SURVIVING SPOUSE TAX ABATEMENTS

WHEREAS, on September 5, 2019 the Cook County Board of Commissioners passed the Surviving Spouse Tax Abatement Ordinance which can be found in Section 74-47 of the Cook County Code of Ordinances; and

WHEREAS, the Surviving Spouse Tax Abatement permitted the application to the Cook County Board of Review ("Board of Review") for the abatement or rebate of Cook County's portion of property taxes levied on a qualified property for surviving spouses of a fallen police officer, soldier or rescue worker in accordance with 35 ILCS 200/18-178; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 74-47 of the Cook County Code of Ordinances, the Board of Review developed an application process in which surviving spouses of a of a fallen police officer, soldier or rescue worker in accordance with 35 ILCS 200/18-178 could request an abatement or rebate of Cook County's portion of property taxes levied on a qualified property; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Review has received applications for property tax abatements or rebates in accordance with Section 74-47 and has reviewed said applications for a surviving spouse tax abatement as set forth in Exhibit A and has determined the following:

- (1) The Board of Review finds that each of the decedents qualifies as a fallen police officer, soldier, or rescue worker who died as a result of or in the course of employment as a police officer; while in the active service of a fire, rescue, or emergency medical service; or while on active duty as a member of the United States Armed Services, including the National Guard, serving in Iraq or Afghanistan;
- (2) The Board of Review finds that each applicant qualifies as a surviving spouse, as each is a spouse, who has not remarried, of a fallen police officer, soldier, or rescue worker;
- (3) The Board of Review finds that each subject property satisfies the requirement of qualified property in that each is used as the principal residence of a surviving spouse and was owned by the fallen police officer, soldier, or rescue worker or surviving spouse at the time of the police officer's, soldier's, or rescue worker's death; was acquired by the surviving spouse within 2 years after the police officer's, soldier's, or rescue worker's death if the surviving spouse was domiciled.

WHEREAS, the above findings demonstrate each applicant satisfies Section 74-47 of the Cook County Code and the Board of Review recommends the abatement or rebate of 100% of Cook County's portion of property taxes levied against the residential properties in the approximate dollar amounts set forth in Exhibit A; and

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WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 74-47(c)(1), the Board of Review also recommends the abatement period shall start from the earliest date permitted under the ordinance, i.e. July 9, 2012, or the decedent's date of death, whichever is later, and continue so long as the applicant continues to satisfy the requirements of Section 74-47.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, the Cook County Board of Commissioners has reviewed the recommendations of the Board of Review and orders the abatement or rebate of 100% of Cook County's portion of property taxes levied against the residential properties in the approximate dollar amounts for the time periods addressed and set forth in Exhibit A; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOVLED, the County Clerk shall provide a certified copy of this Ordinance approving the surviving spouse tax abatements/rebates as provided in Exhibit A to all applicable Cook County tax officials in order to process the approved surviving spouse tax abatements/rebates.; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOVLED, that should the applicable Cook County tax officials determine that a portion of the abatements cannot be made due to the closure of a tax year, the applicable Cook County tax officials shall notify the County's Chief Financial Officer of the portion of the funds that cannot be refunded through abatement and the Chief Financial Officer and County Comptroller shall be authorized to identify an appropriate funding source and rebate any outstanding amount as authorized under this Ordinance.

Effective date: This Ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.

HONORING SUSAN GARCIA TRIESCHMANN FOR HER SERVICE TO THE EVANSTON COMMUNITY

WHEREAS, after a decade of teaching restaurant and life skills to more than 500 young people, Susan Trieschmann, a founder and executive director of Curt's Café has announced that she will depart the enterprise later this year. Curt's Café founded in 2012 is a workforce training program whose motto is "Dine with a Purpose. Enjoy great food and help build community;" and

WHEREAS, Susan began working in food service at the age of 13. She became the Director of Catering at the legendary Pump Room before becoming an original owner and 25-year partner of Food for Thought

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Enterprise. Under her leadership the company grew from a small catering business into a food service industry specializing in upscale catering and café food service management; and

WHEREAS, Susan got the idea to start Curt's when she enrolled in a social justice course while working on a business degree. The course introduced her to the concept of restorative justice, which seeks to restore wholeness to victims and offenders. As her final exam, the instructor sent her to the prison to do youth circles. It was a life-changing event for her, watching young men from different gangs speak from hearts about fear, about family. Subjects that would never be broached in prison. She learned from her work with those and other young men about the need for jobs and a safe, accepting environment for 15- to 24-year old males coming out of prison; and

WHEREAS, building on that knowledge and her background in the culinary arts and industry, Susan developed a business plan to raise funding for a program that would provide life and work skills for those young men. Though the plan initially found little support, she and her partner Lori Dube forged ahead. Curt's, Cultivating Unique Restaurant Training, came into being for the express purpose of working with justice-involved youth. Of the more than 500 young people who have worked their way through the program, only 4% have been re-arrested. That compares to a national recidivism rate of above 80%; and

WHEREAS, at Curt's, the emphasis is on teaching marketable skills and then assisting participants in securing employment including providing instruction needed to fill in educational gaps, gain confidence, and become job-ready. Some teaching is done on café lines, some in a classroom setting, and some by individual mentors. Students are referred by probation officers, Youth Job Centers, social service agencies, police officers, city outreach personnel, and family and friends of graduates or current students. Several graduates have gone on to take leadership and management roles with the café and community members have had the privilege of meeting these talented, resilient young people with whom they may never have otherwise crossed paths; and

WHEREAS, Susan says that part of the success of Curt's Café is the involvement of trained professionals who provide trauma-informed care to the participants. She recognizes that every single one of those young people have experienced significant trauma in their lives. Working with them has elevated her sense of empathy; but she has also experienced the trauma of losing young people to gun violence with whom she has worked and grown close. She is happy to have been able to give birth to this endeavor, proud of the accomplishments of the young people who have gone through the program, and frustrated and angry with the society that allows the kind of trauma to exist that these young people have overcome. At 64, Susan says she is not ready to retire and is already planning the next way in which she will continue to benefit our young people and build bridges in our community; and

WHEREAS, in addition to founding Curt's, Susan is also an original member of Restorative Justice Evanston (RJE). RJE is a non-profit organization in Evanston that works with youth and community on peaceful dialogue around harm caused, celebrations, and conflicts; and

WHEREAS, Susan and her husband Tom raised their two (2) children, Trevor and Anna, in Evanston. Susan is passionate about giving youth a second chance and potential for a positive future for themselves and their families. The Evanston community will be forever grateful for the work she has done to help young people, including people who were harmed by them, and to make Evanston a better place.

WHEREAS, the day of April 1 annually is celebrated as the Assyrian New Year, also known as Kha b'Nissan or Akitu. The Assyrian New Year is not only the first day of the new year, but also marks the start of spring and serves as a symbol of revival; and

WHEREAS, according to the Assyrian Policy Institute, more than 600,000 Assyrian-Americans live in the United States. Illinois is home to more than 80,000 Assyrian-Americans, the vast majority of whom live in Cook County; and

WHEREAS, Assyrians are a transnational ethnic group indigenous to parts of northern Iraq, northwestern Iran, southeastern Turkey, and northeast Syria. They form a distinctive community, united through ethnicity, language, and a culture that constitutes one of the oldest continuous traditions in the world. In their various countries of origin, the governing authorities historically infringed on the cultural and linguistic rights of Assyrians and prohibited public celebrations of the Assyrian New Year; and

WHEREAS, Assyrians began emigrating to Illinois in the late 1800s. The earliest immigrants settled in the River North area. Their population later moved north, first to Lincoln Park and Lake View and later to Uptown and Edgewater. Migration and resettlement of Assyrians from Iraq and Syria intensified in recent years due to the conflict and sectarian violence targeting Assyrians culminating with the rise of ISIS in 2014; and

WHEREAS, the Assyrian New Year is an appropriate time to acknowledge the role Assyrian-Americans have played in our communities. Many serve in local elected offices, including Hon. Tony Kalogerakos, Trustee of the Village of Golf; Hon. Atour Sargon, Trustee of the Village of Lincolnwood; Shamoon Ebrahimi, Alderman of the City of Des Plaines; Naema Abraham, President of the District 219 Board of Education; Sargon Guliana, Vice-President of the District 72 Board of Education; and Mary Oshana, Commissioner of the Skokie Parks Commission. John J. Nimrod was the first Assyrian-American elected to serve in the Illinois State Senate, representing the 4th Senatorial District from 1973 to 1983; and

WHEREAS, Assyrians have also made important contributions to the social and cultural fabric of our communities. The iconic London House in Chicago was designed by Assyrian-American architect Eva Toma. The Pentagon Memorial honoring 9/11 victims in Washington, D.C. was built by Abe Yousif, an Assyrian-American from Elk Grove Village. Chicago's famous Pizza Puff was invented by Elisha Shabaz, an Assyrian-American who immigrated to the U.S. from Iran in 1898; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Board recognizes the cultural importance and history surrounding the observance of the Assyrian New Year for Assyrian-Americans and joins the Assyrian-American community across Illinois in celebrating year 6772 of the Assyrian New Year.

WHEREAS, Black women are more likely to experience preventable maternal death compared with white women, and Black women's heightened risk of pregnancy-related death spans income and education levels; and

WHEREAS, both societal and health system factors contribute to the high rates of poor health outcomes and maternal mortality for Black women, who are more likely to experience barriers to obtaining quality care and often face racial discrimination throughout their lives; and

WHEREAS, public policies and medical practice should incentivize providing patient-centered care that focuses on Black women's individualized needs, including non-clinical, social needs. Moreover, policies should endeavor to eradicate cultural biases and discrimination in medical practice and medical education, increase provider diversity in maternity care and hold individual providers and hospital systems accountable if they fail to provide unbiased, high-quality, evidence-based care; and

WHEREAS, Helen Marie Ramirez-Odell, loving wife, mother, sister, grandmother, great-grandmother, aunt, and fierce activist, passed away on March 22, 2022 at 79 years of age; and

WHEREAS, Helen was born in Chicago on July 22, 1942 to Irving J. and Jessamine Hershinow, and grew up in the Lincoln Square neighborhood; she attended Loyola University Chicago, where she received her B.S.N and R.N. degrees in nursing in 1964; and

WHEREAS, after receiving her degree, she began working as a nurse at Chicago Public Schools where she stayed for over 40 years before retiring in 2001; and

WHEREAS, Helen's activism began in the 1960s when she discovered she could not secure credit to make a purchase from Goldblatt's because she was a woman, and she joined Chicago NOW, where she became an activist for the passage of the Equal Rights Amendment; and

WHEREAS, in the 1970s, Helen joined the Chicago Teachers Union and became a member of its Women's Rights Committee, which she chaired from 1984 to 2009, and worked to end sexual harassment, supported women's advancement at the Washburne trade School, sought to improve conditions and employment for women in sports, promoted women's labor history, supported women political candidates, and fought for women's health, birth control, and reproductive choice; Helen was also active in the Chicago Coalition of Labor Union Women and Cassandra, a Radical Feminist Nurses Network; and

WHEREAS, in 1995, Helen helped found the Women in Labor History Project, later called the Working Women's History Project, which is a nonprofit organization focused on preserving and promoting the stories of historical and living Chicago women who contribute to achieving justice and equality in areas of labor, as well as women's human and civil rights; one of the first acts of the Working Women's History Project was to publish Helen's book, *Working Without Uniforms: School Nursing in Chicago 1951-2001*, which is a collection of oral histories of the Chicago Public School nurses; and

WHEREAS, Helen worked with a coalition across the City of Chicago on the Mother Jones Heritage project, the Mother Jones statue campaign, to honor the contributions of Mother Jones to the Labor Movement and to women; and

WHEREAS, Helen is preceded in death by her parents, Irving and Jessamine; she leaves to cherish her memories, her husband, Paul A. Odell; daughter, Moira (Ramirez) Melendez; step-children, Cyndi (Odell) Christel and Stephen (Merri) Odell; grandchildren, Michael Melendez, Carson (Sarah), Steve, Ryan (Emily), and David; great-grandchildren, Makailyn, Isabelle, and Ryan Junior; brothers, Bob (the late Pat) Hershinow and Paul Hershinow; nephew, Kevin McLinden; cousins, Ellen Nyberg, Larry (Marianne) Nyberg; and a host of other friends and family; and

HONORING THE LIFE AND CONTRIBUTIONS OF JIM REILLY

WHEREAS, Jim Reilly, a downstate Illinois lawmaker who became chief of staff to two (2) governors and headed agencies that oversaw mass transit in the Chicago area, state construction projects, and the operations of McCormick Place and Navy Pier, has died at 77; and

WHEREAS, Reilly grew up in Springfield where he attended Springfield High School. His father James was an attorney and his mother Alta a secretary for the American Red Cross. After graduating from Illinois College in Jacksonville, he received his Juris Doctor from the University of Chicago Law School in 1971. He worked for the city of Jacksonville, Illinois, before becoming a state representative in 1977; and

WHEREAS, Reilly entered the Illinois House in the same class as former Governor Jim Edgar. Those years of service propelled Edgar to higher office and brought Reilly, a self-described Rockefeller Republican, to the attention of then Governor Jim Thompson. Thompson, recognizing Reilly's talent, made him his counsel and subsequently chief of staff; and

WHEREAS, when Thompson left office, Reilly took over as head of the agency in charge of the project to rebuild Navy Pier, the Metropolitan Pier & Exposition Authority (McPier), a signature project of the Thompson administration. During much of the 1990s, he served as chief executive officer of McPier. He helped oversee renovations and expansion including development at the McCormick Place South Building and Hyatt Regency McCormick Place. During his tenure, the pier became the most popular tourist attraction in the state; and

WHEREAS, when Jim Edgar became governor, he brought Reilly back for a second stint as gubernatorial chief of staff. During Edgar's recovery from emergency surgery, Reilly became "a familiar and respected stand-in for the governor," the Tribune reported in 1994. The Tribune described Reilly as "an administrator with a well-known contempt for inertia; and

WHEREAS, in 1999, Reilly went from running the convention hall to helping fill it as chair of the Chicago Convention & Tourism Bureau where he served for five years. He returned to the McPier as trustee in 2010, when state legislation named him to lead a revamp of operations including moving the convention center and Navy Pier to private management. During that time, he backed controversial labor rule changes that he later said allowed the city to retain and bring new trade shows to the city; and

WHEREAS, he became chairman of the RTA board in 2005 as the region's transportation agencies sought to avoid financial doomsday. There, he worked to calm feuds between the RTA's operating units-the Chicago Transit Authority, Metra, and Pace-over who would get limited subsidies and capital funds. He helped avoid the worst-case scenario, and worked to plug a huge CTA pension shortfall; and

WHEREAS, throughout his years of service, Reilly was the go-between, a savvy and trusted insider who could segue from Republican governors to Democratic mayors and, with a minimum of partisan fuss, work out deals to expand McCormick Place, restructure the Regional Transportation Authority and revitalize Chicago's tourism agency; and

WHEREAS, Reilly served one other GOP governor: Bruce Rauner, chairing the Illinois Capital Development Board, the state's construction arm. He remained until his death on the boards of Choose Chicago (the successor of the tourism bureau), Navy Pier, Mercy Hospital, and the Illinois Institute of Technology; and

WHEREAS, Reilly had a deep appreciation for music and a commitment to the Chicago Shakespeare Theater, and rooted for the Bears, Bulls and St. Louis Cardinals. He traveled extensively. He also had a passion for real and model trains, and enjoyed showing his train network to his nieces and nephews during holiday gatherings; and

WHEREAS, in his oral history, Reilly said one of the biggest changes he'd seen in government was a shift over time to a reflexive anti-tax stance among politicians and the public. "In the '70s and even into the early '80s, tax increases were not evil," he said. "Politically, nobody ever campaigned on, 'Got to have a tax increase.' But I think generally people maybe had more faith in government and had more of a sense that taxes are sort of a necessary evil, something you pay for the price of having the kind of things you want;" and

WHEREAS, Reilly is survived by his beloved wife, Veronica Lynch, and extended family. "Jim lived life large, was kind and led a life filled with incredible accomplishments. He dedicated his life to public service. He gave his time, attention, and philanthropic support to multiple charitable and artistic endeavors. He did not take for granted the goodwill and friendship of others," his wife said in a written statement. "I don't believe he fully realized the impact he had on Illinois, most visibly Chicago. He departed with a million more plans in mind."

WHEREAS, Elise Malary, a 31-year-old Black trans woman activist and community leader died in March 2022; and

WHEREAS, Elise was born on March 29, 1990 and lived in Chicago's Andersonville and Rogers Park neighborhoods before moving to Evanston. Elise was a beloved sister, friend, advocate, and community leader. She was known for her fierceness, kindness, and compassion; and

WHEREAS, Elise moved to Chicago in 2016. She interned at the AIDS Foundation of Chicago before working at Equality Illinois, and the Chicago Reader. She joined the Illinois Attorney General's office where she became a valued member of the Civil Rights Bureau. She was a tireless advocate for the LGBTQ+ community and was passionate about her work. She regularly joined other advocates from across the state to lobby state legislators in support of LGBTQ+ affirming legislation during annual LGBTQ+ Advocacy Days. She was an outspoken advocate for the transgender community, especially LGBTQ+ youth, and had been working to raise awareness about transgender violence and discrimination. She served for three (3) years as a member of the Equality Illinois Community Advisory Group; and

WHEREAS, Elise traveled around the state to lift LGBTQ+ Illinoisans, including several trips to Carbondale where she met with LGBTQ+ youth at the Rainbow Café LGBTQ+ Center. On October 8, 2017, she was the keynote speaker at the Center's gala, and her remarks continue to inspire and offer hope to those who attended the event; and

WHEREAS, Elise was a founding member of the Chicago Therapy Collective, the mission of which is to promote city-wide accountability and action to alleviate LGBTQ+ health disparities and advance collective LGBTQ+ health and well-being through education, therapy, advocacy, and the arts. She helped coordinate the Collective's annual Transgender Day of Resilience and Transgender Day of Visibility events and was

a leader on the #HireTransNOW# initiative to reduce anti-Trans hiring stigma and create pipelines to Transaffirming jobs; and

WHEREAS, Elise was known to many through her activism. In 2019, when anti-Trans stickers were placed at the Women and Children First Bookstore in Andersonville, she helped organize a community rally and chalking of the sidewalk outside the bookstore with messages of hope and affirmation for Trans people; and

WHEREAS, Iggy V. Ladden, founder of the Chicago Therapy Collective, said "Elise Malary faced hardness and chose kindness. Elise faced cruelty and chose softness, love, and joy. She chose giving people the benefit of the doubt. She looked for the good in them. She chose compassion, and, she chose time and time again to lift others up;" and

WHEREAS, Elise was a shining light, not just for the transgender community, but for all of Chicago. She will be sorely missed by her friends, family, and loved ones, as well as others who knew and worked with her to improve the lives and well-being of the LGBTQ+ community.

HONORING THE LIFE OF TEMA BAUER

WHEREAS, Tema Bauer, one of Illinois' oldest Holocaust survivors, has died at the age of 105. She lost all 38 family members and her right arm to the Nazis but found a new life in Chicago with fellow survivor Morris Bauer, who "told her that she need not worry about the future because he would always take care of her;" and

WHEREAS, Tema grew up in a Jewish family in Lodz. She was the youngest of Hendel and Chil Posalska's nine children. Her father Chil was a cattle dealer. When the Nazis invaded Poland in 1939, her siblings moved their parents to a smaller town, thinking it might be safer. Tema stayed behind to close up the family home. She was supposed to follow them to the country but was arrested and ordered into the Jewish ghetto in Lodz. Her relatives were all sent to Chelmno, described by the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum as "the first stationary facility where poison gas was used for the mass murder of Jews." None survived; and

WHEREAS, for a time, she worked in the ghetto, first in a kitchen, then at a shoe factory. In 1943, she was sent to the slave labor camp Skarżysko-Kamienna. During the three-day train journey to get there, the packed cars had no room to sit, no water, no food, and no bathroom facilities. From there, she was sent to work in the munition's factory in Leipzig, where she was injured during an explosion. Tema, who was right-handed, lost her right arm. A Jewish doctor helped her survive by amputating it above her elbow without any anesthesia or antibiotics. Two months after she lost her arm, she and other women laborers were ordered on a six-day death march toward the Elbe River. The Allied forces were in the area and as they drew near, the Nazi captors fled; and

WHEREAS, after the war, she returned to Lodz in search of her family. There she saw her future husband Morris, then called by his Yiddish name Moishe. He had survived at least seven camps. German soldiers needed boots, and his skill as a cobbler kept him alive. They were married in 1945 and found their way to a displaced-persons camp in Germany. They hoped to immigrate to Israel but could not because of the injury to her arm. Israel wouldn't or couldn't take anyone who was not capable of working or fighting in the Army. Their first son, Jerry, was born in that camp. In 1949, they arrived at Ellis Island and travelled to Chicago where they eventually settled in East Rogers Park; and

WHEREAS, to help get their life started in Chicago, Morris borrowed \$1,758.38 from the Jewish Family and Community Service organization to open a shoe-repair shop on Devon Avenue. In time, he would start doing custom work for orthopedic surgeons, modifying children's shoes, and helping others with special orthopedic needs. The Bauers were proud that, by 1956, they had paid back every penny of the loan; and

WHEREAS, Tema and Morris built a life in Chicago. Their friends were other Holocaust survivors with whom they shared memories and experiences. They raised their two (2) sons, Jerry and Michael, in Rogers Park. Jerry studied medicine at the University of Illinois Abraham Lincoln School of Medicine. He is board certified in neurosurgery and practiced in Park Ridge, Illinois. Their second son, Michael, who was born in Chicago, became a lawyer and political fundraiser who helped elect LGBTQ candidates before his death in 2019 from melanoma; and

WHEREAS, Tema is survived by her beloved son Jerry, three (3) grandchildren, and seven (7) great grandchildren.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Commissioners of Cook County, on behalf of the 5.2 million residents of Cook County, honors the life of Tema Bauer, salutes her courage and tenacity during the Holocaust, and thanks her for educating the people of Cook County about the reality of the Holocaust. May her memory be a blessing and a reminder that we must all remain vigilant against the devasting harm and cruelty that can grow from blind hatred of others; and

WHEREAS, April is National Sexual Assault Awareness Month; and

WHEREAS, according to National statistics from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), 1 in 3 women and 1 in 4 men in the United States of America (U.S.) have experienced sexual violence involving physical contact; and

WHEREAS, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reports that nearly 1 in 5 women and 1 in 38 men have experienced completed or attempted rape during their lifetimes; and

WHEREAS, according to the Rape, Abuse & Incest National Network (RAINN) on average, there are 433,648 victims of rape and sexual assault each year in the United States of America (U.S.); and

WHEREAS, the Rape, Abuse & Incest National Network (RAINN) data assures that every 73 seconds, an American is sexually assaulted; and

WHEREAS, according to the Department of Justice's Bureau of Justice Statistics National Crime Victimization Survey: only 230 of every 1,000 rapes are reported, only 46 of every 1,000 rapes lead to arrest, and only 5 of every 1,000 rapes lead to conviction in the United States of America (U.S.); and

WHEREAS, the Harvard Medical School Center for Primary Care has reported a significant worldwide increase in sexual violence cases since the surge of the Covid-19 Pandemic; and

WHEREAS, for the past 23 years, Peace Over Violence, a sexual and domestic violence prevention center headquartered in Los Angeles, California, has hosted the Denim Day campaign on a Wednesday in April in honor of Sexual Assault Awareness Month; and

WHEREAS, the Denim Day story begins in Italy in 1992, when an 18-year-old girl was raped by the 45-year-old driving instructor who was taking her on her very first driving lesson. He took her to an isolated road, pulled her out of the car, removed her jeans and raped her; and

WHEREAS, after she reported the rape, the perpetrator was arrested, prosecuted, and convicted of rape and sentenced to jail; and

WHEREAS, years later, that conviction was overturned by the Italian Supreme Court using the "jeans alibi" - according to the justices, the woman was wearing tight jeans, therefore she must have helped the person who raped her remove her jeans, thereby implying consent; and

WHEREAS, the following day, the women in the Italian Parliament came to work wearing jeans in solidarity with the survivor; and

WHEREAS, the Denim Day campaign became official in the United States of America (U.S.) in 1999 where people wore denim in solidarity with women in the Italian Parliament; and

WHEREAS, since then, wearing jeans or other denim apparel on Denim Day has become a symbol of protest against erroneous and destructive manners about sexual harassment, abuse, assault and rape; and

WHEREAS, Dinkel's Bakery and Cafe welcomed its third generation of Dinkel family ownership when Norman Dinkel Jr. took over the business. He remains the current owner with the help of Luke Karl and his wife Sandgren, the 4th generation of the Dinkel family; and

WHEREAS, in the 1980s, Dinkel's began a thriving mail-order business with its stollen and strudels, and in 2013, it began selling bread and sandwiches, while beginning to sell pastries wholesale to local supermarkets; and

WHEREAS, Dinkel's has also been a longtime member of the Bakers Dozen, a secret society of leaders from the oldest family-owner bakeries in and around Chicago. The group gives feedback on recipes, ordering systems and equipment, helping bakeries continue to thrive in their local communities; and

RESOLUTION AGAINST THE RISE IN ANTI-SEMITISM AND IN SUPPORT OF COOK COUNTY'S JEWISH POPULATION

WHEREAS, a documented disturbing rise in anti-Semitic events targeting the Jewish population has surged throughout the United States, and significantly in Cook County; and

WHEREAS, according to the Anti-Defamation League (ADL) annual audit of anti-Semitic incidents, there were 1,879 recorded attacks against Jews and Jewish institutions across the country in 2018, which increased to 2,024 recorded antisemitic incidents in 2020. In Illinois, residents saw a 350% increase in anti-Semitic incidents between 2016 and 2020; and

WHEREAS, according to the FBI, anti-Jewish bias accounted for 57% of religiously motivated hate crimes in 2020, even though Jews only account for less than 2% of the U.S. population. Despite the Covid-19 pandemic and community lock-down, this percentage is up from 2015 when 51.3% of religiously motivated hate crime offenses targeted Jews or Jewish institutions; and

WHEREAS, anti-Semitic propaganda and hate crimes are meant to stoke hatred of Jews among non-Jews and cause Jewish residents to feel they are unwelcome and unsafe in the community; and

WHEREAS, in the first three months of 2022, Jewish communities have faced incidents of leaflet drops, vandalism, broken glass, presence of swastikas, verbal attacks, and physical assaults, which are meant to instill psychological distress, fear, and anxiety; and

WHEREAS, Chicago's Orthodox Jewish community in West Rogers Park was targeted with eight known incidents of hate from January 13 through February 1, 2022. These are days surrounding International Holocaust Remembrance Day on January 27, which triggered associations of Kristallnacht ("the Night of Broken Glass") for Holocaust survivors and their descendants, where the Nazi's anti-Semitic policies turned exceptionally violent. These incidents included:

- On January 13, 2022, a man approached Orthodox Jewish middle school students and a teacher outside of the Yeshivas Tiferes Tzvi school and screamed "all of you should be killed" as he passed by; and
- On January 29, 2022, during Shabbat, a man smashed the window of the Kol Tuv Kosher Foods store and shattered the front door of the Tel Aviv Kosher Bakery next door; the non-Jewish stores on the block were not touched; and
- On January 30, 2022, yellow swastikas were spray-painted on the Hanna Sacks Bais Yaakov allfemale high school and the Friends of Refugees of Eastern Europe or F.R.E.E. Synagogue, a synagogue that has supported Ukrainian and Russian Jewish refugees since 1973; and
- On January 30, 2022, an Orthodox Jewish man was physically assaulted near the F.R.E.E. Synagogue by a man who hurled racial slurs at him; and
- On February 1, 2022, three men in a van verbally threatened a man in the Bnei Ruven synagogue parking lot and later smashed his and other congregants' car windows; and
- From January 29 to February 1, 2022, Congregation K.I.N.S. of West Rogers Park and the all-male Orthodox Jewish high school Yeshivas Meor Ha Torah were also vandalized; and

WHEREAS, in March 2022, anti-Semitic flyers were found in plastic bags containing rocks, beans, or rice, and were left in Cook County residents' front yards and in public parks in Niles, Park Ridge, Glenview, Skokie, and Arlington Heights, Illinois. These flyers contained anti-Semitic tropes that Jews control the world and allege that the "Covid Agenda," Biden Administration, and the war in Ukraine, are part of a Jewish global conspiracy. The flyers list names of people in the Government believed to be Jewish and include photos and images of the Israeli flag next to many of the names. Some of the flyers also allege that Jews control the North Shore, Cook County Sheriff's Police, and Cook County government officials; and

WHEREAS, anti-Semitic hate crimes have been documented across Illinois, including:

- On March 18, 2022, a bomb threat was made to the North Suburban Beth El Synagogue in Highland Park; and
- Threats to Jewish Day Care facilities in and around Skokie, Illinois; and
- Anti-Semitic and white-supremacy propaganda was distributed at Eastern Illinois University, University of Illinois-Urbana, and Lake Land College; and

WHEREAS, incidents of anti-Jewish hate and violence have occurred across the United States, with events in the first three months this year including:

- On January 15, 2022, congregants and a rabbi who were peacefully praying at a synagogue during Shabbat in Colleyville, Texas were held hostage for ten hours by a terrorist attempting to free another terrorist from federal prison, causing panic for Jewish worshippers' safety nationwide; and
- On January 30, 2022, a neo-Nazi group held a rally in Orlando where people wore Nazi-gear, waved swastika flags, shouted "Heil Hitler" and claimed that "Jews rape children and drink their blood;" and
- Dozens of incidents of swastikas found in public areas including for example: a Middle School play area in Alaska, to a post office bathroom in New York, an elementary school in Oregon, a college residential hall in Massachusetts, a park in Iowa, a mural in Arkansas, and a cemetery in Pennsylvania; and
- Since the beginning of March, there have been at least 18 reported bomb threats directed against synagogues and Jewish Community Centers (JCCs) across the United States; and
- Flyers reminiscent of Nazi-style propaganda have been littered in as many as 19 states throughout the United States including: Oregon, California, Montana, Utah, Colorado, Wisconsin, North Carolina, Georgia, Florida, New York, and Maryland; and

WHEREAS, while there is more work to be done, Cook County works to prevent, intervene, and investigate Hate Crimes. The Commission on Human Rights and Ethics participates in the Interagency Hate Crime Coalition. The Cook County Sheriff's Office regularly dedicates resources in the form of patrol cars, officers, and public education to protect all residents from hate crimes, including specifically dedicating officers to protect synagogues when they are threatened.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Cook County Board of Commissioners strongly condemn the hateful acts made against those of the Jewish faith and their institutions and affirm that all people deserve the right to be secure and respected; and

WHEREAS, in the case of abandonment of less than 24 months and purchase for value, by a purchaser in whom the seller has no direct financial interest, the County may determine that special circumstances justify finding the property is deemed abandoned; and

WHEREAS, Class 6b requires the validation by the County Board of the shortened period of qualifying abandonment in cases where the facility has been abandoned for less than 24 consecutive months upon purchase for value; and

WHEREAS, the municipality states the Class 6b is necessary for development to occur on this specific real estate. The municipal Resolution cites the qualifications of this property to meet the definition of abandoned with special circumstances; and

WHEREAS, industrial real estate is normally assessed at 25% of its market value, qualifying industrial real estate eligible for the Class 6b can receive a significant reduction in the level of assessment from the date that new construction or rehabilitation has been completed, or in the case of abandoned property from the date of substantial re-occupancy. Properties receiving Class 6b will be assessed at 10% of the market value for 10 years, 15% for the 11th year and 20% in the 12th year.

Summary: Evergreen Redevelopment LLC has requested HOME Investments Partnerships Program funds in the amount of \$1,250,000 for the 12-month construction period and thirty-year permanent period with a 0% permanent loan rate. The loan will be used to finance the new construction of an 80-unit affordable housing for seniors who are 62 and over in the City of Bellwood, Illinois, a near western suburb of the City of Chicago.

The new construction will be comprised of a four-story mixed-used development and designed to accommodate 60 parking spaces. The elevator serviced 80 residential unit mix will include seventy-six (76) 626 sf. one bedroom and four (4) 998 sf. two-bedroom units. ADOPTION AND FAMILY SUPPORTIVE SERVICES

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 38 - Health and Human Services, Article VIII. - Adoption and Family Supportive Services, Section 38-170 Establishment and Section 38-173 Fees of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as Follows:

Sec. 38-170. Establishment

The Cook County Office of Adoption and <u>Child Custody AdvocacyFamily Supportive Services</u> shall hereby be renamed the Cook County Department of Adoption and Family Supportive Services ("Department") and shall remain within the administrative responsibility and jurisdiction of the Cook County <u>Bureau of AdministrationPresiding Judge</u>.

Sec. 38-171. - Powers and duties.

The Department shall perform the following services and duties:

(a) Social Study Investigations. Upon the direction and order of a judge of the Circuit Court of Cook County, the Department shall conduct a social study investigation and issue a report to the judge who ordered said investigation for the following matters:

(1) Adoptions;

(2) Allocation of parental responsibility or parenting time cases; and

(3) Probate cases involving guardianship and/or custody of a child;

(b) Other Services. The Department may provide additional services on behalf of the Circuit Court of Cook County including, but not limited to:

- (1) Intake screening interview of prospective adoptive parents and, if age appropriate, the child or children;
- (2) Interviews with birth parents prior to adoption consent to obtain extensive background information with the understanding that non-identifying information, as authorized by statute, will be available to the adoptive parents and the adoptee later in life;
- (3) Fingerprinting processing for statutorily required criminal background checks;
- (4) Post adoption services involving inquiries from adult adoptees and to a lesser degree adoptive and birth parents and other qualifying relatives for non-identifying information concerning the adoptee's biological background; and
- (5) Any other service authorized by an Illinois statute, a General Administrative Order of the Circuit Court of Cook County or ordinance of the Cook County Board of Commissioners.

(c) The Director of the Department shall attempt to meet, minimally on a quarterly basis, with (i) the presiding judges of the circuit court responsible for adoption, probate and domestic relations cases and (ii) the Office of the Chief Judge to discuss court orders and case management relevant to the Department's responsibilities. The Department Director shall report the outcome of these meetings to the Chief of the Bureau of Administration.

Sec. 38-173. - Fees

The Department shall charge fees for the following services with the amounts as set in Section 32-1 of this Code.

- (1) Adoption Intake Interview Initial meeting with prospective adoptive family providing an overview of the adoption process, review of qualifications for adoption and implementation of the process for criminal and DCFS background check.
- (2) Birth Parent Interview and Consent Interviewing and collecting information from the birth parent and overview of the signature of documents that allow the birth parent(s) to relinquish rights and responsibilities of the child to a specific person.
- (3) Adult Adoptee Inquiry (paid by Adoptee) Retrieval and review of adoption file and generating a report of non-identifying information.
- (4) Adoption Fingerprint Processing (paid by adoptive parent(s) Assists attorneys and parents with retrieval and processing of state and federal criminal background checks.

- (5) Foreign Jurisdiction Social Study Investigation Request (paid by individual residing outside of the court's jurisdiction) Court of foreign jurisdiction (outside of Cook County) informally requests that the Department conduct a child custody social study investigation of a Cook County resident that includes interviews of all household residents, Cook County criminal background checks and DCFS background checks and retrieval of school progress reports.
- (6) Adoption Social Study Investigation Fee (per child) (Based on annual income of, and paid by, adoptive parent(s) Annual income shall be verified by either a current federal or state tax return or current wages and tax statements, e.g., W-2 and/or 1099 forms) Includes interview of all household residents and child care providers of the adoptee; retrieval of financial information, character and employment references, medical information, school progress reports and other mandatory information integrated into a written report concerning adoption proceedings.

All fees shall be collected by the Department and remitted to the Cook County Department of Revenue.

Effective date: This ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.

WHEREAS, by September 1, 2021, Cook County had successfully awarded seventy-five percent of the ERA Grant funds to eligible households under the Treasury guidelines, making Cook County eligible to receive reallocated funds from other States and Municipalities through the Treasury; and

WHEREAS, on September 30, 2021, Cook County applied for the first reallocation of ERA I Grant funds from Treasury of which \$446, 212 was awarded to Cook County from the redistribution of ERA Grant funds from the National Pool; and

WHEREAS, on January 21, 2022, Cook County applied for the second reallocation of ERA I Grant funds from Treasury of which \$6,196,870.79 was awarded to Cook County from the redistribution of ERA I Grant funds from the National Pool; and

Summary: The new three-story building will have forty 535 SF one-bedroom units, with one unit reserved for the onsite manager. The common areas of the building will be fully accessible, all units will be visitable, and six units will be fully accessible, four units will be adaptable and two sensory impaired units will complete the twelve-unit accessible unit mix.

The development will be located at 711 East Chicago Street and 712 East Laurel Street, in Elgin, Illinois, encompassing approximately 3.87 acres. The proposed building will have entrances on both Chicago and Laurel to facilitate public entrance and resident entry tied closely to the management office.

Currently, there is a two-story, 1,778-square-foot, single-family residential structure, and associated garage, both scheduled for demolition under the subject development. The remainder of the subject property consists primarily of a gravel parking area, lightly forested areas, and pine tree nurseries. The back half of the land will remain undisturbed as the land slopes to be inside the 100-year flood plain. Both a Phase I and Phase II have been completed, examining the property for concerns, yielding no further remediation recommendations.

The new development will have landscaping all around with walking paths connecting the building to the rest of the grounds, including picnic and gardens area approaching the rear of the property. 60 parking spaces will be designed along Chicago Avenue, with coordinated accessible parking and entry.

UP HOLDINGS will serve as developer and property manager, delivering management through its Property Management affiliate UPA, LLC of Lincolnwood. UP Holdings LLC owns eight Illinois LIHTC developments totaling 337 units and averaging 34 units. They currently have four LIHTC projects under construction in both the Chicago metro area and outstate Illinois.

UPA, LLC, the property management affiliate currently has 1,355 units under management in developments primarily centered in Illinois, with properties in Indiana, California and one development in Ohio.

A RESOLUTION FORMING THE ALTERNATIVE HEALTH INTERVENTION AND RESPONSE PILOT PROGRAM'S TASK FORCE

WHEREAS, recognizing an increase in the number of individuals seeking behavioral and mental health services, the Cook County Board of Commissioners passed a resolution in October 2021 declaring mental health a public health crisis; and

WHEREAS, there has been an expansion in our public consciousness and amplified discussion regarding the role of government entities and law enforcement in responding to mental and behavioral health emergencies, especially in light of the need for alternative public safety programs; and

WHEREAS, on August 25, 2021, Governor J.B. Pritzker signed into law in Illinois the Community Emergency Services and Support Act ("Act"), 50 ILCS 754/1 through 754/65; and

WHEREAS, the Act requires every unit of local government that provides or manages ambulance service or similar emergency medical response to coordinate with mobile mental and behavioral health services established by the Illinois Department of Human Service's Division of Mental Health ("Division of Mental Health"). The Act requires coordination with a newly established 988 hotline, which connects callers to the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline; and

WHEREAS, the Act aims to provide callers seeking mental or behavioral health support with an appropriate mental health response, specifically with professionals trained in de-escalation techniques, knowledge of community services and resources, and respectful interaction with those experiencing a crisis while at the same time diverting non-violent/non-criminal calls from a police response; and

WHEREAS, the Act contemplates mobile response teams to divert those in crisis from interactions with law enforcement whenever possible and link them with available appropriate community services; and

WHEREAS, the Act endeavors to meet a community need with an appropriate response, reducing law enforcement responses to those requiring mental or behavioral health care using mobile unit responders where available for dispatch; and

WHEREAS, the Act is effective starting January 1, 2022, and requires local governments to begin coordination with the Illinois Division of Mental Health and its mobile units on or before January 1, 2023 if the unit of local government provides or coordinates ambulance or similar emergency medical response or transportation services for individuals with emergency medical needs; and

WHEREAS, Cook County operates the Emergency Telephone System Board (ETSB) to administer Cook County's 911 system in unincorporated Cook County and via an agreement with Berkely, Blue Island, Dixmoor, Ford Heights, Golf, Harvey, Hometown, Indian Head Park, Lyons, Merrionette Park, Metra, Northlake, Palos Park, Park Ridge and Phoenix; and

WHEREAS, due to the implementation of the proposed ARPA funded Crisis Intervention Pilot Program which will be known as the Alternative Health Intervention and Response Pilot Program ("Pilot Program"), Cook County will establish a mobile crisis intervention program; and

WHEREAS, an Alternative Health Intervention and Response Task Force ("Task Force") should be established to assist in developing and implementing the Pilot Program, determine compliance with the Act and determine details of an ordinance to further establish such a program (a model ordinance entitled "Alternative Health Intervention and Response Ordinance" is attached to this Resolution for reference and is marked as Exhibit A); and

WHEREAS, given the passage of the Act, the various Cook County crisis and mental health ARPA initiatives and the nationwide and local push to maintain an appropriate response to people in crisis while insulating them from interactions with the criminal justice system where possible, the Task Force shall set County-led goals to reduce reliance on the criminal justice system, develop a system to support those with mental and behavioral health needs including on-scene crisis assistance, refer people for treatment, connect those in need to crisis care and provide follow up support —for emergency services provided in unincorporated Cook County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Task Force is established to determine how the Pilot Program will be established, how the approved ARPA initiatives_can be used to aid the Pilot Program, and to make recommendations to become operational on or before January 1, 2023; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Task Force shall include representatives from the Cook County Board of Commissioners, the Cook County Department of Public Health, Cook County Health, the Cook County Sheriff's Office, the Cook County Board President's Office, the Justice Advisory Council, and the Emergency Telephone System Board, and a community representative. The lead sponsor of this Resolution shall serve as the representative of the Cook County Board of Commissioners, and the remaining members shall be appointed by each above-named office or the Cook County Board President as appropriate. The members of the Task Force shall be selected within 30 days of the passage of this Resolution and the

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Executive Director of the Justice Advisory Council and a representative of Cook County Health or the Cook County Department of Public Health shall co-chair the Task Force; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Task Force shall develop and make recommendations to the Cook County Board of Commissioners regarding the establishment of the Pilot Program on or before August 1, 2022.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION

PROGRAM ALLOCATION FOR BUDGETED FY 2022 EQUITY AND INCLUSION SPECIAL PURPOSE FUNDS

WHEREAS, in October 2021, the Cook County Board of Commissioners passed Resolution No. 21-5542 creating a special purpose fund for Equity and Inclusion ("Equity Fund") dedicated to addressing historical disparities and disinvestment communities that are marginalized or have experienced other social and economic disparities; and

WHEREAS, seeding money for equity investment in fixed charges as well as directly to the Cook County Health and Hospitals System was an important step taken by Cook County to address racial disparities and build on the Cook County Policy Roadmap commitment to advancing equitable policies and addressing systemic disparities; and

WHEREAS, Cook County incorporated the initial FY 2021 \$40M Equity Fund investment into the FY 2022 Budget and an additional \$10M from the County's surplus fund balance from the end of FY21 has been allocated in the County's fixed charges for transfer into the Equity Fund; and

WHEREAS, the remaining Equity Funds are budgeted and allocated in the FY 2022 Budget; and

WHEREAS, through the Equity Fund, intentional investments from government resources are allocated to address historical and continued disparities and disinvestment, particularly in Black and Latine (as defined in the Equity Report) communities, and to bring advocates, service providers, and other partners to the table as thought partners and decision-makers; and

WHEREAS, the vision behind the Equity Fund was to create safe, healthy, and thriving communities in Cook County by reimagining and transforming systems around justice, public safety, health, housing, economic opportunity, community development, and social services to benefit Black, Indigenous, and People of Color communities and proactively invest resources in solutions and supports to achieve equitable outcomes; and

WHEREAS, efforts have been undertaken with various Cook County departments to determine the spending and program allocation for \$50M of the budgeted FY 2022 Equity Funds addressed herein; and

WHEREAS, guiding principles to determine allocation of funding included aligning programs with the *Cook County Policy Roadmap* to promote coordination and ease of implementation; center equity to address the structural barriers, systems, policies, and practices that harm Cook County's most marginalized residents; advancing a more comprehensive and interdisciplinary approach to government resource allocation; avoiding duplication of resources and leverage existing efforts and infrastructure where possible; and allocating future savings generated from policy changes and operational reforms back to community investments.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOVLED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners supports the spending plan and use of \$50M in Equity Funds for the following programs and in the following amounts:

1. The Bureau of Economic Development ("BED") led program "Transforming Places" (Place-Based Pilot) will identify high vulnerability communities and co-design a process to meet community-defined needs for economic development, community building, community safety, public health, education or

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social services. Cook County will support participating communities over a sustained period to ensure implementation and capacity-building and help attract additional public, private, and philanthropic resources. The Equity Fund allocation of up to \$15M will support partnering with United Way of Metro Chicago as a grant recipient and program administrator to work with BED identified Community areas.

2. Equity in Grantmaking/Capacity Building let by BED and the Office of the President will allow for the development of a comprehensive equity-centered grantmaking strategy to promote equitable access to resources for community-based organizations and provides for increased capacity to deliver services in partnership with smaller, grassroots, emerging, and BIPOC-led organizations anchored in marginalized communities. Up to \$10M in Equity funds will be allocated to cover consultancy for planning and implementing best practices. The primary use of funds will be administered through a competitive grant process for eligible community-based organizations.

3. Up to \$2M in Equity Funds will be allocated for Cannabis Business development under the leadership of BED. The Equity Funds will support cannabis-related businesses owned and operated by Social Equity applicants, in Cook County. BED will use the funds to promote, facilitate, and assist social equity programs related to the cannabis industry, economic development, and restorative programs aimed at improving disproportionately impacted areas throughout Cook County. The allocated funds will support the administrative costs associated with establishing the Cannabis Business Development Program. The remaining allocated funds will be distributed by BED through a competitive grant process for eligible social equity applicants.

4. The Cook County Landbank Authority will be allocated up to \$5M in Equity Funds to support the administrative and operational costs of their work to increase affordable housing stock and economic opportunity in systematically disadvantaged communities.

5. Up to \$10M in Equity Funds will be allocated to BED to support the development of a Community Information Exchange (CIE) for suburban Cook County and the City of Chicago to enhance the 211 system already being collaboratively developed by Cook County, the City of Chicago and a range of partners. The allocation will support the selection of a Program Administrator and the development of the selected technology platform.

6. The remaining \$3M reserve in the Equity Fund of the \$50M addressed herein may be used to support other priorities identified above or further addressed in the Equity Fund Taskforce Report. The Offices Under the President will provide advance notice to the Cook County Board of Commissioners regarding any allocation of the \$3M reserve.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Budget Director and Comptroller shall be authorized to execute the \$10M transfer from the County's fixed charges account to the Equity Fund which originated from the County's surplus fund balance from the end of FY21; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Budget Director and Comptroller shall be authorized to execute any additional budgetary transfers or chargebacks to effectuate these programs and the spending plan provided herein; and

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Cook County Budget Director and Comptroller shall provide financial updates on the Equity Fund as part of the monthly Revenue and Expense report provided to the Cook County Board of Commissioners Finance Committee; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Cook County Board will hold a hearing annually to get an update on the progress of the programs authorized under this resolution. An Equity Fund report will also be published in December of each year and made available to the Commissioners and members of the public.

CALLING MEMBERS OF THE COOK COUNTY SHERIFF'S MERIT BOARD TO SUPPLY MONTHLY DATA AND APPEAR BEFORE THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

WHEREAS, pursuant 55 ILCS 5/3-7002 of the Counties Code, the Cook County Sheriff's Merit Board (the "Merit Board") is created by the State of Illinois as an independent statutory body charged with performing specific functions, independent of the Cook County Sheriff ("Sheriff"), related to the Sheriff's hiring, promotion, discipline, and termination of certain Sheriff's employees; and

WHEREAS, members of the Merit Board are appointed with the advice and consent of the Cook County Board; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Board appropriates the funding of the Merit Board in the annual appropriation ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the Sheriff is tasked by the legislature to operate the County Jail, security in the Court system and public safety in general for all unincorporated areas and the County's 5.5 million residents; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 55 ILCS 5/3-7006, pursuant to recognized merit principles of public employment, the Merit Board, acting independently pursuant to its statutory obligations, shall formulate, adopt, and put into effect rules, regulations and procedures for its operation and the transaction of its business; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 55 ILCS 5/3-7006, the Merit Board, pursuant to recognized merit principles of public employment, must establish a classification of ranks of the deputy sheriffs in the County Police department, full-time deputy sheriffs not employed as county police officers or county corrections, and employees in the County Department of Corrections, and shall set standards and qualifications for each such rank and employee; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 55 ILCS 5/3-7008, before the Sheriff may appoint any person to the following positions, the Merit Board first must certify such person as qualified for the position: deputy sheriffs in the County police department, full-time deputy sheriffs not employed as county police officers or county corrections, and employees in the County Department of Corrections; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 55 ILCS 5/3-7009, before the Sheriff may promote any person to the following positions, the Merit Board first must certify such person as qualified for the promotion: deputy sheriffs in the County Police Department, full-time deputy sheriffs not employed as county police officers or county corrections officers, and employees in the County Department of Corrections; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 55 ILCS 5/3-7010, the Merit Board is charged with making appointment and promotion decisions pursuant to its statutory obligations and applying its own criteria which it considers and establishes; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 55 ILCS 5/3-7012, the Sheriff may not remove, demote or suspend any county corrections officer, deputy sheriff in the County Police Department, or full-time deputy sheriff not employed as a county police officer or county corrections officer except for cause, upon written charges filed with the Board by the Sheriff, and until the Board conducts a hearing and renders a decision on the matter, except where applicable collective bargaining agreement language provides that such discipline matters with respect to covered bargaining unit members may be subject to arbitration; and

WHEREAS, promoting public safety, as well as accountability and confidence in Cook County law enforcement requires adequate staffing levels and the provision of adequate services in the Cook County Department of Corrections, the Cook County Sheriff's Police Department, and the Cook County Court system; and

WHEREAS, the Sheriff must receive from the Merit Board, on a regular basis, an adequate number of qualified certified applicants for both hire and certified candidates for promotion, to meet the Sheriff's minimum staffing needs; and

WHEREAS, the lack of adequate staffing levels within any of the Sheriff's Departments may cause unnecessary financial burden on the County in several forms, including the payment of overtime, and other employee benefits which may result from mandated overtime; and

WHEREAS, promoting public safety, as well as accountability and confidence in Cook County law enforcement requires the prompt and efficient adjudication of disciplinary proceeding pending before the Merit Board; and

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WHEREAS, unnecessarily delayed and prolonged disciplinary proceedings before the Merit Board may cause financial burdens on the County in several forms, including unnecessary backpay caused by delay; and

WHEREAS, since the Merit Board is a separate statutory entity from the Sheriff's Office that promulgates its own rules and regulations and does not report to any other County agency or office, it is in the best interest of the citizens of Cook County that the County Board require the Merit Board provide the following information on a monthly basis, and provide explanatory and clarifying information, as required by the County Board:

- The number of new hire applications received by the Merit Board, per month;
- The number of new hire applicants currently under consideration for certification by the Merit Board, per month;
- The number of new hire applicants certified as qualified for hire, per month;
- The average length of time it takes to make a certification decision concerning new hire applicants;
- The number of promotional candidates certified as eligible for promotion, per month;
- The number of disciplinary hearings conducted, per month;
- The number of disciplinary decisions issued, per month;
- The number of budgeted vacancies to be filled by the Merit Board within the Sheriff's Office per month.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners that the Chair and the Executive Director of the Merit Board shall provide the information outlined above to the Secretary to the County Board by the 15th day of every month for the preceding month for distribution to the County Board, and shall appear to answer questions concerning that information in a hearing before the Criminal Justice Committee of the County Board as requested; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners that, recognizing the Merit Board reports will address employment issues impacting personal and private information of a sensitive nature, and legal matters, including related to pending and/or anticipated litigation, such reports and hearings shall include both open public hearings and closed Executive Sessions.

ORDINANCE CONCERNING THE AFFORDABLE HOUSING SPECIAL ASSESSMENT PROGRAM APPLICATION FEE

WHEREAS, Cook County is a home rule unit of local government pursuant to Article VII, Section 6(a) of the 1970 Illinois Constitution, and as such may exercise any power and perform any function pertaining to its government and affairs; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Board of Commissioners recognizes that the Illinois legislature, pursuant to 35 ILCS 200/15-178, granted the Cook County Assessor's Office authority to charge a reasonable application fee for the Affordable Housing Special Assessment Program; and

WHEREAS, there currently exists a Fee Schedule granting authority to the Assessor's Office to charge certain fees for administrative expenses.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, Chapter 74, TAXATION, Article II, REAL PROPERTY TAXATION, DIVISION 1. - GENERALLY, Assessor's fee for copy of Commercial/Industrial Manual, Sec. 74-35 of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as Follows:

Sec. 74-35. Assessor's fee for copy of Commercial/Industrial Manual.

(a) The County Assessor shall charge a fee as set out in Section 32-1 for furnishing a copy of the Cook County Commercial/Industrial Manual containing guidelines and data related to assessing industrial and commercial property.

(b) Certified document copy fee. The Assessor is hereby authorized to charge, as set out in Section 32-1, a fee to provide certified reproductions of documents or records. Requests for certified copies shall be limited to documents in their entirety.

(c) Incentive fees. The Assessor is hereby authorized to charge fees, as set out in Section 32-1, for filing of the original application and supporting documentation, any change or amendment to the original

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application or supporting documentation, any additional filing required to complete the incentive requirements, a request to reclassify, or a request to renew an incentive classification as provided for in the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

(d) Division requests. The Assessor is hereby authorized to charge a fee for the filing of each petition for division and/or consolidation, plat of subdivision, plat of vacation, plat of vacation and dedication or condominium declaration that is submitted for the purpose of dividing, consolidating or otherwise reconfiguring parcels or portions of real property.

(e) Amended division requests. The Assessor is also hereby authorized to charge a fee for the filing of each amendment to a petition for division and/or consolidation, plat of subdivision, plat of vacation, plat of vacation and dedication or condominium declaration submitted for the purpose of a division or consolidation of parcels or portions of real property.

(f) Division requests filed between September 1 and October 31. The Assessor is hereby authorized to charge a fee for the filing of any petition for division or consolidation that is filed between September 1 and October 31 along with a request that the work be processed in that following year.

(g) Collection and enforcement. The Assessor is hereby authorized to charge the above fees in this Section as set out in Section 32-1. The fees shall be charged and collected by the Assessor in the manner in which all other fees or costs are collected. These fees shall be in addition to all other fees and charges of such Assessor.

(h) Affordable Housing Special Assessment Program fees. The Assessor is hereby authorized to charge fees, as set out in Section 32-1, for filing of the original application and supporting documentation, and any change or amendments to the original or supporting documentation, as authorized by 35 ILCS 200/15-178.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 32, FEES, Sec. 32-32.1 Fee Schedule, of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as follows:

REQUESTING A HEARING IN THE COOK COUNTY HUMAN RELATIONS COMMITTEE TO DISCUSS VIOLENCE AND SYSTEMIC BARRIERS AGAINST COOK COUNTY TRANSGENDER RESIDENTS

WHEREAS, transgender residents in Cook County are vital members of our communities; and

WHEREAS, transgender residents and trans-led organizations in Cook County contribute in numerous ways to enrich the quality of life in Cook County; and

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WHEREAS, transgender people in our lives should be embraced and celebrated for the wonderful people they are and talents they bring to our communities; and

WHEREAS, these residents face systemic barriers and epidemic levels of violence leading to lack of access, for some, of basic needs and in the most extreme cases, leading to death; and

WHEREAS, in the last year, more transgender people have been murdered in Chicago than any other U.S. city; and

WHEREAS, in March 2022 alone, two Black, trans women, Tatiana LaBelle and Elisa Malary, were found dead within 24 hours of each other days after being reported missing with LaBelle found beaten to death and put in a garbage bin in East Chatham and Elise Malary pulled out of Lake Michigan; and

WHEREAS, in March 2022, Kathryn Newhouse, a 19 year old transgender woman formerly a resident of Illinois, was shot and killed by her father; and

WHEREAS, according the Human Rights Campaign Foundation, at least 57 transgender or gender nonconforming people were fatally shot or killed by other violent means in 2021. The majority of the deaths were Black and Latinx people with the greatest numbers being Black, Trans women; and

WHEREAS, the American Medical Association has publicly described the level of violence against the transgender community as epidemic; and

WHEREAS, most medical experts, law enforcement officials, and community members have stated that data should assume to be incomplete given the misgendering of transgender people; and

WHEREAS, the National Center for Transgender Equality cites that one in five transgender people in the United States has been discriminated when seeking a home, and more than one in ten have been evicted from their homes, because of their gender identity. One in five transgender individuals have experienced homelessness at some point in their lives; and

WHEREAS, according to Lambda Legal, nearly one in six transgender Americans-and one in two black transgender people-has been to prison. Many of those individuals face discrimination by administrators and threats of sexual assault; and

WHEREAS, countless other barriers exist in the daily lives of transgender individuals including with Cook County government; and

WHEREAS, Cook County stands with transgender residents and there is still more work to do to provide gender-affirming services to transgender residents; and

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that we, the Cook County Board of Commissioners request a convening of the Cook County Human Relations Committee to conduct a hearing regarding current protocols and future plans in serving the transgender community; and

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the following Cook County offices appear at the hearing to report to the Board regarding this topic:

- Cook County Health
- Cook County Medical Examiners' Office
- Cook County Sheriff's Office
- Cook County Department of Human Resources

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the reports, updates, and strategies will detail the separately elected officials, or County department's, offices', and/or bureaus individual and collaborative efforts to address this important and serious issue.

ARPA VITAL COMMUNITIES PROGRAM INITIATIVES IMPLEMENTED BY THE BUREAU OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2021, the federal government authorized the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 ("ARPA") which includes \$1.9 trillion in federal stimulus funds to hasten the United States' recovery from the economic and health effects caused by the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, specifically, the federal government has authorized and allocated a federal award of approximately \$1,000,372,385B of ARPA funding to Cook County to assist the County in its recovery from the economic and health effects of COVID-19; and

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WHEREAS, on June 24, 2021, the Cook County American Rescue Plan Act Framework (the "ARPA Framework") was presented to the Cook County Board of Commissioners; and

WHEREAS, to effectuate the approach outlined in the ARPA Framework, the Cook County Board of Commissioners authorized the Chief Financial Officer and the Budget Director to expend a limited amount of ARPA funding via Resolution 21-3657 for the purpose of continuing and expanding existing County programs and initiatives, including any created under CRF, as well as for the purpose of building operational support capacity within County departments and offices to assist with managing the ARPA funded initiatives; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 22-0637 authorized the Chief Financial Officer, Budget Director, Chief Procurement Officer and applicable using agencies to issue grants, contracts and agreements for up to \$100M in ARPA funding for Vital Community programs approved via Resolution 22-0637; and

WHEREAS, to further the Policy Roadmap Goal to pursue inclusive economic and community growth by supporting residents, growing businesses, attracting investment and nurturing talent, the Bureau of Economic Development (BED) has developed a menu of Vital Community programs and initiatives which have undergone review and approval through the Project Management Office process to utilize ARPA funding for such programs and initiatives pursuant to the issuance of grants, contracts and agreements.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Cook County Board of Commissioners hereby approves the issuance of the following agreements by the BED to utilize ARPA funding for the BED programs and initiatives as follows:

- 1. Enter into Subrecipient Agreements with the **Chicago Bar Foundation** in an amount up to \$3,482,600 and the **Illinois Housing Development Authority** in an amount up to \$1,163,600 to implement the **Cook County Legal Aid for Housing and Debt Program**, to help Cook County residents resolve eviction, foreclosure, consumer debt, and tax deed issues prior to court and during the court process.
- 2. Enter into a Subrecipient Agreement with the Chicago Cook Workforce Partnership to implement the Investing in Families and Youth Program in an amount up to \$5,000,000, to provide support to workforce and training programs that offer young adults quality paid work experiences to explore career pathways in target sectors, provide resources to additional target populations, and develop a series of hiring events focused on suburban Cook County. Under the Program, the County will also support the expansion of workforce development programs that serve hard-to-engage populations including people without stable housing, youth in care and graduates of foster care system, people with disabilities, returning residents, and pregnant and parenting youth. Program resources will support residents of suburban Cook County.
- 3. Enter into a Subrecipient Agreement with **Cook County Forest Preserves** to implement the **Community Conservation Corps** in an amount up to **\$1,292,000**. Under this program, the Forest Preserves will implement a year-round initiative that engages a diverse range of people with different needs for employment and training. Participants receive relevant technical skills and training. The Corps has three main types of programming: summer high school programs, full-time seasonal adult programs, and a full-time year around adult program. Each program has different timelines and training requirements based upon the needs of program participants

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including their age and educational attainment, among many other factors.

- 4. Enter into a Subrecipient Agreement with the North Shore Convention and Visitors Bureau (NSCVB) to implement the Suburban Cook County Travel, Tourism and Hospitality Economic Recovery Initiative in an amount up to \$5,000,000. Under this initiative, the NSCVB will manage and coordinate the five suburban Convention and Tourism Bureaus, designated by the State of Illinois, to develop and implement a strategic action plan to support the recovery of the travel, hospitality and tourism sectors, that have been severely impacted by COVID-19.
- 5. Enter into a Subrecipient Agreement with **Southland Development Authority (SDA)** to implement the **Building Capacity in the Southland Program** in the amount of **\$780,000** to help small businesses recover from the interruption of business operations and the negative effects of COVID-19. This Program will help businesses and entrepreneurs in approximately 40 suburbs in southern Cook County, Illinois survive the COVID pandemic crisis, maintain and/or re-open operations safely, and identify opportunities for resiliency and growth. The SDA drives comprehensive, transformative and inclusive economic growth in Cook County's South Suburbs.
- 6. Enter into a Subrecipient Agreement with the Women's Business Development Center to develop Cook County's Small Business Agenda, which includes the Small Business Assistance Program in an amount up to \$6,050,000. Launched in 2020 in response to the challenges small businesses faced in the wake of COVID-19, the Small Business Assistance Program will continue to support a coordinated network of business service organizations that provide one-on-one business advising, webinars and outreach activities for small businesses with less than 20 employees. The program will also include the development of a Cook County "one-stop shop" for businesses, development of parameters and guidelines for the forthcoming Small Business Grant Program(s), development of inclusive procurement strategies and other activities to assist businesses to continue to recover from COVID.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Cook County Board of Commissioners recognizes that time is of the essence and authorizes the Chief of the Bureau of Economic Development to negotiate and enter into the various agreements that outlines the specific metric and impact data, and compliance with all ARPA reporting and monitoring requirements with the agencies listed above to implement the above programs.

REQUESTING A PUBLIC HEARING TO DISCUSS PREVENTATIVE MEASURES FOR POTENTIAL VIOLATIONS OF RESOLUTION 07-R-240, THE ICE DETAINER ORDINANCE, AND RESOLUTION NO. 17-0724'S RECOMMITMENT TO COOK COUNTY'S IMMIGRANT COMMUNITIES

WHEREAS, in recent years, U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) has paid more than \$100 million to data brokers to obtain individuals' personal information. They have used data broker tools to collect sensitive information including Global Positioning System (GPS) location data, facial recognition data, vehicle registrations, credit reports, utility bills, and social media, among hundreds of other sources; and

WHEREAS, ICE has published documents that explicitly confirm that they use data brokers to get around sanctuary policies and laws; and

WHEREAS, in a July 2021 contracting document, ICE's Enforcement and Removal Operations (ERO) stated that it is expanding its contract with data brokers to obtain information that is protected by sanctuary policies across the country; and

WHEREAS, the data that is used by ICE is bought and sold by private companies such as Appriss, recently acquired by Equifax, and can be accessed by ICE as an "add-on feature" in its contract with LexisNexis; and

WHEREAS, in FY2020, ICE issued 122,223 detainers across the country. The previous year, Cook County law enforcement agencies had to reject more than 1,000 detainer requests because of local sanctuary policies. Even when localities refuse to execute detainers, LexisNexis's program, Justice Intelligence, allows ICE to obtain the necessary data to bypass local policies; and

WHEREAS, it is estimated that ICE has purchased extensive personal information on over 283 million "consumer identities" from more than 10,000 government and commercial sources; and

WHEREAS, there are many examples of how data brokers are directly helping ICE violate the spirit and of sanctuary laws; and

WHEREAS, Cook County and Chicago are among the government entities targeted by ICE raids in Operation Palladium (2020) and Operation "Safe City" (2017) which were carried out as political retaliation in sanctuary cities; and

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WHEREAS, to fully protect immigrant communities in Cook County, we must ensure that ICE respects our county's sanctuary resolutions and ordinances; and

WHEREAS, Cook County should help protect the privacy rights and civil liberties of *all* residents and verify that no violations are aided by private interest and corporate data brokers.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Cook County Legislative and Intergovernmental Relations Committee will hold a hearing to discuss the potential risks of data brokers sharing and/or selling personal information with ICE, through expert testimony, to determine whether and to what extent county government data regarding residents is available to private data brokers. The Committee will also discuss the best practices for protecting the rights of all Cook County residents.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT, the Cook County Bureau of Technology, Office of the Chief Procurement Officer, Office of the Clerk of the Circuit Court of Cook County, Cook County State's Attorney's Office, Cook County Public Defender's Office, Cook County Sheriff's Department, Cook County Adult Probation, and other Cook County stakeholders are asked to appear before the Legislative and Intergovernmental Relations Committee hearing to discuss the matter.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE

SALARY REVIEW AND RECOMMENDATION FOR COOK COUNTY ELECTED OFFICIALS WITH TERMS BEGINNING IN DECEMBER OF 2022 AND DECEMBER OF 2024

WHEREAS, the County of Cook ("Cook County" or "County") is a home rule unit pursuant to Article VII, Section 6 of the 1970 Illinois Constitution; and

WHEREAS, as a home rule unit, Cook County may exercise any power and perform any function pertaining to its government and affairs; and

WHEREAS, Article VII, Section 9(b) of the 1970 Illinois Constitution provides that an increase or decrease in the salary of an elected officer of any unit of local government shall not take effect during the term for which that officer is elected; and

WHEREAS, the Local Government Officer Compensation Act (50 ILCS 145/1, et seq.) provides that the salary of elected officers of units of local government, including home rule units, shall be fixed at least 180 days before the beginning of the terms of the office; and

WHEREAS, the County Sheriff, County Clerk, and County Treasurer will commence new terms of office on December 1, 2022, and the Board of Commissioners, Finance Chairman, President of the Board, Members of the Board of Review, and County Assessor will commence new terms of office on December 5, 2022; and

WHEREAS, the Clerk of the Circuit Court of Cook County will commence a new term of office on December 1, 2024; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Board of Commissioners last approved salary increases for the various Cook County elected officials in 2000 via Resolution 00-R-013; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 00-R-013 provided for the Circuit Court Clerk's salary to be fixed at \$105,000 commencing on December 1, 2000, and salaries were also fixed and increased commencing in December of 2002 for the Board of Commissioners at \$85,000 from \$61,000; Finance Chair at \$90,000; President at \$170,000 from \$115,000; Assessor at \$125,000 from \$75,000; Board of Review Members at \$100,000 from \$74,000; County Clerk and Treasurer at \$105,000 from \$86,100 and Sheriff at \$160,000 from \$139,633; and

WHEREAS, various other units of local government have increased elected official compensation since the Cook County Board approved salary increases in 2000 and some units of local government have accounted for annual increases throughout an elected officials term tied to increases in the consumer price index; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Resolution 22-5258 approved by the Cook County Board of Commissioners on October 7, 2021, the Cook County Board of Commissioners requested the Cook County Bureau of Human Resources to conduct a compensation and market survey to determine if the current compensation provided is appropriate or if increases are warranted for the following elected offices with new terms beginning in December of 2022:

- 1) President of the Cook County Board
- 2) Finance Chairman of the Cook County Board
- 3) Each Elected Commissioner of the Cook County Board
- 4) Cook County Assessor
- 5) Cook County Clerk
- 6) Cook County Sheriff

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7)	Cook County Treasurer
8)	Members of the Board of Review

And if the current compensation is appropriate or if an increase is warranted for the Circuit Court Clerk with a term beginning in December 2024; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Resolution 22-5258 the Bureau of Human Resources has consulted with the Bureau of Finance to analyze the market over the last 20 years; and

WHEREAS, the Bureau of Finance has advised that the rate of inflation has increased by 45% over the last 20 years; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Resolution 22-5258 the Bureau of Human Resources engaged the services of a consultant to analyze the peer group that reflects current county population, annual county budget, number of districts or similar within the county, and similar data that illustrates the size and complexity of peer county operations; to validate the compensation and market data collected; and

WHEREAS, the consultant calculated the 25th, 50th and 75th percentiles and the average, minimum and maximum of each compensation component for each office listed above; and

WHEREAS, the market data reviewed provides that the County elected official salaries reviewed pursuant to Resolution 22-5258 are below market rate for similarly elected offices; and

WHEREAS, the consultant provided a single report to the Bureau of Human Resources which was provided to the Cook County Board of Commissioners in March of 2022 providing compensation components, alternative salary changes, and individual official salary adjustments supported by the market data findings; and

WHEREAS, as a result of the compensation report, the Cook County Board of Commissioners recommends a ______ salary increase in year one of the new term of each office noted herein which is based upon the Chicagoland region Consumer Price Index (CPI) the last 12 months and a ______ increase or increase based upon the Chicagoland region CPI whichever is less for the remaining three years of the term for each office noted herein.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners recognizes that the County Elected Official salaries are below market rate and authorizes a _____increase in salary for the Cook County Sheriff, Cook County Clerk, and Cook County Treasurer effective December 1, 2022; a _____ increase in salary for the Board of Commissioners, Finance Chairman, President of the County Board, Members of the Board of Review, and County Assessor on December 5, 2022; and a _____ salary increase for the Clerk of the Circuit Court on December 1, 2024; and

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amount of _____ or CPI whichever is lower on December 1, 2025, 2026 and 2027 for the Clerk of the Circuit Court; and

BET IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the Cook County Board of Commissioners recognizes and approves the salary increases for each County elected official commensurate with their new terms as follows:

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that the Board Secretary shall cause this Ordinance to be prominently available on the County's website along with full and complete descriptions of any other form of compensation, including any State authorized stipends which the General Assembly or the Cook County Board has made from time-to-time available to elected officers.

Effective date: This ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.
