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Sec. 74-556. Effective Dates.

(a) This Article shall be effective on June 1, 2019, and thereafter shall cease on June 30, 2023 and thereafter.

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#### Sec. 74-564. Sunset Clause.

(a) This article shall terminate and have no further force or effect on June 30, 2023.

**Effective date:** This Ordinance shall be in effect on June 30, 2023.

#### PROPOSED ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

#### AN AMENDMENT TO CHAPTER 74, ARTICLE II, REAL PROPERTY TAXATION

**WHEREAS,** the Cook County Property Tax Incentive program is one of the most effective tools to attract and retain businesses in Cook County; and

WHEREAS, the program is particularly important in areas that have economic stagnation and high property tax rates such as exists in the South Suburbs of Cook County; and

**WHEREAS,** there exists several Illinois Department of Public Health designated food desserts throughout Cook County including in the South Suburbs; and

**WHEREAS,** according to U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) 2019 data, Illinois has 318 low-income and low access census tracts where urban residents must travel more than 1 mile and rural residents travel more than 10 miles to the nearest supermarket, which represents 10.2% of all census tracts and accounts for 1,242,939 Illinois residents living in these food deserts, and the county with the greatest number of tracts is Cook County with 51; and

WHEREAS, according to U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) 2019 data, Illinois has 870 low-income and low access census tracts where urban residents must travel more than 1/2 mile and rural residents travel more than 10 miles to the nearest supermarket, which represents 27.9% of all census tracts and accounts for 3,294,760 Illinois residents living in these food deserts, and the county with the greatest number of tracts is Cook County with 302; and

WHEREAS, lack of access to healthy food choices contributes to disparities in health outcomes and life expectancy, and access to healthy food is an integral ingredient to improving healthcare outcome disparities, which is a focal point of County Government, Cook County Health, and Cook County Department of Public Health; and

WHEREAS, one of the pillars of the County's Policy Roadmap and American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) initiatives is to promote Healthy Communities including by addressing food insecurity and food access; and

WHEREAS, creation of a tax incentive to attract or retain grocery stores in food deserts has been determined an effective strategy by many academic and non-profit studies advocating for sustainable development in urban areas; and

**WHEREAS,** in order to target areas that have been designated as food deserts, specific definitions can ensure that tax credits incentivize building in food deserts, while restricting the potential for abuse;

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED**, by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 74 - Taxation, Article II - Real Property Taxation, Division 2 - Classification System for Assessment, Sections 74-63, 74-64, 74-69 and 74-73 of the Cook County Code are hereby amended as follows:

Sec. 74-63. Assessment classes.

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(5) *Class 5a.* All real estate not included in Class 1, Class 2, Class 3, Class 4, Class 5b, Class 6b, Class C, Class 7a, Class 7b, Class 7c, <u>Class 7d</u>, Class 8, Class 9, Class S or Class L of this Section.

\*\*\*

(12) Class 7d. Real estate used for expansion or renovation of a grocery store, new construction of a grocery store, or re-use of vacant commercial space for a grocery store located in a food desert. For this section, a "food desert" means a location lacking fresh fruit, vegetables, and other healthful whole foods, in part due to a lack of grocery stores, farmers' markets, or healthy food providers as defined in 20 ILCS 2310/2310-22, and that location is included in the Illinois Department of Public Health's - Illinois Food Deserts Annual Report. For this section, "grocery store" shall be defined as a commercial retail business where: (a) the majority of the sales floor area that is open and accessible to the public is occupied by produce, food and beverage products, and household items that are packaged for preparation and consumption for daily living needs; (b) includes full-service items including a meat, deli, and bakery department; (c) at least 55% of its employee workforce is employed on a full time basis. For this section, full time employee shall be defined as any employee who works an average of at least 30 hours per week for more than 120 days in a year. An applicant must obtain from the municipality in which the real estate is located, or the County Board if the real estate is located in an unincorporated area, an Ordinance or Resolution expressly stating that the municipality or County Board, as the case may be, has determined that the incentive provided by Class 7d is necessary for development of a grocery store located in a food desert, as defined in this section, to occur on that specific real estate and that the municipality or County Board, as the case may be, supports and consents to the Class 7d application to the Assessor.

In addition, the Ordinance or Resolution shall:

- 1. Provide verification that the subject property is in a food desert, as defined herein;
- 2. State the applicant's intended use of the property as a grocery store as defined herein; and
- 3. State that an Economic Disclosure Statement, as defined in this Division, was received and filed by the municipality or County Board, as the case may be.

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(1213) Class 8. Real estate used primarily for industrial and commercial purposes, consisting of all newly constructed buildings or other structures, including the land upon which they are situated; or abandoned property, as defined in this division, including the land upon which such property is situated; or all buildings and other structures which are substantially rehabilitated to the extent such rehabilitation has added to their value, including qualified land related to the rehabilitation.

\*\*\*

(4314) Class 9. All real estate otherwise entitled to Class 3 classification under this division, provided that such real estate, consisting of land and existing buildings and structures is multifamily residential real estate; either has undergone major rehabilitation, or is new construction, or both; has at least 35 percent of the dwelling units leased at rents affordable to low- or moderate-income persons or households; and is in substantial compliance with all applicable local building, safety and health requirements and codes.

\*\*\*

(1415)Class S. Real estate otherwise entitled to Class 3 classification under this division, consisting of land and existing buildings and structures, which is has been subject to a Section 8 contract renewal. The portion of the land and building eligible for the incentive shall be in such proportion as the number of Section 8 units bears to the total number of units. The proportion shall be applied only to property used for residential purposes, and not to portions of the property, if any, used for commercial purposes.

\*\*\*

(4516)Class L. Real estate which is to be used for commercial or industrial purposes and which is designated as Class 3, Class 4, Class 5a or Class 5b pursuant to this Division; is a landmark or contributing building; and has undergone substantial rehabilitation. The substantial rehabilitation must constitute an investment by the owner of at least 50 percent of the building's full market value as determined by the Assessor in the assessment year prior to the commencement of the substantial rehabilitation.

\*\*\*

(1617) Class 10. Used as a licensed bed and breakfast, as defined under the laws of the Cook County municipality where the property is situated, or registered as a Bed and Breakfast with the State of Illinois Bed and Breakfast Act, as established under 50 ILCS 820/1 et seq., the Illinois Bed and Breakfast Act, with six rentable units or less and with all said units contained in one improvement where none of the units is owner occupied and a Homeowner's Exemption pursuant to the Illinois Property Tax Code, Chapter 35, Title 4, Article 15 shall be available if allowed by law, provided a Bed and Breakfast is not required to be qualified for Homeowner Exemptions.

#### **Board of Commissioners**

The Assessor shall assess, and the Board of Review shall review, assessments on real estate in the various classes at the following percentages of market value:

- (1) Class 1: Ten percent.
- (2) Class 2: Ten percent.
- (3) Class 3: Sixteen percent in tax year 2009, 13 percent in tax year 2010, ten percent in tax year 2011, and subsequent years.
- (4) Class 4: Twenty percent. This change shall be effect on January 1, 2018.
- (5) Class 5a: Twenty-five percent.
- (6) Class 5b: Twenty-five percent.
- (7) Class 6b: Ten percent for first ten years and for any subsequent ten-year renewal periods; if the incentive is not renewed, 15 percent in year 11 and 20 percent in year 12.
- (8) Class C: Industrial properties: Ten percent for first ten years, 15 percent in year 11 and 20 percent in year 12; commercial properties: ten percent for first ten) years, 15 percent in year 11 and 20 percent in year 12.
- (9) Class 7a: Ten percent for first ten years, 15 percent in year 11 and 20 percent in year 12.
- (10) Class 7b: Ten percent for first ten years, 15 percent in year 11 and 20 percent in year 12.
- (11) Class 7c: Ten percent for first three years, 15 percent in year four and 20 percent in year five.
- (12) Class 7d: Ten percent for first ten years and for any subsequent ten-year renewal periods; if the incentive is not renewed, 15 percent in year 11 and 20 percent in year 12. This incentive may be renewed once.
- (1213)Class 8: Ten percent for first ten years and for any subsequent ten-year renewal periods; if the incentive is not renewed, 15 percent in year 11 and 20 percent in year 12.
- (<del>13</del>14)Class 9: Ten percent for an initial ten-year period, renewable upon application for additional ten-year periods.
- (14<u>15</u>)Class S: Ten percent for the term of the Section 8 contract renewal under the mark up to market option, as defined herein, and for any additional terms of renewal of the Section 8 contract under the mark up to market option.
- (4516)Class L, renewable properties: Ten percent for first ten years and for any subsequent ten-year renewal periods; if the incentive is not renewed, 15 percent in year 11 and 20 percent in year 12; commercial properties: Ten percent for first ten years, 15 percent in year 11 and 20 percent in year 12.

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(1617)Class 10: Ten percent.

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## Sec. 74-69. Applicable assessment level.

The assessment level applicable to real estate classified under incentive Classes 6b, C, 7a, 7b, 7c, 7d, 8, 9 and L shall in no event exceed the assessment level which otherwise would have been applicable to such real estate under the remaining assessment classes provided in this Division.

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## Sec. 74-73. - Suspension, Revocation or cancellation of incentive classification.

(a) The following Incentive Classifications are subject to suspension, revocation or cancellation herein pursuant the provisions of this section: Class 6b; Class 6b (special circumstances); Class 6b TEERM; Class 6b SER; Class 7a; Class 7b; Class 7c; Class 7d; Class 8; and Class 8 TEERM.

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**Effective date:** This ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.

## PROPOSED RESOLUTION

REQUESTING A MEETING OF THE COOK COUNTY EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AND REGIONAL SECURITY COMMITTEE TO RECEIVE AN UPDATE FROM THE NEW

# EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE DEPARTMENT OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AND REGIONAL SECURITY

**WHEREAS**, The Cook County Department of Emergency Management and Regional Security ("EMRS") enhances the safety and security of Cook County and its residents by working to build capacity to prevent, protect against, mitigate the effects of, respond to, and recover from all incidents, both human-caused and natural. EMRS is responsible for coordinating the County's response to a large-scale emergency or disaster. On a day-to-day basis, EMRS supports municipalities by providing guidance and coordinating resources as needed, including to suburban law enforcement partners; and

WHEREAS, EMRS is not a law enforcement entity, the Department has limited authority and ability to assist with responding to violence and crime specifically. If local law enforcement requests assistance from EMRS, it would typically be in the form of equipment requests such as light towers and jersey barriers. In a rapidly evolving and complex incident, such as an active shooter scenario, local law enforcement may request the use of EMRS' Unified Command Post/Vehicle, which is equipped with technology allowing for enhanced incident coordination; and

WHEREAS, EMRS maintains strong relationships with municipal law enforcement partners, which may potentially be leveraged to support violence prevention programs. Additionally, EMRS has also served as the County fiscal agent of Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program funds, which provides federal funding for criminal justice projects, including violence prevention programs. Over the past several years, EMRS made a concerted effort to increase the awards to community-based organizations working with justice-impacted populations, including a pre-apprentice carpentry program with the Chicagoland Prison Outreach, reentry programming with the Haymarket Center, and Leave No Veterans Behind; and

**WHEREAS,** on July 1, 2022, former Executive Director William "Bill" Barnes resigned from his position as Executive Director of EMRS. Subsequently, on July 1, 2022, President of the Cook County Board of Commissioners, Toni Preckwinkle, appointed Theodore "Ted" Berger as the new Executive Director of the Department of Emergency Management and Regional Security; and

WHEREAS, Theodore Berger returns to EMRS where he was previously Chief Deputy Director from 2017-2021, serving as Deputy Incident Commander for the County's COVID-19 unified command response directly managing emergency operations center activation with over 200 personnel. During his tenure with EMRS, Theodore Berger also served a nine-month assignment as interim Deputy Chief of Staff to the President's Office providing intergovernmental and operational coordination between six bureaus and 34 departments; and

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, the Cook County Emergency Management and Regional Security Committee convene a meeting to introduce new Executive Director, Theodore Berger and discuss the new leadership of EMRS; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, EMRS will provide an overall update relative to its recent operations, programs, and initiatives, specifically relative to Cook County's COVID-19 vaccination planning.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

AMENDING PROVISIONS OF THE PROCUREMENT CODE CONCERNING PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES OWNED BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (PDBE)

**BE IT ORDAINED,** by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that **Chapter 34 - FINANCE**, **ARTICLE IV. - PROCUREMENT CODE**, **DIVISION 1. - GENERAL PROVISIONS**, SECTION 34-121 of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as Follows:

#### Sec. 34-121. - Definitions

Applicant means a person who submits documents and information seeking certification, continued certification, or re-certification as an MBE, WBE, VBE, PDBE, or SDVBE to the Office of Contract Compliance.

Certified or Certification means the granting of Minority Business Enterprise ("MBE"), Women's Business Enterprise ("WBE"), Veteran Business Enterprise ("VBE"), Persons with Disabilities Owned Business Enterprise (PDBE) or Service Disabled Veteran Business Enterprise ("SDVBE") status to a Person.

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED,** by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that **Chapter 34 - FINANCE**, **ARTICLE IV. - PROCUREMENT CODE**, **DIVISION 4. - DISQUALIFICATION AND PENALTIES**, SECTION 34-176 of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as Follows:

#### Sec. 34-176. - Penalty for failure to meet commitments.

In the event that the CCD determines that a Person failed to fulfill in good faith a project specific goal, including, but not limited to, MBE, WBE, VBE, PDBE, or SDVBE participation commitments reflected in a Utilization Plan, as may be amended through change orders or otherwise over the term of the Contract, the CPO may declare said Person to be in material breach of the Contract, and may withhold payments under the Contract, and recover contractual penalties, in addition to disqualification and any other remedy

A contractual penalty for failure to meet MBE, WBE, VBE, PDBE, or SDVBE participation commitments pursuant to this Section shall be in the amount of the discrepancy between actual MBE, WBE, VBE, PDBE, or SDVBE participation, and the goal set forth in the Utilization Plan, as may be amended through change orders or otherwise over the term of the Contract.

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED,** by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that **Chapter 34** - **FINANCE**, **ARTICLE IV.** - **PROCUREMENT CODE**, **DIVISION 5.** - **PROCUREMENT PROCEDURES AND POLICIES FOR CERTAIN PROCUREMENTS**, SUBDIVISION I. and SECTION 34-201 of the Cook County Code are hereby amended as Follows:

**Subdivision I**. - Selection of Professional Services for Debt Transactions and Management of Bond Proceeds; Continued Participation of MBEs, WBEs, VBEs, PDBE, and SDVBEs

## Sec. 34-201. - Competitive process for legal counsel and finance teams for debt transactions.

(b) The RFQ for legal counsel shall request at least the following information:

(3) Whether and by whom the law firm is certified as a MBE, WBE, VBE, PDBE, or SDVBE;

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED,** by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that **Chapter 34** - **FINANCE**, **ARTICLE IV. - PROCUREMENT CODE**, **DIVISION 6. - BID INCENTIVES AND PREFERENCES**, SECTIONS 34-229, 34-236, 34-237 34-238, 34-242, and 34-243 and

#### Sec. 34-229. - Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this Division shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this Section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning. Terms not defined in this section are defined in Division 1 of this Procurement Code, or in Section 1-3 of the Cook County Code.

Apprentice means any person who: (1) is enrolled in an apprenticeship program approved by and registered with the United States Department of Labor's Office of Apprenticeship, or its successor organization; or (2) has graduated within the past four years from an apprenticeship program that has been approved by and registered with the United States Department of Labor's Office of Apprenticeship, or its successor organization.

Armed forces of the United States means the United States Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, Coast Guard, or service in active duty as defined under 38 U.S.C. Section 101. Service in the Merchant Marine that constitutes active duty under Section 401 of federal Public Act 95-202 shall also be considered service in the armed forces for purposes of this division.

*Bid incentive* means an amount deducted, for bid evaluation purposes only, from the contract base bid in order to calculate the bid price to be used to evaluate the bid on a competitively bid project.

Committee means Cook County Re-entry Employment Committee.

Contract base bid means the total dollar amount bid on a project without factoring any bid incentive or percentage reductions to the bid amount.

County Marketplace means the six-county region, currently the counties of Cook, DuPage, Kane, Lake, McHenry, and Will.

*Disadvantaged* refers to individuals who are mentally, physically, economically, or educationally disadvantaged, including, but not limited to, individuals who are living below the poverty line, developmentally disabled, mentally ill, substance abusers, recovering substance abusers, elderly and in need of hospice care, gang members, <u>living with a "disability" as that term is defined herein</u>, on welfare, or people with arrest or conviction records.

Disability or Disabled means, with respect to an individual, a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more of the major life activities of the individual, a record of physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more of the major life activities of the individual or being regarded as an individual with a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more of the major life activities of the individual.

Earned Credit means the amount allocated to a Contractor upon completion of a Qualifying Contract through which the Contractor met or exceeded the goals for the utilization of Former Offenders, Apprentices or youth.

*Economically Disadvantaged*, with respect to an individual, means having a Personal Net Worth less than \$2,000,000.00, indexed annually for the Chicago Metro Area Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers, published by the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Standards, beginning January 2008.

Eligible Veteran means a person who (i) has been either a member of the armed forces of the United States or, while a citizen of the United States, was a member of the armed forces of allies of the United States in time of hostilities with a foreign country and (ii) has served under one or more of the following conditions: (a) the veteran served a total of at least six months; (b) the veteran served for the duration of hostilities regardless of the length of the engagement; (c) the veteran was discharged on the basis of hardship; or (d) the veteran was released from active duty because of a service connected disability and was discharged under honorable conditions.

Former Offenders means adults who are residents of the County and who have been convicted of a crime.

Labor hours means the total hours of workers receiving an hourly wage who are directly employed at the work site. "Labor hours" shall include hours performed by workers employed by the contractor and all subcontractors working at the work site. "Labor hours" shall not include hours worked by nonworking foremen, superintendents, owners and workers who are not subject to prevailing wage requirements.

*Nonprofit entity* means an entity having tax exempt status under the United States Internal Revenue Code.

Persons with Disabilities Owned Business Enterprise (PDBE) means a small business (i) that is at least 51 percent owned, controlled and managed by one or more Persons with a Disability, or in the case of a corporation, at least 51 percent or more of the stock of which is owned, controlled, and managed by one or more Persons with a Disability; or (ii) a nonprofit entity that employs people with disabilities, pays at least minimum wage, whose management and daily business operations are controlled by one or more persons with disabilities, and that directly or indirectly serves persons with disabilities; and (iii) that has its home office in Illinois, as certified by the CCD under policies and procedures promulgated by the CCD.

*Qualifying Contract* means a Contract for Public Works with a Bid Price of \$100,000.00 or more, for which the Contractor is eligible for Earned Credits.

Service-connected disability means a disability incurred in the line of duty in the active military, naval, or air service as described in 38 U.S.C. 101(16).

Service-Disabled Veteran means an Eligible Veteran who has been found to have ten percent or more service-connected disability by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs or the United States Department of Defense.

Service-Disabled Veteran-owned Business Enterprise (SDVBE) means a small business (i) that is at least 51 percent owned, controlled, and managed by one or more qualified service-disabled veterans or, in the case of a corporation, at least 51 percent or more of the stock of which is owned, controlled, and managed by one or more Service Disabled Veterans; or (ii) a nonprofit entity that employs people with a service-connected disabilities, pays at least minimum wage, whose management and daily business operations are controlled by one or more persons with disabilities, and that directly or indirectly serves service-disabled veterans or other persons with disabilities; and (iii) that has its home office in Illinois, as certified by the CCD under policies and procedures promulgated by the CCD.

Social Enterprise means a person which has its principal place of business and a majority of its regular, full-time work force located within the County Marketplace on the date a bid is submitted and which is: (i) an Illinois benefit corporation subject to Benefit Corporation Act (805 ILCS 40/1 et seq.); (ii) an Illinois low-profit limited liability company subject to Section 1-26 of the Limited Liability Company Act (805 ILCS 108/1-26); (iii) a nonprofit or private-sector entity (or any business unit thereof which maintains separate books and records) which (a) uses earned revenue strategies, either exclusively as a business or as a significant part of a nonprofit's revenue stream, and (b) directly addresses social needs either (1) through its goods and/or services or (2) by employing people who are disadvantaged, or (3) both.

Time of hostilities with a foreign country means any period of time in the past, present, or future during which a declaration of war by the United States Congress has been or is in effect or during which an emergency condition has been or is in effect that is recognized by the issuance of a Presidential proclamation or a Presidential executive order and in which the armed forces expeditionary medal or other campaign service medals are awarded according to Presidential executive order.

Youth means a male or female resident of Cook County between the ages of 16 and 19 years of age.

Veteran-owned Business Enterprise (VBE) means a small business (i) that is at least 51 percent owned, controlled, and managed by one or more Eligible Veterans or, in the case of a corporation, at least 51 percent or more of the stock of which is owned, controlled, and managed by one or more Eligible Veterans; (ii) that

has its home office in Illinois, as certified by the CCD under policies and procedures promulgated by the CCD.

. . .

## Sec. 34-236. - Eligible veterans' preference established.

- (a) Veterans' Workplace Preference. The CPO shall give a preference of one percent of the amount of the Contract to a Responsible and Responsive Contractor for a Public Works Contract when such Contractor has committed by affidavit to utilize Eligible Veterans for at least five percent of the hours worked under such Contract. Failure to utilize Eligible Veterans in accordance with the affidavit will result in breach of contract, in addition to any available sanctions or actions the CCD may, within its discretion, recommend that the CPO take with respect to the contractor or subcontractor as specified in Section 34-275.
- (b) Veteran-owned Business and Service Disabled Veteran-owned Business preference. The CPO shall give a preference of five percent of the amount of the Contract to a Responsible and Responsive VBE or and ten percent of the amount of the Contract to a Responsible and Responsive SDVBE.
- (c) <u>Subcontractor Preference</u>. The CPO shall give preferences to Bidders who commit to utilizing <u>SDVBE</u> subcontractors as provided in the following schedule:
  - (1) If the commitment is 2-5%, the Incentive is 1% of the contract base bid;
  - (2) If the commitment is 6-9%, the Incentive is 2% of the contract base bid;
  - (3) If the commitment is 10-13%, the Incentive is 3% of the contract base bid;
  - (4) If the commitment is 14% or more, the Incentive is 4% of the contract base bid.
- (d) The CPO shall develop procedures for implementation of this Section.

## Sec. 34-237. - Veteran-owned and Persons with Disabilities Owned businesses.

- (a) It is the goal of the County to award each year not less than three percent of its total expenditures for supplies, equipment, goods, and services to VBEs, SDVBEs, and PDBEs. The CCD may count toward its three-percent yearly goal that portion of all Contracts in which the Contractor subcontracts with a VBE, SDVBE, or PDBE. CCD shall submit an annual report to the County Board that shall include, at a minimum, the following for the preceding fiscal year:
  - (1) The number of responsible VBEs, SDVBEs, and PDBEs that submitted a Bid or proposal;
  - (2) The number of VBEs, SDVBEs, and PDBEs that entered into Contracts, the specific industry or category of goods, services, or supplies for each Contract, and the total value of those Contracts;
  - (3) The participation of VBEs, SDVBEs, and PDBEs at both contractor and subcontractor levels;

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- (4) The total number of the County's certified VBEs, SDVBEs, and PDBEs available for participation in procurement, by category or industry; and
- (5) Whether the County achieved the goal described in this subsection.
- (b) Each year, the CCD shall review the three-percent goal with input from the Cook County Chairman of Veterans Affairs, the Cook County Director of Veterans Affairs, countywide veterans' service organizations, countywide service organizations for people with disabilities and from the business community including VBEs, SDVBEs, and PDBEs, and shall make recommendations to the County Board regarding continuation, increases, or decreases in the percentage goal. The recommendations shall be based upon the number of VBEs, SDVBEs, and PDBEs and on the continued need to encourage and promote businesses owned by qualified veterans and people with disabilities.
- (c) The CPO will make best efforts to recruit and solicit bids and make procurements from VBEs, SDVBEs, and PDBEs.
- (d) The above-stated goal shall not be treated as a quota nor shall it be used to discriminate against any person or business enterprise on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex or disability.
- (e) The CCD, in consultation with the Using Agency and the CPO, shall consider the size and complexity of the procurement before establishing contract specific goals and shall only be required to establish contract specific goals on procurements that have an available pool of certified VBEs, SDVBEs, and PDBEs for supplies, materials and equipment, or services.
- (f) The provisions of this Division 6, Section 34-237(a) shall be effective as of June 1, 2019. The Contract Compliance Director shall as soon as practicable develop and implement procedures and any corresponding regulations for certifying and monitoring utilization of VBEs, SDVBEs, and PDBEs.

#### Sec. 34-238. - VBE/SDVBE Certification and Outreach.

- (a) The CCD shall certify a Person as a VBE when it is a small business:
  - (1) That is at least 51 percent owned, controlled, and managed by one or more Eligible Veterans; and
  - (2) That has its home office in Illinois.
- (b) The CCD shall certify <u>a Person</u> as a SDVBE when it is a small business:
  - (1) That is least 51 percent owned, controlled, and managed by one or more qualified service-disabled veterans; and or
  - (2) That is a nonprofit entity that:
    - a. employs eligible service-disabled veterans; and

- b. pays at least minimum wage; and
- c. whose management and daily business operations are controlled by one or more eligible service-disabled veterans; and
- d. that directly or indirectly serves eligible service-disabled veterans; or
- (3) That is an eligible service-disabled veteran who is contracting with the City as a sole proprietorship or individually; and
- -(2) (4) That has its home office in Illinois.
- (c) In lieu of conducting its own certifications, the CCD by rule may accept formal certifications by other entities, provided that Cook County's requirements are met. For purposes of this Chapter, CCD shall accept formal certification of VBEs and SDVBEs by the City of Chicago when evaluating bids.
- (c) In order to increase awareness and provide opportunities for VBEs and SDVBEs, the CCD shall provide education, outreach, and the dissemination of information to VBEs and SDVBEs regarding the County's certification program and available opportunities. The CCD, in collaboration with other departments, shall from time to time, by way of seminars, workshops, and internet-based communications, make available to the business community such information, documents, and personnel as well as:
  - (1) Assist otherwise eligible businesses in applying for, gaining, and maintaining certification;
  - (2) Assist the business community in understanding the manner in which to properly complete a Utilization Plan including how a full or partial waiver may be requested, and the manner in which such a request may be supported;
  - (3) Identify best practices by other governmental entities and private sector firms that may improve the Program; and
  - (4) Identify systemic or organizational problems and related solutions associated with certification and contract participation.

## Sec. 34-242. - Businesses owned by people with disabilities.

(a) Preference for Businesses Owned by People with Disabilities. The CPO shall recommend award to the lowest Responsible and Responsive Bidder who is a PDBE, provided that the Bid of such bidder does not exceed the Bid of the lowest Responsive and Responsible Bidder by more than five ten percent. The preference created by this section may not be combined with any other earned credit or preference created by this Division. The CPO shall develop procedures for implementation of this Section.

- (b) <u>Subcontractor Preference</u>. The CPO shall give preferences to Bidders who commit to utilizing PDBE subcontractors as provided in the following schedule:
  - (1) If the commitment is 2-5%, the Incentive is 1% of the contract base bid;
  - (2) If the commitment is 6-9%, the Incentive is 2% of the contract base bid;
  - (3) If the commitment is 10-13%, the Incentive is 3% of the contract base bid;
  - (4) If the commitment is 14% or more, the Incentive is 4% of the contract base bid.
- (c) Preference for Businesses that Commit to Hire People with Disabilities. The CPO shall give a preference of one percent of the amount of the Contract to a Responsible and Responsive Contractor for a Contract when such Contractor has committed by affidavit to utilize People with Disabilities for at least five percent of the hours worked under such Contract. Failure to utilize People with Disabilities in accordance with the affidavit will result in breach of contract, in addition to any available sanctions or actions the CCD may, within its discretion, recommend that the CPO take with respect to the contractor or subcontractor as specified in Section 34-275. The CPO shall develop procedures for implementation of this Section.
- (d) Certification. The CCD shall certify a Person as a PDBE when it is a small business:
  - (1) That is at least 51 percent owned, controlled, and managed by one or more qualified, economically disadvantaged Disabled Persons; or
  - (2) That is a nonprofit entity that:
  - a. employs people with disabilities; and
  - b. pays at least minimum wage; and
  - c. whose management and daily business operations are controlled by one or more people with disabilities; and
  - d. that directly or indirectly serves persons with disabilities; or
  - (3) That is a person with a disability who is contracting with the City as a sole proprietorship or individually; and
- (2) (4) That has its home office in Illinois.
- (e)(e) In lieu of conducting its own certifications, the CCD by rule may accept formal certifications by other entities, provided that Cook County's requirements are met. For purposes of this Chapter, CCD shall accept formal certification of a Person with Disability by the City of Chicago when evaluating bids.
- (e) (f) In order to increase awareness and provide opportunities for PDBEs, the CCD shall provide education, outreach, and the dissemination of information to PDBEs regarding the County's certification program and available opportunities. The CCD, in collaboration with other departments, shall from time to time, by way of seminars, workshops, and internet-based communications, make available to the business community such information, documents, and personnel as well as:

- (1) Assist otherwise eligible businesses in applying for, gaining, and maintaining certification;
- (2) Identify best practices by other governmental entities and private sector firms that may improve the Program; and
- (3) Identify systemic or organizational problems and related solutions associated with certification and contract participation.
- (f) The CPO shall develop procedures for implementation of this Section.
- (e) (h) The Chief Procurement Officer may determine not to allocate a bid incentive under this section under the following circumstances:
  - (1) For public works contracts, as defined by Section 34-122 of the Procurement Code; and
  - (2) Where the Chief Procurement Officer otherwise concludes that the allocation of the bid would not be in the best interest of the County. The Chief Procurement Officer shall develop rules related to the administration of this provision.

## Sec. 34-243. - Right to accumulate value of incentives

With the exception that veterans may only claim a preference as a VBE or SDVBE, persons who qualify for more than one bid incentive, or other work credits as defined in this Division shall be allowed to accumulate the value of those incentives and credits against the Contract Base Bid for purposes of calculating the bid price to be used to evaluate the bid on a competitively bid project.

## AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE SALE OF TAXABLE PROPERTY ASSESSED CLEAN ENERGY NOTES OF THE COUNTY; AND OTHER MATTERS RELATED THERETO

WHEREAS, Cook County (the "County"), is a county duly organized and validly existing under the laws of the State of Illinois (the "State"), and is a home rule unit of local government of the State pursuant to the 1970 Constitution of the State (the "Constitution"), and is further authorized pursuant to the Property Assessed Clean Energy Act of Illinois, 50 ILCS 50/1 et seq., as amended (the "PACE Act") to establish a property assessed clean energy program (the "PACE Program"), create a PACE area (as defined in the PACE Act) and finance and/or refinance energy projects (as defined in the PACE Act) (the "Energy Projects"), and may, under the power granted by Section 6(a) of Article VII of the Constitution, as supplemented by the Local Government Debt Reform Act of the State of Illinois, as amended (the "Debt Reform Act"), and the other Omnibus Bond Acts, as amended, exercise any power and perform any function pertaining to its government and affairs, including, but not limited to, the power to issue limited recourse bonds or notes without referendum in furtherance of essential public and governmental purposes; and

WHEREAS, on the 22nd day of October, 2020, the Board of Commissioners of the County (the "Board") approved Ordinance No. 20-4202 Establishing a Property Assessed Clean Energy ("PACE") Program and a PACE Area to Finance and/or Refinance the Acquisition, Construction, Installation, or Modification of Energy Projects; Providing for the Issuance of not to Exceed \$500,000,000 Taxable PACE Revenue Notes ("Notes") of the County to Finance Projects Pursuant to the County's PACE Program (the "PACE Program"), Providing for the Payment Of Said Notes, Authorizing the Sale of Said Notes to the Purchaser Thereof; and Other Matters Related Thereto (the "PACE Ordinance"); and

**WHEREAS,** South Riverside Building, LLC, an Illinois limited liability company (together with its successors and assigns the "Property Owner") completed an application to participate in the PACE Program in order to finance or refinance certain qualified Energy Projects that benefit certain real property of the Property 300 S. Riverside Plaza, Chicago, Illinois (the "Property") in the amount of approximately \$43,500,000; and

**WHEREAS**, the PACE Ordinance requires additional authorization from the Board when a property owner is the beneficiary of Notes in an amount greater than \$5,000,000; and

**WHEREAS**, the County desires to approve the issuance of Notes (the "300 S. Riverside Plaza Project Notes") secured not by the credit of the County but rather through voluntary assessments on the benefitted property as described further herein, in support of the 300 S. Riverside Plaza Project in the amount of not to exceed \$43,500,000; and

**WHEREAS,** the 300 S. Riverside Plaza Project Notes will be repaid through voluntary tax assessments levied on the Property from time to time by the County pursuant to the PACE Act and that certain assessment contract to be entered into between the County and the Property Owner (the "Assessment Contract"), in substantially the form previously approved by the Board as part of the PACE Ordinance; and

- **WHEREAS,** the Assessment Contract establishes the terms of the Property Owner's participation in the PACE Program and payment of the amounts financed for costs associated with the 300 S. Riverside Plaza Project; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Board does hereby determine that it is advisable and in the best interests of the County to approve the issuance of the 300 S. Riverside Plaza Project Notes; and
- **WHEREAS**, the County desires to amend the PACE Ordinance to amend the definition of "Authorized Officer(s)"; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Board does hereby determine that it is advisable and in the best interests of the County to amend the PACE Ordinance.

# NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE COUNTY OF COOK, ILLINOIS, AS FOLLOWS:

- **Section 1. Incorporation of the Recitals.** The Board hereby finds that all of the recitals contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are true, correct and complete and are hereby incorporated by reference thereto and are made a part hereof.
- **Section 2. Public Purpose.** The Board finds it is necessary and in the best interests of the County to facilitate capital in furtherance of the PACE Program and issue the 300 S. Riverside Plaza Project Notes, in the form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit A</u> and amend the PACE Ordinance. It is hereby found and determined that such issuance of Notes and such amendment of the PACE Ordinance are advisable for the public health, safety, welfare and convenience, is for a proper public purpose or purposes, is in the public interest, and is authorized pursuant to the PACE Ordinance, the PACE Act, the Counties Code of the State of Illinois, and the Local Government Debt Reform Act; and as further supplemented and, where necessary, superseded by the County's home rule powers under Section 6 of Article VII of the 1970 Constitution of the State of Illinois, and these findings and determinations shall be deemed conclusive.
- Section 3. Approval of Issuance of 300 S. Riverside Plaza Project Notes. The Board hereby authorizes that there be borrowed for and on behalf of the County the 300 S. Riverside Plaza Project Notes in an aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$43,500,000 for costs associated with the 300 S. Riverside Plaza Project. The 300 S. Riverside Plaza Project Notes shall be non-recourse to the County and secured solely by payments received by the County under and pursuant to the terms of the Assessment Contract, in the form attached hereto as <a href="Exhibit B">Exhibit B</a>. The County shall make principal payments on the 300 S. Riverside Plaza Project Notes, together with applicable interest, fees, penalties, indemnities and other amounts payable to the Registered Owner (as defined in the PACE Ordinance) under the Assessment Contract, in the amounts and on the dates set forth in the Note Notification (as defined in the PACE Ordinance). Such County payments shall be made solely from the revenues received by the County under the Assessment Contract. Upon the sale of the 300 S. Riverside Plaza Project Notes, the Authorized Officers (as defined in the PACE Ordinance) shall prepare a Note Notification, which shall include the pertinent details of sale of such 300 S. Riverside Plaza Project Notes as provided in the PACE Ordinance.
- **Section 4.** Amending of the PACE Ordinance Definition of Authorized Officers. The definition of "Authorized Officers" (each an "Authorized Officer") is hereby amended to mean "any one of the County Board President, Chief Financial Officer, County Treasurer, County Clerk, Chief of the

Bureau of Economic Development, Director of Department of Planning and Development, Director of Department of Environment and Sustainability, or their designee." Each Authorized Officer set forth above may take any of the actions permitted to be taken by an Authorized Officer as described in the PACE Ordinance."

- **Section 5. No Conflicts; Further Acts of the County.** It is hereby found that no person holding any office of the County either by election or appointment, is in any manner financially interested, either directly, in his or her own name, or indirectly, in the name of any other person, association, trust or corporation, in the transactions contemplated hereby.
- **Section 6.** Additional Ordinances. The Board may adopt additional ordinances or proceedings supplementing or amending this Ordinance. This Ordinance and the PACE Ordinance, together with such additional ordinances or proceedings, shall constitute complete authority for the County to make the property assessments described herein and in the PACE Ordinance and for the County to issue the 300 S. Riverside Plaza Project Notes, all in accordance with applicable law.
- **Section 7. No Public Hearing; Program Established.** The Board hereby finds that no public hearing shall be required in connection with the issuance of the 300 S. Riverside Plaza Project Notes or with the amendment of the PACE Ordinance.
- **Section 8. Enactment.** No provision of the County Code of the County (the "County Code") or violation of any provision of the County Code shall be deemed to impair the validity of this Ordinance or the instruments authorized by this Ordinance or to impair the security for or payment of the instruments authorized by this Ordinance; provided further, however, that the foregoing shall not be deemed to affect the availability of any other remedy or penalty for any violation of any provision of the County Code.
- **Section 9. Affirmation of Ordinance No. 20-4202.** Except as specifically amended by this Ordinance, the terms of the PACE Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect, and all actions previously taken thereunder are hereby ratified and affirmed.
- **Section 10. Severability.** The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be separable and if any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall for any reason be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, such declaration shall not affect any of the other provisions of this Ordinance.
- **Section 11. Repealer and Effective Date.** All ordinances, resolutions or orders, or parts thereof, in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed and this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect forthwith upon its adoption.

A copy of this Ordinance shall be published on the County's Legistar website.

### HONORING THE LIFE AND CONTRIBUTIONS OF DAVID ELLIS

**WHEREAS**, David Ellis, General Manager of the Evanston Symphony Orchestra for 18 years, died at the age of 75 on July 26, 1022. The loss to his family, friends and the Evanston Symphony is immeasurable; and

**WHEREAS**, Ellis was born in Johnson City, Tennessee, into a military family. His parents and four younger siblings eventually settled in San Diego where Ellis would attend the University of California San Diego, earning a B.S. in geology (with a minor in music) followed by an M.S. in geological oceanography from Oregon State; and

**WHEREAS,** while Ellis was an excellent athlete having participated in several marathons and was a lifelong tennis player, he was known foremost for his love and knowledge of classical music; and

WHEREAS, throughout his professional life Ellis wore many hats, making use of his science degrees at Northwestern University before receiving an MBA from the University of Chicago. He transitioned into a career in finance while at Harza Engineering, and was then hired by Consolidated Foods (now Sara Lee) where he worked for many years in the position of Assistant Treasurer; and

**WHEREAS**, a long-time subscriber to the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and the Lyric Opera, he was able to combine his deep knowledge of music with his experience in finance when he accepted the role of General Manager of the Evanston Symphony; and

WHEREAS, Ellis had an encyclopedic knowledge of classical music and a head filled with facts ranging from every Mozart Köchel number to which recording of a Mahler symphony - he had them all - was the best, to arcane, funny anecdotes about eccentric conductors. He also knew all of the musicians and all of the ESO's subscribers, including their concert hall seat numbers; and

WHEREAS, an article about Ellis in a 2021 edition of the ESO's Noteworthy, a newsletter that the ESO sent to subscribers read: David can tell you about the differences in sound quality created by various conductors. He knows which conductors emphasize the strings and which favor the brass. He talks about how the brightness of sound changes if you tune the orchestra a few hertz higher (a 445 Hz makes a brighter sound than 440 Hz), and he easily compares the sound quality of music venues from [among many others] Chicago's Orchestra Hall and Auditorium Theater to the ESO's homes of Pick-Staiger and the ETHS Auditorium; and

**WHEREAS**, his many accomplishments over 18 years with the orchestra include growing the ESO's subscriber base, facilitating the recording of a live CD, providing interesting details at the orchestra's Musical Insights pre-concert lectures and keeping the organization solvent during the pandemic lockdown. It was a job he threw himself into fully, did exceptionally well, and enjoyed immensely; and

**WHEREAS**, in 2013, he was named the 2012 General Manager of the Year award from the Illinois Council of Orchestras; and

**WHEREAS**, Ellis is survived by his wife of 46 years, Marcia, whom he met on a tennis court in Evanston; his children Michael, Matthew, and Peter; and his siblings and their families. The Evanston Symphony Orchestra is dedicating its Feb. 12, 2023, concert to Ellis. The program includes Prokofiev's Violin Concerto No. 2 in G Minor with Irina Muresanu, one of Ellis' favorite soloists, and Mahler's Symphony No. 1, another Ellis favorite.

## HONORING FRITZ POLLARD AND THE RENAMING OF LANE TECH HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL FIELD

WHEREAS, on October 1st, Lane Tech will memorialize a distinguished graduate of 1912 by renaming the school's football field for Frederick "Fritz" Douglass Pollard, who starred in three (3) sports at Lane: baseball, track, and football, making all-county in all three (3); and

**WHEREAS,** Pollard was the seventh of eight (8) children raised in Rogers Park. Among his siblings were one of the first Black movie producers in America and the first Black woman to graduate from Northwestern University; and

**WHEREAS,** after graduating from Lane Tech, Fritz went on to study Chemistry at Brown University in Rhode Island, where football became his primary sport, becoming the first Black football player at the Ivy League School; and

**WHEREAS,** playing for the Brown Bears, Pollard became the first Black athlete to play in the Rose Bowl, and the next season, the two-time All-America halfback, the second African American to be named to a college All-American team and the first running back, led the Bears to an 8-0 season. National news wires carried a story describing Fritz Pollard as "the football star of the 1915 season,"; and

WHEREAS, Fritz left Brown to serve in World War I and afterward began coaching at Lincoln University, a historically Black college in Pennsylvania. In 1919, he was recruited to play running back for the Akron Indians later renamed the Akron Pros in a startup professional football league, the American Professional Football Association, which would later become the NFL. He was one (1) of two (2) Black players in the league, and the Pros won the 1st league championship in 1920; and

**WHEREAS,** Fritz Pollard started playing professional football the year Jackie Robinson was born. Everyone is familiar with Jackie Robinson's story of integrating professional baseball in 1947, but not many people know that Fritz Pollard integrated professional football in 1919; and

WHEREAS, in 1921, Mr. Pollard became the first Black coach of a professional football team as the coach of the Akron Pros. He continued to play on the team while coaching. Considered an exciting and elusive runner, he was the most feared running back in the fledgling league. During his pro football career, he played and sometimes coached for four different NFL teams, the Pros/Indians (1920-21/1925-26), the Milwaukee Badgers (1922), the Hammond Pros (1923, 1925) where he continued his string of firsts by becoming their quarterback, the first of his color to play that position, and the Providence Steam Roller (1925). Fritz also spent time in 1923 and 1924 playing for the Gilberton Cadamounts, a strong independent pro team in the Pennsylvania "Coal League."; and

**WHEREAS,** in 1934 on what was considered one of the darkest eras in sports a so-called "gentleman's agreement" was reached between the powerful owners of the NFL teams to begin the process of eliminating black players from pro football. No African American played again until 1946. Fritz fought this policy and never stopped fighting for re-integration of the league; and

**WHEREAS**, in 1928, Fritz also founded the Chicago Black Hawks, an all-Black team that lasted until 1932, and in 1935 the founder of a new all-Black team in New York, the Brown Bombers, recruited him to coach. The Brown Bombers and the Blackhawks played exhibition games against the all-white National League football stars. The Bombers were 19-0 in these matches; however, facing increasing difficulty in getting white teams to play against the Bombers he left in 1937; and

**WHEREAS,** Fritz Pollard was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1954, and the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2005 for his illustrious career; and

**WHEREAS**, after football, Pollard went into other business ventures, including newspaper publishing, a talent agency and film and music publishing, before passing in 1986 at age 92; and

WHEREAS, although Pollard didn't play in the present-day Lane Tech stadium, which opened in 1941, almost 30 years after Pollard graduated, and had retired from football, Michelle Weiner, the executive director of Lane Tech's alumni association stated "It's time Fritz Pollard was honored"; and

**WHEREAS,** naming the Lane football field after Fritz Pollard is a fitting way to honor a man who broke through so many boundaries, and "gives students somebody to look up to, show them what it was like to be a champion in several ways.", stated Ms. Weiner. The renaming was approved last spring by school authorities and will be made official on October 1st, 2022; and

#### RECOGNIZING SICKLE CELL AWARENESS MONTH IN COOK COUNTY

**WHEREAS,** the month of September is National Sickle Cell Awareness Month, a month-long initiative designated by Congress to help focus attention on the need for research and treatment of sickle cell disease; and

**WHEREAS,** this year's theme designated by the Sickle Cell Disease Association of America is "Sickle Cell Matters 2022"; and

**WHEREAS,** sickle cell disease (SCD) is the most common inherited blood disorder in the United States in which red blood cells may become sickle-shaped and harden. For a baby to be born with sickle cell disease, both parents must carry a sickle cell trait or genes. Sickle cell disease is not contagious, and there is no universal cure; and

**WHEREAS,** about 1 in 13 African Americans carry the sickle cell trait, and many do not know they have it, and an estimated 100,000 people in the U.S. have SCD, with approximately 2,000 babies born with SCD annually in the United States; and

**WHEREAS,** people of many ethnic backgrounds can have SCD, but it disproportionately affects Black and Brown Americans, with an estimated 1 in 365 Black Americans and 1 in 16,300 Hispanic Americans suffering from SCD; and

**WHEREAS,** sickle cell disease leads to complications including chronic severe and unpredictable pain, anemia, frequent infections, swelling in extremities, fatigue, delayed growth and is one of the underlying medical conditions that causes increased risk for severe illness from the virus that causes COVID-19, defined as hospitalization, admission to the ICU, intubation or mechanical ventilation, or death; and

WHEREAS, President Biden, as he did in 2021, recently passed a proclamation declaring September 2022 as National Sickle Cell Awareness month, reaffirming our commitment to improving the quality of life and health outcomes for all individuals living with SCD by improving access to quality health care, collaborating with partners in the public and private sectors, adhering to the guidance of scientific experts and researchers, and supporting all families affected by SCD; and

**WHEREAS,** this national focus is essential and reinforces the National Institutes of Health (NIH) continued support of SCD research, education, and capacity building, including the "Cure Sickle Cell Initiative" to accelerate safe, effective, and scalable gene therapies to cure the disease; and

**WHEREAS,** because of the many advances and medical breakthroughs in genetic therapies and research, we are now closer to finding a cure for all SCD patients; and

**WHEREAS,** individuals can help be part of the solution by donating blood, which is one of the most critical treatments for sickle cell patients, but less than 10% of Americans donate blood. Additionally, sickle cell patients benefit most from blood transfusions from people of the same race or similar ethnicity, but only 5% of blood donors are of African ancestry; and

WHEREAS, education and research, educating others about sickle cell disease and sickle cell trait, and getting tested for sickle cell trait if you are of African descent and do not know your status are other ways to contribute to this important cause; and

**WHEREAS**, this Honorable Body wishes to promote and raise awareness of sickle cell disease in Cook County and encourage everyone to be a part of this national effort to increase awareness about sickle cell disease and sickle cell trait during the month of September and stand united to improve the health of those living with this disease.

## REQUESTING A MEETING OF THE COOK COUNTY HEALTH AND HOSPITALS COMMITTEE TO RECEIVE AN UPDATE FROM THE COOK COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH ON MPV (MONKEYPOX) IN SUBURBAN COOK COUNTY

**WHEREAS,** in May 2022, cases of MPV started appearing in Europe with the first case appearing the U.S. on May 19, 2022; and

WHEREAS, the virus has spread globally and cases have totaled 3,591 cases in the U.S. by July 26, 2022; and

WHEREAS, the World Health Organization declared MPV a global health emergency on July 23, 2022; and

**WHEREAS,** in the U.S., Illinois has consistently been in the top three states with the highest cases since the start of this outbreak with a concentration in the Chicago area; and

**WHEREAS,** MPV is a viral zoonosis (a virus transmitted to humans from animals) with symptoms similar to those seen in the past in smallpox patients, although it is clinically less severe. Human-to-human transmission can result from close contact with respiratory secretions, skin lesions of an infected person or recently contaminated objects. Transmission via droplet respiratory particles usually requires prolonged face-to-face contact.; and

**WHEREAS,** a two-dose vaccine is available for MPV that was previously developed and is highly effective in reducing severity of illness but supplies remain limited; and

**WHEREAS,** the limited supply of vaccine, at this time, has reduced eligibility for receiving the vaccine to very few individuals with confirmed cases or known exposure from close contacts; and

WHEREAS, at this time, a disproportionate amount of cases have affected the LGBTQ+ community; and

**WHEREAS**, given the history of stigma and discrimination against LGBTQ+ people during the 1980s/90s HIV/AIDS crisis, all public health entities need to prioritize combatting misinformation and disinformation that can perpetuate the targeting of a marginalized community; and

**WHEREAS,** although MPV is not spread in the same way nor has it caused deaths in the U.S. thus far, public health officials should nonetheless use every resource acquired and every lesson learned from the COVID-19 pandemic to combat this virus and control its spread.

REQUESTING A MEETING OF THE COOK COUNTY HEALTH AND HOSPITALS COMMITTEE TO RECEIVE AN UPDATE FROM THE COOK COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH ON THEIR COVID-19 MASS IMMUNIZATION PLANS IN SUBURBAN COOK COUNTY

WHEREAS, on January 27, 2020, the United States Secretary of Health and Human Services declared that COVID-19, a respiratory illness spread by close contact through respiratory droplets, presents a public health emergency, and the World Health Organization characterized the COVID-19 outbreak as a pandemic on March 11, 2020; and

WHEREAS, COVID-19 continues to be a serious threat across the U.S. and Cook County, and

WHEREAS, many hospitals across the U.S. already have a higher load of COVID-19 patients than ever before since the pandemic began, and the director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Dr. Robert Redfield, warned last month that the next few months of the pandemic would be among "the most difficult in the public health history of this nation" and;

**WHEREAS,** as of January 19, 2021 there have been 194,898 confirmed cases of SARS-CoV-2 in Suburban Cook County under the jurisdiction of the Cook County Department of Public Health with 3,639 reported deaths; and

**WHEREAS,** on December 11, 2020, the FDA approved emergency use authorization of the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine; and

**WHEREAS,** on December 18, 2020, the FDA authorized the emergency use of the Moderna COVID-19 Vaccine in individuals 18 years of age or older; and

**WHEREAS**, the approval has quickly ramped up the federal government's distribution of the potentially lifesaving vaccine to 64 states, territories and major cities across the nation; and

**WHEREAS,** initial doses of Pfizer's vaccine have been limited as manufacturing increases, with priority given to health-care workers and nursing homes first, but with subsequent phases the distribution will become available to a wider portion of the populace; and

**WHEREAS,** the Cook County Department of Public Health (CCDPH) is the Illinois certified local health department for suburban Cook County, Illinois, with the exception of Evanston, Skokie, Oak Park, and Stickney Township, serving 127 municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Department of Public Health (CCDPH) working alongside the Cook County Department of Emergency Management and Regional Security is charged with making the COVID-19 vaccine available to people in CCDPH's jurisdiction of suburban Cook County; and

WHEREAS, CCDPH is working with partners at all levels, including hospitals, health care providers and community leaders, to develop flexible and responsive COVID-19 vaccination programs that can accommodate different vaccines; and

**WHEREAS,** it is paramount that as the vaccines become more readily available we work together and take advantage of all available resources in order to effectively administer the difficult and complex task of mass immunization so that we can overcome this healthcare crisis and look towards recovery; and

**WHEREAS,** equally important will be to ensure the vaccines are distributed in an equitable fashion, prioritizing those areas and residents of the county that have been most impacted by COVID-19 as a result of longstanding disparities in healthcare system access and delivery.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that the Cook County Health and Hospitals Committee convene a meeting to discuss the Cook County Department of Public Health's COVID-19 vaccination planning for Suburban Cook County; and

## PROPOSED RESOLUTION FOR ARPA HEALTHY COMMUNITIES PROGRAM INITIATIVES IMPLEMENTED BY COOK COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH ("CCDPH").

**WHEREAS**, on March 11, 2021, the federal government authorized the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 ("ARPA") which includes \$1.9 trillion in federal stimulus funds to hasten the United States' recovery from the economic and health effects caused by the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, specifically, the federal government has authorized and allocated a federal award of approximately \$1,000,372,385 of ARPA funding to Cook County to assist the County in its recovery from the economic and health effects of COVID-19; and

**WHEREAS**, on June 24, 2021, the Cook County American Rescue Plan Act Framework (the "ARPA Framework") was presented to the Cook County Board of Commissioners; and

**WHEREAS**, the Cook County Board of Commissioners via Resolution 21-3654 accepted the ARPA federal award allocated to Cook County to assist the County in its recovery from the economic and health effects of COVID-19 in the amount of approximately \$1,000,372,385.00; and

**WHEREAS,** Resolution 21-3654 further authorized the Cook County Budget Director and Comptroller to create and implement a Special Purpose Fund for the ARPA award and other accounting measures to track the acceptance and spending of the federal award; and

**WHEREAS,** the Cook County Board of Commissioners authorized the Chief Financial Officer, Budget Director, Chief Procurement Officer and applicable using agencies to issue grants, contracts and agreements for ARPA programs approved via Resolutions 22-3657 and 22-0637; and

WHEREAS, Cook County's Policy Road Map, adopted by Cook County in 2018, is the foundation of the County's strategic plan with pillars focused on Healthy Communities, Thriving Communities, Sustainable Communities, Vital Communities, Smart Communities, and Open Communities; and

**WHEREAS**, to further the Policy Roadmap Goal, the Cook County Health has developed a menu of Healthy Community programs and initiatives which have undergone review and approval through the Project Management Office process to utilize ARPA funding for such programs and initiatives pursuant to the issuance of grants, contracts, and agreements; and

**WHEREAS,** Resolutions 22-3657 and 22-0637 provided that any grants issued regarding ARPA programs in an amount over \$1M shall require the approval of the Cook County Board of Commissioners.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that the Cook County Board of Commissioners hereby approves the issuance of the following agreement by Cook County Health to utilize ARPA funding for multi-year terms through Fiscal Year November 30, 2024, subject to annual appropriation by the Board, for Cook County Health programs and initiatives as follows:

- 1. Enter into a Subrecipient Agreement with **NAMI Chicago** in an aggregate amount of up to \$1,485,000 to implement the **Sustaining Mental Health Hotline for Suburban Residents**, a program to utilize NAMI Chicago's existing mental health and crisis lines within in the city of Chicago to provide support for suburban Cook County residents. NAMI's Helpline will provides phone service Monday Friday, 9am to 8pm and Saturday and Sunday, 9am to 5pm to suburban Cook County callers. The Helpline is expected to field 3,500 4,000 calls per year in suburban Cook County. The Helpline will provide emotional support, information on mental health and substance use, refer callers to appropriate mental health or substance use resources, and assist in connecting to other social services when needed. NAMI will also provide intensive case support for callers with significant needs using their Clinical Support program.
- 2. Enter into a Subrecipient Agreement with the Chicago Food Policy Action Council (CFAC) in an aggregate amount of up to \$1,381,545.00 to implement the Good Food Purchasing Program, a program to direct institutional food purchasing towards five core values: local economies, environmental sustainability, valued workforce, animal welfare and nutrition. It provides a metric-based, flexible framework to assess the progress of public institutions as they work to become a recognized Good Food Provider. In 2018, Cook County approved a resolution promoting GFPP that requires all Cook County food-procuring departments and agencies to participate, including: Cook County Health, Cook County Juvenile Temporary Detention Center, Cook County Sheriff's Office, and Cook County Bureau of Asset Management. CCDPH has

partnered closely with Chicago Food Policy Action Council (CFPAC) on Cook County's Good Food Purchasing Policy implementation since its adoption in May 2018 (Resolution 18-1650), which specifically identified CFPAC as a key implementation partner. CFPAC is a non-profit organization that co-develops, facilitates, advocates for, and supports implementation of policies that advance food justice and sovereignty for all residents across Chicago and the region. CFPAC specifically focuses on advocacy, network building, resource sharing and cooperative movement to dismantle systemic racism in the food system and uplift Black, Indigenous, Latinx and People Communities of Color who are mobilizing food in community. CCDPH and CFPAC jointly convene the Cook County Good Food Task Force (which includes all procuring departments and agencies, as well as local leaders in food system change). The task force is working collectively to ensure that GFPP implementation builds a more racially equitable, accountable, and transparent food supply chain. CCDPH and CFPAC will continue to partner with Illinois Public Health Institute/Alliance for Health Equity to expand participation in GFPP across the Cook County region by advancing good food standards in suburban Cook County hospitals. CCDPH and CFPAC have identified areas that require additional capacity to achieve our goals over the next five years including: program evaluation, communications/design, audits for scratch cooking equipment kitchen audit, food waste reduction auditing, scratch cooking kitchen staff trainings, and translation/interpretation services for GFPPrelated outreach and events. Over the next five years, CCDPH will build upon existing Cook County GFPP implementation efforts with CFPAC, that which includes continuing to work with County Departments (Cook County Health, Cook County Sheriff's Office, and Cook County Juvenile Temporary Detention Center) and our national partners at the Center for Good Food Purchasing to track and analyze Department's food purchases, create Good Food Action Plans, and tackle plan recommendations. CFPAC will work with CCDPH and the Cook County Office of Chief Procurement Officer to incorporate GFPP in all County foodrelated solicitations based on latest recommended language and product availability/research. CFPAC will also work with CCDPH and the Cook County Office of Chief Procurement Officer to identify best practices and pilot innovative equity focused procurement and evaluation processes. In years 2-4, CFPAC will manage/monitor the release of micro-grants for suburban Cook County BIPOC food producers, suppliers, and cooperatives to expand their capacity to access Cook County institutional procurement channels.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that the Cook County Board of Commissioners recognizes that time is of the essence and authorizes the CEO of Cook County Health or his designee to negotiate and enter into the various agreements that outline the specific metric and impact data, and compliance with all ARPA reporting and monitoring requirements with the subrecipients listed above to implement the aforementioned programs; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that the Cook County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes the CEO of Cook County Health or his designee to modify the agreements and funding allocations to the above identified subrecipients based upon need and utilization.

# REQUESTING A PUBLIC HEARING TO DISCUSS COOK COUNTY COURT SYSTEM'S USE OF SCRAM CONTINUOUS ALCOHOL MONITORING DEVICES, OVERSIGHT AND REPORTING MECHANISMS FOR SCRAM DEVICES, AND EXISTING OR NEW CONTRACTS

**WHEREAS**, Cook County Courts have used Secure Continuous Remote Alcohol Monitor (hereafter "SCRAM") devices as a condition of pretrial release in DUI and alcohol-related crimes since 2006. The SCRAM bracelet is a continuous alcohol monitoring device worn on the ankle. The SCRAM bracelet takes a transdermal alcohol concentration (TAC) reading every 30 minutes and uploads data daily to servers via a home phone line. A TAC reading correlates closely (approximately 95%) with a BAC reading; and

**WHEREAS**, Cook County has previously entered into contracts with the Chicago-based company "CAM Systems" to provide SCRAM devices; their most recent contract expired in January 2021; and

WHEREAS, "CAM Systems" is a private company that supplies the SCRAM devices to more than 500 individuals annually, the individuals are billed \$12.40 to \$24.40 per day for the device. In some cases, the rate may be lowered depending on an individual's income or financial circumstances; and

WHEREAS, the original contract with "CAM Systems" included a provision that required the company to provide the Office of the Chief Judge with quarterly statistics reports that "minimally include, the number of defendant/probationers referred, the number of devices installed, the number of currently active

defendant/probationers, the number of defendant/probationers terminated from the program, a breakdown of the types of terminations, a breakdown of the number and types of rule infractions, the average and range for length of stay in the program l, and information about costs per defendant/probationer including average cost, range, and distribution; and "

**WHEREAS**, the Board of Commissioners and other relevant County stakeholders must have a comprehensive understanding, accurate data and reports regarding use of SCRAM devices, the devices' effectiveness, as well as clarity regarding Cook County's contractual obligations with "CAM Systems" and/or any other SCRAM vendors.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that the Criminal Justice Committee will hold a hearing to discuss the use of SCRAM devices, best practices for monitoring and accountability when issuing SCRAM devices, and contract provisions with "CAM Systems" and// or any other SCRAM vendors; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that, the Office of the Chief Judge, the Office of Chief Procurement Officer, the Cook County Justice Advisory Council and other Cook County stakeholders are asked to appear before the Criminal Justice Committee hearing to discuss the matter.

PROPOSED ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

**PUBLIC TESTIMONY** 

**BE IT ORDAINED,** by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that CHAPTER 2, ADMINISTRATION, DIVISION 2. - RULES OF ORGANIZATION AND PROCEDURE, SECTION 2-106 of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as Follows:

### Sec. 2-106. Public Testimony at meetings of the Board, its Committees, Joint Committees, and Subcommittees.

The Board encourages public participation in the legislative process. The following rules shall apply at any meeting of the Board and its committees at which public comment or testimony is taken:

- (a) Public testimony at all meetings. Subject to the provisions herein, public testimony will be permitted at all meetings of the Board, its committees, joint committees, and subcommittees. Any member of the general public may address the Board or any of its committees at any remote meeting required to be open to the public under the Open Meetings Act (5 ILCS 120/1, et seq.) in writing, or orally from a remote location by means of electronic, video, audio, or telephonic connection if permitted in the meeting notice.
- (b) Authorization to speak. Authorization as a public speaker or to provide written testimony to be read into the record of a meeting of the Board, its committees, joint committees, and subcommittees shall be granted to those individuals who have submitted in writing, their name, municipality of residence, subject matter, and organization (if any) to the Secretary.
- (c) Public comment period. Duly authorized public speakers shall be called upon to deliver testimony at a time specified in the meeting agenda, or at the discretion of the chair, but prior to final action by the meeting body as is practicable. For remote meetings, the public comment period may be limited to written testimony which will be read into the record.
- (d) Germane subject matter encouraged. Public testimony should be germane to a specific item(s) on the meeting agenda. To preserve order and decorum and in the interest of efficiency, the presiding officer may impose subject matter limits on public comment or testimony.
- (e) Time limits
  - (1) <u>Time limits</u> for public speakers. Written public testimony or oOral testimony will be limited to three minutes. The Secretary will keep track of the time and advise when the time for public testimony has expired. Responses to inquiries of the public speaker by the presiding officer or members shall not count towards any time limit. With leave, the presiding officer or members may extend a public speaker's time as desired.
  - (2) Overall time limit for public comment. All public comment shall be limited to sixty (60) minutes per meeting provided that the Board President or Committee Chairperson may allow a greater period of time for public comment subject to the consent of a majority of the Board when doing so will not interfere with the conduct of business or the maintenance of order and decorum at the meeting.

- (f) *Prohibited behavior for public speakers*. Public speaker or written testimony shall not include the use vulgar, abusive or otherwise inappropriate language when addressing the Board; failure to act appropriately; failure to speak to an item that is germane to the meeting, or failure to adhere to the time requirements may result in expulsion from the meeting and/or disqualify the person from providing future testimony.
- (g) Disruptions of meetings prohibited. Disruptions of meetings are prohibited. Disruptions include, but are not limited to:
- (1) Speech or testimony by an individual after expiration of the time allotted for the speaker's public comment or testimony;
- (2) Speech or testimony by an individual that is not germane to a specific item or items on the meeting agenda;
- (3)(2)Speech or testimony by an individual who has not been recognized by the presiding officer for public comment or testimony, who is speaking in a volume louder than a low, conversational level appropriate for communication between persons seated next to each other in the chamber, or whose speech is audible by others;
- (4)(3)Holding or placing a banner or sign during a meeting in a way that may endanger other individuals or that obstructs the free passage or view of others attending or viewing the meeting;
- (5)(4) Verbal comments and testimony must be conducted in respectful speech with no personal attacks;
- (6)(5)If an individual engages in disruption of the meeting, including, but not limited to, any of the actions described above, the presiding officer may: rule the individual out of order, direct the individual to cease the activity and impose other reasonable conditions for the individual's continued presence at the meeting. If the individual does not immediately comply with the presiding officer's order, the presiding officer may direct the removal of the individual from the meeting. Unless otherwise ordered by the presiding officer, any individual ordered to be removed from a meeting is excluded from returning to that meeting, unless the decision of the presiding officer is overruled by a majority vote of those members in attendance. Any two members may place before the body the question of whether to permit the individual to return to the same meeting;
- (7)(6) If an individual is removed either from two or more committee meetings within a 15-day period or from two or more consecutive meetings of the Board, the Board President or Committee Chairperson may exclude the individual from participation in public comment or testimony periods at future Board or committee meetings:
  - a. The Board President or Committee Chairperson shall notify the individual in writing of the type of exclusion, the specific reasons for the exclusion and the specific terms and length of the exclusion.

- b. The notice of exclusion shall advise that the individual may submit written comments to the Clerk Board Secretary for distribution to the Board members at future public comment or testimony periods.
- c. The notice of exclusion shall be filed with the <u>Clerk-Board Secretary</u>, who shall post it on the door to the Board chambers and on the Board's web page, provide a copy of the notice to Board members and mail the notice to the individual's last known address, if any. The notice is effective when posted. The exclusion order shall remain posted on the door to the chambers for the duration of the exclusion period.
- (8)(7)In determining the scope and length of an individual's exclusion, the Board President or Committee Chairperson may consider the seriousness of the disruptions to the orderly conduct of the meeting, the number of disruptions in which the individual participated and other reasons deemed relevant by the President or Committee Chairperson.
  - a. The Board President or Committee Chairperson may issue an exclusion from future participation in public comment or testimony periods for up to 28 calendar days.
  - b. At the next regular meeting of the Board, following the filing and posting of the exclusion notice, the exclusion order may be overruled or modified by a majority vote of those Commissioners in attendance. Any two members may place before the body the question of whether to overrule or modify the exclusion decision.
- (9)(8) Any individual excluded from participation in future public comment or testimony periods may appeal the exclusion by submitting a written appeal to the Clerk-Board Secretary within five calendar days after the exclusion notice is posted. The Clerk-Board Secretary shall distribute copies of the appeal to all Board members. The Board shall consider the appeal at the next regularly scheduled Board meeting if any two members place it before the body. The individual's exclusion from public comment or testimony periods shall remain in effect during the Board's consideration of the appeal.

**Effective date:** This ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.

Amendment to Section 8.1 - Limitations on Contributions to clarify the definitions of "official action" and "ministerial in nature" and to affirm that political contribution limitations apply to those who sought or are seeking official action, are doing or seek to do business with the County, and lobby the County.

  - (8) Members of the Board of Review
  - (9) Clerk of the Circuit Court of Cook County

The Compensation and Market Survey shall be filed with the Finance Committee of the Cook County Board of Commissioners by December 31, 2024 and every four (4) years thereafter.

(b) After the Bureau of Human Resources presents the Compensation and Market Survey, the Finance Committee of the Cook County Board of Commissioners shall act on any recommendations no later than March 31, 2025 and every four years thereafter.

**WHEREAS,** the Cook County Policy Roadmap, presented by President Preckwinkle in 2018, emphasizes creating Vital Communities through a goal of pursuing inclusive economic and community growth by supporting residents, growing businesses, attracting investment, and nurturing talent; and

WHEREAS, the Cook County Policy Roadmap section on Vital Communities contains the objective to, support expanded opportunities for local businesses, women or Black, Brown, Indigenous Nations, and Asian American-owned businesses and firms owned by people living with disabilities and a goal to expand Cook County's toolbox of available resources for small- and medium-sized businesses and entrepreneurs; and

**WHEREAS**, the Board of Commissioners supports that goal and seeks to see greater opportunity for small businesses and entrepreneurs to thrive in their districts; and

**WHEREAS,** in 2020, the Board of Commissioners passed a resolution calling for an outside evaluation of the suburban Cook County small business ecosystem and the needs of those small businesses; and

WHEREAS, Cook County retained Next Street to conduct this evaluation and present the findings to the Cook County Economic Development Advisory Committee's Small Business sub-committee; and

**WHEREAS,** the resulting report and data from Next Street's evaluation led to recommendation and launch of several programs including small business grant programs, manufacturing grant programs, and the Cook County Small Business Source; and

**WHEREAS**, the Cook County Equity Fund Report released in 2022 includes a policy recommendation to develop the small business and entrepreneurship ecosystem, especially for Black and Latine residents, to reduce the racial wealth gap and further states; and

WHEREAS, the Equity Fund Report further states, "Black and Latine business owners and entrepreneurs face significant disparities in access to capital at every stage, from early business development to expansion to emergency needs. This limits the survival and growth rate of these companies and limits wealth building in Black and Latine communities. Cook County should strategically target this support to suburban Cook County communities, which lack the existing private and nonprofit assistance available in the City of Chicago"; and

**WHEREAS,** the most requested service from small businesses to the Cook County Small Business Source is help with access to capital; and

**WHEREAS**, since 2020, Cook County Small Business Source has supported over 2700 small businesses with direct assistance. The businesses that have been served have been 55% women-owned businesses, 67% Black, Brown, Indigenous Nations, and Asian American-owned businesses, and 46% have 0-5 employees; and

**WHEREAS,** Cook County Small Business Source data shows that businesses requesting financing support tend to be smaller and more diverse; and

WHEREAS, Cook County's Bureau of Economic Development and the Economic Development Advisory Committee's Small Business Sub- Committee have considered both local and national data documenting the specific challenges for woman and BIPOC owned small business in accessing traditional financing options; and

**WHEREAS,** there are additional tools that Cook County could explore to leverage a spectrum of program models and resources to expand access to small business debt and equity financing and influence local financial institution; and

**WHEREAS,** Cook County Government is committed to supporting inclusive economic development and small businesses for all parts of Cook County and pursuing an Access to Capital initiative will further this work.

COUNTY COMMISSIONER, VACANCY IN OFFICE

**BE IT ORDAINED,** by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 2 Administration, Article III County Board, Division 1 Generally, Section 2-74 of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as Follows:

## Sec. 2-74. County Commissioner, vacancy in office.

- (a) District committee of same political party to appoint. If a vacancy occurs in the Office of Commissioner, such vacancy shall be filled by appointment of the appropriate district committee of the political party in the County Board District of which the incumbent was a candidate at the time of the candidate's election. If the incumbent Commissioner was appointed to the position, then such vacancy shall be filled by appointment of the appropriate district committee of the political party in the County Board District which appointed the incumbent. The appointee shall be of the same political party that the incumbent Commissioner was at the time of election or appointment.
- (b) Composition of district committee. The district committee of a County Board District shall consist of the committeemen of each ward or township of the appropriate political party of the incumbent commissioner when elected contained in whole or in part within the County Board District. In making appointments under this Section, each committeeman of the appropriate district committee shall be entitled to one vote for each vote that was received, in that portion of the County Board District which the committeeman represent on the committee, by the Commissioner whose seat is vacant at the general election at which that Commissioner was elected to the seat which has been vacated (or the Commissioner's elected predecessor, if the Commissioner whose seat is vacant was appointed) and a majority of the total number of votes received in such general election by the Commissioner whose seat is vacant is required for the appointment of the successor.
- (c) Written appointment filed with County Clerk. Appointments made under this Section shall be in writing and shall be signed by members of the district committee whose total votes are sufficient to make the appointments. Such appointments shall be filed with the County Clerk.
- (d) Duration. An appointment made under this Section shall be for the remainder of the term. no longer than 28 months. If more than 28 months of the unexpired term of a Commissioner's term remains, a special election shall be held at the next general election to elect a person to serve the unexpired term of the Commissioner. In the case of a special election, the appointed officer shall serve until the election results are certified and the person elected at the special election is qualified. If 28 months or less of the unexpired term remain, the appointed officer shall serve for the remainder of the term.

**Effective date:** This Ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.

**BE IT ORDAINED,** by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that Chapter 2 Administration, Article IV Officers and Employees, Division 1 Generally, Section 2-142 of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as Follows:

## **Sec. 2-142. - Vacancies**

The following provisions shall apply to the following separately elected positions: Assessor, County Clerk, Sheriff, and Treasurer.

- (a) Committee of same political party to appoint. In the event of a vacancy, such vacancy shall be filled to no longer than the end of the unexpired term as dictated by this Section by appointment. The appointment shall be done by the appropriate committeepersons of the political party of which the incumbent was a candidate at the time of the candidate's election or appointment. The appointee shall also be of the same political party that the incumbent was at the time of election or appointment.
- (b) Composition of committee. In the event of a vacancy, the committee that shall appoint the separately elected shall consist of Cook County committeepersons of the same political party that the incumbent was at the time of election or appointment. In making appointments under this Section, each committeeperson shall be entitled to one vote. A candidate is required to receive the majority of the total number of votes in order to be appointed.
- (c) Written appointment filed with County Clerk. Appointments made under this Section shall be in writing and shall be signed by members of the committeepersons whose total votes are sufficient to make the appointments. Such appointments shall be filed with the County Clerk.

If more than 28 months of the unexpired term of an elected official remains, a special election shall be held at the next general election to elect a person to serve the unexpired term of the elected official. In the case of a special election, the appointed officer shall serve until the election results are certified and the person elected at the special election is qualified. If 28 months or less of the unexpired term remain, the appointed officer shall serve for the remainder of the term.

**Effective date:** This Ordinance shall be in effect immediately upon adoption.

#### FLAG ORDINANCE

**BE IT ORDAINED,** by the Cook County Board of Commissioners, that CHAPTER 2 - ADMINISTRATION, ARTICLE I - IN GENERAL, SECTION NUMBER 2-2 of the Cook County Code is hereby amended as Follows:

# Sec. 2-2. Flag.

(a) Creation, description and coloration. There shall be a County flag, described as follows:

- (1) The central design, mounted on a white field, shall consist of a cobalt blue circular band, edged in golden yellow. Mounted on the blue band and arranged in a circle shall be 38 small stars, representing the 30 townships within the County outside of the City of Chicago, and the eight townships within Chicago. A 39th star, larger than the others, shall represent Chicago, the County's seat of government, and likewise shall appear on and at the apex of the circular band. All stars shall be five pointed. The central design, mounted on a white field, shall consist of a light blue (PANTONE® 291 C) municipal key. The top stripe shall represent the North Shore Canal, the Skokie River/ Lagoons, the Des Plaines River, and the North Branch of the Chicago River while the bottom stripe shall represent the Grand Calumet River, the Illinois River, Salt Creek, and the South Branch of the Chicago River and Lake Michigan.
- (2) On the white field within the blue band shall appear an outline of the County map, upon which are shown township lines. The map shall be a golden yellow, with border lines and township lines traced in madder carmine. (2) On the white field, around the light blue municipal key, shall appear a green (PANTONE® 7733 C) outline. The green shall symbolize the Forest Preserve District and nature found throughout the County. The placement of the green stripes shall symbolize a riverbank like seen at the Des Plaines River Trail and North Branch Trail.
- (3) Across the face of the map and extending on each of its sides, but still within the blue band, shall appear a white scroll, delineated in cobalt blue. The scroll shall bear the inscription "JANUARY 1831," designating the month and year in which the County was created by the Illinois legislature. The white field shall represent Cook County's innovation, commerce, and national economic leadership marked by major industries and significant advancements in technology, healthcare, architecture, and countless other pivotal fields.

- (4) On the white field above the central design shall appear in bold letters the word "COOK," and beneath the design, the word "COUNTY." All lettering on the flag shall be in capitals, colored madder carmine. (4) On the hoist end of the flag, there shall be a circle of six (PANTONE® 7622 C) red seven-pointed stars. The six stars shall represent foundational moments of Cook County including: the founding of Cook County in 1831; the founding of Cook County Health Hospitals Stroger and Provident in 1832 and 1891 respectively; the founding of the Cook County Department of Public Health, which remains relevant today through the pandemic vaccination, declaring gun violence as a public health issue, fighting food deserts, and ending health disparities; the founding of the Forest Preserves in 1914, which today remains a critical part of preserving natural lands and offering open space to residents; the founding of the first in the nation the Arthur J. Audy Home in 1899 marking Cook County's leadership in juvenile and family justice reform; and an ode to townships and local governments that make Cook County and which echoes the 30 stars on the old flag.
- (b) *Display*. The flag is to be displayed, when possible, in such manner that, when unfurled, its wording will appear on a horizontal line, the municipal key will appear horizontally, or at an angle of not more than 45 degrees.

## PROPOSED RESOLUTION

REQUESTING A FULL AUDIT OF THE COOK COUNTY COURT SYSTEM'S SECURE REMOTE CONTINUOUS ALCOHOL MONITORING (SCRAM) PROGRAM AND AN INDEPENDENT STUDY OF SCRAM EFFICACY AND PROGRAM ALTERNATIVES

WHEREAS, the Criminal Justice Committee of the Cook County Board of Commissioners held a hearing to discuss the use of SCRAM devices, best practices for monitoring and accountability when issuing

SCRAM devices, and contract provisions with vendor CAM Systems and/or any other SCRAM vendors; and

WHEREAS, the contract approved in December 2016 between Nienhouse Media, Inc., d/b/a CAM Systems and the Office of the Chief Judge provided that the "Cook County Auditor or any of its duly authorized representatives shall, until expiration of three (3) years after the final payment under the Contract, have access and the right to examine any books, documents, papers, canceled checks, bank statements, purveyor's and other invoices, and records of the Consultant related to the Contract, or to Consultant's compliance with any term, condition or provision thereof. The Consultant shall be responsible for establishing and maintaining records sufficient to document the costs associated with performance under the terms of this Contract;" and

**WHEREAS**, alcohol monitoring policies, an issue of not only public safety but also addiction treatment, must ultimately prioritize both fairness and justice. Cook County has the responsibility to ensure that drunk driving incidents are fairly adjudicated and that monitoring devices distributed to defendants prevent repeat offenses, and

**WHEREAS**, there still remain questions from the Cook County Board and criminal justice stakeholders regarding the Cook County court system's use of SCRAM and the contract with CAM Systems, general efficacy of SCRAM devices, and rehabilitation protocols for alcohol-related crimes.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, in order to gain a full and transparent understanding of the County's SCRAM program, related financial data, and contract provisions, the Cook County Auditor should perform a full audit of CAM Systems business and all relevant financial data in Cook County from 2017 to present; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, in order to ensure that perpetrators of alcohol-related crimes are given effective mechanisms for rehabilitation, Cook County shall commission an independent study about the efficacy of SCRAM devices and alternative alcohol monitoring programs.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Cook County Auditor and any vendor commissioned for an independent study shall complete their audit and independent study and issue a report to the President and the Board prior to the approval of any new contract that includes SCRAM.

A motion was made by Commissioner Daley, seconded by Commissioner Britton, that the Proposed Resolution be referred to the Criminal Justice Committee. The vote of the yeas and nays being as follows:
