PROPERTY TAX RELIEF ORDINANCE

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 74 Taxation, Article II. - Real Property Taxation, Division 1 Generally, Section 74- 48 of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as Follows:

Sec. 74-48. Covid-19 Property Tax Relief for Real Property Tax Payments due in 2020 and 2021.

(a) In Cook County, the first installment of property taxes for the 2019 tax year were due on March 2, 2020 and the second installment is due August 3, 2020. Real property owners in the County of Cook have been adversely affected by the COVID-19 global pandemic and Cook County has been designated a disaster area by the Governor of Illinois. While the second installment for the 2019 tax year remains due on August 3, 2020, in accordance with 35 ILCS 200/21-40(C)(1)(A) and Section 21-40(C)(1)(B), the Cook County Board of Commissioners declares that real property owners in Cook County are adversely impacted due to the COVID-19 pandemic and stay-at-home orders issued by the State. Due to such adverse impact on Cook County real property owners, no interest penalties for any late payment of the August 3, 2020 property tax installment will accrue until after October 1, 2020, and payments made on or before October 1, 2020 in regard to the second installment will be considered as filed and paid timely by the Cook County Collector.

In Cook County, the first installment of property taxes for the 2020 tax year will be due on (b) March 2, 2021 and the second installment will be due on August 2, 2021. Real property owners in the County of Cook have been adversely affected by the COVID-19 global pandemic and Cook County has been designated a disaster area by the Governor of Illinois. While the first installment for the 2020 tax year remains due on March 2, 2021 and the second installment for the 2020 tax year remains due August 2, 2021, in accordance with 35 ILCS 200/21-40(C)(1)(A) and Section 21-40(C)(1)(B), the Cook County Board of Commissioners declares that real property owners in Cook County are adversely impacted due to the COVID-19 pandemic and stay-at-home orders issued by the State. Due to such adverse impact on Cook County real property owners, no interest penalties for any late payment of the Tax Year 2020 First Installment will accrue until after May 3, 2021, and payments made on or before May 3, 2021, in regard to the first installment will be considered as filed and paid timely by the Cook County Collector. Additionally, the due date for the Tax Year 2020 Second Installment will be October 1, 2021. nNo interest penalties for any late payment of the Tax Year 2020 Second Installment will accrue until after October 1, 2021, and payments made on or before October 1, 2021, in regard to the second installment will be considered as filed and paid timely by the Cook County Collector.

(c) Due to the adverse impacts of COVID-19 on real property owners in Cook County, a financial hardship application is hereby waived and not required to be eligible for the Cook County Collector to process the relief referenced in Section 74-48(a).

(e) Evaluation and Selection for Contract Negotiation. The CPO in coordination with the Using Agency shall develop evaluation criteria, which are included in the RFQ or RFP. These criteria may include, but are not limited to, experience and qualifications of the Respondent or Proposer, the quality, content and completeness of the Response or Proposal, the demonstrated willingness and ability of the Respondent or Proposer to satisfy the requirements as described in the RFQ or RFP, and, if applicable, the cost proposal. The evaluation shall be performed by a committee chaired by the CPO or a designee of the CPO with representatives of the Using Agency and other persons designated by the CPO.

The CPO will make every effort to make all selection committees as diverse as possible. The evaluation committee will comprise of at least one woman, one African American and or Hispanic American member on every Request for Proposal and Request for Qualification. In the case that there is no minority qualified and available for the selection committee a reasonable explanation will be provided to the Board of Commissioners before selections are made. Membership and ethnicity on a selection committee shall be made public to the Board of Commissioners after the awards are made.

Respondents or Proposers shall be accorded fair treatment regarding evaluation of their Responses or Proposals. Any or all Respondents or Proposers may be requested to make presentations and/or submit clarifications or revisions to their Responses or Proposals for the purpose of obtaining best and final Responses or Proposals. The Using Agency shall document the results of the evaluation. The contents of the Responses or Proposals shall not be disclosed to competing Respondents or Proposers during the evaluation process or any discussions.

AMENDMENT TO THE FLOODPLAIN ORDINANCE

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 106 Floodplains, Sections 106-2, 106-4, 106-5, 106-7, 106-8 and 106-9 are amended and Chapter 106-15 is amended as follows:

Sec. 106-2. - Definitions

<u>Accessory Structure means a non-habitable building, used only for parking of vehicles or storage,</u> that is on the same parcel of property as the principal building and the use of which is incidental to the use of the principal building.

ASCE means the American Society of Civil Engineers

Base flood means the flood having a one-percent probability of being equaled or exceeded in any given year. The base flood is also known as the 100-year frequency flood event. Application of the base flood elevation at any location is as defined in Section 106-5.

<u>Base Flood Elevation (BFE)</u> means the height in relation to the North American Vertical Datum (NAVD) of 1988 (or other datum, where specified) of the crest of the **Base Flood**. Application of the base flood elevation at any location is as defined in Section 106-5.

<u>Breakawaywall A wall that is not part of the structural support of the building and is intended</u> through its design and construction to collapse under specific lateral loading forces, without causing damage to the elevated portion of the building or supporting foundation system.

<u>Coastal High Hazard Area</u> means an area of special flood hazard extending from offshore to the inland limit of a primary frontal dune along an open coast, and any other area subject to high velocity wave action from storms or seismic sources. A coastal high hazard area is identified on a community's FIRM by the designation of zone VE. Cook County only has jurisdiction over the portions of the Cook County FIRM that are unincorporated as defined pursuant to 65 ILCS 5/7-4-4 and 55 ILCS 5/1-1004.

Designated Floodway means the channel, including on-stream lakes, and that portion of the floodplain adjacent to a stream or watercourse as designated by IDNR/OWR, which is needed to store and convey the existing 100-year frequency flood discharge with no more than a 0.1 foot increase in stage due to the loss of flood conveyance or storage, and no more than a ten percent increase in velocities.

(1) The floodways are designated on the countywide Flood Insurance Rate Map for Cook County number 17031C, panels <u>15-93</u>, <u>155-244</u>, <u>253</u>, <u>265</u>, <u>285-404</u>, <u>415</u>, <u>416</u>, <u>418</u>, <u>419</u>, <u>456-520</u>, <u>581-609</u>, <u>616</u>, <u>628 - 635</u>, <u>637-655</u>, <u>658</u>, <u>661-701</u>, <u>706</u>, <u>and 708-832</u>, <u>dated August 19</u>, <u>2008</u>; panels <u>611-614</u>, <u>617-619</u>, <u>636</u>, <u>702-704</u>, <u>707</u> <u>dated November 1</u>, <u>2019</u>; <u>and panels 94</u>, <u>113</u>, <u>251</u>, <u>252</u>, <u>254 - 260</u>, <u>266-269</u>, <u>406-409</u>, <u>417</u>, <u>436-440</u>, <u>526 - 545</u>, <u>656</u>, <u>657</u>, <u>659</u> <u>dated September 10</u>, <u>2021</u> <u>15-609</u>, <u>616</u>, <u>628</u>, <u>637-701</u>, <u>706</u>, <u>and 708-832</u>, <u>dated August 19</u>, <u>2008</u>, panels <u>611-614</u>, <u>617-619</u>, <u>636</u>, <u>702-704</u>, <u>707</u> <u>dated November 1</u>, <u>2019</u> prepared by FEMA. Floodplain means that land typically adjacent to a body of water with ground surface elevations at or below the base flood or the 100-year frequency flood elevation. Floodplains may also include detached special flood hazard areas (SFHAs), ponding areas, etc. The floodplain is also known as the special flood hazard area (SFHA). The floodplains are those lands within the jurisdiction of the County that are subject to inundation by the base flood or 100-year frequency flood. The special flood hazard areas (SFHAs) of the County are generally identified on the Countywide flood insurance rate map (FIRM) for Cook County number 17031C, prepared by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, panels <u>15-93</u>, <u>155-244</u>, <u>253</u>, <u>265</u>, <u>285-404</u>, <u>415</u>, <u>416</u>, <u>418</u>, <u>419</u>, <u>456-520</u>, <u>581-609</u>, <u>616</u>, <u>628 - 635</u>, <u>637-655</u>, <u>658</u>, <u>661-701</u>, <u>706</u>, and <u>708-832</u>, dated August <u>19</u>, <u>2008</u>; panels <u>611-614</u>, <u>617-619</u>, <u>636</u>, <u>702-704</u>, <u>707</u> dated November <u>1</u>, <u>2019</u>; and panels <u>94</u>, <u>113</u>, <u>251</u>, <u>252</u>, <u>254 - 260</u>, <u>266-269</u>, <u>406-409</u>, <u>417</u>, <u>436-440</u>, <u>526 - 545}, <u>656</u>, <u>657</u>, <u>659</u> Cook County only has jurisdiction over the portions of these panels that are unincorporated as defined pursuant to <u>65 ILCS 5/7-4-4</u> and <u>55 ILCS 5/1-1004</u>, <u>15-609</u>, <u>616</u>, <u>628</u>, <u>637-701</u>, <u>706</u>, and <u>708-832</u> dated August <u>19</u>, <u>2008</u>, and panels <u>611-614</u>, <u>617-619</u>, <u>636</u>, <u>702-704</u>, <u>707</u> dated November <u>1, 2019</u>;</u>

<u>Flood Protection Elevation (FPE)</u> means the elevation of the Base Flood (or depth) plus two feet of Freeboard at any given location in the Floodplain.

Lowest Floor means the lowest floor of the lowest enclosed area (including Basement). An unfinished or flood-resistant enclosure usable solely for parking of vehicles, building access or storage, in an area other than a Basement area is not considered a building's lowest floor; provided that such enclosure is not built so as to render the Building in violation of the applicable non-elevation design requirements of this chapter.

Sec. 106-4. Duties of the enforcement officials

The Department shall be responsible for the general administration and enforcement of this chapter, which shall include the following:

- (1) *Determining the floodplain designation.*
 - d. If the site is within a Coastal High Hazard Area, require that the minimum requirements of Section 106-9 be met.
- (7) *Elevation and floodproofing certificates.* Maintain permit files including:
 - a. An elevation certificate certifying the elevation of the lowest floor (including basement) of a residential or nonresidential building subject to Section 106-9; <u>or</u> <u>an Elevation Certificate certifying the elevation of the lowest horizontal structural</u> member of the **Lowest Floor**, where required by Section 106.9 and/or
 - b. The elevation to which a nonresidential building has been floodproofed, using a floodproofing certificate, for all buildings subject to the provisions of Section 106-9.
 - c. <u>Certification of structural design and methods of construction for VE zone</u> <u>construction as required by Section 106.9.</u>

d. <u>Certification of breakaway wall design, when applicable, as provided in Section</u> <u>106.9.</u>

Sec. 106-5. Base flood elevation

This chapter's protection standard is based on the Flood Insurance Study for the County <u>dated</u> September 10, 2021.

- (1) If a base flood elevation or 100-year frequency flood elevation is not available for a particular site, then the protection standard shall be according to the best existing data available in the Illinois State Water Survey's Floodplain Information Repository that has been approved by IDNR/OWR and FEMA.
- (2) When a party disagrees with the best available data, the party may finance the detailed engineering study needed to replace existing data with better data and submit it to IDNR/OWR and FEMA.
- (3) The base flood or 100-year frequency flood elevation for the special flood hazard area (SFHA's) shall be as delineated on the 100-year flood profiles in the Countywide flood insurance study for the County prepared by FEMA, and dated November 1, 2019 September 10, 2021, and such amendments to such study and maps as may be prepared from time to time.
- (4) The base flood or 100-year frequency flood elevation for each special flood hazard area (SFHA) delineated as an AH Zone or "AO Zone shall be that elevation (or depth) delineated on the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) of the County.
- (5) The BFE for any zone VE floodplain, and for a zone AE floodplain in an area subject to flooding effects from Lake Michigan, shall be the highest elevation specified on the FIRM among all flood zones affecting the proposed development. Where development is proposed to encroach upon a riverine Zone AE which is subject to flooding effects from Lake Michigan, the requirements of Section 106-9 shall apply to the entire floodplain.
- (65) The base flood or 100-year frequency flood elevation for each of the remaining special flood hazard areas (SFHAs) delineated as an A Zone on the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) of the County shall be according to the best existing data available from federal, state, or other sources. Should no other data exist, an engineering study must be financed by the applicant to determine BFEs. in the Illinois State Water Survey Floodplain Information Repository.
 - a. When no base flood or 100 year flood frequency elevation <u>BFE</u> exists, the BFE for a riverine SFHA shall be determined from a backwater model, <u>an accepted hydraulic model</u>, based on current industry standards approved by the County Highway Department, such as HEC-II, WSP-2, or HEC-RAS.

- b. The flood flows used in the hydraulic models shall be obtained from a hydraulic model, approved by the County Highway Department, such as HEC-I, or TR-20, or by techniques presented in various publications prepared by the United States Geological Survey for estimating peak flood discharges.
- c. Along any watercourses draining more than one square mile, the above analyses shall be submitted to IDNR/OWR for approval. Once approved it must be submitted to the Illinois State Water Survey Floodplain Information Repository for filing.
- d. For a nonriverine SFHA, the base flood elevation shall be the historic flood of record plus three feet, unless calculated by a detailed engineering study and approved by IDNR/OWR for drainage areas greater than one square mile.
- <u>de</u>. For an unmapped extended SFHA (with a drainage area less than one square mile) which has been identified by the Department of Building and Zoning pursuant to Section 501.3, the base flood elevation shall be determined by the applicant utilizing a method as approved in Section 106-8, with concurrence of the County.

Sec. 106-7. Occupation and use of designated floodways

(2)Preventing increased damages and a list of appropriate uses.

- f. Permits for dams.

Sec. 106-9. Permitting requirements applicable to all floodplain areas

In addition to the requirements found in Sections 106-6-106-8 for development in flood fringes, designated floodways, and special flood hazard areas (SFHAs) or floodplains where no floodways have been identified (Zones A, AO, AH, AE, A1-A30, A99, VO, V1-30, VE, V, M, E, D, or X), the following requirements shall be met

- (1) Public health standards.
 - a. No developments in the special flood hazard area <u>SFHA</u> shall include locating or storing chemicals, explosives, buoyant materials, animal wastes, fertilizers, flammable liquids, pollutants, or other hazardous or toxic materials below the flood protection elevation (FPE) <u>unless such materials are stored in a floodproofed and anchored storage tank and certified by a **P.E.** or floodproofed **Building** constructed according to the requirements of this chapter.</u>
 - b. New and replacement water supply systems, wells, sanitary sewer lines and on-site waste disposal systems may be permitted providing all manholes or other above ground openings located below the FPE are watertight. <u>New and replacement on-site sanitary sewer lines or waste disposal systems shall be located and constructed to avoid impairment to them or contamination from them during flooding.</u>
 - c. <u>Public utilities and facilities such as sewer, gas and electric shall be located and constructed to minimize or eliminate flood damage. All other activities, defined as development, such as pools, fences, filling, paving, etc., shall be designed so as not to alter flood flows or increase potential flood damages. Non-structural fill within a coastal high hazard area (zone V, V1-30, or VE) shall be permitted only if an engineering report demonstrates that the fill will not cause wave runup, ramping, or deflection of floodwaters that cause damage to buildings.</u>
 - d. <u>The use of fill for structural support of buildings within a coastal high hazard area</u> (zone V, V1-30, or VE) [or within a Moderate Wave Action Area] is prohibited.Man-

made alterations of sand dunes within a coastal high hazard area (zone V, V1-30, or VE) are prohibited unless an engineering report documents that the alterations will not increase potential flood damage by reducing the wave and flow dissipation characteristics of the sand dunes.

- e. Within a coastal high hazard area, bulkheads, seawalls, revetments, and other erosion control structures shall not be connected to the foundation or superstructure of a building, and shall be designed and constructed so as not to direct floodwaters or increase flood forces or erosion impacts on the foundation or superstructure of any building.
- (2) Carrying capacity and notification.
 - a. For all projects involving channel modification, fill, or stream maintenance (including levees), the flood carrying capacity of the watercourse shall be maintained.
 - b. In addition, the County shall notify adjacent communities in writing 30 days prior to the issuance of a permit for the alteration or relocation of the watercourse.

(3)Protecting buildings.

- a. All buildings located within a 100-year floodplain also known as a special flood hazard area (SFHA), and all buildings located outside the 100-year floodplain but within the 500-year floodplain, shall be protected from flood damage below the flood protection elevation. This building protection criteria applies to the following situations:
 - 1. Construction or placement of a new building;
 - 2. A structural alteration Substantial improvement made to an existing building; that either increases the first floor area by more than 20 percent or the building's market value by more than 50 percent. This alteration shall be figured cumulatively beginning with any alteration which has taken place subsequent to April 1, 1990; If substantially improved, both the existing building and any addition must meet the flood protection standards of this section.
 - 3. Installing a manufactured home on a new site or a new manufactured home on an existing site. This building protection requirements does not apply to returning a mobile home to the same site it lawfully occupied before it was removed to avoid flood damage; and
 - 4. Installing a travel trailer on a site for more than 180 days.
 - 5. A substantially damaged building under repair. Substantial damage shall be figured cumulatively subsequent to April 1, 1990. If substantially

damaged, the entire building must meet the flood protection standards of this section

- b. This building protection requirement may be met by one of the following methods:
 - 1. A residential or nonresidential building, when allowed <u>in zones A, AO, AH,</u> <u>and AE</u>, may be constructed <u>or substantially improved</u> on permanent land fill in accordance with the following:
 - (i). The lowest floor (including basement) shall be at or above the flood protection elevation (FPE) as defined in Section 106-1.
 - (ii) Fill requirements.
 - A. The fill shall be placed in layers no greater than one foot deep before compaction and should extend at least ten feet beyond the foundation of the building before sloping below the flood protection elevation.
 - B. The top of the fill shall be above the flood protection elevation. However, the ten-foot minimum may be waived if an Illinois licensed structural engineer certifies an alternative method to protect the building from damages due to hydrostatic pressures.
 - C. The fill shall be protected against erosion and scour.
 - D. The fill shall not adversely affect the flow or surface drainage from or onto neighboring properties.
 - 2. A residential or nonresidential building <u>in zones A, AO, AH, and AE</u> may be elevated in accordance with the following:
 - (i) The building or improvements shall be elevated on crawl space, stilts, piles, walls, or other foundation that is permanently open to floodwaters and not subject to damage by hydrostatic pressures of the base flood or 100-year frequency flood. The permanent openings shall be no more than one foot above existing grade, and consists of a minimum of two permanent openings <u>on at least two</u> walls, located below the BFE. The openings must have a total net area of not less than one square inch for every one square foot of enclosed area subject to flooding below the base flood elevation. Refer to FEMA TB1, Openings in Foundation Walls and Walls of Enclosures, for additional guidance.

- (ii) The foundation and supporting members shall be anchored and aligned in relation to flood flows and adjoining structures so as to minimize exposure to known hydrodynamic forces such as current, waves, ice and floating debris.
- (iii) All areas below the flood protection elevation shall be constructed of materials resistant to flood damage.
 - A. The lowest floor (including basement) and all electrical, heating, ventilating, plumbing, and air conditioning equipment and utility meters shall be located at or above the flood protection elevation.
 - B. Water and sewer pipes, electrical and telephone lines, submersible pumps, and other waterproofed service facilities may be located below the flood protection elevation.
- (iv) The areas below the flood protection elevation may only be used for the parking of vehicles, building access or storage in an area other than a basement.
- (v) Manufactured homes and travel trailers to be installed on a site for more than 180 days, in zones A, AO, AH, and AE, shall be elevated to or above the flood protection elevation <u>using a support</u> and anchoring system, designed by a **P.E.** pursuant to 77 III. Adm. <u>Code § 870.110</u> and shall be anchored to resist flotation, collapse, or lateral movement by being tied down in accordance with the Rules and Regulations for the Illinois Mobile Home Tie-Down Act issued pursuant to 77 III. Admin. Code Part 870. In addition, all manufactured homes shall meet the following elevation requirements:
 - A. In the case of manufactured homes placed or substantially improved outside of a manufactured home park or subdivision, in a new manufactured home park or subdivision, in an expansion to an existing manufactured home park or subdivision, or in an existing manufacture home park or subdivision on which a manufactured home has incurred substantial damage from a flood, the top of the lowest floor shall be elevated to or above the flood protection elevation.
 - B. In the case of manufactured homes placed or substantially improved in an existing manufactured home park or subdivision, the manufactured home shall be elevated so that either the top of the lowest floor is above the base

flood elevation or the chassis is at least 36 inches in height above grade and supported by reinforced piers or other foundations of equivalent strength, whichever is less.

- (vi) Recreational vehicles or travel trailers shall be required to meet the elevation and anchoring requirements of Subsection (3)b.2.v of this section above unless:
 - A. They are on site for fewer than 180 consecutive days; and
 - B. They are fully licensed and ready for highway use. A recreational vehicle is ready for highway use if it is on its wheels or jacking system, is attached to the site only by quick disconnect type utility and service devices, and has no permanently attached additions.
- c. Only a nonresidential building <u>in zones A, AO, AH, and AE,</u> may be structurally dry floodproofed (in lieu of elevation) provided that:
 - 1. A licensed Illinois professional engineer shall certify that the building has been structurally dry floodproofed below the flood protection elevation, certifying that the design and methods of construction are in accordance with accepted standards of practice for meeting the requirements of ASCE 24-14, and the structure and attendant utility facilities are watertight and capable of resisting the effects of the base flood or 100-year frequency flood.
 - 2. The building design shall take into account flood velocities, duration, rate of rise, hydrostatic and hydrodynamic forces, the effects of buoyancy, and impacts from debris or ice.
 - 3. Floodproofing measures shall be operable without human intervention and without an outside source of electricity (levees, berms, floodwalls and similar works are not considered floodproofing for the purpose of this Subsection (3)c.3).
 - d. <u>In zones A, AO, AH, and AE, detached accessory structures Tool sheds</u> and detached garages on an existing single family platted lot may be constructed with the lowest floor below the flood protection elevation in accordance with the following:
 - 1. <u>The building must be non-habitable, must not include areas intended or</u> <u>used for cooking, and must not include bathrooms, toilet rooms, or shower</u> <u>rooms.</u> <u>The building is not used for human habitation.</u>

- 2. All areas below the base flood or 100-year frequency flood elevation shall be constructed with waterproof material. Structures located in a designated floodway shall be constructed and placed on a building site so as not to block the flow of floodwaters and shall also meet the Appropriate Use criteria of Section 106-7. In addition, all other requirements of Sections 106-6-106-8 must be met.
- 3. The structure shall be anchored to prevent flotation.
- 4. Service facilities such as electrical and heating equipment shall be elevated or flood proofed to the flood protection elevation.
- 5. The building shall be valued at less than \$7,500.00 and be less than 500 square feet in floor size.
- 6. The building shall be used only for the storage of vehicles or tools and may not contain other rooms, workshops, greenhouses or similar uses. The building shall meet the permanent opening criteria of Subsection (3)2.i of this section.
- e. Existing buildings located within a designated floodway shall also meet the more restrictive appropriate use standards included in Section 106-7. Nonconforming structures located in a designated floodway may remain in use and may only be enlarged, replaced or structurally altered in accordance with Section 106-7(2). A nonconforming structure damaged by flood, fire, wind or other natural or manmade disaster may be restored unless the damage equals or exceeds 50 percent of its market value before it was damaged.
- <u>f.</u> In a Coastal high hazard area (zone VE), the building protection requirements of this Section must be met according to the following criteria:
 - 1. All New Construction and Substantial Improvements shall be elevated on pilings or columns so that the bottom of the lowest horizontal structural member of the Lowest Floor (excluding the pilings or columns) is elevated to or above the FPE, and the pile or column foundation and structure attached thereto is anchored to resist flotation, collapse, and lateral movement due to the effects of wind and water loads acting simultaneously on all building components.

(i) Water loading values used shall be those associated with the Base Flood.

(ii) Wind loading values shall be those defined according to American Society of Civil Engineers 7-16 Minimum design loads and associated criteria for buildings and other structures, or other equivalent standard.

- 2. A registered professional engineer or architect shall develop or review the structural design, specifications and plans for the construction, and shall certify that the design and methods of construction to be used are in accordance with accepted standards of practice for meeting the provisions of Section 106-9 (3)f.1.
- 3. All New Construction and Substantial Improvements shall have the space below the Lowest Floor either free of obstruction or constructed with nonsupporting Breakaway Walls, open wood lattice-work, or insect screening intended to collapse without causing collapse, displacement, or other structural damage to the elevated portion of the building or supporting foundation system.
 - (i) For the purpose of Section 106-9 (3), a Breakaway Wall shall have a design safe loading resistance of not less than 10 and no more than 20 pounds per square foot.
 - (ii) Use of Breakaway Walls which exceed a design safe loading resistance of 20 pounds per square foot (either by design or where so required by local or state codes) may be permitted only if a registered professional engineer or architect certifies that the designs proposed meet all of the following conditions:
 - A. <u>Breakaway Wall collapse shall result from a water load less</u> than that which would occur during the base flood; and
 - B. The elevated portion of the Building and supporting foundation system shall not be subject to collapse, displacement, or other structural damage due to the effects of wind and water loads acting simultaneously on all building components (structural and non-structural). Water loading values shall be those associated with the base flood. Wind loading values shall be those defined according to American Society of Civil Engineers 7-16 Minimum design loads and associated criteria for buildings and other structures, or equivalent standard.
 - C. <u>All space enclosed by Breakaway Walls, open wood lattice-</u> work, or insect screening below the lowest floor shall be used solely for parking of vehicles, building access, or storage.
- 4. Placement or Substantial Improvement of Manufactured Homes must comply with Section 106.9.

5. Recreational Vehicles, including park models, must either be on site for fewer than 180 consecutive days; or be fully licensed and ready for highway use; or comply with Section 106.9.

Sec. 106-15. Other Laws

The provisions of this chapter shall not be deemed to nullify any provisions of local, State or federal law. With respect to Coastal High Hazard Areas, Cook County only has jurisdiction over the portions of the Cook County FIRM that are unincorporated as defined pursuant to 65 ILCS 5/7-4-4 and 55 ILCS 5/1-1004.

HONORING THE LIFE AND CONTRIBUTIONS OF THE HONORABLE BERNARD J. HANSEN

WHEREAS, Bernard J. Hansen (Bernie to everyone he met), 76, a former Chicago alderman from the 44th Ward who specialized in constituent services, died Sunday of complications from diabetes in Chandler, Arizona, where he had retired. He served as alderman from 1983 until 2003, through the administrations of four mayors: Jane M. Byrne, Harold Washington, Eugene Sawyer and Richard M. Daley; and

WHEREAS, a Lakeview native, Mr. Hansen went to Hawthorne grade school and Lane Tech High School. His mother Fern was a nurse, and his father Bernard was a factory worker, according to his family. He met Annette, his wife of 56 years, at Waveland Bowl when they were teens. "I bowled for St. Ben's and he bowled for Lane," Annette shared. Young Bernie was a dynamic high school baseball and football player who once got a lesson from pro football Hall of Famer George Blanda. After a head injury on the field, doctors feared he would be permanently impaired, his wife said, but he recovered and subsequently attended the University of Chicago; and

WHEREAS, before he was alderman, he was a longtime ward superintendent who prided himself on knowing the details of every street and alley in his ward. "They used to call him the 'alley' alderman," said Alderman Tom Tunney, Bernie's handpicked replacement as alderman. "He cared about the blocks, the alleys, the economic development and safety. He was an old-school politician who later in life became much more progressive as the community changed."

WHEREAS, up long before sunrise every day, he would drive through the ward to personally check on things that were of concern to residents. "All that before he headed into the office at 6:00 a.m.," said State Sen. Sara Feigenholtz. "He knew every pothole and every alley and every street in Lakeview. He did so much for so many people. Even if you were outside of the ward, he would take care of you. He was a true public servant", said his son David; and

WHEREAS, though Bernie was elected to the City Council in 1983 with roots in the late Mayor Richard J. Daley's political machine he was always open to change. When Harold Washington was elected mayor, Mr. Hansen regularly voted with the opposition bloc of aldermen; but he was one of the first to actively support Mayor Washington on any policy that benefitted the City; and

WHEREAS, Bernie's love of his community lead to his progressive advocacy that included passage of what he called his greatest accomplishment, the anti-discrimination Human Rights Ordinance. He regularly

backed measures promoting gay rights, including providing health care and other benefits for the partners of city workers involved in same-sex relationships some 18 years before the U.S. Supreme Court ruled on the legality of same-sex marriage. His support for human rights legislation was a matter of "treating people the way they wanted to be treated … whether they're Black, white, brown, pink or purple. Whatever," Hansen was quoted as telling the local Kiwanis Club in 2016. "Bernie spent nearly two decades serving the City Council working tirelessly to serve his constituents while taking a strong stance for human rights. His work undoubtedly made our city a better place," observed Chicago Mayor Lori Lightfoot; and

WHEREAS, Bernie was alderman during the battle over installing lights for night games at Wrigley Field. With any community issue he always supported citizen participation and encouraged vigorous debate. He backed retrofitting factories as lofts in addition to recycling requirements for businesses and residents. He pushed for crackdowns on Wrigley Field ticket scalpers and the rowdiness he said was linked to Medusa's, once an all-ages Lakeview juice bar and famed nightlife spot; and

WHEREAS, "No one was better at getting things done than Bernie and the communities he served were better for it. He taught me that public service is what we each owe our communities," noted U.S. Rep. Mike Quigley. "Bernie taught me that policy only matters when it works at the street level," Quigley said. Others mentored by Hansen were former state Senate President John Cullerton, current state Sen. Sara Feigenholtz and former DNC Chair David Wilhelm.

WHEREAS, Bernie was "the definition of a great public servant" who displayed "street smarts, political wisdom, a wicked sense of humor" while also being a "die-hard Cubs fan. Bernie turned this neighborhood around and made it the safer and more desirable ward it is today," Feigenholtz said; and

WHEREAS, when he retired from the City Council for health reasons in 2003, he picked Tom Tunney as a replacement, making Tunney the city's first openly gay alderman. "He oversaw transformational changes in our neighborhood and helped build the thriving community we share today," Tunney posted on Twitter. "His wisdom and humor will be missed but the 44th Ward family is strong thanks to his leadership"; and

WHEREAS, in addition to his service as an alderman, President William Clinton appointed Bernie to serve as one of four U.S. commissioners to the Great Lakes Fishery Commission from 1994 to 2000. The Great Lakes Fishery Commission is a bilateral treaty organization of the United States and Canada responsible for fisheries management research and recommendations and for sea lamprey control of the Great Lakes fisheries. This was a perfect assignment for Bernie whose 44th Ward borders Lake Michigan. When it was the United States turn to Chair the Commission, Bernie was elected Chair because of his great knowledge of Great Lake fishing; and

WHEREAS, Hansen is survived by his wife, Annette, sons Paul and David and two grandchildren.

WHEREAS, President Irmer, was born and raised in Hyde Park, holds a Professional Bachelor of Architecture degree from the Illinois Institute of Technology and a Juris Doctorate from the University of Chicago Law School; and

WHEREAS, in September 2015, President Irmer began her service as President & CEO of the DuSable Museum of African American History. President Irmer has since been dedicated to advancing the DuSable Museum as a center for African and African American arts and culture, as a center for thought leadership and as a vehicle for community advancement; and

HONORING THE REVEREND JESSE JACKSON SR. ON BEING AWARDED LA LÉGION D'HONNEUR, FRANCE'S HIGHEST HONOR

WHEREAS, Jesse Louis Jackson Sr. was born on October 8, 1941, in Greenville, South Carolina; and

WHEREAS, Reverend Jackson began his theological studies at Chicago Theological Seminary, but deferred his studies when he began working full-time in the Civil Rights Movement with Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Later, he was ordained on June 30, 1968, by Reverend Clay Evans and earned a Master of Divinity degree from Chicago Theological Seminary in 2000; and

WHEREAS, Reverend Jackson, one of America's foremost civil rights, religious and political figures, is the Founder and President of the Rainbow PUSH Coalition and has been a champion of human and civil rights and nonviolent social change for decades, and a leading advocate for a variety of public policy issues, including universal health care, equal administration of justice in all communities, voting rights, sufficient funding for enforcement of civil rights laws, and for increased attention to business investment in underserved domestic communities among many other just causes; and

WHEREAS, over the past forty years, he has played a pivotal role in virtually every movement for empowerment, peace, civil rights, gender equality, and economic and social justice; and

WHEREAS, Reverend Jackson has received more than 40 honorary doctorate degrees and frequently lectures at major colleges and universities including Howard, Yale, Princeton, Morehouse, Harvard, Columbia, Stanford and Hampton; and

WHEREAS, in 2000, President Bill Clinton awarded Reverend Jackson the Presidential Medal of Freedom, our nation's highest civilian honor, and just recently France bestowed upon Reverend Jackson it's highest honor; and

WHEREAS, on Monday July 19, 2021, French President Emmanuel Macron made Jesse Jackson a Commander of the Legion of Honor (La Légion d'Honneur), the highest French order of merit, both military and civil, established in 1802 by Napoleon Bonaparte, for helping "change the destiny of the United States" and with it, the world"; and

WHEREAS, "From your earliest years, you were hungry for knowledge and justice, and you are a special friend of France, a brother for us," Macron said in a solemn address at the Élysée Presidential Palace, adding, "He's a visionary with talent for uniting and leading people, whose moral and physical courage has helped him to overcome adversity and change the destiny of the United States, our oldest ally, and to change our world for the better"; and

WHEREAS, as a highly respected and trusted world leader, Reverend Jackson has acted many times as an international diplomat in sensitive situations; and

WHEREAS, President Macron recounted Jackson's 1990 role in freeing French hostages during the first Gulf War. Citizens from several countries trying to stop the invasion of Kuwait were taken hostage by Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein. President Macron said Jackson negotiated the release of French citizens and thanks to his efforts, they were safely returned to their families; and

DECLARATION OF RUDY LOZANO DAY IN COOK COUNTY

WHEREAS, Rodolfo "Rudy" Lozano was born in Harlingen, Texas on July 17, 1951. He was one of six children born to Guadalupe and Anita Lozano; and

WHEREAS, Rudy Lozano and his family moved to Chicago in the early 1950's, and he spent his formative years in the Pilsen neighborhood on the near Southwest Side; and

WHEREAS, Rudy Lozano developed a sense of activism at an early age and as a child walked strike picket lines with his siblings alongside their metalworker and staunch union activist father; and

WHEREAS, Rudy Lozano's life was characterized by his passion for community activism and his unwavering dedication to humanity and the betterment of all working-class people; and

WHEREAS, Rudy Lozano's mission was to empower all workers and uplift the voices of immigrants and to organize the unorganized, and to strategically forge coalitions among Latino, Black, white progressive allies, and other historically underrepresented community groups; and

WHEREAS, in 1970, Rudy Lozano helped organize Black and Latino students at Carter Henry Harrison Technical High School (now Maria Saucedo Scholastic Academy) to stage a series of walkouts protesting the lack of representation in the curriculum and of bilingual education as well as substandard facilities-Harrison, located in South Lawndale, also served Pilsen and was overcrowded; and

WHEREAS, approximately 35,000 Chicago Public School (CPS) students were inspired by the Harrison action to walk out and within a decade, as a result of both the walkouts and continuing community pressure, the Board of Education built a new high school to serve Pilsen, Benito Juarez Community Academy; and

WHEREAS, Rudy Lozano was among the first wave of Mexican American students at the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC), and led struggles for student diversity and multicultural curriculum leading to the establishment of the Latin American Recruitment and Educational Services Program (LARES); and

WHEREAS, Rudy Lozano married Guadalupe "Lupe" Lozano on December 8, 1973 and became the loving father of three sons: Rodolfo Lozano Jr., Jose Alberto Lozano, and David Emiliano Lozano; and

WHEREAS, after attending UIC, Rudy Lozano became an integral part of the *Centro de Acción Social Autónoma - Hermandad General de Trabajadores* (Center for Autonomous Social Action - General Brotherhood of Workers) or CASA and focused on advocating for immigrant workers; and

WHEREAS, CASA worked to unionize noncitizen workers and provided them with social services and information to better know their civil rights as workers; and

WHEREAS, Rudy Lozano became the Midwest Director of the International Ladies Garment Workers Union, in which he helped union members organize their grievances so the union, and especially their employers, would finally address their poor working conditions and other labor related concerns; and

WHEREAS, Rudy Lozano directed his attention to the largest tortilla factory in the midwest, where immigrant laborers worked and lived in dangerous conditions, and where the company tried to hinder the unionization campaign by calling Immigration and Naturalization Services on their workers; and

WHEREAS, Rudy Lozano began his electoral organizing in Chicago's 25th Ward IPO near west side, where he registered Latino voters and prioritized creating unity between Latino, Black and White community members; and

WHEREAS, Rudy Lozano ran for Alderman of the 22nd Ward in a highly contested and controversial race in 1983. Although he was 17 votes short of forcing the runoff in his race, he played a key role building a strategic coalition between the Latino, Black and White communities that resulted in electing candidates in districts where together they shared a majority vote; and

WHEREAS, Rudy Lozano was instrumental in forging a winning multi-racial coalition that resulted in the historic election of Chicago's first African American mayor, Harold Washington, and organizing the Mexican American community to support Washington thereafter. After Mayor Harold Washington's win, Rudy Lozano was elevated to a trusted adviser; and

WHEREAS, out of this work Rudy Lozano, Lupe Lozano, Jesus "Chuy" Garcia and others established the 22nd Ward independent political organization (IPO) in the Little Village community, which still remains a key progressive force in the region; and

WHEREAS, that grassroots and progressive movement was recognized internationally and inspired many to fight for political independence and to run for office in their community; and

WHEREAS, Rudy Lozano's life was cut short when he was assassinated on June 8, 1983 at his home at the age of 31; and

WHEREAS, Rudy Lozano's murder stunned the whole city. Thousands of mourners attended Rudy Lozano's funeral, including the new mayor Washington, who stated, "If the coalition of Chicago which came with my election is due to anyone, it is due to Rudy Lozano" and people like him; and

WHEREAS, although the devastation of losing Rudy Lozano left a tremendous void in the Southwest Side communities, it inevitably charged and politically activated the Latino community; and

WHEREAS, Rudy Lozano's activism, dedication, vision for unity among people, and his life's work made his legacy well known throughout the city and had a ripple effect that transcended generations; and

WHEREAS, Rudy Lozano's vision survives to this day carried by peers, fellow allies of the movement, and devoted family members, including his widow, children, grandchildren, siblings, nieces, and nephews; and

WHEREAS, on September 7, 1989, the Chicago Public Library system opened the Rudy Lozano Library in the Pilsen neighborhood in his honor; and

WHEREAS, on 1994, Rodolfo Lozano Bilingual & International Center Elementary School was opened in the north side of the City of Chicago; and

WHEREAS, we must never forget that Rudy Lozano was and continues to be one of our most valuable local labor and community leaders and human rights activist of all time; and

WHEREAS, during the past year and a half, Rudy Lozano's teachings have never been more importantthe push for unity among Black, Brown, White and all who stand for love and compassion for each other, the protection and advocacy for immigrant families, and the fight for social justice, racial equity and political power for disinvested communities of color; and

WHEREAS, Rudy Lozano's life has left a profound lesson for us all to continue building solidarity among all working-class people in the name of peace and justice.

WHEREAS, on January 27, 2020, the United States Secretary of Health and Human Services declared that COVID-19, a respiratory illness spread by close contact through respiratory droplets, presents a public health emergency, and the World Health Organization characterized the COVID-19 outbreak as a pandemic on March 11, 2020; and

WHEREAS, COVID-19 continues to be a serious threat across the U.S. and Cook County, and

WHEREAS, many hospitals across the U.S. already have a higher load of COVID-19 patients than ever before since the pandemic began, and the director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Dr. Robert Redfield, warned last month that the next few months of the pandemic would be among "the most difficult in the public health history of this nation" and;

WHEREAS, as of January 19, 2021 there have been 194,898 confirmed cases of SARS-CoV-2 in Suburban Cook County under the jurisdiction of the Cook County Department of Public Health with 3,639 reported deaths; and

WHEREAS, on December 11, 2020, the FDA approved emergency use authorization of the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine; and

WHEREAS, on December 18, 2020, the FDA authorized the emergency use of the Moderna COVID-19 Vaccine in individuals 18 years of age or older; and

WHEREAS, the approval has quickly ramped up the federal government's distribution of the potentially lifesaving vaccine to 64 states, territories and major cities across the nation; and

WHEREAS, initial doses of Pfizer's vaccine have been limited as manufacturing increases, with priority given to health-care workers and nursing homes first, but with subsequent phases the distribution will become available to a wider portion of the populace; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Department of Public Health (CCDPH) is the Illinois certified local health department for suburban Cook County, Illinois, with the exception of Evanston, Skokie, Oak Park, and Stickney Township, serving 127 municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Department of Public Health (CCDPH) working alongside the Cook County Department of Emergency Management and Regional Security is charged with making the COVID-19 vaccine available to people in CCDPH's jurisdiction of suburban Cook County; and

WHEREAS, CCDPH is working with partners at all levels, including hospitals, health care providers and community leaders, to develop flexible and responsive COVID-19 vaccination programs that can accommodate different vaccines; and

WHEREAS, the United States Secretary of Health and Human Services declared that COVID-19 presents a public health emergency on January 27, 2020, and on March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a pandemic; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Cook County Code of Ordinances, Sections 26-36 and the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act, 20 ILCS 3305/11, on March 10, 2020, County Board President Toni Preckwinkle found that the circumstances surrounding COVID-19 constitute a public health emergency and issued a proclamation of disaster for Cook County which has since been extended monthly by the Cook County Board of Commissioners through June 30, 2021; and

WHEREAS, on March 27, 2020, the federal government enacted the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (the "CARES Act") which authorized approximately \$2 trillion in federal stimulus funds to combat the crisis related to COVID-19, and included funds to specifically address the economic and public health issues that state and local governments encountered as they worked to protect their communities during this public health crisis; and

WHEREAS, Cook County qualified as an eligible local government and received \$428.6M in Coronavirus Relief Funds ("CRF") from the US Department of Treasury to specifically address the issues encountered by Cook County government, its residents, and its business from the effects of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on July 16, 2020, Cook County Board of Commissioners authorized the Cook County COVID-19 Funding Response Plan: From Rapid Response to Equitable Recovery ("Cook County Funding Response Plan"), an initiative which addressed the County's utilization of CRF in the areas of public health initiatives, Cook County government operational needs and continuity of service, suburban municipalities' public health and operational needs, and Countywide economic development initiatives; and

WHEREAS, as part of the Cook County Funding Response Plan, Cook County allocated the CRF as follows: \$302M to operational initiatives and direct costs incurred by the County, \$50.8M to assist 134 suburban municipalities and units of local government, and \$75.8M distributed via the Bureau of Economic Development to direct service providers within Cook County to address critical social service needs as well as economic and community development needs; and

WHEREAS, Cook County allocated the \$302M among operational initiatives and direct costs incurred by the County in order to address COVID-19 and ensure continuity of services in compliance with public health guidance and mandates, including costs incurred to reorganize the County's public space for social distancing, the purchase of equipment to allow workers to telecommute, and funding used to defray the cost of public health and public safety workers directly involved in the response to the pandemic; and

WHEREAS, Cook County allocated the \$50.8M among 134 local municipalities and units of local government pursuant to an equitable distribution strategy, which recognized that a historic disinvestment in certain communities within the County resulted in an unequal capacity for suburban local governments to respond to the challenges that Covid-19 presents; and

WHEREAS, Cook County, through the Bureau of Economic Development, utilized the \$75.8M to launch The Cook County Community Recovery Initiative that includes, but is not limited to, the following: Cook County COVID-19 Small Business Assistance Program, The Southland Development, Authority Business Growth Services, Cook County Job Training and Placement, Cook County Manufacturing Concierge, Cook County Rental Assistance Program, Cook County Mortgage Assistance Program, and Cook County Critical Social Service Programs (Homeless Sheltering Program, Legal Aid, Housing Counseling and Foreclosure Mediation Program, Utility Assistance Program, Food Assistance Program, Direct Financial Assistance Program); and

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2021, the federal government authorized the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 ("ARPA") which includes \$1.9 trillion in federal stimulus funds to hasten the United States' recovery from the economic and health effects caused by the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, the federal government has authorized \$350 billion in ARPA funding to be directly allocated to eligible state, local, territorial, and tribal governments to aid in their recovery from the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, specifically, the federal government has authorized and allocated a federal award of approximately \$1,000,372,385B of ARPA funding to Cook County to assist the County in its recovery from the economic and health effects of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on June 24, 2021, the Cook County American Rescue Plan Act Framework (the "ARPA Framework") was presented to the Cook County Board of Commissioners; and

WHEREAS, the ARPA Framework is a comprehensive plan for the County's expenditure of ARPA funding which includes leveraging and expanding existing County programs and initiatives created by CRF as well as creating new near-term and long-term transformative initiatives. The ARPA Framework will guide investments and provide support for programs and initiatives to assist workers and families, small businesses and impacted industries, as well as programs to address health disparities, housing and community needs, and other identified opportunities; and

WHEREAS, through a robust community engagement plan outlined in the ARPA Framework, the County expects to develop new near-term and transformational initiatives that will be incorporated into the County's FY2022 Annual Appropriation Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, to effectuate the approach outlined in the ARPA Framework, it is necessary to authorize the Chief Financial Officer and the Budget Director to expend a limited amount of ARPA funding for the purpose of continuing and expanding existing County programs and initiatives, including any created under CRF, as well as for the purpose of building operational support capacity within County departments and offices to assist with managing the ARPA funded initiatives; and

WHEREAS, in order to provide for continuity of services, facilitate programs and initiatives to aid Cook County residents and businesses in its recovery efforts, it is necessary to grant limited authority to the Chief Financial Officer and the Budget Director to ensure timely budgetary transfers without advance approval from the Board; provided; however, that such transfers are consistent with the requirements outlined in Sections 26 of the FY2021 Appropriation Bill and Resolution.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, effective July 29, 2021 through December 31, 2021, the Cook County Board of Commissioner does hereby authorize the Chief Financial Officer and the Budget Director to use the ARPA funding as outlined in the Cook County American Rescue Plan Act Framework; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, effective July 29, 2021 through December 31, 2021, the Cook County Board of Commissioners does hereby authorize the Chief Financial Officer and the Budget Director to use the ARPA funding for new and existing personnel, professional services and administrative costs (such as consulting fees, technical assistance provider fees or other third party program administrator fees), along with existing programs previously approved under the Cook County Community Recovery Initiative; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that it is anticipated that an amount up to \$25,000,000 will be spent from the ARPA award through December 31, 2021, divided into the following categories: \$3,000,000 in personnel costs, \$10,000,000 in professional services and administrative costs and \$12,000,000 for Cook County Community Recovery Initiatives; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, effective July 29, 2021 through December 31, 2021, the Cook County Board of Commissioners does hereby authorize the Budget Director or designee of the Budget Director to review and approve budgetary transfer requests related to the ARPA funding allocated herein in accordance with Section 26 of the FY2021 Annual Appropriation Bill and Resolution; provided, however, all budget transfer requests in an amount greater than or equal to \$1,000,000, shall further require the advice and consent of the Cook County Board of Commissioners and written concurrence of the Cook County Chief

Financial Officer or a designee of the Chief Financial Officer; provided further that transfers permitted in accordance with Section 20 of the FY2021 Resolution and Annual Appropriation Bill to allow for end-of-year account reconciliation shall not require additional approvals; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Budget Director shall issue a report on the approved budgetary transfers permitted under this Resolution and Section 26 of the FY 2021 Resolution and Annual Appropriation Bill for the preceding month on the day that coincides with the date of the monthly Cook County Board of Commissioners Meeting to the Cook County Board of Commissioners and the Cook County Health System Board, where applicable. Provided, however, if there is a month for which a Cook County Board meeting is not scheduled, then the report will be issued by the 25th day of such month; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the ARPA funding award approved by the Cook County Board of Commissioners on June 24, 2021 will be further utilized and appropriated in Fiscal Year 2022 in accordance with the Cook County Policy Roadmap and the U.S. Treasury ARPA expenditure categories which include expenditures for Public Health, Negative Economic Impacts, Services to Disproportionately Impacted Communities, Premium Pay, Infrastructure, Revenue Replacement and Administrative Costs and will be included the FY2022 Annual Appropriation Ordinance.

Summary: The contract between Cook County and Branded Cities will allow for a Digital Signage Initiative proposing the building of digital signage for billboards displaying advertising over a 25-year period. The Digital Signage Initiative will build up to 30 sign faces across Cook County along interstate and main arterial roadways. Compensation for the County will come in the form of a lease (Minimum Annual Guarantee) and an overall revenue share. The Digital Signage Initiative is expected to pay a Minimum Annual Guarantee to the County in the form of a monthly lease and will also average share in all revenue up to 43.6% with the County annually. As part of the proposal, the County will also be able to display public service messaging for up to three minutes an hour. The County is expected to potentially receive \$55 million over the life of the contract (approximately \$2.7 million annually) and average \$130,000 per operational sign.

DIVISION 9 STATE'S ATTORNEY

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, Chapter 2 - Administration, Article IV. - Officers and Employees, Division 9. State's Attorney, Sec. 2-329 *et seq.*, is hereby amended as follows:

DIVISION 9. - STATE'S ATTORNEY

Subdivision I. In General

Sec. 2-329.State's Attorney and Special State's Attorneys' reports to the Litigation Subcommittee.

(a)*Notice of Monetary Counterclaims and Fee Requests.* When representing Cook County, Cook County Departments or Officers, or any County Official in any civil legal action in State or Federal Court, the State's Attorney or a Special State's Attorney shall provide notice to the Litigation Subcommittee of the Finance Committee of the Cook County Board of Commissioners (Litigation Subcommittee) prior to filing a monetary counterclaim, request for monetary sanctions, request for statutory reimbursement and/or request for fees in excess of \$100,000.00. If the State's Attorney or Special State's Attorney is unable to provide notice to the Litigation Subcommittee in advance of filing, the State's Attorney or Special State's Attorney shall inform the Chair of the Litigation Subcommittee in advance of filing and provide notice to the Litigation Subcommittee at its next scheduled meeting.

(b)*Quarterly Inventory of Civil Actions*. The State's Attorney shall give a quarterly inventory report to the Litigation Subcommittee of the Finance Committee of the Cook County Board of Commissioners of all civil actions that Cook County is named as a party in all courts of State or Federal jurisdiction.

(b)Settlement. The State's Attorney or Special State's Attorney shall request authority from the Litigation Subcommittee prior to settling any matter in excess of \$100,000. Attorneys shall provide a written settlement analysis and recommendation to the Litigation Subcommittee and shall be prepared to present that recommendation at a meeting of the Subcommittee. In addition, the State's Attorney or Special State's Attorney shall provide the Litigation Subcommittee written information regarding cases anticipated to settle in excess of \$500,000 and shall place that informational item on the Litigation Subcommittee's agenda at least one month in advance of seeking authority to settle.

(c)*Permission to try.* The State's Attorney or Special State's Attorneys shall obtain the approval of the Litigation Subcommittee prior to taking a matter to trial. When the State's Attorney or Special State's Attorney recommends that a civil matter proceed to trial, they shall provide a revised Case Summary and recommendation to the Litigation Subcommittee. That attorney shall be prepared to present that recommendation at a meeting of the Subcommittee. Prior to seeking the authority to bring a matter to trial, the State's Attorney or Special State's Attorneys must present a revised case budget with the estimated cost of the potential trial to the Litigation Subcommittee for approval.

(d)*Appeals.* The State's Attorney or Special State's Attorneys must notify the Chair of any final and appealable ruling having a negative financial impact on the County in excess of \$100,000 in civil matters within 72 hours of the ruling. If an appeal may result in the imposition of accrued interest upon the County, the State's Attorney or Special State's Attorney must obtain authorization from the Litigation Subcommittee before pursuing the appeal. However, the State's Attorney or Special State's Attorneys shall take all steps necessary to protect the interests and preserve the appeal rights of the parties they represent pending a decision to appeal, including the filing of appropriate post-trial motions or a notice of appeal when necessary. The decision to appeal must be approved by the Litigation Subcommittee.

(e) *Ethics Reports.* All Special State's Attorneys shall comply with the requirements of Section 2-110(d) of this Code. (Ord. No. 17-5249, 1-17-2018.)

Sec. 2-330.State's Attorney's forest preserve district representation special purpose fund.

(a)The State's Attorney shall charge a fee as set out in an intergovernmental agreement for Assistant State's Attorneys assigned from the Civil Actions Bureau of the Office of the State's Attorney to represent the Forest Preserve District in certain civil litigation matters.

(b)Such fee collected shall be placed in a special fund to be held by the Treasurer of the County, to be expended exclusively for the operation of the Office of the State's Attorney. (Ord. No. 10-O-16, 4-6-2010.)

Subdivision II. Cook County Guidelines for Special State's Attorneys Sec. 2-331.Guidelines established.

(a)*Short title*. This subdivision shall be known and may be cited as the "Cook County Guidelines for Special State's Attorneys.

(b)*Purpose.* In the event that the Cook County State's Attorney is sick, absent, unable to attend to a case or has an interest in a case, a Special State's Attorney can be appointed by a court of competent jurisdiction pursuant to 55 ILCS 5/3-9008. The appointment of any Special State's Attorney is considered temporary and limited in scope to the instant matter before the appointing court.

(c)*Definitions*. The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this [sub]division, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this Section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Attorney is an Attorney appointed by a court of competent jurisdiction, pursuant to 55 ILCS 5/3-9008 and who has fully complied with the Notice Provision contained in Section 2-332 of this subdivision.

Litigation Subcommittee or *Subcommittee* means the Finance Subcommittee on Litigation of the Cook County Board of Commissioners.

Chair of the Litigation Subcommittee or *Chair* means the chairperson of the Finance Subcommittee on Litigation of the Cook County Board of Commissioners.

Case Summary means the report prepared by the Attorney and submitted to the Litigation Subcommittee that updates the Litigation Subcommittee on the progress and status of the case assigned to the Attorney.

Case Management means the regular documentation of the Attorneys' work on an individual case, including, but not limited to, a Case Budget (if applicable), Case Summary, modifications and Quarterly Status Reports.

Case Budget means the estimate of legal fees and expenses through the time of judgment or other completion including costs associated with the use of third-party vendors.

Modification of Approved Case Summary means the required report made within five business days to the Chair of the Litigation Subcommittee of any major deviations to the budget that would significantly expand the planned activities set forth in the Case Summary.

Quarterly Status Reports means the written reports that update the status of the case, made in writing and submitted to the Chair of the Subcommittee on Litigation at least four times annually.

(d)*Applicability*. This Subdivision shall apply to all Attorneys appointed as Cook County Special State's Attorneys by a court of competent jurisdiction, pursuant to 55 ILCS 5/3-9008 to represent the county or a county office, officer, board, commission, employee and/or agent.

(e)[*Compliance required.*] All Attorneys who represent a Cook County party in multiple litigation matters as an Attorney, must comply fully with the terms of this Subdivision for each separate matter of representation.

(f)[*Filing appearances.*] No Attorney may file an appearance in a lawsuit on behalf of an elected official of Cook County or County Office unless they are appointed as a Special State's Attorney by a court of competent jurisdiction or have been authorized by the Office of the Cook County State's Attorney to file an appearance. (Ord. No. 13-O-48, 10-2-2013.)

Sec. 2-332.Notice.

Notices of a motion seeking a Special State's Attorney appointment shall be provided at least 48 hours in advance to Cook County; courtesy copies of said Notices and Motions seeking Special State's Attorney appointment shall also be provided at least 48 hours in advance of the motion being heard to the Chief of the Civil Actions Bureau, the Chair of the Litigation Subcommittee and the President of the County Board. Within 48 hours of appointment by a court of competent jurisdiction, all Attorneys shall provide written notice to the Chair, the President of the County Board and the Chief of the Civil Actions Bureau of the Cook County State's Attorney's Office of their appointment by a court of competent jurisdiction. The Chief of the Civil Actions Bureau shall send a copy of this Subdivision to each Attorney and advise them of the County's request that they comply with the Cook County Guidelines for Special State's Attorneys. (Ord. No. 13-O-48, 10-2-2013.)

Sec. 2-333.Case management.

(a) *Case management*. Each Attorney who has filed an appearance on behalf of Cook County: Shall submit a Case Budget and a Case Summary to the County Board through its Litigation Subcommittee within 30 days of their Appointment or as soon thereafter as the Subcommittee meets. This information and other communications between the Attorney and the Board or Subcommittee shall constitute privileged and confidential Attorney-client communications, unless there is a conflict of interests in disclosing that information or communication between the represented party and the Cook County Board of Commissioners.

- (1) Shall include in the Case Summary the major activities anticipated for the successful defense or prosecution of the case. The Case Summary shall also include estimates of potential liability, whether the case is appropriate for settlement, and the assessment of the probable outcome of litigation; and
- (2) Shall report any modifications or deviations to the initial Case Summary in quarterly reports to the Chair.

(a)*Review and approval of Case Summary and Budget*. The Subcommittee shall review and approve the Case Summary and Budget. The Attorney is not prohibited from initiating legal activities reasonably necessary to adequately protect the legal interests of their client prior to the Committee's approval review of the Case Summary and Budget. Special State's Attorneys appointed in criminal matters shall not be required to submit a Case Summary to the Litigation Subcommittee.

(b)*Estimated Case Budget.* The budget shall include an estimate of legal fees and expenses through the time of judgment or other completion and shall allocate the fees and expenses associated with each phase. Should the court determine that an expansion of the representation is necessary that substantially

increases the Case budget, the Attorney shall inform the Chair who may provide the court with information on the financial impact of that expansion on the County, pursuant to 55 ILCS 5/3-9008.

(d)*Rejection of Attorneys who have filed an appearance on behalf of Cook County in Federal or Circuit Court without Being Appointed as a Special State's Attorney by a Court.* At any time, the Litigation Subcommittee may reject the representation of any Attorney who has not been appointed as a Special State's Attorney. Upon rejection, the Litigation Subcommittee may ask the State's Attorney to provide representation or petition the respective court to appoint an appropriate Attorney. The Litigation Subcommittee may also reject any Attorney from providing representation if they have failed to comply with the Cook County Guidelines for Special State's Attorneys in previous representations of Cook County parties. (Ord. No. 13-O-48, 10-2-2013.)

Sec. 2-334. Fees, expenses, rates and fee petitions.

(a)*Fees and expenses.* Attorneys shall be paid reasonable fees and costs based on the type and nature of the case. Such fees and costs shall conform to the fees and costs authorized under this Section. The Attorney must pay for all expenses in advance unless otherwise expressly directed by the court or agreed to in writing by the Litigation Subcommittee. Reimbursement of expenses shall be requested as part of Attorney's fee petitions. Expenses shall be reimbursed as follows:

Photocopying. Reasonable photocopying at actual cost, not to exceed \$0.10 per page.

- (1) *Messenger service*. The use of messengers when there is a genuine need for expedited delivery at actual charges of a third-party vendor or, when an in-house firm messenger is used, at actual <u>cost (not at the paralegal or legal assistant billing rate).</u>
- (2) *Computerized research.* Actual costs of reasonably necessary computerized research services.
- (3) *Experts.* The reasonable fees of qualified consulting and testifying experts retained to provide opinions necessary to the defense or prosecution of the litigation, except that all expert fees must be pre-approved by the Chief of the Civil Actions Bureau if they are anticipated to exceed \$500.
- (4) Travel. Air travel expenses must not exceed the highest fare coach rate for the flight. Mileage expenses shall be at the Internal Revenue Service deductible rates. Hotels, car rental companies and airlines offering moderate prices and discounted corporate rates shall be used. Attorneys shall reduce the hourly rate charged by 50 percent while an Attorney or paraprofessional is traveling, unless legal work in being performed and is documented.
- (b) General business costs. Law firm overhead expenses including, but not limited to, rent, electricity, supplies, secretarial and support services, computer system expenses, overtime expenses, local telephone service and other similar expenses, shall be considered part of the Attorneys' hourly rate.
- (c) *Miscellaneous costs*. Attorneys shall not seek reimbursement of fees for:

- (1) Preparing a fee petition. Conducting a conflicts check;
- (2) Entertainment expenses;
- (3) <u>Food and beverages while working and/or hosting meetings;</u>
- (54) Excessive staffing;
- $(\underline{65})$ Work resulting from Attorney error;
- (4) <u>Purely clerical work;</u>
- $(\underline{76})$ Preparing an estimated case budget.

Attorneys' appearances and depositions shall, uUnder most circumstances, be based on the work of a-

singleonly one Attorney should bill for attending court appearances, depositions, client conferences, and Litigation Subcommittee meetings. The Attorney shall seek prior approval from the Chief of the Civil Actions Bureau, or the Chief's delegate if the Attorney seeks to have more than one attorney in attendance.

Fee petitions. Unless otherwise expressly directed by the court, Attorneys shall submit fee petitions <u>either monthly or</u> quarterly. If the accumulated charges for a quarter are less than \$500.00, the charges shall be included in the next quarterly fee petition. Attorneys shall submit all fee petitions to the Chair in a time appropriate for referral to and review by the Subcommittee prior to filing the fee petition with the court. The time spent performing the chargeable services shall be recorded on a daily basis to the nearest $\frac{1}{10}$ dth of an hour and shall be broken down in detail, describing the work performed by each individual during that time period. The fee petition shall contain the amount charged for each Attorney and paraprofessional, including the time, the hourly rate and summary total for each. The fee petition shall itemize expenses according to categories including the following: photocopying, messenger service, computerized research, experts and travel.

(e)*Rate structure.* Unless otherwise expressly directed by the court or the Subcommittee, Attorneys shall bill for their services on an hourly basis. and in accordance with the Fee Schedule set forth below, as approved and amended from time to time by the Board. The Fee Schedule shall establish the maximum hourly charges payable for the type of service provided. Hourly rates for each individual civil matter shall be negotiated with the Chief of the Civil Actions Bureau, with attorney fees not to exceed \$290 per hour, and paralegal/legal assistant rates not to exceed \$90 per hour, without approval of the Subcommittee. Law clerks shall not bill for their time without prior permission of the Chief of the Civil Actions Bureau. Attorneys may propose alternative fee structures such as blended, flat or contingent rate upon approval of the Subcommittee. In criminal matters, the hourly rates for attorneys shall not exceed \$205, and the hourly rates for paralegals shall not exceed \$90, without approval of the Subcommittee.

(f)To the fullest extent consistent with this Section, Attorneys in civil matters shall adhere to the Billing Guidelines for Outside Counsel issued by the Civil Actions Bureau of the Cook County State's Attorney's Office, as published and as may be amended from time to time. (Ord. No. 13-O-48, 10-2-2013.)

Sec. 2-335. Reserved. Sec. 2-335.Litigation resolution.

(a)Alternative dispute resolution. If an Attorney believes that alternative dispute resolution is appropriate to resolve a matter, that Attorney shall bring a proposal recommending such action to the Litigation Subcommittee for its consideration and approval.

(b)*Settlement*. Attorneys shall communicate all settlement proposals to the Subcommittee in a timely manner. Attorneys shall provide a written settlement analysis and recommendation to the Litigation Subcommittee and shall be prepared to present that recommendation at a meeting of the Subcommittee.

(b)*Permission to try.* Attorneys shall obtain the approval of the Litigation Subcommittee prior to taking a matter to trial. When an Attorney recommends that a civil matter proceed to trial, that Attorney shall provide a revised Case Summary and recommendation to the Litigation Subcommittee. That Attorney shall be prepared to present that recommendation at a meeting of the Subcommittee. Prior to seeking the authority to bring a matter to trial, Attorneys must present a revised case budget with the estimated cost of the potential trial to the Litigation Subcommittee for approval.

(d)*Appeals.* Attorneys must notify the Chair of any final and appealable ruling in civil matters within 72 hours of the ruling. If an appeal may result in the imposition of accrued interest upon the County, the Attorney must obtain authorization from the Litigation Subcommittee before pursuing the appeal. However, Attorneys shall take all steps necessary to protect the interests and preserve the appeal rights of the parties they represent pending a decision to appeal, including the filing of appropriate post-trial motions or a notice of appeal when necessary. guidance, they shall be relieved of the obligation to comply with the Cook County Guidelines for Special State's Attorney, but only to the extent necessary to avoid the perceived problems that prompted the request for guidance.

(b)*Conflicts check.* Before accepting a court appointment, when applicable, or before rendering any services, Attorneys must conduct a conflict of interest review and provide the Litigation Subcommittee with a written listadvise the Office of the Cook County State's Attorney of all actual or potential conflicts of interest and matters that may present the appearance of a conflict.

(c)*Timely notification*. Attorneys must provide the <u>Office of the Cook County State's</u> <u>AttorneyChair</u> a written notice of any actual or potential conflicts or the appearance of a conflict within five days of learning of the conflict.

(d)*Waiver*. Attorneys must be free of any conflict of interest under the rules of professional conduct unless the conflict is waived by the Litigation Subcommittee and the party represented by the Attorney. (Ord. No. 13-O-48, 10-2-2013.)

Sec. 2-337.Penalties.

(a)If an Attorney fails to comply with Sections 2-331 through 2-335, the Litigation Subcommittee may delay or deny the payment of any accrued or future fees and costs for the matter of representation.

(b)An Attorney who files an appearance without being appointed as a Special State's Attorney by a court shall not be paid for any time or costs accrued prior to their appointment by a court or the State's Attorney. (Ord. No. 13-O-48, 10-2-2013.)

(a)The State's Attorney shall report to the Board of Commissioners quarterly on the cost that the office incurs due to processing court cases involving firearms. (Ord. No. 18-1750, 2-7-2018.)

WHEREAS, the nothing in the revised code provisions shall be construed so as to conflict with applicable Federal or State Laws, rules or regulations. Nothing in the revised code shall authorize the department to impose any duties or obligations in conflict with limitations on authority established by State or federal law at the time such agency or department action is taken. The County shall suspend enforcement of the revised code to the extent that said enforcement would conflict with any preemptive State or federal legislation subsequently adopted. Where this revised code may conflict or overlap, whichever imposes the more stringent restrictions shall prevail; and

WHEREAS, the revised code provisions attached hereto will bring Cook County in line with commonly recognized building practices utilized within and across Cook County; and

WHEREAS, adopting these comprehensive amendments will make Cook County consistent with many of its bordering governing bodies and municipal entities, thereby promoting transparency, economic development and incorporation of unincorporated areas of Cook County.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, by the President and the Cook County Board of Commissioners that Part II, Land Development Ordinances, Chapter 102 BUILDINGS AND BUILDING REGULATIONS, ARTICLE III - BUILDING CODE, Sections 102-110, of the Cook County Code are hereby enacted as attached hereto; and

Sec. 102-110. Regulation of buildings and structures.

The following provisions of the 2021 International Building Code are hereby adopted by reference to provide the regulations of buildings and structures in unincorporated Cook County, Illinois: Chapter 1, Part 1; Chapters 2 through 26; Chapter 28; Chapters 30 through 35; Appendices C through I; and Sections J101, J102, and J106 through J108, of Appendix J. The above provisions are applicable in full force and effect as if set out at length in this Code. WHEREAS, our nation's immigration system should uphold our basic values of family, economic opportunity, freedom, fairness, and other fundamental ideals of the American Dream; and

PROPOSED ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

RULES OF ORGANIZATION AND PROCEDURE

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that CHAPTER 2 - ADMINISTRATION, ARTICLE III - COUNTY BOARD, DIVISION 2 - RULES OF ORGANIZATION AND PROCEDURE, SECTION 2-102 of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as Follows:

Sec. 2-102. Interpretation, force and effect.

(a) *Applicability*. The meetings and actions of the Board, including all of its committees, shall be governed by this division.

(b) *Effect of State law.* Except as otherwise specifically provided in this division, this division supersedes all provisions of Illinois statute to the extent of any conflict or inconsistency, except for statutes that, by their terms, specifically limit home rule units pursuant to Article VII, Section 6(g) or 6(h) of the 1970 Constitution of the State of Illinois.

(c) *Effective date*. This division shall be in full force and effect upon adoption, and shall remain in full force and effect except as amended in accordance herewith, or until superseded by new rules adopted as part of the organization of a newly constituted Board at the commencement of a term.

(d) *Interpretation.* This division shall be interpreted and applied to foster the goals and purposes set forth in Section 2-101. This division is to be construed in accordance with the customary American usage and meaning of parliamentary terms and expressions and the plain meaning of the ordinary words appearing herein. In case of ambiguous application, this division shall be applied in a manner that fosters openness, accountability and fairness in the operation of the Board.

(e) *Adoption of rules.* At the commencement of a term, the Board may adopt new rules of organization and procedure by Ordinance setting forth such rules in their entirety and repealing these rules. Such Ordinance must be adopted by a majority of those elected. Rules so adopted shall supersede these rules.

(f) *Rules for committee meetings*. The rules of procedure for all committee, subcommittee and special committee meetings shall be the same as for Board meetings, except that committees composed of less than the entire Board shall require only a majority of the committee members for a quorum.

(g) Amendment or suspension of rules. Any provision of this division may be temporarily suspended by majority vote, upon motion of any Commissioner specifying the rule to be suspended.

(h) *Remote meetings*. All public meetings of the Board and its committees, joint committees, and subcommittees may be conducted by means of electronic, video, audio, or telephonic connection ("remote meeting") for the duration of the Illinois Gubernatorial Disaster Proclamation, including any extensions thereto, related to COVID-19 or a public health crisis. A member who desires to attend and participate in a remote public meeting shall do so by the designated electronic means. For purposes of conducting a remote meeting, the terms "written", "in writing", "document" and "copy" in these rules includes printed or electronic means, and a rule that requires an instrument to be handed to another member or the meeting Chair may be accomplished by electronic transmission.

(i) *Remote Participation in Meetings.* At any meeting where a quorum of the body is physically present, a majority of the public body may vote to allow a member to participate and vote remotely (by audio or visual means) if the member is unable to be physically present due to:

(1) A personal illness or disability;

(2) Employment purposes or the business of the public body; or

(3) A family or other emergency.

(4) The member desiring to participate remotely gives notice to the Secretary of the Board no later than 24 hours prior to the meeting in case of personal illness or disability or employment purposes or business of the public body or as soon as practically able in the case of a family or other emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 1 General Provisions, Section 1-9 of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as Follows:

Sec. 1-9. Rules and regulations issued by County departments, agencies, and offices impacting the public at-large.

(a) Public facing Rules and Regulations issued to implement Ordinances and resolutions enacted by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, as defined in Section 1-3 of Chapter 1 of this Code and issued by County departments, agencies and offices in accordance with this Code shall be transmitted to the Chair of the Cook County Rules Committee and posted on the County department, agency or offices web page at www.cookcountyil.gov at least ten days prior to taking effect, with the exception of emergency Rules and Regulations which shall be transmitted to the Chair of the Cook County Rules Committee and posted on the applicable department, agency or office web page at the time of issuance.

(b) Public facing Rules and Regulations issued by County departments, agencies, and offices in accordance with this Code shall be placed on the County Board Agenda by the issuing department, agency or office and referred to the Rules Committee.

(c) where said <u>Public facing</u> Rules and Regulations will be received and filed, unless the Rules Committee has suggested modifications. must be approved by the Rules Committee. Should the Rules Committee have suggested modifications, the Rules Committee shall confer with the issuing department, agency or office prior to making any suggested amendments. to update with modifications. Upon completion of the modifications, the issuing department, agency, or office shall refer the modified rules to the Rules Committee.

(d) After the passage of the Rules and Regulations by the Rules Committee, the Rules and Regulations shall be sent to the full Board of Cook County Commissioners for final approval.

(e) County departments, agencies and offices will be charged with maintaining a hard copy of its respective Rules and Regulations for public review and shall place a copy of said Rules and Regulations and any amended Rules and Regulations on their respective web page at www.cookcountyil.gov.

Effective date: This Ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.

MINIMUM WAGE

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that CHAPTER 42 - HUMAN RELATIONS, Sec. 42-13 and 42-14 of the Cook County Code are hereby amended as Follows:

Sec. 42-13. Minimum hourly wage.

Except as provided in Sections 42-14 of this Code, every Employer shall pay no less than the following Wages to each Covered Employee for each hour of work performed for that Employer while physically present within the geographic boundaries of Cook County:

- (a) Beginning on July 1, 2017, the greater of:
- (1) The minimum hourly Wage set by the Minimum Wage Law;
- (2) The minimum hourly Wage set by the Fair Labor Standards Act; or
- (3) Ten dollars per hour.
- (b) Beginning on July 1, 2018, the greater of:
- (1) The minimum hourly Wage set by the Minimum Wage Law;

- (2) The minimum hourly Wage set by the Fair Labor Standards Act; or
- (3) Eleven dollars per hour.
- (c) Beginning on July 1, 2019, the greater of:
- (1) The minimum hourly Wage set by the Minimum Wage Law;
- (2) The minimum hourly Wage set by the Fair Labor Standards Act; or
- (3) Twelve dollars per hour.
- (d) Beginning on July 1, 2020, the greater of:
- (1) The minimum hourly Wage set by the Minimum Wage Law;
- (2) The minimum hourly Wage set by the Fair Labor Standards Act; or
- (3) Thirteen dollars per hour.
- (e) Beginning on July 1, 2021, and on every July 1 thereafter, the greater of:
- (1) The minimum hourly Wage set by the Minimum Wage Law;
- (2) The minimum hourly Wage set by the Fair Labor Standards Act; or

(3) Cook County's minimum hourly Wage from the previous year, increased in proportion to the increase, if any, in the CPI, provided, however, that if the CPI increases by more than 2.5 percent in any year, the Cook County minimum Wage increase shall be capped at 2.5 percent, and that there shall be no Cook County minimum Wage increase in any year when the unemployment rate in Cook County for the preceding year, as calculated by the Illinois Department of Employment Security, was equal to or greater than 8.5 <u>7</u> percent.

Any increase pursuant to subsection 42-13(e) shall be rounded up to the nearest multiple of \$0.05. Any increase pursuant to subsection 42-13(e) shall remain in effect until any subsequent adjustment is made. On or before June 1, 2021, and on or before every June 1 thereafter, the Director shall make available to Employers a bulletin announcing the adjusted minimum hourly Wage for the upcoming year.

Sec. 42-14. Minimum hourly wage in occupations receiving gratuities.

(a) Every Employer of a Covered Employee engaged in an Occupation in which Gratuities have customarily and usually constituted part of the remuneration shall pay no less than the following Wage to each Covered Employee for each hour of work performed for that Employer while physically present within the geographic boundaries of the County:

or

(1) Beginning on July 1, 2017, the greater of: (A) the minimum hourly Wage set by the Fair Labor Standards Act for Tipped Employees; or (B) the minimum hourly Wage set by the Minimum Wage Law for workers who receive Gratuities.

(2) Beginning on July 1, 2018, and on every July 1 thereafter, the greater of:

(A) The minimum hourly Wage set by the Fair Labor Standards Act for tipped workers;

(B) The minimum hourly Wage set by the Minimum Wage Law for workers who receive Gratuities;

(C) Cook County's minimum hourly Wage from the previous year for workers who receive Gratuities, increased in proportion to the increase, if any, in the CPI, provided, however, that if the CPI increases by more than 2.5 percent in any year, the Cook County minimum Wage increase for workers who receive Gratuities shall be capped at 2.5 percent, and that there shall be no Cook County minimum Wage increase for workers who receive Gratuities in any year when the unemployment rate in Cook County for the preceding year, as calculated by the Illinois Department of Employment Security, was equal to or greater than $\frac{8.5}{7}$ percent.

Any increase pursuant to subsection 42-14(a)(2)(C) shall be rounded up to the nearest multiple of \$0.05. Any increase pursuant to subsection 42-14(a)(2) shall remain in effect until any subsequent adjustment is made. On or before June 1, 2018, and on or before every June 1 thereafter, the Director shall make available to Employers a bulletin announcing Cook County's minimum hourly Wage for the upcoming year for workers who receive Gratuities.

(b) Each Employer that pays a Covered Employee the Wage described in subsection 42-14(a) shall transmit to the Director, in a manner provided by regulation, substantial evidence establishing:

(1) The amount the Covered Employee received as Gratuities during the relevant pay period; and

(2) That no part of that amount was returned to the Employer.

If an Employer is required by the Minimum Wage Law to provide substantially similar data to the Illinois Department of Labor, the Director may allow the Employer to comply with this subsection 42-14(b) by filing a copy of the state documentation.

(d) A Special Revenue Fund for the Financing of the Children's Waiting Room. Upon passage of this Ordinance No. 19-2843, the Comptroller shall create a special revenue Fund to be entitled, "The Children's Waiting Room Revenue Fund."

(e) A Special Revenue Fund for Financing Dispute Resolution Services. Upon passage of this Ordinance, the Comptroller shall create a special revenue Fund to be entitled "The Dispute Resolution Fund" as provided for by Illinois law, Illinois Revised Code 710 ILCS 20/3.

This Section establishes minimum standards for asset marketing programs, and will apply to County property, including its website, provided that the proposed use is consistent with the character of County-owned property, serves the public interest, and takes into account the possibility that potential revenue opportunities may increase through the collective or bundled use of particular assets.
