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RESOLUTION REQUESTING AN UPDATE ON COOK COUNTY JUDICIAL STAKEHOLDERS'ACTIONS TO IMPROVE ACCESS TO JUSTICE FOR VICTIMS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

WHEREAS, the Cook County Commission on Women's Issues issued "Recommendations: Protections for Survivors of Gender Based Violence" in July 2021; and

WHEREAS, during the Cook County Board of Commissioners meeting on July 29, 2021, a public speaker referenced an incident where a woman seeking an emergency order of protection was denied access to the Domestic Violence Court; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Board of Commissioners supports expanded courtroom access for survivors of domestic violence to apply for legal orders of protection and understands the urgent need for improving access to justice for victims of domestic violence; and

WHEREAS, the Office of the Chief Judge and the Clerk of the Circuit Court have also concurred with the recommendations of the Cook County Commission on Women's Issues and recognize that timely access to court proceedings and advocacy services must be guaranteed to victims of domestic violence.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Cook County Board of Commissioners requests an immediate update, at the Cook County Board meeting on October 7, 2021, from the Office of the Chief Judge and the Clerk of the Circuit Court on the progress being made toward the urgent goal of 24-hour domestic violence petitioners' access to the Court; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Cook County Board of Commissioners also requests that the County's judicial stakeholders including the Clerk of the Circuit Court, the Cook County Sheriff's Office, the Cook County State's Attorney's Office, the Cook County Public Defender's Office and the Office of the Chief Judge provide the Commissioners with comprehensive plans, during the Finance Committee budget hearings in October, detailing how their offices can address the Cook County Commission on Women's Issues "Recommendations: Protections for Survivors of Gender Based Violence" and how their offices can more effectively assist victims of domestic violence in their efforts to safely engage with the Cook County justice system.

RECOGNITION OF THE CHICAGO VETERINARY MEDICAL ASSOCIATION (CVMA) COMMEMORATING 125 YEARS OF ORGANIZED VETERINARY MEDICINE IN THE CHICAGOLAND AREA

WHEREAS, the Chicago Veterinary Medical Association (CVMA) is an Illinois based, non-profit trade association that represents veterinarians and the veterinary profession in the Chicago Metropolitan area; and

WHEREAS, the CVMA is one of the largest regional veterinary medical associations in the nation, with over 1000 veterinarians and 4000 support staff serving over 1 million pets; and

WHEREAS, the Chicago Veterinary Medical Association was established as an organization on August 7, 1896, under the original name Chicago Veterinary Society; and

WHEREAS, the founding members of the Chicago Veterinary Society met originally to form a veterinary society "for the mutual benefit of its members, both intellectually and socially, and for the elevation of the profession generally"; and

WHEREAS, at the time the Chicago Veterinary Society was founded in 1896, there existed two veterinary Colleges in Chicago; Chicago Veterinary College (1883-1920) and McKillip Veterinary Colleges (1892-1920); and

WHEREAS, the first female veterinarian in the United States, Dr. Mignon Nicholson, graduated from McKillip Veterinary College in Chicago in 1903; and

WHEREAS, one of the first female veterinary practitioners in the United States, Dr. Elinor McGrath, graduated from Chicago Veterinary College in 1910 and practiced small animal medicine for 37 years in Chicago at the Hospital for Dogs and Cats at 3247 Indiana Avenue; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Elinor McGrath has been posthumously recognized by the Chicago Veterinary Medical Association and Illinois State Veterinary Medical Association and was the first woman in the United States to join the American Veterinary Medical Association; and

WHEREAS, due to the rich history of veterinary medicine in Chicago, it has been stated by Dr. Phyllis Hickney Larsen, DVM, Past President of the American Veterinary Medical History Society and Former Chair of the History Committee of the Association for Women Veterinarians; that "There has probably been no city in the United States that has been more instrumental to the development of veterinary medicine than Chicago"; and

WHEREAS, the profession of veterinary medicine plays a critical role in the health and well-being of society, provides human-quality healthcare for more than 180 million beloved family pets in the United States, fosters the abundance and the safety of the nation's food supply by promoting the health and productivity of the nation's herds and flocks, makes significant contributions to the protection of public health through food safety and infectious disease control, and advances human and animal well-being through biomedical research; and

WHEREAS, the veterinarians of the CVMA represent a broad diversity of disciplines within the veterinary profession including, but not limited to general, specialty and emergency practice, shelter medicine, public health, regulatory medicine, research, industry and academia; and

RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING OCTOBER 2021 AS BREAST CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

WHEREAS, October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month, which is an annual campaign to increase awareness and public knowledge of this disease, especially the importance of early detection of breast cancer diagnosis and treatment; and

WHEREAS, in the United States, more than 281,550 women and approximately 2,650 men are diagnosed with new cases of invasive breast cancer according to the Susan G. Komen Foundation; and

WHEREAS, at this time there are more than 3.8 million breast cancer survivors in the United States which includes women still being treated and those who have completed treatment; and

WHEREAS, for women in the United States, breast cancer death is the second leading cause of cancer death, rates are higher than those for any other cancer, besides lung cancer; and

WHEREAS, breast cancer became the most common cancer globally as of 2021, accounting for 12% of all new annual cancer cases worldwide, according to the World Health Organization; and

WHEREAS, the chance that a woman will die from breast cancer is about 1 in 39 (about 2.6%); and

WHEREAS, as a result of early breast cancer detection through mammogram screenings and increased awareness lead to the death rate decreased from 2013 to 2018 by 1%; and

WHEREAS, the American Cancer Society estimates that 43,600 women and 530 men will die from breast cancer in 2021; and

WHEREAS, according to the Illinois Department of Public Health, the projected female breast cancer incidence for Cook County from 2018-2022 is 21,130 (5-year count) with an average annual count of 4,225; and

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WHEREAS, African American women face both disproportionate exposure to breast carcinogens and the highest risk of serious health impacts from the disease, and in women under 45, breast cancer is more common in black women than white women, and overall, black women are more likely to die of breast cancer with African American women having a 31% breast cancer mortality rate - the highest of any United States racial or ethnic group; and

HONORING THE LIFE AND CONTRIBUTIONS OF THE HONORABLE HOWARD (HOWIE) CARROLL

WHEREAS, Howard ("Howie") W. Carroll, age 79, died on October 1, 2021. He was a born leader, statesman, voice for the voiceless, and storyteller extraordinaire. He was born in Chicago to the late Barney and Lyla Carroll. He received his bachelor's degree in business administration from Roosevelt University, studied in the first master's degree program in Urban Studies at Loyola University Chicago, and received his law degree from DePaul University College of Law. He practiced law in Chicago, Illinois and was of counsel to Kamensky Rubinstein Hochman and Delott, LLP; and

WHEREAS, Sen. Carroll was sworn into the Illinois House of Representatives from 1971 to 1973 and the Senate in 1973, where he served for 26 years from 1973 to 1999. He chaired the budget process for 16 years, was the longest serving budget chair in Illinois history, and became known as the person to see regarding the operations of Illinois and local governments. Subsequently, Sen. Carroll also gained recognition for his knowledge on health care and its delivery system in this state. He authored numerous bills focusing on equal rights and human rights, including the first in the country Hate Crimes bill, the first to include sexuality in the Human Rights Act, and CHIP, Illinois' Comprehensive Health Insurance Plan. While his achievements were many, all were accomplished with a keen wit and contagious laugh; and

WHEREAS, Sen. Carroll was elected the 50th Ward Chicago Democratic Committeeman and served in that capacity for 20 years; he also served as Treasurer for both Cook County and the Chicago Democratic Central Committees. Previously, Sen. Carroll served, through Presidential appointment, as the United States Representative on the Executive Committee of the Atlantic Alliance of Young Political Leaders. He is listed in Who's Who in America, Who's Who of World Political Leaders, Oxford's Who's Who, and Marquis' Who's Who, amongst other publications; and

WHEREAS, Sen. Carroll was affectionately known as the Forrest Gump of politics for his meetings with Presidents, Prime Ministers, and Mother Teresa, for his help stopping the Nazis from marching in Skokie in 1977; and

WHEREAS, on January 27, 2016, Senate President John Cullerton reappointed Carroll a member of the State Government Suggestion Award Board for a term expiring January 11, 2017. The State Government Suggestion Award Board administers the program that rewards state employees and members of the general

public with a cash award for suggestions to improve the operation of state government that result in substantial monetary savings to the state; and

WHEREAS, Sen. Carroll held a professorship on the complemental faculty of Rush College, having lectured in the Master's Program of Health Administration. He also lectured to many national associations on the art of negotiating, health care delivery, and in the areas of governmental operations and fiscal controls. On a local level, Sen. Carroll lectured in the areas of the laws of various governmental entities, real estate taxation and zoning, and advising business enterprises on governmental regulations, contracting, and hearing processes; and

WHEREAS, Sen. Carroll was a founder, Corporate Secretary, and member of the Executive Committee of Chicago Fiber Optics Corp. (d/b/a Metropolitan Fiber Systems of Chicago, Inc.); Metropolitan Fiber Systems (which became World Com, now MCI); Midway Air Transportation; and Midway Airlines. He was the Corporate Secretary, Board Member and General Counsel to InfrAegis, Inc., a company which develops Homeland Security products to protect facilities and save lives; and

WHEREAS, Sen. Carroll was a family man and deeply devoted to his Jewish faith. He served as Vice Chairman of the Jewish Federation of Metropolitan Chicago for a period of time and was seated on its Board of Directors. Sen. Carroll also served as Vice Chair of the Board of the North Shore Center for the Performing Arts Foundation, a performing arts venue in Skokie, Illinois that he helped create. He was also a Trustee of Michael Reese Health Trust and an Officer of the Weiss Memorial Hospital Foundation as well as on the Board of several other charitable institutions; and

WHEREAS, Sen. Carroll is survived by his beloved wife Eda Carroll nee Stagman, daughters Jacqueline (Louis Bernstein) Carroll and Barbara Carroll (Dan) Delano and granddaughters Lillian and Alyssa. He is predeceased by his late brothers, Ira L. and Earl A. Carroll.

COOK COUNTY RECOGNIZES OCTOBER 2021 AS DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS MONTH

WHEREAS, October is nationally known as Domestic Violence Awareness Month and a time to uplift the experiences and resilience of survivors, as well as educate and support households experiencing this hardship; and

WHEREAS, domestic violence is a pattern of physical and psychological abuse, threats, intimidation, isolation, or economic coercion used by one person to exert power and control over another person in the context of a dating, familial, or household relationship; and

WHEREAS, intimate partner violence can happen to anyone at any point in a relationship, and affects people of all ages as well as all racial, ethnic, gender, economic, and religious backgrounds; and

WHEREAS, according to the National Intimate Partner and Sexual Violence Survey, women are disproportionately victims of domestic violence, as 1 in 4 women and 1 in 7 men ages 18 and older will experience domestic violence at some point in their life; and

WHEREAS, according to the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence, 37.7% of women in Illinois and 25.9% of men in Illinois experience intimate partner physical violence, intimate partner sexual violence or intimate partner stalking in their lifetimes; and

WHEREAS, a June 2020 report from The Network indicated that there were 2,458 domestic violence related incidents documented by the Cook County Sheriff's Office in 2019 alone; and

WHEREAS, the Illinois Domestic Violence Hotline received 28,749 calls for help in 2020, a 16% increase from the previous year, including a staggering 936 text messages requesting assistance compared to just 37 messages the year before; and

WHEREAS, according to the Institute for Women's Policy Research, approximately 40% of Black women and 34.4% of Latina women will endure domestic violence at some point in their lifetime; and

WHEREAS, Black women experience intimate partner violence at a rate 35% higher than that of white females, and about 2.5 times the rate of women of all other races, and Black women are also less likely than white women to use social services, support programs, or go to the hospital because of domestic violence, according to the Bureau of Justice Statistics and the Feminist Majority Foundation; and

WHEREAS, 63% of victimized Latinas experience multiple acts of victimization, Latinx victims are less likely to tell health care workers, and Latinx victims report seeking local shelters less than women from other ethnic/racial groups due to language barriers and fear of immigration enforcement; and

WHEREAS, noncitizen victims of domestic violence report heightened concerns with accessing law enforcement and services due to uncertainty arising from changing immigration policies and heightened immigration enforcement; and

WHEREAS, LGBTQ domestic violence victims face barriers unique to their status, such as lack of access to domestic violence shelters, according to the National Coalition of Anti-Violence Programs; and

WHEREAS, during Domestic Violence Awareness Month, we acknowledge the progress made in this field and embrace the basic human right to be free from violence and abuse, and recognize that more work remains until every individual is able to live free from fear; and

WHEREAS, this month, we recognize the unique circumstances faced by survivors and individuals facing domestic violence due to the public health crisis of COVID-19 and the negative impact it has had on the delivery of social services and access to resources; and

WHEREAS, according to the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence, domestic violence hotlines across the United States receive approximately 21,000 calls a day, an average of close to 15 calls every minute; and

WHEREAS, victims of domestic violence who worked with advocates experienced less violence over time, reported higher quality of life and social support, and had less difficulty obtaining community resources over time, according to the National Resource Center on Domestic Violence; and

WHEREAS, anyone who is or knows someone who is experiencing domestic abuse of any kind is encouraged to call the Domestic Violence Hotline at (877)863-6338; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Women's Commission has passionately advocated for women and girls since its inception in 1995 and their July 2021 report issued recommendations for better access to services for survivors of gender-based violence that resulted in hours of dialogue among Cook County Commissioners about increasing access to the court system for survivors of domestic abuse; and

WHEREAS, there is a need to increase resources for programs aimed at intervening in and preventing domestic violence in Cook County and throughout the United States.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners commends domestic violence victim advocates, victim service providers, crisis hotline staff and first responders for their compassionate support of survivors of domestic violence; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Cook County commits to continuing to raise awareness of domestic violence and the corresponding devastating effects of domestic violence on survivors, families, and communities, and to supporting and advancing evidence-based solutions to prevent abuse, prosecute perpetrators, and support victims and their families; and

WHEREAS, on January 27, 2020, the United States Secretary of Health and Human Services declared that COVID-19, a respiratory illness spread by close contact through respiratory droplets, presents a public health emergency, and the World Health Organization characterized the COVID-19 outbreak as a pandemic on March 11, 2020; and

WHEREAS, COVID-19 continues to be a serious threat across the United States and Cook County, and

WHEREAS, many hospitals across the United States already have a higher load of COVID-19 patients than ever before since the pandemic began, and the director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Dr. Robert Redfield, warned last month that the next few months of the pandemic would be among "the most difficult in the public health history of this nation" and;

WHEREAS, as of January 19, 2021 there have been 194,898 confirmed cases of SARS-CoV-2 in Suburban Cook County under the jurisdiction of the Cook County Department of Public Health with 3,639 reported deaths; and

WHEREAS, on December 11, 2020, the FDA approved emergency use authorization of the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine; and

WHEREAS, on December 18, 2020, the FDA authorized the emergency use of the Modern COVID-19 Vaccine in individuals 18 years of age or older; and

WHEREAS, the approval has quickly ramped up the federal government's distribution of the potentially lifesaving vaccine to 64 states, territories and major cities across the nation; and

WHEREAS, initial doses of Pfizer's vaccine have been limited as manufacturing increases, with priority given to health-care workers and nursing homes first, but with subsequent phases the distribution will become available to a wider portion of the populace; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Department of Public Health (CCDPH) is the Illinois certified local health department for suburban Cook County, Illinois, with the exception of Evanston, Skokie, Oak Park, and Stickney Township, serving 127 municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Department of Public Health (CCDPH) working alongside the Cook County Department of Emergency Management and Regional Security is charged with making the COVID-19 vaccine available to people in CCDPH's jurisdiction of suburban Cook County; and

WHEREAS, CCDPH is working with partners at all levels, including hospitals, health care providers and community leaders, to develop flexible and responsive COVID-19 vaccination programs that can accommodate different vaccines; and

WHEREAS, it is paramount that as the vaccines become more readily available we work together and take advantage of all available resources in order to effectively administer the difficult and complex task of mass immunization so that we can overcome this healthcare crisis and look towards recovery; and

WHEREAS, equally important will be to ensure the vaccines are distributed in an equitable fashion, prioritizing those areas and residents of the county that have been most impacted by COVID-19 as a result of longstanding disparities in healthcare system access and delivery.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Health and Hospitals Committee convene a meeting to discuss the Cook County Department of Public Health's COVID-19 vaccination planning for Suburban Cook County; and

DECLARING MENTAL HEALTH A PUBLIC HEALTH CRISIS

WHEREAS, Public Health Awareness raises awareness of the relationship between the health of individuals and the health of their communities; and

WHEREAS, behavioral health is a person's condition with regard to their psychological and emotional well-being including substance use disorders; and

WHEREAS, in light of the pandemic we have seen a rise in the use of and need for behavioral health services across the United States; and

WHEREAS, according to the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), 1 in 5 adults experience mental illness and 1 in 20 have a serious mental illness; and

WHEREAS, according to NAMI, people with serious mental illness have an increased risk for chronic disease, like diabetes or cancer, 18% of United States adults with mental illness also have a substance use disorder, 21% of people experiencing homelessness also have a serious mental illness, 1 in 8 of all visits to United States emergency departments are related to mental and substance use disorders, and

WHEREAS, suicide is the 2nd leading cause of death of people ages 10-34 *in* the US and 46% of people who die by suicide have a diagnosed mental health condition; and

WHEREAS, according to data collected by the Chicago Department of Public Health, in 2018, roughly 54,000 people received behavioral health treatment while in 2020 there were over 68,000 people who received behavioral health treatment, accounting for an 26% increase in comparison to individuals who have received treatment in 2018; and

WHEREAS, Cook County Health's Department of Psychiatry provided care for more than 8,700 patients in need of behavioral health services in 2019 and has cared for 8,695 patients during the first two quarters of 2021: and

WHEREAS, according to the Cook County Medical Examiner's office there has been an average of 475 deaths per year by suicide since 2017. With roughly 329 deaths recorded for 2021, Cook County is currently on pace to reach the previous years' average.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Cook County, led by the President and the Board of Commissioners, declare Mental Health A Public Health Crisis in Cook County and affecting our entire society; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Cook County and Cook County Health continue to work in collaboration with their community partners including community healthcare providers and mental health and community-based organizations including the Cook County Behavioral Health Consortium to:

- 1. assess internal plans, policies and procedures to ensure solutions to address the lack of awareness and the need for increased behavioral health services in Cook County
- 2. create strategies to increase awareness of behavioral health services
- 3. increase funding for behavioral health services including mental health and substance use treatment; and continue collaborative and coordinating efforts with the Justice Advisory Council which provides community based investments for behavioral health services including mental health and substance abuse treatment for impacted residents at risk of, and/or involved in the juvenile and criminal justice systems
- 4. increase access to inpatient and outpatient behavioral health services
- 5. work with marginalized populations to provide education on behavioral health, issues and solutions
- 6. assess and advocate for relevant policies that improve health in communities of color
- 7. support local, State, and Federal programs that advance behavioral health initiatives; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, in collaboration with the CCH CEO or his designee, we dedicate funding to augment existing resources and advocate for additional external funding for educational campaigns to increase public awareness of behavioral health services in an effort to reduce stigma; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the County will encourage other local, State, and national entities to declare mental health a public health crisis; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the County Board hereby supports the efforts to address public health disparities due to lack of behavioral health resources throughout Cook County.

COOK COUNTY COMMISSION ON WOMEN'S ISSUES

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 2 Administration, Article VI Boards and Commissions, Division 1.4 Cook County Commission on Women's Issues, Sections 2-490 through 2-496 of the Cook County Code is hereby enacted as follows:

DIVISION 1.4 COOK COUNTY COMMISSION ON WOMEN'S ISSUES

Sec. 2-490. Short title.

This Division shall be known and may be cited as the Cook County Commission on Women's Issues

Sec. 2-491. Policy and Purpose.

- (a) Policy. The Cook County Commission on Women's Issues (the "Commission") was established by Resolution of the Cook County Board of Commissioners March 1, 1994 to serve as an advisory body to the Cook County Board of Commissioners and the President of the Cook County Board.
- (b) Purpose. The purpose of the Commission is to ensure that issues and perspectives of all women and girls are considered in the formation of public policy in Cook County and to codify the 1994 Resolution in the Cook County Code of Ordinances.

Sec. 2-492. Cook County Commission on Women's Issues Members

- (a) Organization.
- (1) The Commission shall be composed of twenty-one members.
- (2) Seventeen (17) members of the Commission shall be appointed by the Cook County Board President upon recommendation of the seventeen (17) Cook County Board Commissioners.
- (3) Four (4) at-large members who reflect the population of Cook County shall be appointed by and serve at the pleasure of the President of the Cook County Board and ratified by the Cook County Board.
- (4) The Chairperson and Vice-chairperson shall be appointed by the Cook County Board President.
- (5) The Commission may designate former Chairpersons of the Commission, County officials and leaders in the women's community as honorary members without voting privileges.
- (b) Qualifications of members.

- (1) Commission members shall reside in Cook County and have demonstrated concern for the needs of all women and girls and the issues impacting women and families.
- (2) The Commission members shall be representative of the different races, faiths, ethnic groups, abilities, age groups and educational levels of the women of Cook County.
- (3) Members of the Commission may not be employed by Cook County government during their term.
- (c) Term and vacancies.
- (1) Commission members shall serve a term of four (4) two (2) years from the date of their appointment as appointed under the previous 1994 Resolution or new appointments consistent with this ordinance. Members may be reappointed. Members terms shall expire upon a vacancy in the applicable appointing authority or when there is a change in the elected office of the appointing authority despite any time remaining on the Commission members two year appointment.
- (2) The Chairperson shall serve a term of <u>four (4) two (2)</u> from the date of appointment as appointed under the previous 1994 Resolution or new appointments consistent with this ordinance. The Chairperson may be reappointed. <u>The Chairperson's term shall expire upon a vacancy in the applicable appointing authority or when there is a change in the elected office of the appointing authority despite any time remaining in the Chairpersons two-year appointment.</u>
- (3) The Vice Chairperson shall serve a term of two (2) years from the date of appointment. The Vice Chairperson may be reappointed. The Vice Chairperson's term shall expire upon a vacancy in the applicable appointing authority or when there is a change in the elected office of the appointing authority despite any time remaining in the Vice Chairpersons two-year appointment.
- (4) Any vacancies on the Commission caused by death, resignation, disqualification or removal shall be filled by the applicable appointing authority and shall be filled for the unexpired term of the member whose appointment has become vacant.
- (5) A vacancy on the Commission shall also be established when a member misses three (3) consecutive meetings without an excused absence or fails to actively participate in the Commission's work.
- (6) If there is a vacancy of the Chairperson's position, the Vice Chairperson will serve as the Interim Chairperson until a new Chairperson is appointed.

Sec. 2-493. Meetings.

The Commission shall ensure the following in regard to Commission meetings:

- (a) The Commission shall hold meetings six (6) times per year. Meetings will be held at a time and place agreed to by the full Commission or upon the call of the Chairperson or, in the Chairperson's absence, the Vice Chairperson.
- (b) Special meetings of the Commission may be called by order of the Chairperson or upon request of one-third of the total membership of the Commission.
- (c) Commission shall hold at least one hearing annually to receive public input on issues affecting women and girls. Public hearing input will be used to recommend actions by Cook County government.
- (d) Members may participate in remote meetings by means of electronic, video, audio, or telephonic communication pursuant to Section 2-470 of the Cook County Code of Ordinances and the Open Meetings Act, 5 ILCS 120/1 et seq.
- (e) The Commission shall be subject to the Open Meetings Act, 5 ILCS 120/1 et seq, and the Freedom of Information Act, 5 ILCS 140/1 et seq.

Sec. 2-494. Quorum

The presence of a majority of the total voting members of the Commission shall constitute a quorum. A quorum shall be necessary in order to conduct all hearings and meetings of the Commission.

Sec. 2-495. Duties and responsibilities.

The Commission shall:

- (a) Make recommendations for legislative and/or executive action to eliminate discrimination against all women and girls and to ensure equal opportunities;
- (b) Work for the elimination of inequities in laws, practices and conditions, which particularly affect women and girls;
- (c) Make recommendations that will promote the equal status of women and girls and create new opportunities for all women and girls where marginalized;
- (d) Review county policies, procedures and practices for their impact on women and girls and offer recommendations;
- (e) Work with the Cook County Board to make recommendations to improve the delivery of services to women and girls;
- (f) Provide advisory opinions to the Cook County Board, the Cook County Health and the Cook County separately elected offices on issues affecting the women and girls;
- (g) Assist in the collection and dissemination of data on the conditions of and opportunities for women and girls in Cook County and help develop programs to meet assessed needs.

INCENTIVE CLASSIFICATION AFFIDAVIT REQUIREMENT WAIVER

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 74 Taxation, Section 74-75 of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as follows:

Sec. 74-75. - Incentive classification affidavit requirement waiver.

(a) This Section shall apply to existing incentives classifications, pending applications and eligibility/renewal applications submitted during the 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020, and 2021 and 2022 assessment years. The Assessor's Office shall liberally construe this Section to effectuate its intent as set forth in subsections (b) and (c) below.

- (b) Compliance with the existing affidavit requirements of Sections 74-71(a)(2) and (a)(8), 74-71(b)(7), 74-71(c)(2), 74-72 and 74-74(b) and (d) shall be waived for the 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020, and 2021 and 2022 assessment years. Such waiver shall be lifted at the beginning of the 2022-2023 assessment year and the affidavit requirements of Sections 74-71, 74-72 and 74-74 that are then in effect shall be effective for the 2022-2023 assessment year and subsequent assessment years.
- (c) Existing incentives classifications, pending applications and eligibility/renewal applications submitted during the 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020, and 2021 and 2022 assessment years shall not be suspended, revoked or terminated for failure to comply with the affidavit requirements of Sections 74-71(a)(2) and (a)(8), 74-71(b)(7), 74-71(c)(2), 74-72 and 74-74(b) and (d), and all affidavits submitted pursuant to such Sections shall be considered void for any purpose.

Effective date: This Ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.

- (3) In the case of commercial users organized as limited liability companies, the commercial user's employees, and members, each of whom, in compliance with this agreement and third-party independent contractors who provide services exclusively to the limited liability companies who execute a joinder agreeing to be bound by the terms of the Agreement between the Cook County Assessor's Office and the commercial user, each of whom, in compliance with said agreement:
- (a) Is covered by the applicable fee paid by the commercial user; and
- (b) Has been issued a username and password.

Effective date: This Ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.

WHEREAS, Cook County has been and should continue to be a beacon for those seeking safe, reliable, and comprehensive healthcare including reproductive healthcare; and

WHEREAS, every individual who is able to be pregnant has a right to make the personal decision about their reproductive health and family planning free from government interference; and

WHEREAS, the decision to terminate a pregnancy is deeply personal and is not made lightly; and

WHEREAS, accessing reproductive care is not a crime and should not be treated as such; and

WHEREAS, restricting access to reproductive healthcare hurts everyone but has a disproportionately negative impact on people of color, immigrants, and LGBTQ+ people due to factors such as income, where they live, or societal bias; and

WHEREAS, in 1973 the Supreme Court of the United States ruled in Roe v. Wade to protect legal rights to safe abortions; and

WHEREAS, the Guttmacher Institute, a reproductive health non-profit, found that women around the world access abortion services at a statistically same rate whether they are legal and safe or illegal and unregulated; and

WHEREAS, laws limiting access to reproductive healthcare just forces unsafe and dangerous conditions including potential severe health complications or death; and

WHEREAS, Texas legislators have passed Texas Senate Bill 8 and the Governor of Texas has signed into law legislation that essentially bans abortion after 6 weeks and creates a mechanism that can penalize any person with knowledge of or who offers support to someone seeking an abortion; and

WHEREAS, this draconian and appalling law not only puts the lives of people seeking reproductive healthcare at risk but creates a dangerous bounty system that essentially encourages "vigilante" justice; and

WHEREAS, such legislation villainizes healthcare providers who are simply seeking to provide basic health information as is a tenant of their Hippocratic Oath; and

WHEREAS, this law goes beyond the pale and is counter to settled law and to all public health recommendations; and

WHEREAS, the United States Department of Justice under the Biden Harris Administration has sued the State of Texas to prevent enforcing this law with Attorney General Merrick Garland stating, "The Act is clearly unconstitutional under longstanding Supreme Court precedent."; and

WHEREAS, residents across the country support a constitutional right to an abortion with a recent poll from Monmouth University citing 62% of Americans in a representative poll supporting keeping Roe v. Wade in place; and

WHEREAS, Cook County and the State of Illinois have been on the forefront of fighting for reproductive rights for decades; and

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois continues to be a leader in expanding access to reproductive healthcare, most recently, passing a law that allows for Medicaid to cover abortion care in Illinois in 2017; and

WHEREAS, Illinois also passed a law in 2019 repealing the Illinois Abortion Law of 1975, which acted as Illinois' "trigger" law, which would deem abortion illegal if Roe v. Wade was ever overturned and contained other significant restrictions including spousal consent and criminal penalties for physicians; and

WHEREAS, as the assault on reproductive rights continue across the country, Cook County and the State of Illinois' leadership is more important than ever; and

WHEREAS, Cook County Health should continue to expand access to reproductive healthcare for anyone who needs it; and

WHEREAS, it is unacceptable that major corporations and other businesses located in Texas have failed to condemn this attack on reproductive rights.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board condemns the actions of the Texas Legislature in passing and the Governor of Texas signing Senate Bill 8; and

CELEBRATING INDIGENOUS PEOPLES' DAY AND RECONCILIATION DAY

WHEREAS, the County of Cook in the State of Illinois occupies territory that many Sovereign Nations, including the Council of Three Fires: Potawatomi, Ojibwe and Odawa, as well as Ho-Chunk, Miami, Sac and Fox, Peoria, Illini and others consider a part of their historical and modern-day homelands; and

WHEREAS, the Indigenous peoples of the Americas who were the original inhabitants of the land, experienced broken promises, violence, deprivation, and disease due to the acts of European colonizers; and

WHEREAS, Native Americans in Cook County make up the ninth largest Urban Native community in the country, a community that continues to practice their cultural traditions, caretaking of the land and educating others about their history and contemporary challenges; and

WHEREAS, Cook County acknowledges a responsibility to support diversity, equity and inclusion in all communities and this effort must acknowledge that Indigenous peoples were systematically removed from

their homelands, maligned for their values and killed to provide economic opportunities to European colonizers; and

WHEREAS, Indigenous Peoples' Day was proposed to the United Nations in 1977 by an international delegation of Indigenous peoples to inform the world about the negative impacts of colonization and the lasting pains of genocide committed against Native people, Cook County must reconcile the past and present harm and trauma perpetrated on Native people; and

WHEREAS, the land we call Cook County has always been home to Native Nations with vibrant cultural traditions and relationships to the land, and while long overdue, the Native Nations' many contributions to our present day society must be acknowledged to create a County where diversity, equity, healing and inclusion are the cornerstone of our modern-day culture; and

WHEREAS, Cook County recognizes our many different cultural groups, races, ethnicities as a source of strength, but many of these groups have faced prejudice, hate and violence, reconciliation to and for those groups is an important step towards healing, shared identity and unity; and

WHEREAS, Indigenous Peoples' Day and Reconciliation Day shall be an opportunity for celebration of Indigenous peoples' cultures and their contributions to our County, and as well as contributions from all communities that have faced prejudice; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Board of Commissioners acknowledges the ongoing struggle for reconciliation, justice and citizenship for Freedmen of the four tribes previously referred to as "Civilized tribes".

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Indigenous Peoples' Day and Reconciliation Day will be the Second Monday in October, replacing Columbus Day. On this holiday Cook County government remembers the mistreatment and acts of violence against Indigenous peoples' and other groups of oppressed people, committing to education and sustained efforts towards ending the ongoing harm and trauma caused by present-day oppressive systems; and

BE IF FURTHER RESOLVED, that Indigenous Peoples' Day and Reconciliation Day will lift-up the contributions that all cultures have made to enrich our county; and

BE IF FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners shall establish the following:

Section 1. A Native-led working group to explore the creation of a Reconciliation process, study the meaning of reconciliation, research different models of truth and reconciliation commissions, and understand the impact that such a process might have on Cook County and its residents. The objective of reconciliation is to navigate the racial healing process by documenting and addressing the harms that have perpetuated racial disparities by implementing specific solutions with a prioritized focus on healing.

Section 2. The Human Relations Committee is directed to lead a County-wide effort, in collaboration with Native leaders and other County departments to explore the formation of a truth and reconciliation process for Cook County.

WHEREAS, the office of the Clerk of the Circuit Court of Cook County will commence term of office on December 1, 2024; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Board of Commissioners last approved salary increases for the various Cook County elected officials in 2000 via Resolution 00-R-013;

WHEREAS, Resolution 00-R-013 provided for the Circuit Court Clerk's salary to be fixed at \$105,000.00 commencing on December 1, 2000 and salaries were also fixed and increased commencing in December of 2002 for the Board of Commissioners at \$85,000.00 from \$61,000.00; Finance Chair at \$90,000.00; President at \$170,000.00 from \$115,000.00; Assessor at \$125,000.00 from \$75,000.00; Board of Review Members at \$100,000.00 from \$74,000.00; County Clerk and Treasurer at \$105,000.00 from \$86,100.00 and Sheriff at \$160,000.00 from \$139,633.00; and

WHEREAS, various other units of local government have increased elected official compensation since the Cook County Board approved salary increases in 2000 and some units of local government have accounted for annual increases throughout an elected officials term tied increases in the consumer price index; and

WHEREAS, efforts should be undertaken to determine whether salary increases are warranted for the various County elected offices for the new terms of office schedule to take effect in 2022 and 2024.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners hereby requests that the Cook County Bureau of Human Resources conducts a compensation and market survey to determine if the current compensation provided is appropriate or if increases are warranted for the following elected offices in December of 2022:

- 4)Cook County Assessor
- 5)Cook County Clerk
- 6)Cook County Sheriff
- 7)Cook County Treasurer
- 8) Members of the Board of Review

And if the current compensation is appropriate or if an increase is warranted for the office the Circuit Court Clerk in December 2024; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Bureau of Human Resources shall consult with the Bureau of Finance and an economist selected by the Chief Financial Officer to analyze the market over the last 20 years and the Bureau of Human Resources shall also engage the services of an outside consultant to validate the compensation and market data collected; the outside consultant shall assist in determining recommendations regarding elected official compensation data which may include no change in compensation or any suggested increases and if increases in compensation are recommended, how such increases should be structured; and

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE SALE OF TAXABLE PROPERTY ASSESSED CLEAN ENERGY NOTES OF THE COUNTY; AND OTHER MATTERS RELATED THERETO

WHEREAS, Cook County (the "County"), is a county duly organized and validly existing under the laws of the State of Illinois (the "State"), and is a home rule unit of local government of the State pursuant to the 1970 Constitution of the State (the "Constitution"), and is further authorized pursuant to the Property Assessed Clean Energy Act of Illinois, 50 ILCS 50/1 et seq., as amended (the "PACE Act") to establish a property assessed clean energy program (the "PACE Program"), create a PACE area (as defined in the PACE Act) and finance and/or refinance energy projects (as defined in the PACE Act) (the "Energy Projects"), and may, under the power granted by Section 6(a) of Article VII of the Constitution, as supplemented by the Local Government Debt Reform Act of the State of Illinois, as amended (the "Debt Reform Act"), and the other Omnibus Bond Acts, as amended, exercise any power and perform any function

pertaining to its government and affairs, including, but not limited to, the power to issue limited recourse bonds or notes without referendum in furtherance of essential public and governmental purposes; and

WHEREAS, on the 22nd day of October, 2020, the Board of Commissioners of the County (the "Board") approved Ordinance No. 20-4202 Establishing a Property Assessed Clean Energy ("PACE") Program and a PACE Area to Finance and/or Refinance the Acquisition, Construction, Installation, or Modification of Energy Projects; Providing for the Issuance of not to Exceed \$500,000,000 Taxable PACE Revenue Notes ("Notes") of the County to Finance Projects Pursuant to the County's PACE Program (the "PACE Program"), Providing for the Payment Of Said Notes, Authorizing the Sale of Said Notes to the Purchaser Thereof; and Other Matters Related Thereto (the "PACE Ordinance"); and

WHEREAS, Our Revival Chicago, LLC, an Illinois limited liability company (together with its successors and assigns the "Property Owner") completed an application to participate in the PACE Program in order to finance or refinance certain qualified Energy Projects that benefit certain real property of the Property Owner (the "Ramova Theatre Project") located within the County at 3506-18 South Halsted Street, Chicago, Illinois (the "Property") in the amount of approximately \$7,400,000; and

WHEREAS, the PACE Ordinance requires additional authorization from the Board when a property owner is the beneficiary of Notes in an amount greater than \$5,000,000; and

WHEREAS, the County desires to approve the issuance of Notes (the "Ramova Theatre Project Notes") secured not by the credit of the County but rather through voluntary assessments on the benefitted property as described further herein, in support of the Ramova Theatre Project in the amount of not to exceed \$7,400,000; and

WHEREAS, the Ramova Theatre Project Notes will be repaid through voluntary tax assessments levied on the Property from time to time by the County pursuant to the PACE Act and that certain assessment contract to be entered into between the County and the Property Owner (the "Assessment Contract"), in substantially the form previously approved by the Board as part of the PACE Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the Assessment Contract establishes the terms of the Property Owner's participation in the PACE Program and payment of the amounts financed for costs associated with the Ramova Theatre Project; and

WHEREAS, the Board does hereby determine that it is advisable and in the best interests of the County to approve the issuance of the Ramova Theatre Project Notes:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE COUNTY OF COOK, ILLINOIS, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1.Incorporation of the Recitals. The Board hereby finds that all of the recitals contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are true, correct and complete and are hereby incorporated by reference thereto and are made a part hereof.

Section 2.Public Purpose. The Board finds it is necessary and in the best interests of the County to facilitate capital in furtherance of the PACE Program and issue the Ramova Theatre Project Notes, in the form attached hereto as Exhibit A. It is hereby found and determined that such issuance of

Notes is advisable for the public health, safety, welfare and convenience, is for a proper public purpose or purposes, is in the public interest, and is authorized pursuant to the PACE Ordinance, the PACE Act, the Counties Code of the State of Illinois, and the Local Government Debt Reform Act; and as further supplemented and, where necessary, superseded by the County's home rule powers under Section 6 of Article VII of the 1970 Constitution of the State of Illinois, and these findings and determinations shall be deemed conclusive.

Section 3.Approval of Issuance of Ramova Theatre Project Notes. The Board hereby authorizes that there be borrowed for and on behalf of the County the Ramova Theatre Project Notes in an aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$7,400,000 for costs associated with the Ramova Theatre Project. The Ramova Theatre Project Notes shall be non-recourse to the County and secured solely by payments received by the County under and pursuant to the terms of the Assessment Contract, in the form attached hereto as Exhibit B. The County shall make principal payments on the Ramova Theatre Project Notes, together with applicable interest, fees, penalties, indemnities and other amounts payable to the Registered Owner (as defined in the PACE Ordinance) under the Assessment Contract, in the amounts and on the dates set forth in the Note Notification (as defined in the PACE Ordinance). Such County payments shall be made solely from the revenues received by the County under the Assessment Contract. Upon the sale of the Ramova Theatre Project Notes, the Authorized Officers (as defined in the PACE Ordinance) shall prepare a Note Notification, which shall include the pertinent details of sale of such Ramova Theatre Project Notes as provided in the PACE Ordinance.

Section 4.No Conflicts; Further Acts of the County. It is hereby found that no person holding any office of the County either by election or appointment, is in any manner financially interested, either directly, in his or her own name, or indirectly, in the name of any other person, association, trust or corporation, in the transactions contemplated hereby.

Section 5.Additional Ordinances. The Board may adopt additional ordinances or proceedings supplementing or amending this Ordinance. This Ordinance and the PACE Ordinance, together with such additional ordinances or proceedings, shall constitute complete authority for the County to make the property assessments described herein and in the PACE Ordinance and for the County to issue the Ramova Theatre Project Notes, all in accordance with applicable law. **Section 6.No Public Hearing; Program Established.** The Board hereby finds that no public hearing shall be required in connection with the issuance of the Ramova Theatre Project Notes.

Section 7.Enactment. No provision of the County Code of the County (the "County Code") or violation of any provision of the County Code shall be deemed to impair the validity of this Ordinance or the instruments authorized by this Ordinance or to impair the security for or payment of the instruments authorized by this Ordinance; provided further, however, that the foregoing shall not be deemed to affect the availability of any other remedy or penalty for any violation of any provision of the County Code.

Section 8.Severability. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be separable and if any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall for any reason be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, such declaration shall not affect any of the other provisions of this Ordinance.

After firm negotiation, Cook County's outline for the near future (3 years) were addressed to stay in league in terms of cost and scope of what exists with other counties of comparable size.

Tax parcel creation and assessment, public safety, election reporting, environmental monitoring, transportation, and economic development are just a few of the areas where GIS software is necessary for Cook County to operate properly. ESRI's platform gives users access to maps and spatial data to make better informed decisions and monitor Cook County's progress in various geographic areas over time.

Shared Data Services: The data services provided through this agreement will support the Cook County Clerk, Cook County Assessor, Cook County Sheriff, Board of Review, Offices under the President, as well as the Forest Preserve District of Cook County, 20,000+ Cook County employees, municipal partners, and the general public.

The acquisition of this software allows the county to continue efficient workflows for spatial data processing and analysis. The addition of this new contract to the previous one outlines no cost increase to GIS software over an 8-year period even though more services and software modules will be added.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION

A RESOLUTION REQUESTING A HEARING ASSESSING THE NEEDS OF THE AFGHAN AMERICAN COMMUNITY AND AFGHAN REFUGEES RESETTLED IN COOK COUNTY

WHEREAS, on August 30, 2021 the United States military ended a nearly 20-year occupation of Afghanistan. The war ultimately ended in a collapse of the Afghan government and an overtaking of the government by the Taliban; and

WHEREAS, according to reports, the United States is preparing to bring 50,000 Afghan refugees into the United States in the next year, with at least 500 expected to be resettled in Cook County; and

WHEREAS, on September 22, 2021, 75 unaccompanied minors from Afghanistan arrived in Chicago; and

WHEREAS, due to catastrophic violence and bloodshed, recent Afghan Refugees and Asylum Seekers have fled their country, home and families and will require their basic human needs be met through community and government support as they resettle in Cook County; and

WHEREAS, the greater Cook County community has identified a desire and willingness to support Afghan Refugees and Asylum Seekers, but a list of specific needs and services, along with streamlined collection point is required to organize a response; and

WHEREAS, the IL Muslim Civic Coalition has built partnerships with over 150 local, regional, and national organizations to collectively impact underserved and often invisible communities, including Afghan Refugees and Asylum Seekers;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Cook County Human Rights Commission is called to a hearing before the Legislation and Intergovernmental Committee with the IL Muslim Civic Coalition and its partners, RefugeeOne and the Muslim Women Resource Center, along with any other relevant organizations selected by the Human Rights Commission to discuss and identify the needs of recent Afghan Refugees and Afghan Asylum Seekers and make recommendations to the Cook County Board and the greater Cook County community on how it may marshal resources to support this refugee community; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, within 60 days after the hearing, the Cook County Human Rights Commission will provide a report to the Cook County Board detailing the outcome of the hearing and documenting methods to best support the short and long term needs of recent Afghan Refugees and Asylum Seekers.
