WHEREAS, on May 21, 2020, the Cook County Board of Commissioners passed Resolution 20-2472 which extended the County's disaster proclamation through September 30, 2020; and

WHEREAS, on September 24, 2020, the Cook County Board of Commissioners passed Resolution 20-4302 which extended the County's disaster proclamation through December 31, 2020; and

WHEREAS, on December 17, 2020, the Cook County Board of Commissioners passed Resolution 20-0490 which extended the County's disaster proclamation through January 31, 2021; and

WHEREAS, on January 29. 2021, the Cook County Board of Commissioners passed Resolution 21-1143 which extended the County's disaster proclamation through February 28, 2021; and

WHEREAS, on February 25, 2021 the Cook County Board of Commissioners passed Resolution 21-1503 which extended the County's disaster proclamation through March 31, 2021; and

WHEREAS, on March 18. 2021, the Cook County Board of Commissioners passed Resolution 21-2068 which extended the County's disaster proclamation through April 30, 2021; and

WHEREAS, extending the proclamation of disaster through May 31, 2021 will assist Cook County, by and through its Department of Emergency Management and Regional Security, to continue to coordinate county, public health and municipal resources and response activities and emergency procurements/agreements in an effort to prevent and reduce further damage and hazards, protect the health and safety of persons, protect property and provide emergency assistance pursuant to Illinois law; and

WHEREAS, extending the proclamation of disaster through May 31, 2021 will also assist Cook County, by and through its Bureau of Finance to continue to coordinate and distribute federal awards and to reimburse costs, prevent and reduce further damage and hazards, protect the health and safety of persons, protect property and provide emergency assistance pursuant to Illinois law; and

WHEREAS, extending the proclamation of disaster through May 31, 2021 will assist the Cook County Medical Examiner's Office in addressing its needs related to COVID-19 deaths; and

WHEREAS, extending the proclamation of disaster through May 31, 2021 addresses the need to continue remote meetings and encourage a reduced footprint in County offices; and

WHEREAS, it is the policy of Cook County to be prepared to address any disasters and, therefore, it is necessary and appropriate to make additional Cook County resources available in accordance with Sec. 26-39 of the Cook County Code of Ordinances for the near future to ensure that the effects of COVID-19 are mitigated and minimized and that residents and visitors in Cook County remain safe and secure.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, pursuant to the Cook County Code of Ordinances, Sections 26-36 and the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act, 20 ILCS 3305/11, the President and the Cook County Board of Commissioners authorize the March 10, 2020 Proclamation of Disaster issued by President Preckwinkle that was previously extended to be extended through May 31, 2021; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Cook County continues to engage its federal, State and local partners to make resources available to the residents and businesses in Cook County impacted by this national emergency_and make additional Cook County resources available through May31, 2021 in accordance with Chapter 26. Emergency Management and Services, Article II. Cook County Department of Emergency

Management and Regional Security, Sec. 26-31 through 26-43 of the Cook County Code of Ordinances to ensure that the effects of COVID-19 are mitigated and minimized and that residents and visitors in Cook County remain safe and secure; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Cook County, by and through its Department of Emergency Management and Regional Security, shall continue to coordinate county and municipal resources and response activities as authorized under Chapter 26. Emergency Management and Services, Article II. Cook County Department of Emergency Management and Regional Security, Sec. 26-31 through 26-43 of the Cook County Code of Ordinances during the extended Cook County Proclamation of Disaster in an effort to prevent and reduce further damage and hazards, protect the health and safety of persons, protect property and provide emergency assistance pursuant to Illinois law; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that extending the proclamation will enhance the County's ability to access the resources, equipment and personnel needed to address ongoing and changing circumstances on the ground related to COVID-19; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, a copy of this Resolution extending Cook County's Proclamation of Disaster through May 31, 2021 shall be filed with the Clerk of Cook County, Illinois.

Summary: Pursuant to Cook County Ordinance Art VI. Div. 3. Sec. 2-511-520 the Cook County Juvenile Temporary Detention Center Advisory Board (hereinafter "Advisory Board") shall submit to the Executive Director of the Juvenile Temporary Detention Center (hereinafter "JTDC"), the Chief Judge of the Circuit Court of Cook County, the Board of Commissioners for Cook County, and the President of the Cook County Board of Commissioners an annual report containing public recommendations for actions which may be necessary in carrying out the mission, purpose and intent of the JTDC. The Advisory Board is charged with providing public recommendations on maximizing the use of current resources and on meeting the physical, social, and psychological needs of the population, as well as establishing public performance measures to track and measure the achievement of the JTDC's mission.

This year the Advisory Board focused its activities on arranging for a hearing before the Cook County Board of Commissioners regarding the use of punitive room confinement at the JTDC; this subject was explored in the 2019 Annual Report of the Advisory Board. The hearing took place on December 16, 2020 before the Criminal Justice Committee of the Cook County Board of Commissioners.

RESPONSIBLE OPERATIONS FOR COMPENSATION IN CONTRACTING (ROCC)

WHEREAS, Cook County strives to create an environment attractive for small local businesses to perform as both prime and subcontractors on Cook County contracts; and

WHEREAS, creating a more streamlined operation for processing payments to Cook County vendors will serve to make Cook County a more attractive business partner to small local businesses which will foster economic growth; and

WHEREAS, streamlining operation for processing payments for Cook County vendors will also benefit Women-, Minority, Veteran, Service-disabled Veteran-, and Persons with a Disability-Owned Business Enterprises, including facilitating those certified businesses to perform as prime vendors; and

WHEREAS, this Responsible Operations for Compensation in Contracting (ROCC) Resolution shall serve as a commitment of this administration to improve Cook County payment processes to avoid creating an undue burden on all Cook County vendors, but particularly those small local businesses owned by underutilized and disadvantaged owners.

RESOLUTION TO STOP THE VIOLENCE AGAINST ASIAN AMERICANS AND PACIFIC ISLANDERS

WHEREAS, Since January 2020, there have been a significant number of reports of Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) Communities being threatened and harassed in the United States; and

WHEREAS, The Organization Stop AAPI Hate reported 3,795 incidents from March 19, 2020 to February 28, 2021. The number of hate incidents reported to the center represent only a fraction of the number of ate

incidents that actually occur, but it does show how vulnerable Asian Americans are to discrimination, and the types of discrimination they face; and

WHEREAS, there are various types of discrimination such as but not limited to, Verbal harassment (68.1%) and shunning (20.5%) (i.e., the deliberate avoidance of Asian Americans) make up the two largest proportions of the total incidents reported. Physical assault (11.1%) comprises the third largest category of the total incidents. Civil rights violations - e.g., workplace discrimination, refusal of service, and being barred from transportation - account for 8.5% of the total incidents. Online harassment makes up 6.8% of the total incidents: and

WHEREAS according to national trends, women report hate incidents 2.3 times more than men. Youths (0 to 17 years old) report 12.6% of incidents and seniors (60 years old and older) report 6.2% of the total incidents. Chinese are the largest ethnic group (42.2%) that report experiencing hate, followed by Koreans (14.8%), Vietnamese (8.5%), and Filipinos (7.9%) Incident reports come from all 50 states and the District of Columbia. Businesses are the primary site of discrimination (35.4%), followed by public streets (25.3%), and public parks (9.8%). Online incidents account for 10.8% of the total incidents; and

WHEREAS, if these statistics did not grab the attention of this nation, the shootings that took place on March 16, 2021 did. 8 innocent Asian Americans were murdered in shootings in three separate attacks across the Atlanta metro region and all but one of these victims were women. We will hold the stories, families, loves, and dreams of all of us impacted by this tragedy close to our hearts and minds; and

WHEREAS, Cook County is committed to support and advance local efforts to increase equity and inclusion to those who have long been excluded from it. We are committed to moving beyond statements of condemnation and toward using the full weight of our resources to name and fight injustices in our communities, corporations and institutions. Not to allow this type of prejudice to fester and lead to the loss of innocent lives.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, we stand in solidarity to protect the rights and freedoms of Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders and fight against the hate, racism and violence that has occurred against the Asian American and Pacific Islander communities.

WHEREAS, Public Health Awareness raises awareness of the relationship between the health of individuals and the health of their communities; and

WHEREAS, there has been an increase in gun related violence in Cook County compared to the decrease in numbers over the past five years; and

WHEREAS, The City of Chicago has seen a sharp increase in gun violence in 2020 compared to previous years. In 2020 3,893 shootings were reported, compared to just 2,536 in 2019; and

WHEREAS, As of April 1, 2021, 703 people have been injured by a gun shot in Chicago, IL surpassing the total 2020 number by 183 cases; and

WHEREAS, The Cook County Medical Examiner's Office confirmed 875 gun-related homicides in 2020, breaking the previous record of 838 set in 1994; and

WHEREAS, The Medical Examiner's office handled 970 homicides in 2020. Which was a more than 40 percent increase over 2019's total of 675; and

WHEREAS, African Americans were the victims of 78 percent of homicides and Latinos accounted for more than 16 percent of homicide deaths. Eighty-nine percent of homicide deaths were male. Seventy homicide deaths were under 18; 22 were under the age of 10. The majority (722) of homicides were in the City of Chicago. The last time Cook County saw more than 970 homicides was in 1996; and

WHEREAS, Cook County Health provides care for over 1,100 patients with gunshot wounds every year through Stroger Hospital, accounting for 20% of the patients that get treatment through the Comprehensive Trauma Unit. Costing the health systems anywhere between 30-40 million dollars a year; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Cook County will: Led by the Cook County Board President and the Cook County Board of Commissioners (County Board), in collaboration with the Cook County Sheriff's Department and other relevant parties; Assert gun violence as a public health crisis affecting our entire society; Assess internal policies and procedures to ensure solutions to gun violence as a core goal of Cook County; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the County will work with community organizations identifying specific activities to: (1) decrease gun violence among the youth (2) increase funding to the Justice Advisory Council programs specific to reduce gun-violence; (3) Work closely with Sheriff and local law enforcement agencies to create strategies to reduce the amount of illegal firearms in Cook County (4) work with marginalized populations to provide education on gun violence, issues and solutions(5) Advocate for relevant policies that improve health in communities of color, (6) support local, State, and Federal programs that advance anti-gun violence initiatives, and (7) and actively work towards reducing the 30-40 million dollars spent each year at Cook County Health on trauma from gun violence by creating a budget line item specifically used for gun violence prevention an intervention; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the County will encourage other local, State, and national entities to recognize gun violence as a public health crisis; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the County Board hereby supports the efforts to address public health disparities due to gun violence throughout Cook County.

WHEREAS, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reports that nearly 1 in 5 women and 1 in 38 men have experienced completed or attempted rape during their lifetimes; and

WHEREAS, according to the Rape, Abuse & Incest National Network (RAINN) on average, there are 433,648 victims of rape and sexual assault each year in the United States of America (U.S.), and;

WHEREAS, the Rape, Abuse & Incest National Network (RAINN) data assures that every 73 seconds, an American is sexually assaulted; and

WHEREAS, according to the Department of Justice's Bureau of Justice Statistics National Crime Victimization Survey: only 230 of every 1,000 rapes are reported, only 46 of every 1,000 rapes lead to arrest, and only 5 of every 1,000 rapes lead to conviction in the United States of America (U.S.); and

WHEREAS, the Harvard Medical School Center for Primary Care has reported a significant worldwide increase in sexual violence cases since the surge of the Covid-19 Pandemic; and

WHEREAS, for the past 22 years, Peace Over Violence, a sexual and domestic violence prevention center headquartered in Los Angeles, California, has hosted the Denim Day campaign on a Wednesday in April in honor of Sexual Assault Awareness Month; and

WHEREAS, the Denim Day story begins in Italy in 1992, when an 18-year-old girl was raped by the 45-year-old driving instructor who was taking her on her very first driving lesson. He took her to an isolated road, pulled her out of the car, removed her jeans and raped her; and

WHEREAS, after she reported the rape, the perpetrator was arrested, prosecuted, and convicted of rape and sentenced to jail; and

WHEREAS, years later, that conviction was overturned by the Italian Supreme Court using the "jeans alibi" - according to the justices, the woman was wearing tight jeans, therefore she must have helped the person who raped her remove her jeans, thereby implying consent; and

WHEREAS, the following day, the women in the Italian Parliament came to work wearing jeans in solidarity with the survivor; and

WHEREAS, the Denim Day campaign became official in the United States of America (U.S.) in 1999 where people wore denim in solidarity with women in the Italian Parliament; and

WHEREAS, since then, wearing jeans or other denim apparel on Denim Day has become a symbol of protest against erroneous and destructive manners about sexual harassment, abuse, assault and rape; and

WHEREAS, in this sexual violence prevention and education campaign, community members, elected officials, businesses and students are asked to make a social statement by wearing denim on this day as a visible protest against the misconceptions that surround sexual violence.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners recognizes Wednesday, April 28th, 2021 as the 22nd Annual Denim Day and honors survivors of sexual assault.

HONORING MR. ARTHUR L. MCCANN

WHEREAS, to "Serve and Protect" is the motto for a policeman. It was also the calling of a great servant leader, Sgt. Arthur L. McCann; and

WHEREAS, Arthur L. McCann was born in 1929 in Paive, Mississippi to parents Ollie and Martha McCann. Mr. McCann had a twin sister Lee Ethel and seven siblings total; and

WHEREAS, Mr. McCann's parents joined the thousands of Mississippians seeking better opportunities during the Great Migration; and

WHEREAS, by 1933, the hard-working McCann family arrived in Chicago where Mr. McCann quickly discovered many of the injustices found in America's southern States were present in his new city; however, these injustices would not keep him from seeking opportunity; and

WHEREAS, Mr. McCann would learn obedience, honesty, integrity, discipline, faith, and hard work from his mother Martha. As the youngest, Mr. McCann received additional guidance from his older brothers, five of which would serve in the Army, Air Force, and Navy; and

WHEREAS, young Arthur watched his older brothers work hard, who in turn, expected nothing less from young Arthur; and

WHEREAS, the streets of Chicago were tough, but the family soon found a church home and fatherly guidance under the teaching of the late great, Bishop Louis H. Ford; and

WHEREAS, the McCann family would be one of the first families of Ford's St. Paul Church of God in Christ founded in 1937. Mr. McCann's mother and sister would serve as missionaries in the church while Mr. McCann and his oldest brother would be Deacons, serving over 60 years; and

WHEREAS, a young Arthur attended Farren Elementary and thrived at DuSable High School where he would build lifelong friendships with young men and women who would become African- American community leaders and trail blazers of Chicago. Mr. McCann developed friendships with such future leaders as former Chicago Mayor Harold Washington and former Cook County Commissioner and Cook County Board President John Stroger. Making friends was easy for Mr. McCann, known affectionately as "Art". Mr. McCann's great personality, people skills, humor, and well-groomed appearance made him an engaging and welcomed member of any conversation. His love of history and art lead him to take up sketching and painting. An ability noticed by his teachers; and

WHEREAS, in 1952, Mr. McCann followed in his brothers' footsteps to serve his country in the United States Marine Corp. The U.S. Marine Corps' guiding principles 'Improvise Adapt & Overcome' would be foundational in his life. Throughout his life Mr. McCann would prioritize visiting veterans at Jessie Brown VA and Saturday meetings with the men in Washington Park; and

WHEREAS, Mr. McCann's pride and joy was his family. Mr. McCann met his lovely wife of 51 years, Dr. Alice Faye Sharp-McCann at St. Paul Church of God in Christ. They would marry on March 7, 1970 and have three daughters, Tammy, Allison, and April, raising his girls in the South Shore neighborhood; and

WHEREAS, Mr. McCann's girls brightened his life and gave him five grandchildren, to whom he was "Pa Pa". Each day Mr. McCann would find a new way to love and spoil his children. Mr. McCann often engaged in deep discussions with his son-in laws and nephews. When asked "what's the secret to a good life?" Mr. McCann said, "giving to others, work hard, and be a good steward over your family and finances"; and

WHEREAS, Mr. McCann was a role model to the boys in his family and community. Never a man to dress down, Mr. McCann always wore a suit or sport coat and slacks. Mr. McCann's nephews often said how they admired how well Mr. McCann dressed and lived. Mr. McCann demonstrated principles of manhood emphasizing Faith, Family, And Community; and

WHEREAS, Mr. McCann applied to become a Chicago Police Officer after returning home from active duty with the intent to continue to serve his community as he served his country. Mr. McCann was the only African-American in his class and on March 1,1957, The City of Chicago swore Mr. McCann in as a police officer. Mr. McCann began a career working as a Youth Officer at Central Headquarters; and

WHEREAS, Arthur devoted his services to mentoring young assailants while assisting the families with finding support through his work on special assignments concerning youth gangs. Mr. McCann became highly decorated with numerous awards highlighting his dedication, service, and commitment to the community he served; and

WHEREAS, in 1968, Arthur was the only African American in his graduating class promoted to the rank of Sergeant. The Chicago Police Department assigned Mr. McCann to the Intelligence Division, Youth Divisions, Vice Control Unit, Gambling, and Prostitution units. He would later receive an Honorable Mention for apprehending a purse snatcher while off duty with his family; and

WHEREAS, Mr. McCann's character, work ethic, and love for the uniform made him a sought after officer from many commanders in the Chicago Police Department. Mr. McCann committed his service to protecting others providing additional pro-bono services to dignitaries as personal security. Mr. McCann's work ethic was unmatched with his simple attitude "work hard, do your best, and help others"; and

WHEREAS, Mr. McCann would later take on the roles of Director of Security at Loop College and Investigator Cook County State's Attorney's Office Child Support Division after spending most of his career with the Chicago Police Department; and

WHEREAS, Mr. McCann's storied career allowed him to serve under five mayors, witness the election of Chicago's first Black Mayor, the election of America's first Black President, the election of the first Black Female Vice President, and the election of Chicago's first Black Female Mayor; and

WHEREAS, Mr. McCann was always ready to serve. Mr. McCann understood the value of engagement in the community and modelling his engagement through dedication for those who saw him as a role model. Mr. McCann served on the 7200 S. Luella Block Club, South Shore Commission, Operation PUSH, NAACP, Urban League, Fifth Ward Democratic Organization, YMCA, George L. Giles American Legion Post #87, Scout Master Boy Scouts of America, and numerous police associations. Mr. McCann was friends with and supported the political campaigns of many past and current office holders and provided security support at polling places on election day; and

WHEREAS, Mr. McCann retired from the Chicago Police Department in 1986 after 29 years of dedicated and decorated service. Mr. McCann was also a proud United States Marine Veteran and retired Investigator Cook County State's Attorney. Moreover, Mr. McCann served as Director of Security for The Blackstone Hotel and Loop College currently known as Harold Washington College. If you met Mr. McCann, you loved him. Mr. McCann was the epitome of "Officer Friendly" and because of his compassionate nature, he developed the engagement skills necessary to build rapport with anyone; and

WHEREAS, After retiring, Mr. McCann continued serving at St. Paul Church of God In Christ Community Development Corporation on its Deacon Board as Treasurer, church trustee, and advisor to many community leaders and friends; and

WHEREAS, on March 28th, 2021 Arthur L. McCann transitioned this life to join his beloved family who preceded him in death. They include Parents Ollie and Martha Battle McCann, his sisters: Ruth and Lee Ethel, his brothers: Wilbert, Willard, Eddie Lee, Ezra, James and Leo. After the death penalty was abolished in Illinois, she served as Deputy Chief of the Homicide Task Force and Deputy Chief of the Felony Trial Division. In 2012, Ms. Campanelli became the Deputy Public Defender in charge of all five Suburban districts in Cook County, a position she held until her appointment as the Public Defender; and

Campanelli, on becoming the Public Defender identified four primary initiatives bond court reform, strengthening problem-solving courts, community outreach, and professional development. Strides have continued to be achieved in all four categories, with cooperation and collaboration from the other criminal court stakeholders; and

Campanelli worked with the Chief Judge of Cook County to secure the right of public defenders to enter police stations and represent those under arrest and in police custody, whenever the person arrested requests to talk with an attorney. RECOGNIZING BLACK MATERNAL HEALTH WEEK AND MINORITY HEALTH MONTH IN COOK COUNTY

WHEREAS, the month of April is National Minority Health Month, a month-long initiative to advance health equity across the country on behalf of all racial and ethnic minorities; and

WHEREAS, Black women in the United States experience unacceptably poor maternal health outcomes, including disproportionately high rates of death related to pregnancy or childbirth, and are three to four times more likely to experience a pregnancy-related death than white women, and Illinois has maternal death statistics even higher than the national average with Black women in Illinois six times as likely to die of a pregnancy-related condition than white women; and

WHEREAS, Black women are more likely to experience preventable maternal death compared with white women, and Black women's heightened risk of pregnancy-related death spans income and education levels; and

WHEREAS, both societal and health system factors contribute to the high rates of poor health outcomes and maternal mortality for Black women, who are more likely to experience barriers to obtaining quality care and often face racial discrimination throughout their lives; and

WHEREAS, public policies and medical practice should incentivize providing patient-centered care that focuses on Black women's individualized needs, including non-clinical, social needs. Moreover, policies should endeavor to eradicate cultural biases and discrimination in medical practice and medical education, increase provider diversity in maternity care and hold individual providers and hospital systems accountable if they fail to provide unbiased, high-quality, evidence-based care; and

WHEREAS, African American & Latinx communities have endured historically bad treatment with our healthcare system, and National Minority Health Month is a time to re-double our efforts to improve this system by listening to their concerns and work to build the trust that was lost over generations of poor treatment; and

WHEREAS, on January 27, 2020, the United States Secretary of Health and Human Services declared that COVID-19, a respiratory illness spread by close contact through respiratory droplets, presents a public health emergency, and the World Health Organization characterized the COVID-19 outbreak as a pandemic on March 11, 2020; and

WHEREAS, COVID-19 continues to be a serious threat across the U.S. and Cook County, and

WHEREAS, many hospitals across the U.S. already have a higher load of COVID-19 patients than ever before since the pandemic began, and the director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Dr. Robert Redfield, warned last month that the next few months of the pandemic would be among "the most difficult in the public health history of this nation" and;

WHEREAS, as of January 19, 2021 there have been 194,898 confirmed cases of SARS-CoV-2 in Suburban Cook County under the jurisdiction of the Cook County Department of Public Health with 3,639 reported deaths; and

WHEREAS, on December 11, 2020, the FDA approved emergency use authorization of the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine; and

WHEREAS, on December 18, 2020, the FDA authorized the emergency use of the Moderna COVID-19 Vaccine in individuals 18 years of age or older; and

WHEREAS, the approval has quickly ramped up the federal government's distribution of the potentially lifesaving vaccine to 64 states, territories and major cities across the nation; and

WHEREAS, initial doses of Pfizer's vaccine have been limited as manufacturing increases, with priority given to health-care workers and nursing homes first, but with subsequent phases the distribution will become available to a wider portion of the populace; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Department of Public Health (CCDPH) is the Illinois certified local health department for suburban Cook County, Illinois, with the exception of Evanston, Skokie, Oak Park, and Stickney Township, serving 127 municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Department of Public Health (CCDPH) working alongside the Cook County Department of Emergency Management and Regional Security is charged with making the COVID-19 vaccine available to people in CCDPH's jurisdiction of suburban Cook County; and

WHEREAS, CCDPH is working with partners at all levels, including hospitals, health care providers and community leaders, to develop flexible and responsive COVID-19 vaccination programs that can accommodate different vaccines; and

WHEREAS, it is paramount that as the vaccines become more readily available we work together and take advantage of all available resources in order to effectively administer the difficult and complex task of mass immunization so that we can overcome this healthcare crisis and look towards recovery; and

WHEREAS, equally important will be to ensure the vaccines are distributed in an equitable fashion, prioritizing those areas and residents of the county that have been most impacted by COVID-19 as a result of longstanding disparities in healthcare system access and delivery.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Health and Hospitals Committee convene a meeting to discuss the Cook County Department of Public Health's COVID-19 vaccination planning for Suburban Cook County; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Cook County Department of Public Health and any other identified Cook County entity involved in Cook County COVID-19 response will provide a monthly COVID-19 update to the Cook County Health and Hospitals Committee. COOK COUNTY BOARD JOINT COMMITTEE MEETINGS

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 2 Administration, Sec. 2-102 and Sec. 2-109 of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as Follows:

Sec. 2-71. Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in Article III, County Board of the Cook County Code, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this Section.

Board or County Board means the Cook County Board of Commissioners.

Clerk means the Clerk of the County Board, appointed by the County Clerk.

Commissioner means any duly elected or duly appointed Cook County Board Commissioner, and means the same as "member" of the Board.

Commission means any commission, task force, advisory committee authorized by the Cook County Board pursuant to Section 2-112 to address an issue of concern to the County relevant to a Standing Committee, but shall not include the Human Rights Commission, the Economic Development Advisory Committee, the Justice Advisory Council, Juvenile Temporary Detention Center Advisory Board, or other Commissions that are authorized to be permanent in nature.

Committee means a committee of the Board and includes a standing committee, a special committee, joint committee, and a standing or special subcommittee of a committee.

Committee of the whole means a committee comprised of all Commissioners as required by this division.

Joint Committee means the combinations of any standing committee and/or subcommittee as defined in Sec. 2-109(i).

Majority means a simple majority of those Commissioners present and entitled to vote on a question.

Majority of those elected means a majority of the total number of Commissioners entitled by law to be elected to the Board, irrespective of the number of elected or appointed Commissioners actually serving in office. So long as 17 Commissioners are entitled to be elected to the Board, a vote of a "majority of those elected" shall mean nine affirmative votes.

Majority votes. Except as otherwise provided in these rules, and except for questions for which a higher majority is required by law, all questions shall be determined by a majority vote of those Commissioners entitled to vote. A vote of "present" shall not be counted in determining the number of Commissioners voting on a question.

President means the President of the Cook County Board of Commissioners.

Quorum means a majority of those elected (nine Commissioners when board is comprised of 17 members) shall constitute a quorum for a meeting of the Board or a meeting of a committee of the whole. A majority of Commissioners appointed to any committee, other than a committee of the whole, shall constitute a quorum for a meeting of such committee or subcommittee.

Secretary means the Secretary to the Board, duly appointed by the President.

Standing Committee means the standing committees provided in Subsection 2-109(i).

Term means the four-year term of office established by State law for the President and the Commissioners.

Sec. 2-102. Interpretation, force and effect.

- (a) *Applicability*. The meetings and actions of the Board, including all of its committees, shall be governed by this division.
- (b) Effect of State law. Except as otherwise specifically provided in this division, this division supersedes all provisions of Illinois statute to the extent of any conflict or inconsistency, except for statutes that, by their terms, specifically limit home rule units pursuant to Article VII, Section 6(g) or 6(h) of the 1970 Constitution of the State of Illinois.
- (c) Effective date. This division shall be in full force and effect upon adoption, and shall remain in full force and effect except as amended in accordance herewith, or until superseded by new rules adopted as part of the organization of a newly constituted Board at the commencement of a term.
- (d)*Interpretation*. This division shall be interpreted and applied to foster the goals and purposes set forth in Section 2-101. This division is to be construed in accordance with the customary American usage and meaning of parliamentary terms and expressions and the plain meaning of the ordinary words appearing herein. In case of ambiguous application, this division shall be applied in a manner that fosters openness, accountability and fairness in the operation of the Board.
- (e) Adoption of rules. At the commencement of a term, the Board may adopt new rules of organization and procedure by ordinance setting forth such rules in their entirety and repealing these rules. Such ordinance must be adopted by a majority of those elected. Rules so adopted shall supersede these rules.
- (f) Rules for committee meetings. The rules of procedure for all committee, subcommittee and special committee meetings shall be the same as for Board meetings, except that committees composed of less than the entire Board shall require only a majority of the committee members for a quorum.
- (g) Amendment or suspension of rules. Any provision of this division may be temporarily suspended by majority vote, upon motion of any Commissioner specifying the rule to be suspended.
- (h) Remote meetings. All public meetings of the Board and its committees, joint committees, and subcommittees may be conducted by means of electronic, video, audio, or telephonic connection ("remote meeting") for the duration of the Illinois Gubernatorial Disaster Proclamation, including any extensions thereto, related to COVID-19 or a public health crisis. A member who desires to attend and participate in a remote public meeting shall do so by the designated electronic means. For purposes of conducting a remote meeting, the terms "written", "in writing", "document" and "copy" in these rules includes printed or electronic means, and a rule that requires an instrument to be handed to another member or the meeting Chair may be accomplished by electronic transmission.

Sec. 2-103. Quorum required for meetings of the Board, its Committees, Joint Committees, and Subcommittees.

- (a)A quorum must be present at any meeting of the Board, its committees, joint committees, or subcommittees to conduct business except for those circumstances detailed in this subsection.
- (b)Should a quorum not be present at any meeting of the Board, the meeting shall stand in recess until a quorum shall attend. The Commissioners present shall be competent to adjourn, receive public testimony but take no formal action and/or recess the meeting to a date certain.
- (c)Should a quorum not be present at a committee, joint committee, or subcommittee meeting of the Board, the Commissioners present shall be competent to adjourn, receive public testimony but take no formal action and/or recess the meeting to a date certain.
- (d)Any joint committee consisting of any standing committee, pursuant to Section 2-109(i), which is not a committee of the whole, shall require a quorum of members from each committee comprising the joint committee, in order for the joint committee to take action on items referred to the joint committee. If a Commissioner(s) belongs to two or more comprising committees and/or subcommittees, the Joint Committee shall count the Commissioner towards the quorum of each committee he or she belongs, which comprises the joint committee.
- (e)If the joint committee includes a standing committee, pursuant to Section 2-109(i), which is a committee of the whole, the committee will require quorum of members for the committee as a whole in order to take action on items referred to the joint committee.

Sec. 2-104. Majority vote to determine questions at meetings of the Board, its Committees, <u>Joint Committees</u>, and Subcommittees.

Except as otherwise provided in these rules, and except for questions for which a higher majority is required by law, all questions shall be determined by a majority vote of those Commissioners entitled to vote. A vote of "present" shall not be counted in determining the number of Commissioners voting on a question.

Sec. 2-105. Prior notice to public for meetings of the Board, its Committees, Joint Committees, and Subcommittees.

- (a) Minimum time requirement for notice of meeting. No less than four business days before any meeting, not including Special Board or Emergency meetings, notice and an agenda for such meeting shall be provided by the Clerk for meetings of the Board or the Secretary for meetings of a Committee or Subcommittee.
- (b) Minimum time requirement for new items. Additional ("New") items added to a previously issued agenda must be posted at least 48 hours in advance for the Board, committee, joint committee, or subcommittee to take final action on the matter. New items posted with less than 48 hours' notice must be withdrawn, deferred, or referred to committee.
- (c) Distribution of notice and agendas of the meeting. The Clerk or Secretary as required shall distribute to the President, all Commissioners and all news media that have requested notice of meetings, shall be post in the Office of the County Clerk and at the location where the meeting is to be held and shall

be made available to the public in the office of the Secretary. In addition, notices and agendas of all meetings shall be posted on a County owned website.

Sec. 2-106. Public Testimony at meetings of the Board, its Committees, Joint Committees, and Subcommittees.

The Board encourages public participation in the legislative process. The following rules shall apply at any meeting of the Board and its committees at which public comment or testimony is taken:

- (a) Public testimony at all meetings. Subject to the provisions herein, public testimony will be permitted at all meetings of the Board, its committees, joint committees, and subcommittees. Any member of the general public may address the Board or any of its committees at any remote meeting required to be open to the public under the Open Meetings Act (5 ILCS 120/1, et seq.) in writing, or orally from a remote location by means of electronic, video, audio, or telephonic connection if permitted in the meeting notice.
- (b) Authorization to speak. Authorization as a public speaker or to provide written testimony to be read into the record of a meeting of the Board, its committees, joint committees, and subcommittees shall be granted to those individuals who have submitted in writing, their name, municipality of residence, subject matter, and organization (if any) to the Secretary.
- (c) Public comment period. Duly authorized public speakers shall be called upon to deliver testimony at a time specified in the meeting agenda, or at the discretion of the chair, but prior to final action by the meeting body as is practicable. For remote meetings, the public comment period may be limited to written testimony which will be read into the record.
- (d) Germane subject matter encouraged. Public testimony should be germane to a specific item(s) on the meeting agenda. To preserve order and decorum and in the interest of efficiency, the presiding officer may impose subject matter limits on public comment or testimony.
- (e) Time limit for public speakers. Written public testimony or oral testimony will be limited to three minutes. The Secretary will keep track of the time and advise when the time for public testimony has expired. Responses to inquiries of the public speaker by the presiding officer or members shall not count towards any time limit. With leave, the presiding officer or members may extend a public speaker's time as desired.
- (f)Prohibited behavior for public speakers. Public speaker or written testimony shall not include the use vulgar, abusive or otherwise inappropriate language when addressing the Board; failure to act appropriately; failure to speak to an item that is germane to the meeting, or failure to adhere to the time requirements may result in expulsion from the meeting and/or disqualify the person from providing future testimony.
- (g) Disruptions of meetings prohibited. Disruptions of meetings are prohibited. Disruptions include, but are not limited to:
 - (1) Speech or testimony by an individual after expiration of the time allotted for the speaker's public comment or testimony;

- (2) Speech or testimony by an individual that is not germane to a specific item or items on the meeting agenda;
- (3) Speech or testimony by an individual who has not been recognized by the presiding officer for public comment or testimony, who is speaking in a volume louder than a low, conversational level appropriate for communication between persons seated next to each other in the chamber, or whose speech is audible by others;
- (4) Holding or placing a banner or sign during a meeting in a way that may endanger other individuals or that obstructs the free passage or view of others attending or viewing the meeting;
- (5) Verbal comments and testimony must be conducted in respectful speech with no personal attacks:
- (6) If an individual engages in disruption of the meeting, including, but not limited to, any of the actions described above, the presiding officer may: rule the individual out of order, direct the individual to cease the activity and impose other reasonable conditions for the individual's continued presence at the meeting. If the individual does not immediately comply with the presiding officer's order, the presiding officer may direct the removal of the individual from the meeting. Unless otherwise ordered by the presiding officer, any individual ordered to be removed from a meeting is excluded from returning to that meeting, unless the decision of the presiding officer is overruled by a majority vote of those members in attendance. Any two members may place before the body the question of whether to permit the individual to return to the same meeting;
- (7) If an individual is removed either from two or more committee meetings within a 15-day period or from two or more consecutive meetings of the Board, the Board President or Committee Chairperson may exclude the individual from participation in public comment or testimony periods at future Board or committee meetings:
 - a. The Board President or Committee Chairperson shall notify the individual in writing of the type of exclusion, the specific reasons for the exclusion and the specific terms and length of the exclusion.
 - b. The notice of exclusion shall advise that the individual may submit written comments to the Clerk for distribution to the Board members at future public comment or testimony periods.

- c. The notice of exclusion shall be filed with the Clerk, who shall post it on the door to the Board chambers and on the Board's web page, provide a copy of the notice to Board members and mail the notice to the individual's last known address, if any. The notice is effective when posted. The exclusion order shall remain posted on the door to the chambers for the duration of the exclusion period.
- (8) In determining the scope and length of an individual's exclusion, the Board President or Committee Chairperson may consider the seriousness of the disruptions to the orderly conduct of the meeting, the number of disruptions in which the individual participated and other reasons deemed relevant by the President or Committee Chairperson.
 - a. The Board President or Committee Chairperson may issue an exclusion from future participation in public comment or testimony periods for up to 28 calendar days.
 - b. At the next regular meeting of the Board, following the filing and posting of the exclusion notice, the exclusion order may be overruled or modified by a majority vote of those Commissioners in attendance. Any two members may place before the body the question of whether to overrule or modify the exclusion decision.
- (9) Any individual excluded from participation in future public comment or testimony periods may appeal the exclusion by submitting a written appeal to the Clerk within five calendar days after the exclusion notice is posted. The Clerk shall distribute copies of the appeal to all Board members. The Board shall consider the appeal at the next regularly scheduled Board meeting if any two members place it before the body. The individual's exclusion from public comment or testimony periods shall remain in effect during the Board's consideration of the appeal.

Sec. 2-109. Committees, generally.

(a) Committees. The committees of the Board shall be comprised of the following, except that subcommittees may not create subcommittees:

- (1) Standing committees and their standing subcommittees as created by resolution of the Board;
- (2) Committees and subcommittees as created by resolution of the Board;
- (3) Committees and subcommittees as created by ordinance of the Board;
- (4) Special committees created by Board resolution;
- (5) Special subcommittees created by standing committees or by special committees or by resolution; and
- (6) Special committees and subcommittees created by ordinance of the Board.
- (7) Joint committees as created by written consent between chairpersons of the comprising committees and/or subcommittees of the Board.
 - a. Comprising committee and/or subcommittee chairpersons shall consent to forming a joint committee relative to a specific item or item(s) on, or to appear on, the Cook County Board Agenda. Consenting chairpersons shall submit the written consent to the Secretary to the Board, President of the Board of Commissioners, and Commissioners of the Cook County Board, no later than two (2) days prior to the County Board, committee, subcommittee, and/or special committee meeting, for which County Board, committee, subcommittee and/or special committee may call the item or items forming the basis of the joint committee's formation.
 - b. Submitted written consent shall include, but is not limited to:
 - (i) The item or items forming the basis for forming the joint committee;
 - (ii) The intention of all consenting committee chairpersons to refer the listed items to the formed joint committee;
 - (iii) The names of the comprising committees and comprising committee chairs;
 - (iv) Which comprising committee chair will preside over the joint committee meeting; and
 - (v) Other such information and details relevant to the efficient execution of the joint committee meeting.
 - c. The formation of a Joint Committee will not constitute a standing joint committee.

 Joint Committees will dissolve upon taking final action on items referred to the committee or at the conclusion of a term should the joint committee fail to take final actions on referred items, pursuant to Sec. 2-211 of this code.

d. No joint committee shall form absent written consent from the chairpersons of the comprising committees pursuant to Sec - 2-109(a)(7).

(b) Meetings of committees, joint committees, and subcommittees.

- (1) Committees and subcommittees shall hold meetings pursuant to a request of the Chairperson of the committee or subcommittee and notice and agenda prepared by the Secretary. Meetings shall be held at the County Seat, in the Board Room of the County Building, unless another place within the County shall be designated by the Chairperson.
- (2) A committee or subcommittee meeting may be cancelled by the Chairperson by providing no less than 24 hours' advance written notice that said meeting has been cancelled to the Commissioners and to the public.
- (3) On a day with a scheduled meeting of the Forest Preserve District of Cook County Board of Commissioners, no committee of the Cook County Board of Commissioners may be held until all meetings or committees of the Forest Preserve District of Cook County Board of Commissioners have adjourned.
- (4) Committees and/or subcommittees, which form joint committees may hold joint committee meetings with consent and agreement, in writing, of the Chairpersons of the committees seeking to hold a joint meeting, at the call of the comprising committees and/or subcommittees Chairperson who will preside over the joint committee meeting, and notice and agenda prepared by the Secretary. Meetings shall be held at the County Seat, in the Board Room of the County Building, unless another place within the County shall be designated by the Chairperson. No action shall be taken at a joint meeting unless a quorum is present for all comprising committees and/or subcommittees.

(c) Notice and agendas. The notice and agenda shall briefly describe all items that will be considered at the meeting. Material pertinent to an item on a committee, joint committee, or subcommittee agenda shall be supplied, along with the agenda, to the President and to each of the Commissioners. With the exception of materials that are confidential as provided by law, such material shall also be available to the public in the office of the Secretary.

- (1) Notwithstanding any other rules governing origination of items on the Board agenda, including subsection (o) of this Section, the following items types are permitted for origin with their respective committees: Litigation Pending; Recommendations of the Zoning Board of Appeals; Journals of Proceedings; Court Ordered Payments; Workers Compensations Claims; Subrogation Recoveries; Self-Insurance Claims; Proposed Settlements; Patient Arrestee Claims; Employee Injury Compensation Claims; Revenue Report; and the Cook County Health And Hospitals System Monthly Report.
- (2) Amendments or substitutes to any item placed on an agenda of any meeting of a committee, joint committee, or subcommittee shall be submitted to the Secretary no later than 24 hours in advance of the meeting at which the item will be considered. Upon receipt of the

amendment or substitute, the Secretary shall immediately provide the amendment or substitute to the President, all Commissioners and all news media that have requested notice of meetings and it shall be posted in the Office of the County Clerk and at the location where the meeting is to be held, and shall be made available to the public in the office of the Secretary. This rule may be waived for technical amendments or emergencies.

(3) Notwithstanding any action to be undertaken by committees, joint committees, or subcommittees pursuant to this Section, only the Board may take final action on any item referred to a committee, joint committee, or subcommittee. Any item contained on a committee or subcommittee agenda, as properly noticed pursuant to subsection (f) of this Section, shall also be referenced on the next regularly scheduled Board Meeting Agenda under the Committee Items Requiring Board Action for purposes of consideration and possible action by the Board. If a properly noticed item contained on a committee, joint committee, or subcommittee agenda is not included in the Committee Items Requiring Board Action section of a Board Meeting Agenda, the Secretary to the Board of Commissioners may include that item in an errata and the Board of Commissioners may consider the item as if it were properly noticed.

(d) Membership and officers of standing committees.

- (1) At the commencement of each term, the members of each standing committee and standing subcommittee shall be appointed for the term by resolution adopted by a majority of those elected.
- (2) At the commencement of each term, the Chair and Vice-Chair of each standing committee and standing subcommittee shall be appointed for the term by resolution of the Board adopted by a majority of those elected.
- (3) The President shall be an ex officio member of all committees.
- (4) Membership and officers of standing committees may be amended by a resolution of the Board adopted by a majority of those elected.

(e) *Authority to call meetings*. The Chair of a committee or subcommittee shall have the authority to call and preside at meetings of such committee or subcommittee. The Chair of a committee or subcommittee, who, according to the written consent of the comprising committees and/or subcommittees forming the joint committee, shall have the authority to call a joint committee meeting pursuant to Sec. 2-109 of this Code. In the absence of the Chair, the Vice-Chair shall perform the functions of the Chair.

(f) Vacancies, Committee Chairs and Committee Members.

(1) A vacancy on a committee, or in the Chair or Vice-Chair position on a committee, shall be created when a member resigns from such position or ceases to be a Commissioner. Resignations shall be made in writing to the Secretary, who shall promptly notify the President and all Commissioners.

- (2) Vacancies on committees or in the positions of Chair or Vice-Chair shall be filled by appointment by the same appointing authority as the initial appointments to such committee. In the case of committee appointments made by the Board, the Board shall fill vacancies by resolution. In the case of vacancies on special subcommittees that were created by committees, the parent committee shall fill the vacancy by motion.
- (g) Participation in debate. Any Commissioner, regardless of whether a Chair, Vice-Chair or member of the committee, and the President shall be afforded the courtesy of participating in debate on any item before a committee.
- (h) Special committees and subcommittees. The resolution or motion creating a special committee or special subcommittee shall specify the subject matter of the special committee or subcommittee and the number of members to be appointed thereto, and may specify a reporting date during the term in which event the special committee or subcommittee shall be abolished as of such date. Unless an earlier date is specified by resolution or motion, special committees and subcommittees shall expire at the end of the term.
- (i) Standing committees. The standing committees, the standing subcommittees and the number of members to be appointed to each (including Chair and Vice-Chair, but excluding ex officio members) are as follows:
 - (1) Audit, seven members. (The County Auditor and Chief Financial Officer are ex officio, nonvoting members of the Audit Committee.)
 - (2) Asset Management, nine members.
 - (3) Business and Economic Development, nine members.
 - (4) Contract Compliance, nine members.
 - (5) Criminal Justice, Committee of the Whole.
 - (6) Environment and Sustainability, seven members.
 - (7) Finance, Committee of the Whole, with the following subcommittees with the number of members indicated:
 - a. Litigation, seven members.
 - b. Tax Delinquency, five members.
 - c. Workers' Compensation, five members.
 - (8) Health and Hospitals, Committee of the Whole.
 - (9) Emergency Management and Regional Security, Committee of the Whole.

- (10) Human Relations, seven members.
- (11) Labor, nine members.
- (12) Law Enforcement, seven members.
- (13) Legislation and Intergovernmental Relations, Committee of the Whole.
- (14) Pension, seven members.
- (15) Transportation, Committee of the Whole.
- (16) Rules and Administration, nine members.
- (17) Technology and Innovation, nine members.
- (18) Veterans, seven members.
- (19) Workforce, Housing and Community Development, five members.
- (20) Zoning and Building, Committee of the Whole.
- (j)Referrals to committees.
- (1) The Board may by motion refer any item before the Board to a Committee or to a subcommittee. The Board may by motion refer any item before the Board to a joint committee, provided the joint committee's comprising committee chairs written consent, prior to the Board's motion to refer the item or items, stated the joint committee's intention to receive the item or items by referral. The Chair of a committee may refer an item pending in that committee to a subcommittee of that committee. An item referred by the Board to any committee, joint committee, or subcommittee, or by a committee chair to a subcommittee, shall not be jointly referred to any other committee or subcommittee. Only upon the return of the item to the Board, either by report of the committee or by the Board's discharge of the item from the committee or subcommittee, may the Board refer the item to another committee or subcommittee.
- (2) Any item that creates a new Ordinance or amends an existing section or sections of the Code shall be referred to a committee, joint committee, or subcommittee upon its initial introduction to the Board. Upon referral, the committee shall hold a hearing on the item. Following the hearing, the item shall be reported to the Board or discharged by the committee, joint committee, or subcommittee.
- (3) The Board may vote for immediate consideration of the item by a majority vote.

(4) No committee, joint committee, or subcommittee shall meet for any purpose other than to consider one or more items referred by the Board.

(k) Committee deliberation and reporting. Upon the completion of deliberations by a committee, joint committee, or subcommittee on an item referred to it, a committee, joint committee, or subcommittee in conjunction with the Secretary to the Board shall inform the members of the actions of the committee, joint committee, or subcommittee on the item to their parent committee or to the Board.

Specifically, action is defined as motions, duly seconded and carried, to adopt one of the $\frac{\text{six seven}}{\text{seven}}$ following statements of intent with respect to an item:

- (1) Approve;
- (2) Approve as Amended;
- (3) Not Approve;
- (4) Not Approve as Amended;
- (5) Receive and File; and
- (6) Returned With No Recommendation-; and
- (7) For Report Only, No Action Taken:

The committee's adoption of any one of the above <u>six seven</u> statements of intent shall constitute conclusive action by the committee on an item, and shall automatically discharge the committee from further jurisdiction of the item. Absent the attachment of one of these six statements of intent to the Communication Numbered item, such item will remain in committee unless discharged by the Board, or until the item is received and filed.

A committee, joint committee, or subcommittee may also inform the members that action by the committee, joint committee, or subcommittee, was deferred, referred to a subcommittee, or special subcommittee or otherwise inconclusive.

(1)Committee meeting minutes. Prior to the next scheduled meeting of the committee or subcommittee, the Secretary shall prepare the minutes of the meeting. The minutes shall contain: a list of the attendees; an account of the items considered; a summary of the deliberations, including motions and amendments proposed and/or adopted; all votes taken; the result of said votes; and, any attachments to the record as ordered by the Chair. The minutes of a meeting may be created and preserved in an electronic format on a publicly available County owned website as maintained by the Secretary.

(m)Joint committee meeting actions incorporated into comprising committees and/or subcommittees' minutes. Prior to the next scheduled meeting of the comprising committees and/or subcommittees, the Secretary shall prepare descriptions of the joint committees' meeting actions to incorporate into the committee and/or subcommittee minutes of all comprising committees of the joint

committee. The joint committee's meeting actions description shall include: the date and time of the joint committee meeting; a list of the attendees; which comprising committee or subcommittee chair presided over the meeting; an account of the items considered; a summary of the deliberations, including motions and amendments proposed and/or adopted; all votes taken; the results of said votes; and any attachments to the record as ordered by the presiding comprising committee or subcommittee chair. The minutes of a meeting may be created and preserved in an electronic format on a publicly available County owned website as maintained by the Secretary.

(m)(n)Public hearings of committees. Any committee meeting may, at the discretion of the Chair, be designated as a public hearing; provided that the following requirements are satisfied:

- (1) A paid notice containing the time, place, subject matter of the hearing, and solicitation of pertinent public testimony shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation in Cook County;
- (2) A like notice shall be posted on the County owned website maintained by the Secretary;
- (3) A court reporter is present and reporting all written and oral testimony by members of the public;
- (4) All oral testimony by members of the public shall be the first order of business after the committee is called to order; and
- (5) Any other meeting notification requirements found elsewhere in this Section.

(n)(o)Discharge of committee item by the Board. The Board may discharge any item from committee by a majority vote.

Sec. 2-111. Items pending in committee at conclusion of term.

All items relating to pending litigation, workers' compensation claims or applications made pursuant to the Cook County Zoning Ordinance at the conclusion of each term shall automatically be referred to the successor committee during the succeeding term. Upon conclusion of the 2018-2022 term and each term thereafter, all legislation and other items referred to any committee or subcommittee prior to the last regular meeting of the term of the Board shall automatically be discharged from Committee or joint committee, and shall automatically be received and filed by the Board. The Secretary shall issue a report not less than 60 days prior to the expiration of each term to the President, and chair of each committee and subcommittee, or the last presiding chair of a joint committee, listing all items pending in each committee, joint committee, and subcommittee.

Should a joint committee fail to take a final action on any item or items referred to it by the end of the term, in which the joint committee formed, the joint committee shall dissolve at the end of the term and after the Board receives and files the remaining joint committee items.

ORDINANCE GRANTING A SPECIAL USE LOCATED IN LYONS TOWNSHIP AS AUTHORIZED BY THE COOK COUNTY ZONING ORDINANCE

WHEREAS, the owner of a Subject Property located in Lyons Township described in Section 2 herein, has petitioned the Cook County Board of Commissioners for a Special Use Permit for Planned Unit Development and a companion Variance (V 21-01) in the R-3 Single Family Residence District, be allowed to build a single family residence on a property designated as an "Environmentally Sensitive Area" according to the Cook County Comprehensive Land Use Policies Plan in Section 06 of Lyons Township; and

WHEREAS, the said petition was received by the Zoning Board of Appeals of Cook County as Special Use SU 21-01 & V 21-01, and a virtual public hearing was held in regard to said request after due notice, all in accordance with the Cook County Zoning Ordinance and the Statutes of the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, the Zoning Board of Appeals entered detailed Findings in accordance with the Standards set forth in the Ordinance with the intended as stated in the Findings of Fact, recommending that the Cook County Board of Commissioners grant said application for a Special Use Permit for Planned Unit Development (SU 21-01) and a companion Variance (V 21-01); and

WHEREAS, it is the determination that said request be granted in accordance with the Recommendation of the Zoning Board of Appeals.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Board of Commissioners of Cook County, Illinois:

Section 1: BACKGROUND

That the owner of the following described Subject Property be granted a Special Use Permit for Planned Unit Development (SU 21-01) and a companion Variance (V 21-01) in the R-3 Single Family Residence District and be allowed to build a single family residence on a property designated as an "Environmentally Sensitive Area" according to the Cook County Comprehensive Land Use Policies Plan, in Section 06 of Lyons Township.

Section 2: DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY

The Subject Property consists of approximately 37,921 square feet of total land area and is located on the west side of Oak Grove Avenue approximately 75 feet north of Railroad Avenue, in Section 06 of Lyons Township, Cook County District #17. The Subject Property's common address is 9101 Oak Grove, Burr Ridge, Unincorporated Cook County, Illinois 60527. The PIN is 23-06-202-008-0000.

LEGAL DESCRIPTION

LOT NINE (9) IN PANTKE'S SUBDIVISION, BEING A SUBDIVISION OF PART OF THE NORTHEAST 1/4 (LYING NORTHWESTERLY OF RAILROAD) OF SECTION 6, T3 TOWNSHIP 37 NORTH, RANGE12, EAST OF THE THIRD PRINCIPAL MERIDIAN, ACCORDING TO THE PLAT THEREOF RECORDED AUGUST 9, 1939 AS DOCUMENT NUMBER 12352515, IN COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS.

Section 3: That the Special Use for a Planned Unit Development in the R-3 Single Family Residence District, as mentioned in Section 1 of this Ordinance is hereby authorized.

FINDINGS OF THE ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS

Pursuant to §13.8.9 of the Cook County Zoning Ordinance, the Board makes the following Findings of Fact as to the Special Use:

1. The establishment, maintenance or operation of the Special Use will not be detrimental to or endanger the public health, safety or general welfare.

The proposed Special Use will not be detrimental or endanger the public health safety or general welfare. There are multiple single-family residences in proximity of the subject property on both sides of Oak Grove Avenue and the surrounding area. Directly south on Oak Grove Avenue and across the street to the east are single-unit residential properties. The single-unit residential property type has been established on the 9100 block of Oak Grove Avenue.

2. The establishment, maintenance or operation of the Special Use will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of the other property in the immediate vicinity for the uses already permitted, nor diminish and impair property values within the neighborhood.

The proposed Special Use will be safe and will not impair the enjoyment of the single-family properties in the immediate vicinity. The subject property had been an existing use for several years and has not diminished property values to the surrounding properties. The proposed use will be an enhancement for property values as the use will be a significant upgrade compared to the property it will be replacing.

3. The establishment, maintenance or operation of the Special Use will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of surrounding property for permitted uses.

The proposed use will not impede the development and improvement of the surrounding properties. The subject property use has existing for several years and has not obstructed the development of the surrounding properties. The surrounding uses are residential which conforms to the proposed use.

4. Adequate utilities, access roads, drainage and other necessary facilities have been or are being provided.

The proposed Special Use has been existing for several years and already has adequate utilities, access roads, drainage and other necessary facilities for its operation. The allowance of the Special Use will not overburden the established infrastructure

5. Adequate measures have been, or will be taken, to provide ingress and egress designed to minimize traffic congestion in public streets.

The subject property is located in an area where Oak Grove Avenue is a secondary residential street. There was sufficient access for the previous single-family use. Additionally, the proposed

6. Establishment, maintenance or operation of the Special Use shall in all other respects conform to all Cook County ordinances, unless otherwise authorized by the Cook County Board of Commissioners pursuant to the recommendation of the Zoning Board of Appeals.

Upon granting of the proposed Special Use, the subject property will conform to all respects of the Cook County ordinances unless otherwise authorized by the Cook County Board of Commissioners pursuant to the recommendation of the Zoning Boards of Appeals.

Pursuant to §9.5.10 of the Cook County Zoning Ordinance, the Board makes the following Findings of Fact as to the Planned Unit Development ("PUD") Standards:

1. PUD conforms with the planning objectives, policies and maps of the County as specified in the Cook County Comprehensive Land Use and Policies Plan.

The proposed use is compatible with Cook County Comprehensive Land Use and Policies Plan. The proposed use is a residential home in a residential area.

2. PUD is of a type and character and contains uses that are needed in the area.

The proposed use conforms to the character of the area and will conform to the demands of the market as a single-family residence in a residential area. The surrounding area is a residential area. Previously, the site has been used as a single-family residential property.

3. PUD is designed and laid out to preserve environmentally sensitive areas, natural resources, habitat and topographic features to the fullest extent possible.

The proposed use will be sensitive to the surrounding environment. It will not impact surrounding environmentally sensitive areas. The mature trees that are scheduled for removal on the site, many of which are in poor condition, will be replaced with new, healthy trees. Many existing trees in good condition will be preserved. The foremost effort will be put to preserve natural resources, habitat and topographic features of the area.

4. PUD is designed in conformity with the provisions of the Cook County Subdivision Manual or any successor subdivision document.

The proposed use will be in conformity to the Cook County Subdivision Manual. The proposed single-family home development will occur on an existing lot of record as to be consistent with the Cook County Subdivision Manual or any successor subdivision document.

5. PUD is designed to provide horizontal spacing between buildings which takes into consideration the purpose and objectives of this article.

The proposed improvement will be designed to allow for sufficient spacing with adjoining properties. The proposed will follow all setbacks as required by Cook County Zoning Ordinance.

6. PUD complies with the industrial performance standards enumerated in Article 6 of this ordinance if the PUD contains industrial uses.

Consistent with the Special Use Standards described above, the proposed single-family home development has no industrial components and therefore does not run afoul of the industrial performance standards.

7. PUD complies with the parking requirements enumerated in Article 11 of this ordinance

The proposed use will have adequate off-street parking. The proposed single-family home will be supported by a private driveway and an attached 4-car garage, which meets the off-street parking requirements for the project.

8. PUD provides appropriate yards, setbacks and buffers between the PUD and adjacent zoning lots.

The proposed use will conform to the applicable improvement setback requirements. The proposed will follow all setbacks as required by Cook County Zoning Ordinance.

9. PUD has adequate utilities, access roads, drainage and other necessary facilities.

The proposed use will provide adequate utilities, access roads and drainage. The proposed is a new single-family residence in an established residential area. All utilities are on site (electricity, natural gas). New septic system and well will be installed to support the new home. The allowance of the PUD will not overburden the established infrastructure.

10. PUD has ingress and egress designed to minimize traffic congestion in public streets.

The proposed use will have a driveway and is designed for minimal impact on local traffic congestion. The proposed home will be supported by ingress and egress points similar to the points of access to the neighboring homes on Oak Grove Avenue.

11. PUD and its maintenance and operation will not be detrimental to or endanger public health, safety or general welfare.

The proposed use will not endanger public health, safety or the general welfare of the neighborhood. The proposed is a single-family residence in an established residential area, and it will not change the characteristics of the area.

12. PUD and its maintenance and operation will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity for the uses already permitted, nor diminish and impair property values within the surrounding area.

The proposed use is a residential use in a residential area and will not diminish or impair property values in this neighborhood. The proposed single-family home would not injure or otherwise threaten the use and enjoyment of other properties located in the immediate vicinity.

13. PUD and its maintenance and operation will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of surrounding property.

The proposed use is a residential use in a residential area and will not impede the orderly development or improvement of surrounding properties. The proposed single-family home would be appropriate and compatible to the other similar improvements in the immediate area.

14. PUD shall provide more open space than would be required in a standard subdivision.

The proposed use will supply an adequate amount of open space. The proposed redevelopment of the Subject Property would maintain open space that exceeds the general requirements of the Cook County Zoning Ordinance. Cook County Zoning Ordinance requires no more 25% of impervious surfaces in R-3 district. In the proposed development, impervious surfaces will cover 19.5%, which leaves additional 5.5% of open space above the requirements.

15. PUD shall be designed to connect to existing or planned pedestrian and bicycle systems in the vicinity.

The proposed redevelopment of the Subject Property would maintain a consistent pattern of single-family home development in an established residential single-family home neighborhood, allowing the proposed single-family home to connect to the existing street, pedestrian, and bicycle systems in the immediate vicinity.

Pursuant to §13.6.3 of the Cook County Zoning Ordinance, the Board makes the following Findings of Fact as to the Variance Standards:

1. Physical surroundings, shape or topographical condition of the property would result in hardship upon the owner, as distinguished from a mere inconvenience, if the provisions of this ordinance were followed.

The existing lot conditions and specifically the 37,921 square feet of total lot area in the R-3 Single Family Residence District in non-conforming. The subject site is 37,921 square feet while the required lot size is 40,000 square feet, without the variance the site could not be improved with a new structure.

2. Physical surroundings, shape or topographical condition of the property would result in hardship upon the owner, as distinguished from a mere inconvenience, if the provisions of this ordinance were followed.

Due to the deficient lot area, these conditions are unique to the subject property and not applicable to the other properties in this zoning district.

3. The Variance sought is not based exclusively upon a desire to make the property more profitable.

The variance is not exclusively sought to make the property more profitable, but rather to replace a vacant property with a new and appealing single-family improvement which conforms to the demands of the residential market.

4. The hardship or alleged difficulty is caused by this ordinance and not by any person presently having an interest in the property.

The hardship is based on lot size and not by anyone associated with the property. The previous use was a single-family residential use which did not conflict in any manner with its existing environment.

5. The Variance will not be detrimental to the public welfare or injurious to other properties or improvements in the neighborhood.

The proposed use will improve a now vacant lot with a modern home. The previous home was not detrimental to the public welfare or injurious to other properties in the neighborhood, nor will a new modern home.

6. The Variance will not impair an adequate supply of light and air to adjacent properties, substantially increase congestion in the public streets, increase the danger of fire, cause increased flooding risk to adjacent property, endanger public safety or substantially diminish or impair property values within adjacent neighborhoods.

The proposed home will not impair adequate light and air to adjacent properties. It will not increase congestion on public streets. WHEREAS, a mob of armed White supremacists, neo-Nazis and domestic terrorists forcibly entered and marauded through the United States Capitol Building, the first-time an enemy group has breached the building since 1814. They attacked Capitol Police Officers, desecrated federal property, destroyed multiple offices, searched for Congresspeople, placed explosive devices around the building; and

WHEREAS, they replaced the United States flag with Trump and Confederate flags, stole property-including electronic devices and critical government documents and attempted to sell the stolen materials to potential foreign enemies; and

WHEREAS, during the sedition by domestic terrorists, President Trump restated via social media that the election had been stolen and told his supporters to "go home," and "I love you"; and

WHEREAS, at least five individuals died during the insurrection, including a U.S. Capitol Police Officer; and

WHEREAS, after several hours, the mob of White Supremacist and domestic terrorists, were overwhelming peacefully escorted from the Capitol Building; and

WHEREAS, lawmakers reconvened and certified the 2020 president election, declaring Joseph R. Biden, Jr. the winner; and

WHEREAS, throughout his presidential campaign and during his administration, President Trump has encouraged and politically profited from discrimination, bigotry, and violence toward the most vulnerable populations; and

WHEREAS, President Trump referred to Haiti and African nations as "shithole countries," claimed that Mexican immigrants are drug dealers and rapists in many cases. He also responded on social media to protesters in Minneapolis following George Floyd's death, that "when the looting starts, the shooting starts."; and

WHEREAS, during his presidential campaign, Donald Trump bragged about directly performing an act of violence when he stated that, "I could stand in the middle of Fifth Avenue and shoot somebody, and I wouldn't lose any voters"; and

WHEREAS, due to the complete disregard for human life and democracy, all individuals that incited or participated in the domestic terrorist attack at the United States Capitol Building should be held criminally responsible; and

WHEREAS, if any Cook County employee incited or participated in the domestic attack at the United States Capitol Building, immediate disciplinary actions should be taken.

 - (d) This subdivision shall sunset on or before June 30, 2021 <u>2022</u>.

- (c) Within five years after the effective date of this ordinance, the County will review the operation of the Program and the evidentiary basis for the Program in order to determine whether the County has a continuing compelling interest in remedying discrimination against MBEs and WBEs in its construction marketplace, and the permissible scope of any narrowly tailored remedies to redress discrimination againstMBEs or WBEs so that the County will not function as a passive participant in a discriminatory marketplace.
 - (d) This subdivision shall sunset on or before June 30, 2021 2022.

MODIFICATION TO LAND BANK

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners that Part II Land Development Ordinances, Chapter 103 Land Bank Authority, Division 2, Sections 103-28, 103-31 and 103-32 of the Cook County Code are hereby enacted amended as follows:

Division 2. Land Bank Authority Board of Directors and Staff

Sec. 103-28. Board of Directors actions.

The Board of Directors shall do all of the following not inconsistent with Illinois law:

- (a) Adopt, amend and/or repeal rules and policies and procedures governing the Board of Directors and its actions and meetings, and adopt, amend and/or repeal policies and procedures to implement day-to-day operation of the Land Bank, including policies governing any staff of the Land Bank consistent with the policies of the Cook County Bureau of Human Resources;
- (b) Elect additional officers, including, but not limited to, initial officers who shall be elected at the first meeting of the Board of Directors, in accordance with the bylaws;
 - (c) Provide for a system of accounting;
- (d) Adopt or amend the Land Bank's budget to submit annually to the Cook County Board of Commissioners for approval and adoption in a time frame mandated by the Cook County Budget Director;
- (e) Adopt, amend and/or repeal policies and procedures for contracting and procurement which must be consistent with the provisions set forth in the County's Code; provided, however, that approval of the County Board or County Procurement Officer is not required for procurement or contracts authorized by the Land Bank and the Board of Directors will act in place of the County Board in any contract, bylaws or agreement with the County which requires the approval or other action of the County Board unless expressly prohibited otherwise in this chapter and until such time as the Board of Directors adopts its own rules, regulations or procedures with regard to procurement and contracts, the existing provisions of the Cook County Code pertaining to Procurement and Contracts shall apply;
- (f) Commission, collect, and receive data from public, private, professional and volunteer sources to compile an inventory and analysis of desirable properties for acquisition;
 - (g) Establish banking arrangements for the Land Bank as per Section 103-58 of this Ordinance;
- (h) <u>Provide recommendations and requests pursuant to the Cook County Budget process regarding executive, administrative and clerical needs.</u> Organize and reorganize the executive, administrative, clerical and other departments of the Land Bank and fix the duties, powers and compensation of all employees, agents and consultants of the Land Bank as per Section 103-32 of this Ordinance.

Sec. 103-31. Executive Director.

- Except as otherwise provided in subsection (b) of this Section, the Board of Directors (a) shall be authorized to retain the professional services of an individual to perform the duties of an Executive Director on a contractual basis with the advice and consent of the President; the Executive Director shall not be an employee of the Land Bank or County. The Director shall administer the Land Bank in accordance with the operating budget approved by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, general policy guidelines established by the Board of Directors, other applicable governmental procedures and policies, and this Ordinance. The Director shall be responsible for the day-to-day operations of the Land Bank, the control, management, and oversight of the Land Bank's functions, and supervision of all Land Bank contractual agreements. All terms and conditions of the Director's service shall be specified in a written contract between the Director and the Board of Directors. The Director may be removed by the President of the Cook County Board or the Board of Directors for good cause, prior to the expiration of the Director's contract. Good cause includes inefficiency, neglect of duty, malfeasance, or any cause which renders the Director unfit or unable to perform the scope of work. The Board of Directors may delegate to the Director any powers or duties it considers proper, under such terms, conditions and to the extent that the Board of Directors may specify.
- (b) Effective May 1, 2021, any subsequent Director shall be appointed by the President of the Cook County Board of Commissioners with the advice and consent of the Land Bank Board of Directors. The Director position shall be a an at-will employee of the County and in the Grade 24 salary classification. The Director shall administer the Land Bank in accordance with the operating budget approved by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, the general policy guidelines established by the Board of Directors, other applicable governmental procedures and policies, and this Chapter. The Director shall be responsible for the day-to-day operations of the Land Bank, the control, management, and oversight of the Land Bank's functions and supervision of all Land Bank contractual agreements. The Director shall report to the Land Bank Board of Directors and the President. As an at-will employee, and appointee of the President, the Director may be removed by the President of the Cook County Board.

Sec. 103-32. Reserved. Staffing services.

- (a) The Board of Directors may approve contracts for staffing as requested by the Executive Director that are deemed necessary to carry out the duties and responsibilities of the Land Bank and in accordance with the policies and procedures established by the Board. Such staff shall be retained pursuant to contracts entered into in accordance with the procurement rules established by the Board.
- (b) Should the Board of Directors, elect to have employees, any staff employed by the Board of Directors for the Land Bank not otherwise retained through the Board of Directors procurement rules shall be recruited or employed via the County's employment plan and be deemed County employees.

WHEREAS, on September 5, 2019 the Cook County Board of Commissioners passed the Surviving Spouse Tax Abatement Ordinance which can be found in Section 74-47 of the Cook County Code of Ordinances; and

WHEREAS, the Surviving Spouse Tax Abatement permitted the application to the Cook County Board of Review ("Board of Review") for the abatement of Cook County's portion of property taxes levied on a qualified property for surviving spouses of a fallen police officer, soldier or rescue worker in accordance with 35 ILCS 200/18-178; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 74-47 of the Cook County Code of Ordinances, the Board of Review developed an application process in which surviving spouses of a of a fallen police officer,

soldier or rescue worker in accordance with 35 ILCS 200/18-178 could request an abatement of Cook County's portion of property taxes levied on a qualified property; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Review has received applications for property tax abatements in accordance with Section 74-47 and has reviewed said applications for a surviving spouse tax abatement as set forth in Exhibit A and has determined the following:

- (1) The Board of Review finds that each of the decedents qualifies as a fallen police officer, soldier, or rescue worker who died as a result of or in the course of employment as a police officer; while in the active service of a fire, rescue, or emergency medical service; or while on active duty as a member of the United States Armed Services, including the National Guard, serving in Iraq or Afghanistan;
- (2) The Board of Review finds that each applicant qualifies as a surviving spouse, as each is a spouse, who has not remarried, of a fallen police officer, soldier, or rescue worker;
- (3) The Board of Review finds that each subject property satisfies the requirement of qualified property in that each is used as the principal residence of a surviving spouse and was owned by the fallen police officer, soldier, or rescue worker or surviving spouse at the time of the police officer's, soldier's, or rescue worker's death; was acquired by the surviving spouse within 2 years after the police officer's, soldier's, or rescue worker's death if the surviving spouse was domiciled.

WHEREAS, the above findings demonstrate each applicant satisfies Section 74-47 of the Cook County Code and the Board of Review recommends the abatement of 100% of Cook County's portion of property taxes levied against the residential properties in the approximate dollar amounts set forth in Exhibit A; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 74-47(c)(1), the Board of Review also recommends the abatement period shall start from the earliest date permitted under the ordinance, i.e. July 9, 2012, or the decedent's date of death, whichever is later, and continue so long as the applicant continues to satisfy the requirements of Section 74-47.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, the Cook County Board of Commissioners has reviewed the recommendations of the Board of Review and orders the abatement of 100% of Cook County's portion of property taxes levied against the residential properties in the approximate dollar amounts for the time periods addressed and set forth in Exhibit A; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOVLED, the County Clerk shall provide a certified copy of this ordinance approving the surviving spouse tax abatements as provided in Exhibit A to all applicable Cook County tax officials in order to process the approved surviving spouse tax abatements.
